## Woolett honored with Alton's Boston Post Cane

Charles Woolett received Alton's Boston Cane on Aug. 24 from Selectman Philip Wittmann, an honor bestowed upon the town's oldest citizen. Born on March 12, 1916, Woolett is 101 years old. Active in the Alton community for many years, he moved to Sugar Hill Retirement Community in Wolfeboro in 2014 from his Hall's Hill Road house following the death of his wife, Lucille.

There were cookies and refreshments on hand and attentive Sugar Hill staff members welcomed Woolett's daughters, Mary and Ruth, and his many friends acquired over the years, among them members of the Alton Rotary Club and the Masons. Woolett



### Money matters dominate BOS public hearing

*Coffee with the Town set for Sept. 6*

NEW DURHAM —

Last Thursday, selectmen deliberated on the details of how to make the best use of a quarter-million dollars in un-budgeted revenue.

Earlier in the week, the Baysider had a chance to catch up with Town Administrator Scott Kinmond in his office to talk about recent deliberations by the BOS at their most recent meeting.

"It was a productive session, which gave us a chance to sort through some important details about these unanticipated

revenues," Kinmond summarized.

The \$251,000 sum comes from two sources: a NHDOT road improvement grant and the re-allocation of the balance from a Capital Reserve Fund account dedicated to costs relating to property re-evaluations.

\$96,699.83 will be coming from the N.H. Department of Transportation grant. The terms of the

received wide smiles and warm handshakes from a line of well-wishers following the presentation.

Woolett was a member of the Alton Volunteer Fire Department for 31 years, beginning in

1952 and retiring when he reached the mandatory retirement age of 67. The firefighters met each month upstairs in the Bay Fire Station. He became the janitor and tended the furnace on his walk to and from the post office every day. Woolett says that in the early days, a separate home phone would ring to alert firemen.

Two major fires during Woolett's involvement were the fire at McGrath's store and the campground fire.

Woolett was known by others in town as a notary public, a broker for fire insurance with the West Farm Agency — following in his father's footsteps, and a Strout

Agency real estate broker for 35 years with Lucille, in a house by Levey Park, previously damaged by fire from a neighbor's barn.

In the early 50s he and Lucille owned the Busy Corner Store and lived in the apartment upstairs, eventually selling it to Sid Butler.

The Wooletts were long time members of the Community Church of Alton. Local historians may remember when the men of the church, Woolett among them, dug out the cellar, propped the church up on beam timbers and poured concrete in the cellar to create an area for Sunday School classes.

He says that Dwight Meder, who drove the school bus, was the minister. Woolet was head usher for 12 years and only missed one Sunday to attend daughter Ruth's graduation from UNH.

In 2015, Woolett donated funds for the

## Storytime, First Steps return to New Durham Sept. 7

**NEW DURHAM** — Calling all babies and pre-schoolers. First Steps and Storytime programs resume at the New Durham Public Library beginning Thursday, Sept. 7.

First Steps is an introduction to early literacy for the very youngest coming from all sensory sides. Singing, clapping, animal sounds, naming body parts, bouncing on a parent's lap, bubbles, and tactile stimulation make for a fun time for all.

"It's a great opportunity for newborns

through toddlers to hear lots of words and songs, to watch other children, and to interact with their parents," Library Director Cathy Allyn said.

"When you're that age, rolling balls and dancing are the gateways to reading."

The half-hour program starts at 10:15 a.m. and following the program, children move to the other side of the library to play with a large variety of toys.

Storytime runs from 11 to 11:45 a.m. and features fingerplays,

movement activities, rhyming, felt board, stories, and crafts.

"Through the years, we've done yoga, music, and movement programs," Allyn said, "so we throw a little of everything into a traditional story time."

Music and rhythm figure prominently in both programs. "We have a broad array of musical instruments," Allyn said, "so we use them often with the little ones."

Parachute activities are particularly popular. "The best thing in the world is to see

their faces the first time the parachute rises over them," Allyn said. "Some of our First Steppers just kick their legs in delight. It makes your day."

Both programs are free and no registration is required. Most children are ready for Storytime by the age of three.

"Some leave First Steps at two and a half, and some leave after three," Allyn said. "It all depends on the child."

## Protect Your Groundwater Day is Sept. 5

**BARNSTEAD** — If you're a private well owner, in the same way that you check your fire alarm batteries once a year, you should also check your well cap. One of the ways in which aquifers can become contaminated with bacteria is

by having uncapped, abandoned wells or current wells that are not capped properly. Take some time on Sept. 5 to check your well cap to be sure it has no damage and is tightly secured to your well head. You also should walk your prop-

erty to ensure there are no old, abandoned wells that are open.

This will help protect the quality of your groundwater.



# Shaheen tours Lakes Region facility

BELMONT — U.S. Senator Jeanne Shaheen spent time touring central New Hampshire last Thursday, visiting a few of the businesses and non-profit organizations in the region to learn more about what some have to offer and what others may need for assistance in the future.

Her first stop was Milpower Source in Belmont, where she hoped to learn more about the products they make. Shaheen currently serves on a U.S. Senate committee that is working on a new Defense Authorization bill. Since Milpower Source supplies components to several branches of the military, another purpose of her visit was to discover more about cost options available through those currently contracted by the federal government and others who have issued proposals.

"We have some new language proposed for the bill, and I want to find out the difference between long term spending versus cheaper costs that may or may not have the same power and security involved," Shaheen said.

Tomer Esched is the General Manager of Milpower Source, and his company has been involved in military contracting for more than 30 years. One of their main products is an Uninterrupted Power Supply, which serves the U.S. Navy in particular.

"When a ship's power is knocked out, the

UPS continues operating so they have radar,

computers and other (technology)," Esched explained. "What's unique about what we make is how rugged they are and how they can handle extreme conditions at sea for months at a time."

To ensure the UPS systems will work well under those varying

conditions, Milpower even employs a shock test for their UPS systems, which simulates what would happen if a ship were to hit something as powerful as an underwater mine.

"A 2,000-pound hammer swings down and hits it with 120Gs of shock. One of the rea-

sons we are so successful is no one else has ever been able to do that. It only happens here in quiet little Belmont," he told Shaheen.

He went on to say the UPS components are built like "tanks," able to sustain all other factors a Navy vessel may endure while out at sea for months at a time.

"They can't afford to carry spares out there. Reliability is the key," said Esched.

Milpower works with more than just the Navy however. The company also provides parts for the military's V-22 Osprey that feeds power to their generators. The V-22 is a specialized tiltrotor aircraft that has the capability of taking off and landing like a heli-

copter, but will fly like an airplane.

He told Shaheen they build power supplies for commercial operations, too. The company is currently working on a power supply unit for the Boeing 737 commercial aircraft to provide the aircraft with backup power.

"When a power source fails, this has to work because people's lives will depend upon it. This will be as close to perfection as you can get," he said. "In all of my career, I have never seen anyone pay as close attention to these details as we do here. Some of the things we build have been out there for 30 years and still function."

Shaheen asked Esched and his staff about the employment opportunities they offer and the tenure of those who are currently working at Milpower. She learned that among the employees are some recent hires from the past few years but there are others who have been with them from the start, now lending their expertise to the next generation.

Tomer said that workforce development is always a challenge in central New Hampshire but Business Development Manager Brian Paul told the senator that they have been working with local colleges and universities to help provide them with the necessary curriculum that will develop skilled workers for the future.

"The challenge right now is finding electrically-minded people," said Paul.

While touring the facility Shaheen also had many questions for employees about their job functions and was impressed with what she heard.

"This is the information I want to take back to Washington. What's great about it is to see it all being done right here in New Hampshire," she said.

From Milpower Source, Shaheen made her way to Voices Against Violence in Plymouth as part of her continuing support for domestic and sexual violence victims, then took a boat tour of Newfound Lake to learn more about ecological challenges and clean water initiatives in the region.



### *Impact investing*

Impact investing is a new term used for what I used to know as "Socially responsible" or "Green" investing. The premise behind this "Impact" investing is that you are to invest in companies that do not impact your social beliefs, religious beliefs, sexual orientation, guns, tobacco, alcohol or a litany of other issues that may be offensive to you or that you just do not care to invest in. It is a matter that should be discussed with your advisor or from my perspective, my client. Over the years of advising people on investing money, I have acquired clients that do have concerns about how and where their money is invested. Not that any of them have the same wants or needs, but in fact when you really drill down to what people care about, it is very specific

from client to client, and even different within the same household.

Don't get me wrong, I am all about giving people what they want. It just happens that when the list of things they do not want to invest in grows to a point, then finding companies that can make money for them starts to shrink. Setting realistic parameters often helps; for instance, finding a compromise with companies that meet most of their objective but maybe not all. Most mutual funds would have to be excluded because there are only a handful of Impact funds that are very general in nature that do not satisfy the specific request of the client and tend to have very high expense. Finding companies that meet a good portion of the clients wants will take some time and work to find acceptable companies, however I think in the long run making these choices will give my client more satisfaction and a feeling of more control over their money.

Many clients just want to make money regardless of the company stock that we buy, and that is fine. Some of the best companies to

buy in certain economic cycles are known as defensive companies. These stocks often are in companies involved with tobacco, alcohol or energy that make up some of the stocks that "impact" investing eliminates.

If you do want to invest your money in an impact style, just remember you still have to diversify, and that can be the tricky part. Talk to your advisor about impact investing and make sure they are able or willing to take the time to research companies that meet your criteria. If your advisor tells you

it is a bad idea or does not want to do it, find an advisor that that will work for you. After all, it is your money and conscience.

Steve Jobs, a founder of Apple said, "Your work is going to fill a large part of your life, and the only way to be truly satisfied is to do what believe is great work."



**WOLFEBORO** — The Winnipesaukee Winery grand opening is scheduled for the weekend of Sept. 9 and 10 from noon to 5 p.m. at 458 Center St., Wolfeboro, in the 1810 House antiques barn.



award stipulate that the funds are to be used for municipal road improvement projects. The timing is good for the town, as it was expecting to have to postpone some projects as a result of a lack of funding.

Kinmond presented the board with a list of prospective projects eligible for the funds. He said priority was given to projects slated for this year that were likely to be "shelved" because of pre-grant revenue shortfalls.

He cited as an example the repaving of a section of Old Bay Road between Tash Road and Drew Drive. Kinmond said the town faced a \$12k shortfall, prohibiting it to go forward with the improvement; Kinmond expects the total cost should come in at around \$42k. The infusion of DOT funding will allow the repaving to be completed in 2017, per BOS approval.

Kinmond also noted that Copple Crown District treasurer Pat Grant requested that some of

the grant ought to be used for road improvements within the village. The BOS was not able to approve this request since the conditions of the award do not allow DOT funds to be used for road projects in village districts.

According to the town web site, "The Copple Crown Village District is a small, separate government entity located within the Town of New Durham." It continues, "Formed in 1978 by a vote of the residents in that area, the village district operates under the provisions of RSA 52." The web site adds that the Copple Crown District consists of 83 households as of April 2017; eligible voters therein elect officers to manage the business affairs of the district.

The state law, which permits the establishment of such semi-autonomous entities within a municipality, notes that it's the district's responsibility to manage "[t]he layout, acceptance, construction, and maintenance of roads."

NHDOT Kinmond said that another chunk of the DOT grant will be used for

therefore interprets this provision as a prohibition against using state grant funding for road improvements in village districts.

While Copple Crown residents will not benefit from the \$96k grant, Merrymeeting Lake-area residents will see some road improvements, which will take the form of drainage upgrades. The overall project, slated for South Shore Road - partially in the area of the town beach - will cost some \$47k, with about \$22k derived from the DOT grant. Kinmond said that culvert enhancements and drainage line maintenance top the list of what's needed. The TA noted that such infrastructure is needed to draw water away from public highways so rainwater can drain into the lake.

Hard costs relating to this project include the purchase of pipe, subterranean structures, and the rental of needed equipment.

Kinmond said that another chunk of the DOT grant will be used for

including radios, EMT gear and other communications devices. Kinmond said that the unit is being bought off from a New York state dealer who was willing to match the state bid for a similar vehicle. The purchase was possible via a prior BOS action that clarified a fund restriction, allowing it to approve the purchase of "vehicles" not limited to "trucks." The more liberal interpretation of what a fire vehicle allows for the acquisition of assets like an SUV.

Kinmond also said that new efforts to engage the community are progressing. He lauded the inaugural "Coffee with the Town" event, which will take place on Sept. 6 at the general store. Kinmond said that he and other town representatives will be available over the coming weeks to connect with citizens.

"We want to hear [their] concerns and listen to what matters most to taxpayers," Kinmond said.

"It's really an effort to foster relationships, promote transparency and just get to know better the people we serve," Kinmond summarized.

He continued, "And having it at the general store over coffee puts us all in a neutral place where hopefully people will let us know what we're doing right, what their concerns are, and how we can all do a better job as public servants to do what's best for the town."

Kinmond also noted that the budgeting process is proceeding apace.

He said that department heads will be submitting their draft budget proposals to him by Sept. 15. After an administrative review, a month-long series of public hearings will begin on Sept. 27 and continue through Oct. 26. Among the departments that will be reviewed on Sept. 27 are those relating to town administrative and clerical functions, assessment, and welfare.

Subsequently, on Oct. 5, the BOS will hear from representatives from the NPDFD, DPW and code enforcement. DPW functions include highway maintenance, solid waste removal, and other duties.

The Oct. 12 session will feature presentations by the NPDFD, emergency management, the library, and parks and recreation.

Later hearings on Oct. 19 and Oct. 26 will include comments from staff and volunteers representing CRF, the 1772 Meetinghouse, the planning board, the ZBA, and the conservation commission - among several others.

All budget review sessions are scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. on the indicated dates. For a full schedule of public hearings, residents can call 859-2091.



People are apt to say, "Why don't you write a foaming-at-the-mouth editorial about throwing trash?" Well, here is where I get to say what a friend loves to say (which is somehow just not a guy thing), "Goodie," because I don't own any newspapers anymore and thus don't have to worry about having to come up with editorials. Instead, I write columns.

Okay, so this is such a smug in-house word-parsing thing, because people tend not to know the difference, but then why

should they? Article, item, column, letter, they're all the same-old, shname-old. It's like expecting people to know the difference between an Ayrshire and a Holstein. "Come on," most sane people think, "That's a farmer thing. It's a cow."

Anyway, my standard answer is that people who throw trash, as if it's somehow going to magically disappear (it is, think "The guy with the dog and the Jeep, and the neighbors") are not likely to read and comprehend, let alone read a column or editorial, let alone take it to heart and change their behavior.

Still, I just have to write about the incredible crassness of littering now and then, to dredge up terms like "morons" or "landscape-trashing louts,"

and get another crop of foam off my mouth.

As I wrote this, a hurricane was threatening the Gulf Coast, and the media were full of flood warnings and stories about "mandatory evacuation."

This is a loaded term if ever there was one. Who has the right to tell you to leave your home? "It's for your own personal safety" is the standard refrain. The implicit risk to safety and rescue personnel is often cited, and as a guy with more than the usual connections to people who take risks for others, I get that.

But there should always be a way, I think, for people to say that they don't want to be rescued, and will take

their chances. It's home, after all, and references to it are all through our founding documents.

But the seldom-mentioned element, I've always thought, is looting. Mandatory evacuation has too often been used as a signal for the criminal element to slink, slither, and slime their way into people's houses, sully the soul of the home, and steal whatever they can carry.

+++++

I was discussing all this with a friend, who said, "Well, people shouldn't be living in flood-prone areas anyway," and then checked herself, because she realized that for some people it's not a matter of choice.

And economic and social discrimination aside, it's a fact that Europeans tended to plant their first colonies where great rivers emptied into the sea. These generally offered safe anchorages and quick avenues for commerce with the interior.

Rivers make mud flats, deltas, and bluffs, and that's where Europeans tended to plant the first colonies and towns. Growth, being a tenet of civilization's mindset, resulted in millions of people now being where they shouldn't.

+++++

I remember taking a transcontinental train trip by way of Louisi-

ana a few years ago, and seeing the destruction caused by the most recent hurricane (I think it was Andrew) in West New Orleans. Some homeowners were rebuilding, but some of the houses were abandoned and were just plain junk.

How many of the people in these houses were there by choice? That's a question for social and demographic wizards. My view from the window of a passenger train was probably the worst, but that snapshot and some knowledge of the history of the place told me "Not many."

I'm lucky to live on a ridge at elevation 1,556 where, I'm fond of telling visitors (who increasingly seem to roll their eyes) any drop of rain that falls is headed for Long Island Sound as fast as its little legs can caper.

Mandatory evacuation? Knowing as much as anyone who's been on the planet for seventy years can know, and of course happily feigning fierceness in the face of the odds, if anyone told me that I had to get out of my home, I'd reach for the 30-odd six and head for the roof.





Fellow senior Chris Nelson will also be leaned on for his experience, as he takes a jump in the ladder to move into the top two.


