30 but late fees were waived for those who waited to have their pet vaccinated at the expo.

Franklin Animal Shelter had a booth at the expo this year where representatives were on hand to explain an upgrade and expansion of their facility and accept donations toward the project. Phase One includes replacing the

animal quarters with new purpose-built kenneling and crates, and the reconfiguration of the outdoor dog runs for greater comfort and efficiency. Phase One began in 2015 and relies upon Phase Two, which will include an addition to the facility. The estimates costs are \$21,000 for Phase One and \$85,000 for Phase

Two.

Other informational booths at the expo included Liberty Doggy Day Care, Canine Light Therapy, and Meredith Place Emergency Veterinary Services.

TILTON — Seventeen members of the Winnisquam FFA Chapter participated in the 86th Annual Convention of the Granite State Association of FFA, April 14 – 16 at the Radisson Hotel in Nashua. Students from ten New Hampshire agricultural education programs were in attendance at the event, where students competed in Career Development Events (CDEs), took part in leadership workshops and were recognized at awards sessions.

Numerous Winnisquam Ag Center students were applauded for their work in agriculture. Iris LaRoche, Tyler Swain, Cianna Carey and Mackinley Goldthwaite placed first in separate categories, with recognition also going to Sierra Laughy, Caroline Crouch, Kate Merrill, Lauren Bolstridge, Roy Wells and Ryan Brown. LaRoche, Swain and Laughy earned additional accolades in yet other categories.

Winnisquam teams competed in various

events, with the Parliamentary Procedure group taking first place state-wide. The team consisted of Autumn Chaffee (chair), Caroline Crouch, Noah Wirth, Kay Foster, Cianna Carey and Mackinley Goldthwaite. Capturing second place was the Ag Sales team of Roy Wells, Caroline Crouch, Brenna Audet and Kate Merrill, with Merrill earning first individually and Audet placing fourth.

In the Job Interview CDE, Chaffee was fourth in the junior division, with Jared Partridge placing third in the sophomore category. Animal Welfare Display competitor Kirsten Frender tied for fourth place, while Novice Impromptu Speakers Kay Foster and Noah Wirth were first and third, respectively, in their age divisions. Senior Iris LaRoche earned fourth place in the Prepared Public

Speaking CDE. Results of competitions held in March at the University of New Hampshire were also announced at the convention. The Winnisquam Floriculture Team consisting of Frender, Audet, Goldthwaite and Grace Weingartner learned they had secured second place, with Frender scoring first overall in the Granite State. Tilton Island was recognized.

"The American flag out there couldn't be lit up at night, and it wasn't able to be lowered to half-mast so that was a problem," Scanlon said.

With numerous events held on the island each year, including the Hartwell concert series, weddings, and other memorial events, he felt the time had come to finally bring the pole up to the requirements of national flag etiquette. The cost to replace the pole would have been upwards of \$400 though and he felt that expense for the town wouldn't be necessary.

"There are a lot of people in our town with different talents. This was a case when I said, you know what, I've got an idea for this and I'll take care of it," said Scanlon.

First he arranged for the pole to be removed from the island and brought to his home where he could get to work correcting those issues.

Not wanting to run electrical wires for the lighting, Scanlon located a solar LED light that would keep the flag properly illuminated in the evenings, then welded it

to the top of the pole.

Next, he replaced the old fixed clamps that held the flag in place with a pulley and cable system, adding a metal eyehook that would secure the flag in either half-mast or full-mast positions.

The fillion on top the pole was also replaced with one that is gold tinted and, for only \$70, he was able to create a flagpole that not only met national etiquette but now gives the town something to show their patriotic spirit.

Last Friday, Public Works Director Johnny Van Tassel retrieved the newly refurbished pole from Scanlon's home and placed it back on the island for all to see, any SEE **FLAG**, PAGE A8

Stand-Up Lakes Region anti-drug program welcomes Chris Herren to Bank of NH Pavilion on May 10

GILFORD—Stand-Up Laconia received a \$6,000 donation from Meredith Village Savings Bank (MVSb) to secure Stand Up Laconia Lakes Region, a special event featuring guest speaker Chris Herren, recovering addict and former professional basketball player for the Boston Celtics, at Bank of New Hampshire Pavilion on May 10. Herren, who has already inspired thousands of youth nationwide with his personal account of addiction and success with recovery, will address approximately 5,000 Lakes Region junior high and high school students from Laconia, Winnisquam, Moultonborough, Wolfeboro, Inter-Lakes, Belmont, Tilton, Farmington and Gilford. The event is free to all attending students.

"Chris has struggled with substance abuse for much of his basketball career. Drug-free and alcohol-free since Aug. 1, 2008, Chris has refocused his life to put his sobriety and family above everything else. He attends meetings daily to support his substance-free lifestyle, often sharing his experiences and road to sobriety," said Luke Freudenberg, co-owner of Winnepesaukee Waterfront Management and member of the Wolfeboro Board of Selectmen. "With commitment from local schools

and the community, plus the generous donation from MVSb, teens will hear his story about stardom and success and how opportunities can vanish for a person just as quickly as they appear. It's encouraging to see and hear how his journey became another kind of success story through recovery. Chris reminds us that hope is always an option, and that we can survive and manage the peaks and valleys of life while clean and sober."

"We are honored to support this event, which will bring a much-needed and inspiring message to the youth of our region," said Rick Wyman, President of MVSb. "Chris Herren's experience offers guidance to local teens making crucial decisions every day about their own health, welfare and future."

Herren's professional basketball career began in 1999, when he was first drafted by the Denver Nuggets. He was later traded to the Celtics in 2000. As years passed, his addiction grew to a point where he could no longer play without being on drugs or intoxicated. He adopted a clean and sober lifestyle in 2008, and since that time, he's conducted more than 250 speeches per year, educating the youth about the dangers of substance misuse. Herren has been profiled in "Unguard-

ed," an ESPN 30 for 30 film released in 2011, and has authored "Basketball Junkie," a memoir chronicling his tortured battle with addiction. He has also founded The Herren Project, a non-profit offering education and mentorship on substance misuse for people of all ages.

Stand Up Lakes Region was originally conceptualized by Freudenberg and Shawn Coope of Wolfeboro.

"Destiny guided Chris to us through Luke," said Eric Adams, Executive Committee Member for Stand Up Laconia, a Laconia-based coalition working to end substance misuse. "I am

grateful that Luke took the initiative and booked Chris. I'm thankful that it all worked out in a way that MVSb was able to step in and alleviate our fundraising efforts to repay Luke. Having Chris come to speak to our teens could not have come at a better time."

Stand Up Laconia is a Laconia-based coalition working to end substance misuse by advocating for prevention, intervention, treatment and recovery. It is a growing coalition that was established to compassionately and effectively confront the causes and consequences of substance misuse. Members include parents,

The search is on for Tilton's next Boston Post Cane recipient

TILTON — The search is on once again for Tilton's oldest resident after the previous Boston Post Cane recipient moved out of town, making her no longer eligible for the distinction.

Sue Rayno, who was honored in 2014, returned the title to town officials when she left the community for a new home late last year. As a result, selectmen and Tilton Town Clerk Cynthia Reinartz are seeking information on

who should be the next resident to be presented with the Boston Post Cane.

The distinctive Boston Post canes were first distributed in 1909 to more than 400 New England communities, courtesy of Boston Post

newspaper publisher Edwin Grozier.

Conceived as somewhat of an advertising stunt for the paper, Grozier had specially made mahogany and gold-topped canes created to honor residents throughout New En-

gland for their longevity.

The canes were originally intended for the oldest male member of each community, but in 1930, the regulations were changed to include women as potential recipients. Over the past century the passing of

the Boston Post Cane has become a treasured tradition in each of the towns that were presented with one of Grozier's canes.

Criteria set by selectmen in Tilton requires applicants to have been a resident of the town for at least 10 years in order to be eligible for their Boston Post Cane award.

The designated honoree will receive a certificate noting that he or she is the oldest resident, along with a replica of the Boston Post Cane. Their name will also be added to a plaque at the Tilton Town Hall where the original cane is held on display.

Anyone with information as to whom the current oldest resident may be and would like to nominate them for the honor should submit a letter to the Tilton Town Clerk at 257 Main Street, Tilton, N.H. 03276 or email Reinartz at tctc@tiltonnh.org.

The submission must include the nominee's name, date of birth, address and telephone number along with the nominator's name and contact information. Forms for the nominations may be picked up at the Tilton Town Hall during normal business hours or can be found online at www.tiltonnh.org. All submissions must be received by Monday, May 16.

Belmont police investigating weekend accident

BELMONT — A Belmont man was seriously injured in an accident that occurred at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, May 7, after police received a domestic disturbance report from a female resident of Concord Street who told dispatchers that her husband had left their home upset and driving erratically.

"An officer arrived in the area to find that the distraught man had accelerated out of the apartment complex parking lot and

crashed into trees in the wood line across from 128 Concord St.,"

said Lt. Richard Mann of the Belmont Police. Officers who ar-

rived first on scene found the man to be seriously injured and bleeding heavily from his injuries. Belmont Fire Department was also called to the site and First Responders had to use the Jaws of Life tool to extricate him from the wreck. The accident victim was then transferred to Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center with multiple broken bones, according to Mann.

The vehicle, a 2004 Ford Taurus, was imbedded in the woods off Concord Street and Rusty's Towing had

to employ a crane to remove it. As a result of the damage, the car was considered a total loss.

"Several factors are being looked at in this crash, to include the use of unsafe speed and reckless operation," Mann reported.

The accident remains under investigation by Belmont Officer Patrick Riley, and anyone who may have witnessed the crash or has additional information regarding the incident is asked to contact the Belmont Police Department at 267-8350.

Discover the mysteries and legends of the Old Worsted Church with Belmont Historical Society

BELMONT — On Tuesday, May 17 at 7 p.m., the Belmont Historical Society will host a presentation by Mark C. Stevens, entitled "Legends, Mysteries, and Memories of the Old Worsted Church."

For almost 120 years, the old Worsted Church stood quietly in the northeast corner of Canterbury at the tiny cross roads hamlet sometimes referred to as "Hill's Corner" or the 'Canterbury Uplands.' Sadly, this unique Church burned to the ground in 1958.

This Old Worsted Church has an unusual history with many legends about it that involve New Hampshire politics in the highest offices, a tragic love affair interrupted by the Civil War, allegations of spying for both the Confederacy and the Union, owning a slave in Canterbury during the Civil War, a female preacher at a time when women weren't allowed to preach, orphanages and con-man swindles, a destitute recluse living in the church and relying on the chari-

ty of the neighboring Shakers, the somewhat bizarre (or beautiful) decorations that adorned the interior of the church, vaudeville dancer Gypsy Rose Lee, lost pictures of the fire that were found decades later in an old family Bible, and the almost comic rescue of the various artifacts that were saved during the church fire are just some of the elements that make this a good story.

The presenter, Mark Stevens, is a Licensed Land Surveyor, history buff, and Canterbury na-

tive. As a surveyor, his profession often leads him to old burned out cellar holes and it also dictates that he read a lot of old deeds, maps, wills, and other historic documents. As a history buff, he couldn't resist researching further into the story of the Old Worsted Church when he inadvertently stumbled across it. Mark spent several years interviewing people who remembered the Old Worsted Church, and collecting old photos, letters, newspaper clippings, journal entries,

and documenting the memories & legends he encountered.

The presentation will be held at 7 p.m. at the Corner Meeting House in Belmont, and is free and open to the public. Light refreshments will be served. The meeting house is located at the intersection of Fuller and Sargent Streets in the village. Parking is available behind the meeting house or in the gravel lot approximately one-half block south of the meeting house on Sargent Street.



NORTH COUNTRY NOTEBOOK

Ice, ice, it's everywhere, just what you need for a drink

I was just beginning a wonderful circular drive around the North Country this past Wednesday when, at the western approach to Dixville Notch, I came across a chunk of ice. "Across" is probably the wrong word, because this fragment of glacier was not in the road, but instead clinging tenaciously to a small cliff, like a limpet mine on the hull of a ship.

For some reason, this reminded me of an oft-repeated statement by Warren Pearson, longtime skimeister at New Hampshire's northernmost ski area, The Wilderness, near where I encountered the ice. One of his frustrations was how to get the word out to skiers down south that long after most other ski areas had shut down for the season,

The Wilderness still had plenty of snow.

"It's hard to convince people mowing their lawns in Boston that we still have plenty of snow," was his succinct way of putting it. Warren had the clipped accent of western Maine, not the better known Downeast drawl, and didn't mince words.

Further east, over the lip of the notch and coasting down into the Androscoggin drainage toward Maine, there was still plenty more snow and ice in the rubble of rock on the floor of the notch, where the sun hardly shines at all.

Not that this is the only place snow and ice can still be found in northern or high-country New Hampshire. There are plenty of places, in plenty of climes, where relics of winter will hang on well into early June, and still other places that will linger longer.

During my hiking days, when I knew many of the Appalachian Mountain Club's hut crews on a first-name basis, one of my favorite destinations was Carter Notch Hut, situated in a high valley tucked behind Wildcat Mountain. You reached it via

Carter Dome, a lightning-prone bald pate of glacier-scraped bedrock featuring a heart-stopping descent to a convivial supper and a warm bunk for the night.

There is an ice-cave there just beyond the hut, aligned in such a way that the snow packs in there, driven by the fierce northwest winds, but the sun barely penetrates even on the longest days of summer. And back in there, as the cave's mini-glacier slowly recedes, hikers and

hut-keepers alike keep stuff that'll spoil or they just want kept cool--butter, milk, and of course beer.

At Pittsburg's Boundary Pond, at 2,335 feet one of the state's highest ponds reachable (almost) by road, a famous deposit of snow and ice can usually be found southeast of the dam, well into high summer and sometimes beyond. Generations of people who've fished there have known about it, for good reason. If you plan to cook before the evening rise, for instance, and need your cooler and ice for the boat (wink,

nudge), you can scamper down below the dam and put your other spoilables on a nice little glacier of compacted snow.

Boundary, by the way, in times of yore known as Mountain Pond, is the pond on

which famed local pilot Harry Scott vowed to land his float plane (and of course take off again) but waited nearly a lifetime for the right conditions to do it.

This is a pond where the Canadian north-

westerlies blow fiercely most of the time, having attained awesome speed crossing the mostly open and flat countryside of the Eastern Townships of southern Quebec. They then smash into the remnants of the Ap-

palachian Mountains that form the boundary, and crash up and over, of course, Boundary Pond.

Harry tried to land there several times, but always aborted in a sort of "touch and go" decision. SEE NOTEBOOK, PAGE A11

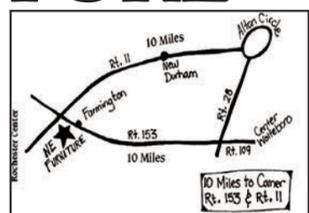

Dyer.

Dyer's own signature, added in 1964, can be seen at the bottom of the adjoining page, just inches below where

that of Attorney Harold Wescott, founder of Wescott Law where Dyer is the senior attorney, signed in 1927. Surprisingly, during the seven decades between the two Dyers, less than sixty new attorneys signed

the journal, indicative of the number of new lawyers in the county during that period.

Sadly, this valuable piece of Central New Hampshire legal history was once misplaced and thought lost for a peri-

od approximately ten years.

"I received information regarding its whereabouts, and we regained possession of it. As president of the organization at the time, I arranged for all attorneys

who would have signed during that decade to do so, effectively bringing the book up to date," explains Dyer.

For the next 30 years, Dyer took personal responsibility for the safekeeping of the journal, bringing it to all BCBA annual meetings. This unofficial role is referred to as Keeper of the Book.

At this year's meeting, held April 21, Dyer

passed the torch to the firm's newest attorney, Kahtrine Lacey.

"I know how much this book means to the association and I'm honored to have been entrusted by Attorney Dyer to carry on the care of such an important, historical item," states Lacey, an attorney with the firm since November of 2014. Lacey proudly added her own signature during the 2015 meeting.

Here's How to Keep Your Portfolio Healthy

corporate bonds, real estate, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on – you may help reduce the effects of market volatility on your portfolio. Keep in mind, though, that diversification by itself can't guarantee profits or protect against loss.

- Maintain realistic expectations. If you expect the financial markets to always move upward, you will be disappointed many times. Market downturns are a normal part of the investment process, and they will always be with us. Once you accept this reality, you will be less likely to make questionable decisions, such as abandoning a long-term strategy. If you've designed an appropriate strategy, possibly with the help of a financial professional, you can stick with it through all market environments.

By following the suggestions mentioned above – staying invested, rebalancing your portfolio as needed, diversifying your holdings and maintaining realistic expectations, you can go a long way toward maintaining the fitness of your financial situation.



The host Red Raiders performed well in a five-school meet, as the boys' team held off defending Division III state runner-up Kearsarge to capture the top spot while the girls' team finished second overall.

The boys' team won the meet with 116.16 points, holding off Kearsarge with 110.83. Prospect Mountain was third with 75 points, followed by Portsmouth Christian (35) and Woodsville (26). In the girls' race, Kearsarge claimed the top spot with 118 points, followed by the Raiders (101.5), PCA (43), Prospect Mountain (37.5) and Woodsville (13).

Gelinas was the top scorer on the day for Belmont, as the senior amassed 18 total points. His day featured impressive individual victories in both the 400 meters (53.7 seconds) and the 200 meters (24.5 seconds), moving down in distances for the day after dominating in the 1,600 meters throughout the early portion of the season. He also helped the 4x400 relay to a victory along with teammates Nick Randos, Colby Leroux and Zach Ennis.

Syed was the top scorer for the girls' team with 14 points, as the junior celebrated her birthday in style with a win in the 400 meters (1:07.2) and a third place finish in the 200 meters (30.1). Syed also ran the opening leg of the winning 4x400 relay team along with Emma Chase, Sarah Chase and Alice Riley.

Eli Allman had a strong showing for the Raiders, as his time of 16.2 seconds not only captured the top spot in the 110 hurdles but also qualified him for the D-III state championship.

Kylie Donovan matched Allman in the girls' 100 hurdles with a victory (17.5 seconds), while teammate Abby Camire was third overall in 21.3 seconds.

In the 100 meters, Belmont's Marc Forgione took the top spot in the boys' race with a time of 12.0 seconds, just ahead of second-place Leroux (12.3) and third-place River Mathieu (12.5).

Behind Gelinas' win in the 200, Brandon Scheffer was next in second place with a time of 25.4 seconds. Adam Sojka

also scored for Belmont (fourth, 25.8), while the girls' side saw Syed take third and Sottak finish fifth overall (31.3).

The field events featured a pair of individual victories for Belmont, with Scheffer winning the shot put with a top heave of 34 feet, four inches, qualifying him for the Wilderness League Championship. Delisle also took a win in the long jump, cruising to a personal best leap of 12 feet, five inches to earn the victory.

Rachael Violette was fourth in the shot put (24-1) with a PR while Katie Seiberth also scored in the event (sixth, 22-8.5), while Veronica Harris and Violette were third and fourth respectively in the discus. Tommy Pare was sixth in the discus on the boys' side.






