Ninth annual Turkey Trot kicks off Thanksgiving morning

Before gathering around the table for a big holiday meal, hundreds of people are expected to gather on the roads with their running shoes for the annual Gilford Youth Center Turkey Trot.

The annual 5K run and walk will take off on Thanksgiving morning through Gilford Village. Runners and walkers of all ages and abilities, even small children in

strollers and pets, are invited to take part in this Thanksgiving tradition benefiting local youth.

The race started as a nontraditional Thanksgiving event where people got together for a run before dinner. GYC director Scott Hodsdon said around 50 people came to that first race.

LRPA gives updates to Gilford board

A revamped website, expanded programming, and some new volunteers and equipment have helped Lakes Region Public Access broadcast events around the region.

LRPA Executive Director Grace McNamara gave the Gilford board of selectmen a semiannual update on the highlights of what LRPA has been doing during its meeting on Nov. 9.

LRPA's Public, Education, and Government (PEG) programming can be found on channels 24, 25 and 26. Entertainment programming is on channel 24, educational programming is on channel 25, and government programming is on channel 26.

LRPA has a new website, www.lrpa.org, which has a schedule of programming on the three different channels for and will livestream programming.

With the new website, LRPA is now a Google business and can now be searched on Google. McNamara said this has brought a lot of traffic to the site and it has had over 1,800 hits.

This year the station had summer hours from the middle of June through Labor Day as a cost saving measure. McNamara said there was no loss in service to the municipalities and this is probably something they will do every summer.

On June 29, LRPA started doing educational programming on Channel 24 with programming from La-

conia, Meredith, and possibly Belmont. McNamara said Gilford has its own Channel 24 for municipal use. McNamara said the town is welcome to send any kind of educational programming to run on this channel.

Belmont recently started broadcasting its municipal meetings. After not broadcasting their meetings for a year and a half, Belmont recently purchased a device to livestream their meetings.

McNamara said they also taped several community events over the summer, including Laconia Academy's graduation, all of Motorcycle Week, the Freedom Ride, and many more. Locally they also taped the Thompson-Ames Historical Society's reading of the Declaration of Independence in July and Gilford Old Home Day among others.

In the coming weeks LRPA will air the New Hampshire Humane Society's Black Friday Adopt-a-thon as well as the Laconia Holiday Parade.

The station is getting ready to air the Children's Auction of the Greater Lakes Region.

"We've been very, very busy," McNamara said. "We try to keep everything we know our municipalities want to do in mind. We're here for you."

McNamara said they have made some equipment investments. They have a refurbished Macbook Pro for editing and will be taking it to the Children's Auction. They purchased a dual channel wireless microphone SEE **LRPA** PAGE A14

Notes from the Gilford Public Library

A persecuted female black slave takes a literal underground railroad to escape; 22 men teach us about the male psyche as they reenact a historic football play; a 'small bomb' devastates the lives of locals in Delhi; Captain Jefferson Kyle Kidd makes a solitary trek through northern Texas sharing news of the world in the 1870s; Brooklyn is place of hope, opportunity, and extreme danger for the innocent. These are the stories that made it to the finals of this year's National Book Awards. Most of these stories could be called 'literary realistic fiction,' but the ways that they are told are as diverse as the authors. The National Book Awards remind me to be grateful for the staggering quality of novels today. Competition is steep, and the authors that make themselves know seem to have earned their notoriety. These are good books.

Of the finalists, by

far the most popular here at the library has been "The Underground Railroad" by Colson Whitehead. Whitehead has an apparent empathy with the struggle of his character 'Cora,' an escaping black slave woman in the deep south. The novel has a surrealist element in the existence of a literal underground railroad. In her struggle to escape there are elements of hallucinations and ruminations on the various forms of racism. It is an astonishing story, and the surrealist message is all too real.

"Another Brooklyn" is another well-liked novel in Gilford. Jacqueline Woodson penned a dramatic telling of life as a young girl in Brooklyn in a then-and-now style. The story is reminisced from the perspective of world-wise adult. 1970s Brooklyn was at once hopeful and terrifying, with opportunities and predators around every corner. The topic is severe, and the writ-

ing can come across as melodramatic, but the experiences are grounded in reality.

The one that caught my eye was "The Association of Small Bombs" by Karan Mahajan. The title doesn't make any apparent sense, so naturally it drew my attention. Indian author Mahajan explores the aftermath of a 'small bomb' killing characters in Delhi. A survivor contends with the trauma and PTSD concurrently with fresh bombing plots. Seeing perspectives from terrorists and their victims in the same story is chilling.

I'm ashamed to admit that I hadn't heard of Chris Bachelder's "The Throwback Special," but I'm glad the awards brought it to my attention. It's a book about the 'American Male,' their marriages, their work lives, their 'friendly' interactions, and their traditions. The cornucopia of male characters suggests that there are innumerable other

types that could have been included, but only 22 could fit. These caricatures meet annually to reenact 'the most shocking play in NFL history' of their own will, when in actuality they are reenacting their life stories for the reader.

Captain Jefferson Kyle Kidd was a solitary traveler sharing 'News of the World' with rural towns in 1870s Texas in Paulette Jiles' new book. The story is simple: The rugged loner gets stuck with an orphan, but during their travels they learn to rely on each other, and their newfound relationship gets tested at the end of the road. The telling is far more robust.

These were all worthy contenders, but Colson Whitehead's "The Underground Railroad" won the award. We will certainly have a book discussion on it at some point, so keep an eye out. The graphic novel "March" won the award for young people's literature, a stunning depiction of the

civil rights movement.

WOW Trail Phase 2 open for business!

Thank you! WOW Trail Phase 2 is now substantially complete and open to the public. Construction of this 1.2 mile section, coupled with the recently completed Winnisquam Scenic Trail in Belmont, means that locals and visitors alike can now enjoy four and a quarter miles of paved, multi-use recreation trail, from Elm Street in Lakeport to Osborne's Agway in Belmont.

Getting to this point has not been easy. Funding, abutter concerns, easements and land transfers, parking, wetlands, historic structures, and the engineering, design and technical challenges related to building a pathway in the active, State of New Hampshire-owned railroad right-of-way were all reconciled in the process.

As you can imagine, there are many people and organizations who've played a role and deserve our thanks. Let's start with the money to build this project, which is not a small amount. The WOW Trail has received generous, long-term support from the local business community, families and civic organizations. We

received a \$100,000 grant from the Community Development Finance Authority, the first ever CDFA grant for this type of project. The Downtown Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Advisory Board supported and the City Council approved the use of \$400,000 towards the project. Annual fundraising events including the WOW Sweepstakes Ball and the Runaway Pumpkin continue to be enthusiastically supported by the community.

The downtown business community and

community at large overwhelmingly supported the elimination of 12 parking spaces on New Salem Street to make room for the trail. Stratham Tire donated a parcel of land so that the trail could get around 2 historic sheds located in the right-of-way. The Foster family (formerly the Citizen building) granted an easement to cross their property to avoid the RR trestle over the Winnepesaukee River. The Dupont family granted access to facilitate the building of boardwalks and a bridge

over Durkee Brook. Many abutters have been impacted during the construction and into the future. For some, the trail brings users very close to their homes and businesses. These abutters, facing genuine concerns about how this will impact their property, have shown restraint and respect in our conversations. We remind all trail users to respect private property and help maintain a clean and safe trail. If you see something amiss on the trail, we urge you

To the Editor:

'Tis the season of giving—and of giving thanks. We at Genesis Behavioral Health have much to be grateful for this year and would like to extend to you—our community—our heartfelt appreciation.

2016 was a year of celebration and challenge. You helped us commemorate 50 years of service to the community with a fundraising dinner at the annual meeting and signature fundraising event, the online auction; both exceeding our expectations thanks to your support and participation. NORTH COUNTRY NOTEBOOK

A New Hampshire turkey story, just in time for Thanksgiving

Wild turkeys have always been part of New Hampshire's wildlife scene. The big mystery is just how far

north they ranged before subsistence hunting in settlement times wiped them out. By the Civil War, they were gone.

"About the northern end of Winnepesaukee has always been my guess," says Ted Walski, who not only knows his turkey history but has turned the state's restoration project into a wildlife success story known from coast to coast.

And it is truly a spectacular story--

from the first failed release at Pawtuckaway in the early '70s, to the release of a hardier variety around Keene in 1975, to a point where today's population is an estimated 35,000 to 40,000. Today, the big black birds with the ironclad feathers and keen-eyed sentries are seen in every county and every town in the state.

And to think that it all started with a swap, fisher cats for turkeys. (Caveat: My use of

"fisher cat" will make professional wildlife biologists cringe. A fisher is not a cat, of course, but has been called "fisher cat" ever since the first Europeans stepped ashore. The term is still very much in the small-town-countryside vernacular, and so I happily use it.)

It was back around the winter of 1969-70, Ted recalls, that West Virginia wanted to restore its fisher population, and let its northern neighbors know that it wanted some. New Hampshire, meanwhile, had plenty of fisher cats, and similar intentions on wild turkeys.

Wildlife biologists up and down the seaboard, and indeed across the nation, tend



 - **Invest in your children.** If you have young children, and you'd like to see them go to college someday, you may want to start putting money away toward that goal. You can save and invest for college in a variety of ways, but one popular method is

through a 529 plan, which offers high contribution limits and potential tax advantages. Plus, a 529 plan gives you significant control and flexibility: – if you establish a plan for one child, but he or she decides not to go to college, you can name another child as the recipient.

- **Be generous.** You don't have to be a millionaire to make meaningful financial gifts to your family. For example, if you have grown children, consider helping them fund their IRAs. You can't contribute directly to a child's IRA, but you can write checks to your children for that purpose – though, of course, they are then free to do whatever they want with the money. It's not always easy for a young person to "max out" on an IRA, which has an annual contribution limit of \$5,500 for workers under 50, so any help you can give your children in this area should be greatly appreciated.
- **Safeguard your own financial independence.** Almost certainly, one of the most undesirable outcomes you can imagine is to become financially dependent on your grown children. Even if you save and invest diligently throughout your working years, you could still

be vulnerable to financial dependency if you need an extensive period of long-term care, such as a nursing home stay. These costs can be enormous, and Medicare typically pays only a small percentage, and usually for just a limited time. To protect your financial freedom, you should explore ways of addressing long-term care costs. A financial professional can explain those alternatives that may be appropriate for your situation.

- **Communicate your wishes to your family.** At some point in your life, you will need to draw up your estate plans, which could include a will, a living trust, a durable power of attorney, a health care directive and other documents. To be fair to your children and other family members, and to avoid hurt feelings, you should clearly communicate your plans and your wishes while you are still around.

Thanksgiving means more than turkey and football. And if you can successfully apply the lessons of this holiday to your financial plans, both you and your family will have reason to be thankful.





to contact the police department.

The WOW Trail Board of Directors and volunteers continue to do the planning, outreach and maintenance activities necessary to keep the trails safe and accessible. The on-going efforts of individuals and community groups to pick-up trash, paint murals, plant and maintain flowers, trim weeds and prune trees, etc all contribute to the success of this project. In particular, the Opechee Garden Club continues to maintain a beautiful garden on the Lakeport end of the trail.

HEB Engineering did an excellent job with the design and construction support. With the stewardship of General Contractor Lyman Con-

Barbara Stanwyck made her share of famous films noir, including two infamous films -- "The Strange Love of Martha Ivers" and "Double Indemnity," – so it's an interesting footnote that "The File on Thelma Jordan" is a relatively obscure film. It was generally well received by critics in its day, with Variety noting that it "...unfolds as an interesting, femme-slanted melodrama, told with a lot of restrained excitement." It features very strong performances from both Stanwyck and Corey, the latter of whom was often relegated to supporting character roles.

"The File on Thelma

Jordan" deserves to be better known by film fans everywhere. So grab your popcorn and meet us after dark for this seldom-seen crime thriller from the past.

to know each other, and quite soon a swap was arranged: 31 cannon-netted wild West Virginia turkeys for 31 wild-trapped New Hampshire fisher (cats), courtesy of New Hampshire Trappers' Association members, who stepped up to the challenge and were paid a token fee.

Ted and coworkers let these first birds go around Pawtuckaway State Park, in the southeastern section of the state.

"And then we had the two worst back-to-back winters in history," Ted ruefully recalls.

The next release featured a more rugged Alleghenies variety, and when these birds found themselves in the hills and farmlands around Keene, they took.

And then Ted, by now official Turkey Project Leader (as well as carrying other important-sounding

titles) began live-trapping and transplanting surplus turkeys each year, edging the circle outward and eventually hop-scotching all over the state's Southern Tier.

By the 1990s, people were seeing turkeys everywhere, even in the far northern reaches of the state---Stewartstown, Clarksville, Errol, Pittsburg; Hall's Stream, Indian Stream, Perry Stream, Clear Stream and clear to the Quebec and Maine lines.

Hunting and fishing license dollars, and taxes on equipment, helped fund turkey restoration and law enforcement, and hunters have reaped just rewards in the form of successful spring and fall hunts.

Agriculture no doubt helped turkeys gain a purchase north of the mountains that they could not have obtained prior to European settlement,

and farming and milder winters in recent times no doubt helped them further northward too.

For Ted, one remaining question is just how far north wild turkeys originally ranged. Perhaps an overlooked mention in a town history will surface.

In the meantime I asked Ted, who has been at this turkey thing just about as long as I've been writing, how much longer he's going to hang in. "Until they scape me off the floor," he said.

Ryan, Lachapelle tabbed All-State First Team picks

REGION – It's been an impressive run of success for the local field hockey teams, as Gilford High School broke through to capture the NHIAA Division III state championship this fall, and Winnisquam Regional High School knocked off three-time defending champion Berlin to reach the D-III quar-

terfinals for the second year in a row.

Gilford's state title capped a string of four consecutive Final Four appearances and near-misses. In the state finals against Pelham, the Eagles clinched the championship in dramatic fashion with a double overtime goal to lift the trophy at Bedford High School.

Gilford had two

players selected to the Division III All-State First Team, as chosen by the New Hampshire Field Hockey Coaches Association (NHFHCA). Junior Kellie Ryan led the Eagles in scoring for the second year in a row, and she was honored with a First Team selection. Ryan scored 19 goals and added 13 assists in leading Gilford to a 15-1-1 overall record. Ryan notched two hat tricks on the season in wins against Mascoma and White Mountains, and she scored multiple goals in six games.

Her biggest tally of the year came in the state finals, when she finished a breakaway opportunity to top Pelham in double OT.

Fellow junior Jillian Lachapelle was also named to the All-State First Team after guiding the defense to a dominant season that featured 12 shutouts in 17 games. In addition to her work defensively, Lachapelle added two goals and eight assists on the season, with tallies coming against Laconia and Pelham.

Winnisquam (8-7-

1) was led on the field once again by junior midfielder Makenzie Snow, who earned First Team All-State honors for the second year in a row. Snow scored the game-winning goal in last year's playoff win over Stevens, and she initiated the goal to beat Berlin in the postseason this time around. Snow's blast was tipped into the net by a teammate as the Bears blanked the defending champs, 1-0.

Other area players to earn First Team honors included Franklin's

Hailey Haskins, Laconia's Cheyanne Zapala, and Newfound's Hayleigh Letourneau, Savanna Bony and Amanda Johnston.

Franklin's Deb Geordevits earned Division III Coach of the Year honors, while Monadnock's Madeline Ellnor was the D-III Player of the Year.

Gilford senior Kaitlyn Van Bennekum joined Ryan and Lachapelle as All-State players. The captain and key defender found her way onto the Second Team All-State squad, as she proved to be quite a cog in the heart of the back line in front of freshman goalkeeper Jenna Delucca.

Winnisquam junior goalkeeper Riley Toupin posted seven shutouts in net, and she was rewarded with an All-State Second Team selection. Teammate and classmate Kaylee Tierney was a top newcomer for the Bears, and she turned in an outstanding season to join Toupin as a Second Team pick.

Franklin's Lauren Pelletier and Lauren Marsh were also on the Second Team roster, as were Laconia's Devon Mello and Emily Gray.


