New CVS pharmacy proposed in Spencer

SPENCER – A proposal for a new CVS in the center of town has been met with mixed reactions from residents.

Submitted Arista Development, LLC, the proposal calls for the construction of a 12,850 square foot CVS with drive-thru access. Development would take place on four lots surrounded by High Street, Main Street, and Pleasant Street.

The majority of the proposed construction site lies within the town center's commercial zoning district, but a small portion would extend into the village-residential zoning district. Some residents in the neighborhood have expressed strong opposition to the proposal.

We would have to deal with increased traffic all day, trucks pulling in every evening, bright lights in the parking lot, and a lot more noise," said Thomas Simulis, a High Street resident. "I moved out of Worcester to get away from the heavy traffic and noise. If this gets built, there would be no reprieve from the traffic."

On Sept. 29, the Zoning Board of Appeals will hold a procedural meeting to discuss the proposal. A public hearing will take place during the Oct. 13 ZBA meeting.

A special permit would likely need to be approved by the ZBA to allow the CVS to be built as a small-scale retail operation with no outside storage. Three vacant buildings on the proposed development site would also need to be taken down prior to construction, officials said.

As of press time, nearly 260 people had signed an online petition calling for the proposal to be scrapped. William Jeff Fortin, also a High Street resident, has joined other abutters of the proposed development site in denouncing the project. They believe the proposal is a nonstarter due to its location and traffic concerns.

'This project would create dangerous levels of traffic every day for drivers and pedestrians. It's already an extremely busy area - the plan is ridiculous," Fortin said. "There are far better places in town where this could go.

This is the wrong spot for the project."

Fortin retained Attorney George Kiritsy to communicate with the town on his behalf. In June, Kiritsy wrote a letter to the Spencer ZBA conveying Fortin's opposition to the proposal and request that the application be denied.

"Large scale retail sales are prohibited within the village-residential zone," Kiritsy's letter read. "Even small scale retail establishments (and CVS is hardly a small scale establishment) are

East Brookfield voters fund water main project

EAST BROOKFIELD - Annual Town Meeting voters approved funding last week for the Route 9 water main replacement project.

The vote was nearly unanimous at the Sept. 16 Town Meeting, which had been postponed from the spring due to COVID-19. Voters authorized the borrowing of \$2.79 million for the Route 9 project, which will range from the Spencer town line to the western part of town near

Officials held a pair of public hearings ahead of the Town Meeting to provide residents with information on the project. The hearings highlighted

the scope of the work needed to repair a water main that is 80 years old.

"That went a long way toward educating residents," Selectman Theodore Boulay said of the public hearings. "The meetings were well-attended, and we also did a lot of communicating with people on this.'

The town has already applied for a loan through the MassDEP's Clean Water Trust, which provides low-interest loans to municipalities and other eligible entities. A significant portion of the loan will be eligible for forgiveness (approximately 13 percent on the principal).

Changes announced to Town Meeting bus routes

LEICESTER - Officials have made some minor changes to the bus routes for the Special Town Meeting.

Due to the location, limited parking, and importance of the Sept. 26 Special Town Meeting, the town and the Worcester Regional Transit Authority (WRTA) have arranged to provide free bus and van service to residents wishing to attend.

Bus routes and schedules are as follows:

East/West bus route: 8:30 a.m., 9 a.m., and 9:30 a.m.

The bus will begin at the former Elfskin mill on the McCarthy Ave/ Route 9 intersection, then proceed west on Route 9 to Leicester Center, turn right onto Paxton Street, and stop in front of Town Hall. It will then proceed to Pleasant Street south before arriving at the meeting site on Huntoon Highway (Route 56).

West/East bus route: 8:30 a.m., 9 a.m., and 9:30 a.m.

Starting from the Walmart parking lot, the bus will proceed east on Route 9, turn right onto Route 56, and wait briefly in front of the Leicester Housing Authority on Pleasant Street, then proceed to the meeting site on Huntoon Highway (Route 56).

Senior Center van: starting at 8:30 a.m.

The van will make continuous loops from the Senior Center to the meeting site and back to the Senior

Center. There are several regulations and advisories in place for riders. They include the following:

Anyone along the designated bus routes may waive the bus down for a ride to the meeting. The van will only load and unload

passengers at the Senior Center and Special Town Meeting sites. Masks must be worn in all WRTA

Social distancing is required for anyone not living in the same household. Seats are marked accordingly.

All of the above routes will be repeated in reverse order after the meeting until all passengers have been given the opportunity to return to their starting point. The Special Town Meeting will

take place at 10 a.m. at the former Millbrook Distributors site (88 Huntoon Memorial Highway). The Town Meeting article will decide the fate of the new school proposal.

If approved, the new school on Paxton Street would serve students from pre-kindergarten through eighth grade. To move forward with the proposal, the Special Town Meeting article must pass by a two thirds majority vote. From there, residents would take a ballot vote on Nov. 3, with a simple majority vote needed to pass.

Officials thank all residents for their patience and cooperation throughout the Special Town Meeting planning process.

NORTH BROOKFIELD - The Haston Free Public Library staff is wowing patrons with its latest effort to showcase new items.

On Sept. 5, the library officially launched the "Wowbrary" program, which offers guests free email alerts highlighting new items. The alerts feature information on the latest bestsellers, movies, audio books, children's titles, cookbooks, travel guides, health books, and other items of interest.

Staff members were excited to unveil the program, and they hope patrons take advantage of it. Even though guests aren't currently able to enjoy the full range of library programs during the pandemic, the new platform will help keep everyone in the loop.

"You will be amazed when you see in one place just how many great new titles we purchase each week, which you can reserve and borrow at no cost," read a statement released by the library. "We cover all age groups and many diverse interests. The new Wowbrary alerts are extremely convenient and, by connecting to the C/W MARS Evergreen online catalog, quickly show what's new – all from the convenience of your home, work, or school computer."

The Wowbrary system allows residents to immediately place a hold on any titles of interest. Staff members have been impressed by the efficiency and comprehensiveness of the system. It has been particularly helpful for parents seeking materials for their kids.

"It only takes a mouse click to see the newest arrivals appropriate for your child or teen," said Children's Librarian Rosemary Mackenzie. "Teachers can quickly spot new resources for their classes.'

Wowbrary alerts are free and do not require a library card. However, if you wish to place a hold on an item, you will need your library card number to do so.

The Wowbrary platform was created to make public libraries more accessible to users. The program is supported by grants, donations, sponsorships, book sale commissions, and volunteers.

Second Chance veterinary hospitals will never euthanize a pet unless they are suffering and according to the contest story, Second Chance veterinarians took one look at his goofy smile and happy wiggles and could not euthanize him.

He quickly became a shelter favorite. The adoption center staff worked with him daily, teaching him commands like "sit" using sign language. He spent five months at the Second Chance Adoption Center in East Brookfield until he found just the right owner who could help him conquer his challenges.

Due to COVID, adoptions (for special needs pets) became few and far between, and because of Quincy's special needs, we feared we might never find his perfect home. Weeks dragged into months, and while people seemed interested in him at first glance, once they learned he was deaf and required special care, they turned away

Finally, on Aug. 27, that special adopter came to visit. He took one look at Quincy and knew this was the dog for him. A previous dog owner, he had enough experience with animals for us to feel comfortable sending Quincy

home, and he was willing to adjust his lifestyle to meet Quincy's needs. Now Quincy is living in a brand-new condo and living the high life traveling with his new owner. Quincy's new owner reports Quincy is thriving and making many new friends at the dog park he visits each morning.



Other Fall Garden Chores

Stowing the Stash: Proper vour bountiful harvest will ensure your family the fruits of your labor throughout the New England winter. Generations ago, a root cellar was a basement staple. Today, the temperature can be achieved via a little creativity. Whether you are growing your own root vegetables or are buying in bulk from a local farm or

farmers market, proper storage is imperative to its flavor and quality. Here's the rundown on proper temps to keep your harvest safe and flavorful: Potatoes, beets, carrots, parsnips, turnips, cabbage and celery should be kept in a humid atmosphere at about 35-40 degrees. Squash and pumpkins should be stored in a dry area at 40-60 degrees. Onions and dry beans should be kept at 33 degrees in a dry area.

Generations ago, a root cellar was a basement staple; today some improvising is in order: Those with unheated basements report success creating a substitute root cellar by partitioning off one corner, installing insulation and a heavy, solid door. Keep in mind the temperature inside the root cellar will be coolest near the floor, so place roots there atop an old door or boards. Or create a root box by filling a large, sturdy cardboard box with a few inches of sawdust or sand. Place a layer of roots such as carrots, leaving two inches along the sides. Cover lightly with sawdust and alternate layers, adding a final three inches of sawdust on top. Store in a cool basement or in the cellar bulkhead area. Roots can touch each other in storage, just don't pack them in tightly, as some moist air must be able to circulate.

Some run over the leaves with a rotary mower, shredding them into fine pieces.Unless too thick, or adding to an existing thatch problem, this may work for your lawn. Continue to mow your lawn until growth ceases, often sometime in October. Make the last mowing a notch or two lower, in order to remove much top growth. This will avoid the need to rake off dead growth in the spring, and will help prevent snowmold disease.

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

for their support of this project, and we also thank the Water Superintendent and the Water Quality Committee. They did an outstanding job of educating residents," Boulay added. Selectmen and Water

Department officials alike are looking forward to improving the aging water main infrastructure. The replacement project will significantly improve several critical areas.

"The water main is very old and undersized, and this

project will help with water quality and the rating for fire flow. Right now, our fire flow is pretty poor," Kenney said in a previous interview.

Fire flow is the amount of water available for fire protection purposes. The flow output of the new infrastructure will be greatly improved, officials said, and the project will also provide several other efficiency and environmental upgrades.

Construction is expected to begin by next summer or fall. Repaying work on Route 9 will take place after the project's completion, likely between 2022-23.

At the informational hearings, residents reviewed a presentation from Tighe and Bond, an engineering company hired to assist with the town's water infrastructure improvements.

The public meetings also covered East Brookfield's Water Meter Replacement Program, which is now in full swing. The town's water rates were addressed as well.

The passing of a trail blazer

The world lost a champion for justice last week with the passing of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg. A role model for both men and women, Ginsburg passed away at the age of 87. Ginsburg was active up until the last two weeks of her life, even performing a wedding ceremony.

She became the second female justice to sit on the U.S. Supreme Court, and the first Jewish woman. Her path to the highest court in the nation was not an easy one being cast off because she was a woman. Despite the pushback, Ginsburg had a list of firsts under her belt, including being the first tenured female professor at Columbia University. She was also the first female member of the Harvard Law Review. Ginsburg was one of nine females out of 500 attending Harvard Law School. At one point, the law dean asked each of the women to justify taking places at the school that could be filled by men.

Serving as the Director of the Women's Rights Project of the American Civil Liberties Union during the 1970s, Ginsburg fought to make legal the right for women to sign a mortgage without a man, the right to have a bank account without a male co-signer, the right to have a job without being discriminated based on gender and the right for women to be pregnant, have children and work at the same time. It was around this time she met her husband Martin Ginsburg, a tax lawyer who she helped through school, while he battled cancer. Together they had

After graduation from Columbia, Ginsburg applied to work for 12 firms; however, she was denied based on her sex. Eventually, she was offered a clerkship at the U.S. District Court with Judge Edmund G. Palmieri. According to Ginsburg, she was declined other positions due to men feeling uncomfort-

Ginsburg became a professor of law at Rutgers in 1963 just after studying the Swedish legal system.

In 1980, she was appointed to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia. In 1993, she was named to the U.S. Supreme Court by President Bill Clinton. During her Senate confirmation hearings, she refused to answer any questions that would reveal her personal opinions, and would not comment on hypothetical cases. She did so to "maintain [her] open-mindedness and integrity as a jurist.'

Her list of achievements can fill a book and her life story is exceptional. Outside the steps of the Supreme Court, thousands have paid respects by leaving flowers, candles and messages that read "Rest in power" and "we can because she did."

A black drape was hung over the entrance of the Supreme Court building on Saturday, a tradition that dates back to 1873 after the passing of Chief Justice Salmon P. Chase. Ginsburg's chair and the front of the bench where she sat was also draped with a black cloth. Both will remain for 30 days.

They called Donald Trump "the most ostentatiously unqualified major-party candidate in the 227-year history of the American Presidency." The words to a song by Harry Belafonte: "If living were a thing that money could buy, You know the rich would live And the poor would die."
But this is exactly what happens. If

you are poor you are much more likely to live where the air quality is bad, next to airports, trash incinerators, chemical plants. Poor people have a higher instances of asthma and their neighborhoods are "food deserts" with no supermarkets with healthy food options available. You're also more likely not to have health insurance and that means you can't afford to get the healthcare you need.

I recently got a bill from my healthcare provider for a test that cost \$1,812. I called my insurance company they said "No, that's the street price" (meaning if I had no insurance I would pay \$1,812). But the actual bill paid by the insurance company was \$266, and my copay was \$20. If you have no insurance your bill is almost seven times more than the insurance company pays. This is only one example.


The first thing President Obama did when he got into office was fight for healthcare for all. So many compromises were made that we ended with the ACA (Affordable Care Act or Obamacare), not the ideal system, but the bottom line is that 20 million more people had insurance, and the coverage that everyone got was improved because the insurance company could not deny a claim based on a preexisting condition, and there were rules for minimum coverage that could not be denied. We have chickens that don't lay eggs, rabbits we don't eat or sell, horses we don't ride, and sheep who produce wool we don't use. And we have the cat. He is King. We also have two dogs who are by FAR the most useful.

Our property is 46 acres with the majority being woods. Our house is set close to a somewhat quiet country road (I say somewhat because of the truckers who drive down at 70mph).

We currently have many adult rabbits, (accidental – more on that later), 10 sheep (intentional), 2 dogs, 2 horses, 30-ish chickens, 2 guinea pigs, and 1 cat (All hail the King!).

Shearing

The past 4 years we have shorn our flock of Shetland sheep ourselves. It was horrible. Not wanting to hire someone to do it, we spent two full weekends per year in the blazing sun, getting eaten alive by bugs, to shear 10 sheep. Our record was 40 minutes for ONE sheep, but most took us 2+ hours. When we were done, the sheep looked like they were shorn by a kindergarten class with safety scissors. As we were inexperienced, and the sheep were squirming, the wool came off in little bits. The largest piece was only about the size of a basketball.

This year we snapped. Sick of shearing the sheep ourselves, we searched around and found a local-ish farmer who could shear our 10 sheep for only \$125. Perfect! We arranged for him to come over on May 2nd. Perfect. The sheep needed to be dry for him to shear them, but it was going to rain the night before. Not perfect.

The only way we could keep the sheep dry enough would be to lock them in their barn. They always have access to the barn, but we never lock them in. In the days leading up to the shearing we watched the weather, desperately hoping the forecast would change. No

We had two choices. Either we could cancel the shearing, or we could lock the sheep in the barn until shearing time. After much debate, we decided on the latter. If we canceled, the earliest the shearer could come would be in late June, and we certainly didn't want to shear the sheep ourselves or wait that long into the summer.

In preparation for locking in the sheep, we made a large screen door we could screw on over the doorway (our old door was beat to pieces by our ram). We also reinforced the doorframe with some 2 x 4's in case the sheep tried to bust out.

Finally it was time to get the sheep in the barn. It didn't go well from the start. We thought that maybe we could lure the sheep into the barn with some grain, but that didn't end up working. The sheep could sense what we were trying to do, and they refused to come.

On to plan B; chase the sheep in. If you have ever tried to herd sheep into a dark, scary barn, then you will know how difficult this is. For almost an hour we chased the sheep

around and around the paddock, trying to herd them into the barn. We got two sheep in! One escaped. We got another one in! One escaped. It was pure insanity. Even with four people, progress was slow. Herding sheep is like herding large wooly cats; they refuse to go where you want them to. Even our sweetest sheep wouldn't come near us. We resorted to grabbing one, shoving it in, and blocking the doorway.

Finally, after over an hour of 'herding', we were able to get all of the sheep in the barn. Quickly we screwed our screen door in place, not wanting to risk an escape.

The sheep were MAAAAD! All night you could hear them baaing and whacking at the door. Thankfully, the door held and none were able to escape.

At last the shearer arrived. Remembering the night before, we kept the sheep in the barn, eliminating another round of 'chase the sheep'. We had the shearer set up inside the barn, to make catching the sheep easy; all we had to do was reach out and grab one, as they had nowhere to run. As each sheep was shorn we would let it out of the barn to make some room.

The guy was good. Really

good. We had expected at least 10 minutes per sheep, minimum. He did them in four. In awe, we watched as he effortlessly sheared the sheep right down to the skin. The sheep got only a few nicks, and the wool came off in one huge fleece. It was perfect in every way.

All in all, between the set up, shearing, and tear down, it took the shearer less than ONE HOUR to nicely shear all 10 sheep. Best \$125 we ever spent. But, that's just our opinion. So, we asked some of the sheep to comment on and rate their experience.

"I feel like a wet chicken. 3/10" -Zeus the Ram

"Never again! Humans bring nothing good! Except grain... and hay... and water... but besides that nothing good! I'm glad I taught my daughters to stay away from them! 1/10" -Athena the Eldest Ewe

"It wasn't all that bad. The guy's hat tasted nice. I'm a little cold without my wool, but I don't see why Gramma Athena is making such as fuss. 7/10" -Arya the Youngest Ewe

"It's kinda nice not having 30 pounds of wool. I feel... lighter.

that Oracle would have "full access" to TikTok's source code and updates to review for national security concerns. 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

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
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

Cherry Valley sewer and water situation and the school building issues should be addressed. This is our one chance in the next 20 years or more to get \$42 million from the state to help with the school issue. It would be foolish to turn that down.

No matter who is elected President in November, the Federal government is going to feel compelled to fund infrastructure projects. We have a powerful Congressman representing our district, Chairman of the House Rules Committee, who should be able to direct some of that money to Leicester. Some of that infrastructure money could solve the water and sewer issues. Some might alleviate the remaining cost of building the school.

This year and next are the years to move forward with both projects, and not try to choose one over the other. The current interest rate is very low, and the cost of construction is lower than usual. There is a major chance for Federal dollars next year for both projects.

Please don't vote "no" and lose \$42 million, and waste money and time that was already spent!

Maintaining existing schools would cost \$33 million. For just \$16 million more the town could have a wonderful new school. This amounts to a difference of around \$25 per month on the average tax bill starting in 2025. For less than a dollar a day extra in taxes we get a modern new school that will last for at least 50 years, maybe even 75, with a much better learning environment and much better safety features.

Back in the 1950's, some citizens thought it was worthwhile to build a new high school and spent their time and hard-earned money planning and building that. That school is now the middle school and is in bad shape. Just as people in the 1950's stepped up to the plate to fund that, now it's our turn to do what's right for the children of this Town and fund the replacement.

My wife and I have no children or grandchildren in this town, no nieces or nephews or other young relatives that would use a new school. But it is still to our benefit to have a new school in Town. Like many folks, our house is our major asset. If the school system in a Town is not the best, real estate values go down. The opposite is true too. If we fund this school the value of your house will go up. Sewer and water rates are important too. Let's solve both issues in our Town: the school this year, followed soon by the sewer and water issue next year. Have faith that when we work together, we are stronger. "Without a vision the people perish."

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
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

In previous columns, I have discussed options for buying antiques and collectibles during the

COVID-19 pandemic. I personal property. We have also written about online auctions during these times. This column will offer a comprehensive look at options for selling estate personal property

during the pandemic. The shelter in place orders at the beginning of the pandemic put live auctions, estate appraisals and estate sales on hold. There were many people who waited for the regulations to be loosened so they could sell their estate received very few calls during the spring, but now we have been fielding more calls than ever.

If you are an estate personal representative, methods of selling estate personal property have changed since the pandemic. Although things have changed, there are still many options available for sellers.

Some companies are still running estate (tag) sales. The Massachusetts

Sellers cannot hold estate sales with 40 people in a house now. Estate sale company proprietors need to carefully monitor the number of people who enter and leave the home and have people waiting outside stay socially distanced.

To avoid the large crowds associated with traditional estate sales, many companies are using other options. They may be holding private sales where buyers are invited to attend one at a time and make their purchases. Some companies are offering items online with a set price. Other estate sale companies have begun auctioning items online.

Some auctioneers have moved their operations

outdoors. The updated gathering order provides for a "maximum of 50 people in a single enclosed outdoor space. Outdoor gatherings in unenclosed spaces are not subject to capacity limitations.'

Auction houses like ours are strictly running online auctions. Auctions may take place at the estate, where we typically offer a preview prior to the end of bidding. Winning bidders may pick up their

Hunting season in the air



THE GREAT **OUTDOORS** RALPH **TRUE**

The recent cool weather has made a big change in my two dogs, Molly and Twig. They can sense the change in weather, and know that hunting season is just around the corner. My yellow Lab, Twig, is my main hunting dog, but my beagle Molly tags along, and often finds a bird or rabbit to chase. Man's best friend and hunting companion will make the hunt a lot more enjoyable. If you are fortunate enough to belong to a Rod & Gun Club that has a pheasant hunting program, the season should start in a couple of weeks. The state upland bird hunting season starts on Oct.

Ruffed Grouse populations have taken a hard hit over the past 20 years or so. Most local bird hunters would not shoot a grouse if they encountered one while hunting, as they have high hopes that every bird

could make the difference in a substantial rebound in their populations in the coming years. Loss of adequate habit is one of the main reasons for the loss of this fast flying game bird. Upland bird hunting has only two species of birds for hunting locally, which include woodcock and Pheasant, not counting the grouse. The woodcock populations are also on the decline due to loss habitat.

If it was not for the state stocking pheasant annually, bird hunting as we know it would be basically gone. Areas North & West of the valley still get to enjoy grouse hunting, but these areas are also seeing a large decline in their population. Numerous bird hunters have suggested closing grouse hunting in some zones in Mass. in hopes of bringing back a healthy population of birds. Hopefully, Massachusetts Fish & Wildlife will take the recommendation under advisement.

Duck hunting opens in Massachusetts on Oct. 13, in the Central District, with a daily bag limit of six ducks. The Wood Duck and Mallards make up most hunter's daily bag limits with a few black ducks making a slight come back in their populations. This year, MFW has set aside a special season for duck hunting statewide for veterans and the military. Oct. 3 and Jan. 30 are the two days which are well earned by those that have sacrificed so much for their country.

Goose hunting picked up last week after farmers started cutting their corn. One pair of hunters bagged 15 birds in couple hours of hunting. These are geese that are defined as nuisance birds, that keep their residence hear all year long, often fowling golf courses, beaches,

With all of the Hurricanes and weather activity on our doorstep, it has been hard for boaters to get in a little fishing. High surf and rough seas are not fun to fish in. Hopefully, the tropics will calm down soon, but there seems to be no letup in sight, and we are only in the first half of the hurricane season. The canal started to heat up last week with a lot of big fish. Tons of bait fish were observed in the area. At least fishing from shore can still provide some good fishing on the saltwater.

Freshwater bass fishing continues to provide anglers with
