## Belmont's Milpower Source receives a visit from Jeanne Shaheen

BELMONT — U.S. Sen. Jeanne Shaheen spent time touring central New Hampshire last Thursday, visiting a few of the businesses and nonprofit organizations in the region to learn more about what some have to offer and what others may need for assistance in the future.

Her first stop was Milpower Source in Belmont, where she hoped to learn more about the products they make. Shaheen currently serves on a U.S. Senate committee that is working on a new Defense Authorization bill. Since Milpower Source supplies components to several branches of the military, another purpose of her visit was to discover more about cost options available through those currently contracted by the federal government and others who have issued proposals.

"We have some new language proposed for the bill, and I want to find out the difference between long term spending versus cheaper costs that may or may not have the same power and security involved," Shaheen said.

Tomer Esched is the General Manager of Milpower Source, and his company has been involved in military contracting for more than 30 years. One of their main products is an Uninterrupted Power Supply, which serves the U.S. Navy in particular.

"When a ship's power is knocked out, the UPS continues operat-

ing so they have radar, computers and other (technology)," Esched explained. "What's unique about what we make is how rugged they are and how they can handle extreme conditions at sea for months at a time."

To ensure the UPS systems will work well under those varying conditions, Milpower even employs a shock test for their UPS systems, which simulates what would happen if a ship were to hit something as powerful as an underwater mine.

"A 2,000-pound hammer swings down and hits it with 120G's of shock. One of the reasons we are so successful is no one else has ever been able to do that. It only happens here in quiet little Belmont," he told Shaheen.

He went on to say the UPS components are built like "tanks," able to sustain all other factors a Navy vessel may endure while out at sea for months at a time.

"They can't afford to carry spares out there. Reliability is the key," said Esched.

Milpower works with more than just the Navy however. The company also provides parts for the military's V-22 Osprey that feeds power to their generators. The V-22 is a specialized tiltrotor aircraft that has the capability of taking off and landing like a helicopter, but will fly like an airplane.

He told Shaheen they build power supplies for commercial operations, too. The company is currently work-

SANBORNTON — Andrew Kellar of NH Solar Garden was present for a public hearing in Sanbornton last Wednesday evening, where he answered questions about his company's quest to develop a solar "garden" on approximately 100-acres of land off Tower Hill Road. The company had hoped that the board of selectmen would approve a Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) proposal that would help the company move forward with their plans.

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# Sanbornton police urge caution after weekend vehicle theft

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SANBORNTON — Police in Sanbornton are cautioning residents to keep their vehicles locked after a 2016 Ford F150 pickup truck was stolen from a home on Route 127 either late Saturday evening or Sunday morning, but they were pleased to report that

the vehicle was quickly found by officers on the seacoast.

"Thanks to some great help from the Portsmouth Police Department, the vehicle has been recovered and a suspect has been arrested," Police Chief Stephen Hankard said on Sunday.

In this case, the keys were left inside the ve-

hicle, making it an easy target for the thief/thieves who made off with the truck.

An investigation into the case is still ongoing, but Hankard and his department would like to remind everyone to keep their vehicles and their homes locked at all times and to store their keys in a safe, secure location

where they aren't readily available.

"As in this case, often criminals are looking for easy targets. The harder they have

to work at finding a victim, the more likely they will be seen and the more likely the police will be called," he said.

Anyone noting any suspicious activity in their neighborhood is, as always, urged to call police.

Civil War Re-Enactor Steve Morin to Present: "School of the Soldier Manual of Arms, Loading-Firing 'Procedures' and Kit and Accoutrements of a Union Infantryman." The program will begin outside at an authentic Civil War soldier's tent then will conclude in the library where Steve will present his collection of Civil War gear.

Steve is a member of the 5th NH Regiment of Civil War Re-enactors. Morin attended the Gettysburg 150th (2013), Cedar Creek 150th (2014) Appomattox 150th (2015) Grand Review Parade 150th (2015) and quite a few other unique events in the past few years. Many of the people he met were extremely

knowledgeable about the war and his research readings intensified over this period. The internet and social media also added to the depth of his knowledge and the authenticity of his presentation.

As to the regiment to which Morin belongs, the 5th NH, is what is called a progressive re-enactment/living history unit. They require 100 percent authentic gear and follow strict military procedure by the manual. To Morin, the most enjoyable times are when the men set up camp to attract and educate the public. His goal now is to continue to share his love of Civil War history, be able to show basic fundamentals of soldiering, and display and explain exact replicas of Union Army equipment and arms.

## Road work on Route 106 could cause delays

BELMONT — The New Hampshire Department of Transportation announces paving operations will require periodic daytime closures of the on and off ramps from the Laconia Bypass to NH 106 and NH 107. This work will begin on Monday, Aug. 28, and will continue for approximately one week or until the ramps are paved. Motorists should seek

alternate routes or follow detours that will be in place.

In addition to the ramp work, final paving and line striping of five miles of NH 106, from just north of Perkins Road in Belmont to the intersection of South Main Street in Laconia, will begin Tuesday, Sept. 5. This work will take several weeks to complete.

Uniformed officers and flaggers will be used to direct motorists through the work zone. All posted speed limits within the work zone will be strictly enforced. Periodic delays should be expected between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. Motorists should seek alternate routes as necessary. All businesses within the work zone will remain accessible to motorists.

This project includes pavement rehabilitation on five miles of NH Route 106 in Belmont and Laconia, as well as eight tenths of a mile on the Laconia Bypass, and the rehabilitation of three bridges. Busby Construction, of Atkinson, New Hampshire is the contractor for the \$7.2 million project, which has a final completion date of Oct. 27.

## Lakes Region Conservation Trust offers guided hikes to celebrate two projects in Belknap Range

GILMANTON — Join the Lakes Region Conservation Trust for a guided hike on Saturday, Sept. 9 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. to celebrate two LRCT land conservation projects in the Belknap Range Conservation Coalition (BRCC) Focus Area and along the headwaters of the Suncook River in Gilmanton. These projects are the 124-acre Rendall Conservation Easement and the abutting 88-acre former Fenollosa property, which lie between Guinea Ridge Road and the Griswold Scout Reservation (Camp Bell and Hidden Valley Camp) just downstream from Manning Lake and Lake Eileen.

The program will begin with light refreshments and recognition for these projects and for the people who made them possible, Nancy Rendall and Marilyn and Michael Fenollosa. This will be followed by an optional guided hike on the conserved land led by Nancy Rendall,

and the property.

The Rendall Conservation Easement property encompasses significant parts of a large wetland complex below the outlets of Lake Eileen and Manning Lake, and includes riparian buffer and a perennial stream system that is part of the headwaters of the Suncook River. The property also includes fieldstone house and barn foundations and fieldstone walls marking intensive agricultural use in the past. The conservation easement was donated to LRCT by Nancy Rendall, and the property is now owned by the Fenollosas.

The former Fenollosa parcel contains what was the last unprotected portion of a significant wetland and stream system that is part of the Suncook River headwaters, and approximately one-third of the parcel is classified as highest ranked habitat in the state under the New Hampshire Wild-

life Action Plan. When the land was in danger of being sold for development, Marilyn and Mike Fenollosa stepped forward to acquire and hold it for more than a year until funding for LRCT's acquisition could be secured. Nancy Rendall donated professional services for project planning and wetlands assessment needed to obtain grant funding, and the effort came to a successful conclusion when LRCT received the necessary grant from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services Aquatic Resource Mitigation Fund.

LRCT is very grateful to Nancy Rendall and the Fenollosas for their generosity and dedication to the success of these projects, as well as to the ARM Fund for its support for the Fenollosa project. LRCT's conservation of these key parcels builds on other conservation achievements in the Belknap Range Focus

Area in recent years involving LRCT, the Society for the Protection of NH Forests, BRCC, and others committed to conservation of the extraordinary scenic, natural, recreational, and historical resources of the Belknaps.

The Lakes Region Conservation Trust was founded in 1979 to conserve the natural heritage of New Hampshire's Lakes Region. ## STRATEGIES FOR LIVING

### What about life after death?

Many years ago, a friend of mine told of a group of boys who had been "cruising" in a small Missouri town in which he was a Pastor. They had been mocking a tent revival – popular in those days – and stopped by a local gas station for some fuel. Addressing the attendant, one of the boys said, "Give us enough gas to get to hell." They got their fuel, and their wish. Within just a few hours, a fatal traffic accident had taken their lives.

Coincidence? Perhaps. But life after death, our destiny, is not something to be taken lightly. My Pastor friend was in tears.

I am deeply disturbed that so many of my friends have given little if any thought to life after death. They can ignore the inevitability of death if they wish, but doing so will not change the facts. And the Bible is quite clear: there is life after death.

I, frankly, have no clue as to what heaven and hell are going to be like. The Bible uses a number of metaphors to describe a place of unimaginable suffering or indescribable magnificence. Hell, pictured as a place of eternal torment and heaven as a city with streets of gold, are but pictures used to describe the indescribable.

# Trash, and living in a flood plain, and being told you have to get out

When you talk with someone who lives on a back road, you risk getting into trash talk—not foul language, but talk about trash. What is it in the brain (or maybe lack of a brain) that lets people feel okay about tossing stuff out of a vehicle?

Suffice to say that whenever I'm out walking my road, I'm picking up trash. As are my neighbors. Talk with any dirt-road-dweller for very long, and the talk will turn to trash.

Throwing trash from vehicles is learned behavior, which means that it's a generational thing. If your grandfather and father blithely threw their favorite adult beverage containers out on the way home from work, you're likely to do as well.

People are apt to say, "Why don't you write a foaming-at-the-mouth editorial about throwing trash?" Well, here is where I get to say what a friend loves to say (which is somehow just not a guy thing), "Goodie," because I don't own any newspapers anymore and thus don't have to worry about having to come up with edi-

torials. Instead, I write columns.

Okay, so this is such a smug in-house word-parsing thing, because people tend not to know the difference, but then why should they? Article, item, column, letter, they're all the same-old, shname-old. It's like expecting people to know the difference between an Ayrshire and a Holstein. "Come on," most sane people think, "That's a farmer thing. It's a cow."

Anyway, my standard answer is that people who throw trash, as if it's somehow going to magically disappear (it is—think "The guy with the dog and the Jeep, and the neighbors") are not likely to read and comprehend, let alone read a column or editorial, let alone take it to heart and change their behavior.

Still, I just have to write about the incredible crassness of littering now and then, to dredge up terms like "morons" or "landscape-trashing louts," and get another crop of foam off my mouth.

As I wrote this, a hurricane was threatening the Gulf Coast, and the media were full of flood warnings and stories about "mandatory evacuation."

This is a loaded term if ever there was one. Who has the right to tell you to leave your home? "It's for your own personal safety" is the standard refrain. The implicit risk to safety and rescue personnel is often cited, and as a guy with

more than the usual connections to people who take risks for others, I get that.

But there should always be a way, I think, for people to say that they don't want to be rescued, and will take their chances. It's home, after all, and references to it are all through our founding documents.

But the seldom-mentioned element, I've always thought, is looting. Mandatory evacuation has too often been used as a signal for the criminal element to slink, slither, and slime their way into people's houses, sully the soul of the home, and steal whatever they can carry.

I was discussing all this with a friend, who said, "Well, people shouldn't be living in flood-prone areas anyway," and then checked herself, because she realized that for some people it's not a matter of choice.

And economic and social discrimination aside, it's a fact that Europeans tended to plant their first colonies where great rivers emptied into the sea. These generally offered safe anchorages and quick avenues for commerce with the interior.

Rivers make mud flats, deltas, and bluffs, and that's where Europeans tended to plant the first colonies and towns. Growth, being a tenet of civilization's mindset, resulted in millions of people now being where they shouldn't.

I remember taking a transcontinental train trip by way of Louisiana a few years ago, and seeing the destruction caused by the most recent hurricane (I think it was Andrew) in West New Orleans. Some homeowners were rebuilding, but some of the houses were abandoned and were just plan junk.

How many of the people in these houses were there by choice? That's a question for social and demographic wizards. My view from the window of a passenger train was probably the worst, but that snapshot and some knowledge of the history of the place told me "Not many."

I'm lucky to live on a ridge at elevation 1,556 where, I'm fond of telling visitors (who increasingly seem to roll their eyes) any drop of rain that falls is headed for Long Island Sound as fast as its little legs can caper.

Mandatory evacuation? Knowing as much as anyone who's been on the planet for seventy years can know, and of course happily feigning fierceness in the face of the odds, if anyone told me that I had to get out of my home, I'd reach for the thirty-odd six and head for the roof.



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

## Impact investing

Impact investing is a new term used for what I used to know as “Socially responsible” or “Green” investing. The premise behind this “Impact” investing is that you are to invest in companies that do not impact your social beliefs, religious beliefs, sexual orientation, guns, tobacco, alcohol or a litany of other issues that may be offensive to you or that you just do not care to invest in. It is a matter that should be discussed with your advisor or from my perspective, my client. Over the years of

advising, people on investing money, I have acquired clients that do have concerns about how and where their money is invested. Not that any of them have the same wants or needs, but in fact when you really drill down to what people care about, it is very specific from client to client, and even different within the same household.

Don't get me wrong, I am all about giving people what they want. It just happens that when the list of things they do not want to invest in grows to a point, then finding companies that can make money for them starts to shrink. Setting realistic parameters often helps; for instance finding a compromise with companies that meet most of their objective but maybe not all. Most mutual funds would have to be excluded because there are only a handful of Impact funds that are

very general in nature that do not satisfy the specific request of the client and tend to have very high expense. Finding companies that meet a good portion of the clients wants will take some time and work to find acceptable companies, however I think in the long run making these choices will give my client more satisfaction and a feeling of more control over their money.

Many clients just want to make money regardless of the company stock that we buy, and that is fine. Some of the best companies to buy in certain economic cycles are known as defensive companies. These stocks often are in companies involved with tobacco, alcohol or energy that make up some of the stocks that “impact” investing eliminates.

If you do want to invest your money in an impact style, just remember you still have

to diversify, and that can be the tricky part. Talk to your advisor about impact investing and make sure they are able or willing to take the time to research companies that meet your criteria. If your advisor tells you it is a bad idea or does not

want to do it, find an advisor that that will work for you. After all, it is your money and conscience.

Steve Jobs, a founder of Apple, said “Your work is going to fill a large part of your life, and the only way to be truly satisfied is to do

what believe is great work.”

residents, however, the board opted to take the proposal under consideration and reserve their vote for another day, saying they needed to take a closer look at the contract.

Kellar began the hearing by explaining that the project would consist of 80,000 solar panels that would provide 25-megawatts of electricity to the state grid. Residents of Sanbornton however would be able to sign on with the company at no cost and receive a slight discount of approximately one-cent per kilowatt on their electric bill.

Among the concerns of both selectmen and the public on hand was the fact that signing just one PILOT agreement (which are only available to utility companies) could open the doors for other similar requests in the future. Kellar replied by saying that his company's pro-

posal would bring the nearby electrical substation to near capacity however so any other utility companies would have to go to a lot of expense to move into the town.

"They'd have to build a whole other substation in order to come here and that could be quite costly," Kellar said.

The basis of the PILOT agreement NH Solar Garden proposed that night was a request to pay the town \$62,000 per year for 10 years rather than pay the town's regular tax rate on the property, which is now in current use.

"We would pay a different rate than other tax payers but we're not looking for any resources from the town, such as schools or anything like that," Kellar said.

Sanbornton's Municipal Assessor Rob Jutton said he plugged numbers into a formula provided by the state and valued the property's tax rate to be approximately

\$66,000 per year if it was removed from current use. He felt the proposed \$62,000 PILOT offer from NH Solar Garden was within reason however. Others felt that his \$66,000 figure was more reasonable and Kellar later conceded to selectmen that the increase of \$4,000 would not necessarily be a "deal breaker" with his company.

Jutton added that the contract includes a stipulation that would allow the town to revisit the contract in 10 years to see if there are any major changes in the company's revenue that might call for an adjustment in the agreement.

"They wanted 20 years and I wanted five years so we compromised at 10," Jutton said.

The PILOT would also mean tax revenue to Sanbornton that could amount to somewhere between 20- and 30-percent, depending on the size of the project once it's finalized. That money, whether it be \$66,000

or \$62,000, would be used to help offset the tax rate.

Some of the more than 25 community members who attended the hearing had questions about the presence of such a large solar array in the town. Most of all, abutters had concerns about glare from the panels as well as the aesthetic effects it would have not just on their neighborhood, but the town as a whole.

Kellar said the panels would be placed three-feet off the ground and rise only seven-feet from there. They would be located in a lower field on the property and not be visible from any real distance. He said his company and Clean Energy of Colorado, which will construct and maintain the facility, would plant a perimeter of trees along the boundaries that would also help keep the array out of public view. As for any glare there might be, he compared it to that from a field of snow.

"The panels are designed to absorb the sun, not reflect it," Kellar said.

Another point of concern to neighbors was the construction traffic on a narrow country road like Tower Hill. Kellar stated that once the major components of the panels were brought in, there would be little traffic and the company would also try to schedule those shipments for off-peak travel times.

Others were concerned that NH Solar Garden is a relatively new company with not much of a history to base their estimates on but Kellar said they have been successful in constructing solar gardens in several towns in Massachusetts. Over the past three years, they have worked in nearly two-dozen New Hampshire towns, including Winchester, Milton, Lisbon and Conway, along with the installation of a 75-megawatt array in Hinsdale in New Hampshire. Another 11-megawatt solar garden planned for Franklin was recently stalled by some regulation issues, but those have been cleared up and they

hope to move forward with that project in the near future.

While some were still not convinced that a solar garden was good for Sanbornton, Andy Sanborn was one of several who was in favor of it.

"When Ian Raymond spoke about putting in a biomass plant at the high school, everyone looked for the 'wolf' in the project, but there was none. It's saved the district a whole lot of money. I don't see a 'wolf' in this room here tonight, either," Sanborn said. "I think we should go forward with this. We need a little more forward thinking in this town."

At the end of the public hearing, selectmen found they had some questions of their own. All three concurred that they needed more time to look over the PILOT agreement and possibly propose a few minor changes to it. Kellar agreed to come back for a second meeting to see if the two sides could come to terms so his company can then move on to the site plan stage and discussions with the Planning Board.

ing on a power supply unit for the Boeing 737 commercial aircraft to provide the aircraft with back up power.

"When a power source fails, this has to work because people's lives will depend upon it. This will be as close to perfection as you can get," he said. "In all of my career, I have never seen anyone pay as close attention to these details as we do here. Some of the things we build have been out there for 30 years and still function."

Shaheen asked Esched and his staff about

the employment opportunities they offer and the tenure of those who are currently working at Milpower. She learned that among the employees are some recent hires from the past few years but there are others who have been with them from the start, now lending their expertise to the next generation.

Tomer said that workforce development is always a challenge in central New Hampshire but Business Development Manager Brian Paul told the senator that they have been working with local colleges and universities to

help provide them with the necessary curriculum that will develop skilled workers for the future.

"The challenge right now is finding electrically-minded people," said Paul.

While touring the facility Shaheen also had many questions for employees about their job functions and was impressed with what she heard.

"This is the information I want to take back to Washington. What's great about it is to see it all being done right here in New Hampshire," she said.

From Milpower Source, Shaheen made
