Lease agreement solidifies Head Start move

WEBSTER — Selectmen voted 4-0 to approve bringing the Worcester Community Action Council Head Start program to town with a long-term lease agreement to utilize the old senior center at 116 School St.

The WCAC has been working with the town for some time to put an agreement in place and will now move their

Head Start operation from Southbridge to Webster and are making preparations for \$1.6 million in upgrades to the 4,000 square foot, two-floor facility.

Both selectmen and representatives of the WCAC called the agreement and win-win for both the organization and the town. Executive Director of the WCAC Jill Dagilis discussed the proposed agreement with selectmen on March 27 and admitted that the plan has seen an increase in the financial commitment the organization will need to make, but that the WCAC is prepared to see things through.

"Our project has escalated from what we first estimated to be a \$900,000 up

Cemetery policies need attention of town

DUDLEY — Residents will soon be invited to a public hearing concerning possible changes to the cemetery regulations in town as a result of concerns about maintenance and lack of awareness of current town regulations.

Dudley Highway Superintendent Dan Gion brought the matter before the Board of Selectmen March 27 saying he wanted a small committee set up to

include himself, a selectman, Town Administrator Greg Balukonis, supervisor of buildings and grounds Dennis Tremblay, and local funeral home director and burial agent Mark Bartel to discuss potential minor changes geared towards cracking down on objects and plant life left at graves in cemeteries throughout the community.

"Throughout the summer months there are some violations of the rules and regulations and I think it's basically

that people just don't know what they are," Gion told selectmen. "If we could get together and review them and bring them back to the selectmen to vote on any changes or keeping it the way it is, I could have some signs made up and we could put them at the entrances of the cemeteries and on the town website so people will know. I think it would go a long way for more efficient maintenance of the

Selectmen not happy about funding of Carbuncle property

OXFORD — Despite showing interest in early February, Oxford's Board of Selectmen will only be interested in a proposed property purchase at Carbuncle Pond if the town can supplement that cost with other funding rather than borrowing.

Selectmen received a proposal from the town's recreation commission in early February when the commission's chair

Joel Masley asked if selectmen would be willing to support the town purchasing property adjacent to Carbuncle Pond, saying the property could be up for sale soon by the owner and has long been used as a fishing spot with the owners' permission.

The recreation committee felt should the town own that property it would provide land for growth at one of the town's most utilized recreation areas. Town officials did not specify

the exact address of the land although it was stated to be adjacent to Carbuncle Beach.

Town Manager Brian Palaia was charged with exploring several different funding options for the purchase of the land and brought his findings back to the Board of Selectmen on March 28.

Option one was to have the town sell property it already owns to supplement to cost of the property. However, Palaia said that could be a stretch.

"We're still looking at doing that and I expect we will (sell land) at some point this year. I looked at the previous result of our tax sales and I guess that would produce maybe 50 percent of what we need to purchase that lot," Palaia said.

With that he examined option number two, which was to take money from a current project at Carbuncle Beach if that project was projected to be under budget. Unfortunately, the town has little wiggle room

there. "The other source of funding I looked into is whether there would be enough room in the budget for the Carbuncle bath house reconstruction that Bay Path is working on. At this point, based on where they are an evaluating the cost, I'm not really comfortable in saying that there's room in that budget," the Town Manager said.

The conclusion was should

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
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Church ladies' group celebrates 150 years

DUDLEY – The year the First Congregational Church's Ladies Benevolent Society was born, Japan started its Meiji era, Congress approved the Reconstruction Act and Department of Education, Joseph Lister first wrote about antibiotics, and the US bought Alaska.

A lot has changed since that year — 1867 — but the LBS is still doing a lot of the same kinds of things it did then, supplying a variety of the church's needs with funds raised by its members.

"This 150th anniversary is pretty sig-

nificant for the group and the church, because it's the longest continuously serving group in the church," said Kenny Laferriere, the group's "honorary male member" and one of the organizers of a gathering this weekend to celebrate it.

How exactly does a guy become a member of a ladies group? In this case, Laferriere has more-or-less been a member since childhood. His grandmother was active for years, and became president shortly before her death 12 years ago. During that time, LBS member (and current president) Laura-Lee Carey was his Sunday school teacher and the group all but adopted him when he got cancer.

Obviously, he survived it, but needed a heart transplant 16 years ago. He later gave them a talk about that experience and organ donation overall, and Carey described him as "our little miracle guy."

"The ladies supported me... and I am able to pay it forward," Laferriere said. "The LBS group is able to give back to the world, and that's what I like about it. They laugh and have good times, but help the community."

Over 150 years, LBS has done a wide array of things for the church. When it built its Stair Wing, LBS "did a lot to furnish it;" it has bought various equipment and appliances, including a furnace; it has funded the devotional books for years (although intends to stop since interest in them has dropped). During the world wars, members wrapped bandages to ship to the front. In 1909, it even provided the church's first indoor plumbing, allowing the outhouse to be relegated to history, he said, citing a typed history of the group.

Much of the money comes from annual events — the big rummage sale ("This room is loaded, piled this high with clothes, and we go through all of it," Carey said, her hand over her seated head.) membership fees — now \$20 a year, but Carey added they also contribute to various community groups. Every Christmas, members donate funds so the veteran's agent can provide food and clothing baskets for local veterans, and host a fair at which they sell various things, sometimes handmade by members. (Carey particularly praised two of them, Stasia Beach and Jan Hatt, for being "really crafty" with their reusing older clothing for new things.)

"We do a giving project, a different one every month," she added; this month they've been collecting socks for diabetic vets. In recent years, they've also collected for Food Share, Heifer Project and Hurricane Katrina relief efforts, among other things, with a fair amount of overlap between the LBS and the church's missions committee.

Carey said they're now looking at starting a scholarship fund to provide a student from Shepherd Hill, Bartlett or Bay Path with \$500-\$750 for college. While that won't go too far with today's inflated college costs, it could help with books and other necessities, she said.

LBS members pay \$20 a year to fund group activities. Until a few years ago, it was \$1 a month and \$2 on your birthday, but Laferriere's history notes the dues started actually as fines. Members gathered to sew for others, and paid 3¢ if they missed a meeting or 6¢ if they were sewing something for themselves. By 1909, it had changed to a 1¢ or 5¢ donation per meeting.

"We think we might still have a couple of the original members," Carey joked.

"But we've lost track of who the original members are," Laferriere added.

The two of them routinely finish each other's thoughts, and clearly have accumulated years of inside jokes from working together. But that one isn't too far off the mark: a couple members are over 90 years old. Last fall, LBS and town officials honored its oldest one, Elin Anderson, when she turned 100, and they recently lost another centenarian. Anderson is no longer active, but "We have one lady who comes every month, drives herself from Oxford, and she's 92," Laferriere said, referring to Helen Austin.

"It really makes my heart melt that these ladies are in their 80s and 90s," he added later. "They can't do much, but they come and do their part. They're all giving in some way."

Although he's the only current male

member, the LBS started with men: In 1867, there were 38 women and 22 men, mostly husbands. Officially, only women can be members today, but they don't have to be church members, and men can attend, Carey said.

To Carey, her term as president is one of keeping old traditions while bringing the group "up to date." For years, they've worn fancy hats at meetings, and she's keeping that, but also holding gatherings that are more social events and game nights, with fewer speakers. Previous president Ann Eaton, who had served 12 years, had started the hat tradition, and also promoted Victorian teas and other events that showcased a more formal and historical side.

Eaton, Carey said, "did a lot," including paying for most things herself "out of her own pocket. She didn't take a cent out of the treasury."

"In my mind, I'd love to still have her as president for this [anniversary]," she added. "...For a couple of years, it was a little wobbly, but she kept it going."

Laferriere agreed, saying, "She's given it her heart and soul. Her family is this church."

Almost as if she'd heard us talking, Eaton arrived. Laferriere had left her a message, but she hadn't been home yet to get it.

"I tried to bring back how the ladies dressed in the olden days, with hats and dresses," Eaton said, adding she also liked running "an old-fashioned Christmas fair" that included a giant wheel of cheddar cheese she dubbed "rat cheese, because my father used it to catch the rats." She recalled earlier generations of LBS hosted big dinners, sometimes for 150 people, with changing monthly themes — a Dutch dinner (in Dutch garb), an "orange supper," "the Victorian supper."

"It was mostly farmers around here. They were members of the Grange and the church,"

Eaton said, noting she was the last leader of the Village Improvement Society, which went around planting flowers and doing other things to keep the neighborhood looking good.

Going forward, Carey said she'd like to see if there's interest in adding an evening meeting to their regular one (now first Thursdays at 1 p.m.) so younger, working people could attend.

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Dudley's River Road – A Long Four Miles

It is 1861. You and your horse-drawn wagon are heading from Dudley to Southbridge for grain and supplies about 6 a.m.. After crossing over the Quinebaug bridge, the horse plods up the slight hill where Erastus L. Haven's house and barn are located (near the beginning of today's Old Southbridge Road).

roads they became harder to maintain. The old road from Dudley to Southbridge was, by all accounts, a real horror to travel, especially at the Southbridge end, and there were constant complaints to officials about the road's upkeep, or lack thereof.

While traveling this old main road to Southbridge, the already narrow, crooked, hilly road seems to get suddenly narrower as you see E. M. Turner's large, 9-passenger stagecoach pulled by two big horses come barreling down the road from Southbridge, straight towards you. They are probably 10 minutes late to Webster and going hell-bent-for-election. All you can do is pull your horse to the right, close your eyes, and hope the coach can get by.

The road from Dudley to Southbridge in the 1850s and 1860s saw many different stagecoach lines running over it as well as the occasional express coach delivering mail and merchandise to Boston. The Southbridge stage from the Globe to Webster left each morning at 5:15 a.m. and the fare to bounce your bones over the dirt roads from Southbridge to Webster and then to Worcester in 1861 was about 85 cents.

Stagecoaches fell out of fashion starting around 1865 as the railroads expanded in the area, and trains could be had going almost anywhere. Street railways were also gaining popularity. By the 1890s a person could travel from downtown Webster to downtown Boston entirely on trolley cars (street railways).

As autos began to run over the old

After a new macadam road was built at Tufts Hill in 1927/28, state representative Joseph O'Kane from Webster-Dudley began a campaign to build a new road all the way to Southbridge. The existing old stagecoach road had been covered with an early form of macadam (invented in 1820) and had outlived its usefulness.

By 1930 it was decided the only way to build the road was to make it a State project. Word was finally received that work would commence in 1930. The 1895 iron one-lane Quinebaug Bridge would be eliminated and the route across the river moved downstream to eliminate the 90-degree corner at the narrow old bridge by Eben Stevens' Intervale Mill. The new road and new bridge would cost about \$250,000. Waste not, want not: The old 1895 iron bridge over the Quinebaug was repurposed as the bridge over the river at the West Dudley papermill.

Work on the new road was delayed until July 1930 because of not getting the specifications for the new bridge to contractors for bid. On July 15, 1930 Waterbury Construction Co. was awarded the work with a bid of \$213,000 for 20,883 square feet of macadam. The new road was to be 4 miles long. It would bypass most of the old stagecoach road to eliminate dangerous curves, hills, etc. and would follow a more or less straight line to Southbridge.

Originally the plan had been to create a route to Southbridge by running the new



road from the bottom of Tufts Hill totally through Dudley to the Quinebaug Bridge, but this idea was abandoned.

By August 1930, three steam shovels had been set up at the Southbridge end of the road, and a gang of about 150 men were employed so the road would be completed early in the fall. Such things such as cutting of trees, burning of brush, and the staking out of the road was practically completed and actual construction was expected to start immediately. Many of the old farms whose land had reached from the old stagecoach road down to the west bank of the Quinebaug River were literally cut in half by the land-taking for the new highway, leaving much of the farmers' fields isolated on the river side of the road. If a farmer's land was taken, he was responsible for the removal of all fences and any outbuildings on the land.

Then, another bugaboo popped up: in early August 1930 men from Webster applied for work on the road construction gangs and were told they could not get jobs because only residents of


Dudley and Southbridge were being hired by Woodbury Co.

After that had been settled, unexpected extremely cold weather in the fall/winter of 1930 caused the long-awaited construction to cease. It was not until April 1931 that Woodbury Co. could resume work on the new road. Following several years of haggling over land-taking, River Road was finally accepted by Dudley selectmen as a public way in November 1939.

Alas, the wonderful new two-lane bridge over the Quinebaug was not a long-lived structure. The hurricane of 1938 took out its center span and another bridge had to be built. The bridge was again destroyed by the flood of 1955. Since then, the bridge has fared well.

The old stagecoach road still exists and is called Old Southbridge Road.

Remembering the friends we've loved

Most of you, if not all, reading this column know the absolute joy that adding a puppy to your family brings. The training and transformation into an adult is quite an experience and is somewhat bittersweet. Puppies grow up so fast! Years seem to blur by and before you know it, the dog is a senior.

While raising a puppy poses its own set of challenges, a senior dog can face many mental and physical health issues.

For those who remember, I had an English springer spaniel named Trixie who passed away in 2014 of cancer nine months after having part of her right lung removed at Tufts. Her litter mate, and brother, Cody, just turned 14 on Dec. 2nd of last year. At that time, I noticed he seemed to be going a bit weak in his hind end. Eventually, he was only able to function with one rear leg and then that leg failed him as well leaving him only able to drag his hind end. Degenerative myelopathy is a disease that affects the spinal cord of older dogs usually between the age of eight and 14. As in Cody, it progresses from weakness in the hind end, often affecting one limb and then the other, and eventually causes paralysis of both limbs within six months to a year. With Cody, the progression was more like three months. The disease can affect the ability to urinate and defecate and eventually, affect the front limbs.

Degenerative myelopathy is not a painful disease. It is believed to be genetic in nature. There is no current prevention, cure, or medical intervention to slow the progression of the disease. Supportive care measures can improve the quality of the dog's life. Basic nursing care, physical therapy, and methods to increase mobility thru the use of special adapted harnesses and wheelchairs are essential to the

dog's well being.

Cody is the second springer I have had affected by degenerative myelopathy. Years ago, I had a 16 1/2 year old springer who became paralyzed in her rear legs. In those days, there were no doggie wheelchairs or special harnesses. The fact that she had canine cognitive dysfunction complicated things as well. Unfortunately, the kindest gift I could offer her was peace from her afflictions. She was the first dog I had to euthanize and the memory of that experience is still painful today. With Cody, things are different. I started doing more research and one of our beloved customers had a special harness that was offered to us for Cody to use. The harness was a Godsend, but unfortunately, not enough. I researched doggie wheelchair companies and decided on Eddie's Wheels in Shelburne. The doggie wheelchairs are custom made for each individual dog for that dog's specific needs. There are different types of doggie wheelchairs or "carts." In Cody's case, he requires a doggie wheelchair that is adjustable so as his condition deteriorates, it can be adjusted to accommodate his needs.

We drove up to Shelburne to Eddie's Wheels a few weeks ago to have Cody measured for a doggie wheelchair of his own. It was a long ride, but a nice one. Cody slept the whole way as he often does on car rides but was quite excited when we got there. Cody loves getting attention and there were plenty of people there to give it to him. What was also there were a variety of disabled dogs. One little dog, ironically named "Webster," had no front legs and walked on his hind legs in an upright fashion. When presented with his doggie wheelchair, he would "walk" over to it and position himself in the wheelchair to be secured. Another dog, a beautiful Pit, had been used as a bait dog and as a result, had been severely abused resulting in a broken spine and paralyzed back end. It was truly amazing to see these dogs have

the ability to be mobile and live somewhat normal lives. Dogs that would have otherwise been euthanized.

What a gift these doggie wheelchairs represent! I was touched and inspired. The price of the wheelchairs vary, based on the type of wheelchair and any options. Kind of like a new car. Some people may think of them as expensive but to me, the ability to allow my dog to be mobile again is priceless.

No, I'm not rich, but we made the necessary sacrifices so Cody could have his own doggie wheelchair. To us, it was a necessity that he had to have and an obligation on our part to make the quality of his life the best it can be despite how long or short that could be.

It is interesting to note that Eddie's Wheels was founded by an ACO, like Jose and I. We were fortunate to meet Eddie while we were there. In addition, we were given a "loaner" wheelchair to use until Cody's customized wheelchair was made.

Cody absolutely loves the doggie wheelchair and adapted right away. We joke around that Cody can "walk and roll" now. There are also wheelchairs made for cats and even ferrets!

Cody's doggie wheelchair was to be ready on Valentine's Day, which ironically is the same day that I brought him and his sister, Trixie, home as puppies so many years ago. So, this Valentine's Day, we will not exchange any flowers, candy, or other gifts with each other. As Trixie and Cody, blessed me that long ago Valentine's Day with true unconditional love of a lifetime, we are now giving back and gifting Cody with the ability to be mobile once again — to be able to walk and roll - a priceless gift of true love.

Till next time, respect and appreciate each other especially our beloved pets who truly bless us with their unconditional love.



Bartlett's first 'Empty Bowls' raises \$2K for Food Share

WEBSTER – Many Americans are lucky enough not to have experienced hunger. But those who have never forget it.

That's certainly Yvette Perez' experience, and a key reason why the Bartlett senior wanted to be part of a recent "Empty Bowls" fundraiser for the Food Share food pantry.

"My family lived in Cleveland, Ohio, and we were really, really poor," she said. "Sometimes, we had to go two or three days without food."

That memory prompts her

family of five to take its leftovers, split it into servings, and give it to the homeless. On Friday, though, it also encouraged Perez to show several of her paintings and drawings to the community. They generally share a common theme – a literal blending of human and nature, with human figures weaving into trees and similar images.

Perez said she wanted to portray images of "body positivity" and "how humans and nature can relate."

"Nature has its imperfections, but we often think of it as perfect, and we see humans as

imperfect. I want to show both as part of perfection," she said.

Perez was just one of several high school artists on display Friday. Most of them were essentially anonymous, since they were represented by abstract ice sculptures and the dozens of ceramic bowls of various sizes and shapes the attendees could select from to hold food served by representatives of several local restaurants. Some, however, were more obvious, since they were in the jazz band playing the music that wafted over the diners or helping serve the food in green St. Patty's Day hats. And one was showing how bowl-making is done.

Sitting at the potter's wheel, junior Alexander Polanco donned a blindfold before saying, "If I can see it, I throw myself off."

"It was a huge group effort; everybody helped out," said organizer and art teacher Sean Harrington. "The kids seemed to really benefit from the concept of doing this."

Later noting the evening raised \$2000 "plus three big boxes of non-perishable food items," Harrington said he chose to help FoodShare with an Empty Bowls event after seeing one in Rhode Island. Last year, the art department crafted bowls for the Community Cat Connection, where people who adopted cats got one to take home.

"We had the pottery wheels and clay, and I wanted to teach them to throw [pottery]," he said. "... Sometimes, it's hard to persevere [at pottery], so having this goal kept them going," and they learn eye-hand coordination, skills and develop a good sense of community in the process.

One of the bowl-makers was junior Johnny Torres, who also staffed the admissions table. He had a couple of his pieces among the dozens available, and said he's now working on a ceramic clock.

"I'm really happy about

all the success we're having tonight," he said, adding that he thinks there should be more effort to help people who are poor and hungry.

"This was a great idea, bringing the community into the school," said Maryann Hoenig, a business teacher and owner of Bogey's Ice Cream, which she was serving. "A fair number of students tell me there's not a lot of food in their house, and it's nice to give back. It's good for the other kids to see this and continue to pay it forward. ... Just because you have three good meals a day, not everyone does."

It's not news to most residents, but Webster has a fairly high poverty rate and the present economy is not treating many people well. Assistant Superintendent Ted Avilas said federal poverty data showed a 10 percent jump in the number of Webster students needing free/reduced lunches, from about 500 last year to just over 550 now, out of the district's roughly 2,500 students. Beyond that, about 80 percent of elementary schoolers participate in the district's breakfast in school program, a fair number get after school snacks, and some also eat through the summer lunch program.

"We need to make sure the

economy is improving and people can find quality jobs that enable them to support their families," Avilas said. "There isn't a family that doesn't want to support themselves."

Assistant Business Manager Monique Pierangeli agreed, saying there also needs to be a lot better information out there regarding the social services that exist.

"They'd be surprised at the number of programs out there to help them," she said.



Now, he will also be available for patient consultations and follow-up appointments on the third floor of 72 Cudworth Road in Webster. The first floor of the medical office building is where Harrington offers physical therapy and sports medicine rehabilitation.

Dr. Rehman's presence in Webster will provide better access to oncology care for patients not only in the Webster-Dudley area but northeastern Connecticut as well.

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

Rick informed me that he has roots in the area. He grew up in Moosup and used to shop for back to school clothes at Buggy's Department Store in Putnam, which is now the Antiques Marketplace. He ran a local pharmacy from 1978 to 1998. He was an avid toy and comic book collector and decided to make a career in antiques after he left the pharmacy business. He sold items in the Greenville (RI) Antique Center in 2001 and went on to manage the store for several years. He began selling items in Putnam in 2010. Rick and Laurie eventually took over Jeremiah's Antique Shops. When Antiques Marketplace became available next door with its 20,000 square feet of space, they decided to take over

that business as well.
 Rick said that his current business model calls for Jeremiah's to offer vintage items like records and baby boomer collectibles while The Antique Marketplace offers antiques. His future plans are to offer retro items similar to Jeremiah's on the second floor of the Antique Marketplace and continue to sell older antiques on the first floor. With many antique shop owners seeing a dwindling customer base, Rick said their model attracts a large number of younger customers. He estimates that about half of Jeremiah's customers are in their 30's or younger. He said that around 30% of the Antique Marketplace clients are under 40.

Despite their recent success, Mr. Dwonczyk realizes that there are factors that continue to make it difficult for shop owners. Antiques aren't a necessity and buyers are spending their disposable income when they purchase items in his shops. The internet has changed the way things are sold and offers another way for buyers to purchase antiques. Generational changes make some items fall out of favor and

Save the date: bring expired and unwanted prescription drugs to the police

On Saturday, April 29 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. the Dudley Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public another opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. This has been a popular and much requested program in the past. I wanted to provide some information to people once again on this event.

The Drug Take Back has been held several times over the years in Dudley. The last took place in October of 2016. A large quantity of prescription medications and medical sharps were taken in at that time. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked. This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue.

Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines – flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash – both pose potential safety and health hazards.

Fortunately, thanks to the effort of District Attorney Joseph Early's office, we now have a permanent Drug Disposal Kiosk located in our Police Station lobby. These items can now be disposed of locally at any time during the year. Other communities have these kiosks at their police stations or other town buildings. If you are not from Dudley, be sure to check with your community for one of these disposal locations.

In addition to the prescription disposal, officials from Harrington Hospital have once again generously offered their assistance to dispose of medical sharps (needles, etc.) on this same day. Collection bins will be on hand to properly and safely dispose of these items as well. Harrington Hospital is also expected to provide valuable medical information and other services to anyone interested.

A number of these programs will take place on this same day in communities all over the area. If you are not a Dudley resident, please check with your local officials for a disposal site near you.

In Dudley, bring your medications to the Dudley Police Department located inside the Dudley Municipal complex at 71 West Main St.



This past Monday Jerry and I were taking our daily walk and were on the south side of the pond when a pair of mallards came flying by quacking, catching the attention of Molly.

We were laughing as she ran along the edge of the pond sight chasing the ducks. Suddenly the two ducks changed course and headed out over a section of ice that had not melted on the pond. She made a very quick course direction and leaped onto the ice landing a few feet out onto the ice, the second leap had her crashing through the ice.

"Oh NO!" It was only a few seconds and I soon realized that she had got stuck under the ice. Quickly jumping into the freezing water, I could see her frantically swimming under the ice. I quickly made a lunge toward her shadow which I could see under the ice and made an attempt to break the ice. Lucky for her and me, the ice gave way and I pulled her out of the water and onto the shore. It all happened so quick!!! A couple of members saw the commotion in the water and offered us a ride back to the club.

With my heart racing and Molly trying to clear the water

from her stomach, I felt it was best to let her walk away. As we headed back to the club house I quickly realized that we both could have drowned. Upon arriving home I contemplated telling my wife about our adventure, but realized it was best to tell a true story. Drying the beagle off with towels and a hair dryer, Molly decided to take a nap. As I told my wife the story I could feel that she was handling the incident with a bit of anxiety. Never a dull moment with dogs.

Molly has totally recovered from the incident and is back chasing birds in the back yard. Aside from a cold, I too have recovered from the incident, but I will always be wearing a life preserver when fishing on my boat. It sure was a wake up call!!

This past week this writer observed two beaver and a fishercat killed by automobiles within a quarter mile of my home. These animals are in their breeding season and will be crossing roads for a few weeks in search of a mate. Because of the ban on trapping beaver, numbers have skyrocketed, and they are causing a lot of destruction to trees, rivers and property.

I have personally had Lyme disease twice and I lost one of my Labrador retrievers to the crippling disease.

Peritrim is a spray that repels ticks. The repellent is sprayed on clothing only, and is not meant to be sprayed on the skin. It will last for a

week or two after use. Read all directions on the can prior to use. Dogs need to be protected also. A "Seresto" flea & tick collar will protect your pet for up to eight months costing only pennies a day. Other medications are also on the market in pill form, but are a lot more expensive.

Be sure to keep your pet on heartworm & Parvo medication. Parvo has also been in the news lately, and has been deadly for numerous dogs.

Cyganiewicz announces for Dudley selectman seat

DUDLEY - We still have just under a month before Dudley's official candidate slate is decided but candidates are already filing their paperwork in anticipation for the June 12 municipal election. One of the first to make his name known for the single open selectman seat currently occupied by Peter Fox is Kerry Cyganiewicz Sr., who many know as the current chair of the Dudley Finance, Appropriation and Advisory Committee, or FAA Committee.

Cyganiewicz is making his second attempt at winning a seat on the Board of Selectmen, having lost to Peter Fox three years ago. Fox recently announced he would not run for reelection, opening the door for Cyganiewicz to run for the seat once again. Cyganiewicz first joined his current board, the FAA

Committee, five years ago and two years ago was named the chair after serving as vice chair for the previous three years. A lifetime resident of Dudley, Cyganiewicz said he plans on taking a relatively similar approach to the 2017 election that he embraced during his friendly battle with Fox in 2014.

"Dudley is still the same place and I'm still the same person. We have a couple of different challenges that we didn't have three years ago that we're going to have to address. I'm still going to be a gentleman in my campaign," Cyganiewicz said in an interview. "I've lived in Dudley my entire life. I graduated from Shepherd Hill and Nichols College and I'm raising my children here so I'm a big fan of this town. Ever sense I was young everyone in my family has given back. It was part of growing up."

During his time on the FAA Committee Cyganiewicz said he and his fellow committee members had helped work with officials on difficult budgets and added a 24-hour paramedic coverage program to Dudley among other achievements. He feels the experience he has received over the past five years speaks for itself.

"I've gotten to work with the various departments and department heads, and employees and we've been on kind of a roll the past few years. People will remember a decade or so ago we weren't in such good shape budget wise and there was a time where, come budget time, we were going to have to shut

the street lights off and wonder who we were going to lay off. That doesn't happen anymore. We're talking about value," Cyganiewicz said. "I'm familiar with the process. I see some challenges that we have. This is my town, this is my village, and I want to be a part of this."

Among those challenges is the controversial Islamic cemetery issue, which up to this point Cyganiewicz has chosen to step away from as the FAA Committee has no involvement in the discussion and with ongoing legislation in play for several months he and his fellow committee members chose to allow the process to play out. However, as a potential selectman Cyganiewicz said he hopes to bring something new to the table assuming the discussions is still ongoing at that time.

"I'm hoping this will all be resolved before June. I think we can all agree, regardless of how anyone feels, that we hope this will all be resolved by then, but if it isn't I will bring a fresh and reasonable perspective to the issue," Cyganiewicz said.

However, that's not the only issue on Cyganiewicz's mind going into the election. As he made the rounds to receive the signatures required for his candidacy, Cyganiewicz took the time to ask townspeople what their concerns were, and he plans on taking at least one major issue to heart if he joins the Board of Selectmen.

"Everybody is talking about our roads. I've thought about it and being in

the position that I am in the FAA I have existing relationships with the highway department and others in town. I've already been trying to understand how we can make them better. Something worth complaining about is something worth fixing and I'm confident the information that I've gathered can help with that. There's a lot to it. It's the snow, it's the trees that need to be maintained, so it's not just the roads themselves," Cyganiewicz said. "I'm convinced we can do this in a cost effective manner. We made it work with the paramedic service, I'm convinced we can make this work as well."

Cyganiewicz said he also wants to work on bringing more development to Dudley, praising the creation of an Economic Development Commission in town last year and saying eh feels there is more that Dudley can bring from it's connection to Nichols College.

"Lets partner with them and lets see what kinds of businesses are growing right now and try to attract them to Dudley," said Cyganiewicz. "I don't think we've fully tapped into that wonderful school we have here. I got a wonderful education from them. There's got to be students who can be a part of that or studies the college can lead to help us there."

Cyganiewicz will be one of many individuals on the ballot on June 12 as Dudley voters elect new leadership for their town in the annual municipal elections.

Charter changes could mean smaller finance committee

WEBSTER - Webster's finance committee could become a bit smaller in the next year or so assuming potential changes to the town charter are approved in the next few town meetings.

Selectmen held a brief discussion on the matter during a meeting March 27 with Town Administrator Doug Willardson explaining the town moderator, Thomas Ralph, was holding off on responding to

interest for the final spot his position is charged with filling on the committee.

"Currently there are five members elected, five appointed by the Board of Selectmen and five appointed by the moderator and if the charter were to be adopted as it's currently drafted it would be three for each of those," Willardson told selectmen. Currently there are two elected seats filled on the committee and four of the five seats charged to Ralph have also been filled. Selectmen have filled three of their five seats, including two members

who were added to the committee in February. Willardson said that Ralph has received interest in his fifth seat and wanted to hold off on filling that position until he or selectmen know where the charter changes stand.

Webster Finance Committee Chair Earl Gabor was present for the meeting and told selectmen that his committee is working perfectly as is and their concern is making sure that there is proper rotation in membership from year to year.

"We're just looking toward the potential reduction. We

don't want to get into a situation where we have five for the next three years in short order. It would have been nice to have staggered the latest go around," Gabor said.

In its current form the finance committee needs at least eight members to have a quorum. The change would bring the committee down to a maximum of only nine active members. Town Administrator Willardson told selectmen that the charter review process is till ongoing, but he doesn't foresee any changes in the immediate future, noting that

it could be until May of next year before a vote is taken on any changes to the document. Officials are simply considering what the future might hold at this time. Some officials did admit that the finance committee's current fifteen-member format might be a bit much. While no official change seems imminent, town officials are at least considering the possibility that a charter change could shrink the finance committee by mid-2018.

Nichols College students help Connecticut shelter bolster security

DUDLEY — The Northeastern Connecticut Council of Governments' (NECCOG) animal shelter has sought the help of criminal justice management students at Nichols College to recommend ways to tighten security at the 13-year-old shelter following last summer's break-in and theft of two Pitbull puppies.

The first dog, a 5-year-old pitbull, was stolen last summer from the shelter located at 125 Putnam Pike, Dayville, CT. Through social media, shelter staff were able to find and retrieve him. The second dog, a 6-year-old Rottweiler-pitbull mix, was stolen a few weeks later; staff members have not found her.

NECCOG Animal Services provides services 24 hours a day and seven days a week to 10 towns for stray dogs, sick and injured domestic animals, capture and restraint of livestock, quarantining of biting animals, placement of animals that owners are unable to maintain, placement of strays not redeemed, a trap-neuter-release program for feral cats, and response to complaints for nuisance domestic animals. It has three full-time employees, three part-time employees, and 20 volunteers who oversee 13 animals (six cats and seven dogs, as of press time). Animals are adopted

every week.

With such a busy schedule and enormous set of responsibilities, the staff needed help to improve the shelter's security.

Enter the Nichols College students, who used their leadership and business skills to come up with real-world, impactful solutions to the shelter's problems. Those solutions have already been implemented at the shelter and are making a difference in the safety of the cats and dogs housed there.

Criminal justice management professor Kim Charbonneau's physical security class was invited in October 2016 to conduct a building-risk assessment of the shelter. Physical security includes a combination of security-related equipment, devices, and technology designated and arranged to alert personnel to loss-causing events or circumstances. Topics covered in the Nichols course include controlling and monitoring the access of people and vehicles, prevention and detection of unauthorized intrusions and surveillance; and safeguarding documents, proprietary information, merchandise, and buildings.

As part of the experiential learning aspect of the course, the students toured the grounds and assessed the security of

the building, identifying potential areas of concern. Following the students' assessment, the class met with animal services director Dianne Collette to ask questions and discuss what policies and procedures were in place at the facility.

Through their assessment, the students determined the shelter's most immediate security-related needs, and assigned each area to a student to determine a solution. The students spent several weeks developing fire evacuation procedures, training programs for volunteers, animal health and vaccination forms, volunteer application and background check procedures, and daily logs for the facility.

Collette was invited to observe their final presentations, where students shared with her their recommendations. She then brought the assessments back to the shelter and implemented several new policies, which, in turn, is helping to increase the safety and security of the animals.

"The Nichols College students' recommendations were very beneficial and helpful," said Collette, who has worked for NECCOG for 12 years.

"They offered excellent ideas to keep our animals safe. We plan to implement some of their recommendations, such

as an employee education program and creating kitten/cat vaccine forms."

Learning that goes beyond the textbook and classroom is an important part of the Nichols academic experience. From consulting work, such as the animal shelter project, and course-related travel, to internships, Nichols students find many hands-on learning opportunities that help them build a resume of relevance.

Said Charbonneau, "Working with the NECCOG animal shelter gave my students an incredible opportunity to gain real-world experience in the area of physical security, while also giving back to the community."

to a \$1.6 million project. We'll be doing significant improvements from the heating system to building out classrooms. Before it can be leased and used it needs a sprinkler system and much more," Dagilis told selectmen before laying out their funding plan.

"Of the \$1.6 million we've applied to the state bond bill funding for \$800,000, to the

federal government for a one time Head Start grant fund for \$500,000, we have a planned capital campaign with a low number of \$100,000, hopefully \$200,000, that we will raise and the balance we would finance through long term low-interest financing through Massachusetts Development. We could possibly finance through Rural Development, but we're leaning for Massachusetts Development."

Should the WCAC fail to receive the grants they have

applied for, Dagilis presented an alternative leasing plan to the Board of Selectmen that would cut the agreed upon \$24,000 yearly rent to the town in half, giving Webster \$12,000 and allowing the WCAC to keep \$12,000 to put towards long-term financing in a worst case scenario. Selectmen did not object to the plan and approved the lease agreement for 25 years and a possibility of a five-year extension, in a unanimous vote of those present on the board.

"The town's not looking to make money on this. The town would probably be looking to at least cover our costs because the Head Start program is just so important and so needed in our town," Selectman Randy Becker said before the vote. "I had the pleasure of going to Southbridge for Reading Day and it's just amazing the number of students that come from Webster. It's got to be at least 50."

Dagilis said that the organization feels Head Start will

be right at home in Webster and that everyone is excited to make the move and become a bigger part of the Webster community.

"We're confident, we're strong, we're a well funded agency, and we really want to be here in Webster and we know the need is here," Dagilis said. "Everyone has really been so cooperative and helpful for us to vet this and see if in fact this site will work. We're hopeful, and excited."

cemeteries."

Officials stressed this discussion has nothing to do with the Islamic cemetery debate that has been ongoing in Dudley since February of last year.

Dion said the issues in question are small issues that apply to every cemetery and talks about updating the regulations to solve these problems precede the other cemetery debate.

"We have current rules and regulations that I think were voted on back in 2010. I know Dennis Tremblay had a

few ideas of maybe adding a few things to it. If we could get a small committee together to discuss that and get it back to the Board of Selectmen to be voted on before the planting season starts, it's basically a concern about the decorations and planting that are violating the current rules and regulations," Dion said during the meeting.

Officials stressed the possible changes would conform to a "limited scope" and any proposals would apply specifically to maintenance, care, and upkeep of the cemeteries.

Balukonis said clearing up the rules and regulations could be a positive to

make sure everyone in Dudley understands what is being asked of them in the town policies.

"There's confusion that comes up about what type of monuments are appropriate for different lots. People feel as though they have the right to put in as many monuments as they would like and the regulations specify debating about whether it's a single grave or a double grave and there are certain stipulations that are there," Balukonis told selectmen. "This is an example of issues that we have encountered in the past."

Selectmen agreed to put together

the small committee, but Selectman Jonathan Ruda suggested allowing the public the chance to have their say before selectmen make any final decisions.

"I want to make sure if there's any residents that would be interested in this," Ruda said. "I think under the circumstances (a public hearing) would be a good idea."

A date for that hearing and the first meeting of the small committee had yet to be announced as of this report with full details expected to be made available in a timely manner on the town of Dudley website.

dreds of young men began to enlist in the armed forces to serve and protect our country. One of those young men was Arthur LaPlante of Webster who joined the US Navy.

Today, at 92, Archie was remembered and honored for his service in WWII with the Past Presidents of the Veterans of Foreign Wars citation signed by members of three wars, WWII, Korea, and Vietnam. Following is Archie's history.

Arthur 'Archie' LaPlante, since he is better known as 'Archie,' we will refer to him that way throughout this article. Archie is one of a dwindling breed of veterans who are members of the Greatest Generation. He is a World War II veteran. He is a familiar character about town, a hard working jack of all trades, and a comical guy who never turned down someone in need. He maintained a junk yard on Route 12, I bought a piece of concrete drain pipe from him

many years ago. He had everything imaginable at the yard but he was not always ready to sell. Archie had a lot of scrap metal and a lot stories to tell.

Archie was born in near-by Oxford in June of 1921. He attended schools in Oxford and Webster before enlisting in the U.S. Navy in Sept. of 1942, just nine months after the Imperial Japanese Navy launched its infamous attack on Pearl Harbor. He received boot training in Newport, RI and after graduation, Archie was transferred to Norfolk VA where he reported for duty aboard the battleship Wyoming, nicknamed the 'Chesapeake Raider.'

Built in 1911, Wyoming was an aging dreadnought, she served in WW I attached to the British Grand Fleet. From 1942-45 she was mainly used as a gunnery training ship. Wyoming was decommissioned and sold for scrap in 1947.

World War II was truly a WORLD WAR, and our fighting men could expect a battle no matter where they deployed. A lesser known ally in the war was Brazil. The

country had remained neutral during the early days, but in time the Brazilians did join the fight. That was after President Roosevelt negotiated a deal with Brazilian leader Getulio Vargas and PanAm to develop airfields in and around Natal. It soon became known as 'the trampoline to victory' and the area was booming with activity.

Archie was sent to Brazil, not for 'Carnivale' in Rio, but to help with construction of a Naval Air facility in Ipitanga in Bahia. Archie was a ship-fitter and his skills were put to good use. He could weld, he was a metal fabricator, did sheet metal work and anything else necessary to construct and maintain a military facility. The base at Ipitanga was first operated by the Army and in November of 1943 the Navy assumed operations providing support for six land-based aircraft and was designated Headquarters Squadron Fleet Air Wing 16. Naval Air Facility Ipitanga was home for Archie, at least for a while.

German submarines were particularly active in the

South Atlantic where replenishment bases were plentiful. The U-Boats became even more aggressive after they found out about Brazil's agreement with the U.S. Brazilian shipping began to take a heavy beating from the Nazi subs. Only after the airfields became fully operational did the attacks become less effective and allied shipping was able to ramp up to adequate levels.

Shipfitter 2nd Class LaPlante was later assigned to USS Savannah CL-42, a light cruiser, Brooklyn Class. Her primary objectives were to hunt down German supported blockade runners off the east coast of South America. Savannah also supported Allied landings at Salerno and Sicily, the ship was heavily damaged by a German 'Fritz X' Glide Bomb and after receiving emergency repairs in Malta she sailed for the Philadelphia Navy Yard for more extensive repair and upgrade.

Archie reported to the Personnel Separation Center in Lido Beach, Long Island, NY where he was discharged 25 Sept. 1945 with the rank

of SF2c(T) having served his country for a full three years.

A lifetime has passed since Archie raised his right hand and took the oath to protect his country. The details of his military service begin to get a little fuzzy with the passage of time. Unfortunately, Archie's records were lost in a devastating fire at the Military Personnel Records Center in St. Louis, MO. The records of 18 million veterans were destroyed, and though there were relatively few naval records destroyed, Archie's were among them. Though we do not have the Official Record of Archie's service we can blend his memories with those of friends and family, stir in the documented activities at his duty stations and be confident that little has been left out of our account.

Shipfitter 2/c Laplante has been awarded the World War II Victory medal, National Defense Service ribbon, and the American Campaign medal.

Mr. LaPlante (Archie) is well deserving of any and all medals, awards, citations and accolades he receives.

Economic committee continues work on town brochure

DUDLEY — Economic Development Committee continues to work towards the completion of a new brochure geared towards inspiring tourism and pride in the local community.

The committee held its first meeting of 2017 on March 15 and Chairman John Briare presented members with the current draft of the brochure, which is geared towards providing insight into businesses, organizations, and the history of the town of Dudley. When the Economic Development Committee was reestablished in 2016 the brochure was one of the first projects members chose to undertake, striking up a partnership with

Dennis Craig of BT Copy and Print to produce it. The committee is looking to simplify the current design, which includes descriptions of town departments that Briare admitted to the committee it could use some tweaking.

“There’s sort of a town of Dudley piece that gives some background,” Briare told committee members. “The printer went to our website and took a bunch of stuff that was on our town website to create the text (in the draft), but there’s no real call to action and it’s very piecemeal – Once it goes to print unlike a website it can’t be changed.”

Members of the committee spoke highly of the conceptual design of the brochure, but the consensus was that it’s far from perfect.

Briare said the brochure has potential, but he’d like to see Nichols College and other community businesses and entities more present and have them more involved with how their companies and organizations are represented in the final copy.

“How do we really incorporate the restaurants and dining and some of the local farms and those type of things? Even the retailers? It’s tough. Retail is struggling across the country right

now and you look at the retailers who have invested in our community, such as Park ‘N Shop, how do we try to get people to shop at those places?” Briare stated. “We’re close on the brochure. Really what we need now is the text, the final pictures, and what does it look like.”

Everything from education to recreation and beyond is expected to be included in the brochure with the end goal of the committee to show anyone from anywhere what Dudley has to offer, whether it’s someone passing through town or someone considering a move to the community.

Committee members want to leave no stone unturned and no entity forgotten.

“We wanted it to talk about some of the existing economic base in Dudley and we want it to give good, positive press to Webco and Gentex and Hanke Sass, some of the companies that really invested in Dudley,” Briare told the committee. “There’s the education piece

and a youth recreation piece which, for families moving into town those type of activities are important.”

Members mentioned possibly bringing in aerial photos of businesses and facilities to add some flair to the presentation and approaching each company or organization to have their say in how they are represented in the final product. While the brochure will be all-encompassing document, committee members don’t want it to be overwhelming. The key for them is finding the right balance, which is still a work in progress.

The committee decided to send the current draft to the Town Administrator, Greg Balukonis, in hopes of receiving feedback from town departments on how the brochure can be improved or how their departments can be better represented. Briare said the committee will await responses and consider changes during their next meeting in April.

Chapter 90 funding announced for Oxford

BOSTON — State Representatives Paul K. Frost (R-Auburn) and Joseph D. McKenna (R-Webster) are pleased to announce the town of Oxford will receive \$507,914 for local road and bridge repairs. The funding was included as part of a \$200 million Chapter 90 bond authorization approved by the House of Representatives on March

29th. Frost commented, “Chapter 90 Funds are fundamental in supporting our communities with their local roadway infrastructure. This state funding is crucial local aid to provide a service everyone relies on to travel for school, work, health-care, shopping, entertainment, youth sports and athletics as well other economically and

socially important activities.”

“I’m very happy to support the Administration’s commitment to our cities and towns by giving those municipalities the resources they need to make sure the roads we travel every day are safe and in good repair,” said Representative McKenna

Chapter 90 funds can be spent on a variety of municipal

roadway projects, including resurfacing, drainage, sidewalks, traffic control and street lighting. The funding can also be used for bikeways, landscaping and tree planting, and for certain road building machinery, equipment and tools.

The state’s Chapter 90 program allocates funding to cities and towns using a formula based on the weighted average

of a municipality’s population, employment, and total road miles. The funds are paid out as reimbursements to communities for qualifying infrastructure work.

The bill now heads to the state Senate for further action, and must be approved and signed by Governor Baker before the funding is finalized.

the town be able to procure money from property sales later this year officials would still have to find a way to cover half of the projected property cost to make the sale work. Palaia asked the Board of Selectmen if they would be comfortable putting a borrowing request on the warrant for the town’s annual spring town meeting, but selectmen felt at this point the town may have

utilized all options they were willing to explore.

“Initially we were going to sell lots and buy this piece of property and I was kind of lukewarm on that idea,” Selectman Michael Voas. “Now we’re saying we’d have to sell property, which I’m all for, no sense in owning property you don’t need, and then we’re going to have to borrow money in addition to that. When I look around town I see buildings and roads and things falling apart. I kind of equate this to me putting an addition on my house when my roof

is leaking. We’ve got so many things that we need to get taken care of in this town somehow.”

Selectman Cheryl LeBlanc agreed saying she is not willing to borrow money for the property either.

“I think it’s a nice idea. I live down in that area so I do think it would be very nice. However, I was really only inclined to consider doing this if we sold enough land to cover the cost or if we could somehow save a little bit of money on the bathroom reconstruction. I would not be inclined to do this either

one way or the other or a combination of both,” LeBlanc said.

Selectman authorized Palaia to enter discussions with the property owner to see if she would be willing to hold off on a sale until the town finds a way to cover the cost. If not, selectmen said they may have to let this particular property go and despite the advantages that the land may bring officials said they may have to allow the land to hit the market with the town having bigger priorities to focus on for the time being.
