Discussion at Shaker deliberative session turns unexpectedly to Gale School

BELMONT — Shaker Regional School District officials held their first ever SB2 Deliberative Session last Wednesday evening after district voters approved the change to an SB2 format rather than an annual district meeting last March.

What was actually contained in the brief 2017 warrant presented last week didn't seem to be as important to many, however, as what was not on the warrant when the greatest topic of discussion was the historic Gale School.

Belmont's Gale School now sits vacant behind the middle school and SAU offices in Belmont Village, but in 1898, it was built to be a central location for Belmont students to get a start on their early education.

Over many decades of use the district outgrew the Gale School's resources and building was found to be in need of many repairs. In the 1980s and '90s a new elementary school and high school were constructed and the former high school became the middle school. Gale School was then left with no purpose other than cold storage for the dis-

In recent years, the district has lost interest in the building it still owns, but attempts to tear the Gale School down have been thwarted by those who value it for its unique architecture and historic significance to the Town of Belmont.

At the district's 2016 annual meeting, the Save the Gale School Committee was challenged to raise funds and arrange for the

Watson sentenced in connection with Tilton man's death

LACONIA — Brian Watson of Northfield was sentenced to 20 years to life in the New Hampshire State Prison last Friday for the sale of a lethal dose of fentanyl to 21-year-old Tilton resident Seth Tilton-Fogg in April of 2015.

After an intensive investigation, detectives from the Tilton Police Department arrested Watson in May of that year, and charged him with the sale of the drugs that led to Tilton-Fogg's untimely death. At the time of his arrest, Watson was reportedly found to also be in possession of several packages of illegal drugs, including fentanyl.

During the course of the trial, Watson's attorney said his 52-year-old client was unemployed at the time, and therefore was selling drugs to make ends meet for his

family. That argument made no impact on the court, however. After hearing testimony in January, the jury found him guilty of the sale of drugs with death resulting and on Friday Judge James M. Carroll handed down the maximum allowable sentence for his crime.



PERSPECTIVES ON LIVING

In the New Testament book of Hebrews, we read: "By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be known as the son of Pharaoh's daughter. He chose to be mistreated along with the people of God rather than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a short time. He regarded disgrace for the sake of Christ as of greater value than the treasures of Egypt."

Of Hebrew origin, he was the grandson of society's most powerful and wealthy man ... and everything life had to offer was available to him.

One cannot imagine the sumptuous life-style that was his to enjoy. The wealth, the power, a life of "wine, women and song" was his for the taking. But it was not to be. By the time we find him on Mt. Sinai in personal conversation with God, producing the Ten Commandments and the law that was to guide the nation of Israel, Moses had gone through a traumatic and life-changing transition.

Despite the ease and comfort available to him as an Egyptian Prince, Moses chose instead to be identified with his Hebrew family. When he was 40 years old, things finally came to a head. He killed an Egyptian who was abusing one of the Hebrews and had to flee for his life. For the next 40 years, giving up on any dreams of greatness he might have had, he became a shepherd to his father-in-law in southern Arabia. The "pleasures of sin," the sumptuous life-style, the educational opportunities, the benefits of power – all lay behind him.

But God had not abandoned him. At 80 years of age, God called on him to lead the Hebrew people out of Egypt into a 40-year journey through the wilderness of Arabia, to the land promised to Abraham centuries before. Moses, who had spent 40 years in Egypt thinking he was somebody, spent 40 years shepherding sheep thinking he was a nobody, only to discover that God can take a nobody and make a somebody out of him – so long as he is willing to pay the price for his success.

But that is God's way. He is more than able and willing – to take us as we are and where we are and help make us the best that we can be. That I believe to be true whether we acknowledge Him or not. But taking Him seriously and following the guidelines He has laid out for us, changes everything. A godly life may demand self-discipline and surrender to His will, something that unfortunately most people do not find the least bit appetizing, but as Moses discovered for himself, it beats anything a self-centered and godless life has to offer.

God's plan for our life, however, can only be discovered "from the inside out." In Jesus Christ we find enough evidence to substantiate the fact that our faith in God is not misplaced. It is to our advantage, far above anything life without God has to offer, to take a step of faith, accept Jesus Christ as the Lord of our life, and discover for ourselves that the promises of God have not been exaggerated; God is as good as His word!



It behooves us to remember when horsepower reigned

We've been under gas power for so long that it's hard to imagine what life was like when everything—and I mean everything---ran under horsepower. Yet this was little over 100 years

I think of this whenever I'm in towns like Wolfeboro and Alton and Plymouth and Littleton, and see palatial downtown and edge-oftown homes, built before the turn of the last century, meaning 1890 or so.

Invariably, these intown homes have an

attached barn with a door on the second story, maybe four feet on a side. And invariably, if I were to gain access via the owners, and things hadn't been all that much remodeled, I'd find two or three horse stalls on the ground floor.

The original inhabitants of these houses had to get to town center for groceries, mail, and of course to do business. And so there were shel-

The impetus for this column came from Henry Beetle Hough, who in 1940 wrote "Country Editor," a book I've long had on my shelves. In it he described life on Martha's Vineyard, when the horse society had just barely given way to

vehicles.

In the book, Mr. Hough talks about a Mr. Boyd, a longtime contributor to and supporter of the weekly paper: "He was the grandson of a Boston teamster who had carted cannon to the frigate Constitution."

Now, think about that. Today, you and I can go down to Boston and head for the waterfront and look for three tall masts, with rigging horse pulling a pung or

and all, and find our way to the USS Constitution, Old Ironsides. And in bent-over posture we can explore below-decks, and see some of the great ship's original cannon.

And through Hough's book, we have a direct connection to how some of those cannon got there.

It was another lesson for me on how so totally life in countryside and small-town and city relied on horses.

Those four-by-four doors above so many of today's in-town barns were there so a farmer could back up his wagon loaded with hay, send a boy up to mow away, and thrust huge forkfuls of hay up to a son, to be folded away there in the hay-mow. And that hay, delivered perhaps in October, would keep the doctor or lawyer or jeweler or teacher or storeowner or librarian or minister in enough hay to have a healthy

buggy to town. And the hay in the mow would last until the green grass of spring.

It was a time of unimaginable spin-offs from horsepower---harness makers, saddle makers, carriage makers, farriers. stable-keepers, horse-sellers and horse-buyers, veterinarians, and of course entrepreneurs who made a specialty of picking up after horses in the streets and storefronts, and keeping things clean.

It was an incredible lifestyle, all built on the power of grass.





What's Smarter -- Paying Off Debts or Investing?

your career, you will need to be prepared to face some financial challenges along the way - but here's one that's not unpleasant: choosing what to do with some extra disposable income. When this happens, what should you do with the money? Your decisions could make a real difference in your ability to achieve your important financial goals.

Under what circumstances might you receive some "found" money? You could get a year-end bonus from your employer, or a sizable tax refund, or even an inheritance. However the money comes to you, don't let it "slip through your fingers." Instead, consider these two moves: investing the money or using it to pay

Which of these choices should you pick? There's no one "right" answer, as everyone's situation is different. But here are a few general considerations:

Distinguish "good" and "bad" debt. Not all types of debt are created equal. Your mortgage, for example, is probably a "good" form of debt. You're using the loan for a valid


If you're just starting out in a hefty tax deduction for the interest you pay. On the other hand, nondeductible consumer debt that carries a high interest rate might be considered "bad" debt - and this is the debt you might want to reduce or eliminate when you receive some extra money. By doing so, you can free up money to save and invest for retirement or other goals.

> •Compare making extra mortgage payments vs. investing. Many of us get some psychological benefits by making extra house payments. Yet, when you do have some extra money, putting it toward your house may not be the best move. For one thing, as mentioned above, your mortgage can be considered a "good" type of debt, so you may not need to rush to pay it off. And from an investment standpoint, your home is somewhat "illiquid" – it's not always easy to get money out of it. If you put your extra money into traditional investments, such as stocks and bonds, you may increase your growth potential, and you may gain an income stream through interest payments and dividends.

• Consider tax advantages of purpose - i.e., living in your investing. Apart from your house - and you likely get mortgage, your other debts

likely won't provide you with any tax benefits. But you can get tax advantages by putting money into certain types of investment vehicles, such as a traditional or Roth IRA. When you invest in a traditional IRA, your contributions may be deductible, depending on your income, and your money grows on a taxdeferred basis. (Keep in mind that taxes will be due upon withdrawals, and any withdrawals you make before you reach 591/2 may be subject to a 10% IRS penalty.) Roth IRA contributions are not deductible, but your earnings are distributed taxfree, provided you don't take withdrawals until you reach 591/2 and you've had your account at least five years.

Clearly, you've got some things to ponder when choosing whether to use "extra" money to pay off debts or invest. Of course, it's not always an "either-or" situation; you may be able to tackle some debts and still invest for the future. In any case, use this money wisely - you weren't necessarily counting on it, but you can make it count for you.







Genesis Behavioral Health awarded grant for Youth Program

LACONIA — Genesis Behavioral Health was one of several local non-profit organizations to receive a grant from the Greater Lakes Region Children's Auction for programs that work to eliminate or mitigate the need for basic and extended services for children. The funding will support Genesis' implementation of a new youth program, SPORT © Prevention Plus Wellness, which will launch

later this spring.

Data from the Centers for Disease Control Hampshire (CDC) and Prevention show that American youth are at risk for a multitude of behaviors that are harmful to their health and well-being. These include alcohol, tobacco, marijuana and other drug use, physical inactivity, unhealthy eating, lack of sleep, and uncontrolled stress. The 2014 LRGHealthcare Community Health

Needs Assessment and the 2014 Central New Partnership Community Health Assessment both report that alcohol and drug abuse prevention and treatment and access to behavioral healthcare are two of the top five most important health issues facing our community. In New Hampshire and nationally, significant attention is placed on early prevention of substance

abuse problems through youth education to instill understanding of risks and skill building to promote risk reduction and resiliency strategies and abilities.

"The staff is excited to be able to utilize the proceeds from this generous grant towards providing evidence based services that integrate substance misuse education with the promotion of health awareness and self-care. This community is acutely aware of the current substance use crisis. The need for additional interventions and resources to create positive change for youth is evident," said Charlotte Hassan, Director of Child and Family Services at Genesis Behavioral Health.

SPORT © Prevention Plus Wellness (PPW) is a motivational intervention and evidence-based practice designed for youth ages eight to eighteen. This model integrates substance abuse education and prevention with health promotion to help children and adolescents minimize and avoid substance use while increasing physical activity and other health-enhancing habits, including eating well

and getting adequate sleep. The intervention promotes the benefits of an active lifestyle with positive images of youth as active and fit, and emphasizes that substance use is counterproductive in achieving positive image and behavior goals. SPORT PPW was developed with funding from the National Institutes of Health (NIH), and is listed as an evidence-based program on the federal government's National Registry of Evidence-based Programs and Practices (NREPP).

GBH will leverage its current partnerships with area school districts, Plymouth State University, Lakes Region Community College, and public health programs such Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL), Partners in Prevention, and Stand Up Laconia to provide trained staff who can offer this program to youth in our community. Staff will screen youth for their health habits, provide tailored feedback and positive image messages, help youth set and monitor multiple health behavior goals, and follow up with youth. The program includes parent resources so the message

is reinforced at home, as well as resources for the participants. SPORT © teaches youth how risk behaviors and wellness behaviors are connected and influence each other, and offers a unique educational and motivational strategy for improving the whole health and well-being of young people in our region. By bringing this program to the Lakes Region, Genesis Behavioral Health hopes to reduce the need for both mental health and substance use disorder treatment services for youth in our community.

Genesis BehavioralHealth is designated by the State of New Hamp*shire* as the community mental health center serving Belknap and southern Grafton Counties. A private, non-profit corporation, Genesis serves nearly 4,000 children, families, adults and older adults each year. 

On the Budget Committee there are four openings and four candidates who are willing to fill them- Craig Clairmont, Susan Harris, Norma Patten and Fred Wells.

Running for two three-year terms on Belmont's Planning Board will be incumbents Peter Harris and Recardo Segalini as well as challenger Kevin Sturgeon, while on the Zoning Board, chair and vicechair Peter Harris and Norma Patten are seeking another term on the six-member board.

Other candidates in Belmont are Mary Louise Charnely, running for the one three-year seat as a Library Trustee, Gail Thomas who is seeking the one-year Library Trustee position, Karen Jameson who signed up for a threeyear term as Trustee of the Trust Funds, and Norma Patten, running for a three-year term as a Cemetery Trustee.

In Northfield incumbent selectmen Wayne Crowley is facing a challenge by Lisa Swancott, while Town Clerk Tax Collector Cindy Caveney is running unopposed for re-election. Also unopposed is Michael Mur-

phy who asks to return to his position as a Trustee of the Trust Funds.

Sanbornton will be deciding between two candidates for selectmen this time around. One is current selectman Katie North who stepped up to fill an opening on the board last fall when Johnny Van Tassel resigned due to employment obligations. In March, however, North will now be challenged for that seat by former selectman Dave Nickerson who is looking to return to the board after a two-year hiatus.

Marla Davis is running unopposed for her position as Town Clerk/ Tax Collector, but Town Moderator Tim Lang is facing a challenge from Tom Salatiello this year.

On the Budget Committee, there is a threeway race for only two three-year terms, where incumbents Roger Grey and Ralph Rathjen are seeking to stay on the committee but are being challenged by John Vorel for one of those

For a two-year position on the Budget Committee it will be Justin Barriault, who was specially appointed to fill a vacancy until the 2017

elections, and Bill Whalen who has signed up for the position as well.

Both Marjorie Bray and Audrey Barriault look to fill the two openings for Library Trustees this year, Abigail Mercer is running unopposed for a three-year opening for Trustee of the Trust Funds in Sanbornton and one threeyear term as a Cemetery Trustee remains open for write-in candidates.

In Tilton four candidates are signed up to run for two openings on their five-member Board of Selectmen. Current selectman Joe Jesseman has opted out of a third term on the board, but incumbent Jon Scanlon hopes to retain his position for a second term. Others hoping to win one of the two openings are Wayne Brock, Eric Pyra and Ashlee St. John.

Town Clerk/Tax Collector Cynthia Reinartz, who has held her position for 18 years, is also being challenged once

again by Lynne Fox. Jane Alden is the only candidate who signed up for one of three openings for a three-year term on the Budget Committee while Juliet Harvey is seeking a two-year seat on the same committee.

Other uncontested races in Tilton are Janice Leighton-Boudreau for Trustee of the Trust Funds, Pete Fogg for Sewer Commission and Rachel Saliba for Library Trustee. Each of those openings is for a three-year term.

Voting for these municipal positions, along with school board elections for Shaker Regional and Winnisquam Regional School Districts, will take place in each of the respective towns on Tuesday, March 14, at their local polling locations.

"When we had the change to SB2 last year we decided not to do anything about the Gale School this year," explained Sean Embree, chair of the

school board.

The change to SB2, the board explained, forced them to place the Gale School on the back burner for coming year, which will now give committee members an extra year to work on the project.

Fogg and Gale School supporters argued time is being wasted though, since they cannot solicit funds for the building without a clear title.

"You're putting the Gale School Committee on the spot," Fogg said. "You wanted (the committee) to do something and they did. Now you have to honor that."

The committee, he said, has achieved a nonprofit status and has donors lined up to contribute to the future of the building. They won't do so however until the school board meets their end of the bargain by signing over the building and providing the promised funds for the move.

Fogg and others went on to argue that \$71,000 was approved by voters of the district last year to move the school to a lot on Concord Street, but it did not show up as a line item on this year's bud-

"We can't even apply for a grant because we're still not the owners," said Diane Marden, a leader of the Gale School Committee. "We've done our part. We need it in our name so we can entertain any grants."

Attorney James O'Shaughnessey and Superintendent Michael Tursi said they would look into the matter. In the meantime, Gale School Committee members were encouraged to continue their mission and meet with the school board over the coming months

In the end, the proposed operating budget of \$22,475,634, as approved by both the board and voters at the deliberative session. was moved forward as written and will be up for a final vote on March 14.

Other articles that district voters will be asked to consider next month will be a Collective Bargaining Agreement for teachers along with \$75,000 to be added to the Facilities and Grounds Expendable Trust Fund and another \$10,000 for the Technology Expendable Trust. Monies for those

articles will be derived from the district's unexpended fund balance on June 30 and have no impact on local taxes.

Details on all the articles are available at the SAU Offices and also on line at www. sau80.org.

Final warrant articles request authorization for voters to be allowed to cast their ballots for the district in both Belmont and Canterbury, and there is also a request to reverse last year's decision to operate under SB2 deliberative procedures and return to a public district meeting.
