
Malone says, "I have the energy to stand up for the issues" and getting more funding for schools and to clean up the water supply are on the top of the list.

Northbridge High School part of Follette Challenge

Northbridge High School's NASA Innovative Conceptual Engineering Design Challenge program entered a \$200,000 national education contest hoping for a chance at one of the 13 prizes awarded to recognize the most unique and inventive K-12 program. In addition to completing an online application for the annual Follett Challenge, Northbridge High School also submitted a short video to promote its program that teaches students the 21st century skills they need to be prepared for life.

Ten of the prizes, valued at \$8,000 each, to be given away are from the People's Choice category and will solely be based on how many votes applicants have received for their videos from the public. Video voting began January 22. The NASA ICED Epic Challenge video is now posted on the Follett Challenge www.ionettchanenge.

After registering, users could cast one vote per day through January 26, when voting ended. Not only were the public's votes significant in the video-voting portion of the contest, but they would also play a role in the overall rubric, as twenty-percent of each school's final score

is based on the number of votes generated for their video.

"We hoped our community would support us by viewing our NASA ICED Epic Challenge program video and voting for our submission," said William Bishop, principal. "Participating in the Follett Challenge recognizes Mr. James Gorman and Mrs. Christine Cote for the great job they are doing with the limited resources they have and, should we win, reward them with resources to do more. It also will give our educators here a platform to share their innovation with other schools across the country and throughout the world."

With a total prize value of \$200,000 in products and services from Follett - a global education solutions leader - the overall winner will earn a \$60,000 prize, plus a celebration at the school, while each of the other two semi-iinalists will earn \$30,000 prizes. The 10 People's Choice awards are worth \$8,000 each in products and services and will be announced Feb. 28, along with the semi-finalists. This year's Follett Challenge will honor semi-finalist winners in four categories: elementary, middle and high school.

Oxford fire highlights woodstove safety

A couple weeks ago, fire crews from several area towns responded to a Sacarrappa Road, Oxford, fire that killed an elderly woman. Shortly thereafter, the Fire Marshal's investigation found the cause to be the wood stove used for

heat. While that doesn't happen

too often, state data from 2016 shows wood stoves, chimneys and fireplaces caused 565 fires. Most of them were due to builtup creosote in the chimney.

We ultimately don't have many problems with wood stoves as long as people clean the chimney and take care of them," said Auburn Deputy Chief Glenn Johnson. "You should inspect the chimney

and stove each time before you burn" and clean them thoroughly at least once a year.

Often, he added, the problem comes from using types of wood that aren't recommended. Although it's common and fairly cheap, pine is the key issue; burning pine creates creosote in large quantities. The hardwoods like oak do as well, but are safe if properly aged (a

year or more is recommended), while they're potentially dangerous when "green" (newly-cut).

According to the Nationwide Insurance website, the real risk is when "a modern, airtight stove [is] damped way down, produc[ing] a flue temperature in the 100-200° Fahrenheit range," as is common when people want to keep the stove

running at night. "These comparatively low temperatures do not sufficiently carry all of the noncombustible gases into the atmosphere. Instead, they condense long the walls of the stovepipe and chimney as creosote," which is itself highly

flammable. Sometimes, issues occur

and he knows first hand how great it could be. He says that Uxbridge has some of the highest graduation rates in the state, but the town does not have enough funding to be one of the best to

Most importantly, Malone wants to fix the pollution in the Blackstone River and the water supply in the towns he would be representing.

The most important issues for each town are schools and environment. Specifically, in Uxbridge, Malone states that something needs to be done about the high water bills residents are forced to pay. He is also worried about the quality of the water, and wants to get funding to replace water and sewer lines. He believes commercial development is the way to bring in jobs and, frankly, tax money into the communi-

Similarly, Millville and Blackstone are facing the same issues. The water and sewer lines are in dire need of repair, and Malone wants to promote commercial development. Blackstone's roads are so poorly kept that residents of the town have gotten flat tires from driving over potholes, and trucks have lost parts of their body due to road conditions. Malone plans to get funding to fix the infrastructure of the towns.

In Bellingham, Malone wants to clean up the Blackstone River as there is an incredibly high rate of chemicals in the water supply, specifically total trihalomethanes. These chemicals have been shown to cause cancer and other issues.

Malone grew up in Uxbridge, and has friends and family through the towns he will be representing. He believes that his youth will be a positive for him and help him create a constituency. Malone has a group called Millennials for Malone on Facebook. He wants to get the next generation out voting, and he wants them to have their voice

heard. "It's our time to get involved in politics" Malone says.

When asked why he chose to start with such a huge role, Malone states that he believes "our community is intertwined with state legislature.

Again, his youth is something he believes will help him in his campaign, because he has the energy to keep up with the fast pace of Beacon Hill. He believes this area is underrepresented in the state, and his candidacy will change that.

Malone's closing statement is "I'm ready to work hard for the people of this district," and he plans on knocking on thousands of doors to spread his message. His biggest inspirations have been his parents who "have always brought me up with a good work ethic," and Mr. Art Dubois, who has been a huge supporter of Malone's campaign. and a voice in Uxbridge politics.



Gifts from loved ones serving in the armed forces

Members of the military may be serving half way across the world from their families, but their families are often on their minds. Many send gifts to family members back home to let them know they are thinking of them.

During the 18th and 19th century, many of the sailors were whalers or worked on merchant ships but there were also military personnel on the high seas. During their free time, sailors carved scrimshaw, typically using whales' teeth or walruses' tusks. Britannica states that examples date back to the 17th century. The craft peaked from 1830-50. Along with the impressive works depict-

ing ships in battle and other nautical and historical scenes, there were many smaller functional pieces that were carved. Scrimshaw.com lists pie crimpers, thimbles and corn huskers as some of the more common items made from scrimshaw. They could be gifted when the sailors returned home. Prices for large pieces have sold for tens of thousands of dollars. New regulations to protect selling illegal elephant and rhino ivory may impact older scrimshaw sales and prices.

Love tokens are coins that have been engraved and were often given to a loved one. Others engraved these coins, but sailors with free time at sea were some of the practitioners of this art. An article by Robyn Einhorn on the Smithsonian website states that the practice may have started in 13th cen-

tury England with the bending of coins. A bent coin was returned after a favor and the bent coin became a "token of your pledge" when you offered something in return for the favor. I typically see love tokens carved into mid to late 19th century coins. I've seen engraving range from peoples' initials and simple drawings to highly detailed engravings of ships. Some are single coins, but several of them can be used to create a bracelet or other pieces of jewelry. We sold a love token bracelet with several intricately engraved

dimes that brought over \$500. Soldiers on land also created works of art during their free time and created trench art. Trench art was made by those serving in earlier wars, but World War I seems to be the peak of the artform. Artillery shell casings and smaller shell casings were often used to craft these pieces. A hammer and

nail were often the tools to create these works. The large artillery shells were sometimes turned into vases. Many had intricate designs of animals and flowers. Others were crafted to look like tanks or cannons. Some pieces of trench art are worth hundreds of dollars. During World War II and more recent

wars, military personnel would often buy pieces to send home or deliver to loved ones when they returned. Satin pillow cases were sold at many of the



military bases. Many had "mother", "sweetheart" or "sister" printed on them for their intended recipients. "Sweetheart pins" were other gift items that were purchased by armed forces personnel. Some pins were produced in mother of pearl and some in 10 karat gold, but for the most part, they were made from relatively inexpensive materials. They may sometimes be found in flea markets and antique shops at very reasonable prices. We sold some small cases of sweetheart pins in our January auction, with cases selling in the \$300

range.

from where the stove itself is placed. State building codes define how far one has to be from the wall, floor and other surfaces, and flammable materials like paper need to be kept as far from one as possible, since the radiant heat can ignite them under some circumstances. The construction of the chimney is an

important factor.

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'Never, under any circumstances, should an unlined, single-brick chimney be used for a wood stove" because they're "prone to deterioration," Nationwide states. A double-layer brick chimney can be used "after checking carefully for cracked mortar or loose or missing bricks," and metal chimney sleeves (layers inserted in the brick chimney) can be used if they're designed specifically for wood stoves, the site states.

In 1980, the do-it-yourself classic Mother Earth News ran a long piece on wood stove safety, most of which is still valid today. Its editors (unnamed) note a key factor is selecting the right size of stove for the space you're trying to heat. Both "overheated" – a too-small stove forced to run beyond its limits - and


"underfired" stoves can pose hazards.

"It is possible for an overheated firebox to ignite walls or other flammable materials that are beyond the 'safe' perimeter. (Did you know, for example, that sustained temperatures of slightly over 200F can actually cause wood to combust spontaneously?)," it states. For the large stoves, owners often try to reduce heat using the damper "a technique that reduces efficiency, makes more smoke and forms creosote rapid-

Johnson noted wood stove owners

need to make sure all of their stove parts are in good condition. If "anything abnormal" exists - corrosion holes, damage to cast iron parts, discoloration – that could indicate a dangerous situation. Additionally, he said, every homeowner (woodstove or otherwise) should make sure carbon monoxide, smoke detectors and fire extinguishers are working properly.

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
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December Existing Home Sales Dropped

Nationally existing home sales dropped 3.6% to 5.57 million from November to December but increased by

1.1% year over year. This is not a sign of the economy weakening. It is exactly the opposite. The lack of inventory is causing a lowering of home sales. The sale in 2017were up 1.1% as well over 2016. This continues to show us that the Real Estate Market is alive and well. In Worcester County, sales dropped by 5.8% from November to December to 710 sales. Then from December 2016 to December 2017 it increased by 3.2%. This shows

our local market is tracking with the national market in their trends.

There is one concern with this drop in sales in December. If the inventory is dropping causing buyers who are ready willing and able to not be able to find a home because the sellers of those homes fear selling their home because there is no inventory. Most likely what will happen is this lack of inventory and high demand will continue to increase prices which the Average Sale Price of a Single Family Home in Worcester County already went up \$16,150 or 5.5 % over the last 12 months. This will then cause sellers who could not sell or would not sell due to prices to decide to sell their homes. This will eventually increase the inventory and hopefully balance the market out.

I suggest consulting with a local Realtor to find out what the inventory looks like in

your area and how that will affect you purchase and sale of a home. Because in most markets, selling a home is the easy part and the most difficult part is deciding what to do once it sells as inventory of homes for sale as well as rental homes are minimal. Many sellers are deciding to either rent temporarily or live with family until they can find another home to





Put a trusted 'Quarterback' on your financial team

On February 4, the eyes of most of the country - and much of the rest of the world – will be on Minneapolis, site of the most-watched football game in the U.S. As a fan, you can admire the way quarterbacks in the Big Game direct their teams. But as an investor, you can learn something from the big game by putting together your own team

to help you achieve your financial goals - and you may find it helpful to have your own "quarterback."

Who should be on your team? Your financial strategy will involve investments, taxes and estate planning, so you will likely need a financial advisor, a tax professional and an attorney. Ideally, your financial advisor – the individual with the broadest view of your financial situation - should serve as the quarterback of this team. And, just as a quarterback on a football team must communicate clearly with his teammmates, so will your financial quarterback need to maintain consistent contact with the other team members.

Let's look at a couple of basic examples as to how this communication might work.

First, suppose you are self-employed and contribute to a Simplified Employee Pension (SEP) IRA. Because your contributions are made with pre-tax dollars, the more you put in, the lower your taxable income. (In 2018, the maximum amount you can contribute is \$55,000.) Your financial advisor can recommend investments you can choose from to help fund your SEP IRA. Yet you will want your financial advisor to share all your SEP IRA information with your tax professional. When it's near tax-filing time, your tax professional can then let you and your financial advisor know how much room you still have to contribute to your SEP IRA for the year, and how much you need to add to potentially push yourself into a lower tax bracket.

Now, let's consider the connection between your financial advisor and your attorney - specifically, your attorney handling your estate planning arrangements. It's essential that you and your financial advisor provide your attorney with a list of all your financial assets – IRAs, 401(k)s, investments held in brokerage accounts, insurance policies and so on. Your attorney will need this information when preparing your important legal documents, such as your will and living trust – after all, a key part of your estate plan is who gets what. But it's imperative that you and your financial advisor convey some often-overlooked details that can make a big difference in the disposition of your estate. For example, your financial advisor might suggest that you review the beneficiary designations on your IRA, 401(k) and life insurance policies to make sure these designations are still accurate in light of changes in your life – new spouse, new children and others. These designations are meaningful and can even supersede the instructions you might leave in your will or living trust. Consequently, it's important for you and your financial advisor to share this information with your attorney.

It can be challenging to meet all your financial objectives. But with the right team in place, and a quarterback to help lead it, you can keep moving toward those goals – and you might cut down on the "fumbles" along the way.

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
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Douglas runs well at DVC Championships, while Crusaders' Wiersma shines in shot put

NORTHBRIDGE The Douglas High girls' and boys' indoor track teams both turned in fine performances at the Dual Valley Conference League Championships. The girls, led by Jenna Keeman, Maureen Grady and Keely Mungeam, finished second with 64 points, while the boys, led by Alec Goldenberg, Matthew Brooks and Clark Bishop, finished fourth with 45 points.

Sutton High won both the girls' and boys' portions of the meet, held Tuesday, Jan. 23 at Northbridge High's Veterans Memorial Field House. The Suzies rolled up 124 points while the Sammies amassed 139.

On the individual side of the DVC championships, no first place performance was as awe-inspiring as the one turned in by Whitinsville Christian School senior Tatiana Wiersma, who won the shot put with a heave of 31 feet, 3-1/2 inches.

Before getting to Wiersma, here is a recap of the team competition.

Wins by members of the Tigers girls' team were turned in by Grady in the 50-yard dash, in 6.52 seconds, Keeman in the high jump (5-feet) and the 4-by-200 meter relay team of Grady, Keeman, Taylor Catlin and Leah Haire (1:59.83). The 4-by-400-meter relay team finished third, as did Mungeam in the two mile (12:42.36). Keeman also finished third in the 300 (47.32), while Mungeam was fourth in the 1,000 (3:33.88).

On the boys' side for Douglas, Goldenberg won the 300 (38.63) and the 600 (1:34.74), Brooks won the shot put (40-10) and Bishop was third in the two-mile (10:46.70) and fourth in the 1,000 (3:00.98).

'We had some ups and downs but overall everybody placed about where we thought they were going to place," Douglas head coach Jeff Thayer said. "We had a few double winners — Alec, Maureen and Jenna that was nice to see. The team is performing well right now. We have a lot of new runners this year, so we're kind of in a learning stage with a lot of them. Because of that, what we did today is tremendous.'

Also tremendous was the performance turned in by Whitinsville Christian's Wiersma in the shot put. It's not so much that she won the event, but that she did so less than four months after surgery to repair her right anterior cruciate ligament (ACL), which she tore playing soccer in the fall.

Because she is still recovering from surgery and at the time of the DVC Championship hadn't been fitted for a brace, Wiersma can only compete in the shot put from a standing position. She is unable to use the customary glide technique to generate speed and power through the circle prior to the throw.

Adapting to the standing throw from the glide is nothing new for





Wiersma, however. She had to do the same thing two years ago during the indoor season after she tore her left ACL while playing soccer.

"Good news, though," Wiersma said. "I talked to my surgeon [on Jan. 18] and I've been cleared to order my brace. Once I get my brace I'll be able to go back to my glide. Last spring I threw 38-6 with the glide. I'm hoping to get back to that and then improve on my distance."

While Wiersma downplayed throwing 31 feet and winning the shot put from the standing position, her coach, Karen

Berkowitz, did not.

"That's huge; 31 feet from the standing position? I can pretty much guarantee that no else is doing that. That's a good throw with a glide," Berkowitz said. "Tatiana's awesome; she is just an athlete, plain and simple. We knew that when she was in the seventh grade."

Wiersma said she decided to join the track team at the Whitinsville Christian School at the urging of her friend, Natalie Booz, who was a member of the team.

"Natalie suggested I try it; that I give it a shot. She said it was fun," Wiersma said. "I tried it and I loved it and I've been here ever since. I like being on a team; I like the environment of it. I have my own thing to focus on, but at the same time you're part of a team; you get to cheer everybody on and work together."

When not playing soccer, running track, being a member of the student council or playing the violin in the school orchestra, Wiersma like to get away with her father, Wayne, and go skiing.

"My dad and I have this goal to ski every moun-



OXFORD — Much has been made this season about the Northbridge High girls' varsity bas-ketball team's tenacious, ball-hawking defense, which is allowing the second fewest average of points per game -30.2 — in the Southern County Worcester League, and sixth fewest in all of Central Mass.

And that defense was again on display against Oxford High on Jan. 26, holding the Pirates to just 33 points in a 53-33 Rams' win. But it was the Northbridge offense, led by freshman Hannah Lomonaco's 14 points and senior Maria Cray's 10 that stole the show, finishing seven points above its season scoring average.

"We knew we were going to have our work cut out for ourselves going against their defense, but what impressed tonight was the way they played offensively," Oxford head coach Joe Pietrzak said. "They made a lot of shots.

Northbridge took control of the game early, opening with a 10-3 run in the game's first three minutes. Cray had four points in the quick start, on a lay-in and a put-back, and Lomonaco added a three-point play. Lomonaco scored on a slicing drive through the lane and was fouled on the play. She calm-ly stepped to the foul line and buried the free throw.

The Rams extended their lead to 20-7 after the first quarter. The team's more or less traded baskets in the second quarter and Northbridge led, 26-14, at halftime. The Rams' lead then grew to 19 points, 38-19, after three quarters.

"We stress distributing the ball; I don't want one person to be the key. If we have that, teams can focus on that. That's what we did tonight to them,' said Northbridge head coach Matt Gauthier, referring to Oxford junior Gina Parmenter, who finished with a game-high 19 points.

Parmenter, who surpassed the 1,000-point plateau Tuesday night (Jan. 23) on the road against Grafton High, was honored before the game with a brief ceremony.

"We are very bal-anced offensively," said Gauthier, who is in his eighth year of his second stint as the Northbridge girls' coach. "Honestly it can be any player on any night. It can be seniors: Maria did it tonight. We had a game earlier in the season where two of our freshmen scored nine points each. The most you might see for us on a give night is a 15- or 16-point performance.

"I'd rather have eight or nine or 10 people scoring," Gauthier continued. "If you're going to key on one of our players, we'll go to someone else. It actually adds a lot of confidence to the girls when they know they can score at any time during the game, and that they might be asked to do so to help the team win.'

Cray said she doesn't expect a ceremony to honor a 1,000-point scorer to happen any time soon at Northbridge High.

"We'll never have a 1,000 point scorer; we're not built that way. We definitely cannot be one dimensional," said Cray, the lone upperclassman on the team. "Coach always says, 'rebound. run and score.' It doesn't matter who it is. If you look at our box scores. one night I could have 20, and my teammates could have four, and the next night I could have four and my teammates have

to pick to focus on; I think that's one of our

strengths," Cray continued. "We share the ball so well we don't have one person scoring all of our points.'

"I'm very, very lucky to have my family with me tonight as well as on Tuesday night. As for Coach P., I can't thank him enough. He has got me to everywhere I want to go in life.

'Tonight's ceremony made me feel lucky to be a part of Oxford High," Parmenter added "It was awesome. I'm so glad I get to call Dr. [Kimberlee] Henry my principal."

Parmenter reached the 1,000-point mark in 55 games. She now has 1,029 points in 56 career games, which works out to a career average of

18.3 points per game. As a freshman Parmenter scored 367 points in 21 games (17.4 average). Last year, as a sophomore, she scored 388 points in 22 games (17.6). This year, through 13 games, she has scored 274 points

"To me the speed in which she got to 1,000 is what makes the accomplishment so impressive," Pietrzak said. "Getting to 1,000 is impressive enough, but to do it in two and a half seasons [55 games] just shows you how dynamic a scorer she can be, especially since after the first few games of her career, everybody knew about her. Everything she gets she has had to work real hard for."



Oxford stayed on its offensive roll to begin the third quarter, outscoring Northbridge 8-1 in the first four minutes to lead, 31-13, with four minutes left




