Continuing a conversation sparked in July, Selectman Bill Borowski readdressed citizen demands for improvements along the Main Street area and Route 31 during a Board of Selectmen meeting in late August. He reiterated that the need is certainly there and citizens and residents want to see a more user friendly center of town for foot

traffic. Borowski said the purpose of his bringing the matter to a Board of Selectmen meeting was to make sure that all departments are working in tandem towards a common goal.



continued from page 1 viceable mileage.

"The two years that I've been chief we've gotten three because we're trying to catch up. The fleet has been neglected for frankly twenty years. I'm just trying to get a serviceable number of cars in the rotation," Chief Maxfield said. "I really need four cars, but I'm only asking for three."

Maxfield said the vehicles do receive a lot of mileage as they are traded off between officers as they change shifts. Several vehicles have been taken out of service in recent years and are used for spare parts as needed. According to Maxfield at least one car currently in use has surpassed the 90,000 serviceable limit for police vehicles and another is quickly approaching that number.

"It's just a matter of maintaining. We generally have three or four cars out at a time. You put one down for service we don't have an extra sometimes, so the guys are forced to grab a detail car since it's all that's available in the lot." Chief Maxfield said. "We pretty much have the six and usually four of them are in use."

On the fire department side, Chief Chief Edward J. Knopf is seeking the purchase of a \$603,000 fire truck to replace a severely age vehicle that has become a safety hazard and does not meet current specifications set by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

"What it buys you is a new NFPA compliant fire engine for the town. It is in line to replace Engine 1, which is out of compliance. It is twenty-five years old. There's severe wear and tear on it. Every cycle they add on new safety measures and there's an issue with rollover stability, there's no seatbelt warning system in the vehicle, it doesn't have enough surface lighting to make the area around the vehicles safe for operations," Chief Knopf said.

The chief warned town officials that noncompliance would create a liability issue should the truck be involved in an incident of any kind. The new vehicle would be similar to the current Engine 1, but would come with a larger 1,250-gallon tank as opposed to the current 1,000-gallon tank.

Both proposals will be part of the town meeting warrant set for Tuesday,





Many of us had the same group of friends since we began kindergarten. There was comfort in knowing that no matter what happened during the day, that there would be this group of known people surrounding you to talk to, to play with and to count on.

Sadly, the story for all Massachusetts youth isn't the same. With over 9,600 children in state foster care, and over 3,400 awaiting an adoptive placement, they don't get to experience the ongoing camaraderie and support of lifelong friends. Foster care and adoptive placement sometimes means changing communities, schools and service providers. At the Massachusetts Adoption Resource Exchange (MARE),

engaged in the adoption process. The matching is based upon family strengths and children's needs; and while this is a very effective way to assure that youth, many of whom had early childhood trauma or neglect, get the best support possible, it also means that children may leave their home community.

MARE recognizes the additional strength that is gained by keeping connections to schools, communities and local resource providers. That is why they advocate for matching children with families in their home community whenever possible. To do this work, they tirelessly promote, educate and work with families from across the Commonwealth to make these vital connections.

"There is a continued need for adoptive family resources from across Massachusetts, but in the western part of the state the need is greater than ever.'

said Diane Tomaz, Director of Family Support Services for MARE. "We work hard to match children across many dimensions: physical, emotional, intellectual and other expressed needs. When it is beneficial, it really helps to maintain connections to resources that benefit both the child and the adoptive family, and we can add 'local community' to that list. We hope to encourage Western Massachusetts families to learn about the process and to ask 'could we be an adoptive resource?' It is only through education that we can dispel myths and help to build an awareness about the foster care adoption process."

In Western Massachusetts alone, there are currently 116 children with whom the agency is working with to match to a waiting family. The area is rich in resources, and many children benefit from this connection to area programming, school resources and other community services. MARE is asking for local, Western MA


families to learn more about what it means to be an adoptive parent to a waiting foster youth. While the process may not resonate with everyone, many are surprised to learn the facts about adoption from foster care and further learn about how long-held myths simply aren't true. For example, did you know that adoption from foster care doesn't have any fees or costs associated with it? Or, did you know that families receive financial assistance during the pre-adoptive placement, and that some families may be eligible to receive financial assistance, after the adoption is finalized? Consider that children in foster care receive health care benefits before and after adoption. Prospective adoptive parents can be almost any age (18+); single, partnered, married, LGBT-identified; homeowners or renters; experienced parents or new to parenting. Families of various income levels can adopt, as long as they have a stable source of income to support a child. Children

adopted from foster care are eligible for a tuition-waiver at Massachusetts state colleges and universities.

our infrastructure approach with at least a potential estimate and focus on the downtown area first and really leave it up to the voters. What I don't like to see happen is different groups working solo," Borowski said.

While the selectman's comments weren't accusatory, he did want to make sure that the highway department, selectmen and planning board were all on the same page.

As fate would have it, Charlton Planning Director Randy Benson discussed the Planning Board's efforts to would with the Central Massachusetts Regional Commission Planning (CMRPC) to utilize funding from the Massachusetts DOT's Complete Streets program to address such needs in the community and the Main Street area is on their radar.

"It's a three-tier program

where you have to first get committed by the Mass. DOT and determine where you would want to build new sidewalks. This program can be something as simple as a bus stop to a whole street corridor. They do have a funding limit of \$400,000. The Planning Board has gotten to tier three which we have a \$10,000 allocation right now that would pay for engineering, design and a cost estimate for the project then we'd apply to the Mass DOT for the funding," Benson said.

The question on hand now is where the public wants the focus to be and clearly Selectman Borowski's experience with citizens has given the Planning Board some direction. However, the board isn't closing the door to other potential priorities. In the end the public will indeed be a deciding factor in which part of town receives upgrades.

We discussed possibly going out into the village district. We are exploring some of our options and then bringing it to

the public to decide where they would like to see our resources spent in terms of sidewalk projects," Benson said.

Selectman Borowski called the situation "serendipitous," as Main Street is, in fact, in the village district of town.

With the next round of grant funding set for the year 2020 the town has time to decide how it would like to proceed. Benson said the town is in "a good position" to apply for the funding next year.

# Why do we like being scared?

"IT: Chapter Two" was released on September 6 around the country. Anyone familiar with Stephen King's horror novel, "IT," published in 1986, knows all about Pennywise and red In Lancaster, the Rialto Theatre had some fun on the eve of the release by placing red balloons on gutters throughout town. The balloons are what Pennywise the clown uses to lure in his victims — and to frighten those who would dare to oppose him.

When our Editor was in high school, an attempt to read the original novel which clocks in at a daunting 1,100 pages, give or take, depending on the edition in question — did not go so well. Being far too scared by the time we reached the third chapter, the book was closed and has been collecting dust since. As an avid reader of Dean Koontz, the thought of reading "IT" didn't seem so scary at first. Suffice it to say, lesson very humbly learned.

When the film now known as "IT Chapter One" was released in 2016, our Editor took another stab (pun very much intended) at the story, this time via motion picture. The morning following the fight, we embarked on a trip into downtown Bangor (which, incidentally, provided the inspiration for Derry, the fictional Maine town that serves as the backdrop for the events of "IT"). The interest to go and see Stephen King's home wasn't planned, it was more of a, 'since we're here' type of situation. The downtown area was quaint, and had less people than one would think on a Sunday, sunny morning. King's home was located just about a mile from the downtown

Anyone with any knowledge of the famous author could pick his house out right away. Red balloons celebrating the release of the new movie were seen swinging and bobbing from the tall black gates, with iron cobwebs and a bat at the top. Our first guess was that the balloons were placed by enthusiastic fans; however, a closer look and one will notice a red balloon inside the home, peeking from a window. Thank you, Stephen (or the home's caretakers), for playing along.

A conversation with the Editor in Chief for Salmon Press provided us with the knowledge that King was working as an Associate Professor of English at the University of Maine, barely making ends meet, when his wife rescued the manuscript for his first published novel, "Carrie," from the trash and sent it to Viking, his original publisher. The book became a phenomenon, and the rest, as the old saying goes, is history.

This left us pondering the question, Why do people like being scared? Human beings have been telling ghost stories around the campfire, jumping from cliffs for "the trill of it," or dar-ing one another to explore the decrepit house at the end of Main Street that's rumored to harbor restless spirits since the dawn of time, but why? ## Autumn Edibles Go from Décor to Table

Plump round pumpkins and tri colored Indian corn are sure signs autumn is here. While these harvest favorites are familiar sights at entry ways and front stoops, they are also edible! Speckled Indian Corn and seasonal pumpkins, from large Jack-O-Lanterns to squat pump-

kins, are favorite fare for the harvest table. Read on for suggestions to take them from décor to the dining table!

Pumpkins with Purpose: Jack-O-Lanterns are a Halloween tradition. Whether illuminated by old fashioned candles or flickering flameless lights, the carved pumpkins attract trick or treaters near and far to neighborhood doorsteps. Dark orange sugar pumpkins handily go from fall centerpiece to the dinner table. The solid, sweet orbs hold up nicely for displays both indoors and out, and in true frugal fashion, after they have served their time they can be enjoyed as dessert pies, creamy soups and holiday breads. It's no wonder harvest pumpkins have long remained an autumn wonder, prized for both their culinary and decorative virtues!

Perfect Picks: Keep in mind when initially choosing pumpkins that the variety you select should fit your need. For example, if you desire a pumpkin for pie, a medium sugar pumpkin, which is typically small and sweet with a dark orange color, is the best choice. For carving, look for well rounded pumpkins that have good color with stem intact. Pumpkins earmarked as Jack-O-Lanterns are usually larger and contain too many strings and seeds to be practical for pie making, but the seeds are



ideal for toasting. Take THE

Past: Pumpkins' Pumpkins boast a long history at the harvest table. Native Americans revered the pumpkin as a valuable source of food to carry them through the long, cold winters, teach-

ing early English settlers how to grow and prepare pumpkins, which became an important seasonal mainstay of the pioneer diet. The pilgrims utilized every part of the pumpkin, roasting the flesh, drying the seeds, making flour from dried pumpkin, and even weaving floor mats out of pumpkin skins, a method learned from the Native Americans. In New England, colonists made the first crustless pumpkin pies by cutting the top of the pumpkin, removing the seeds and filling it with apples, milk, sugar and spices and baking it whole.

Fresh Pumpkin Bisque: After your (still intact) sugar pumpkin has served its time as an autumn prop, why not serve it up on the dinner table? Here's an easy recipe for a rich pumpkin soup. For a vegetarian version, just switch vegetable broth for the chicken broth.

Ingredients: 1 medium onion, chopped; 2 stalks celery, chopped; 3 cloves garlic, chopped; 4 cups chicken (or vegetable) broth; 2 tomatoes, chopped; 2 bay leaves; ½ teaspoons nutmeg; 2 cups pumpkin purée (one medium sugar pumpkin, about four pounds, yield about 1 ½ cup purée); salt and pepper to taste; 1 cup heavy cream. Instructions: Sauté onions, celery, and garlic in butter. Add broth, toma-

> Belonging to a Rod & Gun Club that has a Preserve permit to hunt year around, is the best of both worlds. Clubs that possess a preserve permit can stock hundreds of Pheasant a year for their members to hunt on a daily basis. There are only two clubs in the valley that are fortunate enough to have a large number of pheasant hunters, and hold a preserve license. Holding numerous functions a year to raise money for their bird hunting activities will provide there members with many great days in the field.

Food Fact: Believe it or not, certain varieties Indian Corn can also be eaten fresh, steamed or boiled. The key is choosing edible Indian Corn that is freshly picked and young and tender. If the kernels appear dried, the corn is too old to be enjoyed fresh.

Corn Décor: Once you've eaten your fill of freshly picked Indian Corn, you can easily recycle the rest for ornamental use. 



# Rams get defensive in statement tie with Wachusett

DUDLEY — In an early-season girls' varsity soccer game that was chock full of the tension and emotion of a Central Mass. final, Shepherd Hill Regional and Wachusett Regional — the defending Division 1 state champion — battled to a 1-1 tie at Richard Carmignani Memorial Field on Tuesday, Sept. 10.

After a scoreless first half the Rams (1-0-2) grabbed a 1-0 lead with 23:56 remaining in the game.

Sophomore Jordan Beeman staked Shepherd Hill to the lead when she scored on a right-to-left direct kick from 30 yards out. On the play Wachusett goalie Emma Hickey was positioned slightly to her left and, because of that,

when Beeman shot the ball Hickey was unable to get over to make a play on the ball, which crossed the goal line just inside the far post. As the play was unfolding it was unclear if Beeman's kick was a shot on net or a cross to a teammate.

"It was both, a shot and a cross," Beeman said. "I mean, it was definitely a shot on net, but if it didn't go in I wanted to make sure it was in the area so one of my teammates could make a play on it. When I took the shot I felt like it was going in. I knew I had the right angle for it to go in, I just didn't know if it would get there before [Hickey] could stop it or bat it away."

"Jordan is one of our most effective and accurate players from that distance," Rams' head coach Amanda Brotherton said. "From where I was standing I couldn't really tell if it was going in when she shot it, but I know she's very accurate on shots like that, so it didn't surprise me that it went in."

Wachusett (1-0-1) tied the game, 1-1, with 14:30 to play when sophomore Regina Pallotta scored on a penalty kick. The Mountaineers were awarded the free shot when Shepherd Hill senior Tori Paine was called for a handball inside the goalie box.

On the play, Wachusett was pressuring Shepherd Hill goaltender Michaela Cluett with three forwards attacking the goal. The Mountaineers' Maggie Kelley took a shot that was out of the reach of Cluett and was headed for the empty part of the net when Paine reached up and batted the ball down, preserving the Rams' lead.

Both teams pressed over the game's final 10 minutes, but neither team could solve the other's goaltender. Cluett finished with 12 saves while Hickey made 11 stops.

Wachusett was an offensive juggernaut en route to winning the state championship last November, finishing the season with 74 goals in 22 games. That explosive offensive was on display against Shepherd Hill, but the Rams' defense kept the Mountaineers off-balance and frustrated the entire game.

"That's one of the biggest things I've been working with the team on; our defense as a whole, especially as a team. That has been one of the things I have focused the most on, first during the preseason and now here in our first few games," Brotherton said. "We were definitely a little dicey in the first game [a 3-3 tie with the Bromfield School], so that was definitely my focus when we came back to practice last Tuesday [Sept. 3].

"Most people know that I'm a pretty defensive-minded person; I was as a player and I am now as a coach. I don't change my mindset very often. The girls are coming together as a team," Brotherton continued. "I lost my two center backs [Allie Marrier and Reese Hammond] and my goalkeeper [Alyssa Trueman] to graduation last year, but we have a strong core in the back now and they're making their own name at this point and becoming a strong unit."

Stepping in to fill the void at the center back position have been Beeman and junior Demi Teguis while Cluett, a junior, has the unenviable task of taking over for Trueman.

"Michaela played awesome today; she did great," Brotherton said. "I feel pretty good about the way we played today, but I feel like we can always play better. One of the things I've been telling the girls in the last couple of games is to come out and set the tone. Then, regroup at halftime and be better in the second half than you were in the first. After games I tell them we're going to be better than we were in this game in the next game."



DUDLEY — The undefeated Algonquin Regional girls' varsity volleyball team mixed an aggressive offensive attack with a spot-on defense in its match with Shepherd Hill Regional on Thursday, Sept. 12, and the result was a 3-1 win for the Tomahawks over the Rams.

With the win Algonquin improved to 3-0 overall and in the Mid-Wach A Division. Shepherd Hill fell to 1-2 overall and 0-2 in the Mid-Wach A. The game scores were 25-17, 23-25, 25-23 and 25-19.

The Tomahawks looked to spike the ball early and often against the Rams and the result was a team total of 40 kills. Chloe Chiota led the Algonquin attack with 11 kills, while her sister Olivia recorded nine kills.

When the Tomahawks weren't spiking the ball on Shepherd Hill they were defending the spike almost as well, racking up a total of 59 digs, 17 of the saves made by Hannah Jaiswal.

After dropping the first game, 25-17, the Rams rallied to tie the match at a game apiece with a 25-23 win in game two, rallying from a 22-20 deficit for the victory.

"The girls felt a lot more confident in the second game and it showed," said Shepherd Hill assistant coach Tony Wong-Li, who coached the team in the absence of head coach Chris Lindstrom, who Wong-Li said was out of town on business. "We came out nervous in the first game. Before the second game we talked about playing like we should be playing. There was just a lot more confidence in that second game and we got our serves in."

Algonquin closed out the match with a 25-23 win in game three and a 25-19 victory in game four.

"In the third and fourth games we got nervous again," Wong-Li said. "The last two games were a series of ups and downs. When we get nervous it seems like we serve into the net or out of bounds."

Shepherd Hill committed 28 unforced errors in the match.

"We made too many unforced errors today," Wong-Li said. "We had too many missed serves, too many [miss-hits] on free balls. We'd make a perfect pass and then we couldn't put the point away; we'd end up hitting it out of bounds."

Sophomore Annaka Lindstrom led the Rams with four spikes, four blocks and four service aces. Senior Kiley Wong-Li finished with three kills and two blocks, while junior Bella Sousa recorded two kills, three blocks and a service ace. Senior Maddi Hughes had a kill and a service ace to go along with three blocks and three digs, while sophomores Gabby Eberhart and Alyse Biron had two kills each.

While acknowledging the match with Algonquin was a close one, Tony Wong-Li said there were parts of the loss that Shepherd Hill can build on.

"I thought we communicated better today than we have and we are starting to run some plays," he said. "Our defense is getting better, too. We're not where we want to be but we're making progress. Defense wins games; we can't win if we don't play defense and I think our defense is coming around."

On a related note Ingrid Lindstrom, who graduated from Shepherd Hill in June and is now a freshman at Franklin Pierce University (FPU) in Rindge, N.H., was named the Northeast-10 Conference Player and Rookie of the Week recently.

recently.

A middle hitter for the Ravens, Ingrid Lindstrom appeared in all four of FPU's games, leading the team to a 3-1 record. She led the Ravens in kills (59), kills per set (3.93), hitting percentage (.448), total blocks (14) and blocks per set (0.93) over the four matches.

In her collegiate debut, a 3-0 win over LIU-Post, Ingrid Lindstrom racked up 14 kills and a .667 hitting percentage. She followed that up with a game-best 27 kills in a thrilling five-set win against Mercy while hitting .511. Lindstrom's 27 kills ranks as the fourth-highest total in program history.

## Potent offense delivers for Wolverines in win over Bay Path

CHARLTON — In its season-opening game with Bay Path Regional, the Leicester High varsity football team's offense was in midseason form. That was the story of the Wolverines' 44-13 victory over the Minutemen on Saturday, Sept. 14 at George L. Fowler Memorial Field.

Leicester scored on all five of its first-half possessions and the defense chipped in with a safety to give the Wolverines a 37-7 halftime lead.

Senior Bryce Gosselin led the high-octane attack, rushing for 161 yards, which included touchdown runs of four and seven yards, on 15 carries. Junior Stephen Olsen added 64 yards on nine carries and he scored a pair of touchdowns, on runs of eight and 12 yards.

The Wolverines got it done through the air, too, as senior quarterback Dan Mero completed 5-of-7 passes for 121 yards, four of his completions ending up in the hands of senior Jack O'Neill, who finished with 101 receiving yards, including a 31-yard scoring strike from Mero in the second quarter.

"We return everybody and we have legit good skill kids who pretty much knew everything coming into the preseason," Leicester head coach Tim Griffiths said. "So, we didn't have to spend a lot of time teaching and coaching kids on

formations and responsibilities and where to be on what play. We were able to focus on repeti-

tion and fine tuning."
After Bay Path went three-and-out on the opening possession of the game, the Wolverines put together a seven-play, 60-yard drive that Gosselin capped with a seven-yard scamper over the left side. Senior Nolan Power then tacked on the first of his six extra points, giving Leicester a 7-0 lead with 7:36 left in the first quarter.

Bay Path needed just one play from scrimmage to tie the game, 7-7, as Tyler Gillespie galloped 70 yards through a gaping hole on the left side of the Minutemen's offensive line and Zach Whittemore added the PAT. Gillespie finished with 124 rushing yards on 15 carries. Gillespie also scored Bay Path's other touchdown, on a nine-yard run, on the final play of the game.

Gosselin said Leicester did not approach the game with the attitude that it was the first game of the year and they would see what happens.

"Our mindset coming in was perfection. We're perfectionists and coach Griff is a perfectionist, too, so if everything's not perfect, it's a problem," said Gosselin who was, for the most part, pleased with his team's performance. "We've definitely got work to do. We made some mental mistakes that we have to clean up. As for my performance,

I would say I had a good game, but I can do better."

Mero and O'Neill were in sync from Leicester's first offensive play, a 19-yard completion. Their 31-yard scoring play is sure to be on the Wolverines' Year in Review Highlight Video. In the back corner of the end zone O'Neill leaped and reached high to grab a bullet of a pass from Mero, a pass that was still rising when O'Neill plucked it out of the sky.

## FALL

## How mulched leaves help your lawn



Various chores are synonymous with certain times of year. For example, cleaning a pool is a summertime task. In addition, rare is the instance that Mother Nature forces anyone to break out the snow shovels outside of winter. Raking leaves has long been a task for fall afternoons, but homeowners may be surprised to learn

that they might be better off putting their rakes in permanent mothballs.

In the 1990s, turfgrass specialists at Michigan State University began exploring the potential benefits of leaving mulched leaves on a lawn instead of raking them and leaving them for curbside pickup. While the researchers noticed an obvious leaf residue on the lawn after mulching, they noted that it only sticks around for a few days. Eventually, the tiny pieces sifted down into the lawn, ultimately serving to control future

weed growth while also providing the lawn with essential nutrients. Over time, researchers noted that homeowners who mulched rather than raked their leaves needed less fertilizer to give their lawns a green look in spring, saving homeowners the effort and cost associated with fertilizing.

Researchers also noted that decomposing pieces of leaves cover up bare spots between turf plants, which have traditionally proven to be excellent spots for weed seeds to germinate. In fact, MSU notes that homeowners can expect a nearly 100 percent decrease in dandelions and crabgrass after mulching leaves for just three years.

Depending on the type of mower being used, up to six inches of leaves can be mulched at a time. Push mowers can handle smaller amounts, though can still be as effective as ride-on mowers.

Fall may be synonymous with raking leaves. However, homeowners who want to give their lawns a healthy boost should consider putting their rakes away and mulching their leaves this fall.

# Choosing the right yeast strain for brewing



Home brewers learn a lot about the brewing process as they grow from novices into skilled brewers. Brewers must familiarize themselves with the process of brewing and the equipment necessary to create beer. Brewers also must learn about the ingredients necessary to create beverages they can be proud

One of the key components in the fermenting process is yeast. The yeast chosen can impact the fermentation, flavor profiles and more. It can be easy to underestimate the power of yeast. Get the process right and there's a delicious brew to sip. But get it wrong

and home brewers might have to pour entire batches down the drain.

According to Beer Advocate, a brewer and beer enthusiast's guide to all things beer, in the past there were really only two yeasts used for beer brewing: ale yeast (the "top-fermenting" type) and lager yeast (the "bottom-fermenting" type). Now there are hundreds of yeasts to choose from that fall into the top- or bottom-fermenting cate-

In short, top-fermenting yeasts rise to the top of the wort during fermentation. This type of yeast is used for ales, porters, wheat beers, and stouts, and the beer

is normally brewed at warmer temperatures. It can form a rich head and fruity flavor, according to 52Brews.com, a beer review site. Bottomfermenting yeasts settle toward the bottom of the wort and are best used for lagers, pilsners, bocks, and American malts.

Many yeast varieties are named for the types of beers they help create, making it easier for novice brewers to find some that will work on their batches. However, Craft Beer and Brewing magazine says to also consider various factors when selecting yeasts that can impact performance.

• Attenuation: Attenuation is the percentage of available wort sugars that a yeast strain actually ferments. High attenuation may produce a sweeter beer while low attenuation can produce a dryer finish. Select a yeast that will achieve these desired results.

• Flocculation: This refers to how the yeast cells clump together and drop to the bottom of the fermenter. Choose a strain that flocculates in a way that is appropriate to the beer brewed.

• Alcohol tolerance: Certain yeasts can survive beyond the beer's estimated alcohol level and produce a higher ABV. It all depends on what's needed for the brew.

• Temperature range: Select a yeast that can ferment at the desired temperature in a home or garage.

A good brew shop can help home brewers find the right yeasts. Learning more about yeast by reading blogs and/or brewing resources also can get a person well on his or her way to brewing delicious beers.

# A guide to safely removing fallen leaves

Raking leaves is a chore many people immediately associate with autumn. Even though raking seems like a simple activity, it's still possible to be injured while removing leaves from the yard.

The University Pittsburgh Center advises that pain from outdoor leaf chores can range from strained back muscles to twisted knees. Blisters on the hands and sunburn are other potential side effects. Many people do not realize that raking is a thorough cardiovascular workout. Individuals at risk for cardiovascular disease or those who have recovered from surgery may not be well enough to rake leaves.

Here's how to make autumn leaf removal more of a breeze when the job is done safely.

• Pay attention when using a leaf blower. Be cautious not to point an operational blower in the direction of people or pets, as debris can be blown about and cause injury.

• Stretch out before raking leaves. Warm up muscles beforehand so they are less likely to cramp. UPMC experts suggest taking a short walk prior to raking to stimulate circulation.

• Use proper raking form. Much like snow shoveling, one should emphasize proper posture when raking, with legs slightly bent and weight distributed evenly. Hold the rake handle close to the body and keep one hand near the top of the rake for better leverage.

• Use the proper gear. A leaf rake fans out like a triangle and comes in various widths. Choose a lightweight material that can be easily maneuvered. A metal rake is for stones and dirt and shouldn't be used for leaves. To get between bushes, a smaller version of a leaf rake, called a



shrub rake, should be used.

• Wear protective gear. When raking or leaf blowing, protect your eyes against debris. You also may want to use a mask to prevent inhalation of leaf mold and other particulates. Gloves can protect hands from blisters.

• Follow manufacturers' directions. Read the instructions for powered leaf blowers, and never modify the device in an unauthorized way.

• Use a tarp and lift wisely. Rake leaves onto a tarp that can be dragged to a garbage pail or to the curb for municipal pick up. For those who must lift bags of leaves, do so by bending at the knees,

not from the waist.
• Wear sunscreen.
Protect skin from the

sun. Even though temperatures are cooler in the fall, this does not mean the sun's rays are any less harmful. Also, take breaks to rehydrate frequently.

• Use a secure ladder

• Use a secure ladder. When removing leaves from gutters, be sure the ladder is sturdy and secure. Consider having a friend serve as a spotter, holding on to the ladder to offer greater security. Do not overextend to stretch for leaves.

If at any time during leaf clean-up you feel sharp or dull, incessant pains, stop working. Listen to your body's signals and start the task anew the next day or when you feel better.

## FALL

## Interesting facts about fall

Weather is often the first indicator that the seasons are changing. For many people across the globe, the hot days of summer will soon be giving way to the more crisp days of fall.

For those who live in regions where summer only subtly gives way to fall or is seemingly gone before the end of August, the 2019 autumnal equinox occurs on September 23. That marks the official beginning of fall, also known as autumn. In fact, that the season the follows summer seemingly goes by two different names is just one of many interesting facts about fall.

• A season by any other name ... Fall is the term most often used to reference the season succeeding summer in the United States. But the season is referred to as "autumn" in other parts of the world, including Great Britain. Fall was once even known as "harvest" because of the harvest moon, which appears close to the autumnal equinox.

• The colors of fall foliage are actually pres-



ent year-round. Fall is known for its colorful foliage. But the pigments responsible for those colors are actually present year-round. According to the SUNY College of Environmental Science

and Forestry, green, yellow and orange pigments are present year-round. However, during spring and summer, the leaves serve as factories where many foods necessary to help the tree grow are

manufactured. That process takes place in the leaf in cells containing chlorophyll, which gives the leaves their green color. This process ceases as hours of daylight decrease and tempera-

tures drop. As a result, chlorophyll breaks down, the green color disappears and the vivid colors of fall foliage begin to appear.

• Squirrels have a (sophisticated) plan out

there. Squirrels hiding food in autumn for the upcoming winter is a familiar sight. And squirrels are more organized than many people may know. Groundbreaking research released in 1991 found that, even when squirrels bury that stash of nuts closely to one another, they will each return to the precise location of their personal cache. Recent research also has shown that squirrels bury their stash based on certain traits, such as the type of nut being buried.

• Babies born in fall are more likely to see the century mark. Researchers at the University of Chicago studied more than 1,500 centenarians born in the United States between 1880 and 1895. They then compared birth and death information with those centenarians' siblings and spouses so they could compare their early environment and genetic background and their adult environment. Their research found that most centenarians were born between September and November.

## Natural ways to fight fall allergies



Leaves are a known cause of fall allergies. Raking them can stir up mold and pollen.

As the days become shorter and the weather cools down, a new crop of allergy symptoms can arise, turning the autumn season into one marked by sneezing, scratchy throats and itchy eyes. Medications can alleviate such symptoms, but allergy sufferers may want to investigate some natural ways

to beat allergies.

According to the American College of Allergy, Asthma & Immunology, ragweed is one of the more common triggers of autumnal allergies. Ragweed contributes to "hay fever," which is a term to describe allergic rhinitis that occurs as a symptom of ragweed pollen

in the air. Ragweed releases pollen in mid-August, and it can continue to be problematic until a deep freeze arrives.

Other sources of fall allergies include leaf mold and pollen that is present on fallen leaves. This gets circulated when people begin to rake or blow fallen leaves. Classroom pets and chalk dust in schools (although chalkboards are largely a thing of the past) are other autumn allergens.

The good news is that many natural remedies work just as effectively as over-the-counter medications in regard to combatting ragweed and pollen problems. Here's how to beat the fall allergy blues

• Stay away from pollen. Stay away from pollen and prevent it from being tracked indoors. Remove shoes when walking through the door. Take off clothes worn outside and launder them promptly, showering to wash pollen off of the body. Use an air conditioner or keep windows closed when the pollen count is high.

• Increase omega-3 fatty acids. It is well documented that fatty acids are good for brain health and cardiovascular well-being. But these acids also may help with allergies. A German study linked foods high in omega-3 fatty acids with the ability to fight inflammation, which is a hallmark of allergy suffer-

ing. Foods that are high in fatty acids include walnuts, flax, eggs, and cold-water fatty fish.

• Rinse off pollen. Use a mild cleanser to rinse the eyelids and eyelashes of pollen, as this is where it tends to congregate after being outdoors. Use saline spray to clear nasal passages of excess pollen as well.

• Take natural supplements. A study published in the journal Clinical and Experimental Allergy found participants who used tablets of the herb butterbar showed significant allergy relief after only one week. Select herbs from reputable manufacturers who certify them

• Use eucalyptus oil. This oil is great to have in the house to help clear up sinuses and provide nasal congestion relief. Mix a small amount with coconut oil and rub onto the chest. There also is some evidence that adding a few drops of eucalyptus oil to cleansing products can help kill dust mites around the house.

• Wear a mask. When doing housework or yard work, wear a mask to reduce the inhalation of specific allergens

Avoid seasonal allergies by exploring natural ways to find prevention or relief of symptoms.

## Protect your plants from winter weather

For the majority of gardening enthusiasts, gardening is a warm weather activity. While some people live in climates that make it possible to enjoy gardening year-round, those who don't often lament the end of the gardening season.

Winter might not be conducive to gardening, but the arrival of cold weather does not necessarily mean a gardener's work is done until the following spring. Taking steps to protect plants from winter weather is an important part of maintaining a healthy garden that thrives from year to year.

Timing is of the essence when winterizing a garden. The online gardening resource Get Busy Gardening!TM advises gardeners that the best time to winterize is after the first hard freeze in the fall. A hard freeze occurs when temperatures dip below freezing overnight. When that occurs, annual plants and vegetables are killed off and perennial plants, which grow back year after year, begin going dormant.

Better Homes and Gardens notes that perennials are the easiest plants to prepare for winter, as they require just a little cutting back and mulching to be safe from cold weather. But no two perennials are alike, so homeowners should consult their local gardening center for advice on how to

prepare their particular perennials for the coming months.

The steps necessary to winterize annuals depends on which type of annuals, coolor warm-climate, you have. Cool-climate annuals should be covered with polyspun garden fabric when light frost is in the forecast. In addition, Better Homes and Gardens recommends pulling dead annuals and adding them to a compost pile after a killing frost. Any annuals that developed fungal disease should be discarded. Mulch annual beds with a three- to four-inch layer of chopped leaves or similar materials, spreading the mulch only two inches thick over selfsown seeds you want to germinate in the spring.

Warm-climate annuals also should be covered with polyspun garden fabric when light frost is expected. Seeds of cold-hardy annuals can be planted for extended winbloom, while gardeners also can collect seeds of warm-weather plants that will breed true to type. Even though you're winterizing, Better Homes and Gardens recommends that gardeners continue to weed and water their plant beds and plants while also keeping an eye out for pests. If organic mulch has decomposed or thinned out, replace it with a new laver.



Get Busy Gardening!TM notes that the bulbs of tender plants like dahlias and tuberous begonias can be dug up and overwintered in their dormant state. All dead foliage should be removed after the bulbs have been dug up, and the bulbs

should be allowed to dry out a little before being stored. Container gardeners can overwinter their tender bulbs in their pots inside, but be sure to remove their foliage and store them in a dark, cool place that maintains temperatures above freezing.

Winterizing may mark the end of gardening season, but it's an important task that can ensure a healthy, beautiful garden next spring, summer and


