Lucky Paw Lodge vows to “treat every dog like our own”

OXFORD – “Go West young man” was the historic clarion call for the western expansion. But today, in Oxford, it might just mean something closer to home – taking your dog to spend some time at the western-themed Lucky Paw Lodge, which just opened on Route 20.

From outside, the former granite showroom is pretty non-descript, a standard commercial building. But inside, visitors and their dogs walk through a space designed to look like Main Street of an old west village or farming community, with the 76 kennels split into several small “buildings” alongside others that house staff areas, the

grooming room and other spaces. At the end, the “street” opens into a gated “Pasture” – the indoor play area. There are also outdoor play areas.

“I didn’t want to be the same as everyone else,” owner Brent Sellew, a former Charlton selectman, said. “I didn’t go anywhere to be influenced by someone else.”

“We went with the old-town look so you feel homey,” added his daughter Leah Kennedy later.

Once up and running, owners Brent and Anne Sellew of Charlton are already considering expansion into some of the 10 acres they own for trails, agility training and other amenities. Those might even include

Compensation study offers little peace of mind

DUDLEY – In 2018, the Dudley Board of Selectmen saw several departments seek wage increases for town employees bringing into question Dudley’s ability to compete with neighboring towns and where it stands in relations to other communities with its pay scale. As a result, the town teamed with Nichols College to perform a compensation study in 2019, but a recent request from the town of Webster has Dudley’s selectmen taking the matter even more seriously.

Town Administrator Jonathan Ruda approached selectmen on July 1 with a request from neighboring Webster that proved that Dudley is not the only community taking a closer look at its salaries.

“Webster has requested that we share the current data of what we pay our employees,” Ruda told selectmen. “They’re conducting their own compensation study. I’ve agreed to assist them with that and they’re going to be sharing their findings with us when they complete their study.”

Ruda said the data collected would serve as an added resource as Dudley tries to balance their own pay scale to remain a competitive town to work for. However, the discussion evolved from simply addressing this partnership to how the town can properly approach ensuring that pay raises are handled responsibly and effectively. With selectmen having slightly differing opin-

ions on how to move forward, Ruda wanted some direction on how much of a priority this issue should be as he enters the second month of his term in the town’s highest employed position.

Several selectmen were grateful to Nichols College for helping produce the compensation study, but felt it in no way provided an easy path forward for the town in terms of providing fair and competitive salaries. Both Selectmen Paul Joseph and Steven Sullivan felt the data was worth holding on to and sharing with Webster but is not the “end of the road.”

“We have elected positions in town that people run for. They know the salary when they run. We have people that we hire through elected officials and the Board of Selectmen with the Personnel Board. When people get hired they know what they’re getting paid and sometimes they get in and they think ‘gee, it’s a lot more than I thought for what I’m making’ and other times they think or they see or hear data that is presented about another town and similar position. I think that our biggest issue since I’ve been on the board is if you’re going to compare (a job) to (another town) you’re really comparing apples to oranges,” Selectman Sullivan said.

The town administrator admitted that part of Dudley’s problem is that the town has not established a definitive approach to handling wage increases. He feels there hasn’t been substantial progress in

Local veteran inducted into In Memory program

WASHINGTON, D.C. — More than 500 Vietnam veterans, including former Marine Paul Edward Mailloux of Webster and 26 others from Massachusetts, will be inducted into the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF) In Memory program in 2019. This program honors Vietnam veterans whose lives were cut short as a result of their

service after they returned home from the war.

On June 15, VVMF will host more than 2,000 attendees at the annual In Memory ceremony on the East Knoll of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, where each 2019 honoree’s name will be read aloud. This year, 534 service members will be honored during the ceremony.

“For many Vietnam vet-

erans, coming home from Vietnam was just the beginning of a whole new fight. Many never fully recovered, either physically or emotionally, from their experiences. As these veterans pass, it is our duty and solemn promise to welcome them home to the place that our nation has set aside to remember our Vietnam veterans,” said Jim Knotts, president and CEO of

VVMF.

The plaque that honors these veterans was dedicated as a part of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial site in 2004. It reads: “In Memory of the men and women who served in the Vietnam War and later died as a result of their service. We honor and remember their sacrifice.”

Once these veterans are

DUDLEY – The Pearl L. Crawford Memorial Library is continuing its annual musical tradition in 2019 with another iteration of the Pearle Jam Concert Series, a collection of monthly musical acts bringing different styles and genres to Dudley’s town library.

The 2019 series started off on Thursday, July 11 with a female musical group bringing to life the music of the ‘50s and ‘60s from the show “The Marvelous Wonderettes.” Usually a quartet, the group consisted of only three of its members for the Pearle Jam show, Sarah Fabrivio, KC Beauregard and Kelly White. A fourth member, Allison Sawtelle, was unable to participate in the show but usually serves as the fourth part of the groups traveling musical presentation of classic tunes.

The group was signed to be the first act of Pearle Jam 2019 after Library Director J. Drusilla Carter, who had worked with them in theater productions in years past,

approached them to bring their talents to Dudley for an afternoon. Carter said the library is excited to bring the Pearle Jam series back for another year, especially kicking things off group that specializes in older music that fans of any generation can appreciate.

“Every year, the library hosts the Pearle Jam series and we try to have something for everyone. This year, we have everything from the ‘50s and ‘60s being sung today, we have someone coming in who plays the accordion and sings folk songs, we have a rock band coming next month, and we have a Celtic musician coming later this year. We also have a percussionist coming to do a Woodstock show in October,” Carter said. “It’s another way to make this a center for the community. It gives people a taste of what the library has to offer and what it is we do.”

A for the Marvelous Wonderettes, their show shares the name of the classic musical production that all four participated in

Selectmen give cop and eater kudos

OXFORD – Selectmen honored people for two very different kinds of contributions to society at their last meeting July 9.

First, retiring police officer James McDonald was commended for his 33 years on the force. The town also threw him a retirement celebration the following Saturday at the Auburn Elks.

“I’ve had many residents walk up to me to say they love seeing you around town,” Selectman Cheryl LeBlanc told him. “You’re very approachable and a regular guy, and they appreciate it.”

Meghan Troiano said she was one of those people. When she moved to town in 2006, she said, McDonald was one of the first people she met.

“It seems your name comes up across the community quite a bit,” said newest Selectman Mike Daniels. “In 33 years, you’ve made quite an impact.”

John Saad noted it must be “tough to give up something you’ve enjoyed, and I know you have because I’ve heard nothing but good remarks over the years.” He praised McDonald’s work and urged

him to enjoy going to Maine. He said the officer earned a lot of respect from citizens, fellow officers and other people in the justice system for his court work, among other things.

McDonald himself thanked the department past and present and said he remembers the day he started, in part because Saad was among those who voted to hire him.

“I’m leaving and he’s still here,” McDonald noted, sparking laughter. “I don’t know if that’s got something good or bad.”

Moments later, the board gave a similar presentation to Bay Path electronics teacher Jeffrey Esper for something he loves to do – eat.

Chairman Dennis Lamarche listed several regional and national competitions Esper has won in recent years, including two in June – Hooters Wild Wings and Hostess Donettes. He dubbed the man’s history “quite an accomplishment.”

LeBlanc described Esper as “very humble” and said she first heard of him in passing. A few years ago, she was changing the channel and saw “Jeffrey Esper of Oxford, Mass.” come up for

winning a Nathans’ Hot Dog contest. “Clearly, you love what you do, and bringing the spotlight to us by default is not what you wanted to do,” she said. Esper said he started by winning local restaurant challenges, with his favorite being a Springfield restaurant’s cheeseburger eating contest.

“Once you win a Nathan’s qualifier, you’re in the league,” he said. Afterward, things turned more serious as the board revisited the idea of buying property next to the town beach it previously rejected in 2017.

Town Manager Jen Callahan said the owner recently asked if the town might be interested in it for recreation use. The owner is now seeking an appraisal, and a proposal exists to subdivide the land into four lots. She said she’s been trying to convince the owner that a low price would benefit her family “because it’d have public access ... and she’d like it to be preserved, not built upon.”

“An awful lot of the public trespasses on this property out to the point” because it’s illegal to launch boats from the beach, she said. “They think the town already owns that.”

By a 4-1 vote, the board encouraged

Callahan to see what kind of agreement and price she can get, with Saad noting the cost is his top concern.

“[We should] look long and hard at this,” he said. “If it goes and we miss something here, we’ll be kicking ourselves in the butt. ... Recreation [land] is becoming limited everywhere.”

LeBlanc was the sole no vote, saying she had the same concerns she had in 2017, including cost. She noted the Recreation Department and DPW “already have a lot on their plate.”

In other business, the board voted unanimously to approve seeking a MassWorks grant to install sewers along Route 20, another grant to work on McKinstry Dam, and to rename the Senior Center the Oxford Social Center.

The latter came about because it’s “open and accessible to anybody” under its federal funding, Callahan said. The agency “is trying to change the vision they have” and expand opportunities beyond just seniors to “all abilities and all ages.”



'She captures their personality'

NILES' 'WHIMSICAL' ANIMALS GRACE BOOKSTORE WALLS

WEBSTER – Jen Niles is living evidence you don't need formal training to become known for art. But you do have to be willing to work at it.

Niles is regionally famous for her "whimsical" and colorful animal paintings, many of them inspired by the real-world antics of her cats PK and Nellie. This month, she's occupying the walls of Booklovers' Gourmet, where she said she's had "tons and tons of shows, but this is my first reception" last Saturday.

Speaking to a small group of visitors, she said she got started "kinda by accident." She used to do pen-and-ink house portraits – and still loves doing them – but one day decided to try painting her cats. Initially, it was a "naive style," but a neighbor in Paxton liked them and hung her first four in a personal gallery. Another neighbor soon bought two.

"So it left a big hole in the gallery, so I had to do more," Niles said.

Before long, a local store owner started hanging them, but "when I started to know a little more about painting, that woman actually dropped me. She liked the primitive stuff," Niles said. When asked if she's ever tried to recreate that style, she added, "I can't fake it. The clumsy stiffness of my early paintings came naturally."

But she will experiment with various styles. For example, she throws in various non-feline animals and buildings occasionally, will purposely make some "fuzzy," sometimes uses a digital scratchboard to draft ideas, and recently started working with oils and Adobe Illustrator. (Most of her repertoire is in acrylics.) She'd really like to be able to take a sabbatical and paint things just for herself, but admits she can't afford to.

"I don't want to be stuck in one thing, but I'm known for one thing," she said.

Conveniently, though, that is her favorite theme, which she described as "books and cats and coffee. That's all you need in life." Her "other true love is buildings and architecture," which also appear in her paintings often.

But she admits, "I haven't made my peace with people yet. I can't do people."

Niles describes herself as an introvert, noting she talked more at her Booklovers' reception than most other places she's been recently. At home, she has a small camper out back she uses as her "haven when I want to get away from my family." When she needs to get farther away, she goes for a bike ride.

"At home, I'm always fooling around ... but there's not enough hours in the

day to try all the things I want to try," she said.

Among other things, she's tried making t-shirts (but thinks her art "looks ridiculous" that way; she'd like to try pillows or bags instead), wooden cut-out designs, ornaments, magnets and other small items, but finds many of them too time-consuming to make any money.

Niles noted she makes a living at art, mostly by teaching at libraries, animal shelters and various other places, but not schools. One of her more popular classes is "Paint Your Pet," where she has students give her images of their pet, which she sketches onto canvas for them to paint. Originally, she had the students do it from scratch, but noticed some of them got "stressed out" over it.

She has several stores that routinely carry her pieces (especially smaller ones and greeting cards), sells some through Facebook, Etsy and other sites, and does participate in bigger art shows/festivals. But the festivals tend to be a challenge – lots of competition and often a fairly high entry fee that makes it hard to sell enough to make money.

One exception, she said, is the Beacon Hill Art Show in Boston, where the people "don't look at the price tags." There, several customers buy multiple paintings at once, while Central Mass show-goers tend to have less free cash.

That said, though, Niles is preparing for this year's StART on the Street, which takes over a swath of Worcester's Park Avenue on Sunday, Sept. 15. In the past, she's had a tent, but this year Niles intends to just get one of the festival's smaller spaces, something she noted requires a lot more organization.

Her son Nate, 16, got his start in the festival's Youth Market (which gives spaces for just \$10). He's a digital artist, and they collaborated to make various bookmarks, including some that were bacon-shaped, which he sold by walking around with them in a skillet, Niles recalled. As he got older, though "he didn't want to have anything to do with those anymore" because they were "part of childhood," so her house now has hundreds of them.

Niles said her husband David is a graphic artist (and was formerly at the Telegram), while her father sketches and grandmother was "the original cat lady." She was drawing and painting all the time." Unlike some artists, she doesn't have a studio, although she has been a member of a couple over the

years. Mostly, her art happens on the "little round table that does everything" in her kitchen.

Some of that art is written. For a while, Niles tried to be a Telegram correspondent, but found deadlines frustrating.

"I like writing, but I have to be able to look at it, reread it and edit it," she said. She also recently started taking poetry classes at the local library, noting "I want to do it, but didn't think I was doing it right."

As far as her paintings go, the observers present thought that was definitely not a problem.

"It's really fun and you can tell she's an animal lover," owner Deb Horan said. "She captures their personality and their situations, how they interact with people."

"These remind me of New Yorker Magazine cartoons, except they're colored, not black and white," said another patron. "They're fun to look at."







determining how Dudley compares to surrounding communities, whether they be larger or smaller, and how those comparisons would effects salaries.

“I think part of the issue with this and why it’s been going on for several years is we’re just continually kicking the can. I need to know specifically what the board would like me to do and I will execute that,” Ruda said.

The newest selectman in Dudley, Jason Johnson, used his business background to explain his view of the complexities of a proper wage study and how Dudley may want to proceed.

“To properly address a problem, you need to define the current state. The current state would be the market analysis – It’s usually based on a problem like being unable to find candidates to fill a position or having to replace people at a higher industry rate. I’d like to see it portrayed as a problem statement with data that backs up the current state before speculating. I don’t want to solve problems that are not the root cause of what we really need to work on,” Johnson said.

One of the major issues discussed during the conversation was the abundance of wage increase requests that were brought to selectmen and the Personnel Board on 2018. Town Administrator Ruda made a recommendation to selectmen that they make and immediate shift in how they approach implementing raises for the time being.

“If the board supported the premise that I put out that we stop assigning ran-

dom increases for anyone who asks and we have a more centralized process for anyone who asks that will immediately stop the bleeding,” Ruda said. “I’ve already spoken to the Personnel Board about it and I would hope that every member of the (Board of Selectmen) agrees that we have to come up with some methodology to assign salary increases instead of the way we’ve consistently done it for decades.”

Selectman Paul Joseph agreed stating that part of the problem is that the town has no set standard that it follows when it comes to raises and salary increases.

“I think that our problem is clear and it’s exemplified by the way that the town through the board or the town administrator administer our labor and management responsibilities, and that is by the seat of our pants,” said Joseph.

One overarching theme of the discussion was how important this issue should be to the town in its current state. Some selectmen questioned whether this should be a top tier issue on the new town administrator’s to-do list or if it’s more of a background problem worth looking into as time allows. The selectmen all seemed to agree that it is an important issue, and one they will continue to address and examine, but it does not take precedence over some more pressing matters the town is facing in the immediate future.

House is overreacting to Cultural Council budget issues

To the Editor:

In recent weeks, it was reported by the Boston Herald that the Massachusetts Cultural Council's travel expenditures during the past fiscal year totaled around \$13,000. The spending of said travel expenditures, including parking, food, and hotel costs, has been criticized and sparked a larger debate on government spending reform in this year's budget cycle. In each of their budget debates, the House and Senate have tied higher budgetary funding for the MCC to required transparency reforms. The Senate's version requires the MCC to submit an annual spending plan, while the House requires all MCC spending to be approved by the Attorney General, the Comptroller, the Inspector General, and the Ethics Commission.

I can appreciate advocates' desire to cut waste and ensure efficiency and transparency when it comes to state government spending. As a former Local Cultural Council Chair, I valued being open with my constituents about the Oxford Cultural Council's work to benefit our communities. I also have had to make hard choices during my tenure; the OCC always received more grant requests than it could accommodate, requiring deep and collaborative discussions with the other members on how to best allocate our resources provided to us by the MCC. As such, I want to ensure our State Government is efficiently spending taxpayer dollars just as much as anyone else in our community.

However, I must express a difference of opinion on the need for these specific reforms. Putting \$13,000 in context, the MCC's current budget of \$16 million and travel expenditures make up only eight hundredths of a percent of the overall budget. Suddenly the amount of expenditures on travel to promote arts and culture doesn't seem so grandiose.

Let's take this one step further and say that these reforms somehow reduced all travel spending to zero, reallocating all the funding to each Local Cultural Council in Massachusetts. There are currently 329 Local Cultural Councils in the Commonwealth. If you split the sav-

ings up evenly, each Council would get roughly \$40 in funding each year. In each of the years that I have served on the Oxford Cultural Council, that amount is so paltry, it would not have been able to fully fund a single additional grant request. Not to mention the MCC hosts a variety of other grant programs as well, so even getting that much in additional funding per LCC is highly unlikely.

MCC funding has historically been very volatile. Funding has gone up in good economies, and drastically cut in bad economies. Funding increases have been vetoed by both Democratic and Republican Governors and have been overridden by the Legislature more often than not. In the 1990's, the Oxford Cultural Council had a state appropriation of roughly \$10,000. Today, the OCC has a state appropriation of \$7,400. As Chair, I have passionately advocated year after year before the Legislature to gradually increase funding to get us back to that \$10,000, and the OCC has made great strides since I started serving in 2015.

I believe that the reforms proposed by the House and Senate are, at the very least, unnecessary. I can grudgingly accept the Senate proposal as a good-faith civic compromise to restore trust and transparency with our constituents whom I served. However, the House proposal I would describe as counter-productive, overkill, and ultimately a much larger waste of state resources than the MCC's travel expenditures. As well-intentioned as this proposal may be, it risks stifling the progress we have made in regard to local aid.

I request that the Legislature, at minimum, discard the House proposal. Its heavy-handed approach is an overreaction to what I believe is barely a blip on the budgetary radar. In that same vein, I also ask the Legislature to proceed cautiously with MCC spending reforms, so that they do not ironically end up interfering with the MCC's worthy mission of funding local art projects in the many municipalities of the Commonwealth.



Estate plans can help you answer questions about the future



The word "estate" conjures images of great wealth, which may be one of the reasons so many people don't develop estate plans – after all, they're not rich, so why make the effort? In reality, though, if you have a family, you can probably benefit from estate planning, whatever your asset level. And you may well find that a comprehensive estate plan can help you answer some questions you may find unsettling – or even worrisome.

Here are a few of these questions: What will happen to my children? With luck, you (and your co-parent, if you have one) will be alive and well at least until your children reach the age of majority (either 18 or 21, depending on where you live). You also might want to name a conservator – sometimes called a "guardian of the estate" – to manage any assets your minor children might inherit.

Will there be a fight over my assets? Without a solid estate plan in place, your assets could be subject to the time-consuming, expensive – and very public – probate process. During probate, your relatives and creditors can gain access to your records, and possibly even challenge your will. But with proper planning, you can maintain your privacy. As one possible element of an estate plan, a living trust allows your property to avoid probate and pass quickly to the beneficiaries you've named.

Who will oversee my finances and my living situation if I become incapacitated? You can build various forms of protection into your estate planning, such as a durable power of attorney, which allows you to designate someone to manage your financial affairs if you become physically or mentally incapacitated. You could also create a medical power of attorney, which allows someone to handle health care decisions on your behalf if you become unable to do so yourself.

Will I shortchange my family if I leave significant assets to charities? Unless you have unlimited resources, you'll have to make some choices about charitable gifts and money for your family. But as part of your estate plans, you do have some appealing options. For example, you could establish a charitable lead trust, which provides financial support to your chosen charities for a period of time, with the remaining assets eventually going to your family members. A charitable remainder trust, by contrast, can provide a stream of income for your family members for the term of the trust, before the remaining assets are transferred to one or more charitable organizations.

As you can see, careful estate planning can help you answer many of the questions that may be worrying you. Be aware, though, that certain aspects of estate planning, especially those related to living trusts and charitable trusts, can be complex, so you should consult your estate-planning attorney or qualified tax advisor about your situation. But once you've got your plans in place, you should be able to face the future with greater clarity and confidence.

July is National Blueberry Month

Blueberries are touted as an antioxidant rich snack, and in addition to its many health benefits, the tiny fruit tops of the list of “anti-aging” foods. But the delicious, sweet berry has been pleasing palates for many centuries. *Out of 40 different fruits, juices and vegetables, the blueberry comes in with the highest antioxidant level, according to the North American Blueberry Council. Just three and a half ounces of blueberries are equivalent to over 1700 International Units of vitamin E. Wild blueberries pack up to three times more berries per pound than cultivated, making them the optimum choice for concentrated antioxidant capacity.

*According to the New England Journal of Medicine, the Rutgers Blueberry

Cranberry Research Center in Chatsworth, N.J. found that blueberries help prevent infections in the urinary tract in much the same way that cranberries do. They may also help to prevent macular degeneration according to Ronald L. Prior, Ph.D., director of the USDA.

*The antioxidant and anti-inflammatory effects of blueish purple foods like wild blueberries may have the potential to help prevent Alzheimer’s disease, cancer and heart disease, according to Susan Davis, MS, RD, Nutrition Advisor to the Wild Blueberry Association of North America.

*Studies show blueberries (and grapes) contain properties which can increase night vision. In fact, a cup full of blueberries has been known to improve dark adaptation within 30 minutes of consumption. According to Ronald L. Prior, Ph.D., director of the USDA, blueberries may also help to prevent macular degeneration, which is the leading cause of vision loss in Americans 60 years of age and older.

* Research suggests that blueberries may reduce the build-up of the bad cholesterol that contributes to heart disease. In fact, a compound discovered in blueberries seems to act as effectively as commercial drugs used to reduce levels of “bad” cholesterol in rodents.

* Laboratory tests reveal the anthocyanins in blueberries could act to boost brainpower and halt the signs of aging. When fed blueberry extract for nine weeks, elderly rats outperformed a control group at such tasks as navigating mazes and balancing on rotating logs. And when aging

Brownie Dominoes with Wild Blueberry Cinnamon Sauce

Packed with healthy ingredients, this recipe from the Wild Blueberry Association of North America is company-worthy!

Ingredients: 4 ounces unsweetened baking chocolate; 3/4 cup butter; 1 3/4 cups sugar; 3 eggs; 1 teaspoon vanilla extract; 1 cup all purpose flour; 2 cups frozen Wild Blueberries; 1/2 cup water; 1/4 cup sugar; 1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice; 2 teaspoons cornstarch; 1 teaspoon cocoa powder; 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

Brownie Directions: Preheat oven to 350°F. Microwave chocolate and butter for 2 minutes or melt in double boiler. Stir until chocolate is melted. Stir in sugar, eggs, vanilla and flour until thoroughly blended. Pour into greased 8-inch x 8-inch baking pan and bake 45 minutes or until cooked through. Let cool approx. 2 hours.

Sauce Directions: In a small sauce pan combine 1 cup Wild Blueberries, 1/4 cup water,

It’s been two months since my last update on antique, auction, and collectibles news. Much has transpired since then, beginning with a 900-year-old find.

A Viking chess piece recently sold at a London auction house, according to the Washington Post. Dozens of chess pieces were originally found on the Isle of Lewis in 1831. There were enough for four chess sets, but five of the pieces were missing. The figures, in the shape of Norse warriors, were intricately carved from walrus ivory during the 12th century. An antiques dealer in Scotland purchased a more recently found piece, a 3 1/2 inch figure (which would be a rook in a modern chess set) in 1964. It was passed down to his family before it was determined to be a “Lewis chessman.” The family auctioned it and it brought 735,000 pounds (\$927,000) this month.

Pokemon cards are something we don’t offer in our auction, but some rare cards can bring 5 figure sums. A Business Insider article states that a seller is offering a \$1,000 reward for a card that never reached the buyer. The



“Trainer No. 3” card is “an exclusive card given to the third-place finalist of a Japanese competition called Super Secret Battle in 1999.” It is one of the rarest cards in existence and sold for \$60,000 in an online auction. The card was insured for the maximum allowable value of \$50,000 by the U.S. Postal Service. The card was sent to the Dubai-based courier Aramex, who was to deliver it to the buyer. Aramex

signed for a package, but they said it was for a bulk package and not the card. Because Aramex signed for the package, the seller is unable to collect the insurance. The seller is unsure if the package was lost or if an employee stole the package with the card. Because of its rarity, the card won’t be able to be sold publicly without drawing attention. The owner is hoping the \$1,000 reward will result in its return.

An auction of Burt Reynolds’ estate generated some strong results according to KTLA TV. A “Smokey and the Bandit” original Reynolds signed script sold for \$37,500. KTLA reported that “Reynolds wanted a Trans Am because ‘Smokey’ was his favorite film, but all of the original cars used during filming were destroyed.” He later purchased a Trans Am for himself. His last custom owned 1979 Pontiac Trans Am fetched \$317,500 at auction last month. A fan raced away with a great keepsake from the star.





Editor's Note: The accompanying photos are from Cherry Valley Post 443's American Legion game versus Framingham Post 74 this past Wednesday, July 10.

LEICESTER — Dan Mero and Chris Kustigian each had a pair of hits and drove in runs as the Cherry Valley Post 443 American Legion baseball team ended the regular season on a winning note, defeating Main South Post 341, 14-2, in a game that was stopped after five innings due to Legion baseball's mercy rule on Sunday, July 14 at Rochdale Park.

Mero singled twice, drove in two runs and scored a pair of runs while Kustigian singled,

doubled, drove in a run, stole two bases and scored three times in the lopsided win. In two games against Main South this year Cherry Valley has scored 35 runs.

Post 443, which finished 13-9, was seeded fourth in the Zone 4 Playoffs and hosted Sturbridge Post 109 Wednesday, July 17 (after press time), in the second round double-elimination portion of the tournament. Post 341, which finished the season 8-14, was the No. 9 seed in the 10-team tournament. Cherry Valley split its regular-season games against Sturbridge, losing 12-3 at home on June 17 before winning 6-5 on the road on June 27.

Post 443 put its game against Main South on July 14 away

early, leading 2-0 after the first inning, 8-0 after the second, 13-0 after three and 14-0 through four. Cherry Valley did not bat in the fifth inning.

Nick Army got the start on the bump for Cherry Valley and pitched three innings, allowing just two hits while striking out one and walking one. He was relieved by Jason Panient, who allowed two runs on two hits in two innings of work. Panient struck out one batter, walked another and hit a third.

"Nick Army has come on to be a very reliable pitcher for us. He pitched against Leominster and had us in a position to beat them, although we were unable to do so," Post 443 manager Jim Stephens said. "It was good

that I got Jason in there today to throw a couple of innings. He struggled a little in the second inning, but that's OK."

Stephens said that Aidan Gilman will start Cherry Valley's first playoff game and Tyrus Garvin will go in the second.

"Our pitching staff right now is completely aligned," Stephens said.

In addition to the contributions at the plate by Mero and Kustigian, Post 443 also got singles off the bats of Panient, Evan Brindisi, Joel Erickson, Erik Johnson, Mike Keeler and Dom Esposito. Cherry Valley finished with 10 hits and six walks while striking out just once.

"We hit the ball well once we got patient at the plate," Stephens said. "Their pitcher [Mike Sheeran] was pitching slow; we're not used to that."

In a season of breakout performances for Cherry Valley, Mero's play at second base, on the mound in relief and at the plate could be the most impressive.

"Danny's had an absolutely fabulous year. He's really become a good baseball player. He's grown into his role as one of the leaders on this team," Stephens said. "It's unbeliev-

able how good he has become, just compared to last year, and earlier this year in high school. I can't say enough good things about the kid."

Mero pointed to Post 443's comeback win over Shrewsbury as the game in which Cherry Valley proved to itself that it was a team that could compete with any opponent.

"Shrewsbury, we think, is one of the best teams in the state, if not the best team in the state," said Mero, a rising senior at Leicester High. "Beating them gave us a lot of confidence as a team. It showed us we could play with the best teams in [Zone 4] and compete against them."

Mero described his Legion season as a "good" year.

"I think I've gotten better as a player, in general, since the high school season ended. I feel playing Legion baseball makes you better and after playing all summer I think I am a better all-around player," said Mero, who, even though the regular season had ended just moments earlier, was already focusing on the playoffs. "We're a confident team. I think we'll play well. I think we'll be a tough team to face."





Sturbridge clips Main South as Post 109 continues historic season

STURBRIDGE — Jim Rosseel has managed the Sturbridge American Legion Post 109 baseball team for the past 11 seasons and, as far back as five years ago, he began scouting for this particular team. He knew that this could be the summer where Sturbridge turned the program around, and he was right.

Post 109 edged past Main South Post 341, 3-2, at Tantasqua Regional's William R. Emrich Field

on Thursday, July 11 and evened its record to 10-10 in the process (Sturbridge finished 11-11). They earned the No. 5 seed in the upcoming Zone 4 playoffs (which got underway after press time) and qualified for postseason play for the first time in Rosseel's tenure.

"I've been waiting for this for a long time. I started picking this team four, five years ago," said Rosseel, explaining that the then-youngsters would chase after foul balls and pass the hat

around to collect money for the program.

Mick Sullivan, now in his sixth year with the program, has seen it all. He had just three at-bats in his first two seasons and endured plenty of losing years. Sullivan is proud to be part of a play-off-bound team.

"It definitely feels good," said Sullivan. "It's kind of a culture change — people show up and they want to win. Every year it's a slow incline, like the stock market."

When asked what changed, Sullivan noted the experience of the squad instead of the usual youthfulness of it.

"We have some veteran arms now," he mentioned. "We've had the same team for three or four years; everyone is getting a year older and we're understanding the game better now."

In the win against Main South, Deven Kingman picked up the victory on the mound. Kingman pitched the first 6-2/3 innings before giving way to Sean Clark because of the 105 pitch count limit. Kingman allowed two earned runs on six hits while walking four and striking out one. Clark earned the save after allowing a single but getting Ryan Adams to ground out.

"Deven was lights out," Rosseel said of Kingman.

"He mixed it up well. He's a veteran, been with us for a few years."

And while Sturbridge's offense wasn't at peak performance, the defense turned in a great effort. Post 109 played error-free ball and turned three double plays.

"It's starting to come around at the right time," Rosseel said of the team defense. "I don't care if [the double plays are] served up or not, you still need to execute them — they're not easy."

Sullivan, at shortstop,

was part of all three double plays. In one he fielded a grounder, tossed the ball to second baseman Jared Langevin for the first out, and Langevin threw over to first baseman Roger Leland to finish it off. Sullivan also fielded another, tagged the second base bag himself and threw over to Leland. In the third double play, Langevin started it by throwing to Sullivan, who then tossed it down to Leland.

"The bats were kind of cold tonight, so it's huge that the defense could pick them up," said Sullivan.

Post 109 jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the bottom of the second inning when Leland (2-for-3) singled and Langevin (2-for-3) followed with an RBI triple to center on a ball that took a fortunate hop over the fielder's head. Langevin then scored

when Colin Eliason hit a sacrifice fly.

Main South did tie the score in the top of the third on a Ryan Prosser (2-for-3) two-run scoring double, but Sturbridge rallied for the winning run in the fourth when Eliason walked to load the bases and Clark followed with another walk to plate Langevin.

Rosseel was glad that Post 109 didn't let a sub-.500 team in Post 341 (8-12; they finished 8-14) find a way to win.

"We hung in there. We didn't let this one get away from us," said Rosseel.

Sturbridge was set to play at No. 4 Cherry Valley Post 443 (13-9) in the first game of the double elimination postseason tournament after press time on Wednesday, July 17.



Chemical-free options for managing mosquitoes in your landscape

It's time to get outside and enjoy summer BBQs, gardening, hikes and much more. Don't let mosquitoes keep you inside; Instead enlist these chemical-free strategies to manage these pests in your landscape.

Start by eliminating the mosquitoes' breeding grounds. Drain the water out of buckets, old tires and clogged gutters and downspouts that hold water needed for mosquitoes to reproduce.

Check kids' toys, tarps and pool covers that also retain water. Drain the water and store these items in the garage or turn them over to keep them from becoming a mosquito breeding ground. Even small containers hold enough water for hundreds to thousands of mosquitoes to breed.

Change the water in birdbaths at least once a week. Make it part of your routine maintenance; rinse birdbaths when watering containers. Or

install a small pump to keep water moving to prevent mosquito breeding.

Use organic mosquito control like Mosquito Dunks and Mosquito Bits (SummitResponsibleSolutions.com) in birdbaths, rain barrels and water features. Mosquito Bits quickly knock down the mosquito larval population, while Mosquito Dunks provide 30 days of control. They both contain a naturally occurring soil bacterium *Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis* that kills mosquito larvae, are certified organic and safe for pets, fish, wildlife and children.

Use Mosquito Dunks to manage these pests in areas subject to periods of standing water. One dunk provides control of 100 square feet of water surface for 30 days. Attract insect-eating birds to the landscape with a few birdhouses. You'll enjoy their beauty and benefit from their diet of insects, including many garden pests and mosquitoes.

Reduce the mosquitoes' daytime resting spaces by keeping your garden weeded. Removing weeds and managing neglected

garden spaces will make your landscape less inviting to these pests.

Keep mosquitoes away when hosting a party, gardening or relaxing outdoors. Use a fan to create a gentle breeze that keeps the weak-flying mosquitoes away from you and your guests. Some gardeners even take a small fan into the garden while weeding.

Light a few citronella candles for a bit of ambience and mosquito control at your next evening party or event. Citronella oil and the scented candles do have some mosquito-repelling properties. Scatter lots of candles throughout your entertainment space. Position the candles within a few feet of your guests for some short-term relief from these pests.

These strategies and some personal protection will help you increase your summer enjoyment. Wear light colored, loose fitting clothing, covering as much of your skin as possible with long sleeves and pants.

For Deet-free personal repellent options, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention has also approved products with the active ingredient picaridin (found in Skin So Soft products), IR3535, and the synthetic oil of lemon and eucalyptus. Avoid products that contain both sunscreen

and insect repellents as you need to apply the sunscreen more often than the repellent.

Using a combination of these mosquito-management strategies is sure to provide a summer filled with more enjoyable gatherings with family and friends.
