## Conservation Commission members pitch in to clean up the grounds at Salmon Run

TILTON — Members of the Tilton Conservation Commission spent last Saturday morning sprucing up the gardens and grounds at Salmon Run Conservation Area on East Main Street, readying them for visitors to the scenic site along the Winnepesaukee River.

Kathi Mitchell explained that the name for the property stems

from the history of the Winnepesaukee River, when Native Americans would come to the area for the annual salmon and shad fish runs. The fish later provided food for the first settlers to the area as well and the river itself helped power mills that were eventually built along the banks.

“It was just our way of drawing attention to a bit of the history of the river because it was



## Belmont police warn of phone scam

BELMONT — The department has received calls from concerned residents about the IRS calling them to say they owe money. Please be aware that the Internal

Revenue Service will communicate with you by mail about any tax situation you may have with them.

Never give personal information out via

the telephone. Software readily available now allows caller ID's to read anything they want to so do not completely trust the caller ID. Anyone calling you to say they have a warrant for your arrest from the I.R.S. should be considered a scam.

Scammers often fool people by using a Washington, D.C. area code. Don't be surprised if the caller already knows a bit of your personal information such as your place of business, home address or the names of their neighbors. All of that information can be gathered from open internet searches and social media inquiries.

# NH Humane Society hosts Annual Meeting and grand opening of Catio


LACONIA — The New Hampshire Humane Society will host its Annual Meeting on Thursday, May 18 from

# Tilton police arrest several for possession and sale of drugs

**TILTON** — As part of Operation Granite Hammer, Tilton Police Chief Robert Cormier announced on Monday evening that his department recently took more than a dozen people into custody for the sale and unlawful possession of both prescription and illegal drugs in the Tilton

community, as well as other charges that were consequential to some of their arrests.

Those individuals were listed as: 21-year-old Jazmine Gebo of Belmont, who was taken into custody for the sale of a controlled drug (Fentanyl) and conspiracy to commit sales of a second controlled drug (methamphetamine);



## Joint investigation leads to arrest of Tilton man on suspicion of assaulting a minor

**FRANKLIN** — With the assistance of the Franklin Police Department, detectives from Tilton Police Department arrested 53-year-old Charles Beckley of Tilton on May 11, charging him initially with one count of aggravated sexual assault on a minor under the age of 14.

Police Chief Robert Cormier of Tilton said his detectives began looking into the case following a May 3 com-

plaint they received from a local mother. At that time, the woman reported that her 13-year-old daughter had been sexually as-

saulted by Beckley, who is known by both the young teen and her family. The alleged assaults are said to have occurred over a span of six to 12 months.

As a result of their investigation, TPD was able to obtain a warrant for his arrest. Learning through Franklin police that Beckley was on Canal Street in Franklin last Thursday, officers moved in to take him into custody without incident.

Tilton's detectives

also received a search warrant for Beckley's home where they consequently gathered further evidence for their case.

"Since that time we have also received additional tips. The initial arrest concerned one child but if we get more evidence there could be other charges pending," said Cormier.

Cases such as this, the chief said, can be complicated. In this instance it could possibly include other victims from Tilton, Northfield and Franklin, therefore involving additional jurisdictions.

"We're being assisted in this case by both the Belknap County and Merrimack County attorneys' office," Cormier said.

Beckley was arraigned by video from the Belknap County Jail where his bail was set at \$20,000. He is currently being held in lieu of that bail but should he be released, Cormier stated that conditions of the court order are that he not have contact with any victims or parties involved in the case, nor with any children under the age of 18.

(Fentanyl) and posses-sion with intent to dis-tribute the same illegal substance; 20-year-old Ashley Normandin of Meredith was arrested for sale of a controlled drug (heroin/Fentan-yl); Dustin Winter, age 26 of Loudon, was arrested for the sale of



## STRATEGIES FOR LIVING

The year was 1949, and two young evangelists were about to launch a crusade, this time in Los Angeles, Calif., that was to have an historic and deeply personal impact on them and on the church. Charles Templeton, who had been alternating preaching with his best friend, Billy Graham, was in the throes of a major, personal crisis. Some time before he had read an article in Life Magazine featuring a mother in drought-stricken Africa carrying her dead baby in her arms. To quote from Lee Strobel, in his book "The Case for Faith," page 14, Templeton thought, "Is it possible to believe that there is a loving or caring Creator when all this woman needed was rain?" That point of view obviously influenced Templeton's faith in the Bible and he made no secret of his feelings. As Graham recounts in his autobiography Just As I Am, Templeton challenged him. "Billy," he said, "you're fifty years out of date. People no longer accept the Bible as being inspired the way you do. Your faith is too simple" (p. 138).

Billy Graham, who had enormous respect for his friend, could not dismiss Templeton's argument out of hand. "If I was not exactly doubtful," he recalls, "I was certainly disturbed." Things finally came to a head for him during a quiet walk in the San Bernardino mountains. "Dropping to my knees there in the woods, I opened the Bible at random on a tree stump in front of me" and prayed, "Father, I am going to accept this as Thy Word – by faith! I'm going to allow faith to go beyond my intellectual questions and doubts, and I will believe this to be Your inspired Word" ("Just As I Am," p. 139).

Little did Billy Graham realize what a profound influence that simple prayer was to have on his personal life. Charles Templeton was soon to withdraw from the ministry, move to Canada, and become a writer and commentator. For Billy Graham, however, the Los Angeles crusade launched a ministry that was to enable thousands of people discover a new relationship with the God Templeton had rejected. Amazingly, it all came down to a matter of personal choice.

Living by faith is, indeed, no "cake walk" and it does demand that we accept the truth that God has chosen to reveal, yes, by faith. The evidence is there for anyone who is willing to study the record and judge it for what it says. In the final analysis, however, it is an act of faith. There is no other way.

The choice to believe, it seems, is most generally a personal issue rather than an intellectual one. God, and the revelation He has given us, demands that we accept His Lordship over our lives. That is a tough call for most people. We don't want to live under God's control.

It is a matter we each must settle in our own lives. The choice we make will inevitably impact the life we live and, whether we want to face it or not, our eternal destiny. But do not fear; God is no man's debtor. He never takes more than He gives in return. It is, indeed, a privilege to serve the Living God!



## North Country Notebook

## Ice, ice, it's everywhere, just what you need for a drink

**Editor's note:** Mr. Harrigan was unable to submit a new column in time to meet our press deadline for this week's edition. The following North Country Notebook column was originally published in May of last year.

I was just beginning a wonderful circular drive around the North Country this past Wednesday when, at the western approach to Dixville Notch, I came across a chunk of ice. "Across" is probably the wrong word, because this fragment of glacier was not in the road, but instead clinging tenaciously to a small cliff, like a limpet mine on the hull of a ship.

For some reason, this reminded me of an oft-repeated statement by Warren Pearson, long-time skimeister at New Hampshire's northernmost ski area, The Wilderness, near where I encountered the ice. One of his frustrations was how to get the word out to skiers down south that long after most other ski areas had shut down for the season, The Wilderness still had plenty of snow.

"It's hard to convince people mowing their lawns in Boston that we still have plenty of snow," was his succinct way of putting it. Warren had the clipped accent of western Maine, not the better known Downeast drawl, and didn't mince words.

Further east, over

the lip of the notch and coasting down into the Androscoggin drainage toward Maine, there was still plenty more snow and ice in the rubble of rock on the floor of the notch, where the sun hardly shines at all.

Not that this is the only place snow and ice can still be found in northern or high-country New Hampshire. There are plenty of places, in plenty of climes, where relics of winter will hang on well into early June, and still other places that will linger longer.

During my hiking days, when I knew many of the Appalachian Mountain Club's hut crews on a first-name basis, one of my favorite destinations was Carter Notch Hut, situated in a high valley tucked behind Wildcat Mountain. You reached it via Carter Dome, a lightning-prone bald pate of glacier-scraped bedrock featuring a heart-stopping descent to a convivial supper and a warm bunk for the night.

There is an ice-cave there just beyond the hut, aligned in such a way that the snow packs in there, driven by the fierce northwest winds, but the sun barely penetrates even on the longest days of summer. And back in there, as the cave's mini-glacier slowly recedes, hikers and hut-keepers alike keep stuff that'll spoil or they just want kept cool--but-ter, milk, and of course beer.

At Pittsburg's Boundary Pond, at 2,335 feet one of the state's highest ponds reachable (almost) by road, a famous deposit of snow and ice can usually be found southeast of the dam, well into high summer and sometimes beyond. Generations of people who've fished there have known about it, for good reason. If you plan to cook before the evening

rise, for instance, and need your cooler and ice for the boat (wink, nudge), you can scamper down below the dam and put your other spoilables on a nice little glacier of compacted snow.

Boundary, by the way, in times of yore known as Mountain Pond, is the pond on which famed local pilot Harry Scott vowed to land his float plane (and of course take off again) but waited nearly a lifetime for the right conditions to do it.

This is a pond where the Canadian northwesterlies blow fiercely most of the time, having attained awesome speed crossing the mostly open and flat countryside of the Eastern Townships of southern Quebec. They then smash into the remnants of the Appalachian Mountains that form the boundary, and crash up and over, of

course, Boundary Pond.

Harry tried to land there several times, but always aborted in a sort of "touch and go" decision because he feared cracking up either on the way in or trying to get out. "But one day," he whistled, "I happened to hit it just right," and down he went, and after enjoying a pontoon ride around the pond a couple of times just to add emphasis and flirt with disaster, off he went again. Harry always began his sentences with a barely discernable whistle.

One time Dave Cook and I were under the dim confines of a big spruce tree there at Boundary, having been blown

ashore by the usual tempest, and gradually our pupils dilated so that we could perceive the outlines of another creature under there, and it became Harry, seeking the same shelter. "Hello, boys," he said with a little whistle, just as if we were encountering each other in downtown Colebrook.

One hot summer day at Boundary, "hot summer day" meaning about 55, with a Force Five gale, Bunny Bunnell and I had come ashore to avoid being blown off to Bangor, and as was our usual strategy in a crisis, one of us, or maybe both of us, called for an adult beverage to sooth our nerves and add a

touch of sharpness to our already well-honed sagacity.

"But hark!" he cried, or something like that, "we need ice!" (the cooler's supply somehow having become exhausted), and down over the dam I scrambled, because I was the younger and number, and fetched plenty.



### Is Your Portfolio "Healthy"?

May is National Physical Fitness and Sports Month. If you can exercise regularly, you'll help yourself feel better, control your weight and even reduce the chances of developing certain diseases. But why not extend the concept of "fitness" to other areas of your life — such as your investment portfolio?

And to help maintain a healthy portfolio, you can draw on some of the same principles that apply to keeping your body in good shape.

Consider, for example, one of the things that happen when you exercise — namely, your body uses more oxygen. As an investor, you may need your portfolio to get "oxygen" in the form of infusions of new investment dollars. Another element important to exercise is the need to avoid injury. That's why all sorts of athletes, both competitive and casual, stretch before they swing into action. Many of them also take other injury-avoidance steps, such as strengthening their "core" through abdominal work and increasing their flexibility through yoga. When you invest, you can be "injured" if your portfolio takes a hit during a market downturn. However, this type of injury will likely be much more severe if your portfolio is over-concentrated in just one asset class and the downturn primarily affects those exact assets. But if you own many different types of assets — stocks, bonds, government securities, and so on — you may reduce the impact of a downturn on your portfolio. Keep in mind, though, that this type of diversification can't guarantee profits or help you avoid all losses.

While exercise is essential to maintaining good health, it isn't the only factor involved. You should also get regular checkups with a medical professional, who can run various tests to measure changes in cholesterol, blood pressure, heart function and other areas. To

help ensure your portfolio is healthy, you also need to chart its progress over time. And that doesn't just mean determining if you're getting the growth you need, though that's obviously of great interest to you. You also need to evaluate whether your portfolio has gotten out of balance, which can occur without your doing anything at all. To illustrate: If you start out with a certain percentage of one type of investment, such as stocks, and these stocks grow to a point where they now take up a bigger share of your portfolio, you may be taking on more risk than you had intended.

Consequently, you should review your portfolio at least once a year to evaluate both its performance and its balance. Once you've compared where you are today with where you were a year ago, you'll be in a better position to make appropriate changes if needed.

Do what it takes to keep yourself physically fit — but also take steps to ensure your investment portfolio is in good shape. It's vitally important to your future — and you can do the work without even breaking a sweat.



such an important part of the community back then," she said.

Because of the dams that were later built, there aren't salmon running upstream today, but there are still many other types of fish that can be found in the waters beside Salmon Run Conservation Area.

"There's trout and other species here, and people are welcome to come try their luck. It's actually a very nice place to fish," said Selectman Jon Scanlon, the board's representative to the Conservation Commission.

Salmon Run also serves as a connection to the Winnepesaukee River Trail system. People can walk, jog or ride a bike from the parking lot behind McDonald's to Salmon Run, cross over to the sidewalk in front of the police station. From there people can cross the river at

Cannon Bridge and follow the sidewalk to Surrette Park in Northfield. There the trail continues a west along the riverfront to Trestle View Park in Franklin, with some interesting historic markers along the way.

"The plan is that Belmont will eventually bring their trail up to Tilton, so people will be able to travel the trails from Franklin all the way into Laconia," Commission Chairman Chuck Mitchell said.

Besides being a link in the WRT, the property further provides a great place to simply relax, have a picnic and enjoy the beautiful flowers that have been planted in the gardens and fields. Mitchell said Belknap Landscaping installed the flowerbeds then a wildflower seed mix was used to cover the rest of the property with green fields and bright blossoms. As a result, hundreds of daisies, Brown Eyed Susan, lupine and other natural flowers

bring a variety of color to East Main Street in the summer months.

Kathi Mitchell, a master gardener herself, said the gardens at Salmon Run are especially nice in that there are plants that will blossom in spring, summer and fall.

"It was all designed to attract butterflies and bees, and there's something in bloom here all the time," she said.

Last Saturday, Mitchell, his wife Kathi Scanlon, and Commissioner Paul Rushlow focused on weeding all the flower beds and trimming along the wooden rail fencing. In the meantime, Commissioner Jim Cropsey took on the task of cutting down overgrown brush and some of the small saplings along the riverbank itself.

"What we'd really like is to open the river up along here so people can see how beautiful it is when they drive along Main Street and into

town," Mitchell said.

On June 25, the annual Winni Slalom kayak competition will take place in the river off Salmon Run where com-

petitive kayakers from all around the northeast will make their way through a challenging course that ends by the railroad bridge in down-

town Tilton.

"This is a great spot to watch the start of the race for anyone who's interested," said Scanlon.

alarming amount of personal information about you which may be enough for someone to believe the scam caller has some legitimacy.

Some of the scam numbers used recently were from 646 and 202 area codes. Few return numbers left will take an incoming call. According to most recent resident to receive one of these scam calls, the caller had a foreign accent and it sounded like they're in a busy call center. "If you really owe the IRS money, they first will send you something in writing, you're not going to get a call out of the blue demanding payment." The IRS has a help line you can call to ask questions regarding tax issues it is 1-800-908-4490.

Basically, this is just a new spin on an old scam to separate you from your cash. Do not give any information out via the telephone or internet. The scammers are very savvy and will make you feel like they

are legitimate. Do not be threatened into providing information. Law Enforcement does not ask for you to send money anywhere in order to vacate an arrest warrant.

In this latest incident, one of our officers called the "IRS number" back. The Belmont officer was able to quickly determine the caller was not legitimate. Oddly enough, the scammers stopped using that call back number once we identified ourselves.

If you or a family member has fallen victim to a telephone scam

you should notify your local police department. Do not be embarrassed to report the matter or ask for help it just leaves you vulnerable for more fraud against you.

You may also want to contact your credit agencies to let them know to flag your accounts for fraudulent activity if you feel your identity may have been stolen. Joining a credit monitoring service also helps you detect fraudulent activity early.

Local police departments can be a great resource if you feel you have been scammed.


