Caney steps up to help his fellow man

LOCAL FIREFIGHTER RECALLS BATTLING WILDFIRES ON WEST COAST

DUDLEY — The Town of Dudley's top officials praised a local firefighter on Sept. 26, calling him a local hero for his efforts in helping quell the destructive forest fires that spread throughout California and surrounding states on the West Coast earlier this year.

Dudley firefighter Jesse Caney appeared before the Dudley Board of Selectmen in late September to tell his story about fighting the dangerous wildfires over the summer months. The 25-year-old wildlife biology major was teamed up with crews from the National Park Service in May, becoming a part of the massive effort to battle more than 30 large fires spread throughout the western states. Caney helped resolve situations

in Arizona, California, Nevada, and Utah as part of his tenure in the west before coming home in late August to reunite with his local crew in Dudley. Much of Caney's

work was done in conjunction with his employment by the Lassen Volcanic National Park.

"It was a lot of fun to work for the park service.

Webster preps for annual Fall Town Meeting

WEBSTER — The Town of Webster is preparing for its annual Fall Town Meeting on Oct. 17, and there appears to be a lot to cover on the warrant that was recently finalized by selectmen and released to the public.

Many financial items are included on the agenda, as well as several citizen petitions and other items of interest that will require voter approval to progress. Among the financial items listed off are a few relatively standards expenditures that are more housekeeping than anything else.

Voters will be asked to approve \$99.12 for outstanding bills for funding police personnel for a recent Rape Aggression Defense course for those in the town hall and a few electric bills call for a \$146.36 expenditure. Other financial expenditures on the ballot are due to salary negotiations,

but two standout financial decisions have been placed on the warrant to take care of a few new additions to Webster.

Article 3 on the warrant seeks to reallocate \$15,000 to fund a recently added Recreation director position in town. This money will not be new money spent, as Acting

Town Administrator Pam Leduc told selectmen these finances will simply be taken from another position at the Senior Center.

"The Board of Selectmen approved the job description that I drafted for the part time Recreation Director. I've

WEBSTER — Local fire personnel made quick work of a residential structure fire on Saturday, Oct. 1, with multiple departments responding to a 911 call after a resident returned home to find an adjacent living space was spewing smoke.

Webster Fire Chief Brian Hickey told The Webster Times that a fire at duplex at 35 Third Street, specifically Apartment A in that building on the left side, caused multiple crews to be called in to gain control of the situation, leaving the apartment

Facts about World War II in Dudley

While the fighting of World War II never physically reached the little town of Dudley, the townsfolk treated the situation with patriotic gravitas. Here are just a few of the actions that were taken.

January 1942: A Civil Defense Report Center was created at the Dudley Junior High School on West Main Street (today's Municipal Complex) where all alerts and alarms were to be called in. Miss Loretta Filipski was the first young woman volunteer to man the Center, open 24 hours per day. Women were on duty during days and night coverage was by young men in the Quartermaster Training Division of Nichols College. Alerts, if they occurred,

were to go to heads of various committees. T asked with relaying any received

alerts or alarms to the appropriate people were a group of girl messengers and couriers volunteering at the Center, outfitted with custom-made uniforms of tan dresses, tan berets, knit socks and sport shoes.

Weekly lists of the volunteers' schedule appeared in the newspaper.

There was also a huge map of Dudley erected in the Report Center. One of the largest maps ever made of Dudley, it was 10 feet wide and stood 8 feet tall and was installed in two pieces. The work of George Stocklin and Leon Lachance, it took two weeks to fabricate and was made of wallboard. Every hydrant and every house was shown as well as the brooks, ponds, rivers, streets, railroads, schools, shelters, and water basins, all marked in various colors.

The girls manned the Report Center's phones during all the war games and air raid practices. They also looked up and recorded the records of every man from

Dudley who was then serving or had served in the armed forces of the country, back to the continental army.

January 1942: Servicemen on leave were forbidden to "hitch" or "thumb" a ride. Patriotic motorists could enroll in the Service Motor Corps. The group's slogan was "Give Them A Lift." Each driver participating placed a distinctive sticker on his car and carried a roster to be filled out for each soldier after his official pass to leave camp was shown. Motorists could get paperwork to participate at the Webster Times or at Webster Buick Co.

January 1942: Dr. Quincy H. Merrill, Chairman of the Dudley Public Defense Committee, announced that sand may be obtained by residents of the town at the Town Hall on West Main Street. Those who obtained the sand, to be kept at home as a measure in preventing spread of fire in cases of any hit by an incendiary bomb, were asked to bring their own containers.

February 1942: "Bombing" of Dudley occurred with a surprise "bomb" dropped Green Street.

Almost simultaneously two others were dropped, one on West Main Street and one on Schofield Avenue. The "bomb" on West Main street was an "incendiary" and the fire department was called out. Almost 100 citizens participated in this first drill, which included ambulances, "victims," fires and rescues. The exercise was critiqued, problems corrected, and another "bomb" dropped on Quinebaug to make sure improvements in the drill worked.

March 1942: The Dudley police chief had a warning for motorists planning on parking on the side of the road during a practice blackout. Keep your foot off the brake pedal! The light produced by depressing the brake pedal during a blackout produced an amazing amount of unwanted illumination.

April 1942: An electric air raid siren with a range of 3 miles was purchased by Dudley's Civilian Defense Committee for \$400 and was erected in the tower of Conant Memorial Church on Dudley Hill. It was a 7 1/2 horsepower three-phase device. It was used April 9 to sound the alarm for a blackout drill in town, which was a great success. A second air raid siren was erected near Sixth Avenue.

August 1942: Stephen Beresik, 23, a former carder/operative, was the first Dudley resident to have been killed in action in World War II. Originally listed as MIA after the sea battle of Savo Island in August 1942, he was officially declared missing and presumed dead almost one year later (September 1943). He had been a fireman third class aboard the heavy cruiser USS Quincy (CA39) with its crew of 1020. He was lost at sea when the Quincy was sunk by the Japanese. He was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart.

August 1942: A horse-mounted unit of Civil Defense in Dudley was organized to patrol the outskirts of town. Members, all experienced riders, provided their own horse. Several nights per week riding sessions were held. Frank Ashby was the head of the group, which consisted of Charles Bateman, Albert Bailey, Raymond Dudley, Grace Jacobs, Mrs. Augusta Cash, Lyman Hall, Winston Hall, Elaine Cash, Norma Smith, Robert David, Everett Brown, Harold Walker, Arthur Gadoury, and Leonard Martin.

October 1942: A company of 22 students enrolled in a course for Army Glider Pilots sponsored by the Department of Commerce began their course of study at Nichols Junior College. The uniformed students, ages 18-37, were under strict military supervision and were to receive 240 hours of ground school work at Nichols and also 35-40 hours of flying training at Grafton Airport over 8 weeks.

February 1943: Central Avenue in Dudley had only 24 houses in 1943. From these 24 residences, 30 young men had joined the Armed Services by 1943. Leo Lachance, a local Civil Defense official, was the one who actually counted the number of residents of Central Avenue who had joined up.

September 1943: It was announced that Nichols College would not reopen in the Fall of 1943 due to the fact that its President, James L. Conrad, an Army reserve officer for 17 years, had been called to active service. The staff and the student body were both weakened by increased Armed Service enlistments, and it would be impossible for the college to continue to reopen until the war's end.

Town announces early voting schedule

DUDLEY — Dudley announces that all registered voters will be able to vote before Election Day for the first time ever in Massachusetts.

Early voting will begin on Oct. 24 and continue through Nov. 4.

To be eligible to vote in the November 8th State Election, you must register to vote or make any necessary changes to your voter registration by Oct. 19.

In Dudley, early voting can be done in person at the Dudley Municipal Complex, 71 West Main Street, Room 210 during the following dates and times:

- Monday, Oct. 24 to Wednesday, Oct 26 and Monday, Oct. 31 to Wednesday, Nov. 2: 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- Thursday, Oct. 27 & Nov. 3: 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and 5-7 p.m.
- Friday, October 28 & Nov. 4: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

For public convenience, Dudley has also decided to offer weekend hours on Saturday, Oct. 29: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Registered voters also have the option to request an early voting ballot through the mail. Simply fill out an application and mail it to Dudley Town Clerk, 71 West Main Street, Room 207, Dudley, MA 01571. The application can be found on the Secretary of the Commonwealth's website: <http://www.sec.state.ma.us/ele>.

On Tuesday, Nov. 8, the polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the Dudley Senior Center, 71 West Main Street.


Guests brave weather for annual Apple Festival





Upcoming vote on marijuana

Everyone agrees — the November elections will be interesting.

I have received many questions on the upcoming ballot Question 4, which addresses the issue of legalizing recreational use of marijuana in Massachusetts. This is an important matter that will definitely have an impact on

the Town of Dudley and every other community in the state. This is a complex question (approximately 12 printed pages in length) that covers a variety of topics. Space is limited here so I will only be able to address a few items of interest.

Marijuana is still classified as a Schedule One Drug by the Federal Government through the Controlled Substance Act. Legalization by states is contrary to federal regulations. This may be a factor at some point, as when there is a conflict between state and federal law, the federal law prevails. Massachusetts has already taken two steps addressing marijuana use. In 2009, one ounce (app. a sandwich size bag) or less was decriminalized. A civil fine is the maximum penalty for possession only. Cases of distribution or possession of larger amounts remains a criminal offense. A few years after this law change, the use of medical marijuana was approved by voters. This allows individuals to obtain authorization from a doctor to use this substance if it is deemed medically necessary. Even though these laws have their complications, they addressed two main concerns of those who have long favored full legalization. Simple possession of an ounce or less will not result in a jail sentence and those with some form of terminal illness or, as the law provides, "other condition" can obtain permission to use this without fear of penalty. It is important to obtain medical approval since, similar to alcohol, people should never self medicate with marijuana.

The proposed legislation wishes to expand our current laws to full legalization for people age 21 and over. It allows for possession and legal distribution of plant form marijuana as well "edible" products, including candies, oils, resins, concentrates, and beverages. These can include gummies, lollipops, sodas, baked goods, and a variety of other products. These contain a higher concentration of the active ingredient found in marijuana know as tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC. Much of the marijuana cultivated today contains higher amounts of this active ingredient than what was available in years past. This is certainly a concern.

Proponents, as stated on the on the ballot question, claim law enforcement veterans support this legislation and say passage will replace the "black market" sales with a controlled legal market. They also claim we will benefit from the increased tax revenue. As a 28-year law enforcement veteran, I am not in favor of the passage of this question. I have not spoken with anyone currently in law enforcement who supports this. We are experiencing an unprecedented opioid and opiate addiction issue in our area and throughout the country. Heroin overdoses and deaths are at all time highs. They impact every social and economic group. My logic tells me the last thing that will assist with our current drug problems is to increase their availability. Though the percentages can be debated, legalization will increase cases of addiction. Legalization will have a huge impact on our youth as evidenced by the state of Colorado (currently dealing with legalization). They have one of, if not the highest, teenage marijuana use rates in the country. The more access there is to a particular product, the greater likelihood it can be used by those under age. Ask yourself why edible products such as gummy bears, lollipops, and sodas are included in this legislation? Are they being marketed for an adult audience? We have strict tobacco rules everywhere today. Candy cigarettes or bubble gum cigars are no longer sold as they were believed to attract future smokers. Promoting these marijuana based products in this fashion appears to have similarities with tobacco.

A legalized and regulated industry will not replace the "black" market or street level sales. In Colorado, law enforcement has actually seen an increase in these activities, even to the point where out of state dealers have come in to take advantage of legal pot sales. Home production of alcohol is a complex process which takes time and money. Marijuana, on the other hand, can be grown rather easily by most people and at a relatively low cost. When distribution is legal, illegal sales opportunities exist to undercut

The best bang for your buck when doing minor renovations

Please contact your real estate agent and consult with them before making renovations if you are planning on selling or just to understand how your decisions will affect the resale value of your home. Most of the time I will find that some of the improvements were not necessary and other necessary items were overlooked. The most cost effective simple improvements are:

1. If you have wallpaper, strip the wallpaper and paint. I have found warm water with fabric softener to work well to remove wallpaper. You can also use a steamer or there are products at your local hardware store that can be purchased. I'm sure there are plenty of other methods.
2. Paint all rooms in the entire house with neutral colors, including ceilings because many times we don't realize just how much a fresh coat of white paint on the ceiling will make the room pop.
3. If you have carpets over the hardwoods pull the carpets to expose the hardwoods and refinish the floors. If hardwoods are damaged, you may find installing new carpet that is a neutral color to be more cost effective than the repairs or just have carpets professionally cleaned.
4. Have your home professionally cleaned and setup a cleaning service while the home is on the market even if your home is vacant.
5. For under \$100 you can install some very high wattage light bulbs to brighten up your home. Some sources show return on investment on this being over 700 percent and maybe even consider adding some light fixtures in rooms without them. If it is easy to access for an electrician it may make sense to add overhead lighting in rooms that currently don't have them.

6. Small improvements to the bathroom such as a new vanity, toilet seat, grout, and drawer handles are a good idea. You may get as much as 200 percent return on these investments.

7. Kitchen improvements such as appliances, countertops and cabinets. Sometimes even just painting cabinets will give the kitchen a much cleaner look and make it so buyers don't think they need to replace them right away. Also replacing the hardware on the cabinets can bring them back to life. Many times sellers will ask if we can include a credit for these items, instead of making the repairs. History of auctions

While auction bidders are entering bids on their smart phone they may not be aware that they are taking part in an event whose history dates back as far as Ancient Greece in 500 BC.

A sourcebook on the Fordham University website states that Marcus Aurelius didn't have any money to pay his soldiers during his rule from 161 to 180 AD. He sold his imperial furniture and decorations in the Forum of Trajan. The National Auctioneers Association reports that Rome was the first "nation" to license auctioneers. The "Magister Auctionarium" drove a stake into the ground to start the auction.

When the Pilgrims arrived in America they used auctions to sell "crops, imports, livestock, tools, slaves and entire farms." Candles were used at auctions in the 1700's. If you were the high bidder on an item when the candle burnt out and the flame died you won the bidding. By the mid-1700's auctions were often held at taverns. Elaborate and detailed catalogs were created to auction works of art. George Washington was an avid auction buyer.

During the Civil War colonels were the only people allowed to auction war plunder. Auctioneers today now hold the honorary title of Colonel. The first

auctioneer school in the United States was opened in 1906. Many auctioneers were needed to liquidate assets during the Great Depression. Over the years, auctions continued to be a preferred method to liquidate business assets, to sell personal property from estates and to sell valuable objects of all kinds.

The Internet has changed the way most businesses operate and auctions are no exception. eBay was founded in 1995 and offers a way to auction items online. There are many other platforms now available for both online sellers and buyers.

When we recently ran an auction with an important collection of radios we took advantage of modern technology but also used some tried and true methods. A scribe entered winning bidder figures into a PC that was networked into other computers used by clerks. The clerks used the computers to check people in and cash them out at the end of the sale. Some bidders had called us prior to the auction and left absentee bids. Our staff also handled telephone bids from bidders who couldn't attend in person. We had a speakerphone so bidders across the country could hear my bid calling while they bid on the radios with their personal computers or smart phones. Despite all of the modern

technology, the auction had an old fashioned feel for those who attended. The client had a catered barbeque and the auction took place under a tent on his lawn. Modern technology is great but I'm sure those who were able to attend and bid live under the tent found that it was well worth the drive to attend in person and be a part of the event.

The preview for a Worcester online moving sale of a doctor's home takes place on Oct. 8. Our September radio auction generated over \$200,000 in sales

the market price or simply sell it to those underage. In places where it is legal, it has created what is known as a "gray" market, where legal cultivators sell products "under the table." Marijuana sales are strictly a cash business. This increases opportunities for crimes, such as robbery, and can allow for the under reporting of sales, which will directly impact tax revenues. Any

additional taxes raised through the sale of these products will never equal the societal costs associated with addiction and treatment.

Legalized drug sales at this time are a terrible idea. In Massachusetts we have already addressed the two main marijuana concerns; no incarceration for simple possession and controlled access to it for medical needs. We as a society will deal with all the impacts associated with increased drug availability and addiction. As police officers, we see the results of addiction daily, through

health issues, addiction, and increased criminal activity.

A great deal of information is available on this important issue. Voters must educate themselves on this subject and make an informed decision. It is my duty as a police chief to inform town voters of my concerns and allow them to make their choice. Challenged by head coach, Bay Path's defense helps top David Prouty

SPENCER — After the Bay Path Regional varsity football team lost a 44-13 decision to Blackstone Valley Tech on Sept. 24, head coach Matt Fall challenged his defense. The message didn't seem to be delivered when David Prouty Regional's Darrell Beer scored a 22-yard rushing touchdown in the first minute when the Minutemen and Panthers squared off on Friday evening, Sept. 30, at a rain-soaked Eugene R. Hurley Athletic Field. But in the end Bay Path's 'D' proved to be up to the task, holding Prouty scoreless the rest of the way en route to a 34-6 victory.

"The first thing you want to think is, 'Here we go again,' but the mistake that was made on that play was an easy fix. They figured it out," Fall said. "As far as that challenge...I'm going to add on to that challenge a little bit this week, but I'm happy with how they responded after a tough loss last week."

Fall is keeping the exact message between he and the defense private.

"Our defensive line stepped up a lot this week," said Bay Path's Matt Pecore, a member of the linebacker unit. "Our linebackers, we finally got together. We did some good work this week."

Pecore also played fullback and was a vital force on the offensive end. He carried the ball 11 times for 117 yards and 3 touchdowns while also setting up blocks for tailback Pat Dyer (16 carries, 136 yards, TD, two-point conversion).

It didn't hurt that Pecore cherishes playing in what most would call poor playing conditions.

"This is my favorite weather, ever since Dudley/Charlton," he said of learning to play the game in AYF.

Pecore was quick to mention the standout performances of the linemen and Dyer as well.

"Thanks to my linemen I had great yards and great carries this week, and so did my tailback Pat Dyer," he said. "He follows behind me and I'll get him yards no matter what."

Fall also praised the play of the linemen, Pecore and Dyer.

"I have to give props to the offensive line tonight," he began. "After last week they really worked hard this week. Our offensive line coach, Tony Salvaggio, got them rocking this week, and obviously that hard work pays off."

In regard to Pecore, Fall said, "Pecore is a downhill runner and he's a bruiser back. He's going to get you those tough yards."

And Fall noted that Dyer is "a football

kid. He has a very good football mind. He really just enjoys the game — all conditions, all weather. He's just one of those kids that you like to coach because he loves the game genuinely."

Dyer tied the score at 6-6 midway through the second quarter on a 48-yard run. On the play he lowered his shoulder and broke a pair of would-be Prouty tacklers before finding the end zone. The Minutemen took the lead at 7-6 thanks to Ben Paquette's extra point kick and were quick to add more points.

Just a minute later — following a successful onside kick — Pecore scored from 22 yards out on a run up the gut that also saw him break a couple of tackles.

The score remained 13-6 at halftime, but Bay Path found the end zone nearing the end of the third quarter to up the advantage to 21-6. Pecore scored on a 9-yard jaunt up the middle, diving into the end zone to elude a defender. Dyer added the two-point conversion rush.

Then, with 7:56 to play, Pecore broke a shoestring tackle to score from 23 yards out, and Paquette kicked the extra point to make it 28-6.

The Minutemen — who improved to 2-2 — scored their final points with 4:19 to go when John O'loughlin made the most of his only carry, a 54-yard score, which included spinning 360 degrees to

break a tackle.

David Prouty, meanwhile, lost their first game of the season after starting 3-0.

"We have to get better," said head coach Nate Orzech, noting that their victories were shootouts. "We can't keep giving up 35, 40 points a game or we're not going to win any games."

Orzech also mentioned the stellar play of Bay Path, stating, "They did an awesome job. They came out and they played better than us and they deserve everything that they got."

It didn't help the Panthers' cause that starting quarterback Kyle Driscoll injured an ankle during the second quarter. As a result, both Joe Thebeau and Evan Fritze split the quarterbacking duties before giving way to Jason Anderson in the fourth period.

"That's completely on us. We didn't have our kids prepared. They have not had enough reps," Orzech said of Thebeau and Fritze taking over under center. "Those kids did a nice job with the amount of reps that they had."

Beer was Prouty's most productive offensive player, finishing with 143 rushing yards and the TD on 20 carries, while Anthony Barrett made multiple tackles on the defensive side of the ball.

Connecticut — second place in 50 meters, fourth place in 100 meters, long jump and javelin.



Rhode Island — second place in 50 meters, third place in javelin.

DUDLEY — Competing in the Midland Wachusett League A Division, perhaps the top league in all of Central Mass., there are no easy matches for the Shepherd Hill Regional varsity volleyball team. With that being said, head coach Tom Caffelle hopes for his team to compete night in and night out, and that was no different when the Rams hosted Wachusett Regional on Tuesday, Sept. 27.

"We're in a very tough league with a lot of good teams so we knew this

was going to be a dog-fight, but we've been playing better and we figured if we gave it our best shot we'd compete. That's our goal is always to compete," he said.

And a high compete level can oftentimes produce victories, which was exactly the case as Shepherd Hill outlasted the Mountaineers, 3-2. Set scores were 25-23, 17-25, 17-25, 25-18, 16-14.

Senior Kyra Foss — who played an integral part in the Rams' victory — was quick to mention that this win was a little more special than the others.

"This was the best win I've ever had at Shepherd Hill," she said. "I don't even know how to feel. Every year we always get killed by them in three sets."

The first set started strong for the Rams when Federica Mozzarelli provided six straight service points — she finished with 12 in total — as they jumped out to a 7-2 lead.

Shepherd Hill maintained its lead until Wachusett rallied to pull ahead, 23-22. But the Rams scored the set's final three points to win a close one, 25-23.

"I was proud of them because we fell behind in that set and then we came back," said Caffelle, who last served as the team's coach in 2013 before returning this fall.

The Mountaineers gained leads of 5-0 and 6-0 in the second and third sets, respectively, and never trailed as they gained control of the match, 2-1.

And Wachusett took a 13-10 lead in set No. 4 before they were unable to get the ball back over the net. Now trailing, 13-11, Foss stepped to the line to serve for the Rams. Eight straight service points later — she finished with a team-high 16 — and The Hill took a 19-13 lead before finishing off the 25-18 set victory courtesy of an ace from Ingrid Lindstrom.

"Every time I hit it I just say, 'This is going over,' and hopefully it does," Foss explained about her serving prowess, adding that she keeps her mindset simple to not overcomplicate the matter.

Now down to the deciding fifth set, which plays to 15 points (win by two), Wachusett surged ahead, 11-7. But the Rams were able to rally again and saw the set tied at 14-14. They took a 15-14 lead when Lindstrom's long hit was un-returnable, and they won the match a point later when a long rally finished with the Mountaineers hitting the ball into the net.

"I was really proud of the way in the fourth and even the fifth set how we fell behind early and we hung in there," said Caffelle. "We always talk about the next point

being the important point. There's no three-point play in volleyball — you have to earn them one at a time.

"Today was the fruit of our labor in the sense that we were able to come back and win a set and come back and win a match," he added.

With the Rams' record now at 5-4, they hope for more improvement and production.

"I think they realize that we have to work hard every day to improve. By improving every day, it allows us to compete," Caffelle explained, adding that the services of volunteer assistant Tony Wong-Li has been a big help. "The goal is to compete, and that's why I told them after the game that this is a great win, but we have to try to be even better tomorrow."

Should Shepherd Hill get better tomorrow and every day moving forward, a spot in the district tournament — 10 or more wins in the 20-match regular season is the qualifier — can be achieved.

"I'm looking forward to hopefully making it to districts because we haven't done that in a long time," Foss concluded.

Blaze damages home on Third Street in Webster

with smoke, fire and water damage, but the residents of the building uninjured. Hickey said the quick thinking of a neighbor allowed crews to respond immediately to the situation a little after 5 p.m. that day.

"The woman who lives on the right side of the house came home and heard the smoke detectors going off and saw smoke. She called 911. There was actually fire in

the building," Hickey said. "The residents had actually gone to the movies. We determined that the fire started in the living room area of that side of the home."

Crews from Douglas, Dudley and Oxford joined in to help resolve the situation, with crews from the Quinebaug Volunteer Fire Department in Thompson, right across the Connecticut border, covering the Webster Fire Department while crews went to work. Hickey said it was a great

effort by all involved to gain control of the situation before it got too out of hand.

"The initial crew did an outstanding job of knocking the fire down. There was quite a bit of fire in that room when we got there," said the chief. "The Webster Police, my department and the Massachusetts State Fire Marshal are performing an investigation right now. It doesn't appear to be suspicious, but we're trying to figure out exactly what went on."

The residents of the home were temporarily displaced from the incident while inspectors determine the structural integrity of the building following the fire. Chief Hickey said that while firefighters had multiple homes to manage while putting out the blaze, they didn't put the focus on preventing the fire from damaging the other home specifically. The fire was tackled from all sides with the intent of reducing damage to the entire structure, which

was helped by the construction of the building as well.

"You have to look at it in terms of trying to contain what you have," Hickey said. "The first engines did a good job getting it under control and the crews that came in behind them were a great help. We did our best to contain it to where it is and those types of buildings are built with fire stop between them that helps prevent the fire from moving from one side to the others."

The chief went on to compliment the personnel of all the departments that responded to the scene noting that with limited personnel on board these days everyone who makes the effort to be a part of the response is not only valuable, but essential in making sure the job gets done.

done a calculation based on \$20 an hour, minimal hours on off-season and more hours in the summer of course and during our beach operations. The \$15,000 is available from the Senior Center custodian salary account because the Senior Center Director came to me, and this is a team approach to our budgeting, and she has found alternate funding for her half of the full-time second shift custodian that we currently have," Leduc explained, also noting that janitor position will be covered with grant money going forward.

Another item, Article 4 to be precise, will also include existing money from the town's General Liability Insurance Account to implement a new system that Leduc noted has been discussed heavily in recent Board of Selectmen meetings.

"This is the appropriation required if we're going to implement the Code Red that Selectman (Robert) Miller has brought up. We will have a presentation on Oct. 11. This \$5,000 is what it would cost us to implement this system from Nov. 1 through June 30," Leduc said. "This is a system that's utilized by many communities. When the Town Meeting Review Committee was meet-

ing we talked about how to get the word out to residents and we've implemented a few of those things that we were able to. A system like this was something that we talked about."

Miller said he feels this Code Red system expenditure will be worth the investment as it will allow the town, and several of its departments including water, sewer and highway, to use a single system to contact multiple residents about any issues or delays to be expected in Webster.

"If there's a road out for whatever they could use that or if there's a sewer or water problem somewhere everybody could be notified properly

instead of, 'Oh, I have brown water today,'" Miller said.

Article 13 on the Town Meeting warrant is a bit wordy, but in summary it is an act that, according to Leduc, was put on the warrant at the request of State Rep. Joe McKenna and requires Town Meeting authorization for a conservation restriction exchange for the property owner of Sunny Shores. The plan was approved and vetted by both the Conservation Commission in Webster as well as selectmen and a town meeting is the final step before the business can take its request to the state.

Other highlights of the 2016 Webster fall Annual Town Meeting agenda include a

motion to make the ADA Committee in Webster a Commission on Disability, an article authorizing the use of town land for the local Head Start program, a citizen petition to adopt Dominique Drive as a town road and a citizens petition to implement a bylaw concerning wildlife feeding in the town.

The full town meeting warrant can be found on the town of Webster's website. The fall annual town meeting will take place on Monday, Oct. 17, at 7 p.m. at Bartlett High School.

OBA book looks back at Oxford during World War II

and women that were a part of the town's personal growth and events that occurred on a national scale. Oxford Business Association member Terrance Cummings presented the book to the Board of Selectmen in late September, saying the idea stemmed from his reading of "The Greatest Generation," by Tom Brokaw. That book detailed the generation that grew up and participated during World War II with this new book, sharing a similar title to Brokaw's work, focusing primarily on Oxford's greatest generation.

"When I was reading that I noticed there was nothing in there from Oxford, so the OBA got together and we decided we would produce [the book]," Cummings told selectmen.

Cummings presented the book with pride, and said it's only the latest work in the Oxford Business Association's continuous attempts to honor the history of the town and the people who made Oxford, and the nation, great. The book is a follow-up to the OBA's 2013 release, "Oxford 1713-2013," which excluded World War II, as the OBA felt there was so much history to explore in that era that it deserved its own book to cover it all. After three years of work, the book is finally being made

available, with copies up for purchase during the recent Oxford Fall Festival and more being made available through the Oxford Free Public Library during its annual book sale from Oct. 13-15.

In presenting the book to the Board of Selectmen, Cummings read the forward that was written by OBA member Dan Prouty that explained the book is more than just a look at Oxford's history, but a long awaited tribute to those from Oxford who make up part of The Greatest Generation.

"For over three years we have been researching our World War II heroes who were Oxford residents before and after the war. We only wish we had the time, resources and inclination to undertake this effort 30 years ago when our veterans were still among us," Prouty wrote. "While reaching out to our contemporaries to obtain information on our subjects we heard the common theme, 'I know my dad was in Europe, North Africa and the Pacific but he never talked about it.' We were fortunate enough to have received many old family photos and newspaper clippings of that era to put together a collection that will tell their story in history. A story of some who paid the ultimate sacrifice."

The book contains many different stories of veterans from World War II who were able to share their experiences personally or through their families

to be a part of the book. Many of these veterans continued to contribute to Oxford when they returned home while others settled into their family lives to rebuild after leaving them behind to take part in the conflict. Some were brothers, other husbands and fathers and mothers, but all played a part in the historic war and remained forever a part of Oxford history and the community because of it.

The long awaited book received praise from selectmen, with Chairman Dennis Lamarche calling the book a fitting tribute.

"The younger generation has no clue what happened in 2011, never mind what happened in World War II. You have excerpts in there from people who have given quotes of what they have done so it's a great history document for our younger generation," he said. "I personally say thank you to the OBA and Terrance. He's put a lot of work into it and the OBA."

Selectman Cheryll LeBlanc purchased a copy of the book while attending the Fall Festival and said it is a great product and a fascinating read. Selectman John Saad, who had previously praised the book at a past Board of Selectmen meeting, reasserted his love for the book and his appreciation for the work of the OBA to make it a reality.

"When I first got the book and I looked

at it I was flabbergasted. I knew a lot of these people and of course many of them have passed away. I just feel bad that my dad never got to see it because he's in the book and he was the first enlistee from the town of Oxford to go to war," Saad said. "I'm sure he would have been very proud to see what's in there regarding him. I also have an uncle in there as well. I was amazed at some of the people I knew over the years that have served in World War II that I never knew what they did or where they went - These people went through hell and if you read some of the stories in there and where these people were and what they did it's a wake up call."

The booklet was funded in part by IPG Photonics Inc., Stephen Donovan, the Daniel Prouty Trust, the Oxford Honor Guard, Coonan Insurance and George DeFalco, Jr. with volunteers including Prouty and Cummings as well as Earl Holmberg, John Prouty, Larry Crowley, Tony Sgariglia, Russ Garre and Carol Manzi. All proceed from the book will help produce more books through the Oxford Business Association further exploring the history of the Town of Oxford, according to Cummings.

I was originally assigned to an engine module but I got to detail out with hot-shot crews just because my fire management officer thought that I could hold up with the guys," Caney told selectmen. "They're more of an aggressive crew. They get sent out first. They go to the biggest fires. They're kind of like a quick strike force that gets in there."

With a strong interest in forestry and wildlife conservation, as well as his college major in Wildlife Biology, Caney found himself fascinated with the job and last year helped manage wildfires a little closer to home on the east coast in South Carolina and Georgia. While on the west coast Caney pulled 16-hour

shifts and worked chainsaws cutting down massive trees that were either fire hazards or were actually burning. That was all in a days work for a firefighter who quickly became one of the guys on his crew of dedicated workers who take their jobs very seriously while also finding a bit of enjoyment in their career of choice.

"A lot of us do it because it's a lot of fun," Caney said. "We like the challenge and we all like being outside and helping other people in ways that are just different I guess."

Dudley Fire Chief Dean Kochanowski praised the young firefighter as one of his best and said that it was no surprise to him that Caney took his job on the west coast seriously and embraced the opportunity to help his fellow man so fully.

"If you watched any of the national news you'd know there were some pret-

ty intense fires out there. I just thought he did an extraordinary job," said the chief when introducing Caney to selectmen. "He's a very dedicated individual. He's very dedicated to the department locally."

Caney said he brought back a lot of knowledge from his experience on the west coast and got to try a few new and exciting things, including chopping down the massive trees and riding on a helicopter to be a part of aerial assaults on the fire, but one of the shining memories of his time over the summer was seeing first hand the appreciation of homeowners whose homes are still standing because of his work and the work of his many colleagues day in and day out.

"It's actually eye opening to see what people out west go through with wildfires compared to how we have it over here," Caney said. "Ecosystems are dif-

ferent. Fire dangers not as high with wildfires out here."

Caney said this won't be his last time joining in the fight against wildfires and he looks forward to the opportunity to embrace new challenges and adventures when the time comes for him to step up to that plate once again.

Webster and Dudley Fire Department personnel recently completed a boating safety course, expanding their knowledge of regulations and skills on the water.

The local Tri-State Flotilla 10-2 of the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary instructors offered the "About Boating Safely" course and materials to the departments as various types of on-water crafts are now utilized in fire & rescue operations. The ABS is approved by the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators and meets state education requirements in the U.S. and several international waters to operate a power driven vessel. This same course is given to

the local boaters to meet state requirements.

Webster Fire Chief Brian Hickey and Captain Paul Konieczny from Dudley Fire Department completed the course along with several of our local first responders.

A USCG Aux. Certificate of Appreciation was awarded to the Webster Fire Department for their continued support in providing their classroom location for the Tri-State Flotilla's public education program. First District Northern Region Commodore Philip Kubat, also 10-2's Public Education Officer, along with Tri State Flotilla 10-2 Commander Ed Tavares presented the certificate to Chief Brian Hickey.

Established by Congress in 1939 the USCG Aux. is a volunteer, civilian component of the CG supporting operational, administrative, and logistical requirements directed by the Commandant of the USCG or Secretary of Homeland security. Trained crews and facilities augment the CG, enhance safety and security of our ports, waterways, and coastal regions. They give their time and experience to promote and improve Recreational Boating Safety by instructing several different courses, and offering Vessel Safety Checks at area boat ramps or by request at www.cgaux.org.

Whether it's a lake or one of the many local ponds, any-

one using power, sails, or paddles should take the time to know the rules and regulations making boating safer. All one has to do is watch the ads on TV or print showing someone heading into the sunset on a paddleboard, with no sign of having a lifejacket on or with them. Paddlecraft drownings by good swimmers on a perfect summer day, while not wearing a lifejacket have become the highest fatality statistic in the last two years. Lifejackets are required on all Paddlecraft, and must be worn in canoes or kayaks from Sept. 15 to May 15 in Massachusetts. Anyone near our local waters have seen boats operating at higher than headway speed (5-7 mph) with-

in 150 feet of the shore, dock, or float; or worse, operating within 75 feet of marked swimming areas, or near a diver-down flag. It's a basic lack of knowing the regulations, navigation rules, equipment requirements, horn signals, etc. all covered in a basic course like the ABS. Don't let a great day on the water turn into a nightmare...sign into our next public one-day ABS course at the Webster Fire Department on Saturday, Oct. 22 and be part of the safe boating solution.

Vote for smart investment moves

The presidential election is little more than a month away. Like all elections, this one has generated considerable interest, and, as a citizen, you may well be following it closely. But as an investor, how much should you be concerned about the outcome?

The bottom line? From your viewpoint as an investor, don't worry too much about what happens in November. Instead, follow these investment strategies:

Stay invested. If you stop investing when the

market is down in an effort to cut your losses, you may miss the opportunity to participate in the next rally - and the early stages of a rally are typically when the biggest gains occur.

Diversify. By spreading your dollars among an array of investments, such as stocks, bonds and other investments, you can help reduce the possibility of your portfolio taking a big hit if a market downturn primarily affected just one type of financial asset. Keep in mind though, that diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.

Stay within your risk tolerance. Investing always involves risk, but you'll probably be more successful (and less stressed out) if you don't stray beyond your individual risk tolerance. Waste not, want not: Tips to save money

The old depression era adage “use it up, wear it out, make it do or do without” rings true today, as the stalled economy has almost everyone tightening their financial belts.

The most simple (and painless) way to boost the family budget is cutting down on household waste. While statistics show the average household has a long way to go when it comes to conserving the basic necessities, a renewed awareness and a little effort can have a huge “payback” — proving the conservation of food, water and fuel is good for the pocketbook as well as the planet!

Food Facts: According to a study done by the USDA, Americans waste almost 27 percent of all the food produced in the U.S. each year. In fact, the average household throws away more than 1.25 pounds of food each day, a 50 percent increase since 1974. That means the average family of four is currently losing approximately \$590 worth of food each year! Ready to do something about it? Read on for some suggestions:

Live by the list: Research reveals grocery shopping without a list can account for spending 20 percent more than planned. The study also shows impulse buying occurs

on almost than 60 percent of all supermarket trips! Whether you jot down your pantry needs on paper or use a shopping list app, this first step can nip food waste in the bud!

Soup it up: Most of us are guilty of throwing out the ends of chopped vegetables, or carrot tops, celery leaves, and stems from herbs and such, but the truth is these throwaways are full of flavor. Make it a habit to toss veggie odds and ends into ziplock bags and store the freezer. Do the same for vegetables that are starting to wilt. When you have enough for stock, simply boil up and strain as a base for homemade soups and stews.

Daily bread: Think before you fling out that stale bagel, bread heel, or bag of post cook-out hot dog rolls. Allow breads to dry out, and then periodically whirl them in the blender to create flavorful bread crumbs. Add Italian or other seasonings to vary the tastes. You’ll never have to buy breadcrumbs again.

Freeze food costs: If you are a single person household or can’t consume a loaf of bread before it goes stale, why not freeze the loaf upon purchase and defrost slices on a daily basis? Ditto for bakery items such as rolls and donuts (raised freeze better than cake donuts). Keep baked goods in the freezer and take out as much as you need each morning.

Loose is less: Buying fruits, vegetables, hot dogs and deli meats loose, rather than by

the bag or pound, eliminates waste. As a bonus, you often end up with fresher foods.

Chow challenge: Want to test your culinary creativity while cutting down on food waste and costs? Plan a “grocery free shopping week” every other month. Skip the weekly shopping trip and vow to make meals using only pantry, fridge and freezer foods on hand. This not only encourages creativity in the kitchen but it can be a fun family challenge.

Water Works: Saving our natural resources is an important effort that all ages can participate in. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promotes water efficiency year round, and offers these “water waster” solutions:

Locate a leak: Leaky faucets that drip at the rate of one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons of water each year, but it’s not always easy to gauge whether or not you have a leak. Here’s an easy test: If you’re unsure if you have a leak, read your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, you probably have a leak.

Toilet trouble: According to the American Water Works Association, toilets account for 45 percent of all indoor water use in an average household. It is estimated that 20 percent of all toilets leak - and that translates into 200 gallons of water wasted every day! To tell if your toilet has a leak, place

a drop of food coloring in the tank and wait a half hour. If the color shows in the bowl without flushing, you have a leak.

Tub tip: Did you know full bath tub requires about 70 gallons of water, while taking a five-minute shower uses 10 to 25 gallons? If you must take a bath, be sure to stopper the drain immediately and adjust the temperature as you fill the tub to prevent waste.

Tap the savings: The average bathroom faucet flows at a rate of two gallons per minute. But the simple act of turning off the tap while brushing your teeth in the morning and at bedtime can save up to 8 gallons of water per day, which equals 240 gallons a month!

Offset pump prices: With gasoline prices unpredictable, most of us have practiced the basics of fuel conservation, from eliminating the junk in our trunk and properly inflating tires to avoiding high speeds and jack rabbit starts. Just in case you haven’t heard, here are a few more suggestions to cut your fuel costs down to size:

Filter Fix: Want to improve your gas mileage by as much as 10 percent? Check your air filter. Statistics show nearly one in every four cars needs their air filter replaced.

Always align: Did you know poor alignment not only wears your tires out faster, but it forces your engine to work harder? Proper aligning of tires can cut up to 10 percent of gas usage.

Idle debate: The big debate continues. At what point is it more efficient to turn off the ignition rather than let the engine idle? According to car experts, here’s a rule of thumb: For most vehicles the energy balance will be positive if you shut off the car for more than 20 seconds. You’ll realize even more fuel savings if you are running the air conditioning while idling.

At this time the Oxford Police are attempting to locate the proper owner of the firearm. Each juvenile was arraigned Monday, Sept. 26, at Dudley District Court on multiple firearm and ammunition charges, as well as the operator facing motor vehicle charges.

½ cup vegetable oil
½ cup sour cream, room temperature
2 large eggs, room temperature
1½ teaspoons vanilla extract

FROSTING:

¾ cup heavy whipping

cream
5 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut into ½-inch pieces
3 tablespoons granulated sugar
3 tablespoons water
½ teaspoon salt
1⅔ cups (10 ounces) NESTLÉ® TOLL HOUSE® Dark Chocolate Morsels
½ teaspoon

FOR CAKE:

PREHEAT oven to 325° F. Grease two 8-inch-round cake pans. Line bottoms with wax paper.

COMBINE sugar, flour, baking soda and salt in large bowl. Bring coffee to simmer in small, heavy-duty saucepan. Remove from heat. Add 1 cup morsels; whisk until chocolate is melted and smooth. Cool slightly.

WHISK vegetable oil, sour cream, eggs and vanilla extract in another large bowl to blend. Add chocolate-coffee mixture; whisk to blend well. BAKE for 33 to 35 minutes or until wooden picks inserted in centers come out clean. Cool in pans on wire racks for 10 minutes. Run knife around edges of cakes. Invert onto wire racks; remove wax paper. Cool completely. Spread frosting between layers and over top and sides of cake. Store any leftover cake in refrigerator. Bring to room temperature before serving.

FOR FROSTING:

BRING cream, butter, sugar, water and salt to simmer in medium, heavy-duty saucepan over medium heat, stirring frequently. Remove from heat. Immediately add 1⅔ cups morsels; let stand for 2 minutes. Whisk until melted and smooth. Add vanilla extract. Pour into medium bowl. Refrigerate, stirring occasionally, for about 1 hour or until thick enough to spread.

Smoked Chicken Nachos With Chipotle Cream And Avocado

Serves: 6 | Prep Time: 20 Minutes | Grilling Time: 32 To 39 Minutes | Special Equipment: 2 Large Handfuls Mesquite Or Hickory Wood Chips, Large Grill-Proof Pan Or Disposable Foil Pan

Chipotle Cream

1 cup sour cream
1 canned chipotle chile pepper in adobo sauce, minced
1 tablespoon fresh lime juice
¼ teaspoon kosher salt

Rub
2 teaspoons kosher salt
1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
1 teaspoon ground cumin

1 teaspoon paprika
½ teaspoon ground cayenne pepper

4 chicken breast halves (with bone and skin), each about 8 ounces

12 ounces corn tortilla chips

14 ounces Monterey Jack cheese, coarsely grated

4 scallions, cut into thin slices

2 tablespoons finely chopped jalapeño chile peppers

1 large Hass avocado, cut into ½-inch cubes

Juice of ½ lime

¼ cup roughly chopped fresh cilantro leaves

Store-bought salsa (optional)

This is a fun way to use up leftover barbecued chicken or turkey. Who doesn't love some cheesy, meaty nachos with smoky sour cream and fresh avocado? It's worth smoking some spice-rubbed chicken breasts just for this recipe. Using bone-in rather than boneless chicken breasts requires a longer cooking time, but there's a dividend: the meat has more time to absorb the flavorful smoke.

1. Soak the wood chips in water for at least 30 minutes.

2. Whisk the chipotle cream ingredients, including any juices remaining from mincing the chipotle chile. Refrigerate until ready to use.

3. Prepare the grill for indirect cooking over medium heat (350° to 450° F).

4. Mix the rub ingredients. Season the chicken breasts all over

and between the skin and meat with the rub.

5. Drain and add the wood chips to the charcoal or to the smoker box of a gas grill, following manufacturer's instructions, and close the lid. When smoke appears, grill the chicken, skin side down first, over indirect medium heat, with the lid closed, until the juices run clear and the meat is no longer pink at the bone, 25 to 30 minutes, turning once when the skin releases easily from the cooking grates. Remove the chicken from the grill and, when cool enough to handle, shred into pieces, discarding the skin and bones.

6. Increase the temperature of the grill to high heat (450° to 500° F).

7. Spread half of the tortilla chips into a large grill-proof pan. Distribute half each of the cheese, scallions, jalapeño, and chicken over the chips. Repeat with another layer.

8. Place the pan with the nachos over indirect high heat, close the lid, and cook until the cheese is melted and the chips are tinged golden brown, 7 to 9 minutes. Wearing insulated barbecue mitts or gloves, carefully transfer the pan to a heatproof surface. Top the nachos with the avocado and then drizzle with the chipotle cream and lime juice. Garnish with the cilantro. Serve hot with salsa, if desired.
