Dowgiewicz adds consultant to his role as selectman

AIDE TO TOWN ADMINISTRATOR CONCERNING VIOLENT CRIME IS GOAL

WEBSTER – With a series of violent and concerning crimes littering Webster in the past couple of months, including the death of a woman at the hand of her boyfriend on Harris Street, a shooting near the Main Street Dunkin’ Donuts, and a shooting a Maynard and Negus streets on May 22, selectmen are hoping to provide support to the town administrator to respond to these concerns without getting involved with

the day-to-day operations of the Webster Police Department.

Selectman Robert Miller brought up the matter during Town Administrator Doug Willardson’s report on May 22 saying that he, personally, has been approached with concerns about the increase in violent crimes the town has seen in the past couple of months.

“I know we’ve had a lot of reaction as far as some of the shootings and violent type crimes in town that seem to be a little more persistent,” Miller said asking if Willardson

would be open to having a selectman consultant on the matter. “Maybe one of us could volunteer.

Webster selectman and former Connecticut State Trooper Mark Dowgiewicz offered his services saying he has been concerned for years about the potential of violent crime becoming a norm in Webster.

“For five years I’ve been saying that this problem is coming in to town. Three an a half or two and a half years ago Selectmen Miller and (Donald) Bourque were both here when

we made the motion to hire two or three more police officers to do a community action team to hit the hotspots in town. That was turned down, not by us because we voted to approve it. The powers that be said we didn’t need it. I made the statement that at some point there’s going to be guns in town, and now we have them. I would definitely like to work with (the town administrator) on this,” Dowgiewicz told his fellow selectmen.

Willardson said he would be happy to have the help and

mentioned that several new officers, two through grant funding and one through new hire, were recently approved at the spring annual town meeting to help add resources to the police department. There were some words of caution shared by Selectman Randy Becker, who said the selectmen need to be careful to avoid getting involved with the day-to-day of the police department and allow them to do their due diligence to tackle the problems

Dudley gives a green light to green light

DUDLEY – Voters in Dudley approved a budget for the 2018 fiscal year and also made a point by choosing to spend additional stabilization fund monies on police detail for the installation of a signal at a risky intersection.

Voters overwhelmingly approved an \$18.5 million budget for the next fiscal year, starting July 1, which utilizes a heavy amount of incoming revenue and stabilization money to increase the budget over the current year by 5.36 percent, or over \$947,000. The spending plan utilizes over \$356,000 of the towns saving fund and allocated

\$7.8 million for the Dudley-Charlton Regional School District and \$872,756 for Bay Path Regional Vocational Technical High School. In addition to \$19,990 allocated from the stabilization fund for fire department gear, voters also approved another expenditure, even though a motion was originally made to table the article.

Article 19 on the town meeting agenda called for the use of \$4,400 to pay for police detail for the installation of a left turn signal at the intersection Schofield Avenue and West Main Street, also known as Route 12 and Route 197 respectively. It was Dudley Economic

Development Commission Chair John Briare, speaking as a citizen, who suggested the item not be passed over like several other extra financial items had been over the course of the night. He said that intersection has faced issues that put motorists in danger and require attention sooner rather than later.

“This intersection, trying to take a left there you are playing roulette,” Briare said. “Every now and then there comes an opportunity to fix it and I think this is an opportunity to tackle that now. Rumor has it there may be some private donations

Voters demolish Oxford override

OXFORD – Voters resoundingly rejected an \$800,000 Proposition 2 ½ override last week by a vote of 1081-382 in an otherwise sleepy local election with no opposed races.

The weeks leading to Election Day saw almost no signs – just a handful for unopposed School Committee candidate September Forbes – although several handmade anti-override signs popped up on the day itself. Both polling places had a couple, and people spent some time in the afternoon promoting that side of the issue at the Rte. 12/Charlton Street intersection.

Besides some impassioned pleas at town meeting, that was pretty much the extent of vis-

ible campaigning either way.

During a little while at both polling places, voters selected at random didn’t generally want to divulge their thoughts on the issue. But two women who did essentially summarized the rationale for “no,” although neither gave their name. “I feel we already pay enough taxes, not that I don’t want to help the schools,” said one, while the other later added, “I don’t want it to pass because you can’t go back otherwise.”

Not surprisingly, the outcome “disappointed” Superintendent Mark Garceau, who said he is already making the cuts necessary to address

Harrington closing birthing center

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SOUTHBRIDGE — The Board of Directors of Harrington HealthCare System voted unanimously on Friday to seek approval from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health to close Harrington Hospital’s Family Birthing Center, according to President and CEO Edward H. Moore.

At the same time of the closure, Harrington will enter into an agreement with UMass

Memorial Medical Center to maintain local access to pre- and post-natal care and all gynecological care, with deliveries being performed at the Maternity Center at the Medical Center’s Memorial campus.

Under the agreement, three Harrington OB/GYNs will become employees of the UMass Memorial Medical Group, Inc. and will join deliv-

ery call rotation there. These providers will continue to manage their current patient panel as well as new obstetrics and gynecology patients at two co-branded satellite offices within the Harrington service area.

“Harrington and UMass Memorial already cooperate in the delivery of obstet-

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May Real Estate Market Update

I have written several times about how interest rates can drive prices in the Real Estate Market. The Federal Reserve did not raise the Federal Funds rate in May which does not directly correlate with the mortgage rate but does have a large effect on it and is a big indicator on the direction of interest rates on mortgage loans. Based on the strong jobs report released after their May meeting many economists expect they will raise the rates next month. They are also considering a plan to reduce the amount of mortgage backed securities that are held by the Federal Reserve that was initially used to stimulate the economy back in 2008. It will be important to follow whether there is a rate hike at the June meeting and if there are any policy changes put in place that may impact the Real Estate Market. It is predicted that we will see 2 more rate hikes this year, possibly in June and September.

If we look at the health of our current Real Estate Market, we see that today we have 1709 homes for sale in

Worcester County compared to this day last year when there was 2229 homes for sale or a 23.3% decrease in inventory. I still am not convinced a small hike in interest rates will have a huge effect on our Real Estate Market locally until our supply of homes increased drastically to compensate for the large demand. I also don't think we will see these rates change the values of homes at this point since we have such low inventory. We actually have less homes for sale today in Worcester County than we did in December. Eventually as rates and values continue to rise we should see an increase in inventory causing the prices to stabilize. If we look at homes sold over past 12 months compared to the same time for the previous year there is an almost 3.4% increase in sales and a 5.3% increase in sales price while it

taking over 19% faster to sell the home this year than last year in Worcester County. Again, this data still shows all positive information at this point even though the sales number increase is lower than in December which is also probably caused by the shrinking inventory.

It is important to continually look at these numbers to see if any of the growth is slowing down thus causing a slowdown in our Real Estate Market. If you are thinking about buying or selling a home then make sure to hire a Realtor that understands the economics that drive Real Estate so they can help you decide based on your situation if now is the best time to make a move or not.

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
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New fire gear approved during town meeting

DUDLEY — Taxpayers approved the purchase of new equipment for the town's fire department as part of a yearly effort to keep the department's resources up to date and in line with modern standards.

Voters approved an expenditure of \$19,990, to purchase ten sets of fire gear during the town's spring annual town meeting May 22 that Chief Dean Kochanowski said will help keep the firefighters well equipped and safe while they manage any incident that might occur in the town of Dudley or any community that calls for mutual aid.

"We need forty sets of replacement gear, but instead of putting it all on the town all in one lump sum I'm doing

ten sets a year for four years so this is the second set," Kochanowski said. "Last year it did get passed over until the fall, but it was extremely important because it's a safety issue. We have gear that has holes in it and gear that won't protect the firefighters in the 'immediately dangerous to life or health' (IDLH) atmosphere so it could cause serious injury or even death if the gear is not replaced."

The chief said the National Fire Protection Association requires gear be replaced every ten years, and seeing as the equipment for the entire department in Dudley was overdue to be retired the chief felt it would be better to stagger the investment rather than put the town in a position of making a single lump-sum pur-

chase.

The money for the gear was approved to be taken from the town's stabilization fund, and while the fire department received the set of gear it requested there was a second investment that was tabled due to the town's limited free cash from a busy a difficult budget season. Town residents agreed, albeit by a non-unanimous vote, to table the purchase of a CPR machine for the town's ambulance units and while the chief said the department can do without that purchase for now, he said it could be part of the town meeting in the fall or a request for next year if he is unable to procure grant funding to make the purchase.

"We actually have one of those machines now, but we have two ambulances so some-

times we're without the device when we have multiple ambulance calls. It's been proven to provide 'return of spontaneous circulation after cardiac arrest' at a much higher level," Kochanowski said. "Patients that experience cardiac arrest have a much better survival with these machines than they do with manual CPR by a person."

As the Dudley Fire Department continues to invest in the future, including new gear and a new fire station facility, Kochanowski said he is optimistic they are headed in the right direction. With the town showing support for these numerous projects, and even a few voting against tabling the purchase of the CPR machine, Kochanowski thanked the voters and said he's pleased

that the department is making great strides.

"We appreciate the support for the townspeople, but we're also serving the town and to do our job appropriately and provide safety to the town we have to keep our equipment updated and in proper working order," said Kochanowski. "Unfortunately when I first became chief here six years ago there were a lot of deficiencies in the department and I'm not saying why that happened, but we had issues that needed to be taken care of. We're trying to tackle them one at a time and prioritize what we need. Some things I've been able to cover through grant funding and other things through the town so we've had a mix approach to try not to slam the town all at once."

Senator secures funding for local priorities and statewide initiatives

BOSTON — After three full days of debate, Senator Michael O. Moore (D-Millbury) announced that the Senate passed a \$40.3B state budget for Fiscal Year 2018. The budget makes targeted investments in education and workforce development, and includes provisions to address local funding priorities.

The budget includes significant increases in local aid to assist municipalities and school districts with providing important services to area residents. The eight communities within the Second Worcester District will

receive more than \$319M in education aid, and about \$57M in unrestricted general aid to support local initiatives and operations.

"I know how hard people in central Massachusetts work to make ends meet and to support their families," said Senator Moore. "I also know the importance of programs supported through the state budget and its impact on helping families who are struggling. While no budget is ever perfect, I am proud of the hard work that the Senate has put into crafting a budget that addresses many critical areas including education."

As part of the budget process, the Senate debated more than one thousand amendments ranging from funding items to policy goals. Importantly, the Senate adopted an amendment to overhaul the education funding formula as recommended by the Foundation Budget Review Commission. Several Moore-sponsored amendments were adopted as part of the Senate budget package including:


- \$35K to establish a formal partnership between seven area manufacturers and eleven high schools within the Blackstone Valley to educate students

and staff about Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) career opportunities with a focus on advanced manufacturing.

- \$50K to support a substance abuse treatment clinic in Shrewsbury for veterans. The clinic is operated by Veterans, Inc. and will be staffed by licensed mental health providers.
- \$40K for public safety improvements in the town of Auburn. This includes funding to install a surveillance system at the Auburn Housing Authority to protect elderly and disabled residents.
- \$27K to replace outdated defibrillators in emergency vehicles within the town of Upton. This funding will enable the town to replace the 13 devices, as well as to purchase one training unit to conduct the recertification training in-house.
- \$54K to help the Millbury High School purchase a multi-function activity bus to support transportation of students to academic and athletic events.
- \$9K to support the renovation of the emergency dispatch center in the town of Northbridge.
- \$75K to support public safety operations in the city of Worcester including funding for a canine unit.
- \$50K to support the Center for Autism and Neurodevelopmental Disorders at UMass Medical School.
- \$150K to support the Bottom

Line program which helps low-income and first-generation college students get into as well as through college.

- \$100K for a comprehensive statewide study relative to the Commonwealth's early education and care workforce.
 - \$80K to assist the Children's Advocacy Center of Worcester County which strives to reduce the trauma to young people who may be victims of physical and/or sexual abuse.
 - \$40K to support the South Worcester Neighborhood Improvement Corporation which provides important programs to underserved members of the community including parent skill building, leadership development, job creation, planning and youth programs.
 - \$60K to support a joint proposal for UMass Memorial EMS to provide tactical EMS support to the Massachusetts State Police STOP Team.
- The FY18 state budget now goes before a Conference Committee comprised of six legislators to resolve differences between the versions of the budget passed by the House of Representatives and the Senate. Online access to budget documents is available on the Legislature's website, www.malegislature.gov. The new fiscal year begins July 1, 2017.

Aquarion files for rate adjustment with DPU

OXFORD — Aquarion Water Company of Massachusetts has filed a request with the Massachusetts Department of Public Utilities (DPU) to adjust rates its customers pay for water service. Aquarion's last request for a water rate increase was six years ago in 2011.

Aquarion owns and operates three separate water systems in the Commonwealth: Oxford, Millbury, and a combined system for the communities of Hingham, Hull, and North Cohasset. The requested increase in rates will vary by system and by customer class.

For the average residential customers in Oxford, Aquarion's request would result in an increase of about 16.7% or \$5.70 per month.

Since Aquarion acquired the water system serving Oxford from another private company in 2002, Aquarion has had one rate decrease (at the company's request) and two rate increases

from the DPU.

In the past three years, Aquarion has coordinated their infrastructure improvements with the town of Oxford's Department of Public Works to minimize construction disruptions to customers and streamline infrastructure work. Aquarion invested nearly \$4 million including more than \$2 million on water main improvements on Main Street and Charlton Street.

Last year, Aquarion was ranked first among privately-owned utilities and fifth among 84 of the U.S.'s largest private and public water utilities by JD Power, which looked at overall customer satisfaction using six factors including water delivery, price, billing and payment, conservation, communications and customer service.

"By continually investing in our water system, we improve the reliability of our treatment facilities, reduce the fre-

quency of service interruptions, reduce water main leakage, ensure our ability to meet growing water demands, and enhance fire protection," Walsh said.

If approved, the requested rate increase would translate into a water rate increase of approximately 3.1% per year for Oxford resident since the company acquired the water system in 2002. This is lower than the 4.9% per year growth rate that the average water utility in Massachusetts has experienced from 2000 through 2014 (source: Tighe & Bond 2014 Massachusetts Water Rate Survey).

"The communities we serve rely on us to provide reliable, quality water service to support their local economies and to provide a high quality of life for residents," said Charles V. Firlotte, president and CEO of Aquarion Water Company. "The investments we make in our systems help ensure that we are able to fulfill that commitment to the health and prosperity of our customers and communities."

that seem to be plaguing the town in recent months.

"I understand what Mr. Miller is talking about with regards to staying away from the day-to-day operations and with that in mind Doug (Willardson) is relatively new to the town and probably still developing a relationship with the chief so I would think that's going to grow and mature to the point where if he needs opinion, great, but lets be cautious," Becker said. "There's always a concern if there's just a one-on-one relationship between a selectman and the town administrator where the rest of the board is unaware of what's going on – I would just caution to make sure we keep the board fully apprised of what's going on."

Miller agreed, "I would urge that absolutely, that we should basically help the administrator and any action would be through the administrator, not us - Mr.

Dowgiewicz does have a police background. That might be helpful in some way."

Willardson said that he believes his relationship with Webster Police Chief Timothy Bent has improved since it got off to a rocky start in December. He said he feels he can be a good partner to the police department if the opportunity arises.

"We've moved forward and I think this will be a good opportunity to continue to build on that relationship and also have somebody else's opinion as well. I think it would be fine, I don't see any issues with it," Willardson told selectmen before they voted to officially make selectman Dowgiewicz a consultant for the town administrator with matters concerning the ongoing concern with violent crimes in the Webster community.

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

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
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

from some of the businesses that are effected that they might be willing to contribute to having this left hand turn signal put on there."

Briare suggested the town pay for half the \$4,400 and seek the other half in private donations. Voters agreed to push the matter to a vote and approved the item, to the dismay of several selectmen who said they understand and

support the need for the fix, which supporters called a band-aid at best, but were concerned at the extensive impact the budget and other previous items had already done to the town's stabilization fund.

Selectman Steven Sullivan said he agreed that the left turn issue needed to be addressed, but didn't want to see the town dive deeper into it's savings.

"I certainly agree that we need to fix a problem while we have a chance," Sullivan said. "(With the budget and other votes) we are effectively wiping

out five years of work with the Finance Committee and Board of Selectmen to get that stabilization fund over half a million dollars and effectively wipe out at least probably 75 percent of it tonight."

Selectman Peter Fox agreed and felt the item should have been held off until the fall town meeting.

"This is a very important and dangerous situation at the lights. I also agree with Mr. Sullivan that we have just about wiped out the stabilization fund, which is our savings account - It's very

important that we try to conserve whatever money we have left after tonight and take this issue up in the fall," Fox said before the vote.

With the approval by voters the funding of the police detail will bring the stabilization fund in Dudley down to over \$114,000. Expenditures that were tabled during the town meeting included spending on a dump truck, improvement to the recycling center, a CPR machine for the fire department, and a heat exchanger for the town hall.

the fiscal shortfall. He said those will mean a couple of teachers at the high school "go unfilled," plus a couple at each of the middle and elementary schools. Collectively, he said, "class sizes will be inching higher."

Despite that, he thinks the district "can squeak into next year" without cutting popular programs like the arts, music and Navy JROTC, but in fiscal 2019, he added, "Where am I going to go? It's going to be those kinds of programs."

The underlying issue is far from unique to Oxford. Garceau said the single biggest thing driving these budget issues is

the fact the Legislature has so far failed to act on changing the way districts are funded, despite having done a foundation budget formula review back in 2015 that recommended such changes.

"They continue to pile on these unfunded mandates, but haven't changed the formula in over 40 years," he said. "It's going to take the political will to force the issue and recognize... that we can't afford to keep pace with these expenses."

Specifically, he points to three big costs -- health insurance, transportation and special education. The first tends to go up far faster than the cost of living, but is also very variable. He noted Oxford has two providers: one reduced rates

about 4 percent, but the other had a "double-digit increase." Likewise, Garceau described special ed as "impossible to budget for" because they never know how many kids they'll need to serve, and by law the schools have to educate all of them.

To Forbes, a notable issue is how charter schools take money from the public system. She noted Oxford pays far more to send a child to one of them than to another public school district -- about \$12,000 a year vs about \$5000.

"If you send your children to private school, you should be ready to pay for it," she added, noting that she sees them as private. She sent one of her kids to a private school for several years and paid for it,

but two are now in the public system. (The third graduated already.)

"The state is not in a great financial place either," she said. "Everybody needs to take a look through a new lens. We need to make some changes so everybody gets what they need."

As a new School Committee member, Forbes said she hopes to help continue the improvement the district has seen in recent years, with the goals of making the district a Level 1. She said she knows all four other members and is "looking forward to working with them," but didn't yet have specific priorities in mind.

The new Selectman, Meghan Troiano, said pretty much the same thing, noting she's "{still

kind of taking it all in."

This was her second attempt at the office; she attributed her loss by just three votes last year to being "the new face."

Regarding the ballot question, Troiano said she "didn't think it was the best option for the town. I think there are other ways to get the money for the schools."

The other people elected Tuesday were all incumbents: Selectman John Saad, School Committee member William Spitz, Town Moderator Russell Rheault, Library Trustee John Flynn and Bay Path School Committee member Benjamin LaMountain.

rics and women's health as high-risk pregnancies are often referred for delivery at the UMass Memorial Maternity Center, and a tertiary level urogynecologist employed by UMass Memorial is currently deployed part-time at Harrington," says Moore. "This arrangement will ensure that patients will experience the best of both worlds, local access for all comprehensive gynecological care as well as 90% of pre- and post-natal care locally, and deliveries taking place in the Maternity Center at UMass Memorial."

A total of 39 administrative and non-physician clinical staff that works within the Family Birthing Center or Harrington Physician Services prac-

tices will be impacted according to Vice President of Human Resources Christopher Canniff.

"We will do everything we can to support our employees in preparing for this transition with outplacement services, retirement planning and assistance in applying for open positions at Harrington and other area hospitals," Canniff said.

Moore says the closure is necessary due to staffing difficulties, low birth volume, and the financial burden of underwriting \$3-\$4 million in annual costs to staff a unit with limited utilization.

"The writing has been on the wall for some time now. Despite having a low transfer rate, area residents have been hesitant to choose a birthing center like Harrington's that does not have a neonatal intensive care unit," he said. "In 2014, Harrington delivered only 237,

or 15 percent of the 1,560 babies born in our service area."

"Birth volume is decreasing every year in the United States. Harrington deliveries reached their peak in 2001 and have been steadily declining ever since, with a record low birth count in 2016 of just 217 deliveries. That's a lower number of deliveries than any other community or teaching hospital in the Commonwealth except for Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket," according to Moore. "We've also seen the effects

of the Massachusetts opioid crisis, with an increase in redirection to UMass Memorial of high-risk opioid-affected deliveries."

The Family Birthing Center at Harrington Hospital has been in continuous operation since the hospital was founded in 1932. The 6,500 square foot labor and delivery unit includes 11 private delivery suites, a 12-bassinnet nursery and one operating room for C-sections.

child protection a national priority. This is a great opportunity for parents to discuss safety awareness with their children.

There are many ways to begin discussions with your children on safety topics. One of the programs we have used in the past was "Take 25." This was a national child safety public awareness campaign created by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC). It encouraged parents to take 25 minutes to talk to their children about safety and ways to prevent abduction. According to NCMEC, every year in America, an estimated 800,000 children are reported missing, more than 2,000 each day. Of that number, 200,000 are abducted by family members and 58,000 are abducted by non-family members, for which the primary motive is sexual. Each year, 115 children are the victims of the most serious abductions; they are taken by non-family members and either murdered, ransomed, or taken with the intent to keep.

An analysis of attempted abduction cases by NCMEC found that in 84 percent of the cases, the child escaped would-be abductors through their own actions. Teaching children about safety works and saves lives.

The National Center has rolled portions of "Take 25" into their overall national outreach with the "Be Here for Kids" campaign. Information may be found at www.missingkids.org/behereforkids.

There are materials available to assist parents with these important conversations. The hope is some initial questions will lead to further dialogue about topics and issues which relate to each family's specific situation. The occasion of Missing Children's Day is a great opportunity for parents to have this meaningful discussion with their child.

Children are exposed to a great deal of challenges, both in person and on-line. Any opportunity parents can utilize to discuss safety measures with their children is time well spent. Missing Children's Day is a chance for us to remember those who are still missing and take precautions to prevent future incidents.

No cookie baking, no checkers, no reminiscing and learning first hand history from someone who lived it.

Then there's the extracurricular activity that takes place in most structured young lives. Being shuttled from soccer to dance to private music lessons to karate to...

When is the day dream time? The chance to just watch clouds or notice nature?

And listen to your own inner voice. So you learn who YOU are.

It is a new way of living, a new way of being. The losses won't entirely even be known for another 20-30 years when these children attempt to raise children of their own.

Eco friendly tips to keep cool

Instant Shade: Erect awnings, porches, or trellises on east, south and west sides of a building. This reduces solar heat penetration through walls and windows, keeping things cool.

Note: Maintaining a gap between the top of a solid surface awning and the side of your house helps vent accumulated heat.

Did You Know A home's inside temperature can rise as much as 20°F or more if the east and west windows and walls are not shaded.

The Grass is Greener: Grass is a great natural coolant, and the more lawn you have, the greater the cooling benefit. On

a hot summer day, grass can be up to 14° cooler than exposed soil, and as much as 30° cooler than concrete or asphalt!

According to experts, the front lawns of a block of eight average houses have the cooling

effect of about 70 tons of air conditioning! That's enough to cool 16 average homes.

If you use an air conditioner, make sure you're using it to its full advantage. Here are some top tips for optimal operation of your cooling unit:

* Did you know an air conditioner operating in the shade uses less electricity than one in the sun? Plant trees or shrubs to shade air conditioning units, but be sure not to block the airflow.

* To boost efficiency, use a fan with your window air conditioner to circulate the cool air throughout the home.

* Never place lamps or TVs near your air conditioning thermostat. The heat from these appliances will cause the air conditioner to run longer.

* Be sure to add insulation around air conditioning ducts when they are located in unconditioned spaces such as attics, crawl spaces, and garages. Also, check to see that your fireplace damper is tightly closed.



Wong-Li, Fagan, Delphia all help Rams edge Hudson, 4-3

DUDLEY — The time-tested recipe of timely hitting, from Kiley Wong-Li, solid pitching (Cayley Fagan) and good defense (Hailey Delphia) paid dividends again, this time for the Shepherd Hill Regional varsity softball team, which rallied to defeat Hudson High, 4-3, on May 23.

Wong-Li clubbed a two-run, go-ahead home run in the fifth inning. Fagan pitched out of jams in the sixth and seventh innings with the tying run in scoring position. Delphia made five putouts in right field, four that are sure to make their way onto the Rams' season-ending highlight reel DVD.

Shepherd Hill needed the contributions of all three to outlast the persistent and pesky Hawks to improve to 12-7. Hudson, which was hoping to upset the Rams for its postseason-qualifying 10th win of the season, dropped to 9-9 with the loss.

"They're a good team. We played them earlier in the season and we were much more fortunate in the box in that game," Shepherd Hill head coach Donny Loos said, referring to the Rams' 16-6 win over the Hawks in Hudson

last month. "Sophia [Togneri, Hudson's starter] was really on her game. She was throwing hard, had a great changeup, was spotting the ball well and she kept us off balance. We were lucky that we got enough hits to score one more run than they did today."

That "one more run" came courtesy of Wong-Li.

Shepherd Hill entered the bottom of the fifth inning trailing, 3-1, thanks to a two-run homer in the top of the inning off the bat of Hudson's Ali Banks. Carly Snyder opened the Rams' half of the fifth with a single to center field and then scored to cut the Hawks lead to 3-2 when Sophia Sciarappa followed with a line-drive double to center field.

With one out Wong-Li put Shepherd Hill ahead, 4-3, with a booming home run, her seventh of the season, over the center-field fence, Sciarappa scoring in front of her. Wong-Li's clout came on an 0-2 count.

"Kiley had been fooled badly on a changeup for strike two and she looked at me and said, 'I'm not going to let that happen again,'" Loos said. "When you leave the ball over the middle of the plate up in the zone, that's what she can do. She is a powerful kid and she

hits the ball hard."

Wong-Li admitted that Togneri had her off balance with that second-strike changeup.

"She really fooled me on that one," said the freshman, who leads the Rams in home runs and RBIs. "I was expecting another changeup and I think the pitch I hit was a changeup, but it was a little faster and I was ready for it. Before hitting the home run I had grounded out and struck out, so I was ready for a hit."

The game was far from over, however, as Hudson got the tying run to third base in the sixth inning and to second base in the seventh. But both times Fagan pitched her way out of trouble.

In the sixth the Hawks had runners on second and third with one out when Togneri hit a fly ball to right field. Delphia backed up, made the catch running in and threw a perfect strike to home. Hudson's Megan Miller, who was on third at the time, chose not to go home on the play. Well, she didn't exactly choose not to go home.

"She left third about three seconds early, before [Delphia] caught the ball," Hudson head coach Laura Bowen said. "So, she had to go back to third and tag up again, and by that time there was no way she was going to beat the throw."

In the seventh Hudson had runners on first and second with two outs, but Fagan shut down the Hawks' potential go-ahead rally by striking out Miller to end the game.

Potentially overshadowed by the hitting of Wong-Li and the pitching of Fagan was the defense of Delphia in right field. It shouldn't be. In the second inning the junior made a spectacular catch, grabbing a hard hit fly ball in deep right field on the full run, just getting her glove up in time to snare the ball as it seemed to be zipping over her head.

In the third inning she made another running catch for the second out of the inning and then made the defensive play of the game for the third out, coming in for a soft hit that was dropping quickly. Delphia lunged to make the catch and then completed a full somersault before quickly popping up to show the umpire that the ball was in her glove.

"I was really comfortable out there today," Delphia said. "I was seeing the ball well off the bat. With the overcast skies, this was a perfect day to play softball. It's easier to pick the ball up. Sometimes you'll look up when it's sunny and you'll lose the ball in the sun. But not today, I was seeing the ball right off the bat every time."

Indians sweep Burncoat, Southbridge in doubleheaders to close season in winning fashion



Pioneers punch postseason ticket by beating Bartlett in regular season finale

WEBSTER — In a de facto elimination game for both sides, the Southbridge High varsity baseball team needed to win its regular season finale versus Bartlett High on Wednesday, May 24 to become postseason eligible in the Central Mass. Division 4 district tournament.

And behind the right arm of the Pioneers' Tyler Stoever, who was pitching on one day's rest, Southbridge clawed past the Indians, 4-2, to

finish the regular season an even 10-10. The Pioneers had a chance to reach the postseason last year, but a final game loss sealed their fate as they finished a game shy of qualifying at 9-11.

Stoever, who was on last year's team, put the thought of that loss "in the back of his head" as he was predominately focused on the task at hand in Bartlett.

"I tried to forget about it and get this game," said Stoever. "And I did."

The Indians, meanwhile, dropped to 6-10.

Since they play an 18-game regular season schedule, the loss eliminated Bartlett from reaching the same Central Mass. Division 4 district tournament that the Pioneers will take part in.

"We came in and the goal was districts," said Indians' head coach Jon Way on how his team's season would be looked at. "There are a lot of highlights, [but] we didn't play very well in the middle of the season."

For Southbridge, it is the team's first postseason appearance since 2010.

"We had our ups and downs, but we really grew as a team throughout the year," said first-year head coach Shane Presutti.

"We came together as a team today and that's the best part of it all," added Stoever.

Stoever's complete game performance included allowing two earned runs, surrendering seven hits, striking out eight and walking none. He retired 10 straight batters from the last out in the third inning until the third out in the sixth.

"He throws strikes, didn't walk a single batter. He's got real heart," Presutti said of Stoever, who he didn't even have penciled in as the starting pitcher until Stoever tested his arm when they got to the field.

"I got to the game and I was like, 'I want the ball,'" Stoever recalled.

Even Way had to give props where they were due.

"I think Stoever, he had an unbelievable games coming off one day's rest," the opposition's coach said. "That just goes to show you the type of warrior that kid is. He's one of those kids that when the game's on the line he wants the ball."

Way's pitcher, Tyler Davern, nearly threw just as well as Stoever. Davern tossed a complete game six-hitter, allowing four earned runs, struck out six and walked two.

"Davern threw really well today," said Way. "We just didn't make enough plays to win the game, didn't have the timely hitting and they did — that was the difference."

The Indians struck first in the bottom of the first inning on a Davern sacrifice fly, but the Pioneers battled back with two runs in the top of the third. O'Reimy Santana, who singled, scored on a Rafael Polanco RBI single and Stoever (2 for 4) drove in Edwin Rojas, who had reached on a fielder's choice, with an

RBI single.

Bartlett tied the score at 2-2 in the bottom of the third on Davern's RBI single, but Southbridge gathered the eventual winning run in the top of the fourth.

There, Carlos Escalera singled, stole second and third base, and scored on Santana's sacrifice fly.

The Pioneers added an insurance run in the fifth on a Stoever RBI single, a laser past the first base-

man.

Southbridge then won the game in the seventh when Rojas, the team's shortstop, turned a 6-3 double play by fielding a grounder, hustling over the second base for the force out and throwing to first in time. Polanco then caught a hard-hit ball his way at second base to end it.

"That was the biggest reason why we won today," Presutti said of

the defense, which played errorless ball. "We average a decent amount of errors per game, which is not good, but our outfield was positioned well and our infield was clutch."

Add it all up and the Pioneers are back in the district tournament.

"My first time going in three years," said Stoever. "So many emotions are going through my mind. I love the feeling right now."

CHARLTON — It was a brisk, rainy day on Thursday, May 25, but the bats were hot for the Oxford High varsity softball team when they squared off with Bay Path Regional in the regular season finale for both. The Pirates connected on 10 hits and took advantage of seven Minutemen errors en route to a 15-1 victory after five mercy-rule shortened innings.

"I tell my girls to put the ball in play and then they have to catch it and throw it," Oxford head coach Jamie Hetherman said of the importance of making contact and forcing the issue against the defense. "I tell them to make them make the plays and today that paid off."

The Pirates scored twice in the top of the second inning, eight times in the third and five more times in the fourth to put the game away and establish the 12-run mercy rule after five innings were complete.

In all, the entire Oxford starting nine reached base at least twice. Leadoff hitter Crystal Nelson was 1 for 2 with a trio of walks, while No. 2 batter Karlie Parmenter was 2 for 3 with a pair of walks and four RBI's. Cleanup hitter Kayla Soto was 1 for 1 and reached base her other three times on errors while also driving in two. Amanda Fradsham, batting eighth, was 3 for 4 with a team-leading three runs scored.

Candice Nelson, the Pirates' pitcher, tossed a five-inning complete game, allowing one unearned run on two hits, striking out 11 and walking one.

"Candice was our No. 2 last year and this year she stepped up as our No. 1 and she's up over 100 strikeouts," said Hetherman. "She doesn't walk many people and her ERA is like 2.45. She has a good selection of pitches and I'm excited to watch her pitch in district play."

Oxford has indeed reached the postseason, as they finished 12-8. The Pirates will next embark on the Central Mass. Division 2 district tournament where Hetherman believes that Nelson and the rest of his team, full of upperclassmen and youngsters playing well beyond their years, will be ready to perform at a high level.

"The young girls are veterans now," he said. "I think we're peaking at the right time."

And although Bay Path admittedly didn't play their 'A' game versus Oxford, they are also postseason bound. The Minutemen, playing an 18-game regular season schedule, finished 11-7 and will take part in the Central Mass. Division 3 district tourney.

Bay Path started with Katherine Ryan on the mound and, after two-plus innings, was relieved by Aliya Guillotte. The duo combined to walk 10 batters and hit another, and head

One strong trait that Bay Path — which scored its run when Amanda Schramm crossed home plate on a passed ball — has possessed this season is its resiliency. On two occasions they've played an opponent poorly, only to bounce back the very next day. First,

they lost a 23-1 decision to Worcester Tech before playing them tight during a 2-0 loss a day later. The same scenario occurred recently when they lost to Monty Tech, 16-3, and then fell by a 1-0 count to Monty the following day.

And, although it won't be against Oxford, Carrero is hoping that the Minutemen continue their trend of playing much better a game after struggling, especially since it will be in the district tournament.

"I have every confidence in the world that they'll bounce back," he said. "If history repeats itself we should be very competitive in our district game."

Tower's walk-off hit boosts Rockets by Oxford, 5-4

AUBURN — The Auburn High baseball player that teammates, coaches, friends and fans all like to call "Pee Wee" came up with the biggest hit of the day for the Rockets' varsity team in their stirring 5-4 come-from-behind, extra-inning win over archrival Oxford High on May 24.

Josh "Pee Wee" Tower stroked a single to left field with two outs in the bottom of the eighth inning and teammate Collin Hines scampered home from second base with the winning run.

"I was guessing first pitch fast ball and I got it," Tower, a senior, said. "I hit it hard and it was slicing away from the left fielder. I honestly thought he was going to catch it. When I rounded first and saw that he didn't come up with it, what a great feeling that was."

Delivering against the Pirates for Tower, who finished the day 3 for 4 with two RBI's, was really a matter of unfinished business.

"My whole high school career, up until today, we had never beaten Oxford. We were 0-5 against them coming in to this game," Tower said. "Plus, as my team's No. 3 hitter I felt like I had to deliver in that spot. Getting a pitch like that, and to hit it, and to get a walk-off win, there's no better feeling."

Auburn head coach Eric Swedberg was happy but not surprised his second baseman delivered in that situation.

"That's what a kid that's

going to Franklin Pierce does," Swedberg said. "He's about to become a college baseball player. He needs to do that."

With the score tied, 4-4, with one out in the bottom of the eighth, Hines got on base, singling to right field on a pitch that he literally threw his bat at. He moved to second on a fielder's choice to second base by Steve Saucier.

After Mike Breen hit a popup into foul territory that was caught by Oxford third baseman Colin Ryan, Tower plated Hines with his hit to right field that ticked off the glove of Pirates' left-fielder Justin Tessier.

Another key player in the victory for the Rockets was Breen, who came on in relief of Matt Palmer to start the second inning. Breen finished out the game for Auburn, allowing two runs on three hits while striking out six and not walking a batter.

"Palmer has had a tweak in his shoulder so we had Breen ready," Swedberg said. "He only threw about 50 pitches his last time out so we knew he could throw for a while for us today. He did a great job and he's only a freshman; that's pretty cool. He didn't give up any walks, which is huge, and he threw all his pitches — slider, deuce, change and fastball."

Oxford jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the top of the first inning. Dave Meech and Tessier opened the game with back-to-back singles and they were driven in by back-to-back singles by Joe Grady and Joel

Erickson.

Auburn came right back in the bottom of the first with three runs of its own, to take a 3-2 lead. Saucier led off for the Rockets with a single to left and then stole second. He moved to third on a single by Tower and scored to make it 2-1 on an RBI single by Luke Matthews. Tower then scored to tie the game, 2-2, on an Oxford error, and then Matthews scored to give the Rockets a 3-2 lead on an RBI single by Mike Collins.

The Pirates (12-9) tied the game, 3-3, in the top of the second inning when Michael Bordeaux reached on an Auburn error, stole second and scored on an RBI single by Meech (2 for 4).

Auburn (16-4) re-took the lead, 4-3, in the bottom of the second inning, Hines singling down the right field line, moving to second on a groundout and scoring on an RBI single to left by Tower.

Oxford then tied the game, 4-4, in the top of the fifth inning. Tessier led off with a single to right, advanced to second on an error by the Rockets, went to third on a fielder's choice by Grady and scored on the back end of a delayed double steal.

Leading Auburn's 12 singles hit parade were Tower, Collins and Hines, who all had three hits, as the Rockets now prepare for the Central Mass. Division 3 district tournament.

Oxford finished with seven hits, two each off the bats of Meech, Tessier and Erickson.

"We made a lot of mistakes," Oxford head coach Justin

Richards said in summing up the loss, the Pirates' fourth straight. "We're trying to minimize them. Hopefully we can take a whole lot of positives out of this game and learn from the mistakes we made. We're making fewer mistakes than we have made, but we still have to get better."

"I thought overall we battled pretty well," Richards added. "At the end of the game, when the game was tied, 4-4, they

made more plays than we did. They made every play they're supposed to make and we didn't."

Oxford then lost its season finale to Bay Path Regional, 16-4, to finish the regular season 12-10 before looking to defend their Central Mass. Division 4 district title.

revealed they had yet to meet or get acquainted with the candidate. Selectman Randy Becker said he was confident all the same that Napierata was a worthy choice for the position.



Gobi advocates for regional school transportation

BOSTON – Senator Anne M. Gobi (D-Spencer) has announced a unanimous vote by the Massachusetts Senate to increase regional school transportation reimbursement funding during Tuesday's budget debate. The amendment, filed by Senator Gobi, raises the reimbursement rate to 72 percent of full funding, at a total of \$62,271,000, a \$1.25 million increase over FY17 funding.

"I appreciate the unanimous support I received from my Senate colleagues for this amendment," said

Senator Gobi. "They understand how critical funding is for our regional school districts and how it helps the overall school budgets."

Regional school districts often have higher student transportation costs since they cover larger geographic regions. There are currently 58 regional school districts in Massachusetts with 171 member schools. The transportation money that is not reimbursed by the state comes directly out of their school budgets. Senator Gobi has advocated each year for an increase in funding with a goal of 100% reimbursement.

The House of Representatives approved \$62,021,000 and the two amounts will be negotiated by the conference committee.

Amendment blocks use of EBT funds for marijuana purchase

BOSTON — State Senator Ryan C. Fattman

(R-Webster) announced his amendment banning the use of welfare funds on purchasing recreational marijuana has passed in the State Senate's budget.

"This amendment is an example of good government and our state working to protect taxpayers," said Fattman. "In my time in the legislature I have worked to reduce illicit purchases using cash assistance on items such as alcohol, tobacco, lottery tickets, and not lose sight of spending tax dollars responsibly."

"An Amendment on cash assistance expenditures" was passed successfully Thursday in the State Senate's budget, and bans the use of cash assistance on recreational marijuana purchases starting July 1, 2018. The start date of the amendment coincides with the anticipated beginning of recreational marijuana licenses being issued in Massachusetts.

Similar amendment language also passed the House of Representatives last month during budget deliberations, and the amendment will now move forward to be signed by Governor Charlie Baker.
