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## Project Lead The Way comes to Auburn

Two very talented Auburn technology specialists have been working hard over the past few months gathering information, attending workshops and finally, writing and submitting a grant to bring a new STEM-based curriculum to our students. Ms. Sarah Connell from Swanson Road Intermediate School and Ms. Kerry LeBreton from the Pakachoag and Bryn Mawr Schools, have been working closely with Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI) to

bring "Project Lead The Way" (PLTW) to Auburn. These passionate educators took on this challenge with their usual enthusiasm and intelligence, proceeding through several phases in order to ultimately submit a final application for grant monies.

The Auburn Public School District is thrilled to announce that their hard work and commitment to our students has resulted in our receiving three PLTW grants. One at the Swanson Road Intermediate School, one at the Bryn Mawr School and one at the Pakachoag School.

There were only 58 schools across the Commonwealth which received this grant and we are extremely excited and appreciative of this opportunity. PLTW is a nonprofit organization and is supported by the Administration of Massachusetts Governor Charlie Baker and Lt. Governor Karyn Polito, the One8 Foundation, and Mass STEM Hub.


The Project Lead the Way program is intended to prepare students for career success in the sciences. The curriculum provides inquiry-based learning experiences in computer

science, engineering and biomedical. These learning experiences are hands-on, project-based activities that bring real-world connections to our students.

As part of the grant the schools will receive the curriculum and be able to purchase necessary materials and equipment. In addition, teachers will be provided with professional development. This is an amazing opportunity for our teachers and students and aligns with the District's focus on Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM). S.T.E.M. (Science,

Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education is becoming a greater and greater focus across the country as a result of the growing shortage of talented and qualified STEM workers. ## Schools float third override quest

OXFORD – For at least the third year in a row, the Oxford School Committee is starting to talk about seeking an override to fund the schools.

The issue came up at their most recent meeting in a somewhat unusual context – discussion of a clause in the union agreement that allows teachers from outside town to bring their own kids into the district. To member Palmina Griffin, that triggers concerns of financial liability when the district doesn't get paid for them under school choice.

She objected to the fact this is allowed despite the "lack of money we have to service the children of our town. ...It pains me to look at this as a liability, but with the way our district is structured, it is."

Griffin cited a rough figure of \$600,000 for the override, but

added "I'm not even sure that's enough."

The Committee sought \$600,000 last year and lost by about 300 votes, while an \$800,000 override in 2017 got crushed by 700 votes.

"A week or two ago, we thought everything was grand," she said.

The district Web site (www.oxps.org) has a page for override information, but it was empty last weekend.

Business Manager Justin Leduc told the committee the district's proposed FY 2020 budget is currently "short about \$240,000 from what the town has given us," which was a little more than \$17.9 million. He sees some cuts that might help going into next year, including a reduction of \$39,000 in rent at the central office, cutting a \$10,000 summer central

## Area police take part in multi-agency manhunt

SPENCER – A man was arrested last week in Sutton after a manhunt that included multiple agencies.

Rasheem Rosa, 19, of Worcester, was arrested on Feb. 11, one day after police conducted an extensive search for him following a domestic incident.

At 1:50 p.m. on Feb. 10, Spencer Police received multiple 911 calls from an undisclosed address describing a large fight involving bats, golf clubs, knives, and a sword. Spencer officers requested assistance from Leicester Police and State Police. When

officers arrived on scene, they determined that no one had been injured, and the use of the reported weapons had only been threatened.

Police ascertained that the dispute was over the custody of a 17-year-old girl. Officers also learned that Rosa, who was allegedly armed with a three-foot sword, had fled into the woods behind a row of nearby apartment buildings. The investigation also revealed that Rosa had an outstanding default warrant for his arrest.

The Central Mass. Law Enforcement Council (CEMLEC) was activated for

a canine and drone search of the area. Officers from the State Police, Environmental Police, Oxford, Shrewsbury, Westborough and Sturbridge Police canine units joined in the search.

"After an extensive search of the area where several hikers were located walking the Audubon property and removed from the area for their safety, it appeared Mr. Rosa had gone to the Greenville Street area, where he was picked up by an automobile," a Spencer Police statement read.

The search was called off at approximately 4:30 p.m.

The 17-year-old juvenile was placed with her guardian, and Spencer Police applied for an additional warrant for Rosa's arrest through Western Worcester District Court.

Rosa was located in Sutton the next day and arrested on charges pertaining to the outstanding warrant. Rosa was found with the same girl who had been returned to her guardian by officers the previous day. She apparently ran away with Rosa, police said.

The investigation is ongoing, and additional charges might be filed, police said.

## Old Sturbridge Village to kick off spring season with Maple Days

STURBRIDGE—Old Sturbridge Village is getting ready to celebrate spring with Maple Days, the museum's ode to the start of maple sugaring season.

During all weekends next month, March 2-3, 9-10, 16-17, and 23-24, visitors can witness the entire maple sugar-making process as it was done in the 1830s, from tree tapping to turning the sap into usable sugar.

"It's our annual time to show how maple sap was harvested and processed," said Michael Arnum, Director of Marketing and Public Relations at Old Sturbridge Village. "They weren't as interested in maple syrup because it doesn't keep well, but maple sugar was used to sweeten baked goods."

Maple sugaring, which typically takes place from early February until late March, when temperatures fluctuate between freezing at night

and above freezing during the day, was often preferred over buying cane sugar in the early 19th century. This was not only because maple sugaring is native to North America and was not carried over from Europe like many other traditions and agricultural practices, but because many of the people who lived in early New England villages were refusing to buy cane sugar as a form of protest against the slave trade.

"If they were abolitionists, they

# Four Score sees positive results in first meeting with Planning Board

CHARLTON – One of several companies seeking to set up a marijuana cultivation operation in Charlton held their first public hearing before the Planning Board on Feb. 6.

Four Score Holdings LLC is looking to setup a medical and recreational marijuana growing facility at 144 Sturbridge Rd. in Charlton utilizing an existing 20,000 -square-foot building to house the operation. The company began its proposal in 2018, as the Valley Green Grow controversy came to light however there has been little to no direct opposition to the Four Score project during that time. In order to proceed the company needs site approval and a special permit from

the Planning Board. The business is expected to generate over \$2 million in revenue over a five-year period.

The hearing included input from several representatives of Four Score Holdings, with Attorney Daniel Glissman leading the discussion recapping how the project got to where it is today.

“We held a community meeting back in July and received what I think was pretty good feedback,” Glissman said. “We’re located in the industrial general zoning district and, as such, are allowed by special permit for the proposed uses. This is an existing building. It’s really an ideal building for our proposed use here in terms of its current layout.”

The facility is expected to include between 13,000 and

15,000 square feet of growing space with minimal adjustments to the building itself. Attorney Glissman said there will be additions and alterations to portions of the property and the building, but for the most part the footprint and structure will remain as it currently stands with the interior reworked to accommodate the equipment necessary for the growing operation.

“We are really not proposing much to change to this building. We’re proposing some bump outs in the back for equipment and air handlers and the like,” Glissman said. “We’ll be improving the space with landscaping as deemed appropriate by the Planning Board. We’ll stripe the entire lot with parking spaces just to make sure the flow is well

setup for traffic and parking purposes. We’ve set out where we will store snow and we’ve proposed a dumpster in the back that we will screen. We’ve also included handicap parking and other than that there’s really no additional changes to the exterior of the building.”

Kurt Smith, one of the founders of Four Score Holdings LLC, offered some insight not the products that the company plans to produce. The facility will be used for growing and manufacturing and will not be selling products from the building itself. Smith did not rule out the possibility of exploring distribution at a later date.

“Currently, our product line is not completely developed, but this is as it sits a wholesale operation so we would be serving other dispensaries unless

we were granted the opportunity to retain cannabis here. The products would be concentrated cannabis flour, concentrated oil products in various forms, vape cartridges and capsules, edibles, things like that,” Smith said.

The project received little opposition from the Planning Board with the only major request being an odor mitigation plan which Four Score had already produced despite not being asked to do so in the past. The Board of Selectmen were expected to address the proposal on Tuesday, Feb. 12, but winter weather forced that meeting to be canceled. The Planning Board continued the public hearing to March 6.

## Senior Center launches new Memory Café program

SPENCER – Recognizing the lack of services available throughout the area for residents requiring memory care, the Senior Center staff is excited to launch a new program this month.

The Senior Center’s Sunflower Memory Café was scheduled to offer its first session on Feb. 21. Held on the third Thursday of each month from 1-3 p.m., the program is open to all individuals suffering from memory loss. You do not need to be diagnosed with a condition or provide medical documentation to attend. The program is meant to provide a relaxed environment for seniors to discuss issues and enjoy activities.

The program is helpful for anyone suffering from dementia, memory loss, brain disorders, and other forms of cognitive impairment.

“A memory café gives those suffering a memory issue a chance to meet others with the same issues without judgment, and they can help each other cope with the changes in their lives,” said Senior Center Director Pamela Woodbury.

Under Gov. Charlie Baker, the state has made a major push toward expanding programming for those suffering from dementia. After launching an initiative to help communities become dementia friendly, the Baker Administration is hoping to see memory cafés opened throughout the state. In Spencer, Woodbury and her staff

are excited to open the program to residents and guests from other communities. As the baby boomer population continues to age, memory care programs are expected to significantly expand over the next decade.

Worldwide, the number of people suffering from dementia is projected to increase from 50 million in 2018 to 152 million in 2050. In the U.S., a new person is diagnosed with Alzheimer’s disease almost every minute.

“One in eight people 65 and over have memory issues,” Woodbury added. “Due to the increase in numbers with the Baby Boomers aging, these numbers will increase.”

Several memory café sessions in Spencer will be sponsored by former

resident Gwen Pratt. Group activities and refreshments will be provided during each session.

The Senior Center staff reminds guests that you do not need to be a resident of Spencer to attend. Additional information on the push to increase dementia friendly communities is available at the state’s Web site, www.mass.gov.

## Re-visit the case of Bathsheba Spooner with upcoming program

SPENCER – Things didn’t end well for Bathsheba Spooner – the first woman in the nation to be executed for her crimes – and residents are looking forward to traveling back in time and learning how her sinister story began.

On Tuesday, March 12, a presentation on Bathsheba Spooner’s life will take place at Senior Living at Prouty (195 Main St. in town). Set for 1:15-2:30 p.m., the presentation is titled, “Bathsheba Spooner: America’s First Murder for Hire.” The program will be delivered by Sari Bitticks, the president of the Auburn Historical Society and chairperson of the Auburn Historical Commission.

The program is available in Spencer because of a local cultural grant. Guests from throughout the area are welcome to attend and learn about Spooner, who entered an arranged marriage to a wealthy farmer in the late eighteenth century. After having an affair with a young soldier, Spooner asked her paramour and two other men to murder her husband.

In 1778, the dark plot came to fruition, as Spooner’s husband was beaten to death in March. Spooner and her accomplices were quickly arrested and tried for the murder. Following her conviction, she was hanged in July of 1778, but there is far more to the fascinating story that will leave guests stunned and enlightened.

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# Leicester School Committee votes to close Memorial School

LEICESTER – After extensive deliberations, the School Committee decided last week to close the Memorial School and reconfigure the district's grades.

At its Feb. 12 meeting, the School Committee unanimously voted to close the school at the end of the school year. At an upcoming meeting, committee members will take a vote to return the building to the town.

As part of the reconfiguration plan, the district will move students in grades three and four to the Primary School, beginning in September. School Committee members will consider changing the name of the building, as it will now serve two additional grades. Moreover, preschool students will move to the high school.

"There are some construction projects that have to be done to prepare the space. We have an engineer looking at the space, and once we have his report we will begin to make changes," Leicester Schools Superintendent

Marilyn Tencza said of the preschool transition to LHS.

Finally, fifth grade students will move to the middle school as part of the reconfiguration. The building will see a few modifications to accommodate an additional grade, officials said.

School Committee members cited several benefits to closing the Memorial School, which is currently the lone school located off the town's main educational campus. Not only is there a significant financial savings from operating one less building, but officials are also eager to expand STEM education to the lower grades. Currently available to students in grades six through 12, STEM programming will now be offered to fifth graders and possibly fourth graders.

Another benefit to the decision is the ability to have all students on one campus, officials said. This will help improve efficiency and planning for bus routes and district-wide events like

Evening with the Arts. Specialized programs will also be more easily facilitated.

"We will be able to retain more teachers, and we can offer better support to our students through social, emotional and special education," Tencza said.

School Committee members had several concerns about the reconfiguration, but a presentation from Tencza helped solidify a plan for all buildings.

"My biggest concern was moving the pre-K to the first floor of the high school. Dr. Tencza did a great job of getting us the information about other local districts that have done that with great success," said School Committee member Scott Francis. "With some minimal construction at the high school to modify the bathrooms for our new shorter students, it should be a smooth transition."

The Primary School, middle school, and high school have a combined capac-

ity of approximately 1,800 students. The district currently has a total enrollment of 1,458 students, so there are no concerns of overcrowding, officials said. The main focus is on modifying each school to accommodate new grades.

After the February vacation, the district will form an Education Committee and a Facilities Committee to serve as advisory bodies throughout the reconfiguration process.

# Quaboag Historical Society hosting antique appraisal event

EAST BROOKFIELD – Have you always wondered how much those antiques in your attic are worth? Or maybe you recently bought an item at a tag sale and would like to have it evaluated. If so, you'll want to take advantage of an upcoming appraisal event next month.

Sponsored by the Quaboag Historical Society (QHS), the antiques and collectibles appraisal event will take place on Sunday, March 3, at East Brookfield Elementary School (410 East Main Street). Set for noon to 3 p.m., the program will provide residents with a chance to have their old treas-

asures and new acquisitions appraised.

The free event will be run by Wayne Tuiskula, a longtime local auctioneer, appraiser and columnist. Appraisals will be performed on a first-come basis, with each guest limited to three items to ensure that many residents have a chance to participate.

An antiques dealer since the 1980s, Tuiskula sells items each year at the Brimfield Flea Market and other local shows, in addition to handling several estate sales and auctions. Moreover, he writes about antiques for several publications and teaches evaluation

techniques in classes for the Worcester Public Schools and the Bay Path Adult Education programs.

Tuiskula has even appeared as a collectibles appraiser on the popular PBS program, "Antiques Roadshow." He is looking forward to reviewing local residents' items, describing their histories, and estimating how much they are worth.

QHS members, meanwhile, are excited for an event that promotes history in a fascinating way. They are always on the hunt for creative ideas to help bring attention to the area's past.

"We think this program is

special – and a good one for a winter gathering," said QHS president Amy Dugas. "Lots of folks have things – perhaps family treasures – that they'd like to know more about, including their value."

Many residents have collections dating back decades, while others recently inherited items and would like to learn about their worth. Occasionally a resident will unknowingly purchase a valuable item at a tag sale or a craft fair, then learn its worth and sell it for thousands.

But even if you don't bring an item to the appraisal event, the program is a great

way for collectors and antiques lovers to meet.

"If you don't want to bring anything for appraisal, it's fun to see what other people bring and what they're worth," Dugas added.

Light refreshments will be provided at the event.

# Spencer officials hold public hearing on community development grants

SPENCER – Selectmen held a public hearing last week focused on the town's proposed application for community development block grants.

At the Feb. 11 hearing, residents learned about the town's proposed fiscal year 2019 application to the state seeking up to \$800,000 in CDBG funds. The town has teamed up with the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission (PVPC) to hone the application, which will request funds for several construction projects on Cherry Street, Lloyd Dyer Drive, and Wall Street.

"This would include sewer, drainage, and water on Wall Street, along with repaving the road and replacing any sidewalk," said PVPC senior planner

Ted Harvey, who has worked closely with town officials throughout the application process. "Spencer has successfully received CDBG funds for similar projects on Chestnut and Mechanic Streets."

The proposed projects are critical to the town's continued improvement of roads and infrastructure, officials said. Following the extensive downtown revitalization effort and upgrades to Route 31, the interior roads south of Route 9 have become the next priority.

The proposed work on Cherry Street, Lloyd Dyer Drive, and Wall Street represents the culmination of a planning study that took place in 2014. Funded by the state's CDBG program, the study highlighted several ways to improve Spencer's "Southside Neighborhood."

The town currently has funds remaining from last year's CDBG disbursement to complete the engineering design phase for the upcoming projects. After collating professional analyses

and input from residents received at recent public hearings, the town is in the process of finalizing its CDBG application.

"CDBG funds continue to be a valuable resource to the town and will have a very positive impact on the Cherry-Wall-Lloyd Dyer roadway improvement project," said Town Administrator Thomas Gregory.

The town's CDBG application is due to the state in March, and officials will be notified if Spencer has been selected for funding by July. If adequate state grant funding is received, the projects would likely begin in the spring of 2020.

Several other area communities are also competing for CDBG funds. Towns have the ability to partner in the application process to improve their chances of being chosen.

CDBG funds are allocated to individual states by the federal government.



## Southbridge to further promote clean recycling

SOUTHBRIDGE—In a world full of discussions about the importance of reusable cups, biodegradable plates, and sustainable energy, the Southbridge Inspections Department is doing its part by initiating a Recycling Campaign to put an end to dirty recycling after finding that recycling bins throughout the town have been home to many non-recyclable items. Since Jan. 21, inspectors have been looking through the recycling bins and attaching green “oops” stickers to those that hold non-recyclable materials, which inform residents of what they did wrong in their recycling efforts and serve as a friendly warning. However, starting March 1, recycling bins that consist of more than 15 percent non-recyclable items won’t be emptied at all. “We had a couple loads in November that had to be disposed of because they contained so many items that couldn’t actually be recycled,” said interim recycling coordinator and landfill monitor Anna Smith. “This is about eliminating con-

tamination in the recycling bins and avoiding items that don’t end up being recycled so that the loads don’t end up in our own landfills.” Due to limited funding, the campaign is hoping to apply for a grant with the permission of the Town Council in order to continue its efforts to create a cleaner recycling process, especially due to the fact that an audit by Casella Waste Systems, which provides the town’s weekly trash collection and bi-weekly recycling collection, revealed that more than 25 percent of Southbridge’s collected recyclables are not actually recyclable. Regulations in the town of Southbridge require that only paper, cardboard, glass bottles, cans, and single polymer plastics be recycled, but there are many non-recyclable items that are mistakenly thought to be recyclable and placed in the recycling bins, including larger pieces of scrap metal, textiles, and, most commonly, plastic bags. “Plastic bags are the number one problem,” said Smith. “The equipment at the recycling centers ends up shredding them and they can clog up the

machines. The best way to recycle them is to take them back to the grocery store.” After a legal battle with Casella Waste Systems that stemmed from the company claiming that it would stop collecting curbside trash and recycling in December, the expected date of the landfill reaching its capacity, Southbridge is using the Recycling Campaign to prepare to take on its own curbside collection efforts several years into the future. “In five years we will be funding our own trash and recycling collection, so we are looking towards the future and preparing for when that time comes,” said Smith. It’s an education process and campaign and the people in town have been very receptive. ## Ultimate Frisbee bringing Jewish and Arab teens together

DUDLEY — Frisbees are helping promote peace in Palestine.

Not just any frisbees, but the organized sport of Ultimate Frisbee, which Eben Weitzman described as "a highly competitive sport infused with a cooperative culture."

"It has baked into it this cooperative, constructive approach to conflict resolution" based on players talking out their on-field differences without relying on referees to arbitrate, he told a roomful of Nichols College students last week. "They know they don't always get the right result [for them personally], but they're committed to doing it this way."

Weitzman, a UMass-Boston psychology professor, plays the game. At a tournament several years ago, he overheard someone collecting used discs for Ultimate Peace and that opened a door to seeing the Israeli-Palestinian conflict in a whole new light. Since then, he and other American volunteer players have gone over there repeatedly to coach young players from three distinct, self-identified groups — Israeli Jews, Israeli Arabs and Palestinians — in Ultimate Frisbee and, more importantly, its "spirit of the game."

To them, the game's ethos might be a way to break down barriers in what Weitzman described as "a tremendously painful ... ongoing protracted conflict" in which the Jews see themselves defending their homeland, the Palestinians see themselves being oppressed, and both viewpoints "are very real to the people who live them," he said.

It's actually even more complex, Weitzman added. Israel has both Jewish and Arab citizens, with the latter having fewer rights than the former — but more than the Palestinians (residents of West Bank and Gaza), who are not citizens at all. He noted Ultimate Peace has found it particularly hard to get players from Palestinian communities because of the political barriers. They've only had three towns represented from there, versus seven Arab Israeli towns and a few more Jewish Israeli towns.

Ultimate Peace's efforts began in 2010 with a summer camp for teenagers in which they played games between the villages then purposely mixed team members, and finally had a tournament in which all teams were randomized.

Over time, they've been adding "dialogue and relationship-building work" with the kids, who spend their time in camp as members of "families" of six kids each — three Hebrew-speakers, three Arabic-speakers.

Last year, Weitzman surveyed those kids using what he called a "stereotyping scale," in which they told him how they felt society thinks about four groups of people (the three in the area plus Americans) in eight key traits that he split in two groups representing "competence" and "warmth." In all cases, the attitudes improved.

"We saw changes in the places you'd most want to see changes," he said.

His favorite response came from one teen he'd seen writing in Hebrew who told him "I don't think you can make statements like this about a whole group of people."

"These kids form incredibly close relationships ... with kids on the other side of those identity divides," Weitzman said. But, given the social divisions, it can be difficult for those kids to see each other outside the camp sessions. He noted some who have had opposition from their parents over returning to camp, but also one Jewish family who took their daughter into the West Bank, had coffee with the Palestinian family of another player, and left her there to visit for a while.

Ultimate Peace's goal, he said, is to help them "develop a durable social network. ... If they keep those friendships and those relationships, they have a chance to live a different way."

Weitzman noted solving this long-running conflict requires far more than just bringing people together and hoping

they'll be friends. For decades, the two sides have "traumatized" each other in various ways, and each community has developed "a really impaired ability" to trust the other while pointing to history "to justify their own actions." At the same time, though, there are "many people committed to coexistence," with mixed communities in Haifa and some villages.

Both cooperation and competition, he noted, are examples of interdependence. In the former, groups notice similarities, work on common interests, share ideas, and "tend to make sure were both powerful together." In the latter, "every single one of those is reversed" — they see differences, stress opposing goals, keep secrets and act "to undermine the other's well-being."

Switching those is a challenge, because there are "certain conditions where [bringing people together] will just make things worse" if not handled carefully, Weitzman said. For it to work, the two sides need to have "equal status" in the shared setting, common goals, "explicit opportunities for intergroup cooperation," not just working side-by-side, and support from outside law, custom and/or authorities.

He noted many sports have been the focus of peace-building efforts in Palestine and other trouble spots, but only Ultimate Frisbee has that particular kind of cooperative culture.

"Maybe the elements of [the spirit of the game] can be identified. ... If we can extract the 'secret sauce,' maybe it can be used in other peace-building programs, he said.

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office staff person, a projection that school choice costs will drop next year, and the likelihood they'll see seven people retire. But the state's special ed "circuit breaker" payment is also falling by \$58,000. He said Oxford's homeless student funding (under the McKinney-Vento Act) won't be affected, since that's being covered by "entitlement grant money."

Chairman William Spitz added that the board knew about that \$240,000 shortfall and asked the administration to address it weeks ago, but "presently that has not been touched, and that's the problem." He noted that money is necessary to have "a bare-bones budget," and called for another budget meeting within

the next couple of weeks.

Superintendent Elizabeth Zielinski said the governor's proposed budget includes a \$45,000 increase in Chapter 70 general school aid for next year, but Oxford "takes a larger hit on school choice and charter school [costs] ... to the tune of \$185,000." Although the governor's office "makes it sound good, everyone's getting hit," and she noted she and others are trying to work with legislators to fix the problem during the Legislature's budget process.

The Legislature is also looking at a more general overhaul of the Chapter 70 funding formula, but a bill to do that died in committee last year. Since a special commission researched and reported on the issue a few years ago, the funding gap

has grown to about \$1 billion a year.

In other business, the committee honored soccer coach Colby Harvey for being chosen Division IV Coach of the Year, after he brought the girls varsity team to division finals a few months ago.

"We're very proud of you and want to thank you for what you've done for our soccer program," Spitz said.

Athletic Director Kevin May noted the soccer program is expanding. Last fall saw the first girls junior varsity team "in five or six years," he said.

The committee also praised the leaders of the "Girls on the Run" program, which now has nine participants (seven from Barton School, two from the middle school). Coach Kim Mayo said the

program provides "a very detailed, scripted curriculum" with daily topics on such things as communication, cooperation and "any of those life skills we're trying to empower those girls with."

The team meets Wednesdays and Fridays after school to run around Barton School (literally), with the girls running between set stations where they fill out worksheets related to the day's topic. Periodically, they participate in regional 5K races coordinated by the Worcester-area GOTR chapter, which has 24 member teams, according to its website. The next is May 19, and some team members "seek volunteers to be running buddies."

Additionally, the girls devise their own "give-back" projects, with two from Oxford (Kate Mayo and Keegan MacIlvane)

recently creating "Kindness Rocks" posters that now hang in the police and fire departments.

overall grades. Last year, evidence showed that students who participated in our Robotics program also showed an increase in their core course subjects (math, writing, English, and reading). More specifically, it was found that 79 percent of students increased their English scores, 71 percent of students increased their reading scores, 50 percent of students increased their math scores, and 50 percent increased their writing scores.

Since we are non profit, Our Bright Future Inc. does not charge students for any programming, and therefore this enrichment, skill building program relies heavily on community donations and grants. The greater

## The right insurance can meet both short- and long-term needs

If you’re going to achieve your important financial goals, you’ll need to build an appropriate investment portfolio. But that’s only part of the story – because you also need to protect what you have, what you earn and what you’d like to leave behind. That’s why it’s a good idea to become familiar with the various types of insurance and how they can address short- and long-term needs.

For starters, consider life insurance. You may have important long-term goals, such as leaving an inheritance for your family and providing resources for your favorite charities. You may be able to fulfill some of these through the death benefit on your policy.

You can also purchase life insurance to help fill the gap between the amounts you have saved and what your family would need if you died unexpectedly. Thus, insurance can pay for liabilities (such as a mortgage, car payments, student loans and other debts), education expenses (such as college for your children) and final expenses associated with your passing.

Next, consider disability insurance. If you were injured or became ill and couldn’t work for a while, the loss of income could be a big problem for your family members – in fact, it could disrupt their entire lifestyle. Even a short-term disability could prove worrisome, while a long-term disability could be catastrophic. Your employer might offer short-term disability insurance, and that could be enough – but do you really want to take that chance? To protect your income if you were out of work for an extended period, you might need to supplement your employer’s coverage with your own long-term disability policy. Long-term disability insurance, which generally kicks in after you’ve used up your short-term benefits, may pay you for a designated time period (perhaps two to five years) or until your reach a certain age, such as 65. Long-term disability insurance likely won’t replace your entire income, but it can go a long way toward helping you stay “above water” until you recover.

You may also want to think about long-term care insurance. Despite its name, a long-term care policy could meet either short- or long-term needs. On the short-term end, you might need the services of a home health care aide to assist you in your recovery from an injury such as a broken hip. On the other end of the long-term care scale, you might someday need an extensive stay in a nursing home, which can be extremely expensive and which isn’t typically covered by Medicare. But in either case, you might be able to benefit from a long-term care insurance policy, or possibly a long-term care rider attached to a life insurance policy. And the earlier you take action, the better, because long-term care insurance, in particular, generally becomes more expensive the older you get.

This list of insurance policies, and the needs they can help meet, is certainly not exhaustive, but it should give you an idea of just how important the right insurance coverage can be for you – at almost any stage of your life.

## Dahlias bring diverse shapes, sizes, colors to the garden

Dahlias have been a fixture in summer flower gardens for generations. But it may be time to update your idea of dahlias! With hundreds of varieties to choose from in a fabulous array of colors, shapes and flower sizes, it is no surprise the National Garden Bureau has declared 2019 the Year of the Dahlia. Join the celebration and brighten your garden with dahlias this year.

Not only are dahlias beautiful, but they’re also easy to grow. Just plant the tuberous roots in a sunny, well-drained location, once the soil has warmed to about 60 degrees – or around the same time as you would plant tomatoes. It takes a week or two for the first shoots to emerge, but the plants grow quickly and will be blooming by midsummer.

Grow dahlias in containers to brighten your balcony, deck or front steps. They combine nicely with other plants in containers as well as in the garden. Mix them with bold, leafy elephant ears, Lacinato kale and Swiss chard; finely textured ornamental grasses and gaura; upright salvias and gladiolus; and trailing plants like calibrachoa, verbena and ivy. Dahlias will add pizzazz to your gardens and landscape, especially in the second half of the summer when many other flowers are starting to wane.

Dinnerplate dahlias are bodacious beauties that command your attention. They include any variety of dahlia with flowers that are at least eight inches in diameter. These extra-large blossoms are produced on bushy plants that grow three to six feet tall. Favorites include Café au Lait, Vancouver and Thomas Edison. Use stakes to help support the flowers and keep the plants standing upright.

Decorative dahlias offer the widest array of colors and styles. Their petals are flat to slightly rolled and flower sizes vary from four to eight inches. Growing an assortment of several different varieties, like the Spice Mix Decorative Dahlia

Collection (longfield-gardens.com), lets you enjoy a color-coordinated blend of hues that combine well in both the garden and in a vase.

For dahlias with a completely different look, grow cactus and semi-cactus types. Their rolled or partially rolled petals give the flowers a spiky texture. Varieties such as Yellow Star and burgundy-maroon Nuit d’Ete will add style and sophistication to your garden.

Make sure your flower garden also includes a few ball and pompon dahlias. These perfectly round swirls of tightly rolled petals come in vivid colors, and their long vase life make them a favorite with floral designers. Use coppery-orange Mirella or vivid Boom Boom Red to weave shots of color throughout an arrangement.

For contrast, incorporate some single, peony-flowered, anemone and collarette types. Dahlias such as HS Date, Bishop of Dover and Fascination have fewer petals and slightly smaller blooms, which makes them good companions for annuals as well as perennials. Plus, their daisy-like centers are magnets for bees and butterflies.

Bring your dahlias up close with dwarf varieties, commonly known as border dahlias. These plants grow just 12 to 24 inches tall, yet most have big, four-to-five-inch blooms. Popular varieties include Gallery Pablo, Melody Swing and Gallery Art Nouveau. They are ideal for

small spaces, lining a walkway and are a perfect addition to containers.

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

CHARLTON — When the Bay Path Regional girls' varsity basketball team left Upton 52-36 losers to Blackstone Valley Tech on Wednesday, Feb. 6, head coach John Selen called the setback "disappointing" and that we "just didn't have our heads in the game today." That loss dropped the Minutemen to 13-4.

Fast forward to Thursday, Feb. 14 and Bay Path completed a three-game stretch where they looked like the Minutemen of old. Bay Path beat Abby Kelly Foster twice — "we played fantastic," Selen said of those two games — before hosting Worcester Tech on Valentine's Day for Senior Night. There, the Minutemen also took care of business, 55-42, to finish their regular season with an impressive record of 16-4.

Bay Path can look back at the Valley Tech loss and realize that the seniors — there are eight in total — took matters into their own hands.

"They weren't too thrilled of losing to the Beavers in the fashion that they did. "They thought it was a poor performance; they thought they could have done a lot better. It was a silent bus ride all the way back.

"It's a senior group; they know what they're supposed to do. They understood their commitment wasn't what it should have been going into that game. We righted the ship," added Selen.

In the game with Worcester Tech — where the Eagles could barely suit up a starting rotation, as only five players dressed — the Minutemen stumbled slightly out of the gates. Bay Path trailed for most of the first quarter but led, 11-10, after those initial eight minutes. They then took a 30-23 halftime lead.

"I warned the girls, it's like you get caught up in the Senior Night thing. It's the emotion of the night and the weight of it all," Selen said. "At halftime I said, 'things aren't going well,

but if we up the tempo they're going to get tired,' so that was the whole idea to push the ball and attack the basket, and it worked in our favor."

The Eagles showed their wear in the third quarter, as they were getting beat down the court. Worcester Tech also began making passes to no one in particular and lost the battle on the scoreboard, 16-6.

As a result the Minutemen led, 46-29, heading into the final quarter before winning by 13 points.

Four of Bay Path's seniors, as well as sophomore Madison Paulhus, compose the starting five. All five showed flashes of brilliance, with Kiara Coates leading the way with a double-double total of 16 points and 11 rebounds. Alexus Afriyie notched 14 points, Paulhus scored 10 points, Nekelle Waskiewicz added 7 points and Emily Wong Kam pulled down 10 rebounds.

"They function well together as a group and they communicate well. It's a real good group of kids," Selen said of the starters and the team as a whole.

Coates added that Senior Night "went really good. I really like how everyone played out there. We tried to tire [Worcester Tech] out."

In addition to Coates, Afriyie, Waskiewicz and Wong Kam, Bay Path's other seniors include Emily Margoupis, Evelyn Sheehan, Kayla Davis and Patricia King.

The Minutemen will now wait for the postseason brackets to be revealed (on Friday, Feb. 22) before they embark on a run through the Central Mass. Division 4 Tournament, where the seniors hope to win their first District game.

"We earned it," Coates said of the 16-4 record and a trip to the playoffs for her fourth straight year and fifth overall for the program. "I want to go all the way to WPI."

Worcester Polytechnic Institute typically hosts the tournament's semifinal and final rounds.

The four youngsters were Aiden Walker, Charlotte & Holden. That had a great day fishing and playing on the ice, as did numerous other young anglers hoping to catch one of the recently stocked trout.

The latest deer harvest in Mass. was recently made available to the public, and what a year it was. The deer were in great shape and many sported some great antlers. The figures were as follows: The youth deer hunt netted 138, Paraplegic hunt 3, Archery season totaled 5,190, Shotgun season 6,495, Primitive arms totaled 2,687. More than 700 deer were harvested during the two week extension of the archery season in zones 10 - 14. A total of 885 deer were harvested in zone 8 and 1,458 deer were harvested in zone 9 this year. Primitive Arms saw a whopping total of deer harvested, which has a lot to do with the great accuracy of the rifled black powder guns, that are now used by deer hunters.

Turkey hunting regulations are being reviewed by Mass. Fish & Wildlife with possible changes in daily bag limits and an increase in season limits. It should be noted that if the changes are made, the regulations will not become effective until 2020.

Changes to the striped bass fishing relative to catch & release are being recommended by the Mass. Division of Marine fishery's board hoping to minimize the striped bass mortality.

Circle hooks have been used by many striped bass anglers including this writer for many years. They work very well but you need to change your fishing tactics. When fishing using circle hooks with live bait or

This past weekend was a great day to be outdoors enjoying the nice weather and doing some fishing. On Saturday, the Whitinsville Fish & Game Club & the Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club held their annual fishing derbies. They were both well attended with Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club seeing a record amount of anglers ice fishing, but what was most exciting was the amount of

chunk baits, allowing the fish to make a short run and then starting to reel the fish in with out setting the hook, takes some practice. Circle hooks do work well and most often hook the fish in the mouth rather than in the throat, which often causes damage to the fish resulting in a dead fish after release.

Studies have shown that 9 percent of catch & release striped bass will die from damage to their gills and throat. Consideration is also being given to anglers using gaff's to bring the fish into the boat, or on shore. Banning the use of gaff's on striped bass could become reality. More than one million striped bass die annually after being

released. These type of regulations need to be implemented for both recreational and commercial anglers. The method of yo-yo fishing which has the angler using wire and lead weights and a hook attached to the fresh bait like porgies needs to be stopped. These regulations are long overdue. Commercial fishing for herring and porgies also needs tighter restrictions on the catch. Removing to many of these bait fish can also have major negative effects on our striped bass populations. Stay tuned for more on the new regulations being considered by DMF.

had a boycott on cane sugar," said Arnum. "Maple sugar filled in as an alternative."

The museum, which has a working sugar camp for its annual demonstrations in March, will not only teach guests about the process of making maple sugar, but will also have costumed interpreters cooking period foods made with maple products and making maple related items in the Pottery Barn and Tin Shop.

"You get to see how the maple is processed from the trees and boiled down to be turned into sugar," said Arnum. "Then you can go into the houses and watch it be used for baking things such

as cookies and cakes."

On Maple Days weekends, the village will be open from 9:30 a.m. to 4pm. Tickets are \$28 for adults, \$26 for seniors, \$14 for college students and youth ages four to 17, and free for children ages 3 and under and can be purchased at the door or online.
