# 'Caroline's Cannabis' opens in Uxbridge

**UXBRIDGE** Blackstone Valley's first woman-owned, 'mom and pop' marijuana retailer has recently opened in Uxbridge.

Caroline's Cannabis is located at 640 Douglas St., and is owned by Caroline Frankel. According to its Web site, the business is a "proud supporter of the marijuana movement."

We believe responsible adults should have a choice not only for medicine but also for

recreation. We need to change the negative social views towards cannabis users," the Web site reads. "Please edu-cate before you recreate, and always consume responsibly."

According to Uxbridge Town Manager Angeline Ellison, Frankel had been working diligently with the town for quite some time prior to officially opening.

"For her, it's been a long process and the town has been supportive of her, not only in making sure she does what she needs to do in following all of

the [state Cannabis Control Commission] requirements but also in getting community support," Ellison said.
As far as crowd and traffic

control, Ellison said Uxbridge took a "more proactive approach" after seeing the impact of marijuana dispensaries on Northampton and Leicester, including working to get a plan in place for parking and ensuring visitors are

"It was an overall joint effort not only with Caroline but also with the town to be able to make it a success," she said. "I think it's definitely a positive business opportunity for her and also has a lot of community support as well."

Prior to the store's grand opening on Friday, March 15, Uxbridge Chief of Police Marc Montminy issued a statement regarding a traffic plan to assist potential patrons, as well as persons who would be traveling through the area.

"Douglas Street (Route 16) is a designated state road and you cannot park on the road...The proximity to the on/off ramps

for Route 146 creates a serious hazard for motorists and pedestrians," Montminy said in the statement. "The area involved is heavily congested with truck traffic, construction vehicles and motorists between Route 146 and Route 395."

The store has about 50 parking spots, some of which are reserved for handicapped parking. If that lot is filled, parking is available at a satellite lot, with a shuttle bus transfer for customers to and from the store. Any questions or con-

# Police warn of scams

REGION — With technology rapidly advancing and users becoming more tech savvy, new duplicitous scams seeking financial and personal info occur every day via phone, Internet, and other sources. However, residents can protect themselves; local police departments cautioned of several popular scams they see frequently and how people can better safeguard their personal information.

"I always stress that education is the only way to shut these people down," said Northbridge Fraud/Scam Officer Conrad Chickinski. "These scams are constant and ongoing. One thing that I would like to stress is that these scammers usually create an environment of fear and a sense of immediacy. They do not want the victim to stop and think and start making calls."

The scams that the Northbridge police department faces on a daily and weekly basis seem to follow a rough calendar, said Chickinski, including scams involving the I.R.S. or the Social Security Administration, which typically pick up in intensity during tax season.

"These usually follow the format with a male or female contacting the victim and stating that an audit has revealed that they owe money and that an arrest warrant has been issued for them and they will be arrested if they do not make an immediate payment," Chickinski said.

The victim is then told to purchase pre-paid Visas or MasterCards, Green Dot money cards, iTunes cards, or other gift cards, and is instructed to provide the identification numbers on the back of the cards over the phone.

"Once this is done, the cards are now worthless and the scammer(s) have taken the money," he continued.

In Uxbridge, Chief of Police

# Uxbridge students win online challenge

UXBRIDGE—A student team from Uxbridge High School was recently named the overall winner in an Online Industry Challenge for Project Lead the Way, selected for having the best diabetes management or treatment idea, as demonstrated by the thoroughness of their pitch and the potential impact of the developed idea on diabe-

tes patients. The challenge, organized by Mass STEM Hub, asked students to investigate the case of a fictitious character, Anna Garcia, found deceased in her home. As they explored concepts of biology and medicine, students determined the factors that led to Anna's death and applied those learnings to forward thinking solutions, according to a statement from Mass STEM Hub. After learning about the impact of diabetes and current treatment and management methods, students applied that knowledge to develop a research proposal for an innovative way to improve the life of a diabetic.

"The opportunity for our students to merge our academic programs with industry is at the core of our programs at

Uxbridge High School," said Uxbridge High School Principal Michael Rubin. "We are beyond proud of our students in Ms. Larkin's class, grateful for the support of Mass STEM Hub and our industry partners, and excited for what this means for our program and what the students of UHS are capable of

accomplishing. In the brainstorming process, students were also asked to think about the implications of being a diabetic, from the medical challenges to the impact on their day-to-day life. Using an iterative design process framework, they chose a challenge area to focus on and develop a novel method to treat or manage that challenge.

Through the Online Industry Challenge, students submitted their work to receive feedback from practitioners at one of three Massachusetts medical centers, including MGH Diabetes Research Center, the Joslin Diabetes Center, and Charles River Medical Associates. All students received feedback from industry professionals on their submitted laboratory notes, pitch presentations, and project

# National recognition for Blackstone Valley Tech

UPTON - Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School (BVT) found a perfect partnership with Project Lead the Way (PLTW), a nonprofit organization that provides transformative learning experiences for students and teachers by empowering them to develop in-demand, transportable knowledge and skills through computer science and engineering pathways and recently brought another accolade to our school.

PLTW recently recognized Blackstone Valley Tech as a 2018-2019 Project Lead the Way Distinguished High School for its commitment to increasing student access, engagement, and achievement in their programs. There were only 67 high schools in the country to earn the distinguished school designation. Out of those 67, BVT was one of just 34 schools in the country to earn the award consecutively. In fact, BVT is the only school in New England to earn the designation for the 2018-2019 school

"While the distinction is given to the school, it's truly the students at BVT who have earned this accolade. They are the ones who are engaging with the curriculum, producing incredible projects, and showcasing their talents at various venues throughout the Commonwealth and even the country. Their success with the curriculum and the end-ofcourse assessments from PLTW have translated into incredible achievements in VEX robotics and SkillsUSA competitions," said Vocational Director Dr. Matthew Connors. "This confirms that what they are learning in the classroom

is meaningful, relevant and applicable to the real-world, and that serves as validation for us as a learning organization."

To be eligible for this designation, BVT had to meet the following criteria: offer at least three PLTW courses; of those who participated in PLTW. at least 33 percent took two or more PLTW courses during their high school tenure; and at least 70 percent of students were required to earn a proficient or advanced score on PLTW End-of-Course (EoC) Assessments.

Conner Christensen, a senior from Mendon in the Engineering & Robotics program at BVT speaks highly of PLTW.

He says, "Taking these PLTW courses throughout high school has provided me with some great exposure to the various disciplines of engineering. They helped me discover what I liked and didn't like, which ultimately made my decision of choosing a major a lot easier. These courses also afforded me applicable industry related knowledge as well as taught me invaluable soft skills such as collaboration and problem solving which will be beneficial wherever life takes me.'

BVT currently offers six PLTW courses in Engineering and has implemented the computer science pathway in our Information Technology program. The second of four courses in that pathway will be offered this fall with the other two courses to be rolled out in consecutive school years.

BVT Engineering & Robotics instructor Brian Rhodes loves PLTW.

He explains, "PLTW provides a rigorous platform in which our students learn our Engineering Curriculum. We then utilize the amazing facilities at BVT to implement the hands on aspect of each project based learning activity. Historically, 82.5 percent of our PLTW students earn top scores on the program's End-of-Course Assessments, which allows those students who have passed minimum requirements the unique opportunity to obtain college credit for their PLTW courses. This is a huge head start on their path towards achieving their career goals in Engineering."

Locally, Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI) supports and accepts PLTW courses. Current WPI students who completed a PLTW engineering course in high school and met the endof-course exam requirements are eligible for WPI undergraduate credit, free of charge.

Zoe Mahoney, a senior from Sutton in the Engineering & Robotics program at BVT can already see PLTW courses paying off. Mahoney was one of five applicants to WPI to receive the \$20.000 PLTW scholarship. Her technical educational experience through PLTW has been both enriching and inspiring.

She says, "As the second graduating class in this rigorous program, I have seen hands-on experiences within the classroom setting grow from traditional teaching styles to a collaborative center

of innovation and technology. All of this has led to many opportunities including robotics club, community outreach, and other career-oriented extracurricular activities. The technical skills in shop combined with the challenging concepts have deepened my understanding in academic classes allowing me to further my success. It has also given me invaluable skills such as a creativity, critical thinking, communication, and collaboration - ultimately, allowing me to think outside the box when solving real-world problems to bring forward real-world solutions."

With the continued success of the PLTW curriculum, BVT students develop skills that they will use in school and for the rest of their lives, on any career path they choose to pursue.

# Chamber supports education funding reform

WHITINSVILLE — The Blackstone Valley Chamber of Commerce (BVCC), along with more than 100 other business, community, political and civic leaders from across the Commonwealth, signed a letter delivered to Gov. Baker, Senate President Spilka and House Speaker DeLeo earlier this week calling for a legislative solution on school funding that includes measures that will close achievement, opportunity and skills

The letter comes in advance of a Joint Committee on Education hearing at the state house on Friday where legislators will hear testimony on several bills that have been filed dealing with school

'Having a designated plan for state funding to education is the right solution

to create educational programs geared toward skilled training curriculums in our public schools. Development of curriculums to emphasize employability skills such as problem solving, teamwork, and communications enhance the employability of students once they enter the labor market. Reform that does not include a focus on building these skills is unlikely to achieve goals related to closing opportunity and achievement gaps," stated Jeannie Hebert, President and CEO of the BVCC

"Simply putting more money into a system that is failing far too many young people would be reckless," said Edward Lambert, Jr., Executive Director of the Massachusetts Business Alliance for Education, one of the lead organizations behind the letter and a partner of [organization name]. "Crossing our fingers and hoping to get better results is not a strategy. We're hearing from folks all across the state who want to ensure that new funding closes achievement and skills gaps and who agree money alone won't accomplish those goals.'

The letter calls for new funding to be used effectively and efficiently stating that "Experience, research, and practice-based evidence (including evidence from bright spots of success in our state) have shown that just putting more money into the system - even when expressly for the purpose of addressing achievement gaps - does not get us improved outcomes."

# Webster man teaches NRA gun safety course

WEBSTER — Firearm ownership continues to grow exponentially year over year within the United States, and more specifically Massachusetts. Americans enjoy the rights and freedoms that citizens of many other countries do not, the ability to keep and bear arms, which the second amendment of the constitution has empowered us since 1791.

Gun ownership originated to protect individuals from tyrannical government. They have evolved into tools in the 21st century to serve many purposes. Gun ownership varies from reasons today such as hunting, target shooting, competition and personal defense within and outside the home.

Americans enjoy this powerful right that citizens of many other countries cannot experience. With this right comes the strong responsibility of having the safe skills and attitude towards handling firearms. Matt Lanava, certified NRA instructor, teaches the home firearm safety course in Webster, and travels to other locations to instruct the high level, four-hour course which individuals enroll in for a multitude of reasons. One of the main reasons includes but is not limited to persons looking to obtain a License to Carry (LTC) firearms within Massachusetts.

With the large amount of firearms in existence, Matt has a goal to educate and reduce the fear of firearms to ensure the safety of the population as a whole. Education and the proper attitude regarding firearm safety will cause the most impactful reduction in firearm related events. The NRA home firearm safety course instructs students that a gun by itself is neither safe nor unsafe. Any of the unfortunate events happen from one of two reasons, negligence or ignorance.

If the basic fundamental rules of safe firearm handling are followed, unfortunate events related to firearms will not occur.

The NRA home firearm safety course which teaches the fundamentals of firearm safety as a foundation course that should not be the end all be all of firearms.

Matt also helps students with firearm consultation when students are ready to make a firearm purchase and he also schedules range time for students to try out certain firearms and the ability to practice safe shooting principles.

The course also covers what many find to be confusing laws within the state of Massachusetts and help filling out the application form. Many believe that obtaining firearms is an easy process

without much regulation. This is convoluted fact as in Massachusetts, individuals purchasing firearms from a dealer must submit a federal background check and report the sale to the state to be documented in the records bureau.

In addition to these laws and fundamentals, the course also covers proper storage of firearms, cleaning and maintenance of firearms, different ammunition and most importantly, the safe loading and unloading of firearms.

Gun laws and regulations can often be misguided emotion towards a passionate nerve that strikes individuals. All media platforms as well as political agendas are also often manipulated. When focusing on the safety of firearms, the main objective remains the

same across all individuals. No one wants to have unfortunate firearm events. In the case of everyone wanting the population to be safer, firearm safety and education should be a high priority for all individuals.

Received my most recent newsletter fro the NEOWA. As a member for many years, my membership to the New England Outdoor Writers organization has provided me with a wealth of information. The most recent news letter contained an article by Stephen Carpenteri, of Lyman Maine. He too is worried about the loss of habitat to ruffed grouse. Grouse pop-



ulations in our neck of the woods have plummeted to a verge of extinction, mostly due to development. The state of Connecticut is talking about listing the grouse as an endangered species. Mass. needs to take some kind of action to bring back grouse populations in Mass.!

It sure opened up my eyes to the outrageous spending by some states of the Pittman Robinson money's that are being used for everything but what it was intended. They are monies from taxes that are paid by sportsmen through a tax on numerous hunting and fishing equipment etc. every year, that are earmarked to help states improve habitat on WMAs and other state properties that benefit wildlife. In his research he found out that the monies in some states are being used for trash pickup, salaries and cemetery maintenance, to mention a few , and are also used to gate off state properties' that are supposed to be open to sportsmen for hunting & fishing.

"P-R monies on average, have only 1 percent being used for the intended purpose, which includes mowing of thousands of acres of grasslands, even though not one of our preferred game species lives in or feeds exclusively on grass,» the article stated. He also stated that some state wildlife biologist told him that nothing had been done to improve wildlife habitat in their states in decades except "annual mowing" during their 30 year careers. Sportsmen should be outraged at this terrible waste of there monies.

# Planning Ahead for Flower Planting

Spring here, and nothing jump starts "garden fever" like planning a bed of Whether you have visions of an elaborate formal flower garden or favor the simplicity of a side door cottage bed, plotting a flowering garden is a labor of love. Prepping

for plants allows for an infusion of personality, fosters visual creativity, and paves the way for a spectacular season of blooms! Read on for some easy tips and tricks to help you along.

**Blooming Bulbs** 

Nothing adds color and beauty to a garden for less effort than bulbs. Even if you didn't have the foresight to plant spring bulbs last fall, you can still enjoy summer blooms. Ideally, you should wait until the danger of spring frosts has passed before planting bulbs. If you think the threat of frost is over, think again. Garden experts give May 30 as the first safe planting date of the season.

Some summer flowering bulbs that have a history of success include Dahlias, Gladiolus, Cannas, Caladiums, and Daylilies. Just keep in mind in our zone you may have to dig up the bulbs and store for the winter for springtime planting next year.

To test whether soil is ready to work, squeeze some in your hand, then poke at the clump. If the clump breaks up easily into small crumbs, the soil is dry enough to till.

Getting a head start on bulb planting by starting them indoors increases your odds of success. Use deep pots and replant them outside once the ground has thawed.

Planning where you want to create 'splashes" of color in the garden also includes how dramatic a statement you want your plot to make. Plentiful clumps of flowers demand attention and this method of planting has long been a favorite of gardeners.

Another popular planting pattern is to "drift" flower varieties, which has been compared to painting the garden with a brush of color. Drifts can encompass waves of complementing bulb varieties bordering each other, or each flower drift can stand on its own, perhaps creeping across an incline or making its way along a stone wall. To ensure successful drifts, use a generous sprinkling of densely planted bulbs. Or, simply toss or scatter bulbs and plant them where they land for a natural meadow effect.

Perhaps the best rule of thumb for planting bulbs is the most obvious. Plant bulbs where you want to see color. Attractive uses include planting bulbs to border a perennial garden, to fill in a rock garden and as a decorative accent circling a mailbox post or light

Garden experts recommend planting bulbs in crumbly soil with proper drain-

age, although hardy bulbs often thrive in less than satisfactory soil. Soil that has not been turned over in a while will benefit from loosening it up with a shovel. Your hole should be dug a few inches below where the bulb should sit to allow

for fertilizer. Bulbs should be planted pointed side up. Flat tubers should be planted sideways for best results. Avoid any air pockets in hole which can inhibit growth.

Here are more tips and shortcuts are geared toward cutting time and effort in the garden.

\*Plants that grow best in alkaline soil such as geraniums and hydrangea will thank you with better blooms if you water them with a mild mixture of baking soda and water occasionally.

\*The first thing to check if your azalea leaves are looking yellow is the soil pH. Azaleas need a soil on the acid side. Alkalinity locks up iron needed for green color.

\*Adding Epsom Salt to plants has been reported to enhance the color of blossoms and leaves, promote new flowers and fruit, improve the root system and improve the strength of stems. For roses: Sprinkle one teaspoon of Epsom Salts per foot of plant height and spread evenly around the base for better blossoms and deeper greening. Add 1/2 cup sprinkled around the base and then scratched in, for strong production of new flowering canes and healthy new basal cane growth.

\*Did you know most fragrant flowers are lightly colored or white? If you want to add a scent to your garden, be generous with white or pastel blooms.

# Antiques news update

It's been over a month since my last antique news update. Some great finds have turned up since then. A painting that was stolen in 1991 was recently found at a Sarasota, Fla. estate sale, according to WFLA television. The painting, titled "Palette," had been taken from the Van Wezel Performing Arts Hall during a Eric WAYNE TUISKULA performance. Bowyer was attending

the Sarasota estate sale when he found a Jon Corbino painting priced at \$25. Boyer is a treasure hunter, who said that he has found many valuable pieces of art at yard sales. However, when researching the artwork, he learned it was stolen. "Immediately I said, 'We have to give this back to them," Bowyer told WFLA. Vern Weitz, the President of the Fine Arts Society of Sarasota, was thrilled to see the painting returned. The mystery of why it was taken may be never solved. According to Weitz, "we'll probably never know, the family received the painting from a man who died years ago, but now it doesn't matter." The painting has an estimated value of \$10,000. Bowyer refused to accept a reward for returning it. The Van Well Performing Arts Hall plans to increase security to avoid future theft.

"I almost didn't have a chance to acquire it, because I was having

It was gifted to him by his father Michael Aronstein, "a pioneering figure in baseball card and memorabilia." The artwork was taken down and stored when his parents moved in 2015. Aronstein said, "I've been so wrapped up in vintage baseball photography lately that it never occurred to me this piece might have serious value." Aronstein recently attended a Philadelphia sports card and memorabilia show where he saw comic books being offered that made him think about his piece again. He decided to dig it out of storage and sell it. Auction company records show that the nearly forgotten comic book art sold for \$87,000. That's enough to make any comic book collector

Marc Montminy added that no reputable business will ask for payment via any type of gift card.

"Never provide financial or personal information over the phone," he said. "If you need to wire the money or use an unconventional payment method-no legitimate company does that."

Another scam which continues throughout the year but increases around spring break is a "grandparent" scam involving a grandchild in distress. The scam usually begins with a grandparent being contacted by someone purporting to be the grandchild, a lawyer, a doctor, or a police officer, said Chickinski.

"The grandchild then states they have gotten into trouble and needs money for bail, a lawyer, or some other crisis. When the contact is made by another person, they usually state that the grandchild has been in an accident and needs a medical helicopter or money for bail," he said.

The scammers have become much more creative and will sometimes have a lot of information about the "grandchildren," presumably from visiting social media and other websites to compile a portfolio of information before initiating contact, Chickinski added.

Montminy said he has done PowerPoint presentations at the local senior center as senior citizens are targeted more often with these scams.

Other scams following similar protocol include people being told that National Grid will turn their power off unless payment is made with gift cards, and people who are selling items either online or in local ads being contacted by a buyer who readily agrees to purchase the items listed and states that they will send a cashier's check.

"When this check arrives, it is usually triple or quadruple for the asking price of the item being sold," Chickinski cautioned.

When the seller contacts the buyer, they are told a mistake was made and to keep the amount for the purchase and-maybe a little extra-and return the rest using Western Union or Money

"The seller then deposits the cashier's check, takes the remainder, and returns it. Several days later the seller is contacted by their bank and told the check is fraudulent and worthless. They are now out that money," Chickinski said.

However, residents can protect themselves and their information by using caution. Chickinski recommended that people do not provide personal information, as scammers frequently want social security numbers and other per-

"Also I always stress that if it looks too good to be true, it probably is," he said. "I always advise people to talk to a family member, friend, or if they have questions, to call the police depart-

Montminy echoed his sentiments, adding that recently in town, a scam occurred where an occupied residence was put in an ad online as available for rent, asking for the first month's rent and a security deposit.

"Whoever the scammer is who listed the house for rent doesn't actually own it and doesn't live there," he said. "What they're trying to do is get somebody to send over a check...and that would be the last we hear from them."

"If it absolutely, positively has to happen right now—it's a scam," Montminy





Dr. Louis Grace passed away at his home on March 17, 2019 in Englewood, FL. He is survived by his beloved wife,

Dr. Grace was born February 8, 1928 and resided in North Brookfield from 1928 to 2015. He was an accomplished violinist and an Eagle Scout. He graduated from North Brookfield High School in 1945 and served in the U.S. Army in Japan in 1947-1948.

Dr. Grace received his B.A. from Cornell University in 1950 and his M.D. from Tufts Medical School in 1954. He was named Quaboag Chamber of Commerce Man of the Year in 1983 and was active in the Laurelwood Riding Club during the 1970s. Dr. Grace has been a member of the American Medical Association, Massachusetts Medical Association and Worcester District Medical Society since 1955, and a member of the American Academy of Family Physicians since 1957. He was named a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice in 1979 and was a member of the New England OB-Gyn Society and the Brookfield Medical Club for several years.

ects through this program," explains Tom Lemon. "There are now more career pathways within the broad construction industry and Trades women are establishing careers on MassDOT highway construction projects."

"As a female in Construction Technologies, I have learned a variety of very helpful skills and have explored many career paths in the industry ranging from labor work to management and design," explains Annabelle O'Reilly of

Hopedale. "With my classmates and instructors at Valley Tech supporting me and helping me grow as a craftswoman, I feel capable of so much, and I am grateful to have this hands-on learning experience. I was not given less opportunity or less labor work due to my gender; Mr. Lemon saw I was a carpentry student interested in gaining as much information and skill as possible. This allowed me to get a better sense of my interests in Construction. This equality is a core component of BVT, where nontraditional students are not out of the ordinary. I am grateful to see that the treatment on the basis of gender is not present in

my school, nor in the industry. With more women being involved in nontraditional vocations, the unequal treatment among the sexes is disappearing."

During this pre-apprenticeship training program our students learned industry specific skills through various training modules such as work zone safety, how to line and grade paved surfaces, CPR/first aid and AED certification, and construction math which were part of this unique weeklong experiences. Also, important life skills such as showing up on time and prepared to work when on a jobsite. These are all desirable skills to prospective employers in the area of construction and the highway industry.

"Having the chance to learn first-hand from some of the leading construction laborers in the Commonwealth is a great opportunity," said Justin Braza of Milford. "I was able to gain real work experience which I enjoyed, apprenticeship hours, and CPR renewal & recertification all while still here in high school, which will help me in the long-run."

The program concluded last week with Hands on Concrete, a module, where our students under the direction of Tom Lemon constructed a form for a single concrete panel using one standard two by four by eight inch piece of lumber, nails and a hammer.

Nathan Curran of Millbury said, "It was a great time learning concrete work. I had an amazing experience and learned lots of new things."

He and several of his classmates said that having this opportunity to see and experience the work done by the laborers in person gave them valuable insight about the possibility of pursuing this industry as a career path themselves.
