Police warn of 'devastating' IRS phone cons

It's that unfortunate time of year again when people begin to receive scam phone calls more frequently, said local police departments. While scams of all sorts never truly stop, there is a certain time of year when people begin to get calls from scammers pretending to be from the IRS.

Many citizens have called to inform the police of the recent spike in IRS impersonation calls. Other people only realized it was a scam after it was too late and their money was already

gone. Members of the Charlton Police Department have been receiving phone calls from the scam artists for months.

“I had a lengthy conversation with an ‘officer’ from the IRS who informed me there was a warrant for my arrest and if I didn't make arrangements to pay them \$2,956 I would go to jail,” read a Facebook post by Officer Richard McGrath. After a long back and forth with the con artist, McGrath had learned that the scammers wanted him to head to CVS, buy a pre-paid iTunes card for \$700 and read

the security numbers on the back of the card off to him. He continued: “I told him the number was 911. He asked me to read it again. I told him I was a police officer and explained that I was genuinely entertained by his charade. I then told him I couldn't afford to make the payments so I was just going to turn myself in on the warrant.”

While humorous in nature, the post carried an important message: “Please beware this is a scam. Don't be intimidated!” The post went on to say that the IRS would never call for imme-

diately payment, ask for payment with a prepaid debit card, ask for credit or debit card information or threaten you with an arrest.

Said McGrath: “The IRS does not do business like this or over the phone. They don't have the ability to issue arrest warrants. The only people who can do that is the courts. And if there is a warrant for your arrest, no amount of money will get you out of being arrested.”

Fishing adventures continue

Saltwater fishing returned back to normal this past weekend in both Massachusetts and Rhode Island waters.

Bottom fishing for sea bass and fluke is great again if you know where to fish and what to use for bait. Small pieces

of squid were working well when baited on a jig, and fresh silversides were very good if fished on a jig. The bay is still loaded with silversides and can be easily netted in the bay. Drifting a single hook baited with fresh

silversides also worked well when drift fishing in 20 to 30 feet of water.

This past week, Steve Mercure, of Uxbridge, landed a 19-inch sea bass that sported a littoral tag. It was exciting to catch a tagged fish and we could not wait to find out the history of the fish. After calling in the numbers of the tag to the Littoral Society

the following information was revealed: The fish was actually tagged a mile from where it was caught. The fish was tagged by Captain Stephen Tombs of the charter boat "Shearwater Charters" based in Galilee, R.I., on Aug.

24! Oh well! Steve will receive a patch from the Littoral Society to sew onto his fishing vest along with a letter of appreciation for his catch.

The Littoral Society is more than 50 years old and has had anglers tagging numerous species of fish for as many years. Anyone can become a member, which costs \$40 and \$14 for tag kits totaling \$54. The American Littoral Society is a non-profit organization, which will make members eligible for a tax deduction. For more information, go to www.littoralsociety.org. Sea bass legal length in Rhode Island is 15 inches for anglers to retain the fish, and must be measured from the head to the tail, not including any extending pieces of tail that are often found on sea bass.

The Whitinsville Fish & Game Club, in Douglas, will hold their annual Field Day this Saturday, Sept. 17, at their club grounds off of White Court. The event is open to the public and has plenty of free parking. A clambake and chicken BBQ will be available along with food from the kitchen. Club grounds open at 12 noon.

Black bear hunting opened last week on Sept. 6. The season will run until Sept. 24, for the first segment of the 2016 season. All Zones 1-14 will be open again this year for bear hunting. Hunters need a permit to hunt bear and can use a rifle. Hunters need to be very careful and read the entire rules and regulations on bear hunting listed in the 2016 Mass Fish & Wildlife regulations. A report of a 400-plus pound bear being harvested in Barre last week was indeed impressive. Bear hunters

in Maine are having a hard time luring bear into their baited area because of the massive crop of blackberries this year.







9/11: From the Archives

Editor's note: This week's column is a reworked version of a column published back in September 2011, commemorating the 10th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks. Now 15 years later, we at Stonebridge Press continue to remember the families affected on that fateful day, as well as the men and women in our U.S. Armed Forces defending our freedom, both at home and abroad.

I remember exactly where I was, what I was doing and whom I was with when the world changed forever.

I was just a kid, it seems, 15 years ago.

You've probably heard tons of stories from tons of people about what they were doing on Sept. 11, 2001, when they found out about the terrorist attacks at the World Trade Center in New

York City, the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., and a field in Shanksville, Pa., that left nearly 3,000 dead in a day that will go down in history as one of the darkest days ever recorded.

Let me tell you my story.

I was a freshman at Eastern Connecticut State University, in Willimantic, Conn. I was new at the campus, barely a week into my college experience. I was buying books, getting the lay of the land, getting to know my classmates and teachers, and preparing for my first semester as a college student.

Nothing could prepare me for what I was about to see.

One of the things I made a point to do when I started school was to schedule classes for early in the day, because in order to pay for my tuition, I had to have a part-time job on the side. I was lucky to find one, as a teacher at the after-school program at Eastford Elementary School, my alma mater. I worked afternoons there, so I had to get my classes out of the way before then.

This is why I had a class that started at the obscene hour of 8 a.m. It was a basic course in Microsoft Office — PowerPoint, Word, Excel — the basics. After about an hour of course introduction, the professor, whose name escapes me at the moment, finally let us log on to our computers — but there was a problem. I was never given a student password.

Off I went, just before 9 a.m. on Sept. 11, 2001, walking across campus to the tech support desk to get my password. As I entered the building, a few students stood transfixed at a television perched in the upper corner of the lobby. I glanced at it as I walked by, not really paying attention, but noticing it enough to know they were watching the news. I continued on my way.

I exited the elevator, password in hand, at 9:03 a.m. I know this so specifically, because at this point, the lobby was packed with students, eyes glued to the TV, and I suddenly realized this was no ordinary newscast. My eyes watched in horror as a plane suddenly appeared on the TV screen.

"There's no way this is real," I thought. Then it happened.

The crowd shifted with a collective gasp as what I found out to be the second plane hit the South Tower of the World Trade Center in a blazing fireball.

I asked the people around me what had happened, and a helpful student filled me in, tears in her eyes.

"We're being attacked," she said. "One plane has already hit, and another just flew into the other tower."

She quickly turned back to the TV.

I stood in shock for a minute, but quickly realized I had to get back to class, and as I entered, the majority of the group was already on the Internet, surfing CNN and other news media outlets, getting the latest on what was going on.

The rest of the day was a blur from that point. The dean closed the school early that day, and I was sent home, glued to my radio all the way home and then to my TV as I soaked in every last horrible detail of that day. I must have watched the news for about 14 hours straight, late into the night. I couldn't believe what was happening. The world would never be the same.

I have to admit, I was one of the lucky ones. I didn't have any family members or dear friends in or around the World Trade Center that day. My heart broke for those that did.

Fifteen years later, it is hard to believe I was just a 17-year-old kid on that day. Putting this into perspective, there are students today in our high schools that were born after the attacks.

How time flies.

But as the years go by, and the events of 9/11 recede further and further into the recesses of our collective memory, let us never forget what happened that day — a day when our faith was tested, our freedoms were challenged and lives were changed forever.

I won't ever forget.

Retirement plans for small businesses

If you're self-employed or own a small business and you haven't established a retirement savings plan, what are you waiting for? A retirement plan can help you and your employees save for the future.

TAX ADVANTAGES

A retirement plan can have significant tax advantages:

- Your contributions are deductible when made
- Your contributions aren't taxed to an employee until distributed from the plan
- Money in the retirement program grows tax deferred (or, in the case of Roth accounts, potentially tax free)

TYPES OF PLANS

Retirement plans are usually either IRA-based (like SEPs and SIMPLE IRAs) or "qualified" (like 401(k)s, profit-sharing plans, and defined benefit plans). Qualified plans are generally more complicated and expensive to maintain than IRA-based plans because they have to comply with specific Internal Revenue Code and ERISA (the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974) requirements in order to qualify for their tax benefits. Also, qualified plan assets must be held either in trust or by an insurance company. With IRA-based plans, your employees own (i.e., "vest" in) your contributions immediately. With qualified plans, you can generally require that your employees work a certain number of years before they vest.

WHICH PLAN IS RIGHT FOR YOU?

With a dizzying array of retirement plans to choose from, each with unique advantages and disadvantages, you'll need to clearly define your goals before attempting to choose a plan. For example, do you want:

- To maximize the amount you can save for your own retirement?
- A plan funded by employer contributions? By employee contributions? Both?
- A plan that allows you and your employees to make pretax and/or Roth contributions?
- The flexibility to skip employer contributions in some years?
- A plan with lowest costs? Easiest administration?

The answers to these questions can help guide you and your retirement professional to the plan (or combination of plans) most appropriate for you.

SEP

A SEP allows you to set up an IRA (a "SEP-IRA") for yourself and each of your eligible employees. You contribute a uniform percentage of pay for each employee, although you don't have to make contributions every year, offering you some flexibility when business conditions vary. For 2016, your contributions for each employee are limited to the lesser of 25 percent of pay or \$53,000. Most employers, including those who are self-employed, can establish a SEP.

SEPs have low start-up and operating costs and can be established using an easy two-page form. The plan must cover any employee aged 21 or older who has worked for you for three of the last five years and who earns \$600 or more.

SIMPLE IRA PLAN

The SIMPLE IRA plan is available if you have 100 or fewer employees. Employees can elect



How important is pricing your home?

The two big concerns people have about selling their home are how quickly it will sell and how much money they will get for the home.

How much money they will get is typically the most important. The most common comment I hear is: "We can always lower the price but we can't increase it, so let's just start a little higher and see what happens." I do agree that increasing the price is not a great strategy once you have listed the home for sale. This causes people to assume that you will take an offer for the initial price or lower so they tend to ignore the new price when deciding on what to offer. However, I don't think purposely overpricing the home is a good strategy either.

The first two to three weeks are the most crucial in your marketing time to get the most money for your home. If you are getting a full price or better offer it will typically be in the first few weeks. Buyers want to feel they have gotten a good deal and if your home is on the market for a couple months at the same price and other buyers have not purchased the home, then the buyers will want a discount. After being listed for sale for a

month or two and you lower the price, now the buyers think you are motivated and they can again offer lower for the home and get a deal.

Obviously, we don't have a lot of neighborhoods where every home is exactly the same and can easily be priced. I suggest hiring an experienced realtor who is familiar with your area as to not price incorrectly because your neighborhood sells for a different price than the comparable homes that are used to come up with price. Price the home as closely as you can to the expected sales price which if there is low inventory you may end up with an auction situation resulting in more than one buyer thus driving up the price of the home. This is the best way to get the highest price because about 90 percent of buyers are working with a real estate agent who can pull list of comparable homes and they know if your home is priced correctly or not.

Auburn Public Schools

AUBURN — Federal law guarantees every student the right to a free and appropriate public education regardless of disability. State law (603 CMR 28) documents the process for the identifying the students who may have a disability. The Auburn Public Schools is committed to providing special edu-

cation services for students with disabilities from age 3 to 21.

Child Find is a continuous process of public awareness activities, screening and evaluation designed to locate, identify, and refer as early as possible all young children with disabilities and their families who are in need of Early Intervention Program (Part C) or Preschool Special Education (Part B/619) services of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Parents/guardians of children ages 3-22, who reside in Auburn and feel their child is in need of an evaluation for the determination of eligibility for special education services, may contact the Office of Pupil Services (508) 832-7752. You may also contact your

child’s school directly and speak with the special education team chairperson to discuss your concerns.

To receive Special Education services, children must meet eligibility guidelines according to the IDEA. For more information you can write: Rosemary Reidy, Director of Pupil Services, 5 West Street, Auburn, MA 01501 or call 508-832-7752.

AUBURN — Massachusetts Student Record Regulation 60 CMR 23.06(3) states: “the temporary record of any student enrolled on or after the effective date of 603 CMR 23.00 shall be destroyed no later than seven years after the student transfers, graduates, or withdraws from the school system. Written notice

to the eligible student and his/her parent of the appropriate date of destruction of the record and their right to receive the information in whole or part, shall be made at the time of such transfer, graduation, or withdrawal. Such notice shall be in addition to the routine information letter required by 603 CMR 23.10.”

Therefore, the Auburn Public Schools Special Education Department has reviewed records of students who have left the district before July 1, 2009 and will initiate the destruction of those records.

Please notify the Special Education Department at 508-832-7752 by Oct. 20, 2016 to review and receive these records prior to their destruction.

dent, Auburn police officer and former Leicester police officer — was shot and killed during a traffic stop on May 22.

A 20-minute pregame ceremony included the color guard, bagpipes and drum corps making their way onto the field, an introduction of the Tarentino family, the presentation of the official game ball by Ronald Tarentino III — who surprised his family dressed as a Leicester High player as he is currently stationed at Fort Bragg, N.C. for the United States Army — and the playing of the national anthem with a helicopter flyover by the State Police Air Wing.

Then, at halftime, where the Wolverines led, 10-0, Trish Tarentino — wife of Ronald Tarentino, Jr. — gave a speech, which received a standing ovation.

There were also five prize raffles in addition to a standard 50/50 raffle, with the winning share totaling a robust \$1,313.

Oh, and there was a football game to be played, which didn't disappoint. The Rockets shrugged off the aforementioned halftime deficit and rallied for a 30-23 victory, which included a 2-yard rushing touchdown by quarterback Steve Saucier with 21 seconds to play.

Saucier was named Auburn's MVP, while the award for Leicester went to Matt Morrow, who hauled in a 17-yard touchdown pass with 1:10 to play to give the Wolverines a 23-22 lead.

For both sides, it wasn't so much about winning and losing, but about honoring a family that has such strong ties to both towns.

"It was a great night for a great cause and a lot of great people involved, and we're just happy to be a part of it," said Auburn head coach Jeff Cormier.

"It went off better than probably anyone could have imagined," added Leicester head coach Tim Griffiths. "We all win tonight just by seeing the smiles on their faces."

Saucier mentioned that the anticipation of the special night was grand.

"A lot of us couldn't stop thinking about it," he said. "It was a lot of pressure. It's great for the family. It's great for both communities."

Saucier finished the game with 13 carries for 65 yards and a pair of touchdowns and

completed 10 of 20 passes for 101 yards and another TD, with most of his production coming in the second half.

On the other side, the Wolverines looked sharp early. Nolan Power booted a 34-yard field goal in the first quarter and quarterback Nathan Powers (7 carries, 34 yards, 1 touchdown; 7 of 12 passing, 186 yards, 2 touchdowns, 2 interceptions) added a second half 2-yard rushing touchdown, with Power kicking the extra point to make it 10-0.

Early in the third quarter the Rockets got on the board when Jack Laperle picked off a Powers pass and brought it back to the house, and Jadon Latino made the extra point.

Leicester retaliated with the game's longest play three minutes later when Powers hit Kiev Wilson on a short pass. Wilson then juked some defenders and scampered 92 yards down the field for the touchdown to extend the Wolverines' lead to 16-7.

That score remained the same until a back-and-forth fourth quarter. There, Saucier hit Luke Matthews on a 15-yard scoring strike and Latino booted another extra point.

Auburn scored again with 3:10 to play to grab a 22-16 lead. Saucier called his own number from 12 yards out for six and Andrew Savage waltzed in for the two-point conversion.

Leicester then regained the lead on Powers' connection to Morrow (2 receptions, 38 yards), but Saucier scored the winner shortly thereafter. Saucier hit Jake Daniels on the two-point conversion to account for the final score.

Powers threw a desperation pass as the clock hit zeroes, but Matthews intercepted it to seal the deal.

"At the end of the day it was kind of a perseverance thing and I was proud of our kids that they always had one more play in them," Cormier said of finding a way to win.

But at the end of the day, the night still belonged to the Tarentino family.

"You just saw faces across the student body and alumni and it was really, really awesome. It was just a great atmosphere," said Cormier. "We're real thankful for all those guys that came out."

"Disappointing that we lost but not so much, great high school football game. I'm very proud of what went down for both teams," Griffiths concluded.

McGovern criticizes GOP on several issues

Slush funds Act, which the congressman felt was a bill providing a corporate giveaway. McGovern let his frustration show on the floor when he took the opportunity to call out his opponents in the Republican Party for what he felt was negligent inaction on several health issues in the country while taking up a bill related to corporations on the House Floor.

McGovern said he feels Republicans have largely ignored the Zika virus scare as well as the Flint, Michigan water crisis, the opioid epidemic and issues with gun violence in favor of less significant action in Washington.

"While spending time on efforts that are nothing more than sound bites for my friends on the other side of the aisle to use on the campaign trail, this Republican Congress has repeatedly ignored the calls from our constituents to act on issues they care about," McGovern said. "Issues that impact our communities, our neighborhoods, and our families."

McGovern called for action on the Zika virus, a perceived epidemic that has created concerns about the potential for birth defects in children born to infected women, and said that the virus may be a worldwide issue, but it's impact on American's should not be taken lightly.

"Almost 17,000 Americans, including nearly 1,600 pregnant

women, are currently suffering from the Zika virus. And this month, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention will run out of resources to fight Zika. In the words of Dr. Thomas Frieden of the CDC, "We need Congress to act," said McGovern. "Instead of considering a bipartisan Zika funding bill, the Republican leadership in the House has, once again, caved to the most extreme factions of their Conference to produce an inadequate, partisan bill loaded with poison pill offsets."

Calling the Zika virus situation an "emergency," McGovern called out Republicans on "making excuses" and ignoring input from officials on the epidemic that he feels needs to be taken more seriously. He added that he feels the lack of action is an assault on women's healthcare as well.

"We have public health expert after public health expert tell us we need to act, and yet, my Republican friends seem to think they know better. They have brought to the floor legislation to undermine the Clean Water Act under the guise of containing the Zika virus. And they have even insisted on poison pill riders that continue the Republican assault on women's access to comprehensive health care instead of bringing legislation that is focused solely on protecting American families from the terrible impacts of Zika," said the congressman.

Continuing his tirade, McGovern said he feels that other public health issues

like the opioid crisis and the Flint, Mich. water crisis have gone overlooked, and while he credited Congress for passing some legislation, specifically in regards to the opioid concern, he feels there is still too much to be done and that not enough Republican lawmakers are stepping up to the plate to help make it happen.

"We need to pass a strong piece of legislation that actually funds our fight against the opioid crisis and gives state and local partners the resources they need to help so many of our communities who have been hit hard by this epidemic. Passing a bill that has all these nice statements in it and nice goals and not funding it, well that's just a press release. And that's about the extent of what this Congress has done to deal with this terrible opioid crisis," McGovern said, moving to the Flint crisis next. "For two years, 100,000 people in Flint could not access safe water from their own faucets. For two years, hardworking Americans were denied the fundamental right of access to potable water. We're not talking about some tiny country halfway around the world. This has been happening right here in the United States of America. The Families of Flint Act, led by my friend and colleague Congressman Dan Kildee, would help the people in Flint recover from the man-made disaster that they are still dealing with. But, this Congress is too busy wasting its time to even consider bringing this vitally important, non-controversial bill up for a

vote. Where is the Majority leadership on this?"

Finally, McGovern's criticisms tackled the Republican reaction to what McGovern feels is common sense gun law changes and improvements such as the "No Fly, No Buy" measure that his Republican opponents have not acted on this session. McGovern challenged Republicans to act on what he feels is bipartisan and common sense legislation.

"They have blocked debate on legislation to expand and strengthen background checks. If you go to a licensed gun dealer, you have to go through a background check. But if you go to a gun show or if you buy a gun online, you don't have to go through a background check. What sense does that make? Who can be against that?" said the congressman. "And yet, they have voted time and time again the right to bring that to the floor. They have voted five times against lifting the 19-year-long ban on federal research on gun violence. What is the Republican Congress so afraid of?"

Addressing Republican criticism of the Democratic Party's sit in calling for action on gun violence legislation, McGovern said that while Republicans have been quick to call out Democrats for their protest they have shown little concern for gun violence victims in his eyes.

"My question is, where's the outrage over the 49 innocent civilians killed in Orlando? Where's the outrage over the 14 people killed in San Bernardino? Or the nine

people killed in a church in South Carolina? Is there any outrage over that? Where's the outrage over the 27, mostly children, killed in Newtown, Connecticut? Or the 12 people killed in a movie theater in Aurora, Colorado? Or the outrage over the six people who were killed in Tucson, Arizona where our former colleague, Gabby Giffords, was shot? Or the 32 people killed at Virginia Tech?" said McGovern. "Since my Republican friends have been in recess, over 4,000 Americans have been shot and killed by guns in this country. Where's the outrage? The only outrage that my Republican friends seem to have is over the fact that Democrats have had the audacity to raise this question and say maybe we can do something. Maybe we can do something to protect our constituents. I'll say to my colleagues, we don't need a slap on the wrist from the Republican leadership here. We need to reform our laws to ensure that guns are kept out of the wrong hands."

McGovern completed his speech on the floor with a call to action for everyone in the House to "do the people's business" and asked his colleagues to reassess their priorities in Washington saying simply, "We're not doing it today and I hope that my colleagues will reconsider their agenda for the time we're back here and actually do something meaningful."

IRS phone scams often target the elderly

Department Det. Evan Genkos said he has received a handful of phone calls from people worried about the IRS scammers specifically. He said the biggest piece of advice he gives out is to never give out personal information, especially a Social Security number, over the phone.

He explained: "The IRS would already have that and wouldn't need it from you."

If you're able to withhold all personal information, Genkos said it's possible to stay on the line to try and gather information from the scammers. Any information that you are able to gather should be reported to a local police department so they can make the public aware of the scam.

Through this process, local police

departments have been made aware of other popular scams, some of which have already claimed victims in town. According to McGrath, there is a popular scam where someone will receive a call telling them that a relative of theirs was in an accident and is now in jail. To bail them out of jail or get them out of the situation, the person who received the call is told they must send money over immediately.

"These calls, like many others, often target the elderly," said Genkos. "For many older people it's hard for them to say no. That generation is always helping others. That's what they know. When they get a call in the middle of the night to help a grandson, they're caught off guard. It frustrates us that we have all of these resources but between all of the fake numbers and untraceable addresses we always come back with nothing."

Another popular scam that targets

the elderly is the big lottery winning e-mails and phone calls. The victim will be informed that they won a huge sum of money and in order to receive their winnings they have to provide some money to start the process. A few people in the area have already fallen victim to this scam.

"We don't want people to be scammed," said McGrath. "We don't want people to be unlawfully separated from their money. This kind of scam could devastate someone."

A recent scam that residents in the area have fallen for is dogs for sale online. According to McGrath the dogs are usually French Bulldogs. The victim believes they are purchasing a puppy and send money to a fake breeder. The scammer then asks the victim to send more money for a special shipping crate. Of course, the victim never receives the dog.

"A lot of people have called to let us

know it's occurring," said McGrath. "They have given us some information and we want to use that to warn others. There have been a couple who have already sent money. We told them to contact the Federal Trade Commission."

With all of these scams, it can be hard to know what is real and what isn't sometimes. Local police departments are warning citizens to be prepared and aware. And most of all: "Don't give out or verify any information over the phone," said McGrath. "People can get your number out of a phone number and say they're from the bank or anywhere and get your information. Protect your documents. Protect your trash. Shred things. People go dumpster diving and get a wealth of information from your mail."

WORCESTER — The Board of Directors of the CASA Project of Worcester County is very excited to announce the appointment of Robb Zarges, PhD as their new executive director.

CASA is a financially stable, well-respected, non-profit human service corporation committed to abused and neglected children in the care of Worcester County Juvenile Court.

And since 1981, we have provided court advocacy for abused and neglected children by recruiting, training and supervising volunteer Court Appointed Special Advocates/Guardians ad Litem (CASA/

GALs) who are appointed by a judge to serve one child or sibling group at a time.

In 2015, less than half of the above children in the court system in Worcester County received a CASA advocate. There are not enough trained volunteers. The board and staff have committed to double the number of children served by 2020 by ensuring a sufficient core of trained and supervised CASA advocates are available for all children in need of a court-appointed advocate.

Child abuse and neglect exists in many forms throughout all the communities of Worcester County; it is not limited by geography, race or socio-economic conditions. CASA Advocates serve in all five Worcester County court-

houses where these cases are heard: Fitchburg, Leominster, Worcester, Dudley and Milford.

The CASA Project is in the midst of a transformation, growing from an organization powered by a network of dedicated volunteers to a mature, mission-driven and outward-facing organization that will be a partner and leader across Worcester County’s human service sector. Dr. Zarges, as our new Executive Director, joins at a very important time for the organization.

Dr. Zarges started as Executive Director effective Aug. 29, 2016.

to make pretax contributions in 2016 of up to \$12,500 (\$15,500 if age 50 or older). You must either match your employees’ contributions dollar for dollar — up to 3 percent of each employee’s compensation — or make a fixed contribution of 2 percent of compensation for each eligible employee (the 3 percent match can be reduced to 1 percent in any two of five years). Each employee who earned \$5,000 or more in any two prior years, and who is expected to earn at least \$5,000 in the current year, must be allowed to participate in the plan.

SIMPLE IRA plans are easy to set up. You fill out a short form to establish a plan and ensure that SIMPLE IRAs are set up for each employee. A financial institution can do much of the paperwork. Additionally, administrative costs are low.

PROFIT-SHARING PLAN

Typically, only you, not your employees, contribute to a qualified profit-sharing plan. Your contributions are discretionary — there’s usually no set amount you need to contribute each year, and you have the flexibility to contribute nothing at all in a given year if you so choose (although your contributions must be nondiscriminatory, and “substantial and recurring,” for your plan to remain qualified). The plan must contain a formula for determining how your contributions are allocated among

plan participants. A separate account is established for each participant that holds your contributions and any investment gains or losses. Generally, each employee with a year of service is eligible to participate (although you can require two years of service if your contributions are immediately vested). Contributions for any employee in 2016 can’t exceed the lesser of \$53,000 or 100 percent of the employee’s compensation.

401(K) PLAN

The 401(k) plan (technically, a qualified profit-sharing plan with a cash or deferred feature) has become a hugely popular retirement savings vehicle for small businesses. According to the Investment Company Institute, 401(k) plans held \$4.3 trillion of assets as of March 2014, and covered 52 million active participants. (Source: www.ici.org/401k, accessed November 6, 2015.) With a 401(k) plan, employees can make pretax and/or Roth contributions in 2016 of up to \$18,000 of pay (\$24,000 if age 50 or older). These deferrals go into a separate account for each employee and aren’t taxed until distributed. Generally, each employee with a year of service must be allowed to contribute to the plan.

You can also make employer contributions to your 401(k) plan — either matching contributions or discretionary profit-sharing contributions. Combined employer and employee contributions for any employee in 2016 can’t exceed the lesser of \$53,000 (plus

catch-up contributions of up to \$6,000 if your employee is age 50 or older) or 100 percent of the employee’s compensation. In general, each employee with a year of service is eligible to receive employer contributions, but you can require two years of service if your contributions are immediately vested.

401(k) plans are required to perform somewhat complicated testing each year to make sure benefits aren’t disproportionately weighted toward higher paid employees. However, you don’t have to perform discrimination testing if you adopt a “safe harbor” 401(k) plan. With a safe harbor 401(k) plan, you generally have to either match your employees’ contributions (100 percent of employee deferrals up to 3 percent of compensation, and 50 percent of deferrals between 3 and 5 percent of compensation), or make a fixed contribution of 3 percent of compensation for all eligible employees, regardless of whether they contribute to the plan. Your contributions must be fully vested.

Another way to avoid discrimination testing is by adopting a SIMPLE 401(k) plan. These plans are similar to SIMPLE IRAs, but can also allow loans and Roth contributions. Because they’re still qualified plans (and therefore more complicated than SIMPLE IRAs), and allow less deferrals than traditional 401(k)s, SIMPLE 401(k)s haven’t become popular.

DEFINED BENEFIT PLAN

A defined benefit plan is a qualified

retirement plan that guarantees your employees a specified level of benefits at retirement (for example, an annual benefit equal to 30 percent of final average pay). As the name suggests, it’s the retirement benefit that’s defined, not the level of contributions to the plan. In 2016, a defined benefit plan can provide an annual benefit of up to \$210,000 (or 100 percent of pay if less). The services of an actuary are generally needed to determine the annual contributions that you must make to the plan to fund the promised benefit. Your contributions may vary from year to year, depending on the performance of plan investments and other factors.

In general, defined benefit plans are too costly and too complex for most small businesses. However, because they can provide the largest benefit of any retirement plan, and therefore allow the largest deductible employer contribution, defined benefit plans can be attractive to businesses that have a small group of highly compensated owners who are seeking to contribute as much money as possible on a tax-deferred basis.

As an employer, you have an important role to play in helping America’s workers save. Now is the time to look into retirement plan programs for you and your employees.
