## The future waits ahead for Belmont High School's Class of 2018

GILFORD — On Sunday, June 17, 100 members of Belmont High School's Class of 2018 gathered at the Bank of New Hampshire Pavilion in Gilford for the final time, celebrating not only the completion of high school, but also the future that now awaits.

Valedictorian Nicholas Randos said that in

preparing his speech he found himself fearful, not afraid of delivering a speech in front of hundreds of people, fearful of what the future may hold as he and his classmates go their separate ways.

"Many of us have been guilty of looking forward to college and what lies ahead, rather than staying in the moment...the thing is I real-

ized that I wasn't able to conceptualize what life outside of high school would be like," he said.

With phones and social media such a prominent part of people's lives though, he realizes there are ways classmates today can remain in touch. With social media however, people are often pressured to meet expectations of others,

think and not express their own thoughts and opinions. Randos said that being oneself takes courage and showing one's true self is powerful. He encouraged his classmates to abandon the fear of speaking out in the future, whether online or in person.

"This voice, our true voice, is the voice of change. We must remember this as we embark on

our new journey," said Randos. "I have no doubt that you will use your voice to make this world a better, safer and more understanding place."

Kaleb Brown was Salutatorian this year and for his speech, he turned to three philosophers for their thoughts on how one can achieve happiness but found conflicting ideas from each. Brown said that since Aristotle, Epicurus and Abraham Maslow could not agree on how to live a meaningful and happy life, perhaps there really is no one way to do so.

"We all live different lives, have varying backgrounds and divergent futures. Nevertheless, it is human nature to find

meaning and happiness. It's only a matter of discovering and walking our own path of doing so," said Brown.

The Keynote Address was presented by BHS math teacher Allen Sheehy who said he did not do well academically when he was in high school but he did learn a lot. He reflected on the many ways the Class of 2018 have learned over the last four years, too. While some studied hard, participated in sports, the arts or music and many clubs, others did none of that. They did what they wanted, Sheehy said, and didn't let the world change who they were; they chose their

NORTFIELD — Thirty years ago, dams were proposed on the Winnipesaukee River by Cross Mill Road that would have channeled all of the water into a 14 foot diameter penstock for three quarters of a mile into Franklin and left the river essentially dry. Friends of the Winnipesaukee River filed motions with the Federal Energy Regulatory Committee opposing those dams on behalf of local recreational groups. Now the area is a hot spot for outdoor activities including white water and flat water boaters, anglers, duck hunters and people accessing the adjacent Winnipesaukee River Trail.

On Saturday, June 23, at 1 p.m., there will be a dedication celebrating the generosity of the Blais family in donating a parcel of land to the town of Northfield to preserve river access for generations to come.

The Town of Northfield is grateful to Mrs. Gloria Blais and excited

to formally dedicate this property," said Glenn Smith, Northfield Town Administrator. "This truly was a community effort to make this happen."

A number of organizations were involved in this effort which was led by the Northfield Conservation Commission and Board of Selectman. ## Local dance studio celebrates 20 years in business

TILTON — Congratulations to Creative Steps School of Dance on 20 years of business success in the Lakes Region.

Creative Steps started in 1998 with one instructor in a single room and now has grown to multiple rooms of students who love to dance from all over New Hampshire at their studio in Franklin. Creative Steps was founded by Sue Harrington and her husband Troy with the goal of providing top quality dance education in a fun, rewarding, and nurturing environment to students in the Lakes Region.

"We opened the dance studio originally in Tilton as there was not a lot of education for the performing arts in this area," Harrington said. "I was traveling a half

hour to 45 minutes to teach at other dance studios when there was a real need in my home town for the performing arts, so I felt a need to fill the void."

Creative Steps School of Dance was opened as an educational service designed for students to have a fun, family orientated, and safe atmosphere in which to learn poise, coordination, and self-confidence through the discipline of dance.

"Dance is so much more than just learning steps or something to do after school," Harrington added. "The boys and girls who come through our door learn not just coordination and dance steps, but valuable life lessons like team work, self-confidence, persistence, disci-

pline and hard work."

Students are educated in many genres of dance by an experienced staff such as Ballet, Tap, Jazz, Contemporary and Hip Hop, but it's the hidden lessons that have made Creative Steps successful over the past 20 years. Ideals like "Can't is not in our vocabulary" and "You are only as strong as you push yourself" Have been the backbone of the studio.

"The past 20 years have not always been easy," Harrington said. "We have fought to keep the dance studio going despite a bad economy and some personal struggles for these kids."

## Investigation leads to drug-related arrests in Northfield

NORTHFIELD — Following a lengthy investigation by the State Police Narcotics Investigation Unit into the sales of fentanyl and methamphetamine, they, along with the N.H. State Police S.W.A.T. Unit and members of the Northfield Police Department, exe-

cuted search and arrest warrants at 55 Ledge Rd. in Northfield on Thursday, June 14. The search of the home resulted in the discovery of fentanyl along with two handguns and as a result of those findings, two individuals were taken into custody.

Joshua Cross, age 41, is a resident of the home on Ledge Road that was searched, and was arrested at the scene for the sale of a narcotic drug (fentanyl), possession of a narcotic drug with intent to distribute and for being a felon in possession of a firearm.

Designed to help strengthen literacy skills in young people of all ages, the Summer Reading Program lays the groundwork for preschoolers to become lifelong readers and learners, helps elementary school children develop positive attitudes about reading, and strengthens the high level of literacy that teens need for higher education and future employment. Students who read at least four books over

the summer fare better on reading comprehension tests in the fall than their peers who read one or no books. Nine out of ten kids say they are more likely to finish a book they've picked out themselves.

Magic by George visits the library on Thursday, July 19 at 10:30 a.m. This fast-paced show harmoniously combines George's playful persona with jaw-dropping magic, various genres of music, lighthearted humor, captivating storytelling and plenty of audience participation. of an audience member! In the afternoon, pre-registered children over eight will construct their own magic tricks using everyday household objects. 



her swimming abilities, but any land based activity she is game for.





## North Country Notebook

### Lots of advice on lightning, and it never left my head

A series of thunderstorms swept up from the valley and over my ridge the other night, and I stole out to immerse myself in the event. Well, not literally—I had a porch roof over my head. Still, enough tiny droplets and vapor tend to get blown out ahead of each part of the storm to make you wet, or think you are.

So I sat down in one of the rockers, alternately scooching it in and out in accordance to which way the rain was coming from, for it invariably reversed. If you are anywhere near an open window or door in a thunderstorm, you're going to get wet, usually right at the end.

These were small storms that came one after the other, the wind reversing at the end of one storm and then turning around the other way before the next. Sometimes, in between, the sun tried to poke through.

It was 2:30 in the morning. Nobody else seemed to be about, and that was

fine, because it would have probably been one of the New Hampshire Electric Cooperative's line crews, summoned to find and fix a break. These squalls are small but they hit hard. Errant lightning plays about.

When we were very young, we were taught not to fear lightning but respect it. Our mother, quick to toss us out to play in a soft June rain, would draw us into the house for thunderstorms. But she encouraged us to watch, from windows, doorways and porch. The greatest free show on earth, she always said.

Later on, in my years at Clarksville Pond, one of my jobs was to make sure each cabin had a boat, and to round up strays. If I wasn't paying attention, as teenagers are known to do, a sudden thunderstorm could sweep up the ridge and catch me just as I was

towing a couple of stray boats across the pond. It bears noting that the motive power was oars.

Because I also cadged when I could, I'd heard the stories about golfers struck by lightning.

Both scenarios, golf course and pond, featured people as the tallest objects in the vicinity. This is why I was always among the first to quit the golf course, fee or no fee, and why I rowed to beat "the Volga River Boat Song" on Clarksville Pond.

Rudy Shatney was my mentor at Clarksville Pond, and taught me about guns and axes and firewood and building fires in challenging conditions and a lot else.

He had first-hand knowledge of a fly fisherman being struck by lightning, but it wasn't on Clarksville Pond. Still, the story resonated.

Rudy's Uncle Gerard had a nice sheep and cattle farm down on Route 145, next to the old Batchelder Place. Everyone knew where the Gerard Hurlbert farm was, because it was in a beautiful setting and was neat as a pin, every blade of grass in place.

One time, Rudy and his wife Joan had to be away for a day, and left us kids with the Hurlberts. This was uneventful enough until a thunderstorm loomed.

Into a small bedroom we all went. As the sky went dark, out came a lamp. And then, with a thud on the bed, out came the big Bible. On our knees, we heard and repeated scripture until the skies cleared and the birds sang once again.

This was my first experience with that particular precaution regarding lightning, and one thing I can say is that it was a whole lot easier than towing boats across the pond. But all I truly remember about the incident is that like all of the other advice on how not to get struck by lightning, it worked.



### Don't Let Your Investments Go on "Vacation"

Summer is here – and so is vacation season. Americans spend a lot on their summer getaways – more than \$100 billion in 2017 alone, as reported in Travel and Leisure magazine. Match the right investment with the right "job." You

hire an electrician to install a light fixture, you employ a plumber to clear a clogged drain, and you would not expect either one to work on the other's project. However, using an index as a measuring stick has some drawbacks, one of which is the lack of a personal connection to your situation. Look at it this way: In many types of organizations, you

typically go through performance reviews, where your work is assessed in terms of how well it helped you move toward your goals – and you can follow the same process with your investments. Specifically, you can measure their performance by how effective they are in helping you move toward your financial objectives. For example, if you need your portfolio to provide you with a certain rate of return to meet specific retirement goals at a designated age, but you find that you are not currently on track toward meeting these goals, you may need to adjust your investment

mix to potentially provide you with a higher return. Be aware, though, that seeking higher return potential will likely mean taking on more risk. You may want to consult with a financial professional to make sure you find a risk/reward ratio suitable for your goals and risk tolerance.

#### Look for hard-working investments.

Some investments work especially hard. Some stocks, or investments containing stocks, pay dividends. Instead of taking the dividends, you can choose to reinvest them, purchasing even more shares – and

increased share ownership is one key to helping build financial resources for the long term. Dividend reinvestment is typically automatic, so once you have chosen this option, there's really no extra work on your part. (Keep in mind, though, that companies are not obligated to pay dividends, and they can be reduced or eliminated at any time.)

In the investing arena, as in many endeavors, hard work can be rewarding. So look for opportunities to keep your investments gainfully employed throughout your life.

TILTON — The Winnisquam Regional High School softball team had a couple players recognized for their strong play this season, as sophomore Carly Catty and senior Emily Decormier were named to this year's Division 3 All-State team.

## Riley, Dupuis earn All-State honors

BELMONT — Belmont High School was represented in this year's Division 3 All-State track team, with Hunter Dupuis and Alice Riley among the 16 athletes named.

Dupuis had an amazing season that was highlighted with winning the state championship in the 200-meter dash with a time of 22.87; the 100 meters with a time of 11.61 and the 4X100-meter relay with a time of 45.33. He was also on the

second place 4X400-meter relay team, coming in second to Inter-Lakes by less than one second. He scored 24 points on the day.

"Absolutely Herculean effort," said coach Scott Clark.

Dupuis is one of the best sprinters in the state, not just Division 3. Most recently he placed seventh at the New England Championships in the 400 meters and was second in his heat with a time of 50.42. He was even faster at the Meet of Champions with a time

of 50.29, good for third place. He was also in the 4X100-meter relay team, and at the Meet of Champions finished ninth year to run track.

Clark said Dupuis will be very missed as he is the "text book of quiet, unassuming leader."

"He needs absolutely no vocalization to rally the troops for the relays, or to lead more difficult

workouts," said Clark.

Dupuis will be heading to the University of New Hampshire next year to run track.

Riley has been a force in the track and cross country events for the past three years and was once again named All-State.

This year she was second in the Division 3 state track meet in the

1,600 meters with a time of 5:31.84. She was fourth in the 3,200 meters with a time of 12:05.66.

Most recently, Riley participated in the 1,600 meters at the Meet of Champions and placed 14th with a time of 5:33.23.

When asked what the most memorable event of the season was, Clark said it was Riley running a "very, very good 1,600

in an extremely talented field. He said this type of surge at the end of the season as well needed, as she had been dealing with minor injuries and small disappointments throughout the season.

"She will continue to be a leader, a scary competitor and a funny, funny young lady who leads by exemplary efforts," Clark said.


"My third throw of shot put, I felt myself throw and it felt good," said Isabelle. "I was on that day."

She was also the long jump champion at the Wilderness League Championship with a distance of 15 feet, 10 inches.

At the Meet of Champions, she was ninth in the long jump with a distance of 15 feet, 4.75 inches; eighth in the shotput with a distance of 34 feet, nine inches; and was 10th in the 100 meters with a time of 13.27.

Isabelle is also a varsity wrestler and a member of the state championship volleyball team. She will be heading to Australia this summer to compete in volleyball and track and field, as well.

The athletic career has been successful early, but not out of a lack of adversity as she has bounced back from two broken legs in eighth grade, as

well as a serious bone bruise at the end of last season.

"Being able to finish out my season healthy was a big relief for me," said Isabelle.

Coach Jody Fredette said it has been great to see her true potential this season.

"Gabby will work on specific drills or techniques until she perfects it," said Fredette. "She will often take extra time to make sure she does it correctly before she moves on to the next drill."

While injuries can be a nuisance and create setbacks, it was the opposite for Isabelle. She said due to her injuries she decided

to throw shotput and now it is one of her top events.

Isabelle said she loves being a part of different events because she gets a different thrill out of each one. In the long jump, she is flying through the air. In the shotput, she said the competition can be fierce. In her sprinting events, she said there is nothing like the feeling after you finish a run.

Fredette said in the shotput she breaks down the technique of the glide and practices each movement until she is comfortable. In sprint work outs she listens to exactly how the coach instructs

"If we ask her to sprint the 400 at 80 percent, she sprints the 400 at 80 percent," said Fredette. "If we ask her to sprint the 200 at 95 percent, she sprints the 200 at 95 percent. She never questions the coaches. She is an exceptional athlete."

Fredette said the most memorable aspect of this season was when Isabelle swept all four of her events at two different meets. He also said the fact that she narrowly defeated Newfound's Oceanne Skoog to take the state title in shot put was fun to watch.

"We expect Gabby to continue to improve in

all of her events," said Fredette. "With the addition of the heptathlon, Gabby can expand

her interests in other events. The sky is the limit."
