# New bylaw takes aim at problem properties

WEBSTER – Webster selectmen are exploring a new approach to addressing “problem properties” that would hold landlords accountable for questionable or illegal activity at a home or residence.

Town Administrator Doug Willardson presented a draft of a new landlord bylaw to selectmen on July 10 utilizing framework from a few California communities and the town of

Framingham to produce a regulation that would make landlords more accountable if their properties become the source of periodical illegal activity.

“The purpose was to create a process or make it clear what the process is for people who have nuisances or have continual drug or criminal activities at their rental properties or even at their residential properties,” Willardson said. “I sent this to our attorney.

His first concern was you can do most of this without a bylaw. A lot of these things are either in the state law or the state sanitary code. Through our discussions, he said (selectmen) may want to do it just to send a message or to clarify what the town process will be.”

Selectman Randy Becker seemed to show support for the concept and said he believed it would simplify the regulations to make them easier to reference and

enforce.

“I like the idea of having everything concise and in one bylaw because there’s a myriad of so many different laws and regulations. Having it in one (document) I think is a great thing to do,” Becker said.

Other selectmen showed interest in the concept although there were concerns from selectmen about one particular part of the bylaw that would put the burden of payment for exces-

sive emergency responses to any property in particular on the landlord. Willardson said this was his favorite part of the bylaw due to its targeting properties that require constant police presence due to illegal activities. However, when it comes to other emergency responders Willardson admitted there could be underlying issues with that particular regulation.

“Our attorney was concerned that there might

be a legitimate reason for them to be responding all the time. His example was a medical emergency. So, we can potentially change that to a police response or take it out altogether,” Willardson said.

The town administrator added that he worked with the Webster Police Department to produce a list of known problem properties in

# Changes made to solar array agreement

DUDLEY – Slight changes have been made to a deal between the town of Dudley and the owners of a solar array project as one of the big players in the partnership has backed out of the agreement set in 2015.

Town administrator Greg Balukonis informed selectmen on July 10 that Seaboard Solar backed out of a project that included three ground-mounted solar arrays on West Dudley Road. Balukonis said he has worked for six months to iron out the deal, which was initially approved by the planning board two years ago.

“I’ve been working with the project owner, which is AMP Solar. The board (of selectmen) signed a payment in lieu of taxes agreement about a year ago with Seaboard Solar. In that period of time Seaboard has backed off on the project. They remain the land owner, but there’s been a new developer that has been brought in called solar Massachusetts Project Management and, more importantly, there’s been a company that’s been involved called a project owner which is AMP, a company out of Canada.”

With the changes in the partnership Balukonis

# Celebration set to dedicate Civil War monument

DUDLEY – The Dudley Historical Commission is ready to officially dedicate a new monument erected to acknowledge six local men who lost their lives during the Civil War.

The commission has announced a Saturday, Aug. 12 celebration date for the dedication of the new civil war monument, which has received blessings from town officials and will include music and a daylong Civil War camp reenactment to add some historical context to the day. Historical Commission chair Edward Bazinet unveiled the plans before the board of selectmen on June 10 and said he is hoping for it to be a great day celebrating Dudley and American history while presenting the public with a look at the newest addition to the Dudley town common.

“We just hope it’s really sunny. There will be things for families to come and see. Bring a lunch and a blanket and sit around. Spend the afternoon and there will be a service commemorating the 155th anniversary of the death of Frank Corbin who was a ‘Dudley Boy’. He died in the Civil War. They’re going to do that service at Corbin Cemetery at 4 p.m. and then they will march up on Corbin Road. It will be very similar to what goes on for Memorial Day for us. Then we’ll have the 4:30 p.m. dedication of the new monument,” Bazinet said.

The Grey Whisker Pickers are expected to play at the Black Tavern that afternoon as well following the presentation of the monument. Bazinet explained that there’s more than just a new piece of granite to behold however. The work on the monument also includes a facelift to the town common flag pole and the installation of a piece of the façade from the Stevens Mill which was recently removed from the Main Street area of town. A series of interpretive plaques will also be unveiled while the monument itself, described as a granite bench, will display the names of six Dudley men who were imprisoned as one of the harshest prison camps in the Civil War, the Andersonville Prison Camp.

# Bysiewicz joins Webster Finance Committee

WEBSTER – Webster’s Finance Committee has a new member thanks to the Board of Selectmen who approved appointing Laurie Bysiewicz to the committee on July 10, the third and expected final such appointment by the board until the town’s charter revision is seen through.

Bysiewicz is no stranger to Webster politics, especially its financial sta-

tus, having been one of the most vocal attendees of Webster’s annual town meeting in May when budget numbers came to the table. She brings over 20 years of business experience to the table and touted her specialty with company and corporation budgets when discussing her credentials with selectmen.

“I create, manage, and oversee multimillion dollars budgets for major corporations. I have a lot of experience and I do have a lot of passion around

spending or not spending money as the case may be and wanting to make sure that we’re doing the right thing for the community as a whole,” Bysiewicz said.

While selectmen unanimously approved Bysiewicz’s appointment, save for selectman Mark Dowgiewicz, who was absent from the meeting, one selectman, Donald Bourque, took a moment to address Bysiewicz commentary during the May town meeting. Bourque said he believed Bysiewicz’s

statements that day implied her interest in leaving the town concerned him, but acknowledged her as a vocal and impassioned speaker.

Bysiewicz said she does not plan to leave Webster but rather her comments served to show her concern with the financial situation in the community.

“I’ve lived in Webster since 1989 so

# Little squawking over chicken plan

OXFORD – Since he’ll only have eight chickens, it’s pretty likely nobody’s going to flock to Old Worcester Road for Kevin Johnson’s eggs. But he’ll get the chance to supply his own family with breakfast in a time-honored manner, after selectmen unanimously approved a permit for the birds Tuesday.

Animal Control Officer Kelly Flynn said she visited the neighborhood “and most of his neighbors are fine with Johnson having chickens as long as they are kept in a coop/pen and there are no roosters.” One family did object;

William and Sharon Milosh sent a long email raising various concerns that Flynn addressed. They tended to lump into three groups: disease risk, wandering birds, and noise/smells.

Salmonella “can be deadly to the very young and the elderly – especially those with weakened immune system,” the Miloshes’ letter stated. “I am 76 years old and have a condition that has caused my immune system to be compromised. My wife is 66 years old and has been disabled for seven years with a chronic lung disease that makes her vulnerable to airborne diseases. The neighbors on the other side of Johnson’s home are

also elderly and retired.”

“Most diseases and parasites that are present in chickens as species-specific,” Flynn responded. Humans can catch a few from them, most commonly salmonella, but all are also transmitted by several other animals. In chickens, they require “direct contact with the chickens and their immediate surroundings,” and are easily controlled by routine cleaning, disposal of waste, hand-washing and, in the case of salmonella, by buying the chicks from a certified disease-free dealer, she said.

Selectmen made that the only condition of Johnson’s permit, after

Chairman Dennis Lamarche said he had thought about the health issue “a lot,” but was satisfied with Flynn’s explanation.

Regarding noise, Flynn noted, “They do squawk once in a while, but they’re quiet animals for the most part.”

That was a point two selectmen -- Lamarche and Meaghan Troiano -- reinforced, noting they both have chickens in the neighborhoods and have never had a problem with them.

“I never hear the things,” Lamarche said. “It’s pretty good. I get free eggs

# Cactus enthusiast shares love for unique plant life

CHARLTON — When amateur gardeners and plant enthusiasts consider what to add to their floral arrangements and homes it's safe to say the cactus may not be the first planet that comes to mind. Don't tell that to Cliff Livernois however. The local cactus and succulent expert paid a visit to Charlton Federated Church to share his love for the plant and educate locals on the growth and display of some of his favorite plant species.

Livernois is no stranger to the Charlton area, presenting his plants throughout the region and recently becoming a vendor during Charlton's Old Home Day events. Livernois has grown succulents and cacti for 45 years and said that even today he still learns new things about the plants each year and enjoys sharing his knowledge and love for the plant life with those who will listen.

"I try to show the wide variety of colors and shapes of them and how they can be presented in different types of dish gardens and displays," Livernois said. "I explain how to grow these plants, water them, and the soil to use and how to fertilize and propagate them. They're a lot of fun to grow. I enjoy collecting them and I do these presentations because I've started to sell them and it's just a hobby at this stage."

Livernois saw his first cactus plant in his teenage years and immediately

felt an appreciation for the unique species. Livernois brought along countless examples of succulents and cacti for viewers to appreciate and while some may immediately think of the big spiky plants in the desert when they picture

a cactus, Livernois said the stereotypes often make them underappreciated plants.

"I love the unusual look to them. Some are crested and they have really incredible flowers. There's a lot of diversity to these plants. Part of the fun of this hobby is teaching people and even learning myself about the plants and where they come from. Some of these plants are very easy to grow while others need certain care. Nowadays you can go on the internet and find out a lot of information on these plants," Livernois said. "I just think that they're dramatic looking and they have a sculptural quality to them. Some of them look like they could be coral under the water and others look right at home in the desert. They're unusual and diverse with hundreds of species that are available. Their colors and shapes are fantastic."

Livernois revealed that over the years he has experimented with cross planting to create different hybrid plants that are unlike anything he, or others, have seen before. It is these plants he is most proud of as they show the unique and awe inspiring potential of the cactus and succulent plant variety.

"When you hybridize plants, you get slightly different varieties and that's fun too because you never know exactly what you're going

to get," Livernois said. "I have one plant that has a lot of color that I more or less by chance grew from seed. I call it Judy's Fourth of July after my wife because this time of year, when it's starting to grow, the fresh growth goes from a reddish-yellow color to a more precise red and it looks sort of like a firework. It's a totally unique plant and I am the only one who has it."

Some may still fail to see the beauty hidden within the cactus and succulent plants, but Livernois is hoping he inspired at least a few locals to incorporate the plants into their arrangements going forward. To some these plants may seem like an outlier, but for Livernois they are the most beautiful plants on the planet earth.

# Project begins though deed still in limbo

WEBSTER -- On Wednesday, the old Ray Street Armory started what many hope is its transformation to a new life, as crews in protective garb went in to start removing its asbestos.

The work is a precursor to Christopher Robert's project of establishing a museum to one of Webster's founding figures, mill pioneer Samuel Slater. To him, it's a logical outgrowth of what he's doing over at Indian Ranch, his key business, where he's "in expansion mode" that includes a bigger performance area and a new Samuel Slater Restaurant.

"I have a vision that goes well beyond the Slater Museum," he said. "I want it to be not just a museum, but entertainment. I want to have children say 'Let's go to the museum, it's really neat over

there'."

Beyond that, Robert said one goal is to make it a hub of "a New England, or at least southern Massachusetts, museum area, where everybody feeds everybody else." The region has several, including Grafton's Willard Clock Museum, Southbridge's Optical Museum, Old Sturbridge Village, and various historical society collections, and Robert hopes to include what he dubs "teaser rooms" in which other museums can display samples of what they have to entice visitors to go there.

"In a 50 mile radius, there's a lot of stuff that helped build the country from a manufacturing point of view," he added.

At the moment, the work is entirely at Robert's own risk, Town Manager Doug Willardson said. Although town meeting and selectmen approved the idea, it still has a hurdle to jump before the path is clear. When the state turned the Armory over to Webster in 2005, the deed had a restriction that it be "used solely as a community youth facility."

To correct that, Sen. Ryan Fattmann and Rep. Joe McKenna filed House bill 3781, which both Robert and Willardson expect to pass easily. It'll just take time.

Because the Boys & Girls Club opted for a site in Dudley, the Armory stayed vacant, so the town started storing vehicles and other items in it.

"The building's in bad shape" due to those years of neglect, with many broken windows, rust, paint, non-working electrical and heating system and other issues, Robert said. "It's deteriorating at a very rapid rate. The structure of the building is great, but everything else is a disaster."

Willardson agreed, noting "It's a very sturdy building, a solid shell. As far as the core envelope, it'll last a long time." Despite its vacancy, he said it hasn't had any significant police or fire-related issues because it has been secure.

Roughly the same era saw the National Guard turn over several old armories to their host towns. A scan of various news reports online shows some have since been converted into a wide range of uses, from housing and offices (Woburn), a community center (Southbridge), an arts center (Concord), business incubators and more. But some remain idle or worse; in New Bedford, for example, the armory has been vacant since 2003 and had a fire in 2009 that the state had yet to repair,


according to a 2014 story at www.southcoasttoday.com. Some have sparked fights over whether to demolish them, as in Marlborough, where a developer was denied permission to do so in 2011, but the armory was still unused as of last year.

The issue dates back a long time. According to a compilation of old state laws available at Google Books website, the Acts of 1878, Chapter 265, Section 92, specifically stated that armories "shall not be used for any purpose whatever other than the legitimate uses of the commands occupying them" except "by approval of the commander-in-chief" (that is, the governor). As the Guard came to find it didn't need as many armories, it sold them to the towns -- sometimes for nominal amounts, other times for significant sums that were later reimbursed by the state itself.

Willardson said Robert brought forward the museum idea in January and town meeting voted to support it this spring. He didn't think the town was likely to put many demands on its reuse.

"I'm more concerned about him being overly anxious that about the town pushing him to do anything," Willardson added.

Dayshawn is an affectionate twelve-year-old boy of African-American and Caucasian descent. He has a unique personality and is a curious, imaginative, playful young boy. Dayshawn enjoys making up stories as part of an ongoing role play. He also enjoys coloring, art projects, playing with his toy cars and trucks, and listening to music. Dayshawn is an animal lover and is very caring and gentle towards them.

Dayshawn has some cognitive delays and his program staff believes the delays were caused by developmental trauma.

Dayshawn is also waiting on a departmental evaluation for a possible Autism Spectrum diagnosis as well. Dayshawn does best given a highly structured day and a routine schedule. Dayshawn excels when his environment is calm and relaxing. He loves to be outside exploring new environments but has a harder time when there is a lot of noise or activity around him. He can sometimes show difficulty with sensory skills and benefits from the sensory room at his program. Despite these challenges, Dayshawn has demonstrated a tremendous capacity to learn as an eager and willing student. Dayshawn reads well and is also a good speller. He is often the first child selected to attend activities because of his outstanding positive behavior. Dayshawn does tend to get along better with male peers but he working on improving socialization with female peers as well. He loves having one-on-one time with adults and receiving their positive attention.

Legally freed for adoption, Dayshawn is ready to be placed in a family who could provide him with a lot of one-on-one assistance and is also willing to participate in therapeutic services with him. Dayshawn would be a joyful addition to a single or two-parent family with a nurturing female caregiver and one or two siblings. He also has two biological siblings he maintains contact with every couple of months.

# River Park becomes home to music, crafts and food

WEBSTER — Many years ago, there were probably farms along the French River interspersed with the mills. Last Wednesday, that tradition returned, in a sense, as the first Webster's Wednesdays Market set up its stalls at French River Park.

"People have been saying they want a market, and we thought we'd do

it with the concerts," said organizer Carole Marchand. "We've got different vendors coming on different weeks, and hope to have a good season."

The first one was mostly a craft-oriented event, with a few people providing fabric wares, one offering his photos, and another her books and postcards. Alongside a table of her handmade soap, Marchand brought the fresh vegetables from

area farms, but the farmers themselves will hopefully be attending as their crops ripen. She noted many of them already have market commitments and are watching to see how well this one does.

It runs every Wednesday evening, before and during the summer concert series, until August 30. Opening day coincided with the Pulaski Brass Band show, a perennial audi-

ence-pleaser especially among seniors, but upcoming days will feature student musicians, tribal belly dancers, and various musicians from across the spectrum. They are Full Throttle (7/19), HellCat Maggie (7/26), James Keyes (8/2), Mark Mandeville and Raianne Richard (8/9), Jumpin' Juba (8/23), and a Back-to-School Kidfest (8/30). August 16's performer is still unlisted on the website.

"We've tried to listen to what people are saying and give them what they want," said concert organizer Jules Emerson of the Recreation Committee. "We're trying to have different elements in the market and different performers."

One of those different elements was Christian Letham, a local photographer whose images are intended "to get people to stop and look around."

He said 90 percent of his photos are from within Webster, many of them little natural things that people might normally overlook — flowers from a vacant lot, the bubbles of dew on a leaf, picturesque details of buildings, peo-

ple in action. Although he went to school for graphic design and illustration, he spent 20 years in the business world until "a couple years ago, things just started catching my eye."

"This whole idea [of the market] is a great idea. It was good to expand the music series. It's nice to see Webster doing extra things," Letham said.

Beyond that, he noted events like this help localize the economy and keep the community alive.

"People are so hooked on bigger things, but the same people complain about downtown being 'empty,'" he added. "If you don't spend your money at local businesses, they won't exist. A buck more to support a local business is not much."

Down the walkway from Letham was Dudley author Sky Boivin, who said she heard about the market on Facebook two days earlier, when she was invited to participate by Booklovers' Gourmet owner Deb Horan.

"I live in Dudley, not so far, so I thought I'd give it a try," she said.

Boivin said her work

is inspired by "pretty much anything." Like Letham's, a lot of it comes from nature, but with a strong touch of "different life things." One poem, for example, commemorated the suicide of someone her daughter knew in school.

Beyond her, a woman was selling T-shirts, and another had various knitted goods. Across the grassy field where the band played, a third woman had homemade cheesecake and said she'd be bringing other baked goods next time.

"One thing I really love about these concerts is how they bring people together from every walk of life," said Recreation Committee member Kelly Guay.

"This is a pretty low-key [market]," Marchand added. "The rules are pretty lax. We're hoping we get so many people that next year the rules have to get stricter. All we can do is keep trying things like this and see what takes."

## Entire length of route affected

BRIMFIELD — With construction underway on the Route 20 lane reduction project, reactions remain mixed among residents and town officials.

The stretch of Route 20 between New Holland Road and the Sturbridge town line has seen several major accidents in recent years, prompting state officials to approve a project reducing the road from four lanes to two lanes. Many residents and officials laud the project for its promise to improve safety, but others fear significantly increased traffic congestion, especially during the three annual Brimfield Antiques Show weeks.

The roughly \$4 million project will include the additions of turn lanes, passing lanes in both directions, breakdown lanes, and designated spaces for bicyclists and pedestrians. The road currently has a 55-miles per hour speed limit, and anyone who has frequented it during peak travel periods knows there is essentially no room for error when passing.

MassDOT officials described the turn lane additions as major safety enhance-

ments, citing several recent accidents. Among them was the 2014 wreck that took the lives of brothers Dylan Riel, age 4, and Jayce Garcia, age 1. Their aunt, Holland's Suzanne Hardy, was behind the wheel that day on Route 20 eastbound. A truck was stopped ahead of her in the left lane, waiting to turn, and Hardy moved into the right lane to go around it but lost control and caromed into a guardrail.

State and local officials said the accident — and several other recent wrecks on Route 20 — could have been prevented with a safer road layout. With the addition of turn lanes, vehicles will be able to safely exit the flow of traffic and not obstruct vehicles behind them.

"This road was not originally designed to be four lanes, and it can be very dangerous," said Brimfield Police Chief Charles Kuss. "When you're stopped to make a left turn or your vehicle breaks down, you end up obstructing traffic. This project will make it a lot safer."

Kuss was originally skeptical about the project, but he wound up supporting it because of the safety improvements. Others remain opposed to the lane reduction, describing traffic congestion as the main reason. Even with four

lanes, stretches of Route 20 east and west of the town center sometimes get backed up during the antique shows, as well as in the summer months when drivers use the road as a bypass to the Mass Pike.

Residents fear that the congestion will be much worse once the lanes are cut in half.

"The last thing we need is to spend this money to make the road smaller. Nowhere else in the country are they making roads smaller — this idea makes no sense," said David Cheney, a lifelong Brimfield resident.

Cheney and other residents feel the money could be better spent in other ways to relieve congestion in the area.

"I don't understand why they don't open an exit from the turnpike onto Route 19 in Warren," Cheney added. "That way the congestion wouldn't be nearly as bad."

With the implementation of on-road electronic tolling on the Mass Pike, residents and officials throughout the area have suggested adding exits. Others feel the amount of traffic serviced by new

exits wouldn't justify the costs of constructing the exit ramps.

Senator Anne Gobi attended the public hearing for the Route 20 lane reduction project last year, and she has helped residents stay informed as the project neared.

"I offered testimony relative to concerns I had, including the effect on traffic during the Brimfield Flea Market days, the effect backups will have on secondary roads, and people traveling through residential neighborhoods to avoid Route 20," Gobi said. "The plans also refer to an area for bicycle travel, though it is not called a bike lane. As a bicycle rider, I would not want to be riding on Route 20."

Other local and state officials expressed their concerns as well. Some area leaders agree that the road is unsafe and needs to be reduced to two lanes, while others assert that deficient and distracted drivers are the reason for most crashes and the road does not need to be changed.

# Science madness takes over community center

OXFORD — Two guys walking around Oxford Community Center in white lab coats this week really are “Mad Scientists.” But they aren’t conducting horrible experiments on the children, they’re giving them hands-on experiences with the fun side of science.

Specifically, over the course

of this week, they’re introducing them to a little of the technology behind secret agent films: lasers and mirrors, voice-distortion, fingerprinting, basics of tracking, the secrets we throw in the trash, etc. But if I told you everything, they’d have to kill you.

“They” in this case are “Professor Presto”— known to the real world as Gary Bessette — and “Professor Bugman” —

really Bryan Man, who jokes he’s “too poor to afford another ‘n’” in his name.

“I could have done a lot of other things that made more money,” Man said, “but the reason I took this job is I absolutely love to do it.”

You can see that as he plays with the microphone hooked up to distortion technology — including dropping sci-fi references that are probably

far too old for his grade 1-6 audience, such as mimicking Doctor Who’s Daleks. But they had no problem being just as weird on the mic, creating the soundtrack for their peers, who played games trying to figure out where sets of tiny mirrors are sending their little red laser lights.

One of those was Paighton Samia, whose mother Bonnie was also present. Although Paighton didn’t want to talk, Bonnie did, saying she homeschools her daughter, just as she did an older child.

“This is socialization for her and extra [learning] outside the school year. She’s very hands-on,” Samia said. “I always see what they’re doing here. I put her right in and welcome whatever they want to bring.”

Community Center Director Stacy Barr said this is the first time they’ve had programs from this particular company, and the second summer with a hands-on science program.

“If it’s successful and gets good reviews, we’ll continue with the program,” Barr said, noting the center chooses them basically by “trial and error.” Some haven’t worked, but some “run like wildfire,” and they’re always available to the participants in the all-day program (for an extra fee), although kids can just take Mad Science by itself.

Bessette said Mad Science was born about 30 years ago in Montreal, when two high school students saw the elementary school kids weren’t getting science experiments in class. To solve that, they put

together a few and took them around the city. Since then, it’s expanded into every province, every US state, and several other countries, he said.

“The kids are getting science in school, but not getting the hands-on science,” mostly because of budget cuts and emphasis on testing, Bessette said.

He’s been with Mad Science four years, after a career as a production manager for a theater company. “I’ve put in more hours with Mad Science than I ever put in with the theater company, and I love it.”

Bessette noted the local offices (theirs is in Springfield) have “a lot of leeway” in implementing and even designing programs, provided the home office accepts the ideas. One of the relatively few limits is that they be age-appropriate for pre-kindergarten through fifth grade. But he noted they’re starting to talk about designing programs for older kids, since budgets are often cutting science at that level too.

This week’s “Secret Agent Lab” is the first of two science program weeks. The second, from Aug. 7-10, is called “Red Hot Robots,” and will be geared for grades 3-6. For \$170, kids will get to build their own small robot and develop a basic understanding of simple machines and robotics.

the community, although the department couldn’t produce an organized list of the top 20 properties of concern specifically but rather an overall look at properties that have produced numerous police

calls over the years. Properties on Pleasant Street, East Main Street, Main Street, Prospect Street, Maynard Avenue, Negus Street, Lake Street, the Webster/Sturbridge Family Campground on Douglas Road, and the McDonalds restaurant were all included on that list.

Deputy Chief Michael Shaw took a moment to address

McDonalds specifically being on the list explaining that the business is a hot spot for loitering due to its accessible wi-fi network.

“With McDonalds, they have a lot of issues there with the kids at night. They have wi-fi and people just go there and hang out. I know in years past I’ve reached out to the owners

and tried to meet with them and try to work something out and they were unresponsive,” Shaw said.

Selectmen chose not to take action on the proposed bylaw for the time being in order to give selectman Mark Dowgiewicz, a staunch proponent of such a regulation and who was absent from the July

10 meeting, a chance to have his say on the matter. If the bylaw is passed by selectmen it will require approval from taxpayers at a town meeting to take effect.

said he and the other entities had to recalculate and restate the recitals about who is who with this project and who has responsibility over what throughout the process.

“I’ve worked with them on all of the changes,” said Balukonis. “There are a couple of other items that, as you look at the agreement, got changed that are particularly noteworthy.”

Among those changes is the size of

the project. The panels were initially expected to provide around 4.5 megawatts of power. Now the plan calls for around 4.1 megawatts due to the acreage on side being unable to accompany the number of panels needed for the larger number. The project timeline has also shifted. Panels were supposed to be installed by the end of September, which did not happen. Since then however the on-site work has been completed. All that was left was for the restate PILOT agreement to be pushed through.

One thing that won’t change according to Balukonis is the town’s financial

benefit from hosting the solar arrays.

“The town will still average about \$61,385 a year for 20 years for a total of \$1,227,687 over the life of the project,” said Balukonis who noted the town will reclaim the land after 20 years’ time.

“The land that’s being used to generate power at some point will come back to the town and the town will have the opportunity to put that to use as it sees fit.”

Balukonis admitted that termination of the plan was explored, but this would have cost the companies involved over \$55,168 as part of the PILOT agreement.

Balukonis ensured selectmen that regardless of any further changes with this project the PILOT agreement is structure to be grandfathered in even if ownership or any other aspect of the partnership currently in place is shifted to a new entity.

“If the players change at some point in the future this agreement says that it’s binding on all future parties. So, it doesn’t automatically terminate as a result of new people becoming involved,” Balukonis said.

I've had many an opportunity to move away if I didn't like the town," Bysiewicz stated. "There are times when I don't like some of the practices that we have, which is why I want to start getting engaged and seeing if there is an opportunity for me to help either understand what drives some of the decisions or help be an influence in some of those decisions - I was very passionate and there were some things that I was very unhappy with the night of the town meeting so I think it's a fair question."

Selectmen debated the length of the term of Bysiewicz service on the finance committee.

Committee Chair Earl Gabor suggested selectmen appoint Bysiewicz for only two years opposed to the normal three-year term of past appointees.

"We're trying to stagger the appointments. Normally (the selectmen) approve three-year appointments but because they've already approved two appointments for three-years we'd like to have this appointment be for two years," Gabor told selectmen.

The selectmen agreed, approving Bysiewicz for a two-year term but remained unsure if changing the term length was within their power. Town Administrator Doug Willardson said he would consult town council and if the two-year term was not allowed

selectmen could revise the appointment to be the normal three-year length.

Selectmen previously appointed Nick Adamopoulos and Kiel Becker to the Finance Committee in February of this year. The two appointees are serving three-year terms on the committee and were one of three candidates interviewed that month for consideration. The board of selectmen, under the current town charter, holds the ability to appoint up to five candidates to the Finance Committee. With the appointment of Bysiewicz only one of those seats remains open with selectmen stating there is no intention to fill the final seat before the charter revision is completed.

once in a while."

In practice, hens make noise when laying eggs (usually in the morning), if they feel trapped or threatened, and when personal squabbles with other hens happen. But all of those comprise a small percentage of their time, and the noise doesn't carry far. Roosters are generally much more vocal, but Johnson's request specifically stated he doesn't want one.

In stating his case, Johnson argued that he "took care of birds with my grandfather for a long time" as a youth. Regarding smell and waste, he said he has already contacted a local hauler to take it to the Webster transfer station weekly, and Flynn recommended designating a metal or plastic barrel for it.

Troiano noted chickens do occasionally escape, but don't wander too far.

"There seems as though there's a significant distance from the coop to where the [neighbor's] house is," but to be safe, she urged him to "make sure the cage is adequately secured."

"If he meets all the requirements as outlined, it should not be an issue," Selectman John Saad added.

Officially, Oxford now has five households with chicken permits, although that doesn't include the properties that have more than five acres, since state law exempts agricultural uses on them from most local oversight. Oxford Zoning Bylaws are actually more lenient: they specifically state that "agriculture, horticulture, floriculture and viticulture" are by-right uses in all four residential districts. Associated roadside stands "for sale of products primarily produced on the land under five acres on which the facility is located" are by-right in two of them (Rural Residential and Suburban), but prohibited in the other two.

State law does require the local animal inspector to visit all properties owning chickens and other farm animals annually to ensure they follow animal health and other relevant laws.

Selectman Paul Joseph, an avid history buff, took a moment during the July 10 meeting to urge citizens new and old to take the time to be a part of the event stressing the importance of not only the history associated with the monument, but the sense of community such events allow locals to embrace.

"People should know that the newest monument commemorates the six Dudley residents who were incarcerated at the notorious Andersonville. You take Guantanamo Bay, you take the North Vietnamese prison camp that Senator John McCain barely survived, and none of them were as or are as harsh as Andersonville at that time. There was no agreement like we have today. There was no code of conduct. There

were no obligations," Joseph said.

"Whether you're a lifelong resident of Dudley or a newcomer to Dudley you can not escape the fact that you live here and you have the opportunity to establish your roots and give your children roots, but also give them wings by being educated and understanding the past. Even if you're a recent arrival these six people (on the monument) are part of your roots because you're a resident of Dudley."

Bazinet confirmed that Aug. 12 will be the date for the big celebration with different activities spread throughout the day and the dedication at 4:30 p.m.

"It looks great and it's going to be so much more exciting," Bazinet said after receiving what was described as a "heartly" approval from selectmen to officially schedule the event for next month.



## If it's too good to be true...

A variety of financial fraud "scams" continue to occur frequently in our area. Within the last week, three of them were brought to my attention. People can be asked to send money to various locations or provide personal or bank information. These can take place in person, on-line, over the phone, or

by mail. As a result, people may be out large sums of money. I wanted to once again provide everyone with some information on these illegal activities.

Money and identity scams have been occurring for many years. Those responsible prey on unsuspecting individuals, in particular the elderly. Their goal is to obtain either quick cash or other personal information, such as bank account numbers. Armed with this documentation, the criminal can commit identity theft and access your finances. Some scams will inform the victim they have won a prize or that they are eligible for some gift or benefit. They will ask the victim to provide personal information. This information can then be used to open accounts or conduct other identity theft crimes.

One local resident recently agreed to sell items on line. After settling on a price, they were sent a check for a total far in excess of the actual price. The scammer hopes people will send back the balance of funds before the check is discovered to be false.

Another is certainly concerning. People have received telephone calls from scammers claiming to be police or court officials. The victims are told such things as they have been chosen for Jury Duty but had failed to show, they had not paid a bill or fine, or may owe money to the IRS. The victims are told there is a warrant for their arrest. They are asked for personal information, such as social security numbers, and/or bank or credit card information. They may also be asked to send pre-paid debit cards to a particular location. Rarely, if ever, are people legitimately asked for sensitive information over the phone or by email. Most government offices, or financial institutions, will contact you by mail or deal with you in person when they have the opportunity. Do not trust any of this business over the phone.

Be particularly concerned if you receive a phone call or e-mail telling you a relative or friend has been arrested. These are most often based in a foreign country. Elderly victims are frequently targets of this type of activity. They can be fooled into believing their grandchild is in trouble. The suspects ask for bail money to be wired to them in order to get the person out of jail. This is most likely a hoax. Never send money just based on this type of contact. Be sure to notify family members or the police for assistance.

It is best not to conduct business transactions unless you are sure of the people and places you are dealing with. This includes transactions on-line. Our station parking lot and lobby are designated areas to conduct on line business if it is needed. If you receive unexpected requests for money or other personal information, chances are it is a scam. Be very cognizant of these occurrences and protect your personal information and report anything suspicious to the proper authorities.

Striper fishing at the canal exploded with action this past week. Stripers in the 50 pound class were common among area anglers. A couple of local anglers hauled in a pair of

fish should keep large schools of bass and bluefish around for some time. Keeping commercial fisherman away from some

50 pound + fish and had them weighed in at Jerry's Bait & Tackle shop in Milford this past week. Mike Daniels hooked into a monster bass, but after fighting the fish for a while the huge bass made a final run and snapped the anglers St Croix Mojo rod in half. He quickly grabbed his Lami glass rod and immediately hooked into another monster bass which he landed using an Al Gags bait.

It weighed in at 55 pounds and measured 51 1/2 inches. It took 1 hour 10 minutes to land the huge fish.

Navigating the rocks along the canal are not easy and every year some angler is seriously hurt. The slippery rocks during a low tide are often hard to navigate, and I am surprised that more accidents are not realized every year.

The second steeper was caught by "Manny" and weighed in at a cool 59 pounds and measured 52 1/2 inches! Being at the right place at the right time is the key to success. This week's photos courtesy of Jerry's Bait & Tackle in Milford.

Large schools of porgies are being spotted in many areas of Massachusetts & Rhode Island waters. The huge schools of bait

areas of the bay in both states is paying off big time.

Point Judith area does not seem to have a large population of bluefish in the area as in past years. Normally during my fishing expeditions I would observe large schools of bluefish feeding on bait fish, but in the last couple of years they have been absent during my fishing expeditions. The Snug Harbor report also mentioned bluefish numbers being down.

Fluke fishing is spotty for anglers fishing in Rhode Island waters, and it is no wonder after watching trawlers dragging the waters around the Point Judith area every day. Fluke fishing is fair around the Block Island area, but more fluke did move into the South County area providing some better fishing. Sea bass fishing is also strong in most areas of Rhode Island and Massachusetts. The limit on seabass in Rhode Island is three fish daily until September, when the daily bag limit will increase to six fish. Striper fishing exploded with action this past week at Block Island.

Many 30 to 40 pound fish were being caught daily at Block last week. Fishing with live eels is producing most of

the big fish. Tons of bait fish are being observed by anglers, which are drawing in numerous other species of fish like yellow fin tuna at the Dump and Canyons. Bluefin catches have been light to date.

Last week's shark tournament held annually by Snug Harbor Marina had a 235 pound Mako in the lead. Eating Mako shark is great table fare, and has the texture and taste of swordfish. Some say it is better than swordfish! It is available at some local fish markets, but can sometimes be hard to find.

Recent "NO Trespassing" signs at the Linwood Mill complex area in Whitinsville have raised concern by numerous anglers. The area is a favorite

spot for anglers to load and unload their small car top boats to do some fishing, as well as shore fishermen enjoying a few hours of fishing with family and friends. Hopefully access can be restored back to the area soon. I will try to find out more on the posted signs at Linwood Pond in the next few days.

The next 3-D shoot at the Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club will be held on Aug. 20 this year. The shoot is open to the public. A chicken barbecue is also planned for the event, which is open to the public. More on the shoot in the coming weeks.

## July is National Wild Blueberry Month

## Legislation seeks felony charges when officers are in jeopardy

BOSTON — On Tuesday, July 11 Representative Paul K. Frost (R-Auburn) provided testimony before the Joint Committee on the Judiciary on House Bill 3053, An Act protecting police officers. The legislation seeks to make assault and battery on a police officer while in performance of their duties a felony charge, as opposed to its current status as a misdemeanor.

H.3053 was filed by Representative Frost along with his colleagues Senator Michael Moore (D-Millbury), Representative Kate Campanale (R-Leicester) and Representative Timothy Whelan (R-Brewster), in response to the tragic loss of Auburn Police Officer Ronald Tarentino Jr. on May 22, 2016, who was shot and killed during a traffic stop. The killer was a known criminal who had two prior arrests for assaulting police officers.

At the hearing in the State House, Representative Frost was joined by members of Officer Tarentino's family, father Ron Sr. and his sister

Caitlin Tarentino. Also present were a number of law enforcement personnel strongly supporting the changes proposed by the bill.

Frost commented, "The men and women in Blue are out there every day and night

protecting us from harm. It is incumbent upon us as lawmakers to protect them from harm in return. We need to put a stop to the attacking of police officers. It starts with legislation such as this, that treats assault and battery with bodily inju-

ry with a higher standard in our court system, before such offenders are released on misdemeanor charges and these violent acts escalate such as they did on that sad Sunday morning on Rochdale Street in Auburn on May 22, 2016."

"The time has come for citizens and the media to realize that police officers are people too," wrote Auburn Chief of Police Andrew Sluckis, in an excerpt of a letter addressed to the committee Representative Frost read during the testimony. "Contrary to some public belief, we do not get paid to be punched, kicked and assaulted. We get paid to protect life and property and to enforce the laws of this Commonwealth. All we want to do at the end of the day is to be able to go home to our families, nothing more."

Massachusetts General Law features a precedent for some cases of assault and battery on firefighters to be considered a felony crime. Also noted at the hearing were similar standards for police dogs and horses, yet there is currently no such provision protecting the police officers themselves.


H.3053 must be reported favorably out of the Joint Committee on the Judiciary before continuing along the legislative process.

## Douglas sweeps Tatnuck for third straight PNJ Senior Babe Ruth championship

WORCESTER — For the third consecutive year, the Douglas Senior Babe Ruth baseball team played itself to the top of the Paul N. Johnson League heap.

Douglas completed that feat by defeating Tatnuck, 2-0, in the Championship Series, which was played Tuesday, July 11 at Tivnan Field at Lake Park. The game scores were 7-6 and 14-1.

"This one is real special," said Douglas center fielder Dave Meech, who is the only player on the team to be a part of all three titles. "We've got a lot of young kids this year. Last year we had a lot of older kids that just came in and raked. This year we really had to work as a team to make plays and string hits together. It was

really special this year, not just because of the three-peat, but because we really had to work for it this year. A lot."

Douglas won the first game, 7-6, in the bottom of the seventh inning. The winning hit was delivered by Bryce St. Germain, whose double to center field scored Jake Rucci. Rucci entered the game as a pinch-runner after Nolan Carter walked to begin the rally.

"That was a big at-bat and a huge hit by Bryce," Douglas manager Dave Meech said. "I've been coaching Bryce since he was in the eighth grade. He's always been a gamer. The kid comes to play, on the mound, at the plate or in the field. He's a kid that wants the opportunity to come through big and he did."

Douglas — which has athletes

from throughout the region, including Stonebridge Press affiliated towns of Douglas and Oxford — carried the momentum of St. Germain's clutch double into the second game, jumping out to a 3-1 lead after the first inning and extending that lead to 7-1 after two frames. Douglas added five runs in the fourth inning and two more in the fifth to account for the 14-1 final. The game was halted after the fifth inning due to Senior Ruth's 12-run mercy rule.

"We just built off the energy of Bryce's big hit," manager Meech said. "Energy is a big thing in baseball. If you bring the energy, especially in a doubleheader, if you can just keep grinding, good things happen."

After banging out 11 hits in the first game, Douglas smashed another 11 in the second. Peter Oberg (two doubles, single) and Logan Troy (three singles) led the hit parade, while Harrison Sandorfi went 2 for 3 with a three-run homer and five RBIs.

Douglas' offensive pyrotechnics overshadowed an impressive pitching effort by Jacob Murphy, who allowed just one run on two hits — none after the first inning — while striking out nine and walking two.

"Murph has won some pretty big games for us; he throws strikes," Manager Meech said. "Murph wanted the ball and he got his opportunity and he couldn't have done a bigger job with it."

Nick Genatossio, who came in relief for Douglas in Game 1 and played third base in Game 2 (going 1 for 4 with an RBI and two runs scored), received the Dan Clem Memorial Most

Valuable Player Award for his efforts throughout the playoffs.

"I'm not going to lie; I was a little surprised to win the MVP Award," Genatossio said. "Without my teammates, though, I wouldn't be the MVP. Everyone had a hand in this."

While watching his team celebrate its latest championship, manager Meech couldn't help thinking about 2012, when Douglas went 0-20.

"We went from being the laughingstock of the league to having a team of guys that all wanted to play for us," he said. "I'm just so happy for these guys."

Among the core of players that helped Tatnuck reach the Championship Series were Auburn's Collin Hines and Avery Lemansky and Spencer's Spenser Giorgio.

"Collin was definitely one of my main guys," Tatnuck manager Eric Goldstein said. "He was a rock for us, in the field and at the plate. He had some big hits for us. Avery I pick up three years ago and he's been a mainstay for us for those three years. And Spenser is just a great kid. He has fun every time he is out there on the field. I'm lucky; I've got great kids."

Goldstein said that Douglas' offensive firepower was just too much to overcome.

"The last week-and-a-half they've been hitting the ball like they did in the second game," Goldstein said. "They're a good team. They're a talented bunch and Dave is a real good coach. Our goal tonight was not to beat ourselves and we didn't; they hit the ball and they beat us. It's a cliché, but the better team won tonight."

## American Legion season ends with a win for Cherry Valley Post 443



- "We urge our contractors to always call 811 to keep everyone safe," said Sandy Munley, executive director, Ohio Landscape Association. "Workers and homeowners should never assume they know where gas and other utility lines are located."

- Consider a specialist for your type of project. Contractor specialists have the knowledge, equipment and tools for certain projects. You'll want a pool contractor, for example, to build the inground pool with vinyl liner. You'll want a concrete professional to install that winding walkway. Contractor specialists are listed online or you can contact professional associations such as the Better Business Bureau.

- Request and check references thoroughly. Family, friends and other businesses can provide contractor names. When contacting contractors, ask each to supply at least three ref-



erences—and then call those people. Ask questions. Was the contractor on time and on budget? Were you pleased with the results? Request photos or visit completed jobs.

- Confirm the contractor is licensed, bonded and insured. A contractor should provide copies of current licenses and insurance certificates—make sure all workers are bonded and insured. Personal liability, worker's compensation and property damage insurance protect you from liability in the event of injuries or accidents.

- Ask if the contractor will handle trash removal. You may have containers, wood, plants and other debris that must be hauled from your property. Verify the contractor will manage this task and will include a dumpster or other trash removal costs in the estimate.

- Select a contractor who'll commit to a timeline. It should include when work will begin, when materials will arrive and when most of the work will be completed. Include extra time for unexpected problems or delays.

- Realize you get what you pay for. Cheaper isn't always bet-

ter and, in most instances, you should stay away from the contractor with the lowest bid. Instead, know your needs and prioritize what's most important. You may be able to remove less significant frills to keep your project within budget.

- Avoid contractors requiring more than 30 percent up front. Instead, work with one who lets you establish a payment schedule that follows the project's progress. Make the final payment after you thoroughly inspect the finished project and are completely satisfied with the results.

"A professionally designed and installed landscaping project will provide years of enjoyment for you and your family," Munley said. "Additionally, the project can increase the value of your home while improving curb appeal."




