# Monument rededication planned

**NORTHBRIDGE** – With Veterans Day fast approaching, town officials and residents are eager to honor those who served by rededicating a memorial that has undergone extensive rehabilitation.

The World War I memorial in Rockdale has been transformed, and the finishing touches are being completed in advance of the rededication ceremony set for Nov. 11 at 11 a.m. Built in 1920, the monument at the corner of Providence Road and School Street was badly deteriorated after decades of neglect. But the town's Trustees of Soldiers' Memorials stepped up and led restoration efforts as part of a comprehensive project to

keep all town memorials in top shape.

"It was literally crumbling," Trustees of Soldiers' Memorials member Richard Trier said of the monument. "Not only was it an eyesore, but it was also a safety hazard. This was one of our top priorities."

All that remains is minor landscaping work before the restoration is complete. Following the Veterans Day ceremony, refreshments will be served to guests in attendance. Officials are still searching for relatives of WWI soldiers listed on the memorial who would like to be part of the rededication presentation.

Meanwhile, the Trustees of Soldiers' Memorials continue to inventory and prioritize the remaining restoration projects.

With dozens of memorials and monuments spread around town, the organization has a packed maintenance schedule. Members understand that it is financially impossible to keep every memorial in peak condition at the same time, but their aggressive maintenance schedule will prevent monuments from becoming so deteriorated that they require expensive overhauls.

The goal for the entire project is to provide the best tribute possible to those who served and those who continue to serve. Northbridge residents have made the ultimate sacrifice in every war, and the town will always make room to honor veterans of future wars as well.

Two years ago, Army Cpl.

John Dawson had a memorial square dedicated to him with a large Veterans Day crowd in attendance. This year, even though there are no more living veterans of WWI, the rededication will be an event local WWI families will never forget.

"Our job is to maintain all of the memorials and make sure we are properly honoring our veterans," added Trier, who has been a member of the organization for about six years. "There are a lot of other projects on our list. We need to show our veterans that they will always be remembered."

Though Trier isn't a veteran himself, he was inspired to join the organization to help give back to those who served and make sure no war or conflict is forgotten. In an era where

events as recent as the attacks on September 11, 2001, are obscure for some youngsters – while others have never even heard of Pearl Harbor – it's important for the Trustees to help keep history at the forefront through maintenance of memorials. It means just as much to Trier and his colleagues to restore an existing memorial as it does to dedicate a new one.

"Five years ago, we became very proactive with maintenance, and we will continue with that going forward," Trier said.


## Clean up event planned Saturday

Enjoy a beautiful autumn walk this Saturday morning while making a difference for water quality in the Manchaug Pond area of the Blackstone River Watershed. Join the members and friends of the Manchaug Pond Foundation in a fall clean-up event this Saturday of Manchaug Pond: its shoreline, roadsides, public access boat ramp, and watershed.

In cooperation with the town of Sutton Highway Department and in continued support of a completed Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) S. 319 Non-point Source Pollution Grant, the effort is scheduled to take place Saturday, Oct. 28 from 9:00 a.m. to noon with volunteers meeting at the state Public Access Boat Ramp on Torrey Road in Sutton. All will hit the pavement with garbage bags in hand to clean the roadsides and lake shore in the Manchaug Pond watershed-wide clean up event! Garbage bags, rubber gloves, and coffee will be provided.

Educational information on residential Low Impact Development techniques such as landscaping with buffer zones and rain gardens to limit runoff of fertilizer nutrients and pet and livestock wastes will be offered to participants as made possible by the water quality grant. ## Douglas High School names steering committee for NEASC study

**DOUGLAS** — Principal Josh Romano of Douglas High School announced the names of steering committee members who will direct the school's efforts during its self-study and accreditation by the Commission on Public Schools of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges.

The steering committee will be co-chaired by Caroline Fitzpatrick, history department chairperson and Laurie Durham, mathematics department. The other members of the committee are Jill Carpenter, guidance department; Denise Mulligan, special education department and Vanessa Salinas, world language department.

NEASC membership requires that a school undergo a self-study evaluation at least once every ten years. The steering committee's responsibilities will include coordinating a schedule of events for the school's self-study, collecting reports from

various subcommittees, and making necessary preparations for the evaluation committee's visit.

According to Fitzpatrick, "The self-study will include the completion of a comprehensive assessment of teaching and learning and the support of teaching and learning. The focus of the accreditation visit will be to determine the extent to which our programs and services carry out the school's core values and beliefs about student learning and align with the Committee on Public Secondary Schools Standards for Accreditation."

Douglas High School was last accredited in 2006. The Committee on Public Secondary School's visiting team is scheduled to conduct the accreditation visit in October, 2018.


Discussing these trends with the broader community will offer an opportunity for

# Resistance leaders to get hugs...and cash

The region's top young athletes have always enjoyed much-deserved fanfare. Since the election of Donald Trump, another group can now feel the love and support: the area's youngest stars in the growing "resistance" movement.

Still-Legal! Apparel for the Next Four Years, based in Providence, is giving cash grants up to \$1,000 to the area's most promising young resistance leaders.

"We want," says Still-Legal! founder and Swampscott native Jim Stahl, "to give heart and support to young leaders fighting the good fight. Our democracy feels threatened. Core values that we hold dear as Americans, and as New Englanders, feel at risk

now under the new president. We support young people leading the way on issues like climate protection, support for science, press freedoms, protection for Dreamers, and the values of compassion and tolerance. These brave and peaceful activists need to know we're behind them. They're fighting for each of us. Each grant is a hug from the community."

Those hugs, says Stahl, will come in the form of Young Leader Grants. They are open to activists age 13 to 30. Still-Legal! has pledged \$5,000 in grants beginning this November. That amount could rise to \$50,000 should other businesses and philanthropies join the liberal-minded fund. Sales of Still-Legal!

T-shirts directly support the fund.

"Roughly every 150 shirts sold at retail means another young leader gets a much-deserved grant," says Stahl. "Though we sell online in 50 states, only resistance leaders in our region qualify for now."

Stahl says he and the selection committee are looking to fund the efforts of young leaders in the arts, education, politics, sports, and in service and religious organizations.

Social-enterprise upstart Still-Legal! Apparel for the Next Four Years sprang to life on the eve of Donald Trump's election.

"That's no coincidence," says Stahl. Still-Legal's T-shirt slogans take gen-

tle (and not-so-gentle) aim at the inflammatory policies of the new administration. Appearing plainly in white type on the front of each jersey are simple protest statements like "Facts: They're Still Legal," and "Teach Science: While it's Still Legal," and "Tolerance: While it's Still Legal." Still-Legal! is owned by the educational publishing company Merlyn's Pen, Inc., based in Rhode Island since 1985.



# Enjoy fall foliage, but get ready for winter

Enjoy the fall color and plan a few colorful additions for next season. A few well-known favorites include several maples, sweetgum, serviceberry and redbud. Check out the ginkgo that drops its leaves in a few days and the katsura tree with its fragrant burnt vanilla-scented, yellow fall foliage.

The colorful leaves of fothergilla, Virginia sweetspire and oakleaf hydrangea add energy to any landscape. Look for the brilliant fall foliage of arrowwood viburnum, cotoneasters and sumac. And, if you are

lucky you will catch a glimpse and whiff of the fragrant yellow flowers of common witch-hazel (*Hamamelis virginica*).

Water plants as needed until the ground freezes. New plantings, evergreens, and container planters need the most attention. Water thoroughly when the top 4 inches of the soil is crumbly and moist. Give all plants a thorough watering before the ground freezes. Properly watered and cared for plants have a greater rate of winter survival.

Don't rake those leaves into the street. Recycle that valuable resource right in your landscape. Shred fall leaves with the mower and leave on the lawn, dig them in the garden or bag and save them for mulch in next year's garden. Many gardeners tuck bagged leaves behind the shrubs surrounding their home for added insulation. Next summer

spread the leaves over the garden to conserve moisture, suppress weeds and improve the soil as they decompose.

Keep cutting your grass as long as it continues to grow. Grow your grass tall and leave the clippings on the lawn. They add water, nutrients and organic matter to the soil. Chop fallen leaves and leave them in place. As long as you can see the grass for the leaves there is no problem.

Place black bird netting over groundcover plantings as soon as the leaves start to fall. Simply lift the leaf-filled netting and dump the leaves in the compost pile, garden or other area to be recycled. Replace the netting until all your leaves have fallen.

And for your indoor plants, start forcing your Christmas cactus now for holiday bloom. Keep the soil slightly dry and the plants cooler, 50 to 55°, at

night. Do not fertilize during this period. If you are growing them in a warmer location of 55 to 75° you will need to give the plants 13 to 15 hours (respectively) of darkness and 10 hours of daylight for three months to form buds. Cover or move the plants to a dark location each night and back into bright sunlight during the day. Once buds have formed and the plant is blooming provide consistent soil moisture, a draft-free location and moderate light.

Finish moving houseplants, hibiscus and other patio plants that can't survive your winters indoors. Gradually introduce them to the lower light conditions in your home. Check for and control pests. Wait a few weeks before moving them in with your indoor plant collection. Place the plants in the sunniest window or add an artificial light. Wait two weeks

if you need to move it to a shadier spot in the house. Gradually decrease the light, so the plant has a chance to adjust to its new location with minimal leaf loss. Consider adding some artificial light for better winter growth and survival.

## Challenging the rule of money

DUDLEY – When our media uses the term “oligarchs,” it seems to most often be preceded by “Russian.” But the United States has its own share of them, super-wealthy individuals and corporations who use their money to push the political system to do their bidding.

To Dudley's Liza Moran, that

fact is a wake-up call, an alarm that's gotten louder since 2010's Citizens' United decision opened the floodgates of “dark money” being used to support candidates, ballot questions and otherwise influence election results.

“I woke up and want to get active, do something about this,” she said. “This is so important. It's about our grandkids and the world we're

leaving to them.”

Moran was responding to a presentation by Larry Scarff of “People Govern, Not Money,” a state-level part of the American Promise national campaign to overturn Citizen's United and the subsequent McCutcheon decision by enacting the 28<sup>th</sup> Amendment.

According to the American Promise website, a key part of the process is to come to con-

sensus on what the amendment language should be, and two versions are now in Congress. One got 54 Senate votes last session and now has 133 cosponsors between the houses; the other, the other is presently in the House with 34 cosponsors. The latter is the stronger one – called the “We the People Amendment,” it outright states “The rights protected by the Constitution of the United

States are rights of natural persons only,” while “artificial entities” only get “privileges” that “shall not be construed to be inherent or inalienable.” It states local, state and federal levels “shall regulate, limit or prohibit” campaign spending and prohibits money being construed as speech under the 1<sup>st</sup> Amendment. The other one, the “Democracy for All Amendment,” says the government “may” regulate election spending and “may distinguish between natural persons and corporations.”

“It's really becoming obvious to me; you can see it,” Scarff said. “We're moving into rule by the wealthy.”

In one word – oligarchy.


Back in 2015, a Pew Research poll found that 76 percent of respondents – with an equal number in both parties – agreed that “money has greater influence on politics today than before” and 64 percent felt “the high cost of presidential campaigns discourages good candidates.” The Pew website also notes that spending by “Super-PACs” alone in 2012 equaled the total spent in 2014; there was no super-PAC money at all before 2010 (because they were illegal); and spending has basically been rising continuously since the 1970s with next to no correlation with turnout.

“It's not just Democratic, Republican or Independent, it's an American issue,” Scarff said, noting that the current initiative petition process aims to “tell Congress ‘Do your job and send us an amendment, because we're ready to ratify. If you don't do your job, we'll go around you.’”

Amending the Constitution, however, isn't an easy process by design. It can happen one of two ways under Article V. Two-thirds of Congress can vote to send an amendment to the states, which three-fourths then ratify; or two-thirds of the states can pass legislation calling for a Constitutional Convention, send delegates to draft the amendment(s), and then have three-fourths of the states ratify the resulting change(s). The former method has so far created all of the amendments after the Bill of Rights, in part because Congress wants to avoid the latter method, which probably opens the entire Constitution to changes, not just the proposed amendment.

Most of 2016's spending came from outside sources – so-called “dark money,” which isn't required to be transparent about who the funds come from and is almost unregulated regarding what they can do with it provided they don't get caught collaborating with

Scarff said there was a legal opinion several years ago stating it is possible to just call an “Amendment Convention” to debate one particular proposal, but it has never been tested.



# Middle East policy made by oil

DUDLEY – For the last 60 years or more, understanding American foreign policy would be almost impossible without seeing that it's largely fueled by one thing – oil.

According to Anand Toprani, assistant professor at the Naval War College and guest speaker at Nichols College Oct. 12, access to the black stuff hasn't been so much for our own use, but to ensure our allies get it and our opponents don't. But the whole issue is widely misunderstood.

"I'm hard-pressed to think of an issue – maybe climate change – where the attention given the issue is so inversely proportionate to the knowledge of the issue," he said. Much later, he really summarized his whole talk by adding, "If you think we can leave the Middle East when we're self-sufficient, you don't really understand why we're there in the first place."

Many people, for example, believe the traditional economic concept that oil is "fungible," that is, it can be both replaced by other fuel sources and is subject to supply and demand. Toprani notes both of those are wrong. There several different kinds of oil that can't be processed using the same facilities or turned into the same products. The most useful is light, sweet crude – that can become gasoline and many other things – but Middle Eastern oil is mostly light sour, and Venezuelan is mostly heavy sour, for example.

Furthermore, it is largely oil's price that determines supply, not demand. That means it's supply is restricted by geology and geography far more than many other things, but the more expensive it is, the more funding there is (at least theoretically) for investment in finding more oil. We've seen recently, as the high oil prices of a few years ago sparked more drilling and fracking for hard-to-get oil varieties (tar sands, shales, difficult locations), which led in turn to numerous bankruptcies of smaller drillers.

"Oil is not like any other commodity," he observed. "... There may be a lot of demand for oil, but it's not actually produced, it's extracted."

On average, global extraction has been 2-3 percent above consumption, but actual oil use varies by location. In the West, it's falling somewhat, but in India and China it's growing fast, and United States policy has long been aimed at controlling the oil trade, not oil itself, via the military, the monetary system and major oil companies, Toprani said.

"The Saudis may have the lock, but we have the key," he said.

Various online sources note that may be coming to an end, as Russia, China and other nations work to create international systems that trade oil in currencies other than the dollar, which has been dominant since 1974. On Oct. 11, USAToday.com cited economist Carl Weinberg saying that growing China will push the Saudis to accept payment in yuan, "then the rest of the oil market will move along with them." The story notes Saudi Arabia is "the crux of the petrodollar," and some countries have long opposed having to trade in it.

Toprani noted a lot of oil is also traded by barter.

He said US policy has kept our oil supply "remarkably inexpensive" – even today, at about \$2.60 a gallon, oil costs less than milk – but that's required a lot of involvement overseas and has given oil companies "disproportionate influence on our economy."

The long path to where we are started in earnest with 1944's Foreign Petroleum Policy, in which our government sought to "save Western Hemisphere oil for ourselves" by encouraging production growth in the Middle East to supply our European allies. Shortly after WW2 ended, America led the creation of the United Nations and the Bretton Woods agreement, and Toprani noted the Anglo-American Oil Agreement would've been "the third leg of the stool" of that policy. US oil corporations nixed it because "they didn't want competition from cheap Middle Eastern oil because it'll make their investments not profitable," Toprani said.

Truman's 1947 doctrine was "actually about maintaining access to Middle Eastern oil," but lacked any reference to that fact, cloaking it in phrases about containing Communism. Behind the scenes, though, he was "outsourcing our foreign policy to the oil companies" by exempting them from antitrust laws and US taxes so they could pay royalties to the Saudis and Iranians. That exemption still exists; some in Congress tried to kill it in 2010, but oil-owned senators kept it alive, he said.

"There's no such thing as a 'free market' and an 'unfree market,'" Toprani observed. "There's just a space where people use the government for their own ends."

In the 1960s, the Nixon Doctrine aimed to support "local partners" – governments that were willing to keep the oil flowing. At this time, that meant both the Saudi regime and the Shah of Iran, who owed us his throne after we threw out Prime Minister Mohammed Mossadegh in 1953. (We didn't much

care about the shah; declassified documents show we did it because Mossadegh intended to nationalize Iran's oil fields, which were then being run by the firm that's now known as BP.)

By 1970, the US had become a net oil importer. This is still true despite recently climbing production; Energy Information Agency data show we had "total petroleum production" (including crude oil, biofuels and hydrocarbon gas liquids) of about 13.5 million barrels a day in 2016, but consumed 19.7 mbd. By contrast, we exported about 216 million barrels (about 592,000 per day) in 2016, EIA's data show.

Because of our support of Israel in the 1973 war, OPEC imposed an oil embargo on the US that caused American prices to skyrocket and helped dump us into recession. Oil prices jumped roughly four-fold, but Iran continued to buy US weapons. The price hike spurred short-lived conservation efforts and the first major round of drilling in hard-to-reach places – offshore in the North Sea and Gulf of Mexico, in Alaska, among others. Although that production caused prices to drop, Toprani noted oil remained about twice as costly as it had previously been.

Then 1979 happened. "Historians a few hundred years from now will look at 1979 the same way we see 1789 or 1917," he said. "That year

created the world we see today."

Specifically, three major events caused significant changes in Middle Eastern politics. The Iranians overthrew the shah and formed the Islamic Republic, severing their ties with the US. A fanatical group briefly took over Mecca, prompting the Saudis to adopt and begin exporting more puritanical policies. The USSR invaded Afghanistan, with the war factoring into their collapse and planting the seeds of today's terrorism and wars.

In response, the US adopted the Carter Doctrine, which was quite explicit that we'd use force to repel other powers trying to take over Middle Eastern oil, he said. Originally aimed mostly at the USSR and Iran, it was later an underlying justification for the Iraq Wars of 1991 (when Iraq invaded Kuwait) and 2003 (cloaked in "WMD" claims, which the Bush Doctrine argued "threatened access to oil").

By 2007, Toprani noted, the US had spent about \$7 trillion on military costs in the Middle East – excluding Iraq War II – since 1967. While "the oil will flow in peacetime no matter what," our huge military presence there is aimed to "ensure our friends get oil" during conflicts and "about controlling the international system," he noted.

"We're in the Middle East because we're an empire, and we'll continue to be there for the foreseeable future."

## American historical memorabilia

Our country has a rich history, and New England is a significant location for much of that history. We often find items in local estates from pre-colonial America along with many historical items from more recent times.

Prior to Europeans coming to America, indigenous people were here making use of stones and other objects available to them. Spears tips, arrowheads and vessels for food and liquids are sought after by collectors. Native American beads that are thousands of years old have been discovered. Because beadwork is so fragile, most of what we find is from the 20th century or late 19th century. Two pair of beaded gloves were some of the more valuable Native American objects that we sold. They brought a figure in the mid \$100s. The gloves were attributed to a tribe in the Pacific Northwest.

Although there is debate about whether Boston or Philadelphia is "the Cradle of Liberty" we certainly live in one of the most historic areas in the country. Books and broadsides from Colonial

times still turn up in estates somewhat frequently and they sell well. We've sold many pieces of coin silver designed by colonial silversmiths. A sheet with 8 pieces of uncut currency brought over \$2,000 in our August auction.

America changed greatly through the early to mid-19th century. Westward expansion continued with the Louisiana Purchase and Lewis and Clark Expedition in the early 1800's. The United States entered the War of 1812 and later entered a war with Mexico in 1846. In our last auction, we sold a ship passage document from this era. The document gave permission for a schooner to transport cargo from Savannah, Georgia to Barbados in 1809. It fetched over \$600.

Industry was thriving in New England during this period. Samuel Slater memorized how textile machines worked before he left his native England. He used this knowledge to build a textile mill in Pawtucket, Rhode Island. Ushistory.org reports that "Lowell Girls" were hired in Lowell, MA mills

beginning in 1823. The owners found that they could pay women less than men for their work in the textile mills there. We sold some leather fire buckets in our last auction from this era. They were said to have belonged to LeBaron Putnam of Sutton, MA. The pair reached nearly \$20,000.

I won't discuss Civil War or any other war memorabilia in this column. That warrants a column of its own.


Moving forward after the Civil War, the Battle of Little Big Horn and the discovery of the Comstock Lode were taking place in the West. Rockefeller incorporated Standard Oil and Carnegie built the Bessemer steel plant in the East.

In Massachusetts, Boston experienced the Great Fire of 1872. The Boston Historical Society states that 776 buildings across 65 acres were destroyed. An estimated \$13.5 million in properties were lost and personal property of \$60

million. We sold a presentation fire trumpet made to honor firefighters who battled this blaze for \$2,800 at a 2006 auction. There was one small piece from that fire that brought about \$50, that is an interesting part of history. The piece, a business card, was stamped on the back, noting that it had been in a fire proof safe and survived the massive fire.

*Daylight savings... end of an era*

We 'modern' people have this strange little glitch in our systems. It isn't all that old, though that illustrious inventor and wise man Ben Franklin suggested it back in 1764, it didn't actually begin to happen until 1916. So we are celebrating its 101<sup>st</sup> birthday just this year.

There is a saying attributed to some Native American tribe or another that says only the white man could cut the end off a blanket, sew it on the other end and swear he may the blanket longer...

**How to donate blood**

All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age (16 with parental consent in some states), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, from a computer or mobile device. ## Does market volatility scare you?

Halloween is almost upon us. Of course, on Halloween night, you may see a parade of monsters, demons, Transformers and other frightening individuals stopping by your house, exercising their right to demand candy.

Fortunately, their appearance will be unlikely to cause you unpleasant dreams. But some people seem to have real fears about other things – such as what may happen in the financial markets. One way to keep those fears at bay is to avoid certain impulsive moves, such as the following:

**Avoid ducking out of the market** – Consider this: In March 2007, the Dow Jones Industrial Average stood at about 12,275 points. Exactly two years later, in the immediate aftermath of the financial crisis, the Dow had fallen to about 6,500 – a drop of 47% and the Dow's lowest point in 12 years. By that time, a lot of people had gone to the investment sidelines. So, what did they miss? Depending on how long they stayed out of the market, they may have missed some, or perhaps most, of one of the longest and strongest bull markets in history, because, just eight years later, the Dow had soared to almost 21,000, a gain of 223%. Of course, investing does involve the risk of losing principal, and there is no guarantee the market will perform as it has in the past. However, it's fair to say that if you duck out of the market during its lower points, you might not benefit from the gains that may follow.

**Avoid chasing "hot" stocks** – By the time you hear about a supposedly "hot" stock, it may already be cooling off. Also, how trustworthy is the source? Does this tip come from an unbiased, knowledgeable individual? If not, you have reason to question its value. Even more important, though, you need to ask if the hot stock is appropriate for your needs, goals and risk tolerance. If not, it's not so hot.

**Avoid taking on too much – or too little – risk.** If you feel the need to push your portfolio toward the maximum possible returns, you might invest too aggressively and take on too much risk.

Conversely, if you are determined to avoid any amount of loss, at any time, you might invest so conservatively that your portfolio won't grow enough to help you achieve your long-term goals. You need to strike a balance between risk and reward that is appropriate for you, and you need to make investment choices suitable for your individual risk tolerance.

**Avoid owning too many of the same investments** – If you own a lot of one particular financial asset and a market downturn affects that asset class strongly, your portfolio could suffer. But if you spread your investment dollars among domestic and international stocks, bonds, U.S. Treasury securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on, you may not be as susceptible to a downturn, because different types of investments often perform differently at any given time. (Keep in mind, though, that while diversification can help reduce the effects of market volatility, it can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.)

No matter what you do, you can't take all the uncertainty out of investing. But by understanding market volatility and the composition of your portfolio, you can invest with more confidence.

## Tips to save on the high cost of energy

As the warm weather winds down, it's time to prepare for the long, cold winter. Here in New England heating bills are high enough. But with ever-rising fuel costs and a seemingly never ending recession, it's no wonder many are fretting over upcoming utility bills!

The good news is, with some common sense changes, energy use can be cut down to size. Read on for the annual rundown on reducing fuel consumption (and costs)!

**10% off the top:** According to several energy solution websites, "phantom" or "standby" energy accounts for nearly 10% of a typical family's electricity use. As most of you likely know, electronics such as TVs and computers are common phantom energy users as they are not completely turned off until unplugged. These items should be connected to a power strip, to enable shutting off everything with one simple switch. The big surprise is small electronic devices such as cell phones, cameras, and even tool chargers can draw power 24/7 too! In fact, the average family has 40 such items that are sapping energy and upping your monthly electricity bill.

**Save 3 to 10% more:** Think lowering the thermostat temperature slightly won't make a dent in your fuel savings? Think again. Did you know turning down the thermostat just one degree can save three percent on your fuel bill? Better yet, lowering it five degrees for four hours a day can add up to a 10 percent savings! Lower your thermostat at night and use an extra wool blanket or quilt. And if the house is empty for more than four hours per day turn the thermostat down five or more degrees when you leave for work and crank it back up when you return.

**Shave another 5% off:** Families typically use more hot water in winter months and heating up the water can account for nearly 15 percent of total household energy costs. Lowering the temperature on the hot water heater to 120° can add up to substantial savings throughout the winter. Some manufacturers set water heater thermostats at 140°, while most households only require 120°. According to the U.S. Department of Energy, each 10° reduction in water temperature, you can save between 3 to 5 percent in energy costs. Another benefit? Reducing your water temperature to 120° also slows mineral buildup and corrosion in your water heater and pipes - helping the water heater operate at its maximum efficiency to last longer.

**Pocket \$100 per year:** If you have an older hot water heater, check with your utility company to find out if it would benefit from an insulation jacket. This cost effective tip can add up to over \$100 a year in energy cost savings.

Here's another quick tip: If you are going on vacation, be sure to turn the hot water thermostat down a bit. You'll save money even while you're gone!

**Save another \$250:** Doing laundry takes its toll on water usage and hot and warm water cycles use more fuel than you might think. Save money by buying a cold water detergent and doing all your laundry in cold water. Typical savings realized by a family of five is up to \$250 annually.

Here are more family friendly tips to save energy:

\*Another easy money saving tip is to opt for showers instead of baths during winter months. While a long, hot bath is tempting, remember, it will almost triple your cost over a shower as more water is used and must be heated. To save even more on hot water costs, replace shower heads with low flow models. New ones are so improved, you'll hardly notice the reduction in water flow.

\*During the winter months, use your stove and bathroom fans sparingly, as they remove precious warm air from the room. Obviously, you'll want to use a vent to dispel moisture in the bathroom, but there's usually no need to switch on the vent fan every time you put on the bathroom light. Ditto for a kitchen fan vent. Use it periodically while cooking; do not leave it on constantly unless smoke is an issue.

\*Replace all the lights in your house with compact fluorescent lights. They last up to 10 times longer and cost one quarter the amount to operate. Plus, they are now very affordable.

\*Did you know a dusty light bulb will give off up to 50% less light? Dust them and save money and your sight!

\*Dust also acts as a powerful insulator and dusty baseboard vents and radiators use more energy than necessary to heat up a room, so keep surfaces clean. If you have a coil thermostat, be sure to clean it each season to ensure accurate readings. Just take off the cover and wipe or blow away dust.

\*Check your furnace filter frequently. A clogged filter greatly decreases the furnace's efficiency and makes it work harder. Some energy efficient advisors suggest automatically replacing filters each



# Into the fall hunting seasons, but a warning to watch out for tiny predators

Last week's weather was great but cooler temperatures are needed to get the deer moving. Many areas do not have a good crop of acorns in them this year, but for the ones that do there is a good abundance of deer feeding on them.

This writer received his copy of the New England Outdoor Writers newsletter last week. As a member for more than 20 years, I have had a chance to meet some great writers that often share some very good information about their own personal activities in the outdoors.

This nonprofit organization annually selects some great college students that show good potential in protecting our environment and sportsmen's activities for the next generations. The NEOWA annually awards thousands of dollars in scholarships to these young college students.

This month's newsletter had a very good article by President Rand Julius about the dangers of tick bites. Although this writer has talked about the dangers of tick bites in the past, he revealed new information, and he asked other writers to talk about his wife's latest experience in one of their columns, hoping to sound the alarm about the dangers of tick bites.

Randy's wife Mary found a tiny tick on her foot after time in her backyard. She removed it and did not think about it until the next day when she noticed a small rash in the area of the bite. Twenty four hours later she noticed her foot had started to swell. Her leg was numb and she had severe nerve pain in her joints. She also had flu like symptoms. A doctor's visit and blood test revealed that she had showed positive for the tick disease "anaplasmosis."

She was put on a prescribed medication immediately which she took for three weeks. Although she feels better, she still has nerve pain & numbness in her foot. A couple of weeks later Mary's 91 year old father contracted the disease "babesiosis" from a tick bite. He nearly died from the disease, but after time in a VA hospital with numerous intravenous antibiotics, he seems to be getting better. During his stay at the hospital he suffered from internal bleeding & went into cardiac arrest. Doctors are still in the dark on how to treat patients that have tick bites, so the patient needs to stay educated on what he or she needs to do to survive.

Pheasant hunting is now in full gear in Massachusetts. Pheasant stocking will continue up until Thanksgiving in open covers and Wildlife Management areas. The two bird daily limit and six for the season already has pheasant hunters looking to Rhode Island to hunt. Grouse populations are in very bad shape locally, but areas to the west of the valley still hold some of the fast flying birds. Woodcock are also in bad shape locally. Mass Fish & Wildlife needs to look at their six bird annual limit of pheasant per hunter, and make available a program that allows bird hunters to purchase pheasant tags allowing for the taking of more birds.

The six bird annual limit if so antiquated changes need to be made soon. At a time when woodcock and grouse were abundant, bird hunters had a chance to continue hunting with their bird dogs. Raising a bird dog to harvest six pheasant is crazy. Hunting out of state or at game farms is too expensive for many bird hunters. Fortunately, a few clubs have a game preserve license, and they provide some great pheasant hunting weekly.

Trout fishing anglers can fish all year long and take a daily limit of trout 365 days a year. Raising trout is very expensive, as is the raising of pheasant. Hopefully the Division of Fish & Wildlife board will take up this topic at one of their future meetings.

Ron Merley a long time member of the NEOWA lost a year of his life from a tick bite when he contracted a serious infection. It started off as symptoms of the flu, but got much worse with each passing day. He lost 20 pounds and had numbness and pain from one joint to another. He got so bad he could not get out of bed. A specialist put him on "Rocepherin" medication, which is an intravenous medication, and he started to improve but soon found himself getting worse after the drug was stopped. He contacted another doctor and found out that he had "babesiosis" which is similar to malaria. He never tested positive for Lyme disease after all of his testing by prior doctors. He has finally recovered from his illness after being treated with numerous medications including penicillin, but Randy and Ron wanted to tell their story about the dangers of tick bites.

Test for Lyme disease are only 50 % accurate at best Ron stated. Recent hunting activities in local covers have hunters finding many ticks attached to their dogs, clothing and on their skin. Be careful out there and stay alert for

any signs of tick bites and symptoms of Lyme disease. You need to check your family and your pets daily for ticks and tick bites. Do not hesitate to find another doctor if you are not getting better in a few days. If you encounter a tick bite be sure to get medical help as soon as possible. It could save your life!!!!

month. They claim the savings realized in efficiency more than make up for the cost of the new filters.

\*Do a vent check. If you have baseboards, make sure they are fully open and operable. Move any furniture or drapes that could be blocking warm air flow. Vents or baseboards that are even partially blocked result in an unnecessary hike in heating costs.

\*Automatic timers are very affordable and they make adjusting thermostats a no brainer. Typically, they will keep the temperature steady during the day and automatically reduce it at night, resulting in substantial savings.

\*Generations before us took frugal advantage of the fact moist air retains heat. Stoves of yesteryear often had a pan of water to add moisture to the air. Today, a humidifier is often the choice to boost the effect of heating, which translates into lower fuel costs.





**NORTHBRIDGE** — A strong offensive first half performance and a spectacular defensive showing helped the Northbridge High varsity football team get back on track on Senior Night with a 21-0 win over Tantasqua Regional on Friday night, Oct. 20 at Lasell Field.

It was clear from the start of the game what the Rams' game plan was: play tough defense and run the ball, taking chances when given the chance on the offensive side.

The Rams first forced a punt and then drove down the field methodically during their first offensive reps. Northbridge used a steady mix of short passes and inside zone runs until they capped the drive with a 7-yard touchdown run by

Cullen MacNeil that gave the Rams a 7-0 lead late in the first quarter.

"We wanted to run the ball a little bit better and that is how you pass the ball well is to run, you have to get them on their toes and I think we did that. We came up with a couple big passes in the first half on key downs; all my skill guys are young so I like how they responded," explained head coach Ken LaChapelle.

"He ran hard, he played great on both sides of the ball, he had a nice complete game, but I thought his running was very inspiring to our offensive line," LaChapelle said of Plante. "We have been on our offensive line because they have had a couple tough games and I think that his running complemented them very well."

Northbridge's defense, though, has been strong all season and they lived up to expectations versus Tantasqua.

"Tantasqua was 1-6 but have played a very tough schedule and looked good on film, so I

was very happy with how we responded on both sides of the ball," expressed LaChapelle. "Our solid part of our game has been defense all year, they have been really up to the task, but offense picked up the pace."

On the other side, the Warriors showed great effort and resilience in the second half, holding Northbridge, who is now 5-2, to no points while also causing a turnover.

"I think it was us doing our correct assignments, flying to the ball and trying to tackle," explained head coach Jon Hargis. "We didn't do a great job tackling in the first half... and I think we calmed down a little bit in the second half and played more assignment sound."

The Warriors played great defense and gave all-out effort throughout the game, and although the offense stalled on a few different occasions in Rams' territory and weren't able to capitalize with points, a power run game was key to many successful drives. This power run game was sparked by sophomore fullback Liam Gore, who helped convert on a few crucial first downs and sparked life in the offense when nothing else was working. Gore tallied 50 hard fought yards on the ground.

"Liam Gore ran the ball well tonight, he is only a sophomore. He has a bright future and we are really high on him, it is only his seventh varsity game playing," expressed Hargis.

## Northbridge takes game from Quaboag as both teams battle for playoff berths

NORTHBIDGE — Kiana Schotanus scored a pair of goals for the Northbridge High girls' varsity soccer team, who took advantage of a lethargic effort by Quaboag Regional, defeating the Cougars, 2-1, at Lasell Field on Wednesday, Oct. 18.

With the win the Rams kept their postseason hopes alive, improving to 5-7-2 overall and 5-6-2 in the Southern Worcester County League. Quaboag, also fighting for a postseason berth, fell to 8-6-1 overall and 3-6-1 in league play with the loss.

"It was a battle; two teams fighting for their playoff lives. We still have an outside shot of getting in, but we're probably going to have to run the table," said Northbridge head coach Stephen DiMare, whose team has games remaining with Grafton High, Notre Dame Academy and Blackstone Valley Tech. "I think we can run the table, though, because we're starting to play our best soccer right now. We've got to get a couple more people healthy, but I really do think we have a legitimate shot to make the playoffs."

Schotanus, a junior, scored in the third minute of the first half and the sixth minute of the second half to stake the Rams to a 2-0 lead. Quaboag's Kiarra Dorman, the leading goal-scorer in Central Mass., scored her 46th of the season at the 13-minute mark of the second half to cut the Rams' lead down to 2-1.

"On the first goal I got a great pass in from Jackie [Puda]; she gave it to me in a good spot," Schotanus said. "Once I got to the ball I saw a breakaway. I was thinking I could take it in because I saw only two defenders in front of me. I thought I could get around them and get a shot off far post and that's exactly what I did."

"On the second goal I got another good lead pass, this time from Ally [Boucher] along the left sideline. I dribbled it down into the corner and then along the end line," Schotanus added. "I wasn't sure if I could get that goal because I'm not left-footed. When I took the shot, with my left foot, I tried to hook it as much as I could and it just curved in past the goalie, who was defending the near post, and the ball banged off the far post and went in."

DiMare said Schotanus refused to be denied on her second goal.

"Kiana's got speed; that second goal was her saying, 'I'm not quitting on this play; I'm going to fight and I'm going to get this goal,'" DiMare said. "She's not a left-footed shooter but she still found a way to get a little curl on that shot and get it past [Quaboag goalie Rachel Westberg] and inside the post. And she

did it. Hey, whatever works."

Dorman scored after Northbridge's Sarah Barron slipped on the turf, hurt her right hip and lost possession of the ball in her team's defensive end. Dorman alertly picked up the loose ball, dribbled between two Rams' defenders and snapped off a right-to-left shot that got past Northbridge goalie Sally Price, hit the far post and banged into the net.

"She managed to get free and she scored on a great shot," DiMare said. "There was nothing the goalie could do on that shot. That was a good shot."

Northbridge had several other quality scoring chances in the game. The Rams finished with seven shots that hit either the crossbar or one of the posts. They also had three quality scoring chances off their eight corner kicks where open shots ended up being wide of the goal.

Westberg finished with 10 saves in the losing effort, while Price recorded four saves.

Quaboag head coach Chris Bailey was frustrated through the game by his team's lack of a sense of urgency.

"The effort was pathetic today; it really was," Bailey said. "We got it handed to us by Grafton a couple of weeks ago, and not that that's acceptable, but Grafton is a much better team than we are. This is a team we should beat. And to not even be really competitive out there is extremely disappointing."

Bailey said he thought the slow start might have been a result of the hour-long bus ride from Warren to Northbridge.

"It happens sometimes; but it's not acceptable. It's not an excuse," Bailey said. "There was no sense of urgency at all. Obviously they didn't show up

to play today. I can yell as much as I want, but clearly they weren't ready to play today. They were not here mental-ly. And physically they weren't much better."
