BOH tables cemetery regulation changes

DUDLEY — The Board of Health has tabled its discussion concerning new regulations pertaining to cemeteries in the town, a move sparked in part by the recent debates concerning the Islamic cemetery plans on Corbin Road.

Board Chairman Jennifer Cournoyer made the move to table the item during the board's July 19 meeting as only two of the three members of the board were present, and with the subject matter being one that has drawn a lot of attention, Cournoyer saw it fitting that any information brought forward be shared before the board in its entirety.

"We want to make sure we have our full board going forward to recommend everything," Cournoyer said. "We want to be sure we handle everything properly and the way we should."

Cournoyer explained that the board has received some input from the public outside of their meetings in the form of submitted documents and suggestions, specifically from the community group Friends of Corbin Road. Since the cemetery was denied its permits by town boards in June, attention has turned to the town's process of deciding on whether or not to act on its right of first refusal

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Oxford making ground on municipal curbside service initiative

OXFORD — Oxford is moving forward with its plans to bring about a municipal curbside trash and recycling service, something officials say will be optional but would provide countless benefits to the community if the masses were to jump on board the initiative.

Oxford Department of Public Works Director Sean Divoll made a presentation on July 26 of the findings of an ad-hoc Solid Waste Committee set up by the town last year in order to explore the costs and benefits of consolidating trash and recycling services under on hauler in the town. The presentations noted that Oxford citizens currently use any one of four different private services that often make their way down the same roadways at different times during the week, a practice that officials are concerned had led to a myriad

of different issues, both major and minor, one of the largest being deteriorating conditions on otherwise lightly traveled roads due to the weight and constant traffic of so many different trucks making their way through town.

“We have multiple waste haulers operating on any given street in any given day,” Divoll said. “It causes wear and tear to our roadways and degrades the quality of life for people. In this case, in the span of about a thousand feet there are four waste haulers and if each one is operating a trash truck and if they are operating a separate recycling truck that’s four recycling trucks and four trash trucks. That’s eight heavily loaded trucks on any given date and any given street in the town of Oxford.”

The ad hoc committee charged with overseeing the study of a potential town wide services welcomed bids from

several entities. In the end the committee narrowed down the options to two companies, Pratt & Company, Inc. and Casella Waste Systems, Inc., the later of which operated a transfer station in Oxford. Their best proposals were received at the end of June and according to Divoll only one stood out with Casella having a much less expensive offerings than Pratt with the numbers for both companies contingent on an 80 percent or 60 percent town wide involvement in the program. According to data presented by Divoll, an 80 percent participation by the town under Casella’s plan would carry a budget cost of \$855,214 and a rate per quarter cost per household of \$67.36. At 60 percent participation that cost goes down to \$686,602 for the budget cost, but the rate per quarter goes up to \$72.46 per household. When comparing numbers Divoll said this a saving of at least \$40

per household when using data on costs for several other hauler services currently employed by residents today. Divoll did acknowledge that some details of the contract would be contingent at any time upon the market.

“There are some variables in the cost. The recycling cost goes up and down based on the market. The tipping fees, basically the trash disposal fee, can go up and down as well. The actual pickup cost is set through the RFP and contract to ride on the consumer price index. If that goes up, then that number would go up proportionally, but would be capped at three percent any given year,” Divoll said. “Even then we’re still considerably less than what is being charged on the open market.”

Selectmen seemed very open to the idea, a sentiment that has been a constant since the concept of a town wide pickup ser-

vice first surfaced. Divoll clarified that this service would, in fact, be optional and would not require participation from all citizens in town, however the contract would be contingent on a certain percentage joining in on the service. If the plan is initiated then all citizens would be signed on and those who didn’t want to service could simply opt out of the service and go with their own hauler of choice.

However, there’s still a ways to go before this plan becomes official in Oxford. An Aug. 1 Board of Health meeting was to discuss new rules amending regulations and requirements for trash haulers in the town and this plan still has plenty of public discussion remaining before it becomes official.


Olson also has significant operations experience, having managed a large municipal water and sewer system in Massachusetts, and having served in the role of superintendent and technical advisor for several water systems.

Park Ave. summer program a success



WEBSTER — The Park Ave Elementary Before & After School ASOST Summer Program has combined hard work and having fun this summer!

The children who participated have been fortunate to have been part of a five-week program that operated from July 5 to Aug. 4. The children partici-

pating in the program have been committed to making a difference within their school and local community by planning and implementing a Service Learning Project. This project is in association with the "Kids Consortium" through the Massachusetts Department of Elementary & Secondary Education. A Service Learning Project, which is

all student driven, involves researching specific problems or needs within their community and working together to help determine possible solutions. After much discussion, the students concluded that the need in our school community was to appropriately identify ways to deal with stress from both home and school. The students chose to create a video to share with teachers at Park Avenue Elementary about the use of "worry boxes" in their schools, as well as how to make worry boxes for their own classrooms. After researching many options to help other students relieve stress within their school community, students decided that the worry boxes would make the biggest impact. A worry box is a paper folded into a box shape made by the children, that can be used to set aside their stressors and/or worries by writing them down on a small piece of paper and placing them inside, where they can stop being distracted by them, and focus on learning. Included with these worry boxes is a note explaining what they are for and how to use them. The children are hoping that the use of these boxes and their video can help their peers and teachers to focus better and create a classroom more suitable for learning with less distractions and stress! The newly created worry boxes will be greeting the Park Ave. staff upon their arrival on the first day of school!

Throughout the process of creating our Service Learning Project, and exploring options to deal with stress, students had the opportunity to interact with many of our community members. The community members included were: Allison Rusak, Health Education teacher from Auburn High School, CLAY TIME Pottery Studio from Shrewsbury, Mass, and Ms. Kirsten, a dance teacher from the Mass Movement Workshop. Students also interviewed school community members as part of

Nichols awarded gold LEED certification

DUDLEY—Nichols College's environmentally conscious academic building has been awarded LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Gold certification from the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC), a national organization that certifies buildings that are "green" and sustainable, and protect the environment. The academic building, which opened in September 2015, is the College's first to achieve LEED certification and is the only LEED Gold-certified building in southern Worcester County.

LEED is USGBC's rating system that awards points for satisfying green building criteria. Certified, Silver, Gold, and Platinum levels of green building certification are awarded based on the total number of points earned within each LEED category: sustainable sites, water efficiency, energy and atmosphere, materials and



resources, indoor environmental quality, and innovation and design.

"By achieving LEED Gold certification for its new academic building, Nichols College demonstrates tremendous leadership in the green building movement," said Rick Fedrizzi, CEO and founding chair of USGBC, located in Washington, D.C. "Given the extraor-

inary importance of climate protection and the central role of buildings in that effort, Nichols College's achievement demonstrates its commitment to resource conservation and a sustainable built environment for all within this generation."

Northampton-based architect Juster Pope Frazier designed the building; Worcester-

based F.W. Madigan Company Inc., was the contractor. Among its numerous "green" features, the building features locally sourced and recycled materials to stimulate the economy; excellent indoor air quality; water-use efficiency; and large windows to maximize the amount of natural light, reducing the need for artificial

light and minimizing electricity use during daylight hours.

"Gold LEED certification for the new academic building is an exciting accomplishment and a statement to Nichols College's commitment to environmental stewardship," said Robert LaVigne, associate vice president for facilities management at Nichols.

"Since opening its doors last fall, the building has served as a testament to the College's dedication to innovation—not only in sustainable design, but also education.

FORT POLK, La. — Members of a task force with the New York Army National Guard's 27th Infantry Brigade Combat Team successfully completed the rigors of a force on force training exercise here July 29 and begin heading home this week.

The troops, with more than 5,000 participants from more than 30 states across the country, spent nearly the month of July at Fort Polk as part of the training rotation at the Joint Readiness Training Center, known as JRTC.

Their experience included deployment and staging at Fort Polk followed by more than ten days of offensive and defensive missions in the post maneuver areas against a real opposing force.

The maneuver training is designed to challenge all the components of the maneuver brigade, including infantry, artillery and aviation operations, engineering and reconnaissance tasks, logistics and resupply and medical support and personnel replacements.

The brigade task force included the entire New York Army National Guard brigade combat team, along with supporting elements that included additional infantry units from Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Pennsylvania. Aviation support for the task force included aircrews from Connecticut, Maryland and Utah.

Massachusetts Army National Guard Private Ryan Sweeny, from Oxford, completed training here as part of the Bravo Company, 1st Battalion, 182nd Infantry Regiment and redeployed back home this week as the brigade task force completes the training exercise. Massachusetts Army National Guard Specialist John Jankowski, from Dudley, completed training here as part of the Charlie Company, 1st Battalion, 182nd Infantry Regiment and redeployed back home this week as the brigade task force completes the training exercise.

Massachusetts Army National Guard Specialist Dennis Travers, from Webster, completed training

here as part of the Delta Company, 1st Battalion, 182nd Infantry and redeployed back home this week as the brigade task force completes the training exercise.

Massachusetts Army National Guard Sergeant Mark Kolodziejczak, from Webster, completed training here as part of the Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 182nd Infantry Regiment and redeployed back home this week as the brigade task force completes the training exercise.

The Joint Readiness Training Center allows Army units to conduct combat training in a realistic environment which features a well-trained opposing force, civilian role-players on the battlefield, high-tech systems which monitor the action, and observer-controllers to evaluate unit actions.

All of the exercise participants and opposing force troops wore the Army's Multiple Integrated Laser Engagement System (MILES) gear for the exercise.

The gear consists of a sensor-lead harness worn by the soldier and a halo of sensors attached to the soldier's helmet. In addition to sensors, every weapon system also includes a laser emitter.

When the soldier fires a blank with their weapon, the laser fires a beam. If a target sensor receives a hit, then the soldier is considered wounded or

a vehicle disabled, requiring all of the combat response actions to provide first aid and evacuation.

The MILES gear enables infantrymen to conduct realistic combat training against a real enemy opponent and forces combat medics and logistics personnel to hone their skills by treating simulated battlefield injuries or evacuating damaged vehicles.

JRTC is one of the Army's three combat training centers at which brigade-sized units can conduct realistic training against an opposing force. JRTC specializes in light infantry warfare and operations. For soldiers, it is considered by soldiers as the Super Bowl of Army training.

The redeployment for the thousands of soldiers back to their home states is expected to be complete by Aug. 5.

Scams continue to be a problem

A variety of financial fraud "scams" continue to occur frequently in our area.

People are asked to send money to various locations or provide personal or bank information. These can take place in person, on-line, over the phone, or by mail. As a result, people may be out large sums of money.

I wanted to remind everyone to be aware of these illegal activities.

These money scams have been occurring for many years. Those responsible prey on unsuspecting individuals, in particular the elderly. Their goal is to obtain either quick cash or other personal information, such as bank account numbers. Armed with this documentation, the criminal can commit identity theft and access your finances. Some scams will inform the victim they have won a prize or that they are eligible for some gift or benefit. They will ask the victim to provide personal information. This information can then be used to open accounts or conduct other identity theft crimes.

People may receive an unexpected check in the mail, along with a letter informing them they won a prize. Others may receive a fraudulent check as payment for the sale of a particular item. Often these checks are written for a much larger sum of money than was originally intended. For example, a resident recently received a letter informing them they won a raffle or sweepstakes totaling \$250,000. Along with the announcement letter came a check for \$2,500. The person was asked to send back a payment for \$1,500 to cover "processing fees." Once that is complete, the victim was told they would be sent the balance owed. The goal here is for the victim to cash the \$2,500 check and send the \$1,500 balance back to them immediately. In many of these cases, the original check turns out to be bad and the scammers may receive the victim's money before anything can be detected. Any blind notification of this nature is almost certainly a scam.

Continue to be cautious of calls from people claiming to represent agencies such as the IRS. Most of these government offices, or your financial institutions, will contact you by mail or deal with you in person when they have the opportunity. Do not trust any of this business over the phone. Another scam to be aware of involves people receiving a phone call or e-mail telling them a relative or friend has been arrested. These are most often based in a foreign country. Elderly victims are frequently targets of this type of activity. They can be fooled into believing their grandchild is in trouble. The suspects ask for bail money to be wired to them in order to get the person out of jail. This is most likely a hoax. Never send money just based on this type of contact. Be sure to contact other family members or the police for assistance.

The important thing to remember is do not conduct business transactions unless you are sure of the people and places you are dealing with. Many of these scams ask for your money to be sent to places outside the United States. If you are not expecting something (money or other items), chances are it is a scam. Be very cognizant of these occurrences and report them immediately to the police and/or your bank. Protect your personal information. When in doubt, ask a question of the proper authorities to avoid becoming a victim.

In an episode of the television show "Seinfeld," Elaine's boss gave her a \$10,000 maximum amount to bid on some gold clubs for him that had belonged to President Kennedy when they sold at auction. She panicked after she went well over the \$10,000 amount she was authorized to spend when bidding against a rival.

Items owned by a prominent political figure, movie star or professional athlete can bring astronomical prices at auction. There are many people who were notable on a local level and affected people's lives in their community. Their personal property may also be desirable. People who know them are often happy to have a keepsake of the local figure as well. Attendance for estate sales of locally prominent people may be double or even more of what we would expect at a typical sale.

When we pick up items for auction or run estate sales, family members, friends and neighbors often share stories with us about their connection with the person who owned the items. We've sold items that have belonged to business people, politicians and long time collectors.

Many collectors contacted us when we once sold a large collection of breweriana (beer signs, cans, bottles, etc.). They not only wanted to buy memorabilia for their collections but also because they had developed a friendship over the years with a fellow collector who shared their enthusiasm for their hobby. Some bidders showed up in person to bid but many left absentee bids with us because they lived too far away to attend.

Boats, an airplane engine, along with boating and aircraft parts and accessories were part of one Massachusetts estate that belonged to a local business

owner. Many local buyers who were friends with the consignee or won items from the online auction. Along with local vintage boat and airplane rebuilders and other hobbyists, we also fielded bidders' questions from as far away as Australia.

While a local celebrity's status can increase auction results, prices for items owned by beloved figures known worldwide can be very sizable. A Tiffany silver dog bowl that had belonged to Joan Rivers brought well over the \$800 estimate when it sold for \$13,750. Whitney Houston's passport sold for \$11,250. A Frank Sinatra original painting fetched \$21,250. Marilyn Monroe's certificate from her conversion to Judaism reached \$70,400 at auction.

When JFK's golf clubs actually went to auction in 1996, they brought much more than the amount in the Seinfeld episode. Four MacGregor woods and one manufactured by Wilson sold for \$772,500 to Arnold Schwarzenegger.

When is the best time to sell my home?

Another factor is interest rates which are currently still extremely low and regardless of the time of year, if those rates start increasing that will start to negatively affect the buyers ability to buy a home and possibly lower prices.

Lastly, I would not try to just put your home on the market to not miss the spring market if it is in need of repairs and you are able to make them prior to listing. It is a beauty competition and you want to make sure that your home stands out against the other homes and I think this will almost always yield you more money than trying to time the market.

Fluke and sea bass fishing in Rhode Island

Saltwater continues to provide some great fishing on all fronts. This past week, this writer and a few of my buddies had a great time fishing for fluke and sea bass in Rhode Island waters, although we only retained a few fish for the dinner table.

Most fluke and sea bass were just under the legal limit. Many of the fish we caught had to have the hook left in the fish prior to release to insure their survival. The hook was imbedded too far into the mouth.

If you want some big doormat fluke you need to travel to the block and fish around the newly installed windmills. One fish that is still absent from the waters we have been fishing are the bluefish, although some small snapper blues are showing in some areas. A steady decline of these hard fighting fish in inland waters has many fishermen concerned about their future. They sure are not missed by striper fishing anglers that often have their live baits stolen during their daily fishing trips, but they are enjoyed by many anglers. Only 10 years ago, the Providence River had huge bluefish up to 10 to 12 pounds for most of the fishing season. There are still some schools of bluefish around but not like they had been in previous years. Tons of baitfish have invaded

most of Narragansett Bay this past week and should draw many fish to the coastline.

Tuna fishing anglers are catching some nice Bluefin tuna at the gully and fishing for these hard fighting fish is improving every day. The area also has

a lot of whales. Cod fishing is fair at coxes, as anglers are hoping for a better bite in the coming weeks. Sharks are also being caught offshore and stripers are still providing some great fishing around the Block, with some nice bass being taken near Newport.

The final figures for the 2016 wild turkey season in Massachusetts stands at 3,000-plus birds. It is the second largest harvest since the first hunting season of wild turkeys in 1980. Hunters that did not fill their two turkey tags in the spring will have an opportunity to fill one of them this fall. A turkey of either sex can be harvested. The fall turkey season starts on Oct. 24, and runs to Nov. 5.

The upcoming early goose season is set to open on September 6, 2016 and will run through Sept 23, in central Massachusetts! Sitting out in my back yard during early morning hours recently, numerous Canadian geese were observed flying over my house on

there way to there feeding grounds. My lab Twig is also getting anxious as the sound of the birds honking as they fly by get her attention.

The youth hunt for geese is set for Sept. 24 and Oct. 8. Sportsmen that enjoy taking these first time young hunters into the field to harvest their first bird of their lifetime are rewarded with the emotions and excitement of these young sportsmen. For more information on this youth hunt, check it out on the Mass Fish & Wildlife website.

The regular goose and duck season opens on Oct. 10 this year. The early dates may have you shooting some blue wing teal if you are lucky. These fast flying ducks provide some great early shooting, and wood ducks are also abundant this year after a very successful nesting season and should also provide some great shooting experiences. Because of the low water, water fowlers may need to find some new hunting areas this year.

The Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club will hold a chicken dinner on Sept. 4. The event is open to the public. Tickets can be purchased at the club, or you can call to reserve tickets. The same day the club will sponsor a 3-D shoot, which is also open to the public. Noel Rabidor is chairman of the event. More on this 3-D shoot in the coming weeks.

Take a kid fishing and keep them rods bending.

Healthy seasonal treats

Summer in New England is rich with the fresh scents and tastes of the season. From clusters of wild blueberries and broccoli sprouting from the ground, to swelling watermelons and bright red tomatoes ripening on the vine, home-grown fruits and vegetables take center stage on the picnic table this time of year.

But the area's fresh fruits and vegetables are not only hailed for their extraordinary flavor, they have also gained respect for their healing properties. Research conducted at the USDA center has found blueberries rank hands down number one in antioxidant activity! The blueberry's secret weapon is its deep-blue pigment, which is a potent phytonutrient that acts as an antioxidant and anti-inflammatory.

Research suggests that blueberries may reduce the build-up of the bad cholesterol that contributes to heart disease. And studies show another blueberry compound appears to promote urinary tract health. According to a report in the New England Journal of Medicine, blueberries help prevent infections in the urinary tract in much the same way that cranberries do. Love tomatoes? Here are some more great reasons to enjoy the ripe, red fruit! Researchers have discovered tomatoes may actually have the same effect that aspirin has on circulation! Recent studies in Scotland revealed tomatoes may help reduce circulatory problems in the heart, brain and elsewhere. It seems tomatoes contain a powerful substance that prevents blood clots from forming. The scientists call it the "tomato factor." It interferes with the clumping of platelets in the blood, reducing the risk of clot formation in blood vessels. The "tomato factor" is found in the yellow jelly surrounding the tomato seeds. In one study, platelet activity was reduced by more than 70 percent with only four tomatoes! As if that wasn't enough, the beta-carotene in tomatoes

offers protection from cancer. And tomatoes are another deliciously rich source of the powerful antioxidant lycopene. There was a reason mom told you to finish all the broccoli on your plate. The green vegetable is rich in fiber, carotenoids, and vitamin A, vitamin C and vitamin K. Due to its high levels of vitamin C, beta carotene, and fiber, broccoli is a powerful antioxidant that is believed to prevent damage to cells caused by free radicals, which are believed to be a factor in cancers, Alzheimer's disease, heart disease, arthritis, and in the aging process itself.

Additional research reveals Broccoli contains sulforaphane, a substance that has

been shown in animal studies to dramatically reduce the number, size, and reproduction of malignant tumors, as well as delay the onset of these tumors. In fact broccoli has been named the food most likely to prevent colon cancer!

Want more? The high fiber content of Broccoli is also believed to be benefit those with diabetes. And broccoli also has as much calcium as milk, a hefty weapon for those at risk for osteoporosis.

Note: The word broccoli comes from the Italian "brocco" meaning arm branch.

Financial tips for single parents



FITCHBURG — The Blackstone Valley Cats entered the postseason having won nine of their previous 11 games to earn the No. 4 seed in the Central New England Baseball Association (CNEBA) playoffs. Then, the Cats swept away Shrewsbury and defending champion Clinton, two-games-to-none to reach the championships five-game series with the second ranked Lunenburg Phillies.

After taking a 2-1 lead through the first three games of the showdown, the series shifted venues, to St. Bernard's High School on Sunday, Aug. 7, for a deciding doublehead-

er. Unfortunately, Blackstone would fall in the opener, 7-3, forcing the fifth and deciding Game 5.

In Game 4, the Valley Cats took a 1-0 lead in the first inning on a Tim Beaudette sacrifice fly that scored Eric LaCaire, but from there things didn't go as well. Starter Oliver Collette allowed six runs in four innings of work, including two big home runs that let the Phillies tie the series 2-2 to force the Game 5 contest, which got underway shortly after Game 4 concluded.

In Game 5, it was another big fly that doomed Blackstone Valley, but it was not before they once again took an early lead. With one out in the top of the first, four straight sin-

gles from Joe Cortese, Jono Crimmin, Beaudette and Anthony Razzano amounted to a 2-0 advantage.

With ace Tyler Wagar on the hill, it would have seemed to be enough when the Cats got their lead to 3-0 in the third on a Zack Twitchell RBI single that scored Razzano, who had walked, but the Phillies weren't ready to fold yet.

It was the bottom of the fourth inning that would ultimately decide the league championship, as the Phillies put up a five-spot on Wagar and the Cats, highlighted by a mammoth three-run homer off the bat of Sean Maki — who had killed the Cats all series long. The shot quickly made it a 5-3 game, and Lunenburg never

looked back.

"The long ball is what killed us today," General Manager and acting head coach on the day Dean Wagar said of the two-game sweep and series loss.

Regular head coach Scott Kennedy was away on vacation.

"They hit three home runs today, and we didn't hit one the entire series," Wagar said. "They're a good ball club, well-coached. It's all right, we gave it a run, and we'll be back."

The Cats tried to scratch their way back into the game, but reliever Matt Russell would have none of that. He shut down the Blackstone Valley offense with four innings pitched, allowing just one run on three

hits, and the Cats could only get to within 6-4, the eventual final score.

Overall this season, just their second in existence in the CNEBA, the Blackstone Valley Cats put up a 23-17 record, and advanced one round further in the playoffs than their first go-round. That's certainly something to be proud of for such a new team with such young guys.

"This was a great season, and for a younger team to go this far and listen all year long that, 'you can't do it with young guys,' and then we go and do it, 23 wins isn't too bad," Wagar said before proclaiming, "we'll be back next year...we'll be back for sure."





LEOMINSTER — Coming into Wednesday night, Aug. 3 and a tilt with the second seeded Lunenburg Phillies, the fourth ranked Blackstone Valley Cats — based in Douglas and with local players on the roster — had won 15 of their previous 16 games in the Central New England Baseball Association (CNEBA). That included two 2-0 series wins to bring the second-year franchise to the league championship versus the Phillies.

But the Cats had plenty of chances as Lamont walked five. Blackstone left the bases loaded in both the second and sixth innings, stranding seven baserunners in all on a frustrating evening.

Catcher and team leader Joe Cortese scored the first run for the Douglas squad on what amounted to a double-steal. Shortstop Zack Twitchell attempted stealing second after walking, while Cortese — who reached on a fielder's choice — snuck in the back door while 'Twitch' was caught in a rundown between first and second.

With the score 4-1, the Cats rallied in the sixth, scoring twice. Cory Shepard scored when he tried to steal third and the Phillies' catcher threw the ball into left field. Then, later in the frame,

Cortese hit a sacrifice fly that scored Beaudette, who had previously singled.

In the end, it was too little, too late though, and they could not get anything going in the seventh, going down 1-2-3 to end the game and allowing Lunenburg to tie the series at 1-1 with the 4-3 finish.

Not lost in the shuffle was the relief effort of Tyler Wagar for the Cats, who pitched the final two frames, striking out four and not allowing a hit.

Blackstone Valley then rallied on Thursday, Aug. 4 in Game 3, when they took a 2-1 series lead with a 2-1 win over the Phillies. The series then shifted to St. Bernard's High School in Fitchburg on Sunday, Aug. 7, with the Cats just a win away from claiming the league championship.

thing should be and where it would work," Grenier said. "The staff worked really hard to get everything in order. 
Sterling Movers was brought on board to move desks, bookshelves, chairs, tables, computers and everything else movable from the library to the town hall while library personnel worked to clean the shelves, organize the books and get everything in tip top shape as they settled in to what will be their temporary home for the next year and a half. The Town Hall was chosen over the old senior center in town as the temporary library location and Grenier said she was pleasantly surprised at how well the town hall's theater space, usually used for town

functions and meetings, lent itself to the library's needs.

al on the target property on Corbin Road, while the Board of Health has begun to consider updating its regulations and specifications for all private cemeteries, including the conditions of burial, the required use of a coffin and the depth of the vault, as well as any required distance between the burial site and water tables.

With the discussion being tabled, little new information on proposed regulations was brought forward, however, those in attendance did get some insight into what the process of setting in the new reg-

ulations will include from the Board of Health's standpoint. Unlike a town bylaw, the new proposals will be purely Board of Health related, and will only apply to the Board of Health's decision process on whether or not to approve a cemetery project proposal in the future. Health Agent Thomas Purcell said he feels this process is much more effective and efficient that going to a town-wide bylaw which would require months of meetings, a public town meeting and even a potential vote.

"The beautiful part of the Board of Health in dealing with regulations is it can be changed in a heartbeat. You

don't have to go back to town meeting and all that. We can handle it at the Board of Health level. Certainly we have to hold a public notification and a comment period and all of that stuff. There is a proper procedure for it and, yes, the public can get involved in it, but if we find that something is too easy or difficult we can look at modifying the regulation and it's not something that would take a year or two years to do," Purcell said. "We can do that from meeting to meeting over a period of a couple months. It's a lot easier to adopt regulations at this level than it is to put a bylaw together."

Some citizens did present

information in writing to be in the record and considered at the next meeting by the Board of Health. Purcell said he would suggest anyone with input, whether it is a private citizen or a group of citizens, continue to submit their comments or recommendations in this same manner.

"One of the things I would suggest is anyone who has any comment submit anything in writing," he said. "That eliminates a lot of the redundancy and beating the same old dead horse. If we've already got it then there's no reason to belabor the subject."

Once any new regulations are approved by the Board of

Health the Attorney General needs to approve them as well, but will do so based on the legality of the regulations rather than any recommendations the Attorney General's office would make as towns have the ability to create their own regulations, even ones tougher than the commonwealth's own statewide regulations.

The Board of Health will meet once again on Aug. 16 at 6:30 p.m. where the discussion on the regulations will continue.

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

SWCCC touts importance of proper house numbering

Recently, the South Worcester County Communications Center has been contacted several times by the United States Postal Service regarding verification of addresses in both Webster and Dudley.

The USPS is being made aware by their local carriers of addresses that are not consistent with standard numbering practices.

Two specific scenarios have occurred where a residence had street frontage on two streets, however was only accessible from one of the streets due to wooded portions of the property. As a generic example, a house had an address of 123 XYZ Street, however the only access to the property was off of ABC Street.

This is a very serious concern in the

event of an emergency response. A call from an alarm company, a resident who doesn't make it clear where access is, or due to an abandoned or silent 911 call can lead to a dangerous delay while emergency responders attempt to locate the address.

Similarly, houses that are numbered out of order, another recent scenario responders came across during a response, can lead to a delay. An example is when house number 35 is set back from the road and is located between 39 and 43 due to its driveway location rather than being located between 33 and 37 as would be standard numbering.

Property number standards typically include odd numbers on one side of the road and even numbers on the other side of the road. Numbers should also be in order, although some numbers may be skipped for future use on vacant plots. Property numbers are typically assigned by town assessors' offices and in this day and age with electronic databases and GIS mapping are usually done quite consistently and accurately. However many older properties may remain mis-numbered due to the properties being numbered before standards were in place.

If you feel that your property in Webster or Dudley is mis-numbered, thus a potential hazard for delay during an emergency response, please don't hesitate to contact Communications

Center Director Gregory Lynskey at 508-943-1212 x1255. A visit to the property can be arranged to determine proper numbering so that the assessor can update their records and so that 911 data can be updated.

We understand that changes to an address are often an inconvenience to the property owner, however the potential delay of an improperly located address during an emergency can be a life or death matter.

One final thought, it is just as important that your house clearly display your address so that emergency responders can find it. Mass General Law Chapter 48 Section 59 states in part that all houses must be numbered as follows:

- Numbers should be at least 4" in height and facing the street.

- Numbers should be located in a lighted area in a contrasting color from the area they are affixed.

- Numbers should be posted on both sides of a mailbox or sign post near the roadway in the event your driveway is long and your house is not easily visible from the road.

Although we hope you never require the response of emergency services, having your house numbered properly and displaying that number prominently will help to avoid a delay during an emergency response.

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

Build A Road Map To Help Seniors Stop Or Reduce Driving

Parents don't hesitate to talk to their teenagers about driving safely, but no one is talking to seniors.

1. Do all you can to keep a safe driver safer. For example, explore the CarFit program, an educational program created by the American Society on Aging and developed with the American

Automobile Association, AARP and the American Occupational Therapy Association, available at www.car-fit.org. CarFit is designed to help older drivers find out how well

their personal vehicles suit them and highlight actions they can take to improve.

2. Get the facts. Any decisions about driving cessation should

be based on data, and seniors deserve to have more than just opinions influencing whether or not they can continue to drive. Get the facts with evaluations from medical

professionals, such as a physical or vision exam. Encourage your loved one to take a driving self-assessment.

3. Listen and communicate. Listen to your

loved one's concerns to help understand and develop a plan with which he or she feels comfortable.

4. Create a plan with plenty of alternatives. When you get to the root of an aging adult's concerns, it's easier to create a plan that meets his or her needs. For example, if isolation is a concern, look into public transportation or consider friends or family members who are willing to drive.

5. Explore new technologies. Assistive technologies, such as emergency response systems, smart headlights, and blind spot warning systems, keep older drivers safer on the road.

the tests used to measure battery performance. The two most common are cold cranking amps (CCA) and reserve capacity (RC).

CCA measures the number

of amps a battery can deliver for 30 seconds at 0° F. This is a useful comparison-shopping tool because it's performed the same way by every manufacturer.

RC measures the number of minutes a battery can withstand a continuous draw of 25 amps. Today's vehicles have more onboard and consumer-installed electronics than ever before, and many systems require constant power even when the engine isn't running.

Frequent, short trips also increase the need for additional reserve capacity because the battery may not have enough time to recharge between stops and starts.

Results of both tests can be found on the battery or online. Check your owner's manual to find the right specifications for your vehicle.

Motorcycle and ATV batteries

The most common powersport batteries are conventional lead-acid batteries and absorbed glass mat (AGM) batteries, also called maintenance-free batteries.

While conventional lead-acid batteries are typically less expensive, they require more routine maintenance. Users must visually check the electro-

lyte level through the opaque white case of the battery. If the level is low, it must be refilled with distilled water to keep up performance and avoid an explosion.

AGM batteries are more expensive but need less maintenance and perform well in extreme climates.

Conventional and AGM powersport batteries come with acid bottles for filling the batteries. A motorcycle battery charger should be used to activate these batteries once filled.

Marine batteries Marine batteries are different from car batteries. A marine battery needs to crank over an engine and supply the energy needed for continued accessory use.

For that, marine starting batteries—also known as cranking batteries—are a good fit.

If you need to power many electronic devices, such as trolling motors, GPS or fish finders, a deep cycle battery can be better.

Safe Trips Start With These Six Maintenance Tips

While many people know to check their oil and tire pressure before a road trip, there is one commonly overlooked car care component it would be a bright idea to remember: headlight maintenance.

As the National Safety Council points out, driving at night is more hazardous than at any other time since vision—one of the most important senses necessary for driving—is compromised. Depth perception, color recognition and peripheral vision are all affected.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration adds that the primary reason for severe nighttime accidents and reduced driving safety is dim, cloudy or improperly lit headlights. In fact, a 20 to 50 percent reduction in headlight output leads to a 90 percent increase in the possibility of an accident. Yet an estimated nine out of 10 cars on the road have dirty or yellowed headlights that greatly reduce vision

and need to be replaced, repaired or restored.

Before hitting the streets, it's important to not join the majority—check vehicle headlights and ensure that visibility is high. Try these headlight maintenance tips to prepare for the open road ahead and improve vehicle safety year-round.

- You have choices for better headlights: Better headlights can help increase visibility farther down the road, which in turn can help drivers feel safer and more secure when driving at dusk, dawn or nighttime. If there's an object on the road, better headlights can help drivers react sooner. Any upgrade above a basic headlight replacement can create a better, safer experience for drivers. Many high-performance halogen headlights don't increase glare, which avoids affecting other drivers on the road.

- Replace before burnout: Headlights can dim over time so make sure to replace them before they burn out. If you can't remember the last time the headlights

were changed, it may be time for an upgrade.

- Always swap in pairs: It's very important to replace headlights in sets of two. Since headlights dim over their lifetime, a new bulb paired with an old bulb will create an uneven field of vision, which can be a major distraction on the road for oncoming traffic.

- Restoration as an option: The average age of vehicles on the road today is more than 11 years old. Millions of these cars have faded, cloudy plastic headlight lenses. There are DIY restoration kits that can help you restore clarity and remove the hazy yellow appearance on

headlight lenses. A good restoration kit can let up to three times more light shine on the road from the same, once cloudy headlight.

- Keep it clean: Be

The auto industry experienced a seismic shift this month when J.D. Power announced that for the first

time in 27 years a non-premium brand ranked highest in its annual Initial Quality Study.

When the dust settled, the nameplate that managed to

unseat Porsche, the reigning IQS champion for three years running, and take the top spot was upstart Kia Motors.

The study, now in its 30th

year, examines problems experienced by vehicle owners during the first 90 days of ownership, and marks a massive win for Kia, a brand that has rapidly transformed into a recognized leader in design, technology and craftsmanship.

With an award-winning lineup spanning from subcompact cars to luxury vehicles, Kia's rise to the top was driven by best-in-class quality rankings for the popular Sportage small SUV and Soul compact multi-purpose vehicle, while Forte and Sorento placed second, and the Rio placed third in their respective segments. And the brand's historic performance does not come completely out of the blue.

Kia has placed in J.D. Power's top 10 since 2013, and nabbed the second overall spot in last year's IQS survey, pulling ahead of all non-premium rivals for the first time. Still, Kia owners reporting fewer issues with their vehicles within the first 90 days of ownership than all other car and truck brands in the U.S.—including German and Japanese makes—sent a shockwave throughout the industry.

“Ranking highest overall in the entire industry for initial

quality is the result of Kia's decade-long focus on craftsmanship and continuous improvement, and reflects the voice of our customers, which is the ultimate affirmation,” said Michael Sprague, chief operating officer and EVP of Kia Motors America. “As the highest ranked brand in the industry, there is no doubt Kia is a first-class automaker.”

New vehicle quality across the board rose 3% since 2015, the largest bump in overall quality since 2009, thanks in large part to smoother implementation of technology. Also worth noting: for the first time in a decade, non-premium brands as a whole had fewer problems than luxury makers.

All in all, 33 U.S. makes were included in the study, which divides problems into eight categories, including Engine/Transmission, Audio/Communication/Entertainment/Navigation, and Driving Experience. Automakers have every reason to take pride in a top IQS showing, as fewer problems will inevitably lead to increased brand loyalty and stellar word-of-mouth amongst consumers.






