UXBRIDGE — On Sunday, June 2, Uxbridge High School graduated 117 students as part of the Class of 2019.

Valedictorian Lucas Lawrence and Salutatorian Alexandria Nowicki gave speeches, as well as Uxbridge High School Principal Michael Rubin. Special recognition was offered to seniors Julius Kumah, Ben Parker, Seth Wojciechowski, and Alex Keeler, who will be joining branches of the Armed Forces after graduation.

“So many tiny little moments and decisions and stepping stones brought us to this day,” Nowicki said. “We are all so capable of changing the world for the better. Some of you may think that you have to continue to conform to a certain mold or image in order to be accepted and successful. You don’t. This is your chance to break free. The most beautiful thing about you is that you are different from the person to your left, the person to your right, and everybody else in

## Sutton selectman steps down after decades of service

SUTTON — After 50 years of service to the Sutton community, Selectman and former Police Chief John Hebert is stepping down. The Board of Selectmen recognized Hebert with a plaque for his dedication during a recent meeting.

Town Manager James Smith said he was appointed to his role three months after Hebert was elected as a Selectman in 2007. He said he appreciates Hebert’s guidance, wisdom, and leadership.

“Most of all, I appreciate the friendship we’ve developed,” he added.

Selectman David Hall said the plaque was being presented in recognition and gratitude of Hebert’s 50 years of service, beginning in 1969 as an employee of the Sutton Highway Department. Hebert was also a volunteer on the Sutton Fire Department and joined the Police Department as a part-time officer in 1971. He became a full-time officer in 1972, was promoted to Police Sergeant in 1989, and served as Police Chief from 1995 until his retirement in 2006. He served on the Board of Selectmen for four terms from 2007 to 2019.

“Thank you for your years of service and dedication to the town of Sutton,” said Hall, adding that he will miss Hebert’s experience and institutional knowledge, thanking Hebert most of all for his friendship.

Board member Jesse Limanek added that during Hebert’s time working on behalf of the residents of Sutton, the town has changed, going from a mostly farming town to a suburb in the Worcester-Providence corridor.

“The town has changed but one thing has been constant—your presence and your service to the community,” he said. “I aspire to follow in your footsteps in terms of how you hold yourself. You’re courteous, you’re respectful, your example reflects well not just on us as a Board, but as a town.”

The Board continued sharing a few stories and anecdotes, stating that Hebert is a great mentor and has inspired many to give back to the community.

“I didn’t expect all of this. Thank you, everybody — it means an awful lot,” Hebert said, addressing the Board and those in attendance.

He said he has been a Sutton resident for 68 years and acknowledged his wife, Susan, and their two children, Tyler and Katie.

“I wouldn’t want to live anywhere else. I wouldn’t want to be governed by anywhere else,” he said, encouraging members of the Board to continue working hard on behalf of the town’s residents. “The people in this town, they count on us and they look at us for direction.”

Filling Hebert’s seat is Jeffrey Bannon, who also serves as Chairman of the Finance Committee.



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# Local students graduate from Assumption College

WORCESTER — A total of 635 graduates received a degree during Assumption College's 102nd Commencement exercises on Sunday, May 12, held at the DCU Center in downtown Worcester.

The Commencement speaker, Robert Lewis Jr., chief executive officer of The BASE, a Boston-based nonprofit that provides athletic, education and career-building resources to enable student-athletes to pursue a college degree, shared his life story of struggle and achievement and inspired the Class of 2019 to live a life of meaning.

In her introduction of Lewis, Julia Demkowicz '19, salutatorian, shared of his tireless passion for empowering inner-city youth, specifically his efforts to break down the stereotypes of urban America.

"Robert Lewis may not have had a lot growing up as a child of teenage parents who lived in public housing, but he did have love and the mindset that he could be successful despite any limitations society tried to place on him," shared Demkowicz. "He grew up with a longing to share this message with others in similar situations. After reviewing a report on poverty that showed that Black and Latino men were disadvantaged in many ways, including lower graduation rates and higher incarceration rates, Lewis was determined to change this narrative by launching The BASE in 2013."

Assumption was one of the first institutions of higher education to partner with The BASE, providing scholarships and other opportunities to individuals in the program. Thus far, 11 The BASE students have attended Assumption; two graduated in 2018; four others are among the Class of 2019; five more will continue their studies next year. Nationwide, The BASE serves 1,400 individuals.

"The BASE provides educational, athletic, and career-building resources to enable students to pursue college degrees," explained Demkowicz. "All of these students enter the program

through word of mouth and social media, a testament to the power of the program's message. The BASE builds on the students' passion for sports, including baseball, softball, and, most recently, basketball. The program gives them a sense of belonging and also provides academic resources, such as homework support, writing workshops, SAT prep classes, and college and career visits."

Lewis shared that through The BASE, students were provided opportunities to obtain a college degree, but also to change hearts and minds.

"I started The BASE because I wanted to shift the narrative," explained Lewis. "Urban talent is American talent. When you look at me, what do you see? Your future. You see the next generation of a workforce. Don't call us at-risk. Don't call us underserved. Don't call us disadvantaged. What you might call us are college graduates. And that's what we're doing."

Following an incident in which his house was firebombed when he was 16, Lewis "knew at that moment that I was going to do something good for humanity." Later in life, he would collaborate with Nelson Mandela in South Africa to build a national service model. He also advised British Prime Minister David Cameron during a period of unrest in the United Kingdom in 2011 and served as an advisor to the nation of Haiti following an earthquake there. On Mother's Day, Lewis shared with graduates the limitless potential of their future, especially when supported by a mother's love.

"Nelson Mandela, David Cameron and Haiti," Lewis pondered. "Who would have thought that a person born to a mom at 18 with a fourth-grade education that those opportunities could come? She did. And that's what you have graduates, when you look around and you see your parents. They see your future, and it's bright."

"As I look out into this crowd today, what I see is a kaleidoscope of beautiful people filled with promise and hope," shared Lewis. "You represent what is great in our country right now and for generations to come. I am inspired by you and I know your families are so proud of you."

Lewis also expressed his gratitude to Assumption College President

Francesco C. Cesareo, Ph.D. for his support of The BASE program.

"President Cesareo, your belief in The BASE and our organization changing the game for urban young people throughout the country," shared Lewis. "I want our student-athletes from The BASE Boston, BASE Chicago, BASE Indianapolis and Pittsburgh to experience this wonderful institution and they will."

In closing, Lewis called upon the Class of 2019 to make a difference in the lives of others.

"Be impactful, every day," Lewis concluded. "Influence others to greatness and lead with your soul. The future will be shared by those willing to commit their minds and bodies to the task."

In addition to delivering the Commencement address, Lewis received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters. An honorary degree was also conferred upon Sr. Anne Credidio, B.V.M., who raised funds to rehabilitate a neglected hospital wing in Ecuador for those with leprosy and restored dignity to those suffering from the disease. The recipients were honored for their dedication to community service and living the mission of Assumption College.

During the ceremony-in which 456 Bachelor of Arts degrees; 144 graduate studies degrees (Master of Arts and Master of Business Administration) and certificates; and 35 Continuing and Career Education degrees (Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Science, and associates) were awarded-Francesco C. Cesareo, Ph.D., president of Assumption College, urged graduates to be mindful of the mission of the College as they go forth to use their gifts and talents to better the world.

"The Catholic intellectual tradition at Assumption College has challenged you to examine your life, to examine the values which define your life as you became more aware of who you are, who you wanted to become, and how you would live this out each day of your life," said President Cesareo to the graduating class. "You have discovered your vocation during your time at Assumption. Our society today needs individuals such as yourself who have developed a moral and ethical frame-

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work grounded in a Catholic worldview, who understand that policies, decisions, and actions devoid of values have negative consequences which will be detrimental to the common good."

Zachary Fournier '19, Class of 2019 valedictorian, shared how as students, and now as graduates, they have been called to light the way for others.

"Each of us, in a way unique to our experiences, has been shaped by our time here at Assumption College," said Fournier. "Each and every one of us is unique, in both where we come from and where we are going: sitting among us are students who discovered their future calling as doctors, scientists, business professionals, and educators, commuters who have found a second home as welcoming as their own, and those who may have never before known true friendship who now have lifelong bonds. Regardless of where we came from, Assumption College enabled us to find our vocation and where we are going. Just as our school has shaped us, however, we have left a lasting impact on the campus we have called our home through our achievements in and beyond the classroom, through our collective impact on our community, and through our service to others. # Soter supports Chapter 90 Bond Bill

BOSTON — State Rep. Michael J. Soter, R-Bellingham, has announced that Blackstone is one step closer to receiving \$234,641 for local road and bridge repairs as part of a multi-million-dollar bond bill approved by the House of Representatives, and Uxbridge is slated to receive \$508,936 in funding for road and bridge repairs.


House Bill 69, An Act financing improvements to municipal roads and bridges, provides for \$200 million in Chapter 90 funding reimbursement for cities and towns for Fiscal Year 2020. The bill was enacted by the House of Representatives on a vote of 152-0 on May 29, with support from Representative Soter, who also voted to engross the bill when it initially passed the House on May 8.

Established by the Legislature in 1973, the Chapter 90 program allocates funding on an annu-

ality basis to cities and towns through a formula that is based on the weighted average of a municipality's population, employment, and total road miles. The money is paid out as reimbursements to communities for qualifying infrastructure work.

Chapter 90 funds can be spent on a variety of municipal roadway projects, including resurfacing, drainage, sidewalks, guardrails, traffic control, right-of-way acquisition and street lighting. The funding can also be used for bikeways, landscaping and tree planting associated with certain projects, and for purchasing and maintaining certain road building machinery, equipment and tools.

The Chapter 90 bond bill now requires a final enactment vote in the Senate before it can be sent to Governor Charlie Baker for his signature. The Senate is expected to take this vote on May 30.



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# Northbridge students attend DA's Wellness Conference

WORCESTER — Hundreds of middle and high school students from across Worcester County learned about the dangers of drugs, tobacco and vaping, and received an interactive presentation about the importance of cyber safety and the responsible use of social media at District Attorney Joseph D. Early's annual Student Wellness Conference.

The conference, held at Worcester State University on Thursday, May 23, had a record-high attendance this year with nearly 300 students attending from about 15 different schools.

"The conference this year focused on relevant issues our teens are facing every day: drugs and alcohol, cyber safety, vaping and mental health," Mr. Early said. "Prevention is one of my top priorities, and I am proud of how well our presenters did motivating the students who attended to make good decisions and positive choices when faced with these challenges. 

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# Cool, refreshing and straight from the garden – Mint

Add a bit of cool flavor to your beverages and meals this summer with homegrown mint. Try using peppermint leaves in fruit cocktails and ice cream. Add spearmint to your tea or use the leaves to season lamb and jelly. Or try chocolate mint for a unique sweet and refreshing flavor in desserts and drinks.

This vigorous plant is easy to grow and suited to container gardens. In fact, growing it in a pot will help keep this vigorous herb contained. Or sink a container of mint in the garden or plant where surrounding walks and walls will keep this vigorous plant contained.

Grow mint in a full sun to partial shade location with moist well-drained soil. Mulch the soil to conserve moisture. Though hardy in zones 3 to 11,

you will need to provide a bit of winter protection when growing mint in containers in colder regions. Either sink the container in a vacant spot in the garden or move the planter into an unheated garage.

Water thoroughly whenever the soil is thawed and dry.

Harvest the leaves as needed. Cutting leafy stems off the plant just above a healthy leaf or bud will encourage compact tidy growth. Pick mint just before flowering for the most intense flavor.

Include a container of mint in your patio, balcony or deck plantings. Keeping it close to the kitchen and outdoor living space will make it easy for you to harvest and use. Plus, your guests will enjoy plucking a few fresh mint leaves to add to their iced tea, mojito or favorite summer beverage or salad.

Not only does this easy to grow herb add flavor, but it also aids digestion. Add a garnish of mint to dress up dessert plates or provide it to a loved

Keeping backyard feeders full of food for numerous species of birds can become expensive if you do not have some type of control on chipmunks and squirrels. Hummingbirds are back big time with as many as a half dozen of them flocking to the feeder at one time. My wife Judy enjoyed watching them fly in and out of the feeders daily, before she lost her battle with cancer recently.

Wild Turkeys are also being observed with their clutches of young birds. Some hen Turkeys have been observed with as many as 12 or more young birds. Although not all of the young birds will survive, many will. Predators like fox, fisher cat, hawks and owls to mention a few are sure to take their toll on the newborn.

Deer are also having their young, and will do so all this month with some being born in June. The deer population in Mass. has been strong, and continues to grow annually despite their loss of habitat, due mostly to construction. The deer have adapted to living among humans, and have become a nuisance for residents trying to grow a small backyard garden. One local resident observed a couple of deer feeding in his strawberry patch. As the local back yard gardens start to grow, the deer will sure be back to feed on the fresh young plants.

Keeping deer out of a garden is not easy, and even an eight or ten foot fence will not deter them from jumping over them to feed on the fresh vegetation.

Trout fishing remains strong on local lakes and ponds & bass fishing can not get much better. One of the valleys hot spots is Lackey Pond in Sutton and Whitinsville. Sense the restoration of the Dam a number of years ago, large-mouth bass populations have exploded and it is common to catch a four-pound bass daily at the site. One angler also caught a calico bass and a pickerel at the site. Because the river was heavily polluted back in the '50's -'70's, it is not recommended eating the fish from the area. Catch & release should be practiced. There is a small boat ramp at the dam, that is accessible to small boats, canoes & kayaks. Small motors are allowed. Give it a try.

Stripers are starting to show in big numbers in both Mass. & Rhode Island. Fluke fishing is also picking up along with some impressive seabass.

## Healthy BBQ Tips

It's officially BBQ Season and this time of year grilled suppers make for highly anticipated outdoor meal-times - and the excitement applies even if you've vowed to eat healthy! All it takes is a little creativity to re-vamp traditional barbecue foods into healthier offerings.

Read on prep ideas, recipes, and culinary tips sure to make grilling not only healthy, but the best of the season! \*\*\*

The most simple and cost effective way to ramp up the flavor of healthy cuts of meats, fish and poultry is to prep grilling foods to boost optimum flavor. Below are some pre-cooking strategies that add a healthy dose of deliciousness!

\*Brine: Lean cuts of meat don't have to translate into less taste! Preparing meat and poultry with a brine preparation plumps up the foods while infusing tons of flavor. Brining, which is basically a salt water bath, can elevate dry, lean cuts to rich gourmet status. While many types of brine employ large doses of salt and sugar, the following recipe from Cooks Illustrated "Basics of Brining" offers a

healthier alternative. This brine recipe is ideal for high heat grilling:

Use one quart cold water per pound of food. Add two tablespoons table salt or three tbs Morton Kosher salt, and two tablespoons sugar. Meat or poultry should brine (refrigerated) in the solution for one hour per pound, but not less than a half hour or more than eight hours.

Note: The addition of garlic cloves, peppercorns, herbs, and/or citrus peel offer additional flavor without added fat or calories.

\*Marinade: Marinades are typically comprised of an acid, oil and spices. Marinating lean cuts of meat not only adds flavor, but the acids serve as a natural meat tenderizer. In addition, it's been proven marinade helps protect meat from cancer causing compounds caused by cooking at high heat (HCAs) and by smoking fat drippings (PAH).

Sans the sugar and light on salt, this mustard based marinade rivals the best of them: Mix together two cloves garlic, crushed; one cup balsamic vinegar; 1/2 cup Dijon or other dark, quality mustard; 1/4 cup virgin olive oil; 1/2 teaspoon pepper; 1/4 teaspoon sea salt. Marinade for an hour or more in the refrigerator.

Note: Overnight marinating can reduce cooking time by up to 35%!

\*Spice Rub: With a high flavor factor and low carb and calorie count, spice rubs are healthy, delicious alternatives to rich meat sauces. Both nov-

ice and veteran grillers often experiment with herbs to develop a "signature" all purpose rub that can be used with a variety of meats and poultry. This basic all purpose rub (for beef, pork, poultry or fish) uses common pantry spices: Mix together 3/4 cup paprika; 1/4 cup freshly ground black pepper; 1/4 cup coarse salt; 1/4 cup sugar; 2 tablespoons each chili powder, garlic powder, and onion powder; two teaspoons cayenne pepper. Rub dry spice mixture generously on meat before grilling.

Note: This recipe makes two cups and can be adjusted for smaller portions. \*\*\*

No Sugar Added Barbeque Sauce Recipe

This quick and easy barbeque sauce delivers huge taste without the sugar and preservatives in most commercial brands.

Ingredients: one tbsp butter; one cup onion, diced; one tbsp soy sauce; three garlic cloves minced; one tsp cumin; one tsp dry mustard; one tbsp chili powder; one tsp Italian seasoning; one 6 oz can tomato paste (use sugar free if available); 1.5 cups beef or chicken stock; 2 tbs apple cider vinegar; 1 packet (to taste) of Stevia sweetener.

Directions: Sauté onion in butter. Add all other ingredients. Bring to a boil and simmer for 15-20 minutes, until sauce thickens. \*\*\*

The following culinary tips cut calories, not flavor!

\*Always trim fat off steaks and chops before grilling. Use a brine or marinade to ensure a moist and flavorful cut (see recipes above).

\*Substitute a slathering of fresh avocado for cheese and/or mayo on a grilled turkey burger.

\*Marinate large slices of summer squash, zucchini, peppers, eggplant and the like, and toss them on the grill for a tasty veggie medley.

\*Spice up all your grilled foods without adding calories, fat or sodium with this no salt spice recipe from Dr. Oz: Mix together 1/3 cup each garlic powder, onion powder, and oregano; 2 tsp thyme; 1 tsp parsley flakes; 1 tsp ground pepper

\*Grilled fruits are a scrumptious, diet-friendly dessert as they are. Or, top the caramelized fruit with scoop of sorbet or sugar free ice cream. Firm fruits such as pineapples, apples and pears are best fruits for grilling; bananas, peaches and mangos also work well but need extra attention to prevent them from becoming mushy. To keep fruits from drying out, cut fruit in half (remove any seeds but leave skin on to keep its shape) and soak in cold water with a little lemon juice for 15-30 minutes before grilling. Spray a clean grate with non stick cooking oil to prevent sticking. \*\*\*

Fun Fact: Did you ever wonder where the word "barbecue" comes from? The origin has an

intriguing explanation. Some sources claim it comes from the French phrase "barbe a queue" which translates into "from whiskers to tail." The reference recalls the longtime tradition of cooking an animal on an open fire, thus roasting the entire carcass from whiskers to tail!

## Northern Rhode Island power plant

To the Editor:

In light of the recent post-hearing memorandum with the Energy Facility Siting Board (EFSB) on the matter of Invenergy's "biohazardous" energy plant beginning construction and operation, the call to action is clearer than ever. Such a large (1,000 watt) power plant can only have remarkably negative impacts on the rural towns and surrounding water sources.

Foremost, the town of Burrillville is already home to a large - over 500 watt - power plant which the individuals at ISO New England have determined is more than supplemental for the power required to be generated for surrounding areas. More importantly, the effect of such a large power plant on the ecosystem of countless animals in over 26 conservation lands, 20 bodies of water, and 25 state recreation areas which would surround the plant. In addition to displacing over 160 wildlife species,

two of which are endangered, and annihilating dozens of local ecosystems, the power plant would also emit at least 52 known pollutants into the atmosphere, including 3.6 tons of CO2 and three tons of formal hazardous pollutants. Not to mention the added traffic that would consequently occur as a result of necessary frequent deliveries of diesel and ammonia.

The town has had difficulty combatting the highly funded and highly equipped Invenergy lawyers who seem un-credible and ignorant to statements and clear display of analytics by third parties and towns. At this point, with such legal action already having taken place, the best way to take action is to voice our opinion not only in local town meetings, but to U.S. representatives and even local governor Gina Raimondo, who proposed the plant.

That email that just irked you...  
The text that made you see red and hit "reply" almost before you realized you'd done it...  
The stupid, hurtful or thoughtless remark someone tossed your way in a conversation that made you instantly upset...  
These things require an immediate response, don't they? Are we supposed to let someone email/text/say things like that and not react to them??  
Maybe not. Maybe there is value in not replying right away. It goes against what our "instant" 21st century lifestyle professes, which is that fastest is best: fastest Internet speed; fastest-moving line at the grocery store; fastest roller coaster; quickest and best comeback remark. It's all about being instantaneous.  
But perhaps we need to learn to practice the pause...the deliberate rest before reacting. An angry emailed reply can't be un-sent, and the contents can't be un-viewed. Same for a hastily-sent text, or an equally bitter comment tossed back to the person who insulted you first. It's not about not defending ourselves, or about letting things roll off our backs. It's about waiting to react.  
There's a very convincing school of thought that counsels sleeping on any big decision before making it. That can apply to small things too. The email from a coworker or client that rubbed you the wrong way might look a little different by the next morning. Maybe there was no harm meant, and you interpreted it wrong. Maybe it was an unfair complaint or personal remark against you, but in waiting to reply, you strengthen your position as the more even-tempered and reasonable person. Perhaps the sender of the nasty text also had time to reconsider, and now has the chance to apologize. In pausing before reacting, you allow those possibilities to happen.  
While reacting hastily and immediately can feel great at the time, it can't be undone. Waiting a while – sleeping on it – can never hurt.  
Never react because you think you must. Other than breathing, just about anything can wait one day.

The recent decision to move forward with building the Lasell Turf Field is something that today seems very promising and exciting; however, in a few years from now, that may be far from the case.  
Although adults do use the fields in town, there is an overwhelming majority of children using the fields here in the town of Northbridge. Through recent discoveries over the years, there are an increasingly immense amount of negative side effects for children playing on turf fields. The Biocides (basically a poison or pesticide) are on turf field and can actually lead to a handful of illness that although minor to adults could harm children with sickness such as pneumonia. In addition to the hazardous products being used in the turf, it's also super hot! The community of Northbridge should have taken into consideration whether or not getting a turf field was really a good decision to put their funds into. The grass fields have been used for many years and Northbridge has survived, this is not to say that when it rains or when natural weather occurs it is very inconvenient and unsafe to play on the fields. Installing a turf field is a quick and easy way to solve the problem. But, I think that from the hundreds of books and movies that have been made over the years the point that taking shortcuts almost always has its consequences will reign true in this situation.


The path an individual chooses to take later in life is heavily dependent on the manner in which he/she was nurtured as a child. It should be most concerning—yet not unbeknownst—that today's youth are being raised in a community that has allowed the "un-classy" stench of marijuana to waft through it. This problem is quite literally on many of our doorsteps.  
Caroline Frankel, the "woman in her basement with a laptop, a book of regulations and her dreams," recently opened Massachusetts' first female-owned small-business marijuana retailer in Uxbridge. Caroline's Cannabis is now contributing to the steady decline of this community. Based on data compiled from 2009 to 2014 by the National Surveys on Drug Use and Health, about 12.5 percent of children lived in a household whose parents suffered from substance abuse. Between 2007 and 2009, there was a 37 percent increase in the percentage of teenagers who said marijuana is easi-

er to buy than cigarettes. A shocking 40 percent of teens can get marijuana within a day; roughly 25 percent can gain access to it within an hour. Furthermore, teens whose parents are nonchalant about marijuana are nearly twice as likely to partake, compared to teens whose parents are more conservative about marijuana usage. Not only is marijuana accessible, it is also readily available, courtesy of our local dispensary.

The focus of this community should be providing a healthy environment in which children may flourish. Rather than strive towards such, Caroline's Cannabis has been allowed to pollute the area in which the future of the community is expected to mature. It is often said, "protect the earth for our children," but we often fail to protect our children from the dangers of this earth.

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

## Key double play keeps Rockets in lead, who then pull away from Northbridge

NORTHBRIDGE — Clinging to a 2-1 lead in the bottom of the fourth inning, Auburn High varsity baseball head coach Eric Swedberg headed toward the mound and gave the ball to Ethan Leonard, a crafty lefty. Leonard took over as Northbridge High had loaded the bases with one out. The momentum in the game — played Wednesday, May 29 at Northbridge Middle School — could have shifted drastically in the Rams' favor, but one pitch was all it took for it to remain with the Rockets.

Leonard's first pitch to Caleb Visbeek bounced right back to him. Leonard then threw home to catcher Colin Fitzgerald, who tagged the plate for the force out. Fitzgerald then threw to first baseman Evan Bond to complete the important double play.

Auburn then scored the game's final four runs to win, 6-1.

"They made that double play, which was the momentum shift," explained Northbridge head coach Keith Verra. "It went from 2-1, and maybe we could take the lead or tie it, to 5-1 [in the next half-inning]."

"Huge," Swedberg said of the double play. "And then we got a couple runs and it changes their approach at the plate and [Leonard] can pitch to contact."

After a scoreless first inning, the Rockets got on the board with a run in the top of the second when Joe Clougherty hit an RBI double to left field. Visbeek dove for the ball in the outfield in hopes of catching the third out, but when it got away Auburn's Nolan Kennedy (who had singled) got on his horse and scored.

The Rockets made it 2-0 in the third when Bond's single evaded the center fielder and allowed Coleman Picard (2-for-3) to scamper home.

"We got the two on miscues," Swedberg said of the two runs. "We just took advantage of some of their mistakes."

Northbridge then made it 2-1 in the fourth when Matt Ceruti drew a bases loaded walk, but the Rams left the inning scratching their heads when that was all they could muster.

Auburn's three-run fifth was the result of a throwing error that scored a run, a Bond sacrifice fly and a double steal that saw Brett Sullivan go to second base and Fitzgerald (2-for-4) score from third.

The Rockets added a single run in the sixth (on a Mike Breen, who was 3-for-4, RBI triple to right field) to account for the final score.

Sam Stencil got the start on the mound for the Rockets and he went the first three innings, allowing just one hit and one walk with two strikeouts. His twin brother, Alex, took over in the fourth and recorded an out with a hit and two walks.

"Sam was a little sore today, but he still wanted to start," Swedberg said of the playing-through-pain start. "His twin is Alex and he started the fourth...didn't get any help defensively."

Alex Stencil's run allowed was unearned, and then Leonard tossed the final 3-2/3 innings and didn't allow a hit. He walked one and struck out one.

Auburn improved to 13-5 with the win and finished their regular season at 14-6.

"I'm actually really happy because our roster doesn't look anything like what we thought it would look like," Swedberg said of injuries taking a toll — although not in the win department — for the Rockets.

Northbridge, meanwhile, saw quality pitching from starter Brad Richer (4-2/3 innings) and reliever Mason Consigli (2-1/3 innings). For Richer, it was his first start in multiple weeks. He allowed five runs (one earned) on nine hits to go with five strikeouts and a walk.


"Really good to see Brad Richer on the mound," Verra said. "He had some shoulder inflammation and the doctor shut him down. He pitched great."

The loss dropped the Rams to 9-10.


"They just made the Tournament one game earlier," Verra noted, as the final game at Shrewsbury High on Sunday, June 2 was a de facto playoff game to get into the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament. The Rams lost that contest, though, and finished with a record of 9-11 and a game shy of qualifying for Districts.




Mat Remillard of Northbridge sees a fly ball into his glove in center field for an out.

UPTON — The Shepherd Hill Regional varsity softball team pounded out 14 hits — six for extra bases, including a pair of home runs — and dropped Blackstone Valley Tech (BVT) from the ranks of the undefeated, beating the Beavers, 14-9, on Friday, May 31.

With the win the Central Mass. Division 1 Tournament-bound Rams improved to 14-5. The loss for BVT, in its final regular-season game, was the first of the season. The 19-1 Beavers will enter the Central Mass. Division 2 Tournament as one of the top seeds.

Shepherd Hill led, 3-2, after the first inning, 6-2 after the second, 7-2 after the third, 8-2 after the fourth and 13-2 heading into the bottom of the fifth inning.

"We've been hitting the ball really well lately. We got some runs early and then held on for dear life," Rams' head coach John Snyder said, alluding to the fact that the Beavers scored seven runs in the final three innings. "That's a good team. They were undefeated for a reason. They can hit the ball. They put a lot of pressure on our defense and we didn't react the way we wanted to at times, but we made the plays when we had to."

Shepherd Hill's offensive attack was led by junior Parker Filo-Loos, who had four hits, including a double, and three RBI. Cayley Fagan also had four hits, including a triple, and an RBI. Sophomore Sam Zannotti was 3-for-5 with a double and a home run, while junior Kelly Cournoyer was 2-for-3 with a bases loaded double (three RBI) and two walks. Junior Kiley Wong-Li also homered in the game.

"Parker is continuing to hit really well; she's been a hitting machine the last four or five games," Snyder said. "Kelly is having a great year at the plate, too."

Cournoyer's fifth-inning bases clearing double to center field put the Rams ahead, 13-2.

"Hitting is infectious and I think our bench has a lot to do with it. Everyone was really rallying together and getting hits and that momentum carried through to me and allowed me to get my hit, too," Cournoyer said. "Our bench is great. Once the first person gets a hit we all get rowdy and then the second person gets a hit and we get louder and it makes you want to do anything you can to help your team."

"I feel the way the bench is cheering me on definitely gives me more confi-

dence and more focus when I'm at the plate," Cournoyer added. "We knew they were a good team and that we needed to hit to have a chance and we were able to hit today."

In addition to her solid day at the plate, Fagan was gritty and gutsy facing an explosive BVT lineup. The senior was up to the task, however, recording five strikeouts, two coming in the seventh inning to close out the game.

"Coming in knowing they were 19-0 was definitely intimidating, especially because they pound the ball; they have girls that can really hit," Fagan said. "My defense made a lot of plays behind me. Playing a team like that, that's coming in undefeated, makes us want to win more. I played with some of these girls in travel ball so I knew how well they could hit and I knew I would have to stay around the plate and try not to throw anything down the middle."

The Beavers, who finished with 11 hits, were led by senior Alyssa Clark, who singled, homered and drove in four runs. Also having two-hit games were freshman Emma Ballard, sophomore Abby Behrikis and senior Megan Metzger, who doubled and tripled. Behrikis and junior Hallie Arpin each drove in two runs.

"We didn't play well early. We made four errors in the first two innings. You can't win like that," BVT head coach Peter Cardoza said. "It was an uncharacteristic start to the game for us and the hole was too big for us to dig out of. We'll be fine going forward."

While the loss was disappointing, to be sure, Cardoza said he believed it won't have any effect on the Beavers' chances to win the Division 2 title.

"This game, in the end, is meaningless," Cardoza said. "It won't affect our seeding. We're the only team in Division 2 with one loss. Everyone else has two or more. This won't affect anything; it's a meaningless game. If we're going to play bad, this is a good game to do so to get it out of our system. We haven't played poorly all year. It's tough to go through a whole season without having a bad game. And, in the end, we still battled back, we still scored a bunch of runs."

AUBURN — Welcome back, Izzy Therrien.

Therrien, the shortstop and leadoff hitter for the Auburn High varsity softball team, returned to the Rockets' lineup with a bang on Saturday, June 1, going 4-for-5 with two long home runs, a double and five RBI. The sophomore's efforts helped lead Auburn past Uxbridge High, 16-7, and into the Central Mass. Division 2 Tournament.

Therrien was out of the Auburn lineup for a week after suffering an elbow injury.

"Izzy played awesome," Rockets' head coach Sandy Lavallee said. "She is doing phenomenal. She makes us a different team. Last year she was our catcher and did a great job and this year we moved her to shortstop and she is just doing her thing. She was pretty much the star of the game today."

Therrien showed the Memorial Field crowd of 200 that she was back and, if not 100 percent, very close to it, leading off the bottom of the first inning with a double off the third base bag. Therrien came around to score later in the inning to give 10-10 Auburn a 1-0 lead on a sacrifice fly by Ava Novakoski.

In the bottom of the second inning Therrien clubbed a three-run, no-doubt-about-it home run over the left field fence to push the Rockets' lead to 5-0. In the bottom of the fourth inning she singled to the gap in left-center field and came around to score as Auburn pushed its lead to 13-3 after four innings.

In the bottom of the

sixth inning Therrien hit her second home run of the game, this one a two-run shot, again easily over the fence in left, to push the Rockets' lead to 16-6 at that point.

"It's great to be back. When the injury happened we were all devastated and expected the worst," the always-smiling Therrien said. "So, to be able to come back, especially on Senior Night, it meant a lot. I really wanted to come out and play hard for my senior teammates. This win is huge; we needed it to make Districts, but we really wanted to win it for our seniors."

Therrien was pleased she was able to make quick work of any lingering post-injury nervousness.

"In a situation like this you have your coming-back jitters, sure, but when you get to the plate you feel at home," Therrien said. "That first-inning double was huge. It felt good to be right back in the swing of things and knew I was OK. That double got me going."

Therrien might have been Auburn's No. 1 star of the game against Uxbridge, but she was by no means the only one. Junior Makena Mulcahy, also playing her first game after missing a week due to injury, went 3-for-4 with two RBI and freshman Paige Stewart was 3-for-3 with a walk and an RBI.

In addition, senior Emily Wambach singled, doubled and drove in two runs for the Rockets and Novakoski collected two hits as well.

Leading the offensive attack for 5-15 Uxbridge was senior Maggie

Streichert, who was 3-for-4 with a double, two RBI and three runs scored, and classmate Erika Dube, who was also 3-for-4 with two RBI and two runs scored. Junior Sydney Norberg singled, doubled and drove in a run, and sophomore Ashley Dube collected a pair of singles.

"There was no District berth on the line for us, we were just playing for pride and I thought the kids played hard," Uxbridge head coach Jeff LaCure said. "That's what we do. What we don't have in talent we make up for in heart and effort. They're just great kids; what a treat it was to be around them all year."

LaCure, who has a doctor of psychology degree, just finished his first year as the Spartans' head coach. He spent the previous two years coaching softball at Ludlow High in Western Mass., and before that coached at Millbury.

"I love being back in the SWCL," said LaCure, who thinks his team may have achieved a goal this season that was more important than qualifying for the postseason. "We had the potential to be a tournament team but we had injuries and some other things we had to deal with throughout the season. But, what these kids talked about in our final meeting [after the game] was that we were a softball family. That this was the place they could come to every day and practice and play games and forget about everything else. So, in many ways we accomplished more goals than maybe we even hoped to."



If your travel plans take you to Cape Cod, there are many options for antique shopping. The Cape Cod Antique Dealers Association ([www.ccada.com](http://www.ccada.com)) is holding two antique shows this month. The Seventh Annual Orleans Historical Society Antique Show takes place on Saturday, June 15 at the Orleans Historical Society. The 45th Annual Brewster Historical Society Drummer Boy Open Air Antiques Fair will be held on Saturday, June 22 at Drummer Boy Park.

There are plenty of antique shops on the Cape. The website [vacation-capecode.com](http://vacation-capecode.com) states that there are over 50 antique shops on "the Old King's Highway" between Sandwich and Orleans. There are many others on Route 28, and elsewhere on Cape Cod. Some of the larger antique shops are "Antiques Center of Cape Cod" in Dennis, the "Antiques Center of Yarmouth" on Route 28, and the "Sandwich Antiques Center" on 6A.

There are many old houses on the Cape and some great buys sometimes turn up at estate and yard sales. You can find local Cape Cod estate sales on [estatesales.net](http://estatesales.net) and [estatesales.com](http://estatesales.com). The Cape Cod Times also lists estate sales, yard sales, and garage sales in the newspaper and online. There were 36 listings for "garage sales" in the Cape Cod Times for the weekend of June 1 and June 2. During the summer, I would expect you'd see even more sales listed.

There are also some flea markets on the Cape where you can find antiques and vintage items. The Wellfleet Flea

Their Web site says they are open Wednesday from 6 a.m. to noon and Sunday from 7 a.m. to noon.

There are also two auction houses that have been in business for many years on the Cape. Eldred's ([www.eldreds.com](http://www.eldreds.com)) is located on Route 6A in East Dennis. The Sandwich Auction House ([www.sandwichauctions.com](http://www.sandwichauctions.com)) is on 15 Tupper Road in Sandwich. Both run auctions throughout the summer. With so many antique options on Cape Cod, a rainy vacation day may not be such a bad thing.

Many people prefer to vacation in other parts of New England. I'll offer suggestions on antiquing in other parts of New England in a future column.

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

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


