Polish Festival set for end of August

DUDLEY – For the 65th year, the St. Andrew Bobola Church in Dudley will host its annual Polish Festival at the end of August, celebrating not only the Polish culture in which the church finds its roots, but also the long-standing relationship the parish has had with the local community.

Event spokesperson Paula Niksa called the festival a significant fundraising event for the church, and while it has garnered significant funds to help keep the church operational the festival has evolved into so much more than a simple money-earning opportunity. It has become a Dudley tra-

dition as visitors from town and beyond Dudley's borders crowd the parking lot of the church each year to enjoy the music, food and cultural celebrations taking place on the grounds.

"We're keeping up a tradition that's been in the parish for a long time," Niksa said. "Because we are a Polish parish one of the big features of this event is the home-made Polish food where we have had our parishioner volunteers in already making over 4,000 cheese and cabbage pierogi as well as the galumpkis that are going to be available. We'll have entertainment and activities for the whole family and a big money raffle."

Oxford selectmen begin earth removal hearing

OXFORD – Selectmen opened what might be a controversial earth removal permit hearing at their most recent meeting, Aug. 6.

At issue is a proposal by Eastland Partners to essentially level the site of 175-191 Southbridge Road (Route 20) for two reasons: to make way for the state's realignment of Route 20 and to make a level space for later development of a "heavy commercial complex," according to Eastland's principal partner Chad Boardman.

Board man said the goal for now is to create "a pad-ready site," but the property has "significant ledge that has to be brought down to grade." The first stages of the project have already gone through the Planning Board, but he noted he'll have to go back there for "what we're actually going to do with the site" later.

After reading a list of issues needing to be addressed, Chairman Dennis Lamarche said some of the removed earth could be used in the Route 20 project, and there's already similar work happening on abutting properties. To him, the biggest issue is safety, which "should be of the utmost importance." Among other things, he argued the site needs

fencing and a careful phasing plan because of how the property's grade already changes frequently.

John Saad also cited safety. He recalled an earth-removal project years ago during the construction of I-395 in which the grade was so steep a vehicle rolled over and killed the driver.

Boardman later noted the site's grade ranges from five feet to 70 in some areas.

With a similar project on this site, Saad said he saw many trucks leaving gravel on the streets and a problem with runoff going across Route 20 into nearby wetlands. He recommended "proper policing in the area [and] proper signage," noting there's "going to be a lot of gravel [coming] out of that place."

Lamarche agreed, noting the previous project "left the place a mess" and the town didn't get a big enough bond to fund cleaning it up properly. Cheryll LeBlanc observed this property neighbors an ongoing Eastland project site in Auburn where residents have complained of "excessive drilling and blasting." In response, Boardman noted state laws state how to notify the community about such work and how far away people need to be warned (250

Joseph doubles down on donation of stipend

DUDLEY – Dudley Selectman Paul Joseph has made it clear that he does not want to accept his annual stipend for his service as a selectman, seeking instead to see the money go towards supporting the needs of the Veterans Agent office.

Joseph's request dates back to 2018, when Veterans' Agent Stephen Rogerson sought added financial support to pay the office's clerk for her service and increasing the operating

hours of the department which at the time was only noon until 7 p.m. on Thursdays. Joseph offered up the \$500 stipend he is to receive for serving as an elected selectman in an attempt to add money to the coffers to fund the increase. Before the closing of the Board of Selectmen's July 29 meeting, he sought to ensure that his stipend for this year does, in fact, go toward that cause.

"I'm not going to take a check and then have to declare it and then write a check to the town for a department. We've done

it before, I want my check to go to a different department," Joseph said.

However, Town Administrator Jonathan Ruda said it's not that simple. When Joseph refused his stipend in 2018 the money simply went back into the general fund. Ruda explained that one possibility it to take the stipend and earmark it for a specific cause.

"Let's say, for example, we did a \$134,000 Veteran's Services budget. You could do a \$134,500 budget," Ruda said.

This would increase the line

item and the difference would be made up using the \$500 stipend from the general fund instead of tax dollars to settle the difference.

Selectman Joseph was adamant that the money goes towards the salary of the Veteran's Office Clerk.

"If it's going to take a vote of this board on a motion then once I know it's gone into the general fund, I'm going to ask to increase the salary line item for the secretary for the veterans by \$500," Joseph said.

In early 2018, the Veteran's

Agent made a plea to selectmen to increase financial support of the office due to the work load he had endured and the needs of local veterans. It's estimated Dudley hosts nearly 700 veterans in the community. The office has since added a second day of operation now accepting clients Mondays from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m. in addition to opening on Thursday with extended hours from 10 a.m. until 7 p.m.





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Bringing the flock home

BEALS TALKS BACKYARD CHICKEN BASICS

DUDLEY – By now, almost everyone probably has a neighbor or friend with backyard chickens. But from Andrew Beals' experience, it's actually becoming less popular over time.

In 2009, he was driving through southern Maine when he heard the Portland City Council had approved residents having up to six chickens downtown.

"I knew that poultry had arrived," he told a small group at Pearle Crawford Library Thursday.

That realization led to a lot of educational events like the one he was giving that night – so many, in fact, Beals later noted he once calculated his pay rate as around \$2.50 an hour during a particularly high-travel period. But over the following decade, attendance "dropped off tremendously," especially among those interested in raising birds for meat. Back in 2010, he recalled, there was about equal interest in eggs and meat, but now it's mostly eggs. His Dudley audience had at least one person who's doing both.

Either way, the process often starts the same way – by brooding chicks. Chicks of various chicken breeds are available from numerous places around the area (including Klem's, Tractor Supply, Putnam Co-op, private farms and by mail), but Beals urged people to make sure their supplier gets birds from a National Poultry Improvement Program hatchery.

"I don't think it's something you should get into lightly," he said, noting prospective chicken parents should do some research into what breeds they want.

There are hundreds, with various personalities, egg laying frequencies, meat production qualities, and the like, but Beals only touched on a handful of the more famous ones. In practice, the old cliché "brown eggs are local eggs..." is false, because the only thing that determines egg color is the breed and those can generally be raised anywhere. Several breeds lay various shades of brown, from tan to dark chocolate, some lay speckled, some lay white, and three lay greenish-blue eggs. They all taste pretty much the same, and small-scale growers almost universally argue backyard eggs taste better than those from massive egg factories because the chickens' diet is better.

Beals noted that most

commercially available chicks are hatched in Texas or Iowa, flown here overnight, and sometimes delivered in big chirping boxes by the Postal Service. Once at their new home, they need to be stuck in a brooder – their "artificial mother" – immediately, but there are many ways to design one. They can be purchased, but a simple incandescent/fluorescent light over a box works just fine as long as they can't escape and you watch it to make sure the chicks aren't too cold/hot. Beals noted chicks need gradually decreasing temperatures as they grow, from about 90 degrees dropping to 70, and that can be achieved by slowly raising the light source over several weeks. As long as they're protected from rain, drafts, animals and young children, fed and watered adequately, and have decent, occasionally-replaced shavings, they'll be fine under most conditions. After the age of 3-4 weeks, they can start going outdoors, if it's warm enough and they have feathers.

Once outdoors, they're likely to come in contact with a bacterium called Coccidia in the soil.

"It's everywhere," he noted, and can kill chicks or cause "big time health issues," most commonly seen as greenish diarrhea.

But, since it's also fairly easy to treat, Beals doesn't think most chicks need to be vaccinated for it. Many commercial feeds are also "medicated" with a coccistat, which is not an antibiotic, to slow any infection; if the disease exists, it stays in the birds' digestive system and isn't dangerous to people with normal immune systems, he said.

"If you have a good, clean operation, you'll never see coccidia," he noted.

By contrast, Beals said he's "shocked more people are not vaccinating for Merrick's Disease." That's a far rarer but untreatable nervous system disorder. It usually manifests as a three-to-eight-week-old chick "who's doing the splits. I'd put her out of her misery, because she'll never walk again," he said.

Those who don't want to raise chicks can get pullets (adolescent hens) at age

15-22 weeks; hens normally start laying at 20-24 weeks, so this saves some time and feeding cost. However, pullets are also notably more expensive – \$7 to \$22 each, depending on breed and source – while hatchlings are around \$3.50 each in our area. State law also requires purchase of at least six chicks at a time.

Both age groups need the same things as they mature: water "24/7/365" (at brooder temperature for the chicks), food (usually at the ratio of one pound food per two pounds water), shelter with enough space, ventilation and laying boxes (heat's unnecessary; adult flocks will keep themselves warm), and space outside to run around in (preferably fenced on all sides and above for predator protection. Many free-range them, but that has a higher risk of predation). Feeding differs whether you're raising for meat or eggs; for meat, give them a meat bird mix from chick-dom, but for eggs, only start layer feed, scratch and other supplements at maturity. Feed comes in three main varieties – commercial (which is almost entirely GMO), and two types of organic, certified (up to 9 percent GMO) and uncertified (up to 40 percent commercial/GMO). The organics generally cost about \$10 more per 50 pound bag.

Beals is a spokesman for Poulin Grains, one of the major organic feed producers.

"If you feed too much scratch or corn, you'll see egg production go down," he added. "There's plenty of energy in corn, but not enough protein."

Whatever you use, he noted you'll typically use three to four pounds of feed to get 12 eggs, and with other inputs, he calculated it costs him about \$3.50 per dozen to raise his own. Regarding meat birds, Beals noted they require a lot more protein and vitamins because they're bred to

grow so fast – it takes just eight weeks for the most common ones (Rock/Cornish cross-breeds) to reach market weight of four pounds, and industry is working to reduce that to four weeks and to increase egg production to two per day. Much beyond eight weeks, "these birds will start dying because their hearts give out. They're meat-producing machines."

Beals told a bit of a horror story, from the chicken's point of view. One farmer called him to identify why his 300 layers had stopped laying anything. He visited, determined they were healthy and well-fed, and noticed the farmer also had meat birds. When he asked where those birds were slaughtered, the farmer told him right next to the hens' area. The hens were so traumatized by seeing their kin butchered "they never laid again," he said, adding he told the farmer to move the slaughtering area outdoors.

Under less stressful conditions, layers will normally show a decline in production over their lifetimes. They peak in their first year of laying, drop to 82 percent in year 2, 60 percent by year 4, 30 percent by year 8 and just 10 percent by year 10. In practice, chickens rarely live beyond age 7 or 8, although the record is 17 years, Beals said.

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
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A Night Out on the beach



its. Only two birds are allowed during the regular season. The regular duck season opens on Oct. 14, also in the Central District. The ducks also had a great nesting season with large broods surviving predators and bad weather conditions. Although the valley area does not sit on a major flyway, we still have some great shooting opportunities for migrating waterfowl.

Local anglers continue to catch some very impressive freshwater bass. Numerous largemouth and smallmouth bass are being reeled in daily from local ponds, with Whitehall Reservoir and Webster lake giving up bass in the four to five pound range. Webster Lake is also giving up some impressive Crappie (calico bass) if you know where to fish for them. Webster Lake has had trophy crappie being caught for years by local sportsmen.

Striper fishing remained hot at Block Island last week. Numerous anglers reported catching some 40 to



50 pound fish on live eels, but charter boats were catching there stripers on Parachute Jigs. Black bass (seabass) fishing remained very good in Rhode Island waters, but Fluke fishing was poor to say the least.

Sportsmen are starting to train their bird dogs for the fast approaching bird hunting season. Losing a good bird dog and hunting companion is tough, but replacing them with a new pup can ease the pain. Numerous local sportsmen have lost their dogs in the valley this year due to old age or sickness. I have been through it numerous times and found that replacing your best friend and hunting companion, was the best way to deal with

the loss. Great memories are never forgotten in the field & off, but a new dog will ease the pain and create new ones. If I could not hunt birds over a dog I would quit hunting. It is all about the dog. Pointing, flushing, and retrievers are all about a great day in the field.

This week's pictures show a German Shorthair pointing on a pheasant, followed by a great retrieve. Pheasant are the number one game bird for local hunters, as grouse are extremely rare in the area.

Take A Kid Fishing & Keep them Rods bending.

The early nuisance goose hunting season in the Central District is scheduled to open Sept. 3 through Sept. 20 in Massachusetts! The early Canada goose hunting season is geared to eliminate as many of the non-migratory Canada geese that are fowling water supplies, beaches, golf courses, etc. By the looks of it, there will be many more birds to harvest this year because of their highly successful nesting season. Large broods of geese were counted at various lakes and ponds, by local residents and hunters this year. The big problem each year for hunters is the no hunting restrictions on many of the private local fields, that the geese often frequent to feed.

Finding a hunting field for geese needs to be done early. Golf courses are a great place to start to look for hunting spots, and farmers' fields are another. Finding the daily pattern of geese can improve your chances with some great shooting possibilities. The geese may feed on private property restricting shooting, but they need water. Setting up on route's traveled to their daily habits of water holes, can provide some great pass shooting. A liberal limit of 15 birds daily during the early season can provide some great shooting opportunities, if you do your homework.

The regular Goose hunting season opens on Oct. 14 with a dramatic cut in daily bag lim-

To yield or not to yield?

This past week, I was asked a question about the rules to observe when entering a limited access highway, such as Route 395. The person asking the question is often troubled by those, entering via the on ramp, who do not yield to the traffic on the highway. I was asked

to explain to drivers about the obligations to yield in these circumstances.

In these instances, the driver entering the highway has the obligation to give the right of way to those vehicles already on the road. Most, if not all, of these ramps have "yield" signs. These are prevalent in various locations, including rotary entrances. They can also be found at some intersections on local roads. The procedures to follow these signs are covered under Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 89, Section 9. It states in part, "The driver of a vehicle approaching a yield sign shall in obedience to such sign slow down to a speed reasonable for the existing conditions and, if required for safety to stop...After slowing or stopping, the driver shall yield the right of way to any vehicle in the intersection or approaching on another roadway so closely as to constitute an immediate hazard during the time such driver is moving across or within the intersection or junction of roadways." This law places the obligation to yield the right of way on the vehicle approaching the sign. This section of the law also addresses accidents. It states in part "if such a driver is involved in a collision with a vehicle in the intersection or junction of roadways, after driving past a yield sign without stopping, such collision shall be deemed prima facie evidence of his failure to yield the right of way." This basically means the driver facing the yield sign can be deemed responsible for an accident, despite the actions of any other vehicle.

The bottom line in any of these cases is to know your surroundings and exercise proper caution. When entering a limited access highway, rotary, or similar location where traffic is already traveling, drivers must yield to the other vehicles. In cases of limited access highways, vehicles are traveling at higher speeds. There is a greater likelihood of serious accidents taking place, particularly when vehicles are entering the road or changing lanes. If it will be a "close call" to enter the roadway, take the extra moment and properly give way to the other vehicles. Driving defensively can prevent accidents and injuries.

as an employer, you can generally deduct, as business expenses, any contributions you make on behalf of your plan participants.

SIMPLE IRA: In 2019, you can put in up to \$13,000 - or \$16,000 if you're 50 or older - to a simple IRA. As is the case with the SEP-IRA, your earnings grow tax deferred. You can match your employees' contributions dollar for dollar; up to 3 percent of compensation. If you work for yourself, you can combine employee and employer contributions, so if you use the 3 percent matching rule, and you earn enough to fully match employee contributions, you can put in up to \$26,000 per year (or \$32,000 if you're 50 or older). Alternatively, you could contribute 2 percent of each eligible employee's compensation each year, up to a maximum of \$5,600, regardless of whether the employee contributes. Contributions to your employees are



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tax deductible.

"Owner-only" 401(k) plan: If you have no employees other than your spouse, you can establish an "owner-only" 401(k) plan, which functions similarly to a 401(k) plan offered by a large

employer. Between salary deferral and profit sharing, you can contribute up to \$56,000, in pre-tax dollars, to your owner-only 401(k), or \$62,000 if you're 50 or older. Like a SEP-IRA and SIMPLE IRA, a 401(k) provides the potential to accumulate tax-deferred earnings. However, you could choose to open a Roth 401(k), which can be funded with after-tax dollars. With a Roth 401(k), your earnings can grow tax-free, provided you've had your account at least five years and you don't start taking withdrawals until you're at least 59 and a half.

Which plan is right for you? The answer depends on several factors, such as whether you have any

employees and how much money you can contribute each year. But all the plans mentioned above are generally easy to establish, and the administrative costs are usually minimal. Most important, any one of them can help you build some of the resources you'll need to enjoy the retirement lifestyle you've envisioned. To select an appropriate plan, you may want to consult with your tax and financial advisors.

In any case, don't wait too long. Time goes by quickly, and when you reach that day when you're a "former" business owner, you'll want to be prepared.

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Collecting pinback buttons

Pinback buttons are popular with collectors. You can find pinbacks that will fit in with almost any other type of collection. Many pinbacks have great graphics. They are easy to display. Some can sell for thousands of dollars, but you can find many for under a dollar.

Pinback buttons are made using a wire pin. They typically have a metal circular outer covering and temporarily fasten to a garment. They're commonly associated with political campaigns, but they have a wide variety of uses.

Political campaigns were among the first to use pinbacks after they were created. A 2016 Time magazine article states that ferrotype photograph pins were used prior to pinbacks. Abraham Lincoln used the ferrotype images with locking pins in his presidential campaign in 1861. Whitehead and Hoag created the first pinback buttons in 1896. They had a celluloid (plastic) covering to protect the image. William McKinley

ran against William Jennings Bryan for president that year and they both took advantage of the new buttons to promote their campaign runs.

Advertisers found pinback buttons to be an inexpensive way to promote their products. They were used by local businesses and major corporations. Pinbacks advertised everything from beer to automobiles. An advertising pinback with an image of Elizabeth "Plinky" Servaty Toepperwein for Deadshot Smokeless gunpowder sold for \$1,300 in 2012. A 1909 celluloid pin portraying a Gibson Girl (based on a series of drawings by Charles Dana Gibson) sold for \$8,000 at auction in 2014.

Comic related pinbacks can generate some strong prices. Yellow Kid was a newspaper comics character that was very popular in the late 1800's. A set of 50 Yellow Kid pinbacks went for over \$3,500 at auction in 2013. A smaller set of newer pinbacks brought even more. The set of 8 "Marvelmania" pinbacks depicting Spiderman, the Hulk, and other Marvel comics characters sold for nearly \$4,000 in 2008.

Sports pinbacks can also be very valuable. A 1909 pin advertising Buster Brown Bread pictured Ty Cobb. It

brought over \$4,000 at auction in 2016. Ten 1921 "Mrs. Sherlock's Bread pinbacks depicting baseball players sold for over \$5,000 in 2004.

As you might expect, political pins are the most desirable. A pinback for Henry Ford's 1920s presidential bid sold for over \$7,000 in 2014. One jugate (two portraits side by side) version of John Davis and Charles Bryan from their 1924 presidential run sold for \$15,000 in 2015. A 1920 Cox/Roosevelt (Franklin) jugate pin sold for \$20,000 in 1920. Four of the Cox/Roosevelt campaign pins are worth more than the \$75,000 that a president earned during that time.

Strategies for growing edibles later into the season

Plus, the cooler temperatures enhance their flavor. Simply count the number of frost-free days left in your growing season and compare it with the number of days from planting to harvest listed on the seed packet.

Protect these late plantings and other vegetables from chilly fall temperatures with cloches, coldframes, and floating row covers. Many of these devices have long been used by gardeners to jump start the season in spring and extend it much later into fall. These devices trap heat around the plants, protecting them from frosty temperatures.

Convert gallon milk jugs into garden cloches for individual plants. Remove the bottom

of the jug and slide it over the plant. Use the cap to capture heat or remove to ventilate your homemade cloche on sunny days. Or purchase reusable cloches with built in ventilation. Originally made of glass many of the newer cloches are plastic, making them more affordable, easy to stack and portable.

You can make your own coldframes. Many gardeners convert discarded windows, a bit of lumber and nails into a homemade shelter for their plants. The window size usually determines the size of your coldframe. Just make sure you can reach all the plants inside. For best results your frame should be higher in the back than the front

draped these floating row covers (season-extending fabrics) over your crops. Anchor the edges with rocks, boards, or wire wickets. The fabric traps heat around your plants, but allows air, light and water through so there is no need to uncover the plants during the day or for watering.

Increase the ease of season-extending fabrics with low and tall frost pop-up covers and plant protection frost covers. The frames are fitted with all-purpose garden fabric to create protective tents. You can protect new plantings and extend your harvest by protect-

ing plants down to 24 degrees Fahrenheit.

So, with a little preparation you can keep enjoying fresh-from-the-garden flavor long past the traditional end to your harvest season.

feet). He also observed that they have to do preparatory studies of potential blasting effects on nearby buildings within a certain radius.

Only one of those abutters attended. Ruth Parker said she's concerned mostly about the project "shutting down the road" and causing major traffic problems on Route 20. She also asked if blasting could "mean we have to leave our homes?"

Boardman said they "can't do anything without Mass DOT approval," and Eastland is now talking to the state. In this case, he added, he thinks there will be less impact because the plans call for entering the site from the other side.

"When you open up the entire project, that's when all the you-know-what breaks loose," he admitted.

Town Manager Jen Callahan said she and DPW Director Sean Divoll met with Eastland about this work, but the "permit process raises other concerns." Nothing was finalized there; the board continued the public hearing to Aug 27 at 7:15, with members predicting it might take several sessions.

The board also voted to create a Disabilities Commission and appoint its first two members, Deborah Lamarche and Carol Kuzdzal.

Callahan said the idea came up when she was thinking about assessing the handicapped accessibility of Town Hall. She found such an assessment was already done (in 1994) and a plan to address such issues exists, but "there hasn't been any real attempt to apply for grants for any projects."

That's in part because such grants require the existence of the commission, which oversees their use, researches changes in relevant laws, and does public outreach to educate about disability issues. When one exists, the town can apply for up to \$250,000 a year, she noted.

"Unless you have an impairment or are in this chair," people don't generally see the many issues handicapped people face, Deb Lamarche said. She noted she had been "faceplanted" several times

by accident because of curbs and other issues in various public places.

Kuzdzal agreed, noting it's "almost impossible" for a wheelchair user or someone with a walker to get into the police station because there's no automatic-opener button, and many similar issues exist around town.

"I think this is long overdue," Saad said. "There are places we take for granted because we're not handicapped."

He pointed specifically to towel and toilet-paper dispensers in bathrooms, which can be difficult to reach from wheelchairs, and the frequent lack of grab bars in such places.

Dennis Lamarche agreed, noting he has often talked to builders about how important meeting the handicapped access codes are.

Selectmen also gave local environmentalist Glenn Krevosky a chance to make his case for them to support a deposit on nip bottles, and they voted 3-2 to send a letter to area legislators to look into supporting current bills that do so. Callahan noted at least 80 house members, including Rep Joe McKenna, have signed on.

"If a few people do bring them, it's a few less on the roads," Krevosky said, noting it would be "moving toward a cleaner, less-plastic-in-the-environment world."

Saad praised Krevosky for being the town's "most dedicated person to the environment," but argued "you can't legislate people's personal behavior." He said he agreed with Krevosky's goal, but not with the bill, as did LeBlanc.

"All they're doing is solving a symptom, not solving the problem itself," she said, and urged working to get store owners to clean up around their businesses instead.


Mike Daniels, however, said he supports the idea of a deposit and a plastic bag ban even though "people break laws."

"Nothing irritates me more than seeing dozens of nip bottles on the street," he said.



blast came one pitch after Burke fouled off a pitch that should have been caught by the Alliance's right-fielder, but instead was just another strike.

"I was down in the count 1-2 and [Alliance pitcher Kyle Lavallee] came with a fastball and I fouled it off, said Burke, who also doubled in the game. "I knew he was going to come back with a breaking ball so I was sitting there waiting for it. He left it up a little bit and I just got the barrel on it. I was waiting for that pitch. If he had thrown it down the middle he would have beaten me, but I was selling out for that one pitch and I got it."

"That was a very big home run in a very big spot," Bostek said.

The Bomb Squad wasn't finished in the fifth, however. Nick Lemay (two hits) followed Burke's home run with an infield single and then, after an out, Nick Cardoni (three hits) singled to right field. Lemay tied the game, 3-3,

when he scored on an RBI single to center field by Jake Sanderski, and Cardoni made it 4-3 Bomb Squad when he scored on a sacrifice fly to center by Zakk Renihan.

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BOATING

Prevent carbon monoxide poisoning on your boat

Boating is a rewarding hobby that allows people to spend ample time on the water enjoying the great outdoors. Fresh air and boating might go hand in hand, but a danger may be lurking in the air on or around boats that can put boaters' health in jeopardy.

According to the U.S. Coast Guard, carbon monoxide, or CO, can accumulate anywhere in or around a boat. Inadequately ventilated canvas enclosures and blocked exhaust outlets are just two places where CO can accumulate. Exhaust also can get trapped in enclosed places, potentially leading to the accumulation of CO.

Fortunately, the USCG notes that CO poisoning is entirely preventable. Routine maintenance and attentive boat ownership can protect boaters and their passengers from the threat posed by CO poisoning.

What are the dangers of CO poisoning?

CO is produced when carbon-based fuels burn. Such fuels include gasoline, charcoal or oil, so boat engines are not the only potential source of CO poisoning on a boat. Gas generators, cooking ranges and space and water heaters also pose a threat.

CO is dangerous because it can enter the bloodstream through the lungs, preventing the body from getting the oxygen it needs. The USCG notes that both prolonged exposure to low concentrations of CO or very quick exposure to high concentrations of CO can prove fatal.

What are symptoms of CO poisoning? Irritated eyes, headache, nausea, weakness, and dizziness are some of the early symptoms of CO poisoning. These are easily and often mistaken as seasickness when on a boat. Any of the aforementioned symptoms should be addressed immediately. People experiencing these symptoms should



be moved to a fresh air environment, observed and given oxygen, if necessary. Seek medical help and shut off potential sources of CO, if possible. Do not write these symptoms off as simple seasickness. Err on the side of caution, even if you're unsure if CO poisoning is the culprit.

Protect yourself and others from CO
The USCG recommends all boaters

learn where and how CO can accumulate on their boats. Maintain fresh air circulation throughout the boat at all times, running exhaust blowers whenever the generator is operating.

When hosting others on their boats, boaters should make sure everyone steers clear of engine and generator exhaust outlets. Boaters and their guests should never sit, teak surf or hang on the back deck or swim platform

while engines are running.

The USCG notes that the presence of exhaust fumes means CO is present, too. Dissipate fumes immediately upon detecting them.

Boating is a safe and fun activity when boaters maintain their boats and take steps to protect themselves from dangers like carbon monoxide. More information on boating safety can be found at www.uscgboating.org.
