Service marks 75th anniversary of bomber crash

UXBRIDGE — On May 18, 1944, five men died when their B-24 Liberator was hit by another traveling along with them on their way back to Westover Air Field. They had spent the day in formation flight training. One of

the B-24 Liberators hit another and the tail section was severely damaged, causing the plane to spin nose first into the ground. The site of that crash is a short walk off the side of Chamberlain Road in Uxbridge. Nestled between two homes, the path to the site is marked by a simple black and gold sign.

This year marked the 75th anniversary of that crash. On May 19, a small group of veterans, family members, Uxbridge residents and witnesses to the crash gathered together for the memorial service at the crash site.

Northbridge voters approve Lasell Field project

NORTHBRIDGE — Northbridge residents have approved a \$2.78 million three-year debt exclusion for a project to renovate Lasell Field with artificial turf surface, new track, bleachers, and lighting. The vote passed 936 to 561 during the town's recent election.

"[Friends of Lasell Field] are extremely happy with the support that the project received from the taxpayers," said Timothy Labrie, who spearheaded the Friends of Lasell Field group. "This project is another step in the right direction as we continue to make capital improvements to our community."

Current issues throughout the entire complex, Labrie said, include dilapidated bleachers and outdated lighting systems, wooden poles that he believes will rot at the bases, flooding, grass unable to support the current amount of play, and more. All these concerns become safety concerns as well, he said, for athletes and members of the community attempting to use the complex.

"With last week's grand opening of the new DPW building, this coming fall's ground breaking for the new Northbridge

Elementary School, and a new Lasell Memorial Field on the way...there is no doubt the residents of Northbridge see the need for and value of investing in our town," wrote School Committee Chair Michael LeBrasseur in a public statement.

The next step for the project will be for Town Manager Adam Gaudette to meet with the Building Planning Construction Committee to discuss the project and form a plan of action, said Labrie. Friends of Lasell Field also plans to fundraise for a monument in honor of John Whittin Lasell to be constructed on the property, as the field is named after Lasell, who was killed in WWII.

"I personally would like to thank all the Committee members for their hard work as we went through the process to bring the project to the voters," he said. "I would like to thank the School Committee, Board of Selectman, and Finance Committee, for their support. I would also like to thank the Town Manager, Adam Gaudette, for his guidance and support."

Previously, residents unanimously approved the article at town meeting earlier this month.

Community helps unravel story of local Pearl Harbor casualty

WHITINSVILLE — One local man's efforts to share the story of his childhood friend, who was killed in action at Pearl Harbor on the U.S.S. Arizona, were successful. WWII veteran and Whitinsville native Raymond Rondeau, who now lives in Chandler, Az., said he has received many helpful tips since enlisting the help of the Whitinsville community earlier this year.

Rondeau was reading his local newspaper a few months ago when he came across an article that immediately sparked his interest. A local Tucson woman, Bobbi Jo Buel, had begun the ambitious project of gathering infor-

mation and telling the stories of each of the 1,177 lives lost aboard the U.S.S. Arizona in the Dec. 7, 1941, attack on Pearl Harbor.

Rondeau recalled a childhood friend, Stanley Thomas, who was also from Whitinsville, and was killed in action on the ship, and was determined to contact Buel and ensure Thomas' story was included in the project.

Since he first enlisted the help of the public, Rondeau said many people have contacted him with information regarding Thomas.

"Finally, my project has come to a close," Rondeau wrote in an email.

Band students shine at Hartnett Middle School concert

BLACKSTONE — The Frederick W. Hartnett Middle School held their Spring Concert on May 21. The sixth, seventh, and eighth grade bands performed a variety of pieces from Amazing Grace to Zombie Tango to Pirates of the Caribbean.

Todd Shafer, Instrumental Music Director for the Blackstone-Millville Regional School District, noted that "these students perform a minimum of two concerts a year (four for seventh and eighth grade students) of different material, after only learning how to play their instrument in 5th grade. Pulling that off requires constant and consistent refinement and improvement of fundamental skills, both on an individual level and ensemble level.

Music is chosen to drive the curriculum. Namely, a specific song is selected to teach a specific concept, or include an emphasis on several different concepts. If a band is working on playing "legato" (smooth, connected), a slower song is selected to address that style. As evidenced in last night's repertoire, there are several different areas of improvement being addressed in any

given class/song cycle. This adds variety for the audience but also addresses musical styles and issues on a multi-angled spectrum. The band can improve at playing slow on one song, while also working on playing short and light on a different song." The sixth grade performed "El Pato Loco" by William Owens, "Amazing Grace" by Andrew Balent, "Ancient Echoes" by Elliot Del Borgo, and "Synchronized Energy" by Greg Fhiaras. The seventh grade performed "Wrath of the Titans" by Larry Neeck, "Ye Banks and Braes" by Charles Miller arr. Strommen, and "Zombie Tango" by James Meredith. The eighth grade band performed "Encanto" by Robert W. Smith and "Pirates of the Caribbean" by Klaus Badelt arr. Michael Brown. Mr. Nicholas Marcotte and Mr. Kevin Martins, band directors for grades 5-8, led the ensembles.

In addition to the performances at last week's concert, five students received awards. The awards were Achievement awards for their acceptance into the Central

SUTTON — After more than a year of planning, one local group will host its first annual Sutton Fourth of July celebration on Sunday, June 30.

The event will feature a kids' bike ride, food trucks, parade, fireworks, and more. According to Event Organizer Jonathan Rocheleau, the idea began as a compliment to the town's Memorial Day parade, which is held a month prior.

"The town of Sutton and the Dudley-Gendron Post have been doing an amazing job with the Memorial Day parade every year. The purpose of that parade is to honor those who

have paid the ultimate sacrifice defending our nation," he said. "I have always thought a more celebratory Independence Day celebration would be a nice compliment to the Memorial Day services; a remembrance of those who have given so much to ensure our freedom, followed a month later by a celebration of that freedom."

Realizing this type of event would never start on its own, Rocheleau said he decided to make the thought a reality. One year ago, he asked April Brown if she'd help.

"She's a good friend, shares my passion for our town, and is a very competent local business woman. We began recruit-

ing volunteers," he said.

And thus The Sutton Fourth Inc. was formed as a nonprofit organization, along with a committee of 20 highly motivated volunteers all willing to try to build the day completely from scratch with an unknown budget.

"It's been a challenge to say the least, but one I'm proud to say this committee has delivered on beyond my expectations," Rocheleau said.

The parade will start at 4 p.m.; the Skeletones will begin playing behind the church immediately following the parade, followed by Mike Girard's Big Swinging Thing at 7 p.m. The night will end with a fireworks

display, with viewing in the large hay field on Uxbridge Road next to the common.

Still, the planning portion has its challenges, with parking as one of the greatest challenges, said Rocheleau. Parking is available at the school and at the soccer field on Singletary Ave., and sponsor parking will be at St. Mark's church.

"We are working with local landowners for additional parking in fields, but so much depends on the weather and hay baling schedules that all we can do at this point is cross our fingers."

Rocheleau said the day would not be possible without the financial support of area businesses, including

Unified Global Packaging, who made the fireworks display possible, and Benjamin Insurance, AllCare Medical, and Esler Companies/Renewal by Anderson.

"There are many levels to what I hope to achieve with this day. Keeping both our history and appreciation for our country alive. Strengthening our sense of community, bringing neighbors together face-to-face to have fun. Instilling memories in our children which I hope will last a lifetime."





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

"There was a lot of duplication of information, but occasionally a clue would come out and with my daughter's expertise with the computer, we'd find another piece of information to add to Stanley Thomas' bio."

Stanley Horace Thomas grew up in Whitinsville and was killed in action at Pearl Harbor on the U.S.S. Arizona. Beyond his name, rank, and hometown, his story mostly remained lost to time prior to Rondeau's efforts. Now, that story will forever be written into Buel's project.

"I'd like to thank all of the people who came forward with their tidbits of information. There are too many to name, but if they see this letter they will know that they did their part to honor Stanley Thomas," he added.

Local Uxbridge veteran Don Letourneau (Vietnam Navy veteran) has been overseeing the memorial service for more than ten years. He led the service standing alongside James Crosby, member of the American Legion, and William Albin of Uxbridge, who witnessed the crash when he was employed at Prospect Hill Cemetery, his first job ever. Crosby read the prayers to honor those service members who died that day. Albin gave a first-hand account of what he saw the day of the crash.

Rep. Mike Soter was there to present Albin with a citation recognizing the efforts made in having a marker placed at the crash site. Laura Huyser, Letourneau's daughter, read the Remarks at the Dedication of Marker for Five Airmen Who Died in Bomber Crash in Uxbridge, May 18, 1944. Dennis Seely (Navy) and Russell Wise (Marine) folded the American Flag. Joe Podles played Taps beautifully and then members of the VFW and American Legion Lou Bagaglio (Army), Richard Baker (Marine), and Vinny Ciffzarri (Army) fired the three-volley salute.

Second Lt. Arnold Moholt, 24 years old, of Missoula, Mont.;

2nd Lt. John T. Goodwin, 25 years old, of Chicago, Ill.; Staff Sgt. Thomas L. Cater, 29 years old, of Sayre, Pa.; Sgt. Merle V. Massar, 21 years old, of Mt. Vernon, Wash.; and Sgt. Anthony J. Pitzulo, 24 years old, of Lowellville, Ohio. Those are the five men who died as a result of the crash. Two servicemen that were also in that plane survived as they were able to jump from the plane and their parachutes were able to open in time. Those two were Lt. Joseph H. Talbot and Corporal Robert Kelly. Talbot and Kelly were treated for minor issues that day at Whitinsville Hospital.

Kevin Talbot, son of Lt. Joseph H. Talbot, was also present at the memorial service. He spoke of how in his haste to put on his parachute, his father had put it on upside down. As he descended towards the ground he grappled for the pull cord at his shoulder and couldn't find it. He eventually found it down towards his thigh - the opposite place from where it should have been. Talbot also spoke about the grief his father held for those five men and how it never really left him.

This site isn't on the parade circuit, as it's just too far from the center of town. Many members of the community simply

do not know the site exists or that these five individuals died while training to help protect our freedoms and our country. It has been Don Letourneau's goal to make sure that these servicemen are honored every year, as it's so easy to forget. It would be so easy to let the brush grow over the site and the memories slip away. Letourneau is retiring from this position and is looking for someone to step forward and help to keep the memory of those who died in that crash on May 18, 1944 alive. What's at stake when you take a seat?

Proponents of physical activity say that sitting is the new smoking, but how true is that statement, and what are the justifications behind it?

In modern times, with the onslaught of technology more people are spending their working hours sitting at a desk, or sitting behind a machine that is doing all of the physical labor. While there are still several occupations that allow a person to move about, the days of hard manual labor, long hours on a farm, and using hand held tools to build most things are over.

Today's society is physically lazier than ever, and that is not necessarily the fault of the individual; it is simply how things have unfolded as technology advanced. With this news of the downfalls of leading a sedentary lifestyle chirping about, some companies have invested in stand-up desks to try to offset any negative consequences to sitting in a chair all day long.

One study shows that sitting for too long can increase heart failure and will shorten life expectancy; however, there has been little evidence to prove that a stand up desk could improve such ailments. The study showed that the amount of calories you burn by standing as opposed to sitting equals out to a handful of potato chips; however, over time, those calories do add up. One study showed that standing for longer than four hours showed an increased propensity for enlarged veins. The idea is to find the balance between your standing and sitting time. One suggestion to boost more movement in the office is to move a printer or fax machine far enough away so you have to walk to it, to get in a few more steps throughout the day.

The most disturbing fact discovered was that students sit, on average, for more than seven hours per day. That makes sense when you think about the hours in a school day, drive time, doing homework, sitting down for dinner, and of course, screen time with cell phones or in front of the television. That means that children and teens today are sitting for more than 85 percent of the time during waking hours.

A different study that actually equated sitting to smoking showed that sitting as little as two hours in a row increases the risk for heart disease. Individuals apparently who sit for less than three hours per day are said to have a longer life expectancy.

Proven is the fact that sitting too long can cause orthopedic dysfunction, and also can impact a child's ability to process information. Children who are at standing desks burn up to 25 percent more calories during the school day than their sitting counterparts and were more engaged in classroom activities. Obese children who used standing desks increased calorie burn by up to 25 to 35 percent, and fidgeting can actually impact calories burned as well. Children are meant to move and if given the opportunity that's exactly what they'll do.

Interesting regarding children, and really, no surprise, is the fact that they are happier when not restricted to a chair and classroom behavior improves when students are able to actively learn and tend to be more creative.

When you are in a standing position, your complex motor skills are at their best, and you prevent back and neck pain, pelvic floor dysfunction, knee and hip disorders and reduces cell aging.

We think it would be interesting to place a step tracker on a typical student at the start of a school day and record their steps at the end of the day over the period of a week. Those results may shock many.

Peppermint

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Do you have a business succession strategy?

If you own a business, you've always got plenty to think about: sales, marketing, employees, competition, industry trends, consumer preferences – the list goes on and on. It's easy to get so caught up in your work that you might not take time to think about retirement. But if and when that day arrives, you'll want to be prepared – which means you need a business succession plan.

And you will have to put considerable thought and effort in selecting such a plan, because you've got several choices. You could keep the business in your family. You could offer it to an employee or an outsider. You could design a plan that will take effect while you're alive or after you've passed away. Your decision should be based on several factors, including your family situation, the nature of your business, and your overall financial position (including the composition of your investment portfolio), but, at the outset of your search, you may want to know about some popular succession strategies, including:

Giving the business away – You can leave your business to your children, but if you transfer it during your lifetime, you may be able to obtain some valuable benefits. For example, by relinquishing control gradually, you can be reassured that your children will be able to manage the business on their own. This strategy may also offer tax benefits. You can give your business away outright, but you may want to consider using a trust or family limited partnership, both of which may allow you to control the business for as long as you want, while still receiving a regular income stream.

Selling the business outright – You can always sell your business outright whenever you like – right now, when you retire or some time in between. Of course, any sale brings tax considerations.

Using a buy-sell arrangement to transfer the business – Instead of simply selling the business in a traditional transaction, you could employ a buy-sell agreement. With this arrangement, you can generally determine when, to whom, and at what price you can sell it. If you would like to keep the business in your family, you may be able to fund the buy-sell agreement with life insurance, so family members could use the death benefit to buy your ownership stake.

Buying a private annuity – When you buy a private annuity, you can transfer the business to family members, or someone else, who will then make payments to you for the rest of your life, or, possibly, for your lifetime and that of a second person's. In addition to potentially providing you with a lifetime income stream, this type of sale can remove assets from your estate without triggering gift or estate taxes.

These and other techniques can be complex, so before deciding on what is best for your situation, you'll want to consult with your tax, legal and financial advisors. By taking your time and getting the professional help you need, you can make a successful succession choice.

of the cleansing herb would rid the area of all negativity. Rosemary was burned in shrines in Ancient Greece to drive away evil spirits and illnesses. Greeks students of that time also wore garlands of rosemary in their hair to improve their memory. In addition, it was long claimed a necklace made from rosemary preserves ones youth. Rosemary is now a common herb to use in drawer sachets and hair rinses.

Rosemary-Lemon Meat Rub: Mix together 1 ½ teaspoon grated lemon peel; one teaspoon dried crushed rosemary leaves; two minced garlic cloves; and one quarter teaspoon each salt, ground pepper and dried thyme leaves. Rub on tender cuts of meat to add flavor before cooking or grilling.

Lavender: Dating back several thousand years, lavender has served as a valuable herbal staple in both the kitchen and the sickroom. Romans are credited for the spread of lavender throughout Europe, taking it with them everywhere they went in order to have local supplies of lavender oil which they used extensively in bath water and soap as well as in many other ways. Most lavenders are originally natives of the Mediterranean countries. Today, lavender is used in rubbing oils to soothe sore joints, and an infusion of lavender has long been used as a cold compress to treat severe headaches. The lovely scent of lavender makes it a popular herb in sachets, perfumes and many aromatherapy and craft projects.

Fun fact: In the middle ages, sprinkling lavender water on a person's head was thought to keep them chaste!

Thyme: Thyme is a magical herb, as popular for its flavor as for its healing properties. Historically, thyme was employed as a medicinal weapon to combat European plaques, and as recently as WWI, thyme essential oil was used as an antiseptic. And a hot cup of tea infused with thyme has even been touted as an effective hangover cure!

Sleepy Thyme: Thyme has also been used to treat nightmares. It has been said a few sprigs of the herb placed beneath a pillow can ensure a good night's sleep.

Sage: Sage traces its history back to the ancients who touted the herb for a cure-all for such maladies as epilepsy and warts. For generations, sage has been used for coughs, fevers and as a health tonic. Native Americans used sage in salves to treat various skin

conditions and they frequently used sturdy springs of sage as a toothbrush. Today, sage's antiseptic and astringent properties make it a popular herb for treating skin sores and irritations. Sage is also said to help in the healing of bruises and proper blood circulation.

Sage Honey: Add two teaspoons of fresh sage to one quart of honey. Warm over low heat. Place in a covered canning jar and store for at least two weeks to infuse flavor.

NOTE: Use herbs at your own risk and only under proper direction. Herbs should not be used under some circumstances, so consult a professional before consuming or applying herbs.

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
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

BLACKSTONE — Jackson Haker went 4-for-5 with a triple and drove in five runs, and Harrison "Harry" Mansfield was 3-for-4 with a triple and an RBI to help lead the Uxbridge High varsity baseball team to a 9-0 victory over Blackstone-Millville Regional (BMR) on Friday, May 24.

With the win, their 10th in a row, the Spartans improved to 15-3 and solidified their standing as one of the top teams headed to the Central Mass. Division 4 Tournament next month. The Chargers dropped to 3-13 with the lopsided loss.

Uxbridge head coach Peter Rice said he was happy with how his team played in all phases of the game against BMR.

"The guys are playing real well in all facets of the game. Our pitching has been solid, the defense has been outstanding and we've gotten lot of timely

hitting all season, but especially during this win streak that we're on," he said.

The most notable change in the Spartans this year, according to the players, has been on defense.

"Our defense last year was horrible. This season has shown us what happens when pitchers have confidence in their defense; they go out and throw everything they got," said Mansfield, one of Uxbridge's senior captains. "They don't worry about the other team making contact, or about walking guys. They just go out and pitch and good things happen."

Last year the Spartans missed qualifying for the postseason for just the second time in the last 10 years.

"We had a lot of captain's practices in the offseason and at every one of those practices we worked on our defense for hours at a time, and it's paying off," Mansfield said. "It shows what happens

when you're committed to get better at a certain aspect of your game."

Rice said he has also noticed an improvement in the team's play behind whoever he puts out on the mound on any given day.

"We're making an error or two a game, but we come back and make the next play. The errors we're making are not costing us runs," Rice said. "Because the kids are playing solid defense behind them, our pitchers aren't afraid to pound the zone, pitch to contact and let their fielders make plays, and that's what's happening."

Uxbridge jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the top of the first inning. With one out Haker singled to center field, promptly stole second base and then came in to make it 1-0 on an RBI triple to the gap in right-center field by Mansfield. Mansfield then crossed the plate to make it 2-0 when the next batter, senior Josh Labrie, hit a sacrifice fly to right field.

The Spartans added single runs in the third and fifth innings to push their led to 4-0 and then broke the game open with a five-run sixth inning.

Haker, a sophomore, had the big hit in the sixth, clearing the bases with a triple to right field.

"It was a long at-bat; I worked the count to 3-2 and with only one out on the board at the time I was just trying to get a good pitch to hit," said Haker, who is the leading hitter in the B Division of the Southern Worcester County League with a .458 average and 16 RBI.

"I finally got a pitch I could do something with and I got it out to left field and I got some help from the wind, which kept pushing it toward the line," Haker explained. "I was just trying, at that point, to get it out of the infield and maybe get a run home with a sacrifice fly."

Haker and Mansfield both feel the Spartans are poised to make a deep postseason run.

"We're a strong team and we're winning in a lot of different ways. Everyone is carrying their weight, working hard at practice and contributing," said Haker, who starts at shortstop for Uxbridge. "The way I carry my weight on this team is to try to make every play that I can on defense and have solid at-bats. And I try to pick guys up when they're down and they pick me up when I'm down."

Mansfield said he thinks the makeup of the team is one that can carry the Spartans through the tough one-run games the Central Mass. Tournament

is known for.

"This is a great team; we play together and we've got good leaders," Mansfield said. "We play as a team, we win as a team and we lose as a team. This is the best team I've ever been a part of. I can see us making a long run in the tournament."






