"I moved my business into the Bernat Mill in June 2016," Jacques said, "When I came into the space, I did a lot of research about the history of the property and was excited to be a part of bringing life back into this part of Uxbridge. I remembered visiting the businesses in the mill when the community was thriving, just prior to the devastating fire. When I realized that July 22, 2017 marked the 10 year anniversary of that event, I wanted to create an event to bring the community together, highlight the new energy in the mill, and celebrate local business."

Town receives vote of approval from SBA

On June 27 the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) Board of Directors voted to approve the new W. Edward Balmer Elementary School Project.

The new W. Edward Balmer Elementary School consolidates the town's two aging elementary schools, the W. Edward Balmer Elementary School and the Northbridge Elementary School into one new facility serving all of the town's grades PreK through 5 students at the Balmer site. The consolidated school relocates the fifth grade back into the elementary school setting.

The total project cost is \$100.97 million and the MSBA will reimburse the town approximately \$47.56 million. The estimated cost to Northbridge is \$53.41 million.

The town will be asked to approve the project funding at the fall town meeting on October 23, and to approve a debt exclusion vote on November 6.

BVT awarded Skills grant

SALEM — The Baker-Polito Administration awarded \$10.9 million in Skills Capital Grants to 33 high schools and educational institutions, enabling the schools to acquire the newest technologies to educate students and expand programs. The awards were announced as part of Governor Charlie Baker's visit to Salem High School with Mayor Kim Driscoll. With this announcement, the Baker-Polito Administration has awarded more than \$48 million to 157 different programs over the past three years.

Skills Capital Grants are designed to help high schools, colleges and other educational institutions invest in the most up-to-date training equipment to give their students an advantage when they continue in their chosen field or particular area of study. Skills Capital Grants cover a broad array of fields,

from construction and engineering to healthcare and hospitality.

"The equipment purchased by high schools and colleges over the past three years through Skills Capital Grants has directly impacted the educational experience for thousands of Massachusetts students to better prepare them for the workforce," Governor Baker said. "This program has had a positive impact on students in the Commonwealth and we look forward to working with the Legislature to include \$75 million worth of funding for Skills Capital Grants as part of the Economic Development bill we filed in the spring."

"By giving our students the opportunity to learn on the newest technologies, we are ensuring they will be better prepared to succeed when they graduate from high school," Lt. Governor Karyn

Polito said. "We look forward to continuing our work with these 33 high schools and previous awardees to enhance their programs and develop a skilled workforce ready to meet the needs of the Commonwealth."

The competitive grants are awarded to educational institutions that demonstrate partnerships with local businesses, as well as align curriculum and credentials with industry demand, in order to maximize hiring opportunities in each region of the state.

"Schools that receive these competitive grants are giving their students a head start by creating relationships with local employers who provide input and expertise about the skills and knowledge they will need to be successful in the future," Education Secretary James Peyser said.

"Massachusetts' continued low unemployment rates, coupled with job and labor force gains, has also created a tight labor market in which more and more employers are finding it difficult to recruit workers with the skills necessary to fuel their growth needs," said Labor and Workforce Development Secretary Rosalin Acosta. "The Workforce Skills Capital grant program has had great success in closing those skills gaps and ensuring that the next generation of workers in the Commonwealth has the training necessary to access our high demand job sectors."



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
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Local antique news update

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

A clever reader offers an ingenious "tick tip" and more:

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Summer care for perennial gardens

Keep your perennial gardens looking their best throughout the hot summer months with a bit of midsummer grooming and care. Investing time midseason means you'll be enjoying beautiful gardens now through the end of the growing season.

Start by deadheading, removing faded flowers, to improve the plants' overall appearance. It won't extend bloom time on all perennials, but will keep some like bergenia, lamb's ear, peonies, and perennial geraniums looking neat and tidy throughout the summer. Deadheading will encourage an additional flush of flowers on many perennials including bee balm, coral bells, daylilies, fringed bleeding heart, phlox, purple cone-flowers, salvia, veronica, and yarrow.

Cut spent flowers back to the nearest set of side shoots with flower buds or healthy leaves on perennials like cone-flowers, catmints, salvias, shasta daisies, turtlehead and veronics.

On daylilies and balloon flowers, remove individual flowers on the flower scape (stem) as they fade. Once all the individual flowers have faded and been deadheaded, remove the whole flower stem.

Prune flower stems back to a rosette of leaves at the base of the plant on coral bells, hosta and lamb's ear to keep these plants looking their best.

Shearing a plant, also called cutting back, is a pruning method that removes large amounts of plant material in one fell swoop. This method is useful for plants with an abundance of small flowers such as creeping phlox, rock cress and threadleaf coreopsis. Also consider digging and dividing threadleaf coreopsis every few years to promote continuous bloom.

Keep mums and asters

pruned to 6" throughout June and stop the beginning of July. Complete pruning by the beginning of July on late summer and fall blooming perennials. Early season pruning encourages more compact growth and can be used to stagger bloom times. Manage flopping growth on plants such as Walker's Low Catmint (Nepeta) by cutting the plants back halfway. Cut back salvias and veronics after the second flush of flowers to promote compact growth and additional bloom.

Thin out overcrowded plants by removing some stems to the ground. This increases light penetration and airflow to the plants, reducing the risk of disease.

Use ground level pruning on bleeding heart and other perennials that die-back midseason.

Dead leafing, a technique used to remove or trim back discolored foliage, allows the flowers to remain the center of attention.

Stake plants in need of support to prevent perennials from flopping. This will reduce disease and increase beauty.

Although it's always best to put stakes and supports in place as plants emerge in spring, you can still add a bit of support mid-season. Use bamboo stakes and ties, twigs woven into stems or other attractive or virtually invisible stakes. Then mark next year's calendar to remind yourself to put stakes in place in spring as plants emerge.

Spread a thin layer of mulch such as shredded leaves, evergreen needles, twice shredded bark or other organic material over the soil surface. Mulching conserves moisture, suppresses weeds, keeps roots cool during hot weather and improves the soil as it decomposes.

Continue to remove weeds throughout the season to eliminate competition for water and nutrients. Removing weeds before they form seeds eliminates hundreds of weeds you'll need to pull in next year's garden. Weeding also reduces the risk of insects and disease in your garden since some weeds attract pests and serve as host for diseases

that can damage perennials.

Plant perennials or annuals to fill voids or mask declining spring bloomers. Water new plantings often enough to keep the roots moist for the first few weeks. Eventually switch to thorough, less frequent watering to encourage deep drought tolerant roots. And don't forget to mulch the soil right after you plant to keep roots cool and moist.

Once your perennial gardens are spruced up, it's time to sit back and

enjoy the beauty you've created.

The program began back in 1997, when a group of ten students and two adults spent a week in Washington DC. Since then, area students have gone back every year to work in community kitchens, homeless shelters, and daycare centers.

This year, 33 students will join seven chaperones on the trip, and everyone is looking forward to giving back.

"These kids are learning about how much of a difference just a few people can make when they help others," Terry

Hall said. "It is very inspiring to see these young people getting involved."

The 2018 participants are an eager group of students hailing from Warren, West Brookfield, Sturbridge, Brimfield, North Brookfield, Brookfield, Ware, Monson, and Barre. Dan Mazzaresse, of West Brookfield, is the lone student who has taken part in the trip in years past. Now it's his turn to play the role of mentor and use his leadership to guide younger students.

"Every year it has been amazing. You get to meet so many people and have great conversations with them," Mazzaresse said.

This year's trip will take place from Aug. 4-11. Sponsored by the First Congregational Church of West Brookfield, the trip is open to any student age 13 or older, regardless of whether they attend a church. A few spots are still available for those look-

ing to get involved and give back.

While in D.C., the students will stay at a dormitory in one of the city's most historical Presbyterian churches: the Church of the Pilgrims. Several of the chaperones took part in the mission when they were kids, and they can't wait to share a lifechanging experience with students.

As the countdown to Aug. 4 continues, students are eagerly awaiting their mission. Groups of 4-5 students will work in community kitchens and help prepare food for those in need. Others will provide service in homeless shelters and other facilities throughout D.C.

"There are so many misconceptions about homeless people, and I have always wanted to help out," said Warren's Ali O'Leary, a first-time participant.

Added Ezekiel Powers, of Warren, "I really want to be there for other people and help change their lives."

When the students aren't volunteering, they will enjoy recreational activities, shopping, restaurants, and of course plenty of sightseeing.

Self centered sons and daughters

We had in the past two weeks the largest sporting events on the planet. Millions of people around the globe were tuned into televisions and radios; glued to the internet and cellphone podcasts, double checking Twitter feeds during dinner to keep up with scores.

Everywhere except in America. Because we are separated from the rest of the world by miles...or kilometers...of interest.

We as a nation don't seem to understand the intense sport of 'real' football.

Most people don't even know the terms. A pitch, midfielder, offsides, striker...foreign words even though they are English. The game is straight forward enough. You can't use your hands, you can use your head or your feet only, or your torso. Only certain people can run past the midline on the field. Only the goalkeeper can touch the ball with their hands. And you score by getting the ball into the net past defenders and the goalkeeper.

You can't purposely trip anyone, or push them anyone out of your way with your hands, though you may block them with your entire body as long as you don't touch them with your hands. It's FOOT-ball, people.

It is a game that can be played by poor people in the streets and in fields, on grass or on asphalt or sand. It takes something round to kick and bunch of people to run and that's it.

Which is part of its appeal. It is a game of the masses. Anyone can play. No fancy equipment, no particular intense skill set. Being able to run, and learn the rules. A ball or ball-like object and a goal...that's it.

But Americans just never bought into it. We just never seemed to understand the finesse, the skills it takes to dribble between the feet, to pass with accuracy to better positioned teammate, to control the entire field while still moving at that speed. And the endurance to run for more than 90 minutes with small breaks.

We've heard soccer called a 'sissy' game.

Really? American football is played once a week, with huge stops, between the actual plays which last a few seconds each. The players are padded, the runs are seconds long. Yes, there is pretty heavy duty body contact, but very little time endurance. And lots and lots of breaks (for TV commercials if nothing else).

Basketball does have more running, and is pretty physical. But also has more 'rest' time between plays and more timeouts. And is split up into four quarters with rest in between.

We won't even talk about baseball, interminable with only short bursts of running at all.

So why this innate prejudice about soccer? Why do Americans turn up their collective noses at it?

Maybe it's because we haven't fielded a good, competitive team. We have had really good players at times, but if they are good enough, they play for another, better team somewhere else. They are snatched up immediately by a pro team in England, Ireland, elsewhere. America is not the home of a soccer franchise to entice a great player.

And because we, the "America is the Greatest" self centered group we are, can't abide thinking we aren't the best at something, instead downgrade the sport itself. We, being the innate bullies we are tear down what we are actually jealous of, make fun of what intimidates us.

We can't measure up. How dare they. We, this editor at least, has thoroughly enjoyed the games. We are secretly rooting for one or two teams (sorry, not telling which ones), and as the games wound down one of our picks was still there! Hurrah!

Would we root for America if we had a team in the running? Probably, but against the powerhouses that play in the European and South American leagues? We cannot fathom a USA making it very far. Not until Americans realize how serious this sport is, how athletic the players need to be, how intense the games actually are. And we don't see that happening any time soon. It is one very large blind spot indicative of our own America First idiocy. Especially this week, the week of the Fourth of July, full of hope and promise for our country, our own selfishness is so apparent and so strangely skewed.

I Remember



IN THAT GREAT TIME PARTICK MOON

I remember... or do I? How many times have I reviewed this scene in my mind and panned my eyes as if a film camera—first to the right, then behind, then to the left—always trying to “get” the scene from a different perspective. And if it is true that every time we recall a memory we change it in some ineffable way, what is the “real” scene...or the memory of the scene?

These thoughts puzzle me. An infinite hall of mirrors is memory...what is reflected may only be a reflection of a reflection.

I am standing at the gun rail of the USS Mitchell, a World War II troopship that has been my home and playground since leaving Seattle weeks ago. We are docking at Yokohama— and somewhere on the crowded dock below, in the sea of khaki and waving arms and the noise of the ship and crew, and the colorful vendors and Japanese workmen everywhere, somewhere in that roiling crowd is my father, a 2nd Lieutenant posted to Japan six months ago.

“Does anyone see dad?” My mother is straining to separate the faces in the colorful sea and the tone of her voice seems anxious. But there is a slight difference from the stress of the past weeks: there is a hint of excitement.

Only years later would I grasp the enormity of what my mother had just done. A British citizen from a British military family, a “war bride,” she had moved my two sisters and me, all under the age of seven, from San Antonio, Texas, to Seattle, Washington, by train. She had weathered the mix-up in Seattle causing a four-day layover and then stoically boarded the troopship with my sisters and me in tow for the last leg of the eight thousand mile journey to Japan.

And as I glanced from her face to the crowd one hundred feet below, fear clutched at my stomach. I could not help my mother. I did not remember what my father looked like.

Living in Japan was the formative experience of my life but until recently, I never wrote about it. I spent almost four years there and many memories are as vivid as if they happened yester-

day. For example, nearly everyone I knew lived on one of the many military bases throughout Japan: Grant Heights, Sagami-hara, Washington Heights, Camp Zama, Yokosuka Navel base. My father was worried that we would not really

see Japan from a base and so early in our stay he bought a 1938 Packard, a black monster with running boards and a musty smell in the huge cabin. It had belonged to the mayor of Shokugawa where we first lived. To this day, I can run mental films of the Japanese countryside, the exteriors of small restaurants, and shop stalls everywhere, through the framing of the rear seat window.

For my 8th birthday celebrated in Japan, I asked for a radio. Not only did Armed Forces Radio (AFR) do “America’s Top Twenty,” a run down of pop music with commentary every Saturday night, but on different weeknights, there were radio dramas. Gunsmoke was not a TV show to me (there was little Japanese television, let alone access to a TV), and William Conrad’s sonorous voice as Matt Dillon, US Marshal seemed both tough and intelligent. I knew Frank Sinatra not only as a singer but also as Rocky Fortune, a tough private detective, and I could identify Humphrey Bogart even on quiz shows. AFR was my connection to “the States,” a nebulous geographic place far, far away, which soon became “foreign” even as Japan became my home.

Lying in bed in the dark as voices and sound effects made a movie in my head was a creative experience. I learned to mimic any voice or speech pattern and often amused my friends with dead on interpretations of teachers and fellow students. Had I lived in the United States, I would have missed the hot medium of AFR.

The strangeness of language, architecture, modes of transportation, all rapidly became the “norm” in my life. They unconsciously affected later choices in everything from reading material and favorite colors, to the love of martial arts. Japan was like a mysterious box covered in a beautiful design. I discovered that if you are open to difference, if you are open to surprise, then the beauty of the contents is the beauty of the world.

November election. Before setting out, clad in blue Merolli t-shirts, they were treated with speeches from a few very special guests at the park.

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The weather is cooperating for a summer of fishing fun

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Saltwater fishing this past week had numerous anglers calling me about some great fishing experiences for stripers, fluke, and seabass. During our discussions, I asked them if they had encountered any bluefish. The answer was just what I expected. No! What has happened to our bluefish population? For the past few years I have not caught a single bluefish on my boat. Fishing in areas like the Five Cottages and Carpenters Beach in Rhode Island for most of my life, bluefish were so abundant that they were a pain in the neck. Chewing up live eels while fishing for stripers became costly. Schools of snapper bluefish were always spotted as we fished the above mentioned. Fishing for bluefish at the Providence River a few years back, we enjoyed catching alligator blues on surface poppers. Now I miss this hard fighting fish that was once a pain in the neck!!

This past week this writer headed to Point Judith to do a bit of fluke and seabass fishing now that the seabass season has opened up in Rhode Island waters. Only three seabass are allowed daily, but that is better than nothing. Taking along my fishing partner Harry Salmon on his first trip of the year, after he returned back from his summer retreat in Florida, enjoyed a great time on the saltwater. One half hour from home Harry realized that he had forgot his lunch in his truck. Too bad!! Arriving at the boat ramp in Galilee at 5:00 am. we found the winds to be calm, and the sky was overcast. A light, cool breeze was out of the west, which is a good direction, as it is off of the land. We quickly launched the boat, after catching a few mummies (baitfish) a short distance from the boat ramp.

The outboard motor was started and we were soon navigating past the marina and into open water. Heading out of the East Breakwall we soon found ourselves at a few old fishing spots, as shown on my GPS. We only fished a short time and had no luck. I spotted a few boats at the Carpenters Beach area and made the decision to head out towards them. Arriving at the site, we started to fish immediately. A few hits on the squid strips we were using for bait resulted in a few trash fish, and a couple of scup. Harry decided to use a

couple of mummies and had they just hit the bottom with his bait when he felt a good strike. The light rod was almost bent in half.

"Wow! That looks like a good fish," I remarked.

As the fish came closer to the boat I could see that he had a real nice fluke. After netting the fish we placed it on the fish ruler and it measured out at 23 inches, well over the 19 inch limit.

I was happy for Harry, but I do not like being beat out by a greenhorn! I quickly baited up with mummies on my hook and sent the line to the bottom. Wham! Another nice fish was on my rod. Slowly bringing the fish from the bottom I soon realized that I had a very large seabass on. Reeling the fish to the surface took a while, but I found myself reaching for the net and I scooped up the large fish which weighed in at a cool six pounds!

We had the correct bait and a good drift which is essential in catching these two species of fish. We soon found ourselves limited out on seabass, and we had a few large fluke, when the action exploded with seabass coming into the boat as fast as we could release them and rebait our hooks. Catch and release of some nice seabass was exciting, but we soon found ourselves out of bait and decided to call it a day. I soon realized that my lunch was gone, as I had to share it with Harry, seeing he forgot his lunch in his truck. He reluctantly offered to buy us lunch at a local seafood restaurant. It was the least he could do!! One of week's pictures

Running the motor real slow, the bait was lowered to the right depth and slowly stroked, causing the shiner to look like it was in distress. It sure worked for them. It was a method that was taught to us years ago by a long time lake trout angler. Many anglers used Davis spinners back then, and did not get to enjoy the fish until it was on the surface. All fish were released as they do not make good table fare. At least we do not like them.

Black bear sightings are on the increase and not only in the valley area. Rhode Island has had numerous sightings in the past few weeks. If they are left alone they should not cause any problems for the general public. They are only looking for food after a long winter hibernation.

An angler casting a large fishing lure from the canal on the Cape snagged a fisherman standing in a boat as it was passing by. The angler in the boat could have been seriously injured if it were not for the quick thinking captain who

Problem solved when the ants mistake the borax for sugar and the colony is wiped out in a matter of a couple of weeks or sooner.

Pair of big wins helps Northbridge Post 343 get to .500

NORTHBIDGE — It seems only Mother Nature could cool off the red-hot Northbridge American Legion baseball team last week.

Post 343, winners of three of its last five games and two in a row, was supposed to play Leominster Post 151 on Thursday, June 28, but heavy rains forced postponement of the game to a date and time to be announced.

So, after 10 games played and with 14 remaining, the Northbridge Legion team is 5-5.

"The season is moving along; the team is young. We've only got 13 guys on an 18-man roster," said first-year manager Dave Meech Sr. "With a new coach coming in people get a little nervous, but it is what it is."

Heading into the Leominster game Post 343 had a pair of come-from-behind victories, 16-13 over previously undefeated Shrewsbury and 6-5 over Wachusett in a game that saw Northbridge trailing by two runs heading into the bottom of the eighth inning.

"When you steal a couple of wins it always makes life a little easier," Meech said.

Jonathan Cray played a key role in both victories. Against Shrewsbury, batting out of the No. 9 spot in the lineup, Cray was 4 for 4 with three RBI's. Against Wachusett, Cray delivered the winning hit in the bottom of the eighth inning.

Post 343 catcher Brian Iarussi also

had a pair of games to remember against Shrewsbury and Wachusett, going a combined 5 for 8. He drove in three runs against Shrewsbury. Zach Roberts, in addition to pitching two innings of relief against Wachusett, was 2 for 4 at the plate.

Meech said that pitcher Jack Hughes was also instrumental in Northbridge's win over Wachusett, allowing just one run in five innings of work.

"Jack pitched really good ball against Wachusett," Meech said.

Jake Stuczynski also contributed to the Wachusett win, throwing an inning

of relief for Hughes before handing the ball off to Roberts.

Other key contributors so far this season for Post 343 include J.P. Lucier, Harrison Mansfield, Caleb Visbeck and Dave Meech Jr.

"It's really been a total team effort. Different guys at different times have really stepped up for us," Meech Sr. said. "Harrison, a lefty from Uxbridge, has two wins for us and should have had a third; we lost our opener 1-0 with him on the mound. He's pitched great games, we just haven't had the run support at certain times."

"J.P. hits the ball a ton," Meech Sr.

continued. "He pitches sometimes, but his arm's been sore lately so we've been holding him back. He plays anywhere in the infield we need him; third, short, second and first."

Roberts is playing short and third for Post 343, while Visbeck is a fixture in the outfield along with Meech's son (who also plays some first base) and Mansfield (when he isn't pitching).


"Zach is a really good athlete. So, luckily, we can put him at different spots," Meech Sr. said. "Our outfield is real good with Dave and Harrison and Caleb. Caleb, he can run a ball down and at the plate he squares the ball up well, too."

Meech Jr., who led Oxford High to within an out of the Division 4 high school State Championship, has played four games so far. He has yet to pitch as he is still feeling the effects of his 145-pitch outing in the State Final against Archbishop Williams.

"Dave got thrown into the ground in the state final, throwing 145 pitches, which is ridiculous," Meech Sr. said. "I'm keeping him off the mound for a week and a half and then I'll see how he feels. Throwing a pitcher 145 pitches in any scenario when you're 18 years old is completely ridiculous."

"People say, 'yeah but it was the state championship game,'" Meech Sr. continued. "Yes, it was, but teams win championships, not one player. Archbishop Williams brought in another pitcher late in the game and were able to finish it out. I'm a proponent for pitch counts at the high school level."


Interestingly enough, this year — for the first time ever — there are pitch counts in American Legion baseball.
