
When Spring Street meant just that,

There are streets, and then there are roads. Nary the twain should meet, but they often do. The thing is, the two terms are not interchangeable.

They also are not mutually exclusive. Confusion reigns, particularly in the media. Just recently, I saw an absolutely fine piece on cow-plop derbies. It was not at all damaged by the author's confusion of "road" with "street." Only a curmudgeon editor would notice (that would be me).

The state was a step closer to declaring "The Rock" at Hesky Park the state's Original POW/ MIA Memorial. The board of selectmen voted unanimously in favor of signing the proclamation, that would then go to the Executive Council and Gov. John Lynch to sign. A proposal had originally gone through the state senate to declare the memorial, though the house voted to change "the" memorial to "a" memorial. After further discussions between the town and the state, the town agreed to give the rock and the flagpole to the state so Gov. Lynch could declare it the "original" memorial.

The Department of **Environmental Services** withdrew fines against Meredith Public Works Director Mike Faller after reviewing a document Faller submitted defending him against the accusation of installing a septic system without proper permits. Faller had been issued a \$5,500 administrative fine and a hearing by the DES on charges that he installed a septic system on neighbor Don Cafarella's property without proper permits. Faller data to the selectmen was also placed on administrative leave with the town. Faller and his attorney Jason Major

submitted a 21 page document in response to the notice, saying he did not install the system but helped his neighbor at the spur of the moment. After the DES reviewed the document, all fines were withdrawn.

Meredith's Water Systems Committee presented a series of findings and recommendations to the selectmen on their study of the water system, determining that improvements to the system could be made in house. Committee chair Dave Thorpe presented that indicated the current water plant was operating well and ways

Frost-heaves, that bane of old roads that should never have forced-morphed into tarred highways, are a fading memory as draws the cold from the earth.

In my town, as in many towns, the old road into town was

bypassed by a newer road, a true highway, so-called because it was constructed on built-up ground, hence the term "high way." In many towns, on both sides of the Atlantic, highways were built on mud and gravel dredged or scraped or dug and hauled by oxen-led dump-carts from either side of the right of way.

In New England, cedar logs and the trunks of other slow-to-rot trees were laid sideby-side across boggy areas, hence the term "corduroy road." The final topping in coastal regions was often smashed-up sea-shells, which wagon wheels would compress into relatively smooth go-

Normally, these facts aren't unusual this time of year, they are cause for celebration naturally but they are pretty standard. This year those simple sentences carry a lot more weight behind them. I may be so fully convinced of my way of thinking that I have trouble understanding how someone else can feel so differently. Where can we meet to begin these conversations and try to understand and grow?

Since we tend to come from the human side, how do we think God might see things?

Testing for the virus has continued to accelerate. There are 10 locations that anyone regardless of symptoms can get a test. One of those locations is at the Troop E Headquarters in Tamworth. Additionally, six CVS drug store locations southern Hampshire offer drive through testing. Nearly 85,000 tests have been administered. Protective gear, especially cloth masks, are increasingly available though there are still some issues with protective gowns and the N-95 masks. Most importantly, current hospitalizations for the virus are under one hundred individuals and the percentage of positive tests remains below five percent. Hopefully these trends continue. That will make it possible to lift the limits on groups of 10 or fewer people to a higher number. If these trends continue it should also be possible to restore some indoor seating at restau-

The number of on-going claims had been as high as 140,000 but has dropped to 90,000 according to the Governor who also said the Unemployment Trust Fund has \$240 million available. Both of these are hopeful signs.

However, for many hard-working people and small businesses, the toll has been staggering. Gov. Sununu recently announced the Main Street Business Relief Fund. The preapplication process has closed and guidance on the final application process will be released shortly. When it is released, businesses that filed a preapplication may file a final application. This is the link to file: https://www.goferr. nh.gov/covid-expenditures/main-street-re-

lief-fund. For any business that qualifies for the Main Street Fund the expectation is they could receive ten percent of their anticipated shortfalls. Not-for-profits health care services are not eligible as other funding sources are potentially available. Once the guidance is announced, businesses that filed pre-applications will have approximately a week to submit the final application. The quick turnaround is needed to get funds to struggling businesses as soon as possible.

Continuing efforts are underway for the Legislature to resume operations. It is my hope that both the Senate and House can come together and pass legislation that virtually everyone supports. That includes protections against perfluorochemicals in drinking water, expansion of broadband in rural areas, parity for telehealth services and ongoing efforts to protect children from abuse and neglect.

Legislative action budget on expected shortfalls will also be necessary. The expected shortfall could reach \$200 million by June 30, when the fiscal year ends. That

budget shortfall only gets worse in the next fiscal year. Action will absolutely be critical and I would expect the Governor will call for a Special Session of the Legislature.

The horrific murder of George Floyd and the justified peaceful protests that have tragically become riots has overtaken the national consciousness. I hope that all of us in our wonderful state can have a full discussion of issues that need a thorough airing without senseless violence, mayhem and destruction of lives we are witnessing in many areas of our great nation. These discussions may be painful but are vital if we love our country.

cessional around the school. Cars will go onto Laker Lane, do a loop around the middle/high school, go down Route 25, and go back down Laker Lane and back onto the campus. Cars will then park in rows in the south parking lot at the middle/high school facing the building.

high and dry. They did not have the wherewithal to cross miles of low-lying, valuable tillage land on the valley's floor anyway.

Farmers often considered a road a waste of good land. And for what? Saving time--one of their cheaper commodities at the time, another being labor. Still, this view of a road as a waste of land persisted well into the last century. As a young lawyer, my Dad represented the current generation of a frontier farm family in a suit for damages during the re-routing of Route 3 across good, bottomland tillable north of town.

If travelers on just about any of today's highways look left or right, they'll often see remnants of the old road, snaking along the contour line. These old highways were laid out well above the annual spring floods, when the meadows did what floodplains are supposed to do---act as the safety valve that avoids havoc where the valley narrows.

Once every June, my brother Peter and I biked from Park Street all the way through town and down to South Main Street, just beyond the oldest timber-framed house in town. We ventured there to meet our maternal grandparents, Ruth and Merton White, on their annual pilgrimage all the way up from Concord.

They had stopped in Lancaster to call ahead, as usual, so we could time our rendezvous. It was a big time for Pete and me,

biking clear across town and beyond, with grandparents thrown in for good measure.

Eventually, Gramp White's beautiful dark-green Pontiac Straight-Eight came down the hill from the Shrine of Our Lady of Grace, and up the road into Colebrook, and stopped where two buzz-headed kids were cord to Colebrook (picjumping up and down nic included) about in delight.

They had left Concord at about 9:30, as usual. They had pulled over into a shaded picnic area just north of Franconia Notch, for (of course) a picnic. The shaded pullout,

minus the picnic table, is still there.

And then, a couple of hours later, there they were, on the southern approach to town, otherwise known as Route 3, the Daniel Webster Highway, also known, a bit farther on, as Main Street. And the trip had taken them, Consix hours, give or take a piece of cake or two.

Coppinger said teacher and team member Lindsay Bliznik worked with Sandwich Fair Association President Dan Peaslee on what graduation could look like on the fairgrounds. Bliznik had heard of the drive-in theater format and it was determined this could work well to have the ceremony while keeping with state guidelines.

The school also received an offer to use Castle in the Clouds' property from Castle Preservation Society executive director Chuck Clarke. The decision was put out to the student body where to hold the ceremony, with a handful of seniors and their parents invited to look over the fairgrounds and see the plan. The location went up for a vote and the seniors chose the fairgrounds.

Cars will come into the fairgrounds through the gate on Squam Lake Road, a parking crew from the school will direct people to priority parking, where the viewing will be ideal, or general parking depending on their parking pass.

The ceremony is reserved for seniors and families with each party getting two parking spaces or three for blended families. Coppinger said they wished they could have more members of the public attending, though that wasn't going to be feasible this year.

"The most important criteria for this year's ceremony according to members of the Class of 2020 was to be able to see each other and be together as a class," Coppinger wrote. "The format we have put together honors that request first and foremost."

The graduation will be livestreamed on New **England Sports Network** and broadcast on the radio.

should be found to maximize its output within the plant's footprint. Recommendations included eliminating some of the blow-offs in pipes, updating the plant's SCA-DA system, and creating more mechanisms for redundancy.

Inter-Lakes officials expressed frustration with the Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) report and the state's standards. Inter-Lakes Middle School was classified as a School in Need of Improvement with scores on the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP) that didn't meet proficiency for students with learning disabilities. Administrators took issue with how the designation was scored and that the Department of Education would not offer appropriate tests for students with learning disabili-

That week's editorial stated that AYP doesn't work, saying ILMS students were showing great success but the state was defining the school by using the same test for students of varying abilities.

The Meredith selectmen scheduled a meeting to take public comment on possible solutions for the Meredith Center Road intersection that would be submitted to the state. Meredith Center residents had expressed concerns about the safety of the intersection, including increased traffic and limited sight distance. A number of options for the intersection had been discussed including a t-stop, a four-way stop, or a roundabout.

Meredith Conservation Committee chair Don MacFarlane wrote a letter to the editor reminding the public that the deadline was approaching on fundraising for the Page Pond and Forest purchase. A major fundraising gap had developed and Mac-Farlane wrote that they couldn't get this environmentally important property without broad support.

A number of Lakes Region car dealerships reported that more people were buying smaller, more compact vehicles due to surging gas prices. Owners from number of local dealerships were interviewed for a story, saying smaller models were becoming more popular as were hybrids. At the same time police departments like Gilford were phasing out their Crown Victoria cruisers for more economical cars.

May Weather

Rod Weinberg has collected and compiled the weather data for May 2020 from his home weather station on Diamond Ledge Road. He reports: The average high temperature for the month was 67.6 degrees and the low 44.4 deg. This is 0.5 degrees above normal. The hottest temperature was 92 degrees on the 27th and the coldest was 29 deg. on the 13th of the month. Total precipitation was 3.31" which is 1.12" below normal. Snowfall amounted to 1.8." The average over the past 48 years is 0.1." The highest wind gust observed was 37 mph on the 9th of the month.

The month was characterized by several brief periods of unusually cold

weather followed by temperatures well above normal.

But financial worries have been there, too, both for people whose employment has been affected and for investors anxious about the volatile financial markets. And one aspect of every individual's total financial picture has become quite clear - the importance of an emergency fund.

in normal times, it's a good idea for you to keep three to six months' worth of living expenses in a liquid, low-risk account. Having an emergency fund available can help you cope with those large, unexpected costs, such as a major car repair or a costly medical bill.

Furthermore, if you have an adequate

into your long-term investments to pay for short-term needs. These investment vehicles, such as your IRA and 401(k), are designed for your retirement, so the more you can leave them intact, the more assets you're likely to have when you retire. And because they are intended for your retirement, they typically come with disincentives, including taxes and penalties, if you do tap into them early. (However, as part of the economic stimulus legislation known as the CARES Act, individuals can now take up to \$100,000 from their 401(k) plans and IRAs without paying the 10% penalty that typically applies to investors younger than 591/2. If

you take this type of withdrawal, you have

emergency fund, you won't have to dip you want, replace the funds, beyond the usual caps on annual contributions. Of course, life is expensive, so it's not always easy to put away money in a fund

that you aren't going to use for your normal cash flow. That's why it's so important to establish a budget and stick to it. When developing such a budget, you may find ways to cut down on your spending, freeing up money that could be used to build your emergency fund.

There are different ways to establish a budget, but they all typically involve identifying your income and expenses and separating your needs and wants. You can find various online budgeting tools to help you get started, but, ultimately, it's up to you to make your up to three years to pay the taxes and, if budget work. Nonetheless, you may be

pleasantly surprised at how painless it is to follow a budget. For example, if you've budgeted a certain amount for food each month, you'll need to avoid going to the grocery store several times a week, just to pick up "a few things" - because it doesn't really take that many visits for those few things to add up to hundreds of dollars You'll be much better off limiting your trips to the grocery, making a list of the items you'll need and adhering to these lists. After doing this for a few months see how much you've saved - it may be much more than you'd expect. Besides using these savings to strengthen your emergency fund, you could also deploy them toward longer-term investments designed to help you reach other objectives, such as retirement

did not take the clients best interests into consideration, but sold funds that their firm was paid to promote. In this instance this clients' money was being passively managed through high cost mutual funds whereas the robot may have done a better job for less fees. I guess what I'm saying is that given the choice firm or bank, I might choose the Robo as Client money must be managed with the client's best interest first, but can only be done by an advisor who really understands how to manage that money for their client's needs.

As I mentioned earlier, we have recently

seen how the robot reacts in tough market conditions. The last eleven years had seen a couple of bumps but not any major drawdowns in the equity markets until March of this year. So, complacency has returned to high levels and money will chase a market nearing a top. Studies also tell us that investors will start to sell near the bottom. A robot will not have an opinion on the diof a robot or a typical rection of the markets broker connected to a such as, if you should hedge, if you should raise cash levels or start to shift money over to bonds, fixed income or precious metals. It is a good thing that the robot takes your emotions out of the equation, but I am not so sure that taking a qualified advisor or asset managers emotions, skill, and knowl-

edge out of the equation is a good thing. Time will tell. Robo advising may work for you if your time horizon long and you don't mind market risk in the equity markets, or it could work for a portion of your portfolio that is designated for growth but you will not need for income in the next 10 years.

A good asset manager can manage your money using modern portfolio theory and very low-fee investments that are designed to maximize your returns and minimize your risk. Compare that to the low fee robot. It is all about net returns and risk.
