Community steps up to support victims and survivors of drug abuse at Walk for Addiction

TILTON — For the third year in a row, the Winnisquam community gathered to show their support for those who face addiction or have

lost loved ones to the ongoing drug epidemic through the Walk For Addiction, held on May 6 at Winnisquam Regional High School. Tilton Police Chief

Robert Cormier said his department once again hosted this year's walk in their attempt to raise awareness about the impact drugs have had locally. New this year was a Memory Wall, depicting those lost tragically through drugs.

"This is all about

showing our support for families and people who are fighting addiction and showing them places they can find resources for assistance," Cormier. "We want people to know that the police departments and the community are behind them. We're going to do everything we can to break this cycle of addiction and make families whole again."

Several departments called to battle Lochmere fire

TILTON — An alert citizen walking a dog at a little after 5 a.m. on May 5 discovered a fire at 3 C St., just off Lakewood Drive in the Lochmere District of Tilton, which ultimately

resulted in a two-alarm blaze when the flames began to spread through a tightly knit neighborhood comprised of both year round and seasonal homes.

Tilton-Northfield firefighters were initially toned to 35 Lakewood Drive in Tilton, but when they responded to the call, they found the fire to actually be located on a small lane just off that road.

Chief Michael Sitar said that upon their arrival there was heavy fire showing from a home on nearby C Street with exposure of flames



STRATEGIES FOR LIVING

Following Jesus' resurrection, Matthew, one of Jesus' disciples, tells us that "the eleven disciples went to ... the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted." Come again? After all they had experienced with Jesus, they doubted?

In the words of John Ortberg, writing in "Faith and Doubt," "This is an amazing picture. They have seen him, listened to him, followed him, studied him, and seen him crucified and resurrected - and the last thing we read about them is 'and some doubted.' ... Then Jesus gives the disciples what is called the Great Commission. ... Jesus looks at these worshiping doubters and says: 'You go! You doubters, go. You risk your lives for me. ... And you will find as you go that it is your own doubts that are healed.' Disciples are not people who never doubt. They doubt and worship. They doubt and serve. They doubt and help each other with their doubts (pages 176, 177)."

God, it seems, has called each of us to a life of faith and trust, and there is no other way. Like it or not, this is the way that it is. God is an Eternal Spirit -- Majestic, Sovereign, Transcendent -- and He has chosen most generally not to communicate to us through our material, human frame of reference.

But, as Ortberg has pointed out, He has not left us without an intelligent, tangible, answer to our doubts, a solution that is provable to anyone with an open mind. His name is Jesus. I believe in God, in His benevolence, His care, and His ultimate triumph – because Jesus did. Sure, it demands faith, but I have chosen to put my trust in Him rather than trust my own understanding. The perspectives that have been proposed by other's who have suggested an approach that keeps God out of the picture don't square with reality in my world.

None of us is able to live without faith and trust - in something. The fundamental issues of life – our origin, our purpose, our morality, and our destiny – all demand our attention. We can, of course, "bury our heads in the sand" and simply refuse to think. If that, however, is not an option, then we either place ultimate trust in our feelings or we look for someone else to follow – and let them do our thinking for us. When life has challenged my faith, when doubts overwhelm me with unanswered questions, I hold steady. To think of this as the only heaven I am ever going to know is simply not acceptable. I will not surrender to my instincts and exploit the physical to my own peril; neither will I accept a tomorrow that will not ultimately bring righteousness and justice. And even if I am totally wrong, my life is still testimony to the fact that ignorance with Jesus has led to a far better life than the wisdom to be found in anything society has to offer.



North Country Notebook A walk, in place of a run, offers many a reason to stop

On Monday morning---two days ago, on May 12---residents of far northern Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont awoke to a blanket of new snow, on the ground and atop picnic tables prematurely dragged out of winter storage by overly optimistic inhabitants of the frozen tundra. Local historians said the last time it snowed this late was a century before, in the spring of Ought 8. "No, it was the spring of Aught 8," remonstrated Fenton Hardwick, of East B Hill, Maine. "You media people and the forecasters are always getting it wrong. It's supposed to mean Zero, so it's Aught 8, as in '08." In that year, Mr. Hardwick recalled, the curled-up little feet of roosting chickens froze to their perches, and hapless hens could be released only by careful use of a hair dryer, courtesy of the R.E.A., rural electrification, which came to the countryside 30 years later. "Yep, that was the spring of '38,"

Mr. Hardwick recalled. Other farm families reported that hogs' nostrils froze shut, and could be pried open only by careful use of those tiny little crow-bars that were on sale for just the week before at Ocean State Job Lots.

(Okay, so I'm kidding in the previous two paragraphs, but the first one is true. It indeed snowed during the early hours of Monday, May 12---not a record for northern New England, by any means, but still a shocker to denizens who had already tuned up their lawnmowers.)

NORTHFIELD — The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) announces traffic shifts will begin Monday, May 8 on I-93 in Northfield and Tilton to allow for the rehabilitation of two interstate bridges.

The project involves the rehabilitation of the "Red-Listed bridgthat carry I-93 es" northbound and southbound over the Win-

nipesaukee River, NH Railroad, and a recreation trail. To complete the work, the traffic diversion and shifts will be utilized. Motorists are advised to stav alert and drive with caution through this work zone.

Beck & Bellucci, Inc. of Franklin is the prime contractor of the \$8.5 million project, which has a completion date of June 2019.

and smoke on three sides of the home. A first alarm call immediately went out to bring additional manpower to the scene, but Lt. Jonathan Powell of TNFD then requested a second alarm due to the proximity of other buildings and the extraordinary circumstances of the fire.

Among the many serious situations crews faced that morning were downed electrical wires in the area, along with two 100-gallon propane tanks, dangerously venting propane onto the blaze, Sitar said.

When the fire extended beyond its origin, two adjacent buildings sustained moderate damage before the crews on hand could extinguish the flames. Another two at a time when he was suicidal. His friend brought him to a Hope center and he's been with them ever since. He now serves as a volunteer with the organization when just a year ago he didn't expect to still be alive today. "It goes to show how

important it is to give people love, hope and strength because it's possible," said Cody.

Before supporters headed out on their walk, participants in Teen Challenge performed a song then all walk participants joined

nearby buildings, listed as unoccupied seasonal homes, also received some damage due to the extreme radiant heat, which melted their exterior siding.

Sitar said the owner of the home where the fire originated had already left for work and no one else was occupying the building when the flames broke out. Thanks to the quick thinking of the neighbor who not only called 911 but banged on doors to alert others about the fire, there were also no civilian injuries and no firefighters were injured in the course of the fire.

While it appears the blaze originated in the kitchen of 3 C Street, the fire remained under investigation on Monday afternoon.

The game ended with Prospect Mountain threatening with runners on second and third with two outs, but Winnisquam was able to turn a double play to end the game.


