Blanchard school brings housing to classrooms

Everything old is new again. It may be an old adage, but in this case it works as on May 22 the Blanchard School, LLC held the official ground breaking of the Blanchard School development. It began at the Uxbridge Progressive Club, where President Harry Romasco of Uxbridge, thanked all that made this project successful, including his wife, Sheryl Romasco.

The Blanchard School Development Team consists of two general partners: Virginia Blanchard Memorial Housing Association, Inc. and JNJUHL & Associates LLC. The project architect is Nunes Frabucco Architects of Needham. The general contractor is Sugrue and Associates, Inc. of North Scituate, Rhode Island. The Blanchard School development upon completion will be managed by The Community

Builders, Inc.

The Blanchard School project has received substantial support from the town of Uxbridge and is being funded by local, state and federal lenders; including the Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development through the Low Income Housing Tax Credit program and Housing Stabilization Fund; MassHousing's Affordable Housing Trust Fund, the Community Economic Development Assistance Corporation through its Community-Based Housing

The Massachusetts Housing Investment Corporation provided federal LIHTC and Historic Tax Credit Equity for the project, while Unibank provided State LIHTC and State Historic Tax Credit

Whitin Intermediate adopts new math program

NEW PARTNERSHIP WITH INSTITUTE WILL ENHANCE PROGRAM

UXBRIDGE Whitin Intermediate School has been selected to join the ST Math Massachusetts Program. The program was developed by Mass STEM Hub, the One8 Foundation and MIND Research Institute, and will enable 54 schools to launch their use of ST Math over the next three years.

ST Math is a visual instructional program that builds a deep conceptual understanding of math through rigorous learning and creative problem solving to engage, motivate and challenge PreK-8 students toward higher achievement. In a comparison of Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) results from the 2013-14 and 2016-17 school years, ST Math schools that implemented with high fidelity outgrew their counterparts in statewide math performance rank by 7.4 percentile points.

"We're excited to be able to offer our students a STEMbased math program with proven results to supplement and enhance our math curriculum. ST Math helps students to build powerful problem solving skills," said Dr. Rich Drolet, Uxbridge director of curriculum, instruction, assessment, and accountability.

coordinator "Math Bernadette Bazzett was instrumental in working to bring this grant to Uxbridge. She understands that building a conceptual understanding of math in these formative years will give students the best chance

at future success," said Drolet.







June Real Estate Market Update

According to Bankrate.com as of 06/10/2018 the rate on a 30 year fixed loan was 4.46% which is up slightly from last month. We are continuing to see a very hot Real Estate Market. What we are seeing locally is that buyers are starting to bid on homes with prices that are higher than market value with the intention on negotiating down after inspection

since they figure the sellers will be more apt to do that since they don't want to get under contract with another buyer and go through another inspection. In the heat of the multiple offers, we are also seeing buyers offer on a home with a higher than list price offer only to back out of the sale with no cause and possibly even forfeit their deposit due to buyers remorse. I don't think this is a sign of the market slowing down but it is something to watch over the next several months to make sure.

Today we have 1774 single family homes for sale in Worcester County compared to 6 months ago where we had 1547 single homes for sale. However, 12 months ago we had 1821 homes for sale so inventory is still just slightly lower than this time last year. of year. The average days on market is currently 92 days which is a 8.0% decrease in days

on market from last month. This shows that homes are continuing to sell quicker and homes that have been sitting on the market are either expiring or selling as well. If we look at homes sold over past 12 months compared to the same time for the previous year there is a small decrease in sales of less than 0.1% and a 5.0% increase in average sales price

while it is taking 16.0% less time to sell the homes this year than last year in Worcester County. This shows that prices are still rising and homes are still selling quicker than a year ago. The lower inventory is starting to catch up with the sales causing a lower number os sales these past 12 months compared to the 12 months prior.



Equity for the project. The town of Uxbridge has provided Uxbridge Historic Funds to the project. Federal and State Historic Tax Credits were provided by the National Park Service and the Massachusetts Historical Commission, respectively.

In addition, The Life Insurance Community Investment Initiative will be providing over \$6.2 million in bridge loan financing and the Massachusetts Housing Partnership Fund will be providing a 20-year mortgage for the development.

Following the ceremony at the Progressive Club, the attendees walked up Hartford Avenue East to the Blanchard School for a tour to see the progress. The tour started on the bottom floor of the new addition, where they viewed a standard one-bedroom unit. The tour continued into the original Blanchard School, where the basement has had a complete overhaul. Much of the building was recognizable as the original school, while many things have changed in order to create new accommodations.

Blanchard School is the development of a 25-unit affordable rental housing development in North Uxbridge. This .77 acre site is located at 65 Hartford Avenue East in Uxbridge. The Blanchard School project is the result of almost 10 year effort by the town of Uxbridge, Uxbridge Housing Associates, Inc., Virginia Blanchard

Memorial Housing Association, Inc. and JNJUHL and Associates, LLC to develop affordable rental housing for Uxbridge's low and moderate-income families.

Upon completion, this three story former elementary school and four story new addition will create a 40,000 square foot building and will provide 25 units of which there are seven one-bedroom units, 14 two-bedroom units and four three bedrooms to families with incomes at or below 60 percent of the Worcester area median.

Construction which has been underway since December 2017 is anticipated to take 13 months, with occupancy anticipated to begin in early 2019.



Father's Day - lessons about money can be priceless gifts

Fishing both fresh and saltwater just fine say anglers

Fishing fresh and saltwater can be an exciting past time for young and old. It also can make great memories for the fishing public.

This past week this writer went striper fishing with Steve Mercure of Uxbridge at the Providence River. We arrived at the Bold Point boat ramp at 4:30 a.m.! By the time we had launched my boat it was just breaking light. As I navigated my 16 ft. boat through the channel and out into open water, I noticed a couple of boats about a quarter mile out and decided to check them out. Now I know I wrote a column about "Googans" a couple of weeks ago, where some fishermen follow and fish too close to commercial fishing vessels, but I was just trying to observe what they were fishing for. My prediction was right! They were trying to snag a few porgies for bass fishing.

We set up a few hundred feet from them and found our own school of porgies. It was not a large school of bait fish but we managed to snag a few for our morning fishing trip.

I decided to head out to a favorite spot of mine that often had us catching stripers on past fishing trips. We started our first drift by 6:00 a.m. and had a couple of hits on the

first drift. They evidently were school stripers and were not large enough to handle a full size bait.

After a short run, they dropped the bait and it was time to go back up to where we had started our first drift. As we let our lines out we noticed a couple of osprey circling our baits. Suddenly one of the large birds plunged from the sky and picked up Steve's bait fish.

What the heck!!

I started to laugh as Steve battled the huge bird with his fishing rod. Suddenly the osprey dropped the bait fish and it crashed back to the surface of the ocean. Because the bait fish were swimming close to the surface it was easy for the osprey to spot the fish swimming just under the surface of the water.

Suddenly the second osprey plummeted from the sky and grabbed my baitfish, and I went through the same ordeal that Steve had just encountered. Giving the rod a good tug, the osprey also dropped my bait. Now we noticed that there were five osprey circling our boat waiting for another opportunity to steal one of our baitfish.

We decided to leave the area to avoid another encounter with the birds. We were also concerned that they could become entangled in our fishing line or ingest one of our hooks. I sure wish I had my camera running to capture at least one of the moments, but it happened so fast I did not have time

We soon found ourselves fishing back where we had

snagged a few porgies earlier in the day, and encountered a few more short runs from more than likely school stripers. I decided to check out another favorite spot of mine and found some larger fish by using my fish finder. We quickly let out our baits and had a fish on almost immediately. After the second run, this writer had a good hook up with one striper. After a 10 minute battle, the large striper was brought alongside the boat, where my fishing partner could scoop up the somewhat impressive striper and place it in the boat. He measured out at less than 40 inches, but slightly more than 30 inches?!!!!! At least it was a legal fish and was all that we needed to bring home for some of my acquaintances at the Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club

My brother Ken and his son Mark sent along a picture as shown in this week's column of anice lake trout they had caught a couple of weeks ago at Gate 8, in the Quabbin Reservoir. A \$23 fee to rent a boat and 9.9 hp. motor for the day also included a full tank of gas and admission. They caught seven lake trout throughout the day. They were all released back into the Reservoir. Although no salmon were caught by the two anglers, many fishermen still catch them on some of their trips. They are planning another trip to the Quabbin as early as next week.

Hot on the heels of Memorial Day weekend, gardeners everywhere are heralding in a long-awaited annual rite of late spring: official planting time! Backyard gardeners who patiently waited for the threat of frost to pass, are now eagerly scurrying to get their precious seeds, seedlings and fertilizer into the ground in anticipation of a bountiful harvest crop. And while many successful planters boast their own "secret" techniques to

cultivating impressive rows of ripe, red tomatoes and patches of multi-blooming flowers, there are some easy tricks even "green thumb impaired" gardeners can use to give their plants a growing edge.

The following are some planting concoctions culled from readers of this column, gardening periodicals and past columns. All the methods are simple to do, and who knows, they just might improve the fruits of your labor!

Light Scent: Did you know most fragrant flowers are lightly colored or white? If you want to add a scent to your garden, be generous with white or pastel blooms.

Dash of Salt: Adding Epsom salt to plants has been reported

to enhance the color of blossoms and leaves, promote new flowers and fruit, improve the root system and improve the strength of stems. For roses: sprinkle one teaspoon of Epsom salts per foot of plant height and spread evenly around the base for better blossoms and deeper greening. Add 1/2 cup sprinkled around the base and then scratched in, for strong production of new flowering canes and healthy new basal cane growth.

Pepper Position: Pepper plants thrive on heat, so it can be beneficial to place large rocks next to your green pepper plants to attract the sunlight.

Rein in Mint: Mint is easy to grow and useful in everything from herbal tea to holiday jelly. To stop vigorous mint from spreading and taking over the garden, keep it corralled by planting it in a large plastic bucket with the bottom cut out.

Rain Gauge: When planting your garden, sink a small jar or can in the middle of a row. This way, you can gauge exactly how much water your garden is getting from both irrigation and rainfall.

ums and hydrangea will thank you with better blooms if you water them with a mild mixture of baking soda and water occasionally.

Proper pH: The first thing to

Proper pH: The first thing to check if your azalea leaves are looking yellow is the soil pH. Azaleas need a soil on the acid side. Alkalinity locks up iron needed for green color.

Save \$: For cost effective mulch, use three sheets of newspaper under bark mulch. You'll save money on bark and the newspaper decomposes, enriching the soil.

Rooting Trick: It can be difficult to successfully take cuttings from shrubs to root and plant. Here is an option that ups your chances the cutting will take: Take a small potato, make a small hole, and place your shrub cutting inside. Immediately plant, potato and all, either in the ground or in a pot.

Pucker Power: To safely keep ants and insects off your plants, simply sprinkle concentrated lemon juice in the garden.

Need more green thumb tips? Try these problem solving "recipes!"

Miracle Grower Garden Tonic: Are your plants suffering from lackluster leaves? Are your blooms bowing out? Try this tonic to miraculously rejuvenate your plants this growing season.

Ingredients: Five gallon bucket; water; three pkgs. unflavored gelatin; two cups Epsom salts; one teaspoon borax (boron); one fourth cup dishwashing liquid (made with vegetable oils, not animal fats). Instructions: Put gelatin and Epsom salts in bucket as you fill it with water, so they will dissolve properly. Add borax and stir. Put soap in last (to keep down suds). Mix well. Use about two cups of formula per plant or group of plants. May be poured directly over foliage and allowed to soak in ground. In two to three days, plants and foliage should perk up nicely.

All Purpose Lawn Fertilizer: Lush lawns don't have to be

Blooms: Plants that grow best a luxury with this homemade in alkaline soil such as geranibrew.

Ingredients: One can of beer: one can of cola (not diet); one box or cup of apple juice; one cup lemon scented dishwashing liquid; one cup ammonia; one cup liquid lawn fertilizer. Instructions: Mix together all ingredients. If you buy liquid lawn fertilizer with a hose sprayer attachment, you can use the attachment with any one liter bottle to make a 50 gallon sprayer. Spray your lawn and garden with the above mixture every three weeks, early in the day. *For houseplants, mix four shot glasses of the above mixture to one gallon of water and add one quarter tsp. unflavored gelatin.

Easy Pesticide: This mild insecticide uses only two ingredients, but gives bugs a powerful one-two punch!

Ingredients: One gallon water; 1/3 cup Murphy Oil Soap

Instructions: Mix oil soap with water and apply to stems and leaves of plants.


Uxbridge tames Tyngsborough in District Tournament opener


Uxbridge held on to tame the Tigers, 3-2, ending Tyngsborough's season at 10-10.



Assabet rallies late to spoil Spartans' postseason opener

UXBRIDGE — After Assabet Valley's varsity softball team rallied to defeat Uxbridge High, 9-7, in a Central Mass. Division 3 Quarterfinal round game played Sunday, June 10 at Whitin Elementary School, Spartans' head coach Russ Wise had the difficult task of speaking to his squad for the last time this spring.

"It's a very emotional moment and I tell them that sometimes you lose a game and sometimes another team beats you," he explained. "And today another team beat us. They happened to be better than us today. We didn't make big errors, they made hits in a timely fashion."

Uxbridge broke a scoreless tie with a run in the bottom of the third inning, and the Spartans added six more runs in the fourth to take a 7-0 lead, but the Aztecs plated four runs in the top of the sixth and grabbed five more in the sev-

enth to complete the comeback. Wise said that he knew what Assabet was made out of when he watched them play Nashoba Tech three days earlier in the first round matchup. The Aztecs won, 16-0, thanks to over a half-dozen extra base hits through three innings. Wise added that Assabet then played their substitutes and were still able to hit the cover off of the ball.

"They're a very, very, very good hitting team and very well-coached, and they deserved it," Wise said of head coach Mike O'Brien and his staff.

Assabet, seeded fifth in the tournament, improved to 16-6 and will play in the District Semifinals, after press time. No. 4 Uxbridge closed the book on its season at 13-8.

The Spartans, who had a first round bye, struck first when Morgan McCarty hit a one-out single and Erika Dube (2 for 4, 2 RBI) plated her with an RBI double to center field.

Nipmuc, seeded 10th, won the rubber match over No. 7 Douglas, 8-4, to end the Tigers' season with a record of 16-5.





Hawks take advantage of Northbridge miscues to win District contest

HUDSON — Missed scoring opportunities are often the difference between winning and losing in the postseason. Northbridge High, in its 2018 Central Mass. Division 2 Softball Tournament quarterfinal round game against Hudson High, unfortunately, found out how true that time-tested tenet can be.

The Rams scored one run in the top of the first inning, but could have plated three more. That missed scoring opportunity came home to roost quickly as the Hawks scratched for a pair of runs in the bottom of the inning and went on to defeat Northbridge, 13-1, at O'Donnell Field on Saturday, June 9.

The game was halted with two outs in the bottom of the fifth inning as a result of the 12-run mercy rule.

With the win top-seeded Hudson improved to 18-3 and advanced to the semifinal round of the tournament, where it played No. 4 Leicester High (16-6) after press time. Northbridge, the No. 8 seed, finished its season 14-8.

The Rams reached the quarterfinals by topping No. 9 Lunenburg High in the first round, played Thursday, June 7, by a 9-3 count.

Northbridge sophomore Hailey Bober led off the game versus Hudson with a sharp single to left field, advanced to second on a bunt single by senior Gracie Hogan, took third on a fielder's choice to short by senior Shannon Mortimer and then scored on a Hudson error to give the Rams a 1-0 lead.

Hogan, who moved to second on the fielder's choice and scampered to third on the Hudson error, was thrown out at home on the second fielder's choice of the inning, this one off the bat of senior Maeghan Kelly. The courtesy runner inserted into the game for Mortimer, Katie West, advanced to third on Kelly's fielder's choice.

On the first pitch to sophomore Chloe Frabotta — the next Northbridge batter Kelly stole second, giving the Rams runners at second and third with two out. The scoring threat ended, however, when Frabotta struck out.

In the bottom of the inning the Hawks sent six batters to the plate, scored on an error and RBI single by junior Sophia Togneri to take a 2-1 lead, and they were on their way from there.

"It does change the tone of the game," Northbridge head coach Dave Mills said about his team's inability to plate more first inning runs. "If we can get three or four runs there we really put a lot of pressure on them and we give ourselves a little bit of wiggle room. We had a quick one-run lead and then we gave it right back to them and were behind 2-1 before the inning was over. I think that put us back on our heels a little bit."

The Hawks pushed their lead to 7-1 after three innings and then closed things out with a six-run fifth. Five of their 13 runs scored on Northbridge errors — the Rams committed six in the game — and two scored on passed balls.


"Defensively we didn't have our best game today. They definitely put the ball in play and made us make plays. That's what this game is all about: putting the ball in play and making the other team make mistakes, and we did," Mills said. "When you get this far in the tournament everybody has a good team. It's the team that executes offensively and gets runners in and doesn't make mistakes defensively that wins. Unfortunately, we made a lot of mistakes defensively."

Mortimer, who battled injuries for much of the season, was in the circle for the Rams. The recent graduate,



who's headed to Iowa State University to play softball on an athletic scholar allowed 13 hits while striking out six and walking four.

"I felt like I was definitely on," Mortimer said about her performance. "I was throwing drops as a way to get groundballs to make the outs, but I can only control what I can control.'

Mills will have his work cut out for him next year; six of the 16 girls on this year's roster, including four starters, were seniors.

"It was an up-and-down season," Mills said. "We had some kids really come along this year; some of the younger kids had to step into roles that they normally wouldn't because of injuries. Sophomore Hailey Bober pitched 10 games for us because of Shannon's injuries. Other young kids who stepped up were Chloe Frabotta, our sophomore second baseman who was solid the whole year and our catcher, Erika Kwasek, who is just a freshman and who played well all year.


"When I look back I like to look back on the last two years," Mills added. "In the last two years we were 33-11. That's a pretty good two-year run."

Safety tips for grilling season



People have been cooking meals over open flames since the discovery of fire. Even today, when there are so many ways to cook a meal, many still insist there's nothing better than the taste of food cooked on the grill.

The Hearth, Patio & Barbecue Association, which tracks industry trends, points out that one-third of consumers plan to use their grill or smoker more often this year. Even though grilling is widely associated with summer, a growing number of people are embracing year-round grilling. HPBA's CEO Jack Goldman has said, "Barbecuing is no longer just a pastime, but an integral part of the North American lifestyle."

Seven in 10 adults in the United States

and eight out of 10 in Canada own a grill or smoker. With so many people firing up their grills, it's important to recognize the importance of grilling safety. Each year an average of 8,900 home fires are caused by grilling, and close to half of all injuries involving grills are due to thermal burns, advises the National Fire Protection Association.

Here's how to stay safe.

• Only grill outside. Propane and charcoal barbecue grills should only be used outdoors. Grills should be placed well away from the home. Keep grills away from deck railings, eaves, overhangs, and tree branches.

Keep the grill clean. Thoroughly clean the grill prior to first use, and keep it tidy all year long. Grease or fat buildup can ignite and cause a fire.

• Always attend the grill. Grill distraction-free and keep an eye on the food being cooked. Simply stepping away for a few moments can lead to a fire or

• Start fires safely. Charcoal grills and gas grills may be lit using electronic starters that do not require fire. If using starter fluid, only do so on charcoal, and do not add more fluid or other flammable liquids after the fire has ignited.

· Check for gas leaks. Whether the gas grill is hooked up to a propane tank or the natural gas supply of a home, ensure that the hoses or tanks are not leaking. Apply a light soap-and-water solution to hoses to see if they bubble from leaking gas.

 Keep baking soda nearby. Baking soda can control grease fires, but it's also helpful to have a fire extinguisher or a bucket of sand on hand for other

Watch children and pets. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from grilling areas.

· Wait for the grill and coals to cool. Practice safety around the grill until all coals are cool and the grill is no longer hot to the touch. Only then should the grill be moved or relocated.

How to handle raw meats when grillng out

Cooking over an open flame on a grill in the backyard requires cooks keep watchful eyes on their grills. Charcoal

grill devotees must stay nearby as flames grow before settling down as the coals turn gray. Cooks using charcoal



or pets don't accidentally run into the grill, potentially knocking it over and creating a fire and/or injury hazard. But even gas grill users must be mindful of safety, checking hoses for leaks before igniting fires and then staving within arm's length of the grill to make sure everything is working smoothly.

Fire safety is essential when grilling outdoors, but cooks also must prioritize safe handling of raw meats. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has established a host of guidelines to promote safe grilling and the safe consumption of grilled foods and offers the following recommendations to cooks planning to grill raw meats.

· Separate foods when purchasing them. The grocery store might be far away from home, but safe grilling begins at the checkout counter. The FDA recommends consumers separate raw meat, poultry, seafood, and eggs from other foods in their shopping carts and grocery bags to prevent cross-contamination. Keep these items separate when storing them in the refrigerator as well.

Use separate cutting boards. Another way to prevent cross-contamination is to use separate cutting boards.

grills should also make sure children Designate one cutting board for produce and another for raw meat, poultry and seafood. If grilling more than one type of raw food at once, thoroughly clean the cutting board with soap and hot water between uses.

· Keep separate plates for precooked foods and cooked foods. The FDA notes that cooked foods should never be placed on plates that previously held raw meat, poultry, seafood, or eggs unless the plate has been washed in hot, soapy water. Bacteria from the juices of raw meat can linger on an uncooked plate, compromising the safety of cooked foods placed on unwashed, previously used plates.

Discard marinades once you start cooking. Marinades used on raw foods should be discarded once the foods are removed from the marinade and placed on the grill. Repurposing marinades to use as sauces can increase the risk for bacterial infections. However, the FDA notes that marinades used on raw foods can be repurposed so long as they are boiled before resuing them.

When grilling raw meat, poultry, seafood or other foods, cooks must be careful to prevent cross-contamination that can lead to bacterial infections.

GRILLING

Practice food safety

Warmer temperatures lead to an increase in outdoor dining. Grillmasters anxiously wait to show off their skills while guests gravitate around the barbecue in the backyard.

No matter the temperature outside or the size of the crowd around your dinner table, food safety is a concern whenever foods will be transported inside and outdoors or enjoyed in the fresh air.

A survey conducted by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics found that, while most people realize the months of May through September are prime times for the threat of food poisoning, consumers still are not practicing correct outdoor food safety procedures. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says there are around 76 million cases of foodborne illnesses each year in the United States alone. Those involve hundreds of thousands of hospitalizations and thousands of deaths. The CDC warns that people need to be even more diligent during warmer months to prevent food-related illnesses.

FOOD SAFETY STARTS AT THE STORE

Food can spoil even before making its way into your kitchen. When food shopping, put the cold and frozen items on your list in your cart last. This will help keep them fresher

protect other foods against raw meat or poultry juices that can leak. Bag these items together at checkout so that you'll know to immediately put all of the perishable items away when vou get home.

Some people invest in insulated, reusable tote bags that can keep cold food cold on the ride home. Even if you use such bags, always head directly home after food shopping; do not stop along the way and leave food in a warm car where it can quickly spoil.

SAFETY AROUND THE GRILL

Preparing foods involves avoiding cross-contamination between uncooked and cooked foods. That means switching utensils so that bacteria will not transfer from uncooked or partially cooked food to fully cooked food.

Use a cooler to keep refrigerated foods cold until it's time to put them on the grill if you're cooking away from home, such as at a public picnic site. Otherwise, wait until the grill is hot and ready before bringing out foods that need to be

Rely on a cooking thermometer to test the internal temperature of foods to ensure they reach temperatures that will kill bacteria or other patho-

gens. Hamburgers should reach 160 F and chicken breasts 165 F. When reheating fully cooked meats like hot dogs, grill to 165 F. or until steaming hot.

Discard any unused marinades so that they do not contaminate cooked foods.

OUTDOOR BUFFET TIPS

Food also needs to be protected once it is served. Use ice or coolers to keep cold salads and condiments at at least 40 F. Foods should not remain outside in hot weather of 90 F or above for more than one hour. The maximum time food should be kept sitting out is two hours, says the USDA.

Keep hands and utensils clean at all times. This way vou do not transfer any germs onto safe foods. If a fresh water source is unavailable, keep hand wipes or disinfecting gels at the ready to clean up before

CLEAN UP WELL

Promptly clean all serving platters, utensils and cutting boards if they have been in contact with raw food juices. The FDA even recommends that you sanitize your cutting board with chlorine bleach, and replace it if the surface gets worn and difficult to clean.

Outdoor cooking and dining are quite popular. Following safety precautions can go a long way toward preventing foodborne illnesses.

Master magical marinades



With their mix of acidic ingredients and spices, marinades add flavor and may even pack some nutritional punch.

Grilled foods boast inviting flavors that put many diners on the lookout for second helpings. Quite often the magic behind grilled meals lies in the marinade used to give foods that flavorful kick.

Marinades can be used to enhance the flavor of meats, vegetables and poultry. While marinades add flavor, they also may be responsible for some other benefits in grilled foods.

MARINADES ADD FLA-**VOR**

Defined as a savory acidic to enrich its flavor, marinades help break down fiber and tenderize certain foods. The base of many marinades include vinegar, lemon juice or wine, and marinades can be enhanced with spices, oil and herbs.

It's important not to let foods sit in marinades for too long, as any alcohol, acid or salt in the mixture can chemically "cook" the food in a process known as "denaturing." Adhere to timing recommendations when using store-bought marinades, and keep such guidelines in mind when using homemade marinades as well. Many may tell you to let foods sit no longer than four hours. Marinades with citrus juices may require even less time for flavor to penetrate.

The timing of marinade use also will depend on the foods being marinated. Delicate items, such as seafood, may change with regard to texture or color in a matter of minutes.


It's important to always marinate foods in the refrigerator. Food left sitting out on a counter — even when it's in a marinade — invites the growth of bacteria. If a recipe calls for marinating at room temperature, continue to marinate in the refrigerator, but extend the length of time you marinate. This helps to prevent foodborne illnesses.

When marinating, use plastic or glass containers so the marinade does not cause a chemical reaction, which may occur if you marinate foods in metal containers. Discard all marinades for raw meats and poultry when the time comes to cook the foods, as leftover marinades may contain bacteria that makes them unsafe to reuse on other foods.

THE NUTRITIONAL **BENEFITS** OF MARINATING

In addition to flavor, marinades may improve the nutritional value of grilled foods. In 2008, researchers at Kansas State University discovered that marinating meat in antioxidant-rich spice blends can reduce the risk of forming heterocyclic amines, or HCAs, by more than 80 percent. HCAs are harmful, cancer-causing compounds that form when food chars over an open flame at high temperatures. Marinades must be rich in spices to have any HCAbusting properties.

Marinades are a secret weapon in the creation of tasty, tender and healthy foods. They come in quite handy when grilling, and add an extra dose of flavor when cooking over high heat.


