Gov. Charlie Baker, Lt. Gov. Karyn Polito, and Transportation Secretary and CEO Pollack Stephanie announced recently that total lunding for Administration's the Shared Streets & Spaces Emergency Grant Program would increase to \$10 million. It was also announced that \$3.9 million was released in the largest round of funding to date. The program, which was launched on June 10, provides technical and funding assistance to help Massachusetts cities and towns conceive, design, and implement tactical changes to curbs, streets, on-street parking spaces, and off-street parking lots in support of public health, safe mobility, and renewed commerce, according to a recent release.

The Shared Streets & Spaces program was established to support quick-build projects that can bring meaningful benefits to cities and towns. The program is modeled after the Administration's Complete Streets Funding Program, created in February 2016. As of January 2020, the program has awarded a total of \$46 million to cities and towns for municipal projects aimed at improving infrastructure and safety for pedestrians, bicyclists, motorists, and public transportation customers. The Administration included \$20 million for the Complete Streets Program as part of its \$18 billion transportation bond bill which was filed in July 2019. Soter said he will continue to work with town leaders within his district to secure grants and improve infrastructure.

VT awarded grant for advanced technology

UPTON – As students in distance learning rely on technology, the Baker-Polito Administration has awarded the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District an \$116,735 Remote Learning Technology Essentials grant. It has allowed the district to purchase over 100 Dell laptops to distribute to students for distance learning.

"This grant allowed our school to address and respond to the unique needs of our students with access to the tools and technology required to navigate this school year at no additional cost to our district towns," said Technology Director, Rosetta Spino.

The focus areas for funding include assistive technology for those with individualized education plans, 504 plans, and distance learning technology needs. The supplemental funds ensure students have access to the technology they need to strengthen instruction both at home and in the classroom. This grant is one of several funding sources designed to help Massachusetts school districts address COVID-19 related costs as schools reopen.

"Access to technology is critical for students and their education," said Gov. Charlie Baker. "These technology grants are just one way in which we are working with districts to help them face the challenges associated with COVID-19 and keep kids focused on learning.'

"Our School Committee has consistently encouraged us to advance our instructional resources via grants and other non-tax sources. This award will complement

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Local legislator secures perfect attendance record

GRAFTON — State Rep. David Muradian, Jr., R-Grafton, has successfully maintained a perfect voting record for the 2019-2020 legislative session, participating in all 267 roll call votes recorded in the House of Representatives between Jan. 30, 2019, and July 31, 2020.

The Grafton legislator cast votes on several major pieces of legislation that were signed into law this session, according to a recent statement, including Nicky's Law, which established a statewide "do not hire" registry to track caregivers who abuse clients with intellectual and developmental disabilities. A longtime advocate for Massachusetts' public schools, Representative Muradian also voted for the Student Opportunity Act, which calls for increased school funding and stronger accountability standards to help close student achievement gaps, and the Breakfast After the Bell initiative, which will expand school breakfast programs across the state to help ensure every student comes to school prepared to learn.

"I am proud to say that as the State

Representative for Grafton, Northbridge and Upton I have maintained a 100 percent voting record," Muradian released in a statement. "There has not been one recorded roll-call vote that I have missed in my time in the legislature, which spans1,347 votes to date. Thank you for the opportunity to be your voice.'

In response to the Covid-19 State of Emergency declared on March 10, Muradian supported a wide range of bills to assist families, municipalities, and small businesses during the pandemic. In addition to backing expanded mail-in voting and other options to allow residents to safely exercise their right to vote, he also supported the Restaurant Relief Act, which would cap third-party delivery fees and give businesses additional time to submit their meal tax payments without being subject to penalties or interest.

Other key initiatives supported by Rep. Muradian this session include: legislation to address racial disparities in maternal healthcare; establish a Foster Parents Bill of Rights; enhance consumer access and insurance parity for telehealth services; criminalize female genital mutilation; expand access to behavioral and mental health services for children; reduce distracted driving by allowed only hands-free cell phone use while operating a motor vehicle; provide of \$1.3 billion in state grants to communities for climate change adaptation and infrastructure improvements; assist Massachusetts veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder and other deployment-related health conditions; and create a Women's Rights History Trail to promote education and awareness of the struggle for women's rights in Massachusetts.

Rep. Muradian represents the Ninth Worcester District, including Grafton, Northbridge, and Upton. He currently serves on the House Ways and Means Committee, Joint Committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security, where he holds the title of Assistant Ranking Minority Member, Joint Committee on Elder Affairs, and the House Committee on Global Warming and Climate Change.





These courses test the stamina and agility of the horse team and the skills of the drivers. In the obstacle course, the drivers must drive the horses around a tight course marked with cones on which sit tennis balls. If the driver nudges a cone with the carriage or a horse touches a cone, the ball falls off and they rack up demerits that detract

The three phase Four in Hand is the human equivalent of a triathlon.

Accuracy, speed, and endurance are essential. The driver and her horses must be in harmony, while remaining alert and nimble.

In order to succeed, a driver must be commanding, fearless, and fierce, yet have the heart of a horse whisperer. The driver must be sensitive to the cadence of the horses, and treat the horses so well that they will want to do anything for her.

"It's not an easy sport," Stroud said. "You have to be strong, but you have to be clever like a fox. Instead of using strength, we use our brains."

She said in 2014: "What you've got here is a case of two women who are not afraid to take on their goals. If you give me an idea of something that is difficult to do, I'm liable to attack it. The more challenging it is, the more interested I am.'

Stroud had been a U.S. Equestrian Federation Combined Driving Fourin-Hand Pony National Champion seven times. In 2003, she made her international debut for TEAM USA in the Pony Driving World Championships in Austria. She showed in the World Championships in 2009 and in 2011. In 2014, she qualified to represent the USA again, but this time piloting horses at the World Equestrian Games in France. She also competed in 2016 at the World Championships in

Can you influence your financial aid award?



Right now, the pandemic is causing chaos and uncertainty for colleges and students. But it won't always be that way. And if you have children who will be heading off to school in the next few years, you're probably thinking about more typical concerns - such as expenses. How will you pay for the high costs of higher education?

Most colleges do offer financial aid packages that can greatly help with these expenses. But it pays to know, well in advance, how financial aid works. And the key platform for determining much of your child's financial aid is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). In fact, if you have children starting college next year, now is the time to get going on the FAFSA, which became available Oct. 1 for the 2021-22 award year.

Filling out your FAFSA will provide you with what's known as your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). The EFC calculation takes into account four separate areas: parent income, parent assets (excluding retirement funds, such as 401(k) plans and IRAs, home equity and small family businesses), student income and student assets. The EFC does not calculate the exact amount you must pay for college - rather, it's an estimate, and the amount you pay can be below or above this number.

Nonetheless, the EFC is important in determining your financial aid package, and your actions can influence the results. Here are a few suggestions for future years:

Save money in your name - not your child's. FAFSA will just consider up to 5.64 percent of a parent's assets, compared to 20 percent of a student's assets.

Be aware of how retirement plan contributions can affect aid. Many of your current assets, such as your retirement accounts, may be excluded from the EFC calculation. However, any voluntary contributions you make to your 401(k) or traditional IRA during the "base" year (the prior tax year) generally must be reported on the FAFSA and are counted as untaxed income; consequently, these contributions may have a similar effect on aid eligibility as taxable income. Mandatory contributions, such as those made by teachers to a state retirement system, are generally not reported on the FAFSA Avoid withdrawals from your 401(k) or traditional IRA. The money you take out from these accounts in the years you fill out the FAFSA, and the prior tax year, may count as taxable income in the financial aid calculations. If you really need the money, you may want to consult with your financial professional for alternatives. Consider having children put earnings into a Roth IRA. Money from after-school or summer jobs your children put in a Roth IRA may not be included in EFC – plus, your kids will get a head start on a tax-advantaged retirement account. Keep in mind, though, that Roth IRA withdrawals could be considered as taxable income on the FAFSA if the account owner is younger than 59 $\frac{1}{2}$, which will be the case for your children, or the account is less than five years old. Not all these suggestions will be appropriate for everyone, but they're worth thinking about. You might also want to consult with a college's financial aid officer before you complete the FAFSA, as aid calculations can be complex. An investment of your time and effort early in the process may pay off when the aid packages are finally delivered.



DIY Ideas that Capture Autumn's Brilliance

Few simple pleasures compare to the colorful show of a New England autumn. Why not capture that brilliance with projects that will recall crisp, fall days of yore? Read on for inspiration and instruction to spotlight the blazing color that comes but once a year.

Botanical Prints

Botanical prints are timeless and vintage examples command premium prices. Here in New England, we are surrounded by nature's foliage, which have natural dyes and just happen to make the most appealing botanical wall hangings. Here's how: Materials: Pliable, colorful autumn leaves, the darker the better; parchment or rag paper (resume paper that is at least 25% rag content also works); absorbent paper towels, flat end hammer. Directions: Clean off any dirt or debris from the leaf. Place one sheet of parchment or rag paper on a flat, clean and sturdy surface such as a workshop table or cutting board. Place leaf flat down on surface. Cover with a few layers of paper towels. Using even force, tap the entire area of the leaf (to gauge the area, outline the leaf with pen on the paper towel to use as a guide). This step helps to anchor the leaf to the paper. To release the leaf's natural dyes, go over the leaf surface again, hammering every inch of the leaf. When done, do the same working in the opposite direction. Don't be afraid to take a peek



every once in a while to check your progress. When done, peel the leaf from the paper to expose the print!

To preserve the color of the print, spray with an acrylic protectant. Mat and frame individual prints, or create a collage of different leaves and colors! While jar is still wet, place leaves onto the jar and press in place. Brush over the leaves with another coat of Mod Podge.

Note: Keep in mind spacing leaves apart allows more light to shine through. Overlapping leaves collage style creates a denser jar and dimmer light.

Once leaves are placed, dab or stipple the Mod Podge in the clear spaces. This little extra effort will pay off when the light shines through and shows off the texture rather than brush strokes.

Allow to dry overnight, and then apply one last coat of Mod Podge. As a final touch, spray the outside surface of the jar with an acrylic finish. Again, allow to dry completely. To use, place a contained tea light candle or flameless candle inside the jar. is removed (press between weighted newspaper and paper towels). Carefully brush Mod Podge on each leaf. Note: Do one side at a time and allow to fully dry. Cut straws in half inch length. Attach a straw piece to back of each leaf with hot glue or strong tape. String each leaf on twine and hang!

Note: Brighter colored leaves such as Japanese Maples create the most vivid colors.

Autumn Luminaries

The most colorful and textural fall leaves are literally "in the spotlight" with this homemade luminary project. Use either a real or flameless candle to create a variety of different mood lighting,

Materials: Dried and pressed leaves (drying between weighted newspaper or paper towel pages results in leaves that are dry, yet pliable; Mod Podge (available at craft stores); canning jar.

Note: Lighter leaves allow for more illumination.

Instructions: Using a paintbrush coat the entire outside of the canning jar generously with Mod Podge. Do not coat the bottom of the jar of the rim area.

Foliage Garlands

Garlands strung across a mantle or doorways are popular autumn décor, but why buy faux foliage when you have the real thing right outside your door?

Note: If you are not using preserved leaves, this garland only gets better with age for as they dry, they curl up and take on a new look!

Materials: Colorful fall leaves (crimson and yellow Maple leaves are best); Mod Podge (available at craft stores); plastic straws; twine; hot glue or tape



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
