## Familiar fundraiser takes on new meaning

### WIFFLE BALL TOURNAMENT TO HONOR SANSOUCY

SOUTHBRIDGE — A recent tragedy has made the 12th Annual Aislen Cipro Wiffle Ball Tournament a little bit different this year.

For the first time, proceeds from the popular fundraiser will benefit Christopher's Haven in memory of Todd Sansoucy, a member of the "What the Dickens?!" Relay for Life team who passed away earlier in the summer from esophageal cancer.

Christopher's Haven, which helps out pediatric cancer patients and their families, was one of many causes that Sansoucy was a big supporter of, said tournament organizer Shaun Moriarty.

He explained: "Two or three years ago, Todd

## Parties differ on relevance of ROFR in cemetery case

DUDLEY — The Board of Selectmen may have once again continued the public hearing concerning the right of first refusal (ROFR) option on the Corbin Road land marked for an Islamic cemetery earlier this year, but officials and cit-

izens did not shy away from commenting on the matter, as the latest chapter in the saga has the town involved in a dispute in Massachusetts Land Court.

The Land Court has continued a Case Management Conference to Sept. 6, and with several issues being incor-

porated in the case filed against the town by the Islamic Society of Greater Worcester and other entities, there is some question as to whether any decision on the town's right of first refusal will hold up once the Land Court makes a decision on whether or not the Islamic Society

was wrongfully denied the permits to build their cemetery on Corbin Road.

John J. Davis, a special council brought on board in the last month to assist the town in the case, told selectmen on Aug. 22 that the ROFR option expires on Oct. 31, and with this being the fourth

time the matter has been discussed as a public meeting of the Board of Selectmen, citizens have become concerned about whether or not the court case and the regular continuations of the public hearings will impact the town's ability to utilize the ROFR within the

AUBURN — The Central South County Relay for Life returns for its 13th year on Friday, Sept. 9, bringing cancer survivors and supporters of cancer research, as well as countless walkers and runners supporting the cause, to Lemansky Park in Auburn. Raising around \$75,000 annually,

organizers and participants are hoping to continue, or even build on, the massive success of the local event, one of many national 24-hour cancer walks that help raise funds for cancer research and the fight towards a cure.

Kathleen Reynolds, one of the event's organizers and the on-site

## Selectman uphold PACC suspension

WEBSTER — The Board of Selectmen in Webster has upheld the three-day suspension of the Polish American Citizens Club's liquor license from earlier this year related to an incident on April 14 that included possible cases of underage drinking and what police said was a dangerous situation in the bar's parking lot, and a case of an intoxicated individual leaving the bar with two open containers in hand.

The decision had been contested by the PACC and attorney Gary Bridgman, the club's treasurer, in recent months, despite the PACC complying with and serving its three-day suspension ordered by the town. Bridgman and his fellow members had sought to have the decision overturned all the same to avoid further ramifications with the suspension officially on record.

The date in question saw the bar host an 18-and-over party that was, at first, believed to be a Nichols College func-

tion, but recent evidence has shown the event was merely hosted by a student from the college and not the college itself or any group affiliated with the school. Police responded to a disturbance on the property which led to Webster calling in back-up from the Dudley Police Department and police reportedly finding around a hundred people engaged in different small altercations in the bar's parking lot as well as potential cases of underage drinking, which were not used against the bar in the violation hearing, as well as taking a 22-year-old Nichols student into custody after the individual left the PACC with two open beers and was found to have a blood-alcohol level of .192, leading to accusations of over-serving at the bar as well.

Bridgman came to the Aug. 22 re-hearing of the case prepared with a five-point argument against the decision made by selectmen. Among his reasons to justifying the overturning of the suspension, Bridgman said

# Safety in numbers

## LOCAL RUNNERS SHARE BENEFITS OF RUNNING IN PAIRS FOLLOWING PRINCETON MURDER

In the wake of the murder of a 27-year-old Princeton jogger in the first week-end of August, a local running group is spreading the benefits, both in terms of safety and support, of running in pairs and groups no matter when joggers and runners decide to take to the streets and back roads.

An investigation is still ongoing concerning the death of 27-year-old Vanessa Marcotte as of this report, after she left her mother's home for a mid-day jog on Aug. 7 and was found to have been murdered while on her solo jog. It's only the latest in a disturbing trend that has caused concerns for joggers and runners for years now when it comes to safety and awareness while enjoying a relatively harmless exercise routine.

In fact, the Tri-State Runners, a group of local joggers and runners from the tri-state area who usually frequent Dudley, Thompson and Webster, started with those concerns in mind and the mission on spreading the benefits of partnered running. Founding members José Rivera and Joanna Anderson started the group after Anderson was seeking a running partner to avoid having to make her treks alone. From there, they formed a group of runners who now net-

work and run with each other, either on their own time or at large group events, providing inspiration and support for each other wherever needed.

"That was the number one reason for getting together," Rivera said. "There's safety in numbers. We also get a lot of support and we motivate each other to get out there. There's also accountability when you're running with someone."

With the recent murder in Princeton, Rivera and Anderson are hoping to remind local runners that their group is available and is always accepting new members to partner with local runners and joggers for support and motivation. So far, the group contains around 400 members on Facebook in their closed group, formatted as such for security reasons for the runners, and around 200 are regular participants in any given run while nearly 60 participate in weekly pub runs through Webster and Dudley.

Joanna Anderson said she was inspired to seek out a running partner after a jogger was killed in Woodstock (Judy Nilan was killed in late 2005 during a jog) and connected with Rivera before the two took their mission to higher levels and helped form the Tri-State Runners as they are today.

"Not every runner is a 10-minute

pace. We might have a 12-minute pace or 13-minute pace, so our rule has always been no one gets left behind. If someone comes to a run and we don't recognize them we will ask them if they know where they're going and what they're pace is, so nobody is left behind," Anderson said.

This concept is the core of the group and something they inspire runners to incorporate into their own private runs as well. Anderson said the unfortunate incident in Princeton serves as a harsh reminder that there are bad people who seek to do bad things to the most vulnerable and that it doesn't matter when or where someone wants to run or jog, there is always safety in numbers.

"One of the things that kind of blew us out of the water with the Princeton case is that she ran in a quiet place and a country back road in the middle of the day. Everyone thinks in the middle of that day you are safe and obviously still things can happen," Anderson said. "That's kind of the scary part is to even remind people that something like that can happen even in the middle of the day."

In terms of safety tips, Anderson and Rivera suggested avoiding the use of headphones, although Rivera said music is a personal choice for any run-

ner and Anderson acknowledged that she uses only one headphone while on a run. Both actually stated that music can be a distraction from one's surroundings, whether it's someone coming up from behind or even a nearby vehicle, and that the runners in their group usually socialize while running, making their own entertainment while on their runs. They also suggested sticking to more populated and public areas rather than just back roads when heading out for a run.

The Tri-State Runners is a not-for-profit group with the sole purpose of inspiring runners and providing a networking opportunity for those who won't want to run or jog alone. Rivera and Anderson hope that if anyone does feel shaken up by the incident in Princeton that they realize there are ways to get in touch with others who enjoy the activity and that fear doesn't have to win out when you have someone there to help motivate you and watch your back.

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# Six-alarm fire destroys Main Street buildings

‘THIS IS A TREMENDOUS LOSS TO THE COMMUNITY’

SOUTHBRIDGE — Disaster struck downtown Southbridge on Sunday, Aug. 28, in the form of a six-alarm fire that shut down Main Street for hours as firefighters struggled to contain the blaze.

The Southbridge Fire Department received a call at 2:07 p.m., notifying firefighters that buildings 310 and 312 on Main Street — commercial buildings with residential spaces upstairs — were on fire, crowds from all over town gathering on the street in horror.

For the next two to three hours, the Southbridge Fire Department — as well as mutual aid fire crews, ambulance crews and strike forces from all over Worcester County and parts of Connecticut — aggressively fought the fire, not allowing it to spread to the buildings close by.

“It’s painful for the town, particularly the residents who lived there and the businesses who used the building. It’s very sad,” said Town Manager Ron San Angelo on Monday, Aug. 29. “This is a tremendous loss to the community. We are working to relocate the businesses but we don’t know what the future will

hold. We all feel heartfelt sorrow for the residents who lost a lot in this fire.”

No occupants or residents were injured in the fire. Two firefighters were treated for heat exhaustion and dehydration. The Red Cross provided hotel rooms for the families and individuals who lived in the buildings.

On Monday, Aug. 29, Deputy Chief Paul Normandin met with San Angelo to discuss the damage to the two buildings. Building 310, which was being occupied by Liberty Tax, will be demolished after state building inspectors ruled that the building is unsafe. For now, there will be permanent fencing placed around it while the fire department tries to get a timeline from the building owner and demolition company.

Building 312 will be boarded up and “requires rehab,” said Normandin, “but it should be fine.” As of press time, there was no estimate on the cost of the damage caused by the fire.

“Right now our top priority is safety,” said San Angelo. “We want to make sure everyone’s safe and make sure nobody can access this building. That’s our main priority.”

The cause of the fire is still being deter-

mined. On Aug. 28, the State Police Arson Investigation Team and local firefighters began their investigation process. There was an “area of interest” in Building 310, but Normandin knew nothing more at press time.

Why was the fire so intense? Said Normandin: “Due to construction and multiple additions to all of these buildings — adding on and adding on for years — the type of materials used in construction where the fire was located — it just kept burning.”

Around 5:47 p.m., members of the Southbridge Fire Department had headed back to the station to clean up and get hydrated. That’s when there was a second fire — a three-alarm fire at 5 Benefit Street.

Firefighters rushed back out, as well as fire departments from Charlton and nearby Connecticut towns. The fire was contained to a second floor bedroom, but the entire three-family building sustained smoke damage. Like Building 312, on Main Street, the building will be boarded up for rehab before it can be occupied again. Investigation is underway.

Two firefighters were treated for dehydration and heat exhaustion. No occupants or residents — who were all able to leave the building in time — were injured.

“Two fires in one day like that is not common,” said Normandin. “But this is our job. We deal with everything that comes rolling our way. All of my crews and mutual aid fire crews and ambulance crews did an exemplary job. If we weren’t so aggressive, we’d still be there today fighting the fire. We could have lost all the way up to Hamilton Street. They’re all one on top of the other. It’s awesome that all my people and the mutual aid people came in and given a task and completed it.”

Fire departments from Sturbridge, Dudley, Charlton, Spencer, Worcester, Leicester, Auburn, Oxford, Brookfield, Warren, Grafton, Millbury, Upton and Sutton, as well as departments from Connecticut all helped with the two fires in Southbridge.

“I want to send out a thank all of the firemen and women, police officers and towns who came here to support us,” said San Angelo. “We received tremendous support. I want to thank all of the businesses owners who donated food to the police and firefighters as well.”






# St. Andrew Bobola Church holds Parish Festival

## Bay Path Evening School courses begin Sept. 12

CHARLTON — There's still time to register for Evening School classes at Bay Path Regional Vocational Technical High School. Most classes begin on Sept. 12.

And these are not your average night classes. While Bay Path does offer licensing courses, most of the Evening School courses are a fun way to learn something new, gain a new hobby and skill or even count as a date night with your spouse.

"Seriously, for many people this is a couple's night out," said Evening School Director Christopher Faucher. "People will find a babysitter, go out for dinner and then come out here to learn ballroom dancing, line dancing..."

There are evening classes for every-

body. Cooking classes, computer technology and elder law are just some of the many courses in the catalog. Evening School offers "dream courses," said Faucher, which help people achieve some of their goals, whether it be writing a book or doing voice overs in commercials.

New courses added this semester include cell phone repairing, basic marine maintenance and propane installation certification. Bay Path's also offering continuing education for hoisting licensing, a state requirement for many professions.

Bay Path has been offering Evening School courses for almost 20 years. About 18 years ago the catalog had five to six classes. Now, Evening School has 126 face-to-face classes and over 1,400 online courses.

"A lot of that has to do with the com-

munity," said Faucher. "If someone has an interest in something they will teach it up here. While some of the instructors come from Bay Path's vocational school, the rest come from the community. Some people have a hobby or some kind of skill they want to share and we give them an outlet for that."

Bay Path is always looking for new Evening School instructors. The next semester will start the planning stages after Thanksgiving.

For many people, the courses at Bay Path's Evening School offer a chance to try something they normally could not have afforded. Similar courses can cost up to three times more at local private schools. The price for Bay Path's courses are "minimal," with most of the proceeds going right back into the school.

"Bay Path isn't just a 9-to-12 school," remarked Faucher. "We are communi-

ty-based. If we can assist a member of the community to help them towards employment or move up the chain in their company, that's what we are here for. The community did a great thing for us - voting for additional renovation. This is just a small piece of payment back."

According to Faucher, Evening School is a great community asset.

"Life-long learning is what it's all about," he explained. "Every day you have to learn something new, keep your brain active. What a great way to try something you've never tried before."

## What is happening in our local real estate market?

We all see the news that talks about what is happening nationally in the real estate industry. Most of the national impact will trickle down and affect our local market, but it doesn't always do that. This is why periodically I want to educate on what we are seeing locally in our market and the trends that are happening.

I decided to look at our market over the past six months and compare it to the market of the same timeframe in 2015.

In looking at Worcester County single-family homes according to Multiple Listing Service data it shows many positive trends. The total number of homes sold rose by over 9 percent year over year. The time to get an offer on a home decreased by about 15 percent year over year and the average sales price increased about 2 percent year over year. Being out in the market selling, I thought I had seen some slowing down in the higher price ranges in the market. However, when I look at the data it tells a different story. Homes that sold for prices above \$1 million actually sold about 267 percent quicker this year compared to the same timeframe in 2015.

Inventory has dropped drastically in the last year. There are approximately 27 percent less single-family homes for sale in Worcester County than there

was 1 year ago today. This low inventory has driven prices up and reduced the days on market for homes that have sold. I do not believe this means every home will sell and sell quick. Even with all these factors we do see that buyers are looking for homes that are in great condition and are willing to pay a premium and if they need work they want a discount. I would suggest to consult with a realtor as soon as you think about selling your home and have them come out to show you what you should do in order to sell your home the quickest and for the most money. A good analogy is it is like planning for a wedding. It is usually a shorter period of time and there are less things to coordinate. However, you want to do all the planning so the day of the wedding everything goes off without a hitch and you want it to be the same the day your home hits the market. You want everything to be as perfect as possible from the condition, marketing, pictures, and staging.

## Welcome back to school

School is back in session in Dudley as of Tuesday, Aug. 30. Nichols College student will also return to classes this week. With the weather still good, students and other people are using the roadways for a variety of activities. Many school children will be walking to or waiting at bus stops. I wanted to remind drivers of the start of school and provide some rules for pedestrians.

The rules for use of streets are contained in both state laws and local regulations. If sidewalks are in place on a particular street, they should be used. If there are no sidewalks, people should walk or run along the shoulder of the roadway facing into traffic. You will most likely see a vehicle heading toward you if walking in this fashion. Unless the shoulders of the road are particularly wide, there is little to no room for people to run or walk side by side without one person being on the roadway. Walking in this manner should be avoided and at bare minimum, pedestrians need to walk single file when vehicles approach.


Accident possibilities increase when factors such as solar glare, inclement weather, darkness, or other factors reduce a driver's visibility. All precautions should be taken by pedestrians to stay off the roadway whenever possible. When you wish to cross the road, do this at crosswalks when they are available. If there are no crosswalks, pedestrians should yield the right of way to vehicles before crossing and avoid "jumping out" into traffic. The excuse of "pedestrians have the right of way" is used often to explain why people walk side by side in roadways or dart across a road in front of vehicles. This is never the correct way to think when it comes to pedestrian vs. vehicle situations.

With the start of school, remember to exercise additional care while driving. There will be more people, cars, and activity on the roads, especially in the morning and afternoon hours. Many side streets, dead ends, or other lightly traveled locations may have people using a more relaxed approach to pedestrian rules. Do not ignore the basic safety rules of looking both ways and paying attention to the possibility of cars. Vehicles may come from anywhere, so it is always important to treat these locations with the proper amount of caution. Sharing the road and respecting each others use of it will limit accidents and injuries.

## Consider all aspects of college savings options

It's almost back-to-school time. If you have young children going to public schools, your biggest expenditures may be on pens, pencils and notebooks. But if you want those same kids to go to college someday, you'll eventually face considerably larger costs — so you may want to start preparing soon.

College is costly. For the 2015-16 school year, the average expense (including tuition, fees room and board) was nearly \$20,000 at a public, four-year school, and more than twice that amount at a four-year private school, according to the College Board. Of course, cheaper alternatives are available — your children could go to a local community college for two years at a very reasonable cost, and then transfer to a four-year school.

Still, if your child does go on to get a bachelor's degree, those big bills will eventually arrive. As you consider how you can best deal with these costs, ask yourself these questions:

How much can I afford to contribute? As much as you'd like to help your children pay for college, you also have to think about your own needs — specifically your retirement. Think very carefully before reducing contributions to your retirement plans, such as your IRA and 401(k), to help fund a college savings plan. After all, your children may be able to get scholarships and grants, and even if they have to take out loans, they'll have many years in which to repay them — but you can't postpone saving for retirement without jeopardizing your ability to enjoy a comfortable lifestyle. When it comes to prioritizing your financial goals, putting yourself first is not necessarily a selfish act.

What college savings plan should you consider? A number of college savings options are available. For example, you could contribute to a 529 plan which offers potential tax advantages and high contribution limits. You might also consider a custodial account, such as an UGMA or UTMA, although when your children reach the age of majority, they are free to do whatever they want with the money — and their plans may not include college.

What will be the effect of a college savings plan on financial aid? When colleges determine financial aid packages, they will evaluate your child's assets differently than your assets. Your child typically would be expected to contribute 20 percent of his or her assets, while you are only expected to contribute up to 5.6 percent of your assets. Consequently, you may be better off saving for college in your name, rather than your children's. Under the federal financial aid guidelines, an UTMA/UGMA account is classified as a student asset, while 529 plans are counted as parental assets if parents are the account owners. (The rules on financial aid are not always so clear-cut, however, so it might be worth your while to contact a financial aid officer at a local college or university to ensure that your chosen method of saving will still allow for the greatest possible assistance.)

As you can see, you've got several factors to think about when it comes to helping your kids meet their higher education goals. Study up on these options, so you can find the right answers for your family's needs.

## Saltwater fishing providing great summertime fun

Fishing continues to provide some great days on the saltwater.

As of Sept. 1, sea bass daily bag limits rose to seven fish in Rhode Island. The huge numbers of sea bass in Rhode Island waters have exploded with this hard-fighting, great-tasting fish. Although fluke are a great eating fish, sea bass provide a sweeter taste and are now my favorite fish to eat, and my fishing buddies agree.

This past week, I fished a mile or so out from the Point Judith light. Using roadrunner jigs tipped with a piece of squid or a live mummie, the action was the best that I have encountered in years. Using a set up of two jigs on a single fishing rod, I was consistently landing two sea bass at a time. The fish were in the 2- to 3-pound range with an occasional 4-pound fish. Culling out the largest sea bass and retaining our three-fish limit each we changed our rigs and targeted some scup. Thirteen and 14-inch scaup were a lot of fun to catch. After 20 or so, we decided to try and locate some fluke.

Earlier that day, an angler that I often meet at the boat ramp told me about a place that he had been fishing all week and was catching some impressive fluke. As my eyes scanned the ocean, I was able to locate a few boats in the area that he had suggested we try if we wanted some nice fluke. It was a bit of a ride for us, but the seas were fairly calm and I decided to navigate the 5 miles off shore to try our luck at catching a few fluke for the dinner table. Lucky for us, we spotted the angler that had tipped us off about one of his hot spots for fluke. Quickly lowering our Road Runner jigs to the bottom (60 feet) it was

only a matter of minutes that I felt I had stike on my rod. Setting the hook I knew that it was a nice fluke. It took a while to bring the fish topside and when I started to see some color of the fish in 3 feet of water, I knew it was a beauty. Scooping the net under the fish as it came to the surface had me shouting to my fishing buddy, Steve. As soon as the fish was in the net, the hook pulled out. That was indeed a bit of luck. If the fish had made another run to the bottom he would have been lost. We landed a few more fluke before the tide went slack and the bite also stopped. Time to go. Twenty-five-knot winds were predicted for the afternoon, which is a bit too much for my 17-foot boat. Checking my GPS, I quickly started the 25 HP motor and gave it full throttle, which had us headed for home.

As we entered the east gap of Point Judith, we spotted a number of boats in the area, it was not long before we realized that they were chasing false albacore. The wind was starting to pick up and we were both tired. We decided to head for the boat ramp and call it a day. There was a time that I could fish both tides but those days are long over. Maybe the next time we will give the albacore a try.

This Sunday, Sept. 4, the Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club will hold their annual fall 3D archery fun shoot. The event is open to the public. The club will also hold a chicken BBQ on the same day, with a few tickets still available. Noel Rabidor is chairman of the event and has done a great job setting up the archery course with full size animal targets.

The Salmon River has started to hold salmon, but the real run has not started

yet. As mentioned in last week's column the low water could be an issue this year if they do not get a substantial rain fall soon. Also, colder water temperatures are needed to get the run started. A call to the Salmon River sports shop is a good place to get weekly updates on the fishing conditions for the Salmon River and Lake Ontario. There phone number is 315-298-4343 and talk to Jeff.

Striper fishing at Block Island was as good as it gets for a few local anglers this past Friday. A group of eight anglers from the Valley fished on a charter boat and caught eight stripers all over 40 pounds with Kurt Salvas landing the largest steeper weighing in at 47 pounds! The anglers were using wire line and a parachute jig to catch the fish. Wire line helps to get the jig down deep enough to catch stripers, but it is a lot of work. The Cape had also been giving up some big stripers and action should only get better.

Upcoming field days in the area include the Whitinsville Fish & Game Club, which is scheduled for Sept. 17, and the Wallum Lake Rod & Gun Club will hold their annual field day on Sept. 11. The annual Howard Sears Memorial Shoot is scheduled for Sept. 5, which is

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### Garden Tea Tonics

• Fever Remedy: One of peppermint's claims to fame is that it can alleviate the chills and aid with symptoms of fever and the flu. Try drinking a cup or two of strong peppermint tea made from fresh leaves to relieve cold and flu complaints. To do: Pour one cup boiling water over four to six peppermint leaves. Allow to steep for 15 minutes, strain and serve.

• Sweet Slumber: Lemon Balm promotes sleep as it acts as a very mild sedative. It is also helpful in treating stress and nervous headaches. To make a fresh Lemon Balm tea: steep one teaspoon of fresh leaves in one cup of boiling water. Steep covered for ten minutes. Strain and enjoy. To combat cold sores, made tea with up to four tablespoons of the herb per cup of boiling water. Allow to cool, then apply with a cotton ball to cold sore several times a day.

Late Season Lawn Tips  
Never cut more than one-

A dull blade rips and shreds the grass and makes the grass more susceptible to brown tips, diseases and insects. # Fighting illness, Morway to continue calling high school games

KIDNEY FAILURE NOT KEEPING MORWAY SIDELINED FROM RADIO DUTIES

WEBSTER — Finishing up the high school basketball season this past winter with the Oxford High boys' varsity team competing for the Division 3 state championship on Saturday, March 19, Matt Morway completed his 30th year broadcasting on local radio.

For all intents and purposes, play-by-play announcing has been part of the 50-year-old Morway's entire adult life. But around Christmas time 2015, Morway was diagnosed with Stage 5 kidney failure. As he continued to call the basketball games, extreme fatigue began to set in.

Faced with the tough task of deciding whether or not to return to Cool Country 940 WGFP AM of Webster for the high school football season this month, Morway said that he "changed my mind 200 times."

In the end, though, Morway decided to return to the sidelines for his 31st season, albeit on a limited schedule.

"One day I just said to myself, 'The sponsors are back, the advertisers are back, I've run into some listeners who said to fight through it,' and that's when I said, 'Let's compromise and do a half season.' That and I was an absolute scaredy-cat to give the whole thing up," said Morway in an interview on Wednesday, Aug. 24.

To be able to perform at a high level, Morway, who called the decision to return "really big because this is a really big part of my life," maintains a strict diet and spends 90 minutes a day on a spin bike to enhance his cardio.

But he also knew that a full schedule,

which includes an 11-week season with games on Fridays and/or Saturdays, wasn't in the cards.

"There comes a time when you know your body isn't right and you know you have to slow it down," Morway said.

Joining Morway on Cool Country 940 is his broadcast colleague Pete Geanis. The tandem will be working their 27th year together.

"Peter's been extremely supportive," Morway said of Geanis, a Gardner High School Hall of Famer. "The station itself has been very supportive of this decision. And the advertisers, extremely supportive. I can't thank the advertisers, the sponsors, the businesses enough."

Morway will also return to his full-time history and psychology teaching duties at Shepherd Hill Regional High School.

"I wouldn't trade the Shepherd Hill kids for anybody," said Morway. "They make me ignore myself, which is an awesome thing. They don't know how much they're helping."

WGFP will broadcast six regular season games and are open to calling the pair of playoff games allotted for Nov. 4 and Nov. 11, should a local team advance. And if a team goes to Gillette Stadium for the state championship, Morway and Geanis will surely be on hand.

"We picked some key Bartlett and Shepherd Hill games, and we're going to do the same in basketball," said Morway, adding that it will include the prestigious Clark Tournament. "That's the plan."

The schedule is considered perma-

ment — not tentative — unless Morway goes in for a kidney transplant.

"If I'm called for a transplant during the season, then obviously someone else will take over," he said.

Morway has already taken the necessary precautions should he need to take a leave of absence.

"I had surgery to put a fistula in my arm in case I were to need dialysis," he said.

While Morway waits to see if there is a donor available, he figured his health was good enough to continue teaching and broadcasting.

"I was almost afraid to give it up. If I give it up, it's a sign of me giving up I guess," he said.

As for as the actual football season goes, Morway believes that both Bartlett High and Shepherd Hill will improve and that he is excited to watch all the action unfold. Morway has also covered Oxford High, Auburn High and Bay Path Regional football games in the past.

"I am excited for the season, I just have to keep it in perspective. We're doing enough to make me happy and not doing too many so that I don't get burnt out," he said.

Morway concluded the interview by saying that he wanted to give thanks to the listeners.

"Thirty-one years is a long time," he said. "The audience is loyal — they've been loyal a long time."

Due in part to the loyal audience, Morway was inducted into the New

England Basketball Hall of Fame for broadcasting a year ago.

"I'm still stunned that that happened," he said.

And in just one week's time, Morway will be back to broadcasting. The Cool Country 940 WGFP football schedule is as follows:

# Battle lines drawn in Islamic cemetery proposal case

120-day timeline from the application for sale of the property in July, something opponents to the town have stated the town does not have the right to do, even within that 120-day deadline.

Corbin Road resident Richard Raymond made his concerns very clear, saying the public hearing and the overall situation with the Land Court now involved has gotten a bit too “convoluted” for residents to understand exactly what power they have and what is or is not stopping the town from making any decisions on the matter.

“We have these public hearings and they’re very narrow as to why we should purchase under 61A and what are the benefits of the town in purchasing under Chapter 61A. That’s what we have to focus on and we’ve been given some testimony and facts and reasons why that should take place, however the people who are going to make the decision as to whether or not to bring it to a town meeting seem to be responding to outside concerns that we are not involved in or cannot be involved in at a public hearing,” Raymond said, referring to the land court case and its potential impact on the hearing. “We are very concerned, particularly with the way it’s being reported out, sometimes fairly sometimes unfairly, and how it’s portrayed. As we talk around town I will let you know there is a great concern. The residents of Dudley have rights too. They want to be able to exercise their rights as well. The town has forfeited thousands of dollars in tax money for the right to receive, if they do sell, the right of first refusal should they choose to do that and that’s the rights of the residents of the town.”

The ROFR is one of many items under fire from opponents to the town’s decision earlier this year to deny a special permit for the cemetery on Corbin Road. Davis said that in addition to whether or not the town really is entitled to the ROFR the opposition, which includes the Islamic Society of Greater Worcester, the American Civil Liberties Union and

Todd & Webb LLP out of Boston, are also questioning whether the Dover Amendment, a regulation applying to whether or not a town can deny a project based on religious grounds, applies in the matter, as well as other issues they feel pertinent to the decision. Should the court rule in favor of the Islamic Society and its supporters, it’s likely that any decision on the town’s part concerning the right of first refusal would be overturned, but citizens want to have that decision on the record regardless of any eventual court decision.

In an interview with The Webster Times following the Aug. 22 Board of Selectmen meeting, Attorney Jay Talerman, who has represented the Islamic Society throughout the process, said he does not feel the town even has a right of first refusal in the matter and confirmed that the land court case will address that concern.

“The [selectmen] claim to have a right of first refusal to purchase the property. They do not. That is a legal fiction. It does not exist. Under the statute, you only get a right of first refusal if the agricultural property in question was being converted to a residential, commercial or industrial use. We are not converting it to any such use,” Talerman said. “We are converting it to an institutional religious use. Under the town’s own zoning bylaws religious and cemetery uses are not commercial, residential or industrial. So, they’re exempt from the statute and the town doesn’t even have a right of first refusal.”

During the Aug. 22 hearing, John Briare, a member of the town Economic Development Commission speaking for the second time in four public meetings on the ROFR issue as a private citizen, said he feels the town is being bullied and that outside entities like the ACLU have entered the fray with no real context into the matter and are intimidating the town.

“We’re talking about a piece of property that the town, years ago, through consideration, entered an agreement to have the right to acquire on first refusal, and here we are, years later. Someone

decides they want to sell and we exercise our right, and we have all of these third parties that are trying to interfere with that contract,” Briare said. “In the corporate world we’d be all over this as tortious interference and slapping them around with lawsuits ourselves.”

Briare asked if the town has entertained action against the ACLU and other parties he deemed have no vested interest for tortious interference, defined as an intentional interference with contractual relations, but as it turns out, Davis revealed that the town is actually facing a similar accusation against itself.

“In the context of the land use case, they are asking the Land Use Court to declare certain things. Number one, that the Chapter 61A doesn’t apply, or at least the right of first refusal doesn’t apply. They’re asking the court to determine if the Dover Amendment applies. They’re asking the court whether or not they even need to apply for a special permit and they have included in there a count for tortious interference with contractual relations against the town,” Davis said. “In the context of that case there are a lot of options that we can pursue and all I can tell you is we are looking at everything. I don’t want to get into discussing litigation strategy because I don’t think that would be in our best interest. There’s still a process in place and it’s (the Board of Selectmen’s) intent that the process still be followed and that means public input. If the concern is that the public doesn’t have input I would try to ensure people that the public is going to have input.”

The Land Court case is not the only thing the Town of Dudley has to worry about as this issue progresses. The Aug. 22 meeting was the first since Dudley was informed that the United States Attorney’s Office Civil Rights Unit will be investigating whether or not the town turning down the special permit for the cemetery was a violation of the Islamic Society’s right to religious exercise and was an attempt at putting up a barrier for the sole purpose of preventing the organization from using the land for a religious

purpose. Talerman confirmed with The Webster Times that the possibility of a Civil Rights Violation case could be inevitable if the town continued on its current path with this matter, but that conversations are taking place and he hopes the town and the Islamic Society can come to some agreement without having to take this issue further in court.

“We hope (the discussions) bear fruit,” Talerman said. “We’ve exchanged a few proposals. There’s still a significant gap and the town has not met our expectations yet. If we are not able to resolve this and the town proceed with this matter we are almost certainly going to file a civil rights case.”

A common criticism against the Town of Dudley by those following the story for months has been accusations of religious bigotry and prejudice against the opponents of the project in Dudley becoming commonplace. Talerman said he feels there is sufficient evidence to justify that the town’s decisions and actions since the matter was first made public in February have been heavily driven by religious discrimination. Despite recent meetings presenting potential uses for the land in question and how owning the property would provide different benefits to the town, some still believe there may be more malicious attempts by the public. Despite much of the public discussion at meetings and hearings revolving more around issues of water quality, agricultural preservation of the land and what have been perceived as misconceptions or potential misdirection on the part of the Islamic Society of Greater Worcester, there are some from outside the community who believe that the town’s attempt to act on the right of first refusal is purely an attempt at blocking a specific project, including Talerman.

“You try and be an adult about it. We have rights to pursue and everyone has put their foot down publicly in some way, shape or form. Selectman [Paul] Joseph continues to use the public forum to present a more righteous position on behalf of the town and we dis-

agree with him. So we are expressing our firm opinions,” Talerman said. “That doesn’t mean we’re not willing to engage the town and in fact we are engaging the town. Not everyone in the town of Dudley is against this cemetery. We actually think it’s a minority of very loud and perhaps influential voices that have expressed discontent with the notion of an Islamic cemetery. We think most people in Dudley are very fair minded and would be welcome to have us as a neighbor.”

Joseph, his fellow selectmen and Town Counsel, decided to take the opportunity to refute such claims during the Aug. 22 meeting saying they feel the town has been unfairly mislabeled as “bigoted” or “prejudiced” in the matter. Attorney Gary Brackett, who has butted heads with Talerman consistently throughout the application process, said he sees things very differently.

“I never heard any public official say they want to exercise 61A to block the cemetery. Frankly the purpose of acquiring the land would be to serve a public purpose,” said Brackett. “That includes agriculture, open space, water protection. Say we needed the property to build a new high school or a public works yard or whatever the case may be. Those uses could go in there because they’re exempt from zoning and those would be public uses. The concept of public purpose does not equate to blocking the cemetery. It may be interpreted by some, and I would suggest incorrectly, that the acquisition of open space is to block the cemetery.”

Joseph continued his trend of making strong statements against the negative perceptions many have had against the town in this process, and as he has from the first meeting on the matter, stated he feels the truth will win in the end, and that the Town of Dudley won’t flinch at the accusations against them.

“This is America. Anybody that wants to can make any accusation they want to. That has happened consistently in this situation. Whether it’s ACLU, Department of

Justice or anybody else, the bottom line is that ultimately the truth will expose the falseness of accusations and the motivation of the people who make those accusations,” Joseph said. “That will happen eventually. It will happen ultimately. I hope and pray it happens fully.”

In regards to the ROFR discussion, Selectman Peter Fox wanted citizens to understand that the selectmen are not prolonging or overlooking the issue and that they are fully aware of the approaching Oct. 31 deadline to take full action on the matter regardless of the court case.

“I want to assure the public that the Board of Selectmen takes this matter very seriously and we are not intimidated. We are fortunate to have hard working counsel working with us and an administrator who puts in an enormous amount of hours when he has a full plate already,” Fox said. “We take this very seriously, but we have to do it within the law. We don’t take this lightly at all.”

The town has just under two months to complete the right of first refusal process, with a decision by the selectmen, a Town Meeting and a ballot vote still to take place before the Oct. 31 deadline. Regardless of the controversy surrounding whether or not Dudley can actually utilize its right of first refusal, the question remains if the public and selectmen believe that they should. The purchase would cost the town \$287,000 and would need a vote of approval at a Town Meeting and through a ballot vote for a Proposition 2 1/2 debt exclusion to raise taxes for the life of the loan for the purchase. If the town does not act on all of these requirements by Oct. 31 then the right of first refusal will expire regardless and the land will be up for grabs for the highest bidder, which could very well be the Islamic Society of Greater Worcester, who have said time and time again they are committed to pursuing the property.

# NEASC praises St. Joseph School report

WEBSTER — On June 23-24, the Commission on Independent Schools of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEAS&C) met to review Saint Joseph School’s Two-Year Interim Evaluation Report. The Commission accepted the report without reservation and noted that it was, “thoughtful, addressed multiple recommendations and fulfilled the accreditation requirements.”

St. Joseph School was notified on Aug. 5, of the Commission’s commendation for their progress and the

“clear path the School has set to travel.” The letter noted, “Catholic schools have faced enrollment challenges and it is noteworthy that Saint Joseph School’s Five-Year Strategic Plan projects steady increases over the next five years.” The School has experienced an increase in enrollment over the past two years. Currently, 205 students are enrolled at the school – a 15 percent increase – giving substance to the Plan’s optimism.

In addition, the Commission praised the schools proactive approach to health and safety.

“The School’s response to the recommendations on health and safety has been admirable. As the report notes, these issues – as they should – received the ‘highest priority’ and it is clear the School made significant progress on a variety of fronts. Regular safety drills, new classroom locks, a new PA system, consistent monitoring of visitors, an entirely re-engineered main school entrance, five-day nursing services and new radiator covers in the Pre-K and Kindergarten classrooms – all these changes peak eloquently of Saint Joseph’s commitment

to the safety and security of students and faculty.”

The Commission reviewed the balance of the school’s recommendations and noted that Saint Joseph School is in various stages on issues of mission, governance, enrollment, program, experience of the students, resources, early childhood, faculty, administration, communication and other areas. It stated, “Saint Joseph has set reasonably clear priorities for the next stages of improvement and the School is commended for their multi-year planning and for the obvi-

ous intention to address each of the recommendations as thoughtfully and thoroughly as they have the challenges of health and safety. Saint Joseph School has clearly demonstrated its capacity to resolve issues of program, planning and personnel and the Commission looks forward to the ongoing progress of the School in the years ahead. The School seems ready to take on the next challenges and is positioned well to continue the growth it has already achieved.”

# PACC liquor license suspension decision upheld

he felt a decision was made with little to no evidence of some of the accusations made against the PACC, the PACC was not granted access to the police report prior to the original hearing, and that the PACC should not be held accountable for the individual that was arrested, with Bridgman citing a town ordinance that states that alcohol can be consumed in public on private property, not on town property, and that the parking lot is bar property, out of the town's jurisdiction under the ordinance in question. He also said that the town was delayed in holding the hearing in a timely fashion in relation to when police filed the report.

"By your own bylaws our disciplinary hearing was not timely. Disciplinary hearings are held no later than four weeks after receiving notification from the WPD. No exceptions," Bridgman told selectmen. "There are reasons for a timely hearing. Memories are clear, events are clear and witnesses are available. In this matter, I understand that the young man who was arrested in the incident returned from school to his home in California. He is not available for me to ask him, 'Where did you get those open beers that were in your hand?' There are reasons for a timely hearing and this hearing was not timely according to (the town's) bylaws."

Acting Town Administrator Pam Leduc offered a rebuttal to the concern that the town did not hold the hearing in a timely fashion noting that proper procedure is to acknowledge and schedule the

hearing, however after that was done Webster was forced to reschedule it and under the requirements of the Alcohol Beverage Control Commission (ABCC) the town did what it was supposed to do.

"We actually contacted the ABCC to ask if there was an issue with that. They told us no because it was acted upon. Even though the hearing didn't occur, it was acted upon and scheduled," Leduc said. "There are notice requirements and all of that so (after the meeting was cancelled) we had to start over again. The board scheduled a hearing, and even though that meeting didn't occur, the selectmen still acted on it."

Another point that Bridgman made was to argue that the PACC should not be held accountable for the actions of an individual once they leave the bar with an open container as the arrested student did on that day. He noted that he felt it was "bad law" for a town to enforce alcohol consumption regulations in such a way.

"Is a restaurant, bar or grocery store in this town strictly liable if a person purchases a beer, opens it and walks out the door? I submit that if the answer to that question is yes, then that's a bad policy," Bridgman said. "Restaurants and bars have a tough business and now, by implication, this sanction states that if a person slips out the door this restaurant could be held closed for any number of days or suffer any penalties. I'm unaware of any court case or statute that holds a restaurant or bar liable because a customer left with an open container. Granted that person has a responsibility under the law to not possess an open container and cer-

tainly not in an automobile."

Webster Police Lt. Michael Shaw and Police Sgt. Bobby Wheeler, a responding officer to the incident that day, provided some insight and answers to Bridgman's comments and concerns. First off, Shaw did respond to concerns from Bridgman about the PACC being denied access to the police reports prior to the original hearing. Shaw said this was regrettably correct but was done because the executive secretary on duty saw that the report was an arrest report possibly involving minors and did not realize the PACC was involved.

"She saw it was an arrest report and didn't realize that the charges were related to the PACC, so that's why the report was not released right away," Shaw said. "We've since revamped that policy. I did speak to Mr. Bridgman over the phone regarding the violations around the time he requested it. I provided the report to him the day after the hearing."

In regards to other comments and concerns from Bridgman the officers on hand for the hearing were a little more direct, disagreeing with many of the conclusions that Bridgman made concerning the events of that night and what was stated by police at prior meetings discussing the issue. Shaw denied Bridgman's quoting of him saying there was no evidence of over pouring that night and clarified some of the statements made during the original hearing. Shaw said looking back at the meeting on YouTube he stated that over pouring and open container violations did contain probable cause and while the police did believe and find evidence

of underage drinking that night the bar was not held accountable for that at the time and still is not being charged with such violations.

As for the PACC being held accountable for the individual walking out of the bar with two open containers, Shaw believes the Webster Police acted according to traditional upholding of the town ordinance and the PACC being held accountable is not against normal practice in the town of Webster.

"I've been here 20 years. We've charged people with that numerous times in the past in similar circumstances. It's a civil violation so with what happens in court I can't track it if they dismiss it or not. I looked it up today and I don't know what happened to it. I'd have to go to the courthouse and find out. However, it doesn't change the fact that the person left the establishment with open containers of alcohol," Shaw said. "I know that the open container was the sole reason for the arrest. Were their tear gas and riot shields (to control the crowd)? No, of course not. But, I've been doing this job long enough to know all it takes is one mouth to get the crowd going. It doesn't take much. The individual was handcuffed by the officer for the purpose of being taken into protective custody because he was intoxicated and at that point he began fighting with police, which resulted in the disorderly conduct charge."

Sgt. Bobby Wheeler spoke from his experiences the night of the incident and challenges whether or not Bridgman and others truly saw everything that was happening in the parking lot that night.

"When I approached

the scene there were 100-plus people pouring out. There were pockets of people having altercations. It wasn't the fight that we were reported to be responding to, but there were altercations," Wheeler said. "If Mr. Bridgman was walking around the parking lot drinking a soda he would have seen me using my best command presence to break up these altercations and get people to clear the area. The individual that left the PACC stumbled over their front stairs. He walked out of the building with two beers. He didn't make it to a car. He didn't pick up the bottles in the parking lot. He stumbled out of the bar into my officer."

Wheeler also recalled following younger individuals from the bar to a nearby home known to be a housing location for Nichols students. He stated he found over 20 individuals, many who admitted to being underage, in a room in the home and that they admitted they had been drinking at the PACC. The youngsters were not charged as Wheeler said at that point they were more focused on making sure the situation was under control and everyone got home safely. Bridgman acknowledged that he did meet officers on duty that night in the parking lot and while he may disagree with exactly what violations took place, he gave significant credit to Webster and Dudley's officers for doing their job and doing it well.

Selectmen capped off the nearly half hour hearing responding to Bridgman's disagreements with the town ordinance concerning the consumption of alcohol in the parking lot and the PACC being held responsible for that act. Selectman Andrew Jolda presented a likely reason-

ing behind the violations and how they apply to the PACC incident.

"When you have a liquor license for serving at a bar or a restaurant the alcohol purchased at that venue is to be consumed on premises. The definition of the premises is defined when you submit your application to both the board and the ABCC," Jolda said. "Your premises does not extend into the parking lot unless you amend that in the description. So by leaving the door of the club that is where the problem is with the alcohol."

Bridgman said he agreed with Jolda but still disagreed with the punishment as he felt the parking lot was still private property and not town property, which is where he feels the jurisdiction of the ordinance ends.

In a unanimous vote among three selectmen, with Selectman Robert Miller excusing himself from the matter, as his wife is a member of the PACC and Selectman Mark Dowgiewicz abstaining from the vote due to his absence at past hearings, the Board of Selectman chose to uphold the suspension much to Bridgman's dismay. However selectmen did suggest that if Bridgman still disagreed with the decision he and the PACC could argue their case before the ABCC who could overturn the suspension themselves if they felt the town was out of line in their ruling. Bridgman had indicated at the meeting that this was a possible next step for him and the club.

## September is Peripheral Arterial Disease Awareness Month

SOUTHBRIDGE — Peripheral arterial disease (PAD) is a condition that develops when the arteries that supply blood to the internal organs, arms and legs become completely or partially blocked as a result of atherosclerosis. There are many possible side effects of atherosclerosis including angina and heart attacks if the coronary arteries are involved; strokes and transient ischemic attacks if the carotid and vertebral arteries are involved; and claudication, non-healing leg ulcers and critical limb ischemia if the lower extremity arteries are involved.

One in every 20 Americans older than 50 years of age have PAD. In all, PAD affects eight to 12 million people in the United States. Slightly more men than women have the disease. Common risk factors include high cholesterol, smoking, high blood pressure, diabetes, atherosclerosis and age. An estimated one out of every three people with diabetes over the age of 50 has PAD, making

it one of the primary co-morbidities of diabetes. Due to the prevalence of PAD, September was named Peripheral Arterial Disease Awareness Month by the US Senate in 2007.

Healthcare professionals use many avenues for diagnosing PAD such as medical history, tobacco use, physical exams and diagnostic tests. An ankle-brachial index (ABI) test may be performed, as well. An ABI test is painless and easy, and involves a comparison between a blood pressure reading in the ankles and a blood pressure reading in the arms. An ABI can help diagnose PAD, but it cannot identify which arteries are narrowed or blocked. A Doppler ultrasound test may be done to see which artery or arteries are blocked.

PAD poses particular problems for health care professionals and patients with chronic wounds. Chronic toe and foot sores are common in people with PAD, as are cramping, numbness, weakness or heaviness in the leg muscles.

Many patients with PAD do not experience symptoms. That's why The Wound Care Center at Harrington performs tests for PAD, treats chronic wounds which may have underlying conditions of PAD and counsels patients on how to manage PAD.

The Wound Care Center at Harrington recommends the following action steps to help manage PAD:

- Lifestyle changes such as quitting smoking, correcting blood pressure and cholesterol numbers
- Smoking, high blood pressure and high cholesterol are major risk factors for the development of PAD. Managing these conditions can help improve blood circulation.
- Develop healthy eating habits and an exercise plan
- Exercising can help increase the circulation and reduce pain in the lower extremities. Walking, hiking and bike riding are good exercise options. A personal trainer can help tailor a custom

workout plan that best fits a person's needs.

- Medications
- Always consult with a physician about which medications may help PAD and if they are needed.
- Special procedures and surgeries
- In some severe cases of PAD, surgery may be needed to open arteries that have narrowed. Consult with a physician to see if surgery is a necessary treatment.

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

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

She was born in Southbridge, a daughter of Albert O. and Cecile



Jim’s career followed admirably in the footsteps of his father, Colonel James L. Conrad Sr., who founded the school as a two-year college in 1931, and served as its president until 1966.

Amongst his many awards and accomplishments, he was a past member of the Webster Rotary Club, the Webster Jaycees, the Rhode Island Historical Society, the Dartmouth Club of Worcester, the Black Tavern Historical Society and a member of the Board of Overseers at Old Sturbridge Village.

Throughout his lifetime of achievements, however, Jim was first and foremost a quiet, kind and devoted husband, father, grandfather and friend, and will be sorely missed by his family and all who had the honor to have known him. # Senior Dogs Who Wet Their Beds

## What Pet Parents Of Senior Dogs Should Know

If you're like most dog owners, you've stumbled upon, or even into, a few urine "accidents" from time to time.

### WHAT CAN HAPPEN

Tom and Andrea Armstrong love their dog Clara, a delightful 8-year-old retriever who enjoys playing ball and snuggling. A few years ago, her family started finding wet spots in her bed. They were puzzled. Clara had been reliably house-trained, but now, when she got up, she would sometimes sniff her wet bed and sheepishly skulk away. She seemed to know she'd made a mistake. Her owners considered punishing her.

The Armstrongs did the right thing and took Clara to their veterinarian. A careful history revealed that this well-behaved dog leaked urine only when resting or sleeping, that she always passed a normal stream outside, and that she never strained. Suspecting an incontinence problem, her doctor explained the importance of ruling out other problems before prescribing treatment.

### WHY IT HAPPENS

It could be due to a number of reasons. Bladder stones and infections, kidney disease, diabetes, neurologic disorders and behavior problems are all

possibilities.

For a senior dog, it might be a behavior issue or age-related dementia or it may be entirely physical.

Also, nearly 20 percent of spayed female dogs leak while they sleep due to urethral sphincter hypotonus, often called spay incontinence. Some spayed dogs, most often middle-aged and older, don't produce quite enough of the female hor-

mone estrogen to maintain control of the sphincter muscle in their bladders. After drifting off to sleep, they leak. Some of them lick themselves to clean up the mess, leaving their skin reddened. Nobody's happy.

### WHAT THE VET CAN DO

Fortunately, nearly every affected dog who's treated does fine.

Veterinarians often prescribe the only nonhormone medical option, chewable Proin tablets from PRN Pharmacal, because they taste great and work well.

# Three Tips To Keep Horse Hooves Infection Free

(NAPS)

When it comes to keeping your horse healthy, hoof care is often a critical element so you can enjoy normal activities together, such as riding or competing. Properly maintained hooves are much less likely to develop bacterial and fungal infections; thus, horses can maintain normal hoof function.

### The Problem

Thrush, a bacterial infection, can be a common problem that resides in the "frog" of a horse's hoof. The frog refers to the dark-colored soft tissue on the bottom side of the foot that is triangular in shape, and stretches from a horse's heel to midway toward the toe. The bacteria that causes thrush thrives in unsanitary conditions like stalls, where dirt, debris and bacteria can get trapped in horses' feet. The preliminary sign of the condition is a strong odor coming from the hoof.

### THREE STEPS TO HEALTHIER HOOVES

There are several tips and strategies to manage and prevent thrush. Keeping the hoof and frog clean and free of bacteria is important, and this can be challenging in a barn envi-

ronment that is often wet and full of bacteria.

Certified Journeyman Farrier Tab Pigg recommends these three tips:

1. Clean the hooves daily with a hoof pick and clean wire brush; the pick removes the bulk and the wire brush removes residue.

2. Trim hooves on a regular schedule. Feet that go untrimmed longer than seven or eight weeks develop thin soles and a stretched white line, making it easier for bacteria to enter the hoof capsule.

3. Ask a farrier to use pour-in pads that adhere to the bottom of the foot to seal out moisture and debris. Pour-in pads are liquid urethane adhesives that provide durable, shock-absorbent support within the hoof capsule. This provides additional support for horses. Vettec Equi-Pak CS can be applied to the bottom of the horse's foot to eliminate the possibility of bacteria being trapped and causing an infection. Equi-Pak CS is a fast-setting, soft pad material infused with copper sulfate to effectively manage moderate cases of thrush.
