DPW sparks heated debate in Dudley

DUDLEY – Over the past four months, Dudley’s Board of Selectmen has worked towards proposing a combined Department of Public Works to replace the separate highway and water and sewer departments, both of which are currently without superintendents. The proposal faced its biggest challenge to date during the

annual town meeting on May 20, where it proved to be one of the most contentious items on the agenda. The Board of Selectmen supported the article which would call for the hiring of a single director to oversee the highway and water and sewer departments, rather than hiring two new superintendents to lead those departments as separate entities. Selectman Kerry

Cyganiewicz argued that the move would provide cost savings to the town by paying one person less to do both jobs. “The way it is now, if we have a separate highway director and a separate water and sewer director, they’re each going to make about \$80,000 in salary. They’re each going to make about \$20,000 in benefits,” Cyganiewicz said. “That’s a total of \$200,000. If we just hire

a DPW chief instead of those two people, one person as a centralized leader, that person is going to make about \$100,000 from the research we’ve done. Their benefits are going to be the same, about \$20,000. So, it will be a total of \$120,000. What that means is we’re saving \$80,000.” Despite further arguing that the consolidation into a Department of Public Works would

allow for more efficiency and for interdepartmental sharing of staff and equipment Cyganiewicz and the other selectmen were met by opposition who argued that selectmen were misinformed, and the cost saving data was wrong. Citizen Mike Spahl doubted Cyganiewicz’s figures and said he feels the public is being fed wrong information. “I don’t think you’ve

been properly informed,” Spahl told Cyganiewicz. “I think you’re lying to the people – I cannot see us ever getting a DPW Director that has the qualifications to run the water department and the DPW department and sewer department for \$100,000.” Scott Zajkowski, a member of the Water and Sewer Commission, argued that a DPW. *Please Read DPW, page A10*

Dudley places zoning restrictions on solar farms

DUDLEY – Following a citizen petition seeking to limit zoning for solar farms in town, Dudley is now doing away with the previously utilized solar overlay district thus limiting such apparatus to industrial zoned land only. The push was led by petitioner Mary Sansoucy, and it was the final item during a lengthy annual town meeting on May 20, sparking more than a half hour of debate between supporters and town officials. Sansoucy said she started the petition not with the inten-

tion of ending solar farming in Dudley but instead agreed with many other citizens that such industries don’t belong in residential areas where they have been allowed on certain occasions. “In no way am I against solar energy. I believe it has a place in our town. I also believe large solar areas do not belong in residential areas,” Sansoucy said. “It is a manufacturing process. According to Webster’s Dictionary, to manufacture is to make or process a raw material into a finished product — sunlight to electricity in this case. Manufacturing has no place in a residential area.

The bylaw as it is currently written, allowing overlay districts in residential districts dissolves the meaning of a residential zone district. People who live in a residential district in Dudley, or people who would like to move to Dudley, should have the assurance that a large-scale photovoltaic area does not become their new neighbor.” Sansoucy also brought up documents from the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources supporting her case and accused the town of “spot zoning” which means to place a plot of land in a different zone from that of

neighboring property, in this case an industrial solar farm in a residentially zoned area. Her petition is only the latest chapter in a lengthy movement against further allowing large solar operations near residential properties. The solar farm at the base of the hill near Shepherd Hill Regional High School has drawn the ire of citizens for several years being called and eyesore. Supporters of the article argued that limiting solar farms to industrial areas would preserve land best used for farming while others simply felt it would preserve the character of the town. Some also showed concern that LLCs

and other entities erecting the solar farms could up and leave any time without cleaning up the mess they left behind. Citizen Richard Raymond said he supported the petition because it’s clear that citizens are disappointed with the way solar array installations have been handled, and that the growing public outcry is a sign that change needed to happen. “Each time somebody makes a proposal on the overlay, it has to be voted on by the town. This issue was brought up last town meeting for a possible residential project on *Please Read SOLAR FARMS, page A10*

Mary E. Bixby award helps local girl excel

WEBSTER — On May 15, the Board of Directors of the Hubbard Health System hosted the annual Corporators meeting at the Point Breeze Restaurant. A record crowd was in attendance as new corporators were installed and the present board of directors re-elected. It was at this meeting that the second annual Mary E. Bixby award for crippled children from the Webster-Dudley-Oxford area was made. A five-year-old resident of Webster and a student at the Park Avenue School with cerebral palsy received this year’s grant.

This child receives physiotherapy, occupational and speech therapy. She also needs to be tube fed to meet her nutritional needs. The school nurse, as well as the therapists, researched the equipment that would enable this child to function at a more normal level. A JENX Multistander was purchased for her — simple to use, comprehensive support system providing upright support to allow for her to interact at eye level with her teachers and classmates. This equipment will serve her needs until she is in her teens, as it is adjust-

able. Until now, she has been confined to a wheelchair with head and chest support. She needs help with all her daily needs, and this Multistander will facilitate her care. Her therapists and her one-to-one attendants work to strengthen her muscles, and her speech therapist works to expand her breathing capability and develop her speaking. It has been just a few short weeks since this equipment arrived and was put into use, and already, a noticeable improvement has been seen in her.

Working at eye level with her peers and therapists, she has made progress that would otherwise not have been possible in such a short time frame. At the end of the presentation to the corporators and audiences, all those who work with this child were introduced to the audience and received their yellow rose of gratitude for the passionate care they have provided to this beautiful little girl. Dudley voters approve \$21.1 million budget

DUDLEY – The new 2020 budget for the town of Dudley was approved at the annual town meeting on Monday, May 20, securing a \$21.1 million spending plan for the upcoming year.

The budget totals \$21,131,531, and was touted as a balanced budget by Town Administrator Greg Balukonis in his final town meeting with Dudley before retiring later this month. Balukonis spoke about the details of the plan prior to the vote delving into the finer points of the proposal to ensure voters had all the information they needed to make an informed decision.

“We have a balanced budget. There’s

no need for an override. There are no debt exclusions included in the budget. The total amount of new revenue that we estimate that the town has available to it is approximately \$440,000. The number has not changed remarkably over the course of the years, but it is the amount of money that we need to run the entire operation of the town,” Balukonis said.

The Town Administrator provided insight into some of the most noteworthy increases charged against that \$440,000. The largest impact comes from the assessment from Bay Path Regional Vocational Technical High School which has accepted 21 new students from Dudley. That brings a cost of \$118,832 to the town. Retirement costs

are up \$76,675 while group insurance increases \$57,397. These make up the bulk of the cost levied against the revenue.

“If we total those three line items up, they come to almost \$253,000. When you subtract that from the \$440,000, that’s the amount that we have to run the town’s operation in its entirety, about \$187,000,” Balukonis said. “I think we run a pretty lean operation, and we also have our obligations for the schools.”

The Town Administrator provided some good news to taxpayers in terms of debt, reiterating his comments from Board of Selectmen meetings that long-standing debt for the school has been removed from the town’s expenses.

“There was some debt service that was retired for the Dudley Charlton Regional School District. It was done as a debt exclusion a number of years ago. So that money comes off the books. It’s not replaced by town budget. The town doesn’t just all of a sudden decide that a half a million dollars comes off the books and we’ll replace it with a half a million dollars in spending,” Balukonis said. “The budget increase is very modest when you take out those numbers and you look at what we have for total municipal expenses and operations.”

The 2020 budget proposal passed easily with a unanimous vote of approval from those in attendance.

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
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Masons perform U.S. flag retirement ceremony

This simple ceremony is appropriate for use with Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Freemasons, and other organizations who desire to formally discontinue the use of worn US Flags. It is a dignified ceremony and participants and guests are asked to remain quiet and respectful during the entire event. It is a brief formal ceremony which was conducted as follows:

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



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Historical societies address membership questions

OXFORD — The Town of Oxford is fortunate to have three historical organizations which, together, celebrate Oxford's long history. The Oxford Historical Commission, The Huguenot Memorial Society of Oxford, Inc. and the newly re-organized Oxford Historical Society are groups whose purpose is to celebrate and preserve the history of this town. While the purpose of each group is similar, there are also some differences. The purpose of this article is to address any confusion about membership in these three groups.

Membership in the Oxford Historical Commission is through appointment of the Town Manager, while memberships in the other two non-profits are open to everyone through a membership fee. Even though each of these three organizations maintains a distinct agenda, they usually join together for a variety of projects which provides an advantage for historical issues in Oxford.

Membership in the Oxford Historical Commission was increased to seven by Town Meeting in 1975. Each appointment is for a limited period of

time, and members are named in the Annual Report. The agenda for each Commission meeting must be posted in Memorial Hall at least forty-eight hours before the meeting as the public is always welcome to attend meetings. A clerk is present at each meeting to record the minutes which are then submitted to the members at the following meeting for approval. They are then filed with the Town Clerk's office at Memorial Hall. The Commission accepts donations of historical items and maintains the town historical archives, responds to inquiries and regularly addresses a number of additional historical responsibilities. The Commission in Oxford has maintained a strong and active presence since it was formed by Town Meeting vote in 1973. Any town resident who is interested in becoming a member is invited to complete the form at the back of an Annual Report and submit it, or speak to a Commission member, or just attend a meeting. After individuals attend meetings on a regular basis, they can be informally named associate members.

The Huguenot Memorial Society of Oxford, Inc was formed in 1881 by a concerned group of Huguenot descendants and many other individuals from throughout New England who were determined to keep the memory alive of the courageous band of about thirty Huguenot families from France who established the "Settlement of New Oxford" in 1686. Membership in this non-profit 501c3 organization is open to residents and non residents as well of those of Huguenot descent and those who are not of Huguenot descent. The focus of this Society is to promote the memory of the Huguenot settlers, and along with the Commission maintain Oxford's most historic site which is the remains of the Huguenot Fort at the top of fort Hill Road. New members are always welcome.

According to records, an Oxford Historical Society was active in the mid 1940's and continued to be active sporadically for various periods of time since then. In 1994, an Oxford Historical Society was re-established with much enthusiasm to raise funds to move the 1872 District 8 North Gore

School House from Merriam District to Joslin Park on Main Street in Oxford. Funds for this non-profit 501c3 were also raised to restore and repair the structure so that it could be open to the public. This undertaking was generously supported by individuals and businesses who worked tirelessly to accomplish the relocation. Hundreds of people contributed financially to cover the costs incurred. Today, the presence of this one room school house tells the story of the educational system in Oxford of almost 150 years ago.

This one room school from Merriam District first opened its doors to students in 1872 and continued to educate countless students until it closed about thirty years later when it was replaced by a two room school built in Cominsville to meet the needs of more students living in the area. Years later, a frugal farmer on Pleasant Street saw a potential use for the unused school with trees quickly growing up around it and moved it across Pleasant Street to be used as a storage building on his farm. After many years, his farm was purchased as the site of a future

golf course. At that time, the former school became the pro shop. But, when the popular golf course needed to expand its parking lot, the owner recognized the historic value of the building and donated it to the Historical Commission/Town of Oxford. A group of dedicated individuals raised the money required to move it back across Pleasant Street onto town property where it sat on cribbing for several years. On July 15, 1996, the school traveled about 5.5 miles south from next to Gore Cemetery to Joslin Park. Today, this little school is the focus of the Oxford Historical Society and the Historical Commission.

Membership in the Oxford Historical Society is open to residents and non-residents with an interest in Oxford. The next Historical Society meeting will be Saturday, June 15 at 1 p.m. in the 1872 District 8 North Gore School House on Joslin Park on Main Street. Come, participate or just listen, ask questions and imagine being a student in this school long ago at its first location in Merriam District, North Oxford.

Shepherd Hill earns Innovative Pathways designation

DUDLEY – Shepherd Hill Regional High School was among eleven high schools that received official designation status for new Innovation Pathway programs in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in April of 2019. These programs are designed to allow opportunities for students to explore particular career pathways through high school by providing college-level courses and work-based experience.

Gov. Charlie Baker's office released information on the designated schools in early April including schools in Barre, Danvers, Everett, Great Barrington, Lowell, Mashpee, Norwood, Roxbury, Uxbridge and West Springfield. Shepherd Hill Regional High School was also part of the list representing the towns of Dudley and Charlton. Each school earned the designation by meet-

ing five "principles" including providing equitable access for all students, providing guided academic pathway programs focused on an assortment of industry sectors, enhancing student supports, providing relevant connections to careers and creating partnerships with local employers or workforce development boards.

The Innovative Pathways program was first launched in 2018 with the goal of providing students with career options in an assortment of industries in the fields of STEM. The schools that received designation focused their attention on providing college-level education and hands on learning opportunities to prepare high schoolers for the workplace ahead of college.

Gov. Baker released a statement commenting on the effective launch of the program and its early success within the 11 schools.

"We are pleased to continue offer-

ing these opportunities so more Massachusetts students can enroll in an Innovation Pathway program and gain vital experience in growing industries that will set them up for future success," Gov. Baker said.

Lt. Gov. Karyn Polito provided her own statements complimenting the effectiveness of the program in preparing students for future careers.

"Innovation Pathways expose students to STEM-related fields like healthcare, manufacturing, and life sciences that will prepare them to meet the needs of Commonwealth employers seeking skilled labor to fill open positions," she said.

Finally Education Secretary James Peyser released a statement calling the program the next step in preparing Massachusetts students to become productive members of the work force.

"Students enrolled in Innovation Pathways take a coherent course of

study and receive real-world work experiences relevant to a broad industry sector. This provides them with valuable insight into what is required for certain fields, so by the time they get to college or further certification, they are well-prepared," Peyser said.

At Shepherd Hill Regional High School pathways programs have been launched in healthcare and social assistance as well as manufacturing. When fully enrolled, 172 students will benefit from the courses. These programs have resulted in partnerships with the MassHire Central Region Workforce Board and Gentex Optics, a local business. Students will also be participating in Project Lead the Way curriculum and capstone courses among other educational opportunities with a higher education partnership being offered for students to earn credit through Quinsigamund Community College.

Look for products that allow you to easily move your hose where it's needed. Expandable hoses allow you to easily move your hose from faucet to faucet for watering around the yard or pack it in your RV when traveling.

How long can I leave that unregistered car in the driveway?

The subject of unregistered motor vehicles on private property was brought up. The person purchased a new vehicle and they were in the process of selling their old one. They wondered if there were any restrictions on keeping an unregistered car on their property as they do this.

Many people have unregistered vehicles on their property for one reason or another. I was asked to provide some information on the Town By-law. Article 21 is the section of the Dudley By-laws which pertains to storage of unregistered motor vehicles. Unless a person is the holder of a license, such as a car dealer license, or unless given a special permit by the Selectmen, they cannot allow more than one unregistered motor vehicle to remain on a lot in the Town. The vehicle can be assembled or disassembled for the purposes of this law. The term "lot" is defined as "a parcel of land held in identical ownership throughout including all contiguous land held in the same ownership." In addition, the private sale of a single motor vehicle from your own property is allowed.

Should someone request a special permit for more than one unregistered vehicle, a public hearing will be held, and the Selectmen "may" issue one if certain criteria are met. Such items of consideration include whether the vehicles constitute a nuisance and if they do "not adversely affect the neighborhood."
 This By-law does not apply to vehicles stored within an enclosed building or if they are designed for farming or other agricultural purposes. Penalties for a violation are twenty dollars per day for each violation. This law is designed to avoid hazardous situations and the compiling of vehicles. Should a situation arise where you may have more than unregistered vehicle present, you may have some options. Many charities or scrap dealers will take old vehicles off your property at no cost. You may also receive a tax credit or cash in some cases. Feel free to contact our office should you require assistance with this problem.

Do you have a business succession strategy?

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
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Herbs in the Garden

As you plan this year's garden, remember that few outdoor plantings are as charming as the common herb garden. With a renewed interest in growing herbs, more and more people are enjoying the benefits of the healing plants, whether plucked straight from the ground or from a windowsill pot. Offering a visual delight, plus the promise of medicinal magic, rediscovering the humble herb is a simple summer pleasure. Read on for a review of the practical plants.

Chamomile: Chamomile is a versatile herb that can be brewed into a tea to soothe such maladies as an upset stomach, indigestion, anxiety and sleeplessness. The fragrant herb has even been touted as a nightmare deterrent! The hardy, low-growing plant is easy to cultivate in a backyard garden. Chamomile has been dubbed the "herb of humility" because it seemed to thrive when walked on, and in England has actually been planted as a fragrant lawn.

Fun fact: In the old days chamomile was called the "Plant's Physician." If a plant was sickly, the cure was often to scatter a few chamomile sprigs in the garden bed.

Peppermint: Peppermint, the source of menthol, has long been utilized by generations of practical households. It's claim to fame is that peppermint relieves a tummy ache, alleviates the chills, and lessens symptoms of fever and the flu. A few strong cups of peppermint tea has even been credited with curing a headache. The Romans crowned themselves with Peppermint branches and ancient Greeks believed peppermint could clear the voice and cure hiccups. In ancient times peppermint was considered the symbol of hospitality.

Peppermint Poultice: Make a paste of crushed peppermint leaves and almond oil. Rub onto skin to alleviate muscle aches or migraine.

Catnip: While herbalists recommend catnip tea for upset stomach, nervous

headache and promoting perspiration to cool a fever, it's often fun to grow catnip purely for your pet's pleasure. Folklore dictates catnip grown near or around your home attracts good luck. While catnip is best known for the euphoric response it induces in cats, not all cats are effected by it and some don't react to catnip until they are older than three months.

Catnip Tea: Add one teaspoon of loose dried catnip to one cup of boiling water. Make sure the mixture is steeped only and not allowed to boil. Strain and serve. Try it with lemon or sweetened with honey.

Lemon Balm: Lemon Balm infuses the garden air with a citrusy fragrance. Medicinally, lemon balm has been placed directly onto insect bites or sores, made into teas for bronchial problems, colds, or drank simply to relieve tension. Today, the essential oil of Lemon Balm is commonly used in aromatherapy to treat depression. Rich in legend, it's been claimed soaking the leaves of the balm in wine for a few hours will influence love!

Lemon Balm Vinaigrette: Combine three tablespoons light olive oil, one teaspoon finely crumbled lemon balm, 1/8 teaspoon salt, 1/16 teaspoon pepper and two tablespoons rice wine vinegar. Use as a salad or vegetable dressing.

Rosemary: Rosemary folklore boasts a long history. It is said rosemary was the original incense and burning a twig of the cleansing herb would rid the area of all negativity. Rosemary was burned in shrines in Ancient Greece to drive away evil spirits and illnesses. Greeks students of that time also wore garlands of rosemary in their hair to improve their memory. In addition, it was long claimed a necklace made from rosemary preserves ones youth. Rosemary is now a common herb to use in drawer sachets and hair rinses.

Rosemary-Lemon Meat Rub: Mix together 1 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon peel; one teaspoon dried crushed rosemary leaves; two minced garlic cloves; and one quarter teaspoon each salt, ground pepper and dried thyme leaves. Rub on tender cuts of meat to add flavor before cooking or grilling.

Lavender: Dating back several thousand years, lavender has served as a valuable herbal staple in both the kitchen and the sickroom. Romans are credited for the spread of lavender throughout Europe, taking it with them everywhere they went in order to have local supplies of lavender oil which they used extensively in bath water and soap as well as in many other ways. Most lavenders are originally natives of the Mediterranean countries. Today, lavender is used in rubbing oils to soothe sore joints, and an infusion of lavender has long been used as a cold compress to treat severe headaches. The lovely scent of lavender makes it a popular herb in sachets, perfumes and many aromatherapy and craft projects.

Fun fact: In the middle ages, sprinkling lavender water on a person's head was thought to keep them chaste!

Thyme: Thyme is a magical herb, as popular for its flavor as for its healing properties. Historically, thyme was employed as a medicinal weapon to combat European plagues, and as recently as WWI, thyme essential oil was used as an antiseptic. And a hot cup of tea infused with thyme has even been touted as an effective hangover cure!

Sleepy Thyme: Thyme has also been used to treat nightmares. It has been said a few sprigs of the herb placed beneath a pillow can ensure a good night's sleep.

Sage: Sage traces its history back to the ancients who touted the herb for a cure-all for such maladies as epilepsy

and warts. For generations, sage has been used for coughs, fevers and as a health tonic. Native Americans used sage in salves to treat various skin conditions and they frequently used sturdy springs of sage as a toothbrush. Today, sage's antiseptic and astringent properties make it a popular herb for treating skin sores and irritations. Sage is also said to help in the healing of bruises and proper blood circulation.

Sage Honey: Add two teaspoons of fresh sage to one quart of honey. Warm over low heat. Place in a covered canning jar and store for at least two weeks to infuse flavor.

NOTE: Use herbs at your own risk and only under proper direction. Herbs should not be used under some circumstances, so consult a professional before consuming or applying herbs.

wouldn't be a "good fit" for Dudley, and that he felt it would cost rate payers more money and would actually harm the operations and efficiency of the water and sewer department by forcing them to compete for attention.

"As of now, the water and sewer board is elected by taxpayers to do one thing — to oversee your water distribution system and sewer collection systems, that is it. To keep clear water moving to your home and dirty water coming out of your home, and to keep them separated. That's all. That's our priority. As commissioners, we are not concerned about roads, we are not concerned about buildings or parks or cemeteries. We are concerned about water and sewer. If you vote to pass this measure, the priorities of the water distribution system and the sewer collection system will now be forced to compete with those of the other aforementioned departments," Zajkowski

Ramshorn Road. It was defeated. The town didn't want it then. I've been hearing that (town officials) see this as a source of revenue. I don't see it to the point that it's relevant to destroy residential zoned property. If you want to rezone the property in its entirety rather than spot zoning within the overlay, that's one thing, but that's not what you're doing," Raymond said.

Another supporter was John Briare, the head of Charlton's Economic Development Committee, who spoke as both an official and a citizen. As an EDC member, he noted that solar farms placed last on a recent survey of townfolk when it came for priorities for growth. As a citizen, he felt that Dudley's use of an overlay district was not in the best interest of what taxpayers are looking for.

"I think right now, this is the best thing that we can do, and it's because when the solar overlay district was proposed we cut and pasted from the state and other areas their boiler plate language and the problem with that language is there's too many vulnerabilities for the town," Briare said. "We don't have safeguards in place to protect us so that we're not cleaning up these places when these companies are no longer in business."

The Board of Selectmen disagreed with the petition opening, asking citizens present not to vote in favor of the article. Selectman Steve Sullivan was a vocal opponent of the article, noting that despite

said.

Further debate led selectmen to defend themselves in the public forum, offering rebuttals to accusations of misinformation about certain aspects of the project. At one point, Selectman Steve Sullivan said he "didn't want to lose friends" over the issue, and that selectmen were only trying to do "what we think is best for the town." While the project did received support the majority of voters elected to deny the proposal thus keeping the highway and water and sewer departments as separate entities.

Following the vote, former selectman and recently hired Town Administrator Jonathan Ruda offered comments on the decision to the Webster Times. Ruda played a key role in helping establish the proposal for a DPW consolidation before vacating his seat as a selectman to seek the Town Administrator job. He called the vote "definitely not Dudley's finest moment."

"The independent firm that conducted the review concluded that Dudley water and sewer users and taxpayers would

benefit from formation of a Department of Public Works. The benefits were clearly spelled-out, and included real data, best practices and examples of outside funding opportunities that would become available as a result of the reorganization. A very small number of voters disagreed with the facts and the DPW Article unfortunately failed. I'm very disappointed with the result but based on the light attendance at the Town Meeting, not at all surprised," Ruda said. "I feel that the taxpayers and water and sewer users were poorly served by the vote, and the fact that the Board of Selectmen were unfairly and personally attacked on the Town Meeting floor showed the lack of a good argument by the small group that opposed the improvement."

This is not the first time Dudley has chosen not to embrace a DPW concept. Selectmen also considered the idea in 2014 and 2015 but saw 2018 and 2019 as an opportune time to consider the option again with both superintendents retiring last year.

citizen concern for preserving farmland, one of the most controversial solar farms in town at the base of the hill near the high school is on land that, to his knowledge, has not been farmed for more than 30 years, and that the high school itself was built on property once used as a farm. Selectman Paul Joseph took things a step further, explaining that the article would effectively limit what property owners are allowed to do with their land even if the property is not suitable for farming.

"I disagree with the petition to completely eliminate the overlay. Don't cry wolf. Don't speculate without knowing. Don't scare people that the LLCs are going to run away. Of course they can. Anybody can. Any company can run away. Any corporation can run away," Joseph said. "There may be someone who is going to lose their land and may want to put a solar array on it. Not active farmland. I want to see agriculture thrive here, but if someone has some land where they want to put in what exceeds what you can put on a roof you're telling them they cannot and I think that's wrong and I have that right."

Despite receiving some vocal support from voters, the article passed overwhelmingly with citizens providing a round of applause. The new bylaw does not regulate systems of less than 250KW for roof mounted solar panels or systems that are consumptive power systems where all energy generated is utilized for onsite operations. With the new bylaw large ground-mounted solar photovoltaic installations will now be limited to industrial districts as well as the town refuse and disposal district.

Slugging Shepherd Hill overpowers Tomahawks




Shepherd Hill's Carly Snyder drops down a bunt versus Algonquin.

DUDLEY — The Shepherd Hill Regional varsity softball team made a seamless transition from batting practice to its game with Mid-Wach A rival Algonquin Regional on Wednesday, May 22, clubbing three home runs — including two no-doubters off the bat of junior Kiley Wong-Li — and producing many more loud outs in an 8-2 cakewalk past the Tomahawks.

With the win the Rams, who qualified for postseason play on Tuesday, May 21 with an 11-4 win over Westborough High, improved to 11-5 overall and 5-2 in the Mid-Wach A. Algonquin, which lost for the 12th time in its last 13 games, is now 4-13 overall and 1-7 in league play.

In addition to Wong-Li's two round-trippers after which she was walked in her next at-bat both times, senior Cayley Fagan also homered and 11 of the Rams' outs in the game came on fly balls to the outfield.

Naraylee Baez, Algonquin's senior center fielder, made four spectacular catches, going

up and over the center-field fence to steal a home run off the bat of Shepherd Hill's Kelly Cournoyer. Baez almost repeated the feat on Fagan's home run, but she dropped the ball after landing over the fence for a second time. Angela Ke, the Tomahawks' freshman left fielder, also made four great grabs in the outfield while right fielder Sabrina Greenwood, a sophomore, had three putouts.

"We were dialed in at the plate today," Shepherd Hill head coach John Snyder said. "I think qualifying for Districts was a big relief for the team as a whole. That was one of our goals coming into the season. I think getting in took a lot of pressure off of the girls. I think a lot of the girls were putting some undo pressure on themselves to get to that point.

"This team has been together, a lot of the girls, for 3-4 years, so it was important to them to make Districts this year," added Snyder. "As coaches we didn't set a priority on that, but it's been clear all season that making Districts was important to this team."

In addition to her two home

runs and three RBI, Wong-Li went the distance in the circle. Pitching for just the second time all season and fourth time in her high school career, the right-hander allowed nine hits. She walked four and struck out three.

"Kiley was fantastic today, both hitting and pitching," Snyder said. "I don't ask her to pitch very often, but when I do she comes through and she did today. This was our fourth game in four days and we're in a stretch where we're going to play five games in six days, so I've had to juggle our pitching a little bit."

Shepherd Hill then played Westborough for a second time on Friday, May 24, and then finished the season with games after press time against Millbury High, Shrewsbury High and Blackstone Valley Tech.

"Those three games to end the season are all against very good teams," Snyder said. "They will be a good prep for Districts."

Although she's been successful when asked to take the ball, Wong-Li admitted she's more

comfortable playing first base.

"I don't really like pitching, I'd rather play first, but I'll do whatever my team needs me to do to help us win," said Wong-Li, who was as happy as anyone to see her two hits sail over the left-field fence. "I haven't been hitting very well this season. I got a new swing over the winter and it's finally kicking in. I'm starting to feel more comfortable up there. I feel like, especially today, I'm seeing the ball very well right now."

The home runs were Wong-Li's first two of the season. She is currently batting about .375 with 11 RBI. Wong-Li dropped her bat and shook her head when she was given an unintentional-intentional walk following her first home run.

"I was surprised she walked me the first time. It was only

one home run at that point; I didn't think she needed to walk me there," Wong-Li said. "But, after the second home run I went up there knowing she wasn't going to give me anything to hit."

Shepherd Hill, which took a 2-1 lead in the bottom of the first inning on Wong-Li's first home run of the game, added six more runs in the fourth — three on Wong-Li's second homer and Fagan's blast as well — to take command of the game, going ahead 8-2 at that point.

Shepherd Hill junior Parker Filo-Loos paced the Rams' attack with three hits and an RBI, while Carly Snyder added two hits and Sam Zannotti had an RBI single that drove in a pair of runs. Fagan also drove in two runs.



LEICESTER — After two full innings of play in its matchup with the Leicester High varsity baseball team — played on Memorial Day at Rochdale Park — Oxford High had accumulated four hits, but no runs, against the Wolverines.

The Pirates took the positives out of what had happened, though, and made sure that their second time through the lineup produced some runs. Oxford scored five times in the top of the third inning — plus three runs in the fourth, two runs in the fifth and three runs in the sixth — en route to a 13-0 win over Leicester after six mercy-rule shortened innings.

“You’d like to get four hits and score runs at that point, but they turned a nice double play,” Oxford head coach Justin Richards said of the early innings. “We knew at that point you get a good feeling. For us to break out of it like that [and score so many runs], we hadn’t had that happen before. It was nice to see, especially with two outs, to score those first five.”

In that third inning the Pirates loaded the bases and, with two outs, Aidan Fahey worked a walk to bring the first runner home. Joel Erickson then scored on a wild pitch and a fielding error allowed two more runs to come in. Oxford made it 5-0 when Ben Wing, at first base, took off for second on a delayed double steal. Ryan Parr, at third base, timed things perfectly and was able to get to the plate safely.

In the fourth inning Erickson was safe on a fielder’s choice but then got thrown out at second base. All the while, though, Michael Bordeaux trotted home. Evan Brindisi contributed an RBI single and he later scored on a passed ball.

Then, in the fifth, a run scored when Teegue Olson reached base on an error and Anthony Purretta ripped an RBI single.

Finally, in the sixth, Bordeaux walked with the bases loaded, Nathan Ryan hit an RBI single and Evan Remington scored on a passed ball.

The Pirates totaled 12 hits (three by Erickson and two each by Olson, Purretta and Wing), worked six walks and got hit by a pitch once. All nine

starters scored at least one run.

All the while Erickson was dealing on the mound. He pitched the first five innings and allowed two hits, three walks and hit a batter. Erickson struck out four Wolverines. Remington pitched the sixth and gave up one hit and one walk.

“He’s our workhorse on the mound,” Richards said of Erickson. “He’s the guy we’re going to go with in the play-offs when he’s rested.”

Oxford is in the playoffs — the Central Mass. Division 4 Tournament — thanks to their above .500 record against common Division 4 opponents and by virtue of winning the Southern Worcester County League C Division. The team is now 8-9 and can still get in the most common way, which is by finishing 10-10 or better.

The Pirates’ record may be misleading because of the way the young team has battled and lost a few one-run games.

“It’s a different team because we’re so young, having three eighth graders and a ninth grader start every game, but we didn’t dummy down the schedule,” said Richards. “We are hoping that this helps us come playoff time.”

Despite the loss, Leicester is still above .500 at 9-8 and will also play in the Central Mass. Division 4 Tournament after their 18-game regular season schedule concludes.

“We understand there’s a record, but when it comes to the process that we’re so into at this point in the season, everything’s a win or a learning opportunity,” head coach Jack Rafferty said of what the team will take out of the loss. “These guys definitely learned a thing or two — they’re going to find value out of it.”

Rafferty is pleased that his team will be playing postseason baseball.


“Just to get to that point, we’re fortunate for that,” he said. “The process still doesn’t change. Record is a lot of drama, batting average is a lot of drama, who’s

pitching is a lot of drama; we just need to be ready to control what we can control, and that starts with ourselves.”


