# Dowd named new Chief of Police



Dan Dowd has been named the new Police Chief for Charlton.

Dowd was interviewed by selectmen during a meeting on Feb. 9 and later that evening unanimously picked as the new chief. I would want our officers to treating the citizens as they would treat their own family members and provide the services that they would expect when they show up for work. Obviously, what's going on today with police reform, all those things will help us if we have a strong relationship with the community and we enhance our presence. Being seen in the schools and the community in a positive way will only help us in the future," Dowd said.

Dowd also commented on the need for continued prioritization of traffic improvements and public safety on the roadways after being questions about his position on the matter by Selectman

# Selectmen approve changes to legal counsel policy

CHARLTON – The Charlton Board of Selectmen has updated its policy for accessing town counsel allowing more selectmen opportunities to approach the town's legal representation than in prior years.

In 2004, a policy was put in place that limited access to legal counsel to only the Town Administrator and the chair of the Board of Selectmen. Under the new policy unanimously embraced by selectmen on Feb. 9, any selectman will be allowed to approach legal counsel with a system of checks and balances in place to make sure there is no redundancy in such requests.

"The biggest change is obviously that the members of the board have the right to access the town counsel. There is a process by which new matters would be brought forward and either approved or at least vetted to see whether or not there's already an opinion that's been generated on that," Town Administrator Andrew Golas told the Board of Selectmen. "Generally, it's just so we can keep track of items as they come and try to avoid increased legal costs.

Golas worked on the new policy alongside current Board

of Selectmen chair Karen Spiewak who said the changes were made in order to allow selectmen fair access to legal representation rather than making only two parties the controlling powers over legal advice.

"For us, a major change is if the chair chooses to deny the request it will actually go before the whole board and it will be documented and then the board make a decision, as it should be," Spiewak said.

Selectman Patsy Rydlak commended the change calling it an appropriate step forward toward bringing more transparency to the board.

"If I had an issue and wanted to go to an attorney, the chair and the Town Administrator could say no, and now I'm stuck with my legal issue," Rydlak said. "The form and the process kind of forces it to go before the board. Not that something shady is happening, but if something shady does happen now the entire board is going to be in on it, so I think it just forces transparency on the board. Not that we'd ever need that, but just in case."

It was stressed that the purpose of the policy change was not in response to any particular matter, but rather as a preemptive change for the better.

CHARLTON – Charlton officially has a new police chief. The Board of Selectmen have chosen Dan Dowd, a

police chief following the retirement of Chief Graham Maxfield, to permanently fill the chief position pending

# Warren, Markey condemn Trump acquittal

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Former President Donald Trump has been acquitted for a second time after the House of Representatives voted to impeach the Republican for his alleged involvement in inciting the Jan. 6 insurrection at the Capital Building. Massachusetts's Senators are condemning the Republicans who refused to find Trump guilty of inciting the insurrection labeling them as "cowards."

Senators Elizabeth Warren and Ed Markey both took to Twitter following the vote on Feb. 13 where seven Republicans joined every Democrat in the Senate in voting Trump guilty of the charges against him. However, the vote didn't earn the required number of votes to actually convict the former President the with 57-to-43 tally being ten votes short of the two-third required. Senators Warren and Markey said the Republicans who chose not to convict Trump failed to hold him accountable for his part in the Jan. 6 riots.

"Donald Trump incited a mob of domestic terrorists to attack our Capitol and overturn the election. Even seven Senate Republicans couldn't stomach his act of insurrection. Our democracy must be stronger than the former president and the 43 senators who sided with him today," Warren said on Twitter.

"Donald Trump engaged in an active, willful, intentional attack on our Constitution and our democracy. The Republicans who voted to acquit him are cowards," Markey added in his own Twitter post. The vote to convict Trump would have given the Senate power to prevent him from running for another term in the future. The trial was only the fourth impeachment trial in American history but the second for Trump who was previously impeached by the House and acquitted by the Senate in January of 2020.



# When can children brush their own teeth?

Parents quickly learn that their children go through a transition marked by a desire to be more independent. They're picking out their own mismatched clothes and no longer want any help when solving puzzles or complex toys. That newfound independence signals getting older and can be a healthy thing to nourish. But what happens when a youngster suddenly believes he or she is capable of brushing his or her teeth without assistance?

Parents wrestling with their kids' can-do attitude and if it's wise to allow them to brush their teeth unassisted can familiarize themselves with certain guidelines to determine their youngsters' readiness. According to Scripps Pediatric Dentistry & Orthodontics, most kids are at least six years old before they have developed the finesse and dexterity to handle a toothbrush in a manner that will effectively remove plaque. Dentists also may ask if the child can tie his or her own shoes, which can serve as a barometer of readiness to wield a toothbrush without assistance.

Pediatricians and pediatric dentists recommend that children visit a dentist as soon as a child's first tooth starts to appear. This also is when parents should begin to clean their children's teeth. As a child ages, the natural proclivity to want to take charge of brush-



ing teeth takes hold. The child may not yet have the manual dexterity to brush alone, but parents can encourage the child to brush and then go over the teeth as a "double check." This helps foster independence while also ensur-

ing teeth are fully cleaned.

Flossing may require even more dexterity than brushing, but it is essential for sloughing off plaque that accumulates between teeth and below the gum line, according to Parents magazine. Moms and dads can introduce their children to pre-threaded Y-shaped floss-ing tools, which are easier to handle than loose floss.

Parents will have to check on children even as they age to be sure they are practicing good oral hygiene. Parents who are in doubt about their children's readiness can work with dentists or dental hygienists to assess skills and get other pointers.

# Dental hygiene is about more than just your teeth



Individuals tend to learn about dental hygiene at an early age. On the recommendation of their children's pediatricians, parents may begin brushing their youngsters' teeth the moment the first tooth breaks through the gums. While prop er dental hygiene is vital to

oral health might contribute to various diseases and conditions. Periodontitis is a severe yet preventable gum infection that can lead to tooth loss if left untreated. But the threat of periodontitis doesn't end in the mouth. The American Academy of Periodontology notes there's a connection between periodontitis and several other diseases. While bacteria was long suspected to be the link between periodontitis and other diseases in the body, the AAP notes that recent research points to inflammation as the culprit that connects periodontitis with diseases such as diabetes and heart disease.

#### DIABETES

The AAP notes that people with diabetes are at increased risk for periodontal disease, speculating that diabetes patients' risk is higher because people with diabetes are more vulnerable to infections than those without diabetes. While that suggests periodontal disease is a byproduct of diabetes, the AAP notes that research points to the relationship being a two-way street. Periodontal disease may make it more difficult for people with diabetes to control their blood sugar, making dental hygiene an especially vital component of routine healthcare for people with diabetes.

#### **HEART DISEASE**

The AAP notes that research indicates periodontal disease increases a person's risk for heart disease, with the inflammation caused by the former leading to the latter. People with existing heart conditions also may find that periodontal disease exacerbates those conditions. The Mayo Clinic notes that the link between heart disease and periodontal disease is not fully understood, but enough studies have been conducted for scientists to support the notion that the two are connected.

#### CAN PERIODONTAL DISEASE BE **PREVENTED?**

Periodontal disease is preventable. A daily dental hygiene regimen that includes brushing after meals, flossing at least once per day and swishing with mouthwash are some simple, healthy habits that can prevent periodontal disease. In addition, the AAP recommends that people at increased risk for periodontal disease, including the elderly and smokers, should discuss their risk with their dental professionals.

# **Breathalyzer** issues cast doubt on DUI convictions

REGION - Thousands of Worcester County defendants charged with operating under the influence of alcohol might have the opportunity for a new trial.

Over the next few weeks, defendants will receive letters in the mail indicating they may be entitled to a new trial because of problems with breathalyzer evidence, according to Worcester County District Attorney Joseph Early, Jr.

The breathalyzer tests in question were administered between 2011 and 2018. Statewide, there are about 27,000 defendants who may be eligible to contest their convictions.

Patricia Rydlak. Dowd said that the traffic situation has become a "logistical nightmare" for his officers and needs to be addressed in a big way in the coming years.

"Normally, I have two or three people on and trying to put them all over town is difficult with limited resources. Down the road I'd like to get a second traffic officer That's something I'm going to be asking for. I stress to my officers all the time that's one of our biggest complaints," said Dowd. Another question came from Board of Selectmen Student Representative Henry Weiland who spoke to the 2020 protests against police violence against minorities and how towns like Webster help peaceful protests. He asked Dowd how he would handle such a situation as chief. "Several of us went over the Webster, several went to Southbridge and Sturbridge. Most of the protests around here were peaceful so I don't think there was ever any need for officers to get involved other than to just make sure vehicles can travel while the protest was going on," Dowd responded. "We've

been very fortunate in this part of the country - (Rioting) triggers a different type of reaction, but most police officers know that people have rights and they certainly have a right to protest peacefully. A lot of times positive change comes from those types of protests."

Dowd concluded by saying as a chief he would like to "recruit, retrain and promote quality people" showing concern about the command staff aging and approaching retirement out without succession plans in place. He would like to facilitate a stronger relationship between commanding officers and the younger members of the force to give them the experience to possibly move up into higher positions within the department in the future. He also stated a need for continued improvement in department communication infrastructure praising the ongoing radio upgrade project currently underway.



estate-planning issues. Nonetheless, the task does not have to be overwhelming - as long as you put sufficient time and thought into it. Here are some ideas that may help:

Seek fairness – but be flexible. Even in a nonblended family, it's not always easy to be as equitable as you'd like in your estate plans – too often, someone feels they have been treated unfairly. In a blended family, these problems can be exacerbated: Will biological children feel cheated? Will stepchildren? Keep this in mind: Fair is not always equal - and equal is not always fair. When deciding how to divide your assets, you'll need to make some judgment calls after carefully evaluating the needs of all your family members. There's no guarantee that everyone will be satisfied, but you'll have done your best.

Communicate your wishes clearly. When it comes to estate planning, the best surprise is no surprise - and that's especially true in a blended family. Even if you're the one creating your estate plans, try to involve other family members - and make your wishes and goals clear. You don't have to be specific down to the last dollar, but you should provide a pretty good overall outline.

Consider establishing a revocable living trust. Everyone's situation is different, but many blended families find that, when making estate plans, a simple will is not enough. Consequently, you may want to establish a revocable living trust, which gives you much more control than a will when it comes to carrying out your wishes. Plus, because you have transferred your assets to the trust, you are no longer technically the owner of these assets, so there's no reason for a court to get involved, which means your estate can likely avoid the time-consuming, expensive and very public process of probate. Choose the right trustee. If you do set up a living trust, you'll also need to name a trustee - someone who manages the assets in the trust. Married couples often serve as co-trustees, but this can result in tensions and disagreements. As an alternative, you can hire a professional trustee - someone with the time, experience and neutrality to make appropriate decisions and who can bring new ideas to the process. Above all else, make sure you have the right estate-planning team in place. You'll certainly need to work with an attorney, and you may also want to bring in your tax advisor and financial professional. Estate planning can be complex - especially with a blended family - and you'll want to make the right moves, right from the start.

# Planning and designing a productive vegetable garden

planning Whether your first, second or tenth vegetable garden it can be overwhelming. There are so many tasty vegetables and never enough space and time to grow them all.

Start with a plan. Locate your garden in a sunny location with

moist, well-drained soil. Save those partially sunny areas for greens like lettuce, chard and kale as well as root crops like radishes and beets. These prefer full sun but will tolerate more shade than tomatoes, peppers, squash, broccoli and other plants we eat the flowers and fruit.

Review your favorite recipes and make a list of family favorites and those vegetables most often used. Then check the list to see which vegetables are suited to your climate and growing conditions and those that make the most economic sense to include in your garden.

Tomatoes and peppers produce lots of fruit from one plant and are common ingredients in many recipes. Sweet corn is fun to grow but needs lots of space for a relatively small harvest. If space is limited, consider buying your sweet corn at the farmers' market and use that space to grow other edibles.

Every gardener struggles with determining how many of each type of vegetable to grow. This depends upon the productivity of the variety selected, your family's eating habits and of course the impact of weather on the harvest. It is always better to start small, build on your successes and expand the garden in the future. Track your planting and harvesting results to help when planning future gardens.



You will need to plant more if you plan to preserve or donate a portion of your harvest. Purchasing vegetables from your local farmers' market is a way to ensure you have sufficient fresh produce when you are ready to can, freeze

and ferment.

# An ice fishing update

Local ponds and lakes all have a substantial amount of ice on them, as of this past weekend, and if the weather forecast is correct, safe ice should last a couple of weeks, if not longer. That is not to say that fishermen and the general public should assume that every body of water has safe ice. Constantly checking ice thickness needs to be practiced. Snow covered ice is the most dangerous. Numerous near fatalities from people falling through the ice have been reported this year, with snowmobilers being at the top of the list in Maine & New Hampshire.

Numerous deer have fallen through unsafe ice in the past two weeks, and more are sure to lose their life in the coming weeks. I have spotted many ponds with deer tracks in the snow, as they navigate ice covered bodies of water. Local residents should not walk their dogs alongside lakes ponds and rivers, unless they are on a leash. They can get into trouble real fast, as we have already observed dogs falling through thin ice on local news channels. It is also time to license your dogs in most area towns! They do require certification of a dog's rabies shots. Hopefully, a few veterinarian's will be holding rabies clinics next month in local towns.

This past weekend had a lot of ice fishermen enjoying the great outdoors, and there were many families out enjoying it also. This week's two pictures show a couple of anglers with their impressive largemouth bass. Many reports of bass, pickerel, perch, calico bass, and trout are being reported daily. Wallum Lake in Douglas has been giving up some nice trout, if you have the patience to wait for the bite, that can start fast and end fast, or not start at all. Anglers are reminded that Wallum Lake is an

interstate body of water, & that it is governed by Rhode Island regulations. The lake closes to all fishing on Feb. 28, and will reopen on April 10!

Fishing for smelt in the state of Maine can be a lot of fun, and can provide some great eating, if you can catch them before March 31, in Aroostook County. The smelt are called the «French Fry» of the lake, and have local anglers fishing for them every year. They have elaborate bob houses to fish in, and often fish for the smelt at night. Placing a light near the hole draws the smelt to the hole, and they can be caught with a light jig rod similar to the jig sticks we use here. Be sure to check all regulations and dates for smelt fishing. Using nets is illegal. Back in the day, local anglers fished for smelt on Lake Quinsigamond in Shrewsbury. This writer spent many nights catch-ing smelt near the boat ramp. Unfortunately, pollution and acid rain pretty much cleaned them out.

Numerous attempts to reintroduce smelt into Lake Quinsigamond and Wallum Lake were unsuccessful. Mass. Fish & Wildlife was netting thousands of smelt from the Quabbin Reservoir and stocking them in those two lakes, but they failed to spawn in some of the tributaries around both lakes. That was before the MDC poisoned the smelt at the Quabbin. Soon the state was placing egg screens at the tributaries of both lakes, but they also failed to work. In a last-ditch effort to get smelt back into Wallum Lake, Shoal Spawning alewives were placed in the lake to provide a forage fish for the trout. That was thirty or more years ago.

The Alewives reproduced for many years, and some still do keep a small population in the lake. Trout do no Another largemouth bass caught last weekend.

grow fast on insects, and need a good forage fish to get big fast. Attempts to get MFW to procure some of the brown trout fry from New York's Lake Ontario failed many years ago, would have now been reaping rewards. Anyone that has fished Lake Ontario for brown trout, know how fast they grow, and how big they get. With the loss of the federal brood trout program maybe the state can revisit the possibilities of receiving some brown trout from New York and stocking them at Wallum Lake!

At one time back in the day, the state was supposed to work with Rhode Island to make Wallum a trophy brown trout pond. Unfortunately, both states could not work together, and the communications were stopped. Catching four to 10-pound brown trout were common when the two states were actively supporting the program. The lake was also limed by a company called" Living Lakes" bringing in numerous tankers loaded with lime which was loaded onto a large boat & digitally spread over the entire lake. It solved the problem of acidity at the lake for many years, right up to this day.
