Parks and Recreation Director Herb Greene said the weather was nice for the event and they had a good crowd.

"It's great to see a good turnout and have nice weather for everyone," Greene said.

Old Home Day is organized by the Old Home Day Committee, who planned this year's event months after Old Home Day 2015.

Greene said the Old Home Day Committee is a great group that puts in a lot of time and effort into planning the event every year.

Greene said he overall liked the fun community atmosphere. He said different people will come at different parts of the day.

The scholarship was named in honor of the daughter of Rotarian John Walsh who died in an accident. Every year the scholarship is presented to a graduating senior at Gilford High School.

Rotarians grilled pancakes and sausage to serve food to guests.

"We always get a lot of great participation from club members helping and the public," said Gilford Rotary president Russell Lunt.

Around 500 people came for the breakfast, which Lunt said is an average number. He said they see a lot of locals, but they also see a lot of people who are visiting the area.

Potter Hill residents speak out against scheduled road improvements

Residents on Potter Hill Road are asking the town not to fix the road in 2017 due to concerns that it might make the current speed issues worse.

A number of Potter Hill Road residents came to Wednesday's selectmen's meeting. Potter Hill Road is on the Public Works Department's five-year plan to be worked on in 2017.

Gary Kiedaisch, representing the other residents of Potter Hill Road, spoke to the selectmen about ongoing safety concerns along that road. The road is posted at 25 miles per hour, though residents said they have seen vehicles going down the road at high speeds.

Kiedaisch and other residents spoke at a previous selectmen's meeting. Since then another

speed test was done of the road.

Kiedaisch said the tests show a 50 percent increase in drivers traveling eastbound down Potter Hill Road going more than 16 miles per hour over the speed limit. He said 40 percent of all drivers down Potter Hill exceed the speed limit by 11 to 15 miles per hour, whereas in 2014 35 percent of drivers were traveling at those speeds. There has also been a significant increase in cars down the road.

Kiedaisch said the residents request that the road be left a country road. A number of residents spoke against improving the road, concerned that the work will bring more traffic and cause people to go faster.

Some who spoke said they did not see the need

Special blacksmithing demonstration at the Gilford Farmer's Market on Saturday of Labor Day Weekend

Gilford's Jason Pal-tanavich will be demon-strating his blacksmithing skill on Sept. 3 as he shows how he makes his items that he sells at the Gilford Farmer's Market every Saturday. The market is held on the grounds of the his-torical 1838 Rowe from 9 a.m. till noon, and is located right beside the Elementary School. In

March he set up his shop in his garage with a pro-pane forge; it is a hobby and this is his first at-tempt to sell his items at a market. He has many sizes and shapes of hook forged from iron. How-ever, since he has been at the market he has gotten quite creative, thanks to customers asking for special designs and he is enjoying taking custom

orders. He has many garden designs, for ex-ample, long slender rods that can be put into the ground and that can hold wine glasses, candles, or bird houses or bird feed-ers. He has fiddleheads that can be inserted in your garden or on the side of a garage beside a garden. This summer he took classes at the New England School

of Metal Works in Au-burn, Maine to improve his technique. Come and watch a blacksmith demonstrate and see what he will be creating. Another craftsman

is Amy with her "Big Bags and Udder Things." I had to ask her about the name and her card that has a picture of a cow on it, I think you will chuck-le as she tells you her

Leia, aged perhaps one year old is the perfect sized pint sized canine for anyone looking to share their life with a happy, extremely outgoing, super intelligent dog.



In the pile was a recent note about a mountain lion attack in Idaho.

One of my oldest friends, hailing from coastal Maine in warm months and Georgia when the sun goes south, was in the territory for a couple of days, and for his going-away breakfast I said “Let's go to the Spa.”

Help to conserve Piper Mountain

To the Editor:

The Gilford Conservation Commission is extremely excited to announce the very recent signing of a Purchase and Sale agreement to purchase land on Piper Mountain. This has been the top priority parcel of the Conservation Commission and the Gilford Land Conservation Task Force for protection for many years, and is also a top priority of the Belknap Range Conservation Coalition, a group trying to conserve and protect as much of the Belknap Range as possible.

The land is comprised of 273 acres, and includes the summit with its open and beautiful views, many hiking trails, and important wildlife habitat. Surrounded on three sides by hundreds of acres of land already under protection, it has remained an obvious missing piece of the puzzle in dire need of protection.

The Gilford Conservation Commission and many concerned townsfolk are partnering with the Lakes

Region Conservation Trust to procure the land on Piper Mountain. We need to raise \$120,000 before Jan. 17, 2017, so our time is very limited. Donations may be sent to the Gilford Conservation Commission, 47 Cherry Valley Rd., Gilford, NH 03249. Checks can be made out to the Town of Gilford Conservation Fund with “Piper Mtn.” as a notation in the memo section.

Anyone who has hiked Piper can attest to the beauty of our Lakes Region's mountains and lakes as observed from the ledge outcroppings at the north and south summits, maybe while sitting on one of the “thrones” of rock.

We wish to unanimously thank the seller for giving us the opportunity to protect Piper Mountain for all to enjoy its trails and scenic beauty forever.

for a quarter of a million dollars to be spent for road improvements most of the residents don't want. They said that money could be used for other needs in town.

Penny Pitou said she has been living on that road for many years and used to be able to bike and walk to school. She said when her grandchildren were old enough to walk and bike, her grandson would see trucks coming up the road and get scared.

"It is almost like a way of life has changed," Pitou said.

Local landscaper Alan Lydiard said his company has done a lot of work at the Kiedaisch house and have to be extremely cautious when parking and walking out of the

trailer.

"I have to warn the men if they're coming out of the trailer you have to look because you will get run over," Lydiard said. "The speed of the cars on the road is incredible."

Kiedaisch also asked for a stepped up police presence and more speeders ticketed.

Police chief Anthony Bean Burpee said the police could do a direct patrol for two weeks, though speeding will happen again when people notice no cops are there.

He disagreed that ticketing people will change behavior; saying people who are ticketed speeding down Potter Hill Road will be speeding down another road.

Resident Geoffrey Dutton suggested that

parts of the road be returned to gravel, saying it will greatly reduce the traffic and the speeds.

Public Works Director Peter Nourse said he did not think that will be a solution. He said a gravel road will require more attention and maintenance. Town Administrator Scott Dunn said if the road was dirt, they would have the same traffic problem except the road would have the surface of a washboard.

Nourse said when he put together the five-year plan for the roads in town he noted that Potter Hill Road was in poor condition, especially the drainage.

"I don't know how bad it has to get before everyone goes 25 to 35,"

Nourse said. "I don't want to fix drainage and leave a wreckage of a road. I think law enforcement's a good thing, but turning it into a gravel road there's more maintenance involved."

Kiedaisch also recommended putting in a speed bump.

Selectman Chan Eddy asked about the possibility of putting in a speed table on that road. Nourse said there is no level spot on the road, though one possible spot might be by the Kiedaisch's barn. Board chair Richard Grenier said he is "dead set" against using speed tables.

The selectmen will take a look at that road before their meeting on Sept. 14 before making any decisions.

Tierno said she made a lot of friends in the experience too.

GMS drama teacher Matt Demko said they are really proud of the students. More than 700 students from across the country will audition and 250 will make it in. Demko said it is amazing that all 11 students from GMS who auditioned over the years have been accepted.

"Our kids can stand up to the best kids in the country and it's their hard work and dedication that allows them to do that," Demko said.

Demko also credited the parents of these kids for their dedication and involvement. The parents will stay in New York with the kids throughout the week.

better and verifiable trail-cam images out there, and if requested I'll not reveal anyone's identity or precise location. Ergo, I'm waiting...

+++++

I've been keeping track of cougar sightings in New Hampshire for more than four decades, investigating and publishing only the very best, the encounters that are beyond any reasonable doubt. Thus I'm carrying around in my head about a dozen reports that I consider unassailable.

Among them is the Canaan Hill mountain lion, which has been seen by several residents and passersby. It appears to be a young adult, and appears to pose no threat.

But ah, there's the rub. Adult cougars can weigh almost 200 pounds, and need a lot to eat.

We're all presumed to adore such top predators as symbols of the wild, assigning them the same kind of lofty emotional perch we've reserved for the wolf.

But mountain lions out West have been known to take children, and even adults of small stature. I remember a story about a 5-year-old (or so) in Colorado dragged off in front of his horrified parents, and a widely reported incident in California a couple of decades ago when tree-perched cougar killed a slightly built woman jogger with a bite to the

neck.

+++++

One of the old saws about travelling in far-flung forests is that there is nothing in the woods of the Northeast that'll kill you but your own stupidity. If you think about it, it's true. Absent grizzly or brown bears, and (in theory) absent a viable cougar population, about the only threat is not checking or being ready for the weather, or forgetting some crucial item for your pack.

Earlier this month, a family camping trip to Green Canyon Hot Springs in Idaho nearly turned tragic when a four-year-old girl, supposedly put to bed for the night, went outside the tent looking for a shoe and was snatched up by a cougar, which her mother had caught a glimpse of earlier. When the nearby parents heard screams, the mother, who was closer, ran at the cat, which dropped the child and left the scene.

The girl escaped with bite marks, punctures and slashes, and will be

all right. Idaho Fish and Game officers enlisted a hound hunter to track and tree the cat nearby, and killed it.

"It could have gone the other way so easily," the girl's grandfather told the East Idaho News. "She could have been gone and we would have never seen her."

So as the New Hampshire cougar story expands and evolves, we supposedly pine for the creature's return to its ancestral territory, as one more symbol of all that's wild and free, and of righting old wrongs (moose, turkey, falcon, marten, and wonderfully on and on). But in the cougar's case, would we be able to live with the consequences?



Despite heavy losses, Eagles eye fourth consecutive Final Four

GILFORD – For the third season in a row, the Gilford High School field hockey team found itself as one of the four remaining teams in Division III last year. The Golden Eagles took it a step further, reaching their first state championship game in 17 years after winning back-to-back titles in 1997 and 1998. Gilford ran into a buzz saw however, as undefeated Berlin capped its season with a 4-0 victory in the state title tilt.

Still, it was another outstanding season for an Eagle side that has transformed itself into one of the premier squads in D-III over the last half decade. After a 16-2 season in 2015, head coach Dave Rogacki enters his sixth year with the program sporting a sterling 55-23-5 overall mark.

“The one thing we talked about very early was we’re never going to be satisfied with reaching a plateau,” admitted Rogacki. “As soon as you reach a plateau, you flat line. We got to a certain point last year, but that was last year’s team. We’re a different team now, let’s see what we can build this year.”

The Eagles were set to open their season this week, with games on the road at Bishop Brady (Aug. 31) and home against Berlin in a rematch of the state championship (Sept. 2).

Who’s in: The sizable freshman class offers

all sorts of options for Rogacki, as Gilford will look to infuse some newcomers into the lineup immediately.

“You may see as many as four or five freshmen starting,” admitted Rogacki. “It’s one of those things where I couldn’t care less what grade people are in. Some people like to hold off on playing freshmen but I look at it as, what’re you saving them for?”

Freshman goalkeeper Jenna Delucca will challenge for a starting spot between the pipes, while defender Randi Byars will likely get the starting nod along the back line.

Sydnie Lehr (forward), Kolbi Plante (midfield), Julie Auld (midfield/defense), Emily O’Connor (midfield) and Laurel Gingrich (forward) round out the talented freshman class.

In addition, senior Julia Normandin (forward) and sophomore Laurel Normandin (forward) are also on the squad after coming over from the soccer team. The pair are outstanding athletes who should be able to use their athleticism to contribute in some way this fall.

Who’s out: There are heavy losses throughout the lineup due to graduation. In the midfield, Laura Zakorchemny was a four-year varsity contributor and captain who led the Eagles on and off the field during her tenure.

Up top, Logan Baxter was a menace to opposing defenses throughout

her career, and the forward’s ability to carve past and through squads opened up plenty of space around the field.

The Gilford defense was really hit hard by graduation, and it was a unit that allowed just eight goals in 18 games a year ago. All-State Second Team goalkeeper Jess Ladd was the anchor of the unit, and she

posted 14 shutouts in net while allowing just 0.5 goals against per outing.

Defender Sarah Lachapelle was a First Team All-State pick a year ago, while fellow back line partners Mariah Nelson and Hannah Saulnier also graduated.

The senior class also lost contributors in Sophie Sherkanowski and Autumn Bos.

not just depending on three or four kids to score and that’s a good thing.”

Senior forwards Shannon Anderson and Libby Giles also return to the unit up top, while classmate Annabelle Nowack returns to the team as a forward, as does Fran Perry. Junior Cloe Boucher and sophomores Nicole Berube and Brianna Salanitro all saw time there a season ago.

Inexperienced Eagles turn to new faces in title defense

GILFORD – If you're expecting to see a lot of familiar faces surrounding the Gilford High School volleyball team this season, think again. After capturing the NHIAA Division II state championship a season ago after posting a dominating 20-0 season, the Golden Eagles were decimated by graduation.

Now in her 32nd year at the helm at GHS, veteran head coach Joan Forge has her work cut out this fall. Replacing the bulk of her starting lineup, Forge will need to insert new players into unfamiliar positions, though if her history is any indication, she's just the person to do it.

"The team has its work cut out for them

and they have accepted the challenge of working extremely hard to fill those vacated positions," explained Forge, who will be assisted by Bill Beaudet, Amy Tripp and Michelle Martin this season. "I consider this season a 'work in progress.' We have a lot of work ahead of us and I've already seen a tremendous amount of improvement."

Gilford's title defense, albeit with a much different-looking squad, is set to begin on Sept. 9 with a road trip to Windham, while the home opener is slated for Sept. 13 against Kingswood.

Who's out: Let's start with the reigning Division II Player of the Year in outside hitter Jordan Dean, who graduated and is now playing at St.

Michael's College in Vermont. Dean was a dominant hitter, topping the 500-kill mark as a junior and powering ahead as one of the top offensive threats in the state.

Classmate and partner in crime Maddie Harris also moved on, and she's playing at Endicott College in Mass. this fall after coming into her own last season and providing the perfect complement to Dean as an outside hitter.

The losses weren't done there however, as starting setter Shannon Mercer graduated after a stellar career that saw her top the 1,000-assist mark late in her senior season.

One truly unfortunate loss this season comes in the form of junior Brooke Beaudet. The team's starting libero last year, Beaudet underwent surgery in the spring and will miss the season after proving to be an incredibly reliable back row performer in 2015.

"Last year, every player's position was set on the first day of practice because of returning almost our entire starting lineup," recalled Forge. "This year is completely different. It is fun for me as a coach to put the pieces of the puzzle together. I am still moving players around as they develop and improve their skills during preseason."

Who's in: Sophomore Karly Sanborn will inherit the starting setter slot from Mercer, and despite a lack of experience at the position, Forge said the athletic youngster is ready for the challenge.

"(Sanborn) has been trained as an outside hitter, but her quickness and athleticism is

why I approached Karly about being our setter," said Forge. "She has embraced the opportunity to learn this position."

Senior middle hitter Michaela Ralls is new to the squad this fall, while junior defensive specialists Bailey Hildreth and Kasey Moore will help shore up the team's back row with Beaudet on the mend.

"Back row defense is crucial in volleyball and I'm still searching for players to get the job done," Forge said. "We need consistent passing to the setter on both defense and serve receive and this is currently our biggest weakness. There are many top teams in D-II that return a bulk of their players from last year so we have a lot of catching up to do."

Sophomore outside hitter Maggie McNeil and classmate and middle hitter Lexi Boisvert round out the newcomers to the squad.

Who to watch: The Eagles have four returning players from last year's varsity rotation, and all four are seniors who will battle to get their first taste of contributing on a full rotation.

Stevie Orton will make the move from middle hitter to an outside hitter slot, while Maddi Currier returns to a middle hitter role. Sydney Holland is back as a defensive specialist and looks to lead that back row contingent mixed with younger players, while Cynthia Gagnon makes the shift from right side hitter to middle hitter this season.

"They're all working hard for the opportunity (to contribute)," said Forge.

GILFORD – For the sixth time in eight years, a new coach will lead the way for the Gilford High School football team this fall. The Golden Eagles turn to Josh Marzahl this fall, as he takes over for Shawn Garrett, who compiled a 10-8 overall record in two years at the helm.

Marzahl, who was the JV coach at GHS the past two years, has the arduous challenge of guiding a Gilford squad that officially merged with Belmont High School for a Gilford-Belmont cooperative program at the

"The defense is the one thing I'd say we have to rebuild," offered Rogacki. "We're kind of tweaking that and doing it a different way. We've been spending a lot of time trying to come up with different combinations on defense and who can support each other best."

Outlook: Despite the huge losses to graduation, the Eagles have key offensive returners as well as program-wide depth to fill in those gaps. With huge numbers at both the high school and middle school levels, it appears more likely than not that sustainability of success is well within reach for a program that seeks an unprecedented fourth consecutive Final Four this fall.


