Every Monday through Friday, except holidays, Spencer's Howe Village kitchen and dining area are buzzing with the activity of volunteers. This place is the site for Spencer/East Brookfield's Meals on Wheels program, which serves between 40-50 people on four different routes. Nearly 20 volunteers in total make-up a different daily team that either provides lunch packing and sorting and/or delivery

to clients within the comfort of their homes.

Tri-Valley Elder Services, whose mission is to serve the elderly and disabled population by offering help to enable them to live independently and with dignity within their home or community, has been providing Meals on Wheels services to the greater Worcester area since 1977 and in Spencer since 1983. Meals on Wheels is one of Tri-Valley's most important programs. According to studies performed to measure Meals on Wheels' success, "Home delivered meals improve diet quality, increase nutritional intake, reduce food insecurity, and improve

Spencer names interim town administrator

SPENCER – With its choice for interim town administrator, the Board of Selectmen believes it has found a strong candidate whose leadership will help bridge the gap after Adam Gaudette's departure.

At its meeting last week, the Board appointed William Ross as Spencer's interim town administrator. Ross and town leaders agreed to a 6-month contract worth \$1,650 per week. He will work about 24

hours per week, officials said, which is standard for interim positions in smaller communities.

Ross previously served as the town manager in Mansfield, and Spencer leaders are thrilled to get an experienced leader who can maintain stability of services following Gaudette's seven-year career as town administrator. With the extensive road improvement projects underway in town, officials knew they had to find someone who can man-

age several major items while overseeing services.

"He came highly regarded from several people, and the board knows he has a lot of great experience," said Board of Selectmen Chairman Tony Pepe. "He is very laid back, and his personality fits in perfectly for this position."

One of Ross's most important objectives will be assisting town department heads with the continuation of services

Program takes visitors back to days of Grant

BROOKFIELD — For nearly three decades, Sam Grant has been bringing history to life with his re-enactments of Ulysses S. Grant's accomplishments. This Saturday, Merrick Public Library guests are invited to take a trip back to the Civil War era when Grant comes to town.

Set for Saturday, Sept. 23 at 1 p.m. at the library, the event will feature horses, a sidesaddle demonstration, interactive programs, and presentations on life during the Civil War, among others.

Grant and his wife, Julie, host dozens of educational programs each year at libraries and schools throughout the region. Having dedicated several years to studying the life of the 18th president, Grant enjoys holding history presentations and deepening students' knowledge into one of the most important periods of U.S. history.

For Grant, achieving the Ulysses Grant persona is easier than one might imagine – in fact, he doesn't even



have to change surnames. Many people even think he bears a striking resemblance to the former president and Union Army general.

"It's great to get out there and help young people get interested," Sam Grant told the New Leader. "Hopefully this will inspire kids to dig into history."

Grant's studies into the life of one of the nation's greatest soldiers and heroes soon became his passion, which evolved into portraying Grant's life through re-enactment. He has traveled as far as North Carolina and Ohio to spread his love of history.

After a brief introduc-

Labor of love: '54 Chevy ready to ride

SPENCER – After a lengthy journey that included thousands of miles and a three-year overhaul, a transformed half-ton pickup truck will soon be headed back to its Texas home.

The odyssey began back in October 2014, when Spencer's Louis LoSasso was asked if he would be interested in restoring a 1954 Chevrolet 3100 pickup truck. The classic truck belongs to Chet Gray, one of LoSasso's relatives through marriage who lives over 2,000 miles away in Midland, Texas.



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Public help with arrest of purse snatcher

A Worcester man was taken into custody by Leicester Police on Rt. 9 Sept. 13 after he assaulted a woman, stole her purse, and assaulted a male who came to the woman's aid.

The incident began at approximately 10 a.m. when the man approached a woman at the Leicester Wal-Mart, stole her purse and knocked the woman to the ground. As the suspect began to flee, a male standing near the woman attempted to intervene and he was also assaulted by the suspect who was able to flee from the store.

The suspect ran across the parking lot into the nearby woods and discarded his shirt. Another witness was able to follow the suspect in a motor vehicle

and monitor the suspect's location as he came out of the woods and crossed through the yards of several nearby residents.

An off duty police officer from another jurisdiction became aware of the incident and was also able to monitor the suspect's location.

As LPD units arrived, they were immediately directed to the suspect's location and he was taken into custody quickly by LPD officers without any further incident.

The suspect has been identified as: Wilfredo Rivera, age 31 of 25 Haynes St., Worcester;

He has been charged with the following offenses:

1. Unarmed robbery

2. Larceny from a person
3. Assault with intent to rob (unarmed)
4. Assault and battery on person over 60 years of age

He was booked at the Leicester Police Department Wednesday morning and transported to the East Brookfield District Court for arraignment. He was being held pending a dangerousness hearing early next week.

The Leicester Police Department would like to thank the male who intervened during the incident and the witness who, along with the off duty police officer, provided responding officers with the exact location of the fleeing suspect. All of you helped make this arrest possible.

the quality of life among recipients."

In addition to providing such services, volunteer drivers/delivery-persons also serve as a safety check and source of companionship to clients who may see no one else within the span of the day.

To be a recipient of Meals on Wheels' services, a client must be over the age of 60 and unable to prepare a nutritionally balanced meal themselves or be a younger person with disabilities, and their caregivers. Meals provided always include bread, milk and a dessert, and a tray stocked with a hot entrée and vegetables. The menu varies daily and can be found online or a copy may be acquired at Howe Village. Clients receiving meals automatically receive a copy of the menu at the beginning of each month.

Meals on Wheels also provides a cold supper and weekend and holiday meals depending on a client's needs and requests. Special diet meals, such as heart diet or diabetic diet are also provided. Finally, though there are no

income requirements to participate in Meals on Wheels, a \$3 donation per meal is suggested. However, no client is ever turned away from services if they cannot afford the donation.

For those able or wishing to socialize, Meals on Wheels also provides a congregate meal on site at Howe Village five days per week, Monday through Friday, at approximately 11:45 a.m. Again, those over the age of 60 are welcome to attend; however, spouses under age 60 are also welcome for the same suggested \$3 donation while those visiting guests under the age of 60 are required to pay for the meal. On average, volunteers serve 18 clients through the congregate meal.

Kevin Mahar, the Meals on Wheels Howe Village site manager, loves being able to serve local people in this way, but is also eager to add, "I have the best group of volunteers that anyone could ever want. We couldn't do this without them."

during this transition phase. He will work closely with several town leaders to ensure that services remain at a high level.

"This town is very fortunate to have great department heads who are very conscientious," said Selectman Warren Monette. "He has been doing this for a long time, and he brings a lot of experience to help keep everything going smoothly."

As Ross gets settled in at town hall, the search committee tasked with finding his successor is ramping up its activity. The committee is comprised of State Representative Donald Berthiaume and Frank White (citizens at large); Selectman Ralph Hicks; Finance Committee member Mary Braney; Capital Committee members Nancy Hurlholz and Christine Allesandro; and Planning Board member Maria Reed.

The search committee will spend the next few months gathering a pool of candidates for the next town administrator. They are seeking individuals who will not only be able to work well with town department leaders, but also a problem solver and strong leader.


If needed, Ross told town officials that he is prepared to stay in his role beyond six months.

In our current market this is probably the most important appointment that we go on. I think this is more cru-

cial to the seller of the home than the Home Inspection. The purpose of the appraisal is to confirm value and condition for the bank. The appraisal again is for the protection of the bank lending the money. They want to ensure they are making a good investment. Even if you are putting 20% down the bank is putting down the

other 80% on the home purchase. The guidelines for an appraisal are very stringent however they are also up for interpretation with each of the appraisers. For example, an appraisal for FHA, VA or USDA tend to be more strict on the condition of the building. They want to ensure no peeling paint, no safety issues and that all the utilities are in good working order. If you plan on making sure

there are no appraisal issues I recommend either having a Realtor that has experience with these appraisals or hire an independent appraiser to determine what items should be fixed so that there will be no issue with the appraisal.

The 2nd most important part of the appraisal in this market is the value. I have found that with our low inventory there are many times

that the it is difficult for the appraiser to find comparable homes thus causing the appraisal to sometimes come in low. Also, since the market has been increasing it is also important that the appraiser is adjusting for the increasing market value in the area by doing a time adjustment since homes that sold last fall sold for lower prices than today.

I highly suggest when

you decide to sell your home that you hire an experienced Realtor that knows your area. This way they can supply detailed information about upgrades to your home that will effect value as well as information about homes in the area that have sold that they have detailed knowledge about to the appraiser.

Book sale: something for everyone

LEICESTER – Turning the page to a new season and an important fundraiser, Leicester Public Library officials and patrons are gearing up for their annual book sale.

Hosted by the Friends of the Leicester Public Library, the event is one of two major annual fundraisers. This year's event will take place on Saturday, Sept. 30, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the library's temporary location (1 Paxton Street). The library always receives hundreds of book donations from residents each year, and officials are thrilled with the annual support for their event.

"We often get more books than we can put on display, at least initially," said library director Suzanne Hall. "A lot of times we end up putting other books out there once the first ones sell. We always get great support."

Prices at this year's sale are as follows: hardcover books (\$1); DVDs and audiobooks (\$2); music CDs (\$1); paperback books (50 cents). Donations can be dropped off any time the library is open.

Because the library does not have an annual municipal allocation for programming, it relies entirely on the Friends organization to fund its program budget and provide assistance

for other items as well. This places an added emphasis on fundraisers like the book sale each autumn.

"This is a very important event for us. We have about half a dozen dedicated volunteers who prepare for it, and another half dozen who run the event," Hall added.


In addition to its value as a fundraiser, the event also serves as a great recycling option, officials said. Rather than toss an old book into the garbage, it can be donated to the library and find its way into the hands of an interested reader for a new lease on life. Moreover, many of the books that aren't sold at

the event wind up being donated to the schools and Senior Center for reuse within town.

For library officials, it will be a little strange this year to host the event for the first time at their temporary location. The sale will take place in the barn at the 1 Paxton Street venue.

"We have always done it at the [main] library before, but we have adapted well to our new space," Hall said.

tion to Grant's life and the Civil War, the 19th century is then explored in detail at each presentation. In Brookfield, guests of all ages will even get to see what people dressed like at the time and watch equine programs as well. Though most people are aware of Grant's military expertise, his excellence as a horseman isn't as well known. With his presentations, Sam Grant attempts to convey all aspects of the general's life.

But what separates Grant from other presenters is the complexity of his knowledge. He has read countless memoirs and biographies, some a few times over, in addition to reading biographies on individuals who impacted

Grant's life.

"When people meet my husband, they are meeting someone who has studied the entire life of Ulysses S. Grant – not just the war," said Julie Grant, who lives in Townsend. "We love it when people ask questions at our presentations, and this should be a lot of fun."

The Sept. 23 program is free to the public. It is sponsored by the Quaboag Historical Society and the Brookfield Cultural Council.

In an effort to further bolster its lineup, the Senior Center is even considering additional intergenerational programs like a French speaking class. Of course, seniors always welcome students looking to get involved in service projects, or those who simply want to give back to their town. Most recently, Leicester High School senior and local Girl Scout Morgan Emery spent three months creating an entry garden at the center.

"We want to see kids continue to be motivated and get involved," Cloutier said. "We love having them at our center."

REPLACEMENT TEETH

Once the average American adult has reached age 50, he or she has lost 12 permanent teeth to decay, injury, or gum disease. It is important that these missing teeth be replaced so that the bite will not be altered and the jawbone will not weaken. In order to address all these potential adverse consequences of tooth loss, it is important to restore full function to the mouth and jaws. To this end, a dental implant is the preferred option for replacing a single lost tooth. When screwed into place in the jaw, a titanium implant acts as a replacement for the tooth root to which a porcelain crown can subsequently be attached. Implants look and feel natural.

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
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Hurricane Irma pets landing at Second Chance for adoption

EAST BROOKFIELD — Today another 68 cats are landing at Bradley International Airport on their way to Second Chance Animal Services from the devastated areas of Florida. These are not owned pets but pets that were already in shelters affected by Hurricane Irma.

"This is day two of getting these pets out of there so the shelters can recover and also make room for displaced pets so they can hold them hoping to find their owners" stated Sheryl Blancato, executive director. "Today it is all cats that are coming, yesterday it was all dogs. We expect more to come. The shelters down there were already full so getting these pets out is urgent. The shelters need time to fix any damage and get pets displaced in. This is the largest intake

at one time we have done from an emergency situation. We are an emergency partner for ASPCA as well as other groups and for Massachusetts emergencies. So we are able to mobilize quickly and take in these pets. The state mandates a 48 hour quarantine period for these pets. Once that is done, we will then put them all up for adoption. Since these are pets that were already in the shelters there, there is no wait time to try and find their owners. A few of the dogs we took in need medical care that will require surgery including a cherry eye, masses, etc. We have set up a gofundme page to help with these medical expenses as well as cost of care and houses for this. We are still continuing our normal operations as well so we have a lot of animals to take care of right now."

Second Chance Animal Services doesn't think this will be the last load of pets from the area. As the shelters down there deal with the displaced pets there will be more in need of being rehomed.

"We are ready to continue to help," Blancato stated. "We just sent truckloads of supplies to Texas a little over a week ago so we are now trying to replenish our emergency supplies for this project. No one would have thought there would be two major events in such a short time."


They will be posting updates on the pets on their Facebook

page. Once the pets are through with their 48 hour state quarantine period they will be put up for adoption.

"We have been asked several times if these pets have owners," stated Blancato. "These pets do not have owners looking for them as they were already in the shelters affected by the Hurricane. This is why we need to move these pets out so that the shelters can make space for the displaced pets to give the owners a chance to find them down there. We are grateful to the ASPCA that organized this transport down in Florida to get these pets out of harm's way and on their way to new homes. I commend them for their work as this is no easy task to organize a major airlift like this under these conditions and in such a short time. We are happy to be

a part of it."

Second Chance is a non-profit 501c3 tax exempt organization that began in 1999 in East Brookfield and relies solely on donations and grants to operate. The Shelter operates an adoption center in East Brookfield, a Pet Wellness and Veterinary Center in North Brookfield, as well as a Community Veterinary Clinic in Springfield and Worcester. Second Chance helps over 26,000 pets a year through adoption, spay/neuter, veterinary care, community outreach, educational outreach programs, training, and a pet food pantry. Innovation station for Prouty

SPENCER – A major transformation is nearly complete at David Prouty High School, with students eagerly awaiting the opening of an innovation lab.

Located in the school's former woodshop, the lab is on schedule for a ribbon cutting at the DPHS open house on Sept. 30. The lab will be a hub of STEM-related study throughout the year, but teachers of all subjects will be able to utilize its technologies, beginning next month.

"We are incredibly lucky to have this state-of-the-art learning facility right here at DPHS," said Principal Elizabeth York. "This is the kind of furniture and equipment you find at the college level, not in most high schools."

Brightly lit and spacious, the lab will boast Smartboards with cameras, adjustable work stations that can be raised and lowered via remote control, a 3D printer, and an iPad cart, among others. Teachers will reserve the space to facilitate an array of needs, particularly assignments that involve group

research. Catering to the emphasis on teamwork and project-based learning in STEM curriculums, each station provides space for group problem-solving and collaboration.

The goal is to empower students to work together to form strategies and learn by doing, rather than rely solely on traditional teacher and textbook instruction.

"It's important for our students to work in small groups to tackle problems and come up with solutions. That is what project-based learning is all about," York added.

Later this year, when the second semester begins, students will learn even more about collaboration by taking part in Larisa Schelkin's STEM instructional model. Having forged a lengthy career in engineering and research, Schelkin has since become one of the nation's leaders in STEM instruction. She regularly connects students from different continents in project-based learning through video chats, and now DPHS students will have the opportunity to get involved in

her framework.

Two DPHS teachers will begin piloting Schelkin's methods in January, with a goal of steadily expanding the program.

"We are going to start off small and hopefully have a full-scale rollout next year," York said of the program. "The kids are really excited about everything they will be learning in this lab."

The lab will also serve as a home base for the newest course added to the Prouty lineup: earth and space science. Taken in the sophomore year, the course will introduce students to everything from green energy solutions to astronomy. Not only will students learn about these concepts, but they will also use the 3D printer and other technologies to make models of problem-solving conceptions.

Model designs for a solar array or wind turbine, for example, could be 3D-printed and further explored. The lab will also assist teachers with professional development, and it could even be used for community purposes if the town and school identify a need. The

options are endless, officials said.

"We will constantly be tweaking and improving our programs to make sure we are offering the best opportunities to our students," York said.

Workers are almost finished installing the equipment in the lab, which will also feature repurposed lockers and a staging entry area.





Kuros announces bid for Register of Deeds position

UXBRIDGE — State Representative, Kevin Kuros will soon be hitting the campaign trail as he begins his bid for the Register of Deeds position in Worcester County. Kuros, has served the 8th Worcester District, which includes the towns of Blackstone, Millville, Uxbridge, and Bellingham, since 2010. Kuros will run against Anthony J. Vigliotti who has held the position of Register since 1972.

Kuros said of his decision to depart the state Legislature, "When I first ran for my seat, I said I felt 8-10 years would be the right run as state Rep. I am in my fourth term, and at the end of this term I will have been in this position for eight years. While many of my respected colleagues will disagree with me, my personal philosophy is that any sector and any industry benefit when new ideas find their way into the discussion."

He went on to say, "Prior to being elected to the Legislature, I was always professionally in an executive role, where I could make tough decisions and have them acted upon almost immediately. The greater sense of urgency in the private sector and in agencies like the Registry appeals to me."

The Register of Deeds is a vital position for the residents of Worcester County. Kuros explained, "The Registry is involved in every real estate transaction in the 55 Worcester County cities and towns it covers. When you buy or sell a property, you go to a 'closing'. In that closing, both parties sign a number of documents to transfer the ownership of

the property. Many of the documents are recorded and filed by the Registry. The Registry keeps the official record of property ownership. It also keeps track of who has a lien or liens against the property, including mortgage liens, municipal liens, etc. It is where deeds are filed. And it is where Homestead Act declarations are filed to identify your primary residence to provide a degree of shelter from creditors."

Kuros believes that his role as state Representative has well-prepared him for the new challenge.

"I spent my first six years in the Legislature as the ranking Republican on the Municipalities and Regional Government committee. That committee heard hundreds of bills over the years on items such as land usage, property owner rights, property disputes, subdivision definitions, zoning and other real estate-related topics."

Kuros added, "On a broader base, as a State Representative, I constantly get calls and emails when things don't go quite right with a government office or agency or program, underscoring the need for every government office to step up their game on customer service, accessibility to information, business processes, and anything else that can improve the customers' experience."

In addition to his four terms in the House, Mr. Kuros has a vast professional background in the private sector. He is certain that the combination of experience will help him be successful in the new role.

"The Register of Deeds is dramatically different from being

a State Rep, and not everyone who makes a good State Rep could be successful as the Register. If you think about it, the primary qualification to be a State Rep is to be a caring person who wants to help people, and many people from varied backgrounds can be spectacular State Representatives. However, critical operational positions like the Register of Deeds require specific skills. This position manages a budget and dozens of people. This position is involved in the single biggest transaction of everyone's lives. This position requires current, real life knowledge and understanding of real estate. And this position manages hundreds of thousands of records, so understanding information technology is paramount."

Kuros added, "Unlike most political elections, the campaign for this position very much has to be about substance over form. This is (admittedly) a non-glamorous position. It can't be about who has the flashiest billboards or signs. It has to be about the ability to perform the job on day one. And to that end, I feel I am the perfect candidate to suc-

ceed the incumbent who has held the position since 1972. I have been practicing real estate for 11 years, the last 8 ½ years as the broker / owner of a small firm. So I've got the current real estate, budgeting and management skills necessary to execute the position on day one. Professionally, I spent nearly 20 years working in information technology and management consulting, running a branch of a national consulting firm, and helping dozens of companies improve their IT and business processes. And I spent several years as a consulting contract specialist for the Department of Defense, so I understand the importance of accuracy in critical documents."

He went on to say, "This position is too import-

ant, with a potential to impact too many people, to trust to anyone who cannot check the appropriate experience boxes. My learning curve for the position will be very short."

Our schools aren't worse, just different

To the Editor:

As a young, married banker in the '70s, I found my family expenses were growing faster than my salary. In order to rectify the situation, I took a second job as a cashier at a clothing store. While working there, I met a young man working as a stock boy. His family moved from Italy to Argentina, where he was born, back to Italy and ultimately to Massachusetts as he entered to seventh grade. He spoke little English but had mastered Italian, Spanish, Portuguese and French. When he entered the ninth grade, he was an A student in every subject including English.

He was always criticizing his high school, his fellow students and his teachers. The class sizes were too large, most of the students were unprepared and the teachers were reluctant to move ahead for fear of leaving students behind. He was not eligible to take Advanced Placement course until his senior year so he was forced to endure the regular college prep courses. One day he told me about the schools back in Italy.

When students are about to enter first grade, they all take a test. There is a strict target grade and only the students that meet or exceed the target are permitted to enter first grade. Those who fall below the target enter a remedial school in an effort to correct any and all deficiencies. When students finish four years of study, they all take a test, including the remedial students. The

students that meet or exceed the target grade can start fifth grade and those that fall below the grade enter a vocational elementary school. The same process occurs after eight years with one difference – both schools give a test. The students at the middle school that meet or exceed the target grade go on to high school and those falling below enter the vocational secondary school along with those students that pass the vocational school test. The students that fall below the vocational target grade enter a work study program designed to give them a better chance to enter the work force in a position that suits their skill set.

People love to compare our US schools, teachers or students with other countries – we get ranked 10th, 15th or 20th in the world. They should consider the fact that we are the only country that requires all its students to remain in school until a certain age (it used to be 16 but that may have changed). Also consider that student athletes must stay in school in order to participate and, if good enough, go to the next level. In Italy, no sports are played in schools but rather as town teams. If only 20-30% of students enter high school it stands to reason that a very high percentage of them will be proficient compared to the proficiency of over 90% entering high school in the US. I hope we never change.

The world we knew

They say you can never go back, yet my sentimental mind and feet both found me there early one recent morning. Back to where it all started for me, that west-side neighborhood in Worcester. This was my home for over half my life — thus far — where my formal education began 50 years ago in early September, 1967. The calendar that month matched it this year, including Labor Day falling on Monday September 4.

So, I retraced my steps. From our house on Sorrento, up Grenada then down Copperfield Road, a distance of about a quarter mile to Tatnuck School. It was easy then except for the bossy girl, my neighbor Mary Anne, several years my senior and given charge of the small group line of grammar school students. She kept us all in line, literally! No school bus, just lots of walking to and from this neighborhood public school.

My morning Kindergarten teacher was a veteran old spinster named Edith Van Buskirk. We all simply called her "Miss Van". She was near retirement age when I showed up at her class in the newer wing of this old school that had been built several years before I was born. The original part of the school dates back to around 1900.

1967 was a year of discovery for me, leaving the familiarity of home for a few hours daily to begin a lifetime of learning. Indeed, in now walking those old familiar paths up to the steps of the numerous school doorways I had passed through so routinely reminded me of just how much the country has changed, and not all for the better. Teacher-led prayer had already been forced out of public-school classrooms by then, but we pledged allegiance to the flag each and every day. We sang patriotic songs,

Judeo-Christian songs at the appropriate times of the year, i.e. Hanukkah and Christmas, and occasionally were marshalled to march around the schoolyard to loud public-address music holding American flags to mark approaching holidays like Memorial Day, Flag Day (June 14th) and Veterans' (Armistice) Day (November

11th).

School shootings were virtually non-existent. Our parents didn't worry about us being abducted on our way to or from school, and those ancient solid dark-green wooden school doors were usually unlocked during school hours and even wedged wide open in the warmer weather to facilitate natural cooling inside. It was not unusual to see an occasional local drunkard, or outside visitor to the school's library, inside the building, sometimes for shelter from the weather outside. Many of the west-side residents voted at this school during elections.

No longer is that permitted!
 Just witnessing the old school's newer high-tech metal security doors confirmed that those days are long gone, probably forever. We live in a far more dangerous albeit technologically-advanced world now. As I walked back to my car and left the site of our old homestead, I thanked God for my wonderful parents and my life growing up in a relatively care-free world (for me, anyway) that can no longer be taken for granted. Indeed, while we've achieved much as a country in a half century, I cannot help but feel that we've lost something far more precious and essential to our very sense of national identity, cohesiveness and survival. It was, nevertheless, a pleasant familiar stroll rich with memories of so many dear people and things now passed.

Fast fixes for flea market finds

The hunt for collectibles, whether it begins in your own backyard or across the country, is such a thrill that it's no wonder flea marketing for vintage treasures has become a popular pastime. But as we fill the house, barn and attic with cast-offs too great to resist, the challenge of caring for them can become an overwhelming responsibility. Hot on the heels of the recent Brimfield antique market, this week's column will focus on some creative and clever ways to make care of your collectibles less of a chore, which translates into more time to enjoy your fabulous finds!

Note: Only use these meth-

ods with a "nothing to lose" attitude, as there is no guarantee the fix will work!

There are a few theories on how to best repair a warped vinyl record album, but this method is by far the quickest.

Place the album between two sheets of glass and cook it on a baking sheet in a warm oven (160-175 degrees) for 6-10 minutes. Allow to cool and check the warp. If it needs more pressing, repeat procedure with the oven a few degrees higher until the heat

before warming it up via either method.

Antique pewter can be successfully cleaned without the use of harsh (and expensive) chemicals. Try this "green" method to safely spruce up pewter: Dissolve one teaspoon salt in one cup white vinegar. Add enough flour to make a

paste. Apply paste to pewter piece and allow to sit for up to an hour. Rinse with clean warm water, and polish dry.

Parchment lampshades are fabulous flea market treasures. However, cleaning the aged paper can be a challenge. To dust, take a new foam paintbrush slightly dampened and work your way around the shade both inside and out. For cleaning, experts advise wiping the shades carefully with a cloth soaked in milk. Wipe it dry with a clean cloth. Note: Be sure to test these methods in an inconspicuous area and allow to dry before treating the entire shade.



Fall is the season for foraging

If desiring a different kind of outdoor adventure in the beauty of the late summer weather and woods try foraging for mushrooms. Central Massachusetts mushroom season in our area begins in summer and continues, usually, until mid-September. Because of the rainy spring and early-mid summer, conditions have been perfect for exploring and foraging the fungi.

Chanterelles. Chicken of the Woods. Hemlock Varnish Shelf. Many vari-

eties of mushrooms can be found in our region of New England. Some are medicinal, others are edible, and still others are used for dyeing fabric and paper. Most importantly though, many are very poisonous; therefore, it is not recommended that you harvest with the intention of ingesting them. Many mushrooms listed as edible in other regions are not edible in our region. Unless foraging with an expert and cross-referencing with many guide books, never ingest any wild mushroom!



Finding mushrooms is a bit like being a detective, adding to an adventurous spirit while in the woods. Some hints to finding one of nature's most interesting growths: most of this area's mushrooms can be found on the bark of hardwoods, such as oak, or within conifer forests, among the birch family and within maple groves; however, some also grow in the open, such as in fields, pastures, or recently tree-harvested clearings. Still, other types of mushrooms can be found on rotting logs, and many lay hidden among leaves or within the center of a stump. If picking for identification, it is important to note that a specimen should only be picked with an open cap. Mushrooms picked in the budding stage can be easily misidentified.

Tools to help in foraging are essential. First, having a long stick or cane is helpful when pushing aside leaves to reveal the gems underneath.

Another imperative tool is a knife, for slicing the stem just above the ground, so as not to disturb the mycelium, or root system, which would inhibit further growth for another season.

Also, a basket or other breathable item such as a paper bag rather than a plastic bag for collecting specimen should be carried. Aeration is import-

ant once the mushroom is picked. Plastic allows for bacteria growth and rot, which could change the mushroom before identification.

Finally, other necessary tools to assist in the hunt are a magnifying glass; field guide such as National Audubon's Field Guide to North American Mushrooms or Edible and Medicinal Mushrooms of New England and Eastern Canada; gloves which prevent poison ivy contamination; bug spray; a backpack; sturdy shoes; a GPS or cell phone, and a water bottle, depending upon the time of year, time of day, and length of time of the forage.

Once collecting is complete, make spore prints on black or white paper or glass to further determine the mushroom's physical structure. Every aspect of the mushroom's structure will enable more easily identification.

Because many mushrooms are very close in appearance, making prints is necessary to the process of identification.

Finally, as with all outdoor treks, try to leave the environment undamaged when leaving the area, keeping the area as beautiful and seemingly untouched as upon arrival.




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

Determined after slight district tourney miss, Leicester now 3-1 after downing Pirates

OXFORD — Eighteen points through 18 regular season games is the threshold for being included in the Central Mass. sectional high school field hockey tournament, and last season Leicester High's varsity team eclipsed 17, finishing a point shy at 8-9-1.

"We all had a bitter taste in our mouths from last year because we just missed districts by a point," explained second-year head coach Katie LaPrad. "We all sat down preseason and everyone set a personal goal and a team goal. And they all want to make it to districts."

The Wolverines are off to a hot start in 2017, which is a good sign in terms of completing their goal. After losing to North Brookfield High, 1-0, in the season opener, Leicester has rattled off three straight victories, the latest of which being a 3-0 decision over Oxford High on Friday, Sept. 15. Two days prior the Wolverines topped Tantasqua Regional, 1-0, for a big-time statement win.

"We have a great group of girls this year and a lot of really good leadership on the team," said LaPrad while pointing out her four seniors: Grace Marc-Aurele, Michaela Davenport, Lauren St. John and Cammy Whitcomb.

In their matchup with the Pirates, Leicester got on the board first with 8:05 to play in the opening half. That was when Ally O'Neill took a shot toward the cage, which was saved by Oxford's Nickole Biedrzycki. But Taylor Fontaine collected the rebound and scored.

The halftime score remained 1-0, but the Wolverines wasted little time doubling their advantage. Only a few minutes into the second half, Fontaine fed Hannah DiPilato a pass and her shot got past Biedrzycki to make it 2-0.

Then, midway through the second half, Leicester upped the lead to 3-0 when Fontaine made a tremendous no-look, left-to-right pass that hit Marena Matavao's stick in stride. Matavao then shot the ball into the left-hand corner of the cage for the game's final tally.

Colleen Lamprey made a pair of saves to pick up the shutout for the Wolverines, who are excited about their 3-1 start to the season.

"We really broke a lot of bad habits so now they know what to expect," said LaPrad, as she and JV coach Kathryn Stewart are both working together for the second straight year. "They had a great offseason and started doing some strength and conditioning and some weight training."

And Leicester now has a handful of girls who can get goals instead of just one go-to scorer, which pleases LaPrad.

"I have multiple girls who have scored already, so it's exciting that we have more than one goal scorer on the team. That's what it's been like in the past, we've had one girl who's really scored all of them," she said.

Oxford, meanwhile, dropped to 0-3 as first-year head coach Lauren Drew noted that the team may suffer through growing pains this season.

"We lost five seniors last year, so it is kind of a rebuilding year," said Drew, who served as the team's assistant coach in 2016, her first with the program. "We have a lot of fresh faces, a lot of eighth graders."

One of the fresh faces is Meghan Pini, the Pirates' JV coach. Between Drew (Westfield State) and Pini (Worcester State), Oxford has plenty of experienced

coaches that played at the collegiate level.

Biedrzycki stood out for the Pirates in a losing effort. She made 21 saves throughout the game to keep her team in it. In fact, Biedrzycki has stopped 53 of the 64 shots blasted her way this season, as Oxford also lost to Grafton High (5-0) and Doherty High (3-1).

And Biedrzycki is making all those saves playing as a freshman, and the goalie position is all relatively new to her.

"Last year we had a senior goalie and she got hurt in a game and we did not have a backup goalie. Nickole, she was in eighth grade at the time, stepped up and said that she had played [goalie] in indoor," explained Drew. "She took that girl's equipment and halfway through the season she was the starting varsity goalie last year."

Biedrzycki is now honing her craft and becoming a better goalie.

"She went out and bought her own equipment. She'll do whatever you ask of her," said Drew. "She's aggressive, and I like it."

CHARLTON — Jesse Torres rushed for two touchdowns and passed for another as the Bartlett High varsity football team jumped out to a 20-point second quarter lead and then hung on for a 28-21 win over Bay Path Regional, spoiling the Minutemen's Homecoming festivities.

With an overflow crowd jammed into every nook and cranny of George L. Fowler Memorial Field on Saturday, Sept. 16, the senior gained 121 yards on 13 carries and scored on touchdown runs of 27 and 33 yards to lead the Indians, who rolled up more than 300 yards of total offense.

"Jesse is a phenomenal athlete," said Bartlett head coach Dane Laboissonniere, whose

team improved to 2-0. "The one thing about Jesse that has impressed me is that his vision is incredible. He sees the hole very well and he sets up his blocks very well; he's a very instinctive football player. We know when we put the ball in his hands it's going to yield a positive result. That's very encouraging when you're a coach."

Torres was especially instrumental in Bartlett's ability to jump out to a 20-0 lead with less than two minutes left in the second quarter. He scored his 33-yard touchdown on the first drive of the game, leaping over a would-be tackler on his way to the end zone. A Darius Givins conversion run gave Bartlett an 8-0 lead with 8:33 left to play in the first quarter.

Givins (10 carries, 51 yards)

extended the Indians' lead to 13-0 with 10:06 left in the first half when he plowed his way into the end zone from two yards out. With 1:35 left in the half Bartlett found the end zone again on a 35-yard half-back option pass from Torres to Romeo Soto, to increase its lead to 20-0.

Laboissonniere was happy to be up by three scores but knew the game was far from over.

"We prepared all week knowing they are a great team," he said. "We went in feeling we were the underdogs, going to their place on Homecoming with four starters out. For our guys to step up shorthanded like that I knew at some point, with the amount of guys we had running both ways, fatigue could set in. We gave up a couple of big plays at times when we needed to make a play, but hats off to the Bay Path players, they made plays happen and we didn't. They fought their way back into the game."

Bay Path (1-1) finally got on the board with 12 seconds left before intermission when quarterback Christian Keeler bulled into the end zone from a yard out to cap an eight-play, 65-yard drive.

"I don't think that we adapted to the speed and power that their offense had right away," Bay Path head coach Matt Fall said. "We had to get up to game speed and I think that happened more in the second quarter. Getting that touchdown late in the second quarter and being able to say, 'guys, we're down 21-6, we're two scores away,' was a good momentum builder at halftime; it was something to build on. We came out in the second half and we were able to hold them to just one score, but in the end we just ran out of time."

The score just before halftime certainly seemed to breathe life back into the Minutemen, who cut the Bartlett lead down to 21-13 with 2:05 left in the third quarter on a seven-yard touchdown run by senior Pat Dyer (17 carries, 140 yards) and an extra point kick by Jake Leone.

Bartlett pushed its lead back to 15 points, 28-13, when Torres scampered in from 27 yards out with 2:54 to play and then added the two-point conversion run as well.

Bay Path refused to go qui-

etly, however. The Minutemen took the ensuing kickoff, marched downfield and scored to pull within 28-19 when Keeler hit Daniel

After Bay Path's onside kick attempt failed, the Bartlett offense picked up a first down and then ran out the clock.

"Penalties are part of the game; rules are rules. The refs have got to call it the way they see it," he said. "The frustrating part for us is we committed some untimely penalties. We finally get some rhythm going and we get called for a block in the back on a block that wasn't necessary

to throw. So the frustration for us isn't with the officials, it was the timing of some of our penalties."

"Everybody's on board with moving the ball well," he said. "We all know it's going to lead to more goals. I thought we moved the ball around really well today."


Dan Rickson scored off an assist from Tyler Rodriguez in the 45th minute to push the Tantasqua lead to 5-0.

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Fall weather and hunting dogs; a match made to please

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Upland bird hunting is only a few weeks away, and sportsmen are eager to get their first opportunity at hunting a few pheasant over their bird dog. Pointing dog or flushing dog, the excitement of a bird exploding from cover over a good bird dog can have the hunters' adrenalin pumping. Not all bird dogs are pedigree, but if they are given the opportunity to hunt, and have a bit of training, they too can surprise any hunter. One local hunter trained a Doberman to hunt pheasant and he did it well. Unfortunately, the dog passed away after an accident while out training in local covers recently. No words can describe the pain of losing a pet and hunting companion.

I have talked with many sportsmen over the years about dogs being injured while hunting, and it is a lot more common than you may think. Severe accidents can cause all types of permanent injury for dogs and taking them to a veterinarian can be costly. Keeping your dog safe from injury is not easy, but it is the chance you take every day you exercise them, or go

hunting! Hunting birds around hunters that do not own a dog can be very dangerous. Not all, but many hunters shoot the birds on the ground, as pheasant rarely flush if they are not being pointed or chased by a dog. If your dog is in the area, there is a high risk that your dog could be injured. No bird is worth the risk!

Unfortunately, a few hunters are disrespectful of our hunting areas over past years and leave empty bottles and cans behind during their hunting activities. Numerous bottles are broken and cause a serious problem for dogs that are hunting in the area every year. Having your dog step on a broken piece of glass can end a dog's hunting season. Cans also have sharp edges on them and can cause injury. Hopefully some of our readers will read this column and think twice about throwing their unwanted trash onto the ground. Please do not do it! It is also the fastest way to get private land posted.

There are three types of hunters that own dogs. One is a hunter that enjoys hunting

over a dog, but rarely spends time with them during the off season. Many times it is not by choice. Then there is the hunter that owns a dog for a pet and also hunts them, giving them more attention during the off season. The third is a hunter the spends a lot of time with his dog, taking them out every day, and treats them as one of the family. The bond and love of their four legged friend is unconditional.

You only get out of your dog what you put into them. It is great to watch a well trained dog in the field, and it is even more exciting to have one of your own to hunt over. Numerous bird hunters in the area have purchased a new hunting companion for this year's hunting season, and they are excited to start the training process. Having an experienced dog trainer to help in his or her first lessons can be very helpful and can alleviate serious problems down the road.

Goose hunting is providing some early shooting opportunities in the area. Numerous flocks of Canada geese are in the area, and if you can locate a good spot to hunt, you can have a great time in the field. Having a good retriever like a Labrador, Springer or Britney spaniel, will make the hunt even more enjoyable. Sitting in a goose blind surrounded by a set of decoys in the early morning hours with your

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Up, up and away with comic books

I've touched upon comic books in previous columns but they are such a hot collectible, they deserve a column of their own. As with baseball cards, most people didn't expect comic books to be valuable in future years and most were thrown away. Many people that I meet with realize that their gold bracelet could be valuable or that the signed painting from the 1800s in their living room may be desirable. Many tend to overlook ephemeral items like comic books though.

Comic books don't have the rich history of most of the objects discussed in this column. Comic books were preceded by pulp magazines which date back to 1896 according to the Pulp Magazines Project. Pulp magazines were cheap to buy, many were poorly written and they were printed on low grade pulp paper. Many that survived today are in brittle condition because of the poor paper quality. There were poorly written pulp magazines, but some contained articles

written by great authors like Jack London, H.P. Lovecraft and Edgar Rice Burroughs. Pulp magazines generally don't have the same value as comic books. At a recent auction, we sold copies of "The Shadow" that brought close to \$1,000 per lot (slightly over \$50 each).

Comic books were first published while pulp magazines were still in their heyday. "Funnies on Parade" was the first comic produced in 1933. The Golden Age of comic books took place from 1938 until 1950 or 1956 (depending on the source) and it is when superheroes first appeared. In 1938 Action Comics # 1 was printed and Superman became the first comic superhero. 1940 saw the first appearance of Batman and Robin.

The Silver Age took place from 1956 to 1970. The University of North Carolina Charlotte's comic book timeline lists some of the most important events during the Silver Age of comics. The Flash and the Green Lantern were reintroduced in 1956 from the Golden Age. Marvel Comics became a force in comic books when they introduced the Fantastic Four in 1961.

The Bronze age took place from 1970 to 1985. The timeline lists other important events. Stories grew darker when Spider-Man's girlfriend, Gwen Stacy, is killed in one of the issues. Black and female protagonists start to play larger



roles. Licensed products like t-shirts and action figures help increase comic book companies' profits.

The Modern age from 1985 to the present depicted "gritty realism" while experiencing declining sales.

If you have comic books, there are a few things that you should look for. As with any other antique or collectible, condition is important. Age also matters. There are fewer Golden Age comic books and as a result, they command the strongest prices. Superhero

comic books have much higher value than other types of comic books. Some comic book issues are valuable because an event that collectors find significant took place. For example, Amazing Fantasy # 15 is sought after because it was the first appearance of Spiderman. High grade copies of Golden Age or Silver Age superhero comics can easily bring hundreds or thousands of dollars. A perfect copy of Action Comics # 1 can sell for \$1 million or more. That could buy you almost anything, short

of super powers.

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Do this fall yard work and reap springtime benefits

Lots of people think that their family yards need less attention in the fall, but autumn is no time to ignore your lawn and landscape.

"What you do now will determine the quality of your family yard next spring and summer," said Kris Kiser, president and CEO of the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI), the international trade association representing more than 100 power equipment, engine and utility vehicle manufacturers and suppliers.

"Every gardener knows to plant bulbs in the fall, but autumn is also the time to mow, mulch, aerate, trim and patch your lawn," said Kiser. He offers the following tips to help you get your yard into top shape this fall and ready for more relaxing and fun outdoor activities next year.

Keep mowing. Grass still needs regular care to stay healthy. Grass that is too high may attract lawn-damaging field mice. Shorter grass is more resistant to diseases and traps fewer falling leaves. Cutting the grass low allows more sun to reach the crown of the grass, so less leaf will turn brown in the winter. However, cutting off too much at one time can be damaging, so never trim more than a third of the grass blades off in a single cutting. Put mower blades on the lowest set-

tings for the last two cuts of the season.

Aerate your lawn. Compressed soil hurts grass health. Aerating punches holes into the soil and lets oxygen, water and nutrients into a lawn. Use a walk-behind aerator or get an attachment to pull behind a riding mower.

Mulch your leaves. Many mowers can mulch leaves with an attachment. Since mulching with a mower can mix grass clippings with leaf particles, these nitrogen-rich grass particles and carbon-rich leaf particles will compost more quickly. Together,

they return nutrients to the soil.

Trim and shore up trees and bushes. Use trimmers, chainsaws or pole pruners to cut back trees, shrubs and plants. Make sure branches are safely trimmed back from overhead lines, and not in danger of falling on a structure in winter weather. You may need to tie or brace limbs of upright evergreens or plants to prevent them from breaking in high winds or snow. Call a professional arborist for big trees or hard to reach spots.

Repair bald spots. Fall is a great time to patch

bald or thin spots in a lawn. The easiest way to do this is with an all-in-one lawn repair mixture (found at most garden shops and home centers). Use a garden rake or de-thatcher to scratch loose the soil on the spot.

Kiser also added it is important to follow safety procedures whenever using outdoor power equipment. Read your owner's manual. It will describe the individual requirements for your particular machine, and will provide directions on which fuels may be appropriate for your product. Fuels containing more than ten per-

cent ethanol should not be used unless directed in the owner's manual.

He said, "You'll also want to service and winterize your lawn mower, string trimmer, leaf blower, and other outdoor power equipment."

And, remember, most gas-fueled outdoor power equipment is warranted and designed to run on E10 (10% ethanol) fuel or less. There are fuel options available today that should not be used in your outdoor power equipment. Remember 'look before you pump.' And, make sure to drain the fuel tank before storing equipment for the

winter. Dispose safely of any fuel that is more than 30 days old.

"Winterization is important for outdoor power equipment. When everything is growing again in the spring and you see how all of your hard fall lawn work has paid off, the last thing you want to deal with is a malfunctioning mower," said Kiser.

Day by day, part by part, the truck gradually began to return to its image from six decades ago. If one didn't know any better, it might be assumed that LoSasso used a time machine on the truck in lieu of tools.

"It's not my truck, but I built it as if it were my own," said LoSasso, who put about 850 hours and \$80,000 in parts into the restoration.

"I have worked on this truck day and night, and

I can't wait to return it to him. This has always been a Texas truck, and now it's going back home."

Gray will travel to central Massachusetts next month to see the truck on display at a classic vehicles show in Brimfield. After the long-awaited reunion, the truck will then be shipped back to Texas looking completely different than it did three years ago.

Having worked on vehicles throughout his career, LoSasso was the perfect man for the daunting restoration job.

He performed all of the electrical and mechanical work on the truck, painstakingly reconstructing the engine and interior from a shop in his Ethier Drive garage. This required sealing several wiring openings that came with the original factory-built design, then devising ways to allow the truck to retain its classic look while supporting modern amenities.

The truck features new wheels, upholstery, and even Blue Tooth radio and other technologies. The retooled engine can

easily enable highway speeds and precision handling, but the truck still looks like it did back in 1954.

"The old cars and trucks have character, not like vehicles nowadays where everything looks the same and you can hardly tell them apart," added LoSasso, who completed almost the entire restoration himself, with only the body work and painting outsourced.

"I grew up with these old vehicles, back when you could easily tell the difference between a

Ford and a Chevy."

LoSasso has sent photo updates of the truck to Gray throughout the restoration process, but nothing beats seeing its fresh paint and stainless steel gleam in the sun. LoSasso regularly brings the truck to local vehicle shows, and it has impressed judges enough to earn seven trophies at eight events. Having already appeared at shows in Whitinsville and Worcester, among others, the truck will head to Brimfield next month to wow New England guests one final

time before ultimately returning home.

For LoSasso, who has spent almost as many hours working on the truck as students spend in the classroom during an entire school year, it's exciting to complete the project and send the rig on its way.

Looking ahead, he'll turn his attention to the next restoration challenge this fall, with his eye always on the end result.

Old wicker baskets can be fragile. To safely clean them without cost (and effort) simply bring them into the bathroom with you the next time you take a shower. The hot, moist steam hydrates the baskets and prevents them from splitting. Just wipe them clean.

While some scratches and dings add to the charm of a vintage furniture piece, wood surfaces with deep gouges call for repair. Such defects are easily and inexpensively fixed with a wax stick or crayon in a color close to the wood (and a little elbow grease). Heat up the wax or crayon with a hair dryer and when pliable force it into the crack. For larger gouges melt the candle and carefully pour to fill the cavity. Allow to set, then wrap a lint free rag around a sanding block and rub the repair to make it even with the wood.

If you display Hummels or other small knick knacks on a shelf and find them difficult to dust, try this renovator's tip to prevent damaging the vintage valuables: Apply a dab of dental wax on the bottom of each object to stick them to the surface. This way, you can easily dust the area with a feather duster without the risk of knocking over the items.

To remove the musty smell from an old trunk or dresser drawer, try this old-fashioned method: Fill the item with fresh grass clippings and close tightly. Stir the grass each day for a week. The chlorophyll from the grass absorbs the smell. Or, fill the drawer with an open can of used coffee grounds for several days.

Rust spots are a common stain on vintage linens. To remove the spots, mix up a past of salt and white vinegar and apply to the stain with a toothbrush until spot is gone. Rinse thoroughly. To whiten aged doilies soak them in a solution

of three parts water and one part white vinegar.

Old aprons and pre "permanent press" items often require proper starching. Here's an old fashioned mixture for spray starch that grandma made for pennies, and it just as useful today: In a large spray bottle, mix together one heaping tablespoon corn starch and two cups cold water. Shake until thoroughly blended. If you want to add a touch of freshness to your starch, add a couple drops of non staining lavender oil. Shake before each use, and spray items before ironing.

Aged, delicate chains can easily become knotted, especially in a jewelry box. To untangle a knotted necklace chain, place a few drops of cooking oil on a piece of waxed paper. Lay the knot in the oil and use two common pins to work it loose.

An ounce of prevention...
*Don't display your vintage dishes on plate hangers unless the clips are covered to prevent

scratches on china and porcelain plates.

*Prevent marble damage by keeping marble tables and sculptures away from fireplaces or heaters. The marble can discolor from smoke and could even crack if located too close to a heat source.

*Have an old barometer? Mercury will expand or contract according to temperature. To retain the accuracy of mercury barometers, they should not be positioned too close to central heating radiators.

*Never store antique glass ornaments in a damp basement or attic. Mildew can form and damage the glass.

*Prevent fading of vintage tin signs by avoiding the ultraviolet rays of the sun and fluorescent lights, both of which will fade tin pieces.

*Toys with batteries should only be stored with batteries removed. Be sure to check for corroded cells in old toys that have been in storage.

convenience of a South County mobile registry location for the busy end-of-month closing days, saving everyone involved the hour round trip to/from Worcester. Imagine a mobile app to allow easy access to registry documents. These are the types of things a Kevin Kuros-led registry will bring."

Kuros, who has never missed a vote in all of his four terms (1600 straight votes and counting), said it was a difficult decision to leave Beacon Hill. "I love my job and take it seriously. I love the way hundreds have opened their hearts and homes to me over the years. I am blessed having been elected four times as State Rep, to be able to recognize my constituents when they have milestones, receive awards, celebrate victories, mourn losses. I will miss the debate with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle, sometimes intense, but always respectful. I will

miss the policy-wonkish side of government. I will miss finding the beauty of common ground on specific issues with colleagues who I may differ with significantly philosophically." He added "What I won't miss is the glacial pace at which things move. I have always had an executive mindset, which is to make a decision and have it acted upon. And while the legislature is intentionally designed to be deliberative and not reactive, it could accomplish so much more with a heightened sense of urgency."

Many residents in the 8th district were surprised at Kuros' decision to leave Beacon Hill.

"There has been an outpouring from many of my constituents, wishing me well but expressing sadness that I'll be leaving the legislature. It makes you feel good about the work you've done and the way you've interacted with people. I've been reassuring my constituents that nothing changes between now

and January of 2019, and that I and my aide Amanda Copeland are still there for them."

Surprisingly, Kuros' greatest accomplishment as a State Representative had little to do with legislation or policy. He explained, "One evening at office hours, a middle aged homeless man came in to speak with me. He was living on the railroad tracks and dumpster-diving for food. He was thin, disheveled, unhealthy, and at the end of his rope. We were able to work with the Senior Center, the police department, the town manager, the St. Vincent de Paul Society and others and get him off the street and into public housing. Today he is happy and healthy and has a safe roof over his head. It's the unglamorous aspects of the job that are so rewarding. Over the years we've helped hundreds of constituents with issues involving MassHealth, unemployment claims, elder care, the RMV, disability services, licensing and other agencies. But I'd have to say knowing you've helped

change the course of someone's life would probably be my top memory."

Kuros will face off with Vigliotti on the ballot in the fall 2018 election.

"While this election is more than a year away, and it's for a position that many people are unfamiliar with, I wanted to get an early start to educate the public about its importance, and why I feel my real-world experience and credentials are a perfect match to succeed the long-serving incumbent. For more information, I encourage people to visit my website at www.kevinkuros.com/deeds."

But Representative Kuros might not be alone. State Representative Kate Campanale (R-Leicester) has indicated that she is considering the run as well.

"This is an opportunity that I have been exploring", Campanale said. "I think it might be a good chance for me to expand my public service to Worcester County. While I am still in that exploratory phase, I do plan on making a decision in the coming weeks."

Creative ways to recycle leaves

Leaves cascading down from trees indicate the arrival of autumn. However, colorful and awe-inspiring autumn leaves can be a hazard if left to lie on the ground too long.

Fallen leaves form a dense insulator to protect trees' roots and prevent competing plants from growing. Decomposing leaves also provide nutrients for the tree. But wet leaves can be a safety hazard and leaves left on the lawn through the winter can pose a threat to the grass. These are just a couple of reasons why so much effort is placed on leaf clean-up in the fall. The following are some creative ways to recycle leaves that fall from your trees in the weeks to come.

• **Mulch:** Shredded leaves can make for a great amendment to fertilizer for garden beds and even the lawn. Leaves lying on the grass can be mulched into small pieces with a mulching mower so they don't choke the blades of grass. Leaves also can be broken down with a string trimmer, a leaf blower that has a vacuum function or a commercial shredder/chipper. Add the shredded leaves to a compost pile or use them to fill container plants before adding regular potting soil.

• **Insulation:** Collect leaves



to mound over delicate perennial plants and shrubs. The leaves will add more warmth to the soil and may help plants make it through harsh winters. Just remove the leaves slowly when spring arrives so that the soil underneath can get the sunlight and water it needs to thrive. Leave some leaves in

the yard so that animals can use them as nesting material and line their dens for the winter.

• **Stuffing:** Create whimsical scarecrows as part of your autumn decoration scheme. Gather older clothes that you no longer use and stuff the sleeves of shirts and the legs

of pants with leaves, which are less expensive and easier to come by than straw. Use a few pieces of straw around the neck and hand areas of the scarecrow for visual effect. Tie off with twine and display your scarecrow.

• **Bedding:** Chicken owners can use fallen leaves as bed-

ding in their chicken coops. Dry leaves also may create more comfortable and drier conditions for goats and other livestock. Goats may look to recently fallen leaves as a nutritious food source. Gather the leaves and let the goats munch before you further rake and compost the leaves.

• **Decorations:** Natural leaves can be used as decorations both inside and outside a home. String freshly fallen leaves together and wrap them around a grapevine wreath for a rustic door decoration. Leaves can be placed in clear vases and put on display for a cheap way to showcase some autumn color. Preserve favorite leaves with a lamination machine or by sealing them between heated sheets of waxed paper. Cut out the leaf shapes and use for hanging window decorations.

• **Recreation:** Leaves have long been favorite toys for children, who eagerly await jumping into large piles of fallen leaves. Fill paper bags with leaves and draw a target on the front. Let kids test their skill aiming for the targets. Children can camouflage their clothing with leaves and masking tape and have a more intense session of "hide and seek."

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, well-designed landscapes can save homeowners enough energy to make the projects pay for themselves in less than eight years. The DOE notes that homeowners' landscaping strategies should be dictated by the climates in which they live. For example, homeowners who live in hot, arid regions

should employ landscapes to shade their homes' walls, windows and roof, while those who live in cool regions should make sure their landscapes are not blocking the winter sun from reaching their homes' south-facing windows. The DOE also advises that shading is the most cost-effective way to reduce solar heat gain in a home, noting that well-planned landscapes can reduce

previously unshaded homes' air conditioning costs by as much as 50 percent. The DOE also notes that, in tree-shaded neighborhoods, summer daytime air temperature can be up to six degrees cooler than the air temperature in treeless areas. Homeowners considering adding trees to their landscapes should know that deciduous trees shed their leaves annually, which means they will

block solar heat in the summer but allow sunlight into the home in winter. That's ideal for homeowners who live in regions where temperatures climb in summertime but drop considerably in winter. Homeowners who want year-round shade might consider evergreen trees and shrubs.

How to plant a tree for successful growth

More sunlight and warm temperatures frequently inspire homeowners to spend more time in the great outdoors during spring and summer.

Outdoor projects often top homeowners' to-do lists in spring and summer, with gardens and landscapes taking center stage. Planting more trees around the yard is one popular project that can improve property value and benefit the environment.

WHY PLANT TREES?

There are plenty of reasons to plant trees. Trees provide a natural form of shade, reducing air temperature by blocking the sun's rays. This can reduce reliance on air conditioning systems and make it more comfortable to spend time outdoors during the summer.

North Carolina State University College of Agriculture & Life Sciences says trees absorb and block noise and reduce glare. They also can trap dust, pollen and smoke. Trees also absorb carbon dioxide and potentially harmful gasses from the air. One large tree can supply a day's worth of oxygen for as many as four people, while also storing 13 pounds of carbon per year.

GETTING STARTED

Visit a garden center or nursery and select a tree that will be hardy in your planting zone. Choosing native trees can increase the likelihood that the new tree will adapt to its surroundings. Also, inspect trees to determine if they're healthy before taking them home. Look for evidence of root girdling, which occurs when the roots circle around the perimeter of the container and surround the trunk. Trees should not have any dead or dormant branches.

The DIY Network suggests locating the tree where it can thrive. This means selecting a spot that can make it easier for the tree to grow tall and wide. Avoid planting near the house, where roots can crack concrete or asphalt, and always plant away from underground pipes.

PLANTING THE TREE

Now it is time to amend the soil. It's

not enough to enrich only the soil in the hole where the tree will be placed. Move out into a circular area beyond where the roots will start so that roots can expand and properly anchor the tree. The next method of success is to ensure that the tree has a large enough hole to contain the existing root ball and allow for roots to grow and expand. Better Homes and Gardens experts say to prepare a hole that is two to three times as wide as the root ball of the tree. Treat the root ball gently. If the roots are wrapped in burlap, remove the burlap or push it to the bottom of the hole.

Backfill the hole with soil and check that the tree is straight. Stake the tree to help it stay upright and straight until the roots anchor it more effectively. A layer of mulch around the base of the tree can prevent weeds and reduce water loss. Water daily for several weeks until the roots have fanned out.

It's best to leave trees be for the first growing season, only removing broken or diseased limbs. Resist pruning and shaping until the tree has survived its first growing season.

3 pre-winter lawn care pointers

Winter weather can be harsh, especially on lawns. Homeowners who spend much of spring and summer tending to their lawns may fear the impact that winter will have on their once-lush landscapes, making the fall a great time to fortify lawns against any harsh conditions to come.

Homeowners must take grass type into consideration before taking steps to prepare their lawns for the winter. Some grasses are best fertilized in late-summer, while others should be fertilized in autumn. Cool-season grasses, including fescue and bluegrass, are best fertilized sometime between the months of September and November. Warm-season grasses, such as Bermuda or zoysia, should be fertilized between July and September. Once homeowners have gained a greater understanding of their lawns, they can begin exploring the various ways to prepare their lawns for whatever winter has in store.

1. EXPLORE WINTERIZING FERTILIZERS.

Homeowners who want to make their grasses more winter hardy can consult landscaping professionals to determine if winterizing fertilizers will work for their lawns. These specially formulated fertilizers, many of which are made exclusively for cool-season grasses, contain higher levels of potassium and lower levels of nitrogen than early-season fertilizers. Potassium helps strengthen and harden plants, and cool-season grasses may need extra potassium as winter settles in. Homeowners who are not sure if they should apply winterizing fertilizer can conduct soil tests to determine the potassium levels in their soil. If the test indicates the soil has sufficient potassium, then applying a winterizing fertilizer is likely unnecessary. In addition, homeowners who have fed their lawn a balance of nutrients throughout spring and summer likely will not need to apply winterizing fertilizer.

2. GET RID OF FALLEN LEAVES.

While fallen leaves may be integral components of idyllic autumn landscapes, leaves left on the lawn throughout the winter may lead to disease in the grass. Leaves trap moisture and block sunlight and air from reaching grass, and that can encourage the development of disease. In addition, leaves can harbor insects that also may contribute to disease. While it might seem like common



sense to delay leaf removal until the end of autumn when all the leaves have fallen, that, too, can prove harmful to lawns. Leaves left laying on lawns for long periods of time can contribute to the same types of damage as leaves left on the lawn throughout winter, so do your best to remove leaves as they fall.

3. TAKE STEPS TO FIGHT SNOW MOLD.

Homeowners who live in regions where snow falls into spring or where spring tends to be cold and damp may want to take steps to prevent snow mold. Gray snow mold typically looks fuzzy and gray, and lawns infested with snow mold may develop unsightly gray or brown spots indicative of dead grass. Pink snow mold may be even worse than gray snow mold because pink mold attacks the roots as well as the leaves. To prevent snow mold, continue mowing into the fall, even as lawns grow dormant, clearing the lawn of grass clippings and leaves after each mow. Thick lawns may provide a breeding ground for snow mold, so homeowners whose lawns have a history of developing snow mold may benefit from mowing their lawns into the fall.

Winter is rarely easy on lawns, but homeowners can take several steps to prepare their lawns for potentially harsh winter weather.
