## 'Everybody needs a chance'

COMMUNITY TURNS OUT FOR RECONCILIATION HOUSE 5K

WEBSTER – Dozens of people provided the feet, police made the food, and nature provided good weather for Saturday's first 5K run/walk to raise funds for Reconciliation House, the sober house affiliated with the Episcopal Church.

"It's a great house; it teaches you balance when you get out of jail," said resident Chris Savasta, who has lived there about 10 months.

Savasta is one of the roughly 50 men who now live or have lived there since Reconciliation House opened about two years ago. Most stay three to six months, and all come from the Worcester County jail's addiction treatment program, where Rev Janice Ford provides counseling.

Savasta said he was there about 20 months after getting "in trouble with painkillers and heroin."

Since his release, though, he said he's found "the amount of support in the community is amazing. ... They've gone from locking up the addicts to trying to support them," and he didn't expect that.

Among other things, he said, he found a job (board member James Alkire often

hires residents to work at his restaurant, Point Breeze), and has become a Nichols College student. He plans to move into his own apartment in August.

His former landlord agreed that the house has made a difference.

"I love what she does. We're so blessed to have Janice in our orbit at the jail," said Sheriff Lewis Evangelidis, who came to join the run. "If everybody in the world did what Janice does, it'd be a better place."

Tina Nixon of Webster sees it from a slightly different perspective. When Ford brought the idea of converting the unused rectory into a sober house for men from the jail, she was a little worried at first, but voted to support it. Some church members had concerns about having "convicts next door," but Nixon said she's come to see that their presence "changes your whole outlook and aspect of it. First, they're just addicts; now they're humans with problems."

That dovetails with what she feels is necessary to address the larger social issue of addiction. She said the community needs to "make it open where you can talk about it, with more

education on the road it's going to lead you down," she said. People need to know doing the drugs isn't acceptable, but there shouldn't be a stigma against discussing the issues that lead to addiction.

"There needs to be more out there to help people feel better about themselves than drugs," she said.

"If I'd had these chances, I wouldn't have done 17 years [in prison]," agreed house manager Jason Arnold. "Putting down the drug is easy. It's what comes after [that's hard]."

Arnold has been running the house for about a year, having become a certified recovery coach since his release. He notes "everybody needs a chance," and this house "allows these guys to have a voice and interact with the public." To Arnold, that's critical to solving the problem of addiction.

"We're just doing a little, but we need a lot more," he said.

Arnold was working alongside house resident Gregory Paquette, who has lived there three months and thanked the community sur-

## Budget tops Dudley warrant

DUDLEY – It's that time of year again. The town of Dudley is preparing for its annual spring town meeting, the yearly gathering of officials and citizens to sift through business of the town and vote a new spending plan for the upcoming 2020 Fiscal Year.

Going into the meeting, Dudley voters are looking at a balanced budget. It's the final spending plan prepared with the assistance of outgoing Town Administrator Greg Balukonis who announced his retirement earlier this year. The budget totals \$21,131,531 with no additional overrides or debt exclusions being proposed by the town. The budget serves as the seventh article on a lengthy agenda with 34 items prepared for discussion over the course of the night.

Several of the articles are basic housekeeping items including selectmen reports, committee recommendations, unpaid bills, supplemental budget appropriations if needed, and the revolving fund. A pair of early articles will finalize the details of the town's new Agricultural Advisory Commission including terms limits and specifics of alternate members. One of the larger items of discussion thought

will be the proposal to adopt a Department of Public Works for Dudley. This proposal has been one of the most consistent items of conversation for the town in 2019 and, if approved, the article on the town meeting warrant would allow the town's Board of Selectmen to petition the General Court for a special legislation to establish the DPW and abolish the Water & Sewer Commission to transfer that commission's duties to the DPW Director.

Several articles on the warrant involve fund transfers while another financial item will see the Dudley Police Department seek \$51,000 for a new police cruiser. The purchase of a street sweeper, at a cost of \$225,000, will also be up for discussion. Several zoning bylaw changes are further down on the warrant while the Dudley Fire Department will seek new equipment of its own by requesting \$24,600 for twelve new sets of fire gear.

These and other matters will all be addressed during the annual spring town meeting on May 20 at the Shepherd Hill Regional High School Auditorium. Details concerning the proposed town budget and the full town meeting warrant are available on the Town of Dudley Web site.



Baker told his fellow graduates. "For me, I will always remember take that risk, don't be afraid to be different, and, most importantly, don't be afraid to fail."

Speaking for the graduate degree students was Caitlyn Llewellyn, who earned a Master's in Business Administration after earning her initial degree from Nichols in 2017. After five years at Nichols College Her message to the graduate students was to leave a mark on the world no matter how big or small.

"No matter where life takes you, leave a legacy. With this mindset, you have the ability to make every single day count," Llewellyn said.

The third student speaker of the

afternoon was Valedictorian Sabrina Boermeester, who earned an accounting degree when she crossed the stage later in the ceremony. Her speech focused on what she called the "three F's of life": fear, failure, and future.

"Success is not money. Success is happiness, love, meaning, and longevity. It's about being able to jump through hoops and dig obstacles and teaching others to do the same," Boermeester said. "Nichols has provided us with the base we need to be successful in a career. Now it's our turn to teach ourselves how to not only survive, but also to live. It's up to us to learn how to redirect fear, lead through the surmounting of failure, and succeed in our futures that stand before us."

While hearing from their fellow students provided some of the most poignant moments for the graduating class of 2019 the 505 students were also greet-

ed by Lt. Governor Karyn Polito, who offered words of wisdom after being honored herself with an honorary doctorate. Polito's partner in Boston, Governor Charlie Baker, served as commencement speaker for the 2016 ceremony during the pairs first term in office. Polito left students with an important message, to follow their compass which she defined as "purpose."

"Helping others in your community is purposeful, and I'm blessed with the opportunity to do a whole lot on that front," said Polito. "Now is the time and opportunity for you to calibrate your compass. Define what it is that gives your life purpose. Your family and community here at Nichols have helped you create the foundation for this exercise. You have the opportunity to be bigger than yourself, and to serve your communities in positive, impactful ways."

rounding the house for “help[ing] me get my life together.” He said he’s been drug-free for 18 months after spending eight years addicted and a year in jail.

“I was spiritually broken. [Rev Ford] helped me find myself,” Paquette said. “In addiction, you don’t care about anything.”

He attributed his turnaround to “the environment and people around me and their positivity. Everybody’s there for each other.”

That was apparent at the event itself, too. It began with a short group service which included a section of candle-lighting to commemorate those who died from overdoses. Although the wind nixed the ability to actually light them, Ford and participants mentally lit candles for love, joy, memories, tears, hope, peace and strength. Some also wrote words of memory and/or encouragement to those fighting addictions on a large white board.


Afterward, police leaders cooked burgers and hot dogs for runners provided by Point Breeze.

At least 60 people signed up in advance to participate, and Ford estimated 80-100 showed up.



WEBSTER – “We love it when our students surpass us,” said Bartlett art teacher Brittany Gyllenhammer. “That’s the dream.”

She was speaking about some of those participating in this year’s Bartlett Rocks student show, gracing the walls this month at Booklovers’ Gourmet. More than 50 pieces, most of them digital images, represent the flower of the school’s art program, with a wide range of subject matter. Among them are unusual selfies, pumpkins transforming

into people, nature shots from odd angles, and various examples of artistic repetition.

“I want to tell a story. Sometimes people tell stories with words. I tell stories with pictures,” said senior Garrett Mann, who finds a lot of his inspiration in science. Specifically, he’s going into astrophysics, where “the beauty and complexity and all the unanswered questions” have attracted his attention for years.

Not surprisingly, his submission is an image of the sky, although in this case seen through the bars of a metal grate.

Not far away, junior Nadia Gaber’s camera focused downward, where her new zoom lens captured the details of a summer fire. Gaber said she normally does portraits, but “wanted it to be abstract, so I shot the fire. ... I like to look for small details within big things.”

“They have a gift, really enjoy what they do and are inspired,” said visitor Carole McDonough, grandmother of fraternal twins Garrett and Victoria Mann, who both had pieces in the show. “[The school has] a wonderful teaching system that enables them to fulfill the dreams they have in their heads.”

In Victoria’s case, the dream is more aquatic; she’s particularly inspired by the ocean and visits to their father’s cabin on Cape Cod. A lot of her work is in ceramic, so it wasn’t in the show (although an image was). But she’s happy to share it on

her iPhone, which is laden with images of sculpted coral reefs, octopi and other denizens of the deep.

“We don’t know what’s out there,” she said. “I want to explore it, and that’s what I do.”

As far as photos go, Victoria said she particularly likes scenes from “a worm’s eye view” and other uncommon perspectives.

Teacher Sean Harrington noted the show, plus field trips, cameras, computers and other art department equipment, have been funded by the Janet Malser Trust.

Over the years, he said, one of the biggest changes has been the growth of digital art, which “opens up some new avenues to go down,” in part because it’s far easier to experiment and correct mistakes on computers than using some of the older technologies (film and darkrooms, for example). Using dig-

ital, students are “less likely to be timid, and will put down bold strokes. They can save it three different ways, and that’s definitely helped them.”

He still has them learn traditional drawing techniques and photographic concepts. Among other things, they’ll purposely “take bad pictures and figure out where the balance is.” Ironically, sometimes ‘bad’ images turn out to be good ones; one assignment called for over-exposing an image, but at least one of those (of the school itself) ended up in the show.

“Some kids volunteered their work,” he said, while he and Gyllenhammer picked other pieces from the students’ portfolios.

Want the secret to growing great tomatoes? Blue Ribbon tomato growers reveal planting deep is the golden rule to successful tomato plants! Bury a tomato plant's stem and the stem will sprout new roots that help the plant grow sturdy and tall quickly!

How does your garden grow? With a little help from your garden tools! Keep them clean with a five gallon bucket of coarse sand mixed with a quart of clean motor oil in the garage. After using spades and shovels push the metal end in the sand mixture and wipe dry. The

Placement is important when growing squash and melons. Because they are pollinated by bees, avoid planting them near other flowering plants, which can compete for bee pollinators.

Plant a chrysanthemum plant in the vegetable garden. Because the flower wilts before other plants when water is needed, it'll act as a red flag to tell you to irrigate. Cucumber and squash plants can also act as indicators because they are the first to droop during a dry spell.

Going on vacation? Keep house plants watered for up to a month by watering well placing pot and all in a clear plastic bag. Tie it top and bottom and place in northern light. When you're back, untie the top and let the plant adjust to room air for a day or two before removing the plastic completely.

Firing up the grill for a sizzling steak? New York Times 'Minimalist' and cookbook author Mark Bittman claims the five best steaks for grilling are: rib eye, skirt, sirloin, t-bone and flank steaks, one inch thick. His secret? Dry the steaks with paper towels then grill them without turning for three minutes

# “Senioritis”: a very real mindset, with very real consequences

We’ve all heard the term ‘senioritis,’ but is this diagnosis real? After some lengthy research, we say absolutely.

Senioritis is defined as, “A supposed affliction of students in their final year of high school or college, characterized by a decline in motivation or performance.” The end is near, with graduation just around the corner, and many seniors can taste freedom, but aren’t quite sure what to do with it. Even with some students heading off to college, the fear of the unknown, combined with a complete change in the cadence in life, is enough to make several seniors come down with a serious case of senioritis in an attempt to break away from the stress and rigors of 13 years of schooling.

Some signs of the affliction include a lack of motivation, a decline in grades or feeling as though nothing they do in the final months leading up to graduation really matters much. Most students’ entire senior year of high school is spent trying to plan for the future; this can be daunting and stressful for these kids, who are still, at the end of the day, just kids. Some symptoms parents should look for include extreme laziness, apathy, spending all of their free time with friends away from home.

Unfortunately, this rapid decline in motivation does not go unseen by universities. Many schools will look at a student’s last semester, even after he or she has been notified of acceptance, and a substantial decrease in grades raises a red flag. This has admissions offices questioning a prospective student’s level of commitment, and the question of maturity is also put on the table. If the situation is bad enough, a college or university can rescind an acceptance. Each year, thousands of students receive such letters. Sometimes a student will enter their freshman year of college already on academic probation. If a student was issued merit aid from an institution they risk losing those funds.

There are things that can be done to help offset senioritis. One thing a student can do is to set tiny goals, such as getting a B or higher on the next quiz or test, or to finish an assignment ahead of time. Working on better ways to study for tests is also crucial. Too much pressure can cause students to shut down so taking some time to relax and have fun with family and friends is a great idea.

Another idea is for parents and teachers to reassure students that life after high school is an exciting time and that not every graduate needs a definitive plan right away. Explain different opportunities for a gap year, including the pros and cons of taking one.

If your child becomes too self-destructive handing out consequences is key. Finding their currency and removing it may change their perspective and keep them on track. Remembering to reward good behavior is a must. If your child is behaving in such a way that they become emotionally removed, disobedient and disrespectful taking a gap year might be the best option as college is expensive and tuition should never go to waste. Sometimes when students see their friends off at school while they are left behind can be motivation to get back into the swing of things.

An article, “Local road funds flatline as state budget grows” in the May 2 Worcester Telegram, opines the need for increased Chapter 90 funds to help cities and towns that are “... struggling to keep roadways in the state in good repair.”

As a resident of the Bay State and a taxpayer, I am both surprised and not surprised. The not surprised part is that the idea on Beacon Hill is to spend still more on our roadways. The surprise is that someone would actually refer to our roads as in good repair. It seems that the \$200 million that has been put forward in the past is not enough. The solution (hold on to your wallet if you are a tax payer) is to spend \$300 million. Why, you might ask, so much more? Well, as Rep. Russell Holmes (D-Boston) notes, “Everything has gotten more expensive, literally.” I wonder if it is possible that Rep. Holmes is including the tax burden that we, the taxpayers struggle with, when he says “everything.”

Guess that \$200 million just doesn’t go as far as it used to. Why might that be the case? According to the Reason Foundation, “More money is going to state highways, but there has been very little progress in improving their condition.” They go on to identify Rhode Island, Massachusetts, California and

Florida, among the big spenders, outlaying more than \$500,000 per state-controlled mile.

Our roads may not be paved with gold, but it sure looks like we’re spending as if they were.

The report goes on to note that Massachusetts ranked 46th out of the fifty states in overall performance and cost effectiveness. Yes, we did beat out Rhode Island, New Jersey, Alaska and Hawaii. Other New England states ranked much higher with Maine at 16, New Hampshire at 23, and even Connecticut at 44.

Given the burden of prevailing wage (a.k.a. welfare for unions) in Massachusetts, one might be surprised that we aren’t dead last. We certainly are making every effort to reach the bottom.

Before the state spends anymore on roads that seem to last no longer than the average TV mini-series, taxpayers need to know how our money is being spent and why our roads are so much more expensive than those of neighboring states.

What’s really flatlining is the taxpayer’s wallet.

National Missing Children’s Day is held in the month of May. It is observed officially on May 25. Since it was first established in 1983, National Missing Children’s Day serves as an annual reminder that there are thousands of children who are still missing and stress-

es the importance of making child protection a national priority. This is a great opportunity for parents to discuss safety awareness with their children.

There are many ways to begin discussions with your children on safety topics. One of the programs we have used in the past was “Take 25.” This was a national child safety public awareness campaign created by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC). It encouraged parents to take 25 minutes to talk to their children about safety and ways to prevent abduction. According to NCMEC, every year in America, an estimated 800,000 children are reported missing, more than 2,000 each day. Of that number, 200,000 are abducted by family members and 58,000 are abducted by non-family members, for which the primary motive is sexual. Each year, 115 children are the victims of the most serious abductions; they are taken by non-family members and either murdered, ransomed, or taken with the intent to keep. An analysis of attempted abduction cases by NCMEC found that in 84 percent of the cases, the child escaped would-be abductors through their own actions. Teaching children about safety works and saves lives.

The “Take 25” program gave some sample, conversation starter questions, for parents. Here are a few questions to consider should you wish to engage your children in this exercise. For kids ages 5-8: Could you tell me our address? How about our home, work, or cell phone numbers? Has anyone ever called or knocked on the door while I was gone? What did you do? Let’s make a list of 3 people whom you can call in case of an emergency? For children, ages 9-12: If something happened at school that made you feel bad or scared, would you tell me? Do you think that it is safe to share your passwords with your friends? How about with your best friend? For teens (13-18): What kind of information do you feel is safe to share about yourself online? Are you comfortable with the information that you have posted online, knowing that it might be seen by friends, officials at your school, college and university admissions departments, and employers? Have you and your friends talked about what types of pictures are okay to post online? What about the comments you leave on each others’ pages? These are just a few examples which may be useful in getting started. Hopefully a productive dialogue can result. If you need more information, check out the NCMEC Web site at <http://www.missingkids.org>.

Children are exposed to a great deal of challenges, both in person and on-line. Any opportunity parents can utilize to discuss safety measures with their children is time well spent. Missing Children’s Day is a chance for us to remember those who are still missing and take precautions to prevent future incidents.

# The power of positive persistence

I have enjoyed a fair amount of success in my life, and yes, I have endured near devastating defeat. Regardless, I've always been able to stand up, brush myself off and keep moving forward. I always have hope of a bright future. I am constantly optimistic that success is coming, and because I have hope and optimism, I'm driven to be persistent in pursuit of my dream. I am rarely the smartest guy in the room, but I'm always the most persistent.

I have written often about hope, optimism and persistence. I believe these are the essential building blocks for health, happiness and prosperity. It doesn't always take intelligence, education or IQ to succeed. Some of the unhappiest and least successful people I know are also the smartest. Although intelligence and education are important, they are not the be-all of success and happiness.

## Hope, Optimism and Persistence.

I began writing a book in late 2002. My father had lived a fascinating life in baseball and war. He served in the Navy during the Second World War and was a star baseball player, growing up in the rural coalmining town of Sesser, Ill. I felt the story had wide appeal and would be inspirational to readers. I was not a trained writer and in fact had little experience writing anything, but I began.

After 14 months of pecking away on my laptop, I had a rough manuscript I was calling, "Playing with the Enemy" and I began sending copies out to publishers. I was certain they'd all jump at the chance to publish my book. However, the rejection letters began

pouring in. One, two, three ... twenty-six ... forty-two ... sixty-three ... seventy-four ... yes, I was deeply disappointed but not discouraged. I had hope that a publisher would say yes. I was optimistic that the next submission would be the one, but most importantly, I kept submitting my manuscript to publishers even though seventy-four had said no.

I submitted for the 75th time to a publisher that focused on military titles. This time, I didn't only mail a copy as their submission guidelines instruct ... I called their President, Theodore P. Savas.

Me: Hello, Mr. Savas? My name is Gary Moore, and I'm mailing a manuscript to you today that I know is a perfect fit for your publishing firm.

Savas: Give me your ten second version.

Me: It's about a young man's journey through life in baseball and war.

Savas: Don't bother mailing it. We don't do sports books and we are not interested. "CLICK"

I put my manuscript in an envelope, addressed it and sent it to the man who had just abruptly said he wasn't interested and hung up. Most people would think I'm crazy. I was just rejected and instructed not to send anything. Regardless, I was hopeful he would read it. I was optimistic that he would love it. I knew if I did not send it, I had zero chance he would publish it ... so with enthusiasm, I rushed it to the post office. A one percent chance is better than no chance at all.

A few days later, I called Mr. Savas again.

Me: Mr. Savas? This is Gary Moore. I was calling to see ... (interrupt)

Savas: I told you not to send it. We are not interested.

Savas: I won't read it. I don't have time and we don't publish sports books and ... (interrupt)

Me: Right, and if this was a sports book, I never would have sent it, but ... "CLICK"

Again, I was disappointed, but not discouraged. I logged onto the internet to find out who publisher number 76 would be, but truth is stranger than fiction! The next day, I received a call from the man who had hung up on me twice.

Savas: Do you have a publisher for this story?

Me: Yes ... you.

Savas: You know ... I told you not to send it.

Me: I remember.

Savas: When you sent it anyway, I told you I would not read it.

Me: Yes, you did.

Savas: But last night ... I took my son to Karate class along with a handful of manuscripts I wanted to read. When I settled into the chair, I realized I accidentally grabbed yours. I wasn't happy, but read it anyway ... (long pause)

Me: (I stopped breathing.)

Savas: Congratulations. I'll fax a contract to you later today.

Savas Beatie released my book in September 2006 and it was heralded as a surprise hit!

Surprise? I wasn't surprised. I remained hopeful and optimistic that it would be a bestseller. In 2008, Penguin, the world's largest English language publisher, purchased the paperback rights and again, it was released and succeeded. What is the moral of this story?

Never give up on your dream.

# Landscape structures provide function and beauty

Incorporate arbors, trellises and other structures into your designs when planning new or updating existing gardens and landscapes. These structures help form the framework of any garden, add year-round interest and provide years of beauty and function.

Utilize arbors to define and connect distinct areas of the landscape. Invite visitors into your landscape with a vine-covered arbor. Guests won't be able to resist the invitation to enter and experience the beauty that lies beyond. Cover these structures with vines for seasonal interest, additional texture and blossoms. Combine two different vines to extend or double your floral display. Plant an annual vine for quick cover with a perennial that takes a year or more to establish and cover the structure.

Beat summer's heat by creating your own shade with vine-covered arbors. Plant annual or deciduous vines that let the sun and its warmth shine through during the cooler months. When the leaves return, they provide shade and cooler temperatures during warmer times.

Arbors are as much at home in the food garden as the flowerbed. Connect two garden beds with an over-the-top arbor.

Grow pole beans, melons or squash up and over the Titan Squash Tunnel (gardeners.com). You'll

expand your gardening space by going vertical and help reduce disease problems by increasing the sunlight and airflow reaching the plants. Secure large fruit to its obelisk with a net, cotton or macramé sling to prevent them from breaking off the vines.

Dress up any home, garage or shed with trellises covered with flowering vines, climbing roses or an espaliered fruit tree. Provide space between the wall and trellis when mounting them to a building. The space reduces the risk of damage to the wall and the plants benefit from the added airflow and light.

Many trellises are works of art in their own right, so when the plants go dormant the structure continues to dress up an otherwise blank wall. Whether you prefer simple squares and diamonds, circles, leaves or ceramic songbirds perched among the branchlike supports of the Enchanted Woods

Trellis; select a design that reflects your personality and comple-

ments your garden design.

Combine several trellis sections to create a decorative screen or bit of fencing. This is a perfect solution for creating privacy or a bit of vertical interest

in any size or shape of garden space. Add colorful glass bottles and contemporary design to a vertical planting with a trellis like Gardener's Achla Designs Vinifera Bottle Trellis.

Use obelisks as focal points in the garden or containers. They're perfect for creating scale in the garden, especially when new plantings are small and immature. Select a support tall and sturdy enough for the plants you are growing.

Add a bit of beauty and elegance when growing watermelons, cucumbers, pole beans or tomatoes. Train them onto decorative obelisks and they'll be pretty enough to include in flowerbeds and mixed borders. Add more beauty and a bit of hummingbird appeal with scarlet runner beans. The bright red flowers are followed by green beans that can be eaten fresh or its large seeds harvested and used fresh or dried.

Always consider the function, strength and beauty when selecting structures for your

landscape. Team them up with plants suited to your growing conditions and you will benefit from years of enjoyment.

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

# Making Sense Of Cryptocurrencies

(NAPS)

Social and traditional media have been abuzz with articles and information about the rising phenomenon of digital currencies. But what does it all mean and should you buy in?

What Is Cryptocurrency?

Cryptocurrency, or simply crypto, is one type of digital currency. Cryptocurrencies are distinct from "fiat currencies" such as the dollar, euro or yen. Unlike fiat currencies, crypto isn't represented or organized by physical paper units or coins. Rather, each unit is a unique alphanumeric string of computer code.

Also, cryptocurrencies are not issued by a central bank. Instead, they are controlled by technology that determines how many units are produced and how transactions are recorded. While Bitcoin is one of the earliest and most recognized cryptocurrencies, more than 1,000 cryptocurrencies currently exist.

For U.S. federal tax purposes, cryptocurrency is treated as property, which means selling or exchanging it can have tax consequences.



Cryptocurrency is a digital representation of a stored value secured through cryptography, a mathematically intensive encryption process designed to enhance data protection and authentication.

Cryptocurrencies and Risk

Buying, selling and using cryptocurrencies comes with numerous risks.

- In some cases, you can spend and trade crypto, but these products are not legal tender in the U.S. and most other jurisdictions. No law requires companies or individuals to accept crypto as a form of payment. If no one accepts a specific cryptocurrency, that crypto will become worthless.
- Platforms that buy and sell cryptocurrencies can be hacked, and some have failed. Consumers can—and have—lost money.
- Cryptocurrency payments are irreversible. Once you complete a transaction, it cannot be reversed.
- Cryptocurrencies and Investing

All investments come with some degree of risk, and cryptocurrencies are no exception. Only invest what you can afford to lose and be aware that you may lose some or all of your investment.

Investing in cryptocurrencies can take many forms, such as purchasing coins in the hope their value increases or buying shares in platforms or companies that facilitate blockchain technology and other aspects of the cryptocurrency revolution in the hope they succeed.

Another way to invest is through an Initial Coin Offering, or ICO. An ICO is a way for companies to raise

money that involves the creation and sale of digital tokens. A certain number of these tokens are sold to investors in exchange for other cryptocurrencies or fiat currencies like the dollar.

As with any new industry or concept, be alert for fraud, which has occurred in both ICO and direct currency purchases. Pump-and-dump scams are a potential risk with some crypto-related stocks, particularly those that do not list on a major exchange such as the NYSE or Nasdaq.

*Bartlett turns back Panthers in the rain, 9-2*

WEBSTER — On a day when the weather would have been more appropriate if the calendar said March rather than May, the Bartlett High varsity baseball team persevered through the elements and past a scrappy David Prouty Regional team, defeating the Panthers, 9-2, on Monday, May 13.

With the win the Indians moved to within a game of .500, improving to 5-6

overall and 3-5 in Southern Worcester County League (SWCL) play. David Prouty fell to 2-12 overall with the loss, its eighth in a row, and 1-10 in the SWCL.

The Panthers jumped out to a 2-0 lead after 2-1/2 innings, scoring a run in the top of the first and another in the third.

David Prouty grabbed a 1-0 lead on an RBI single to left field by senior Colin Nosek. Nosek drove in class-

mate Cam Dubey (single, double), who drilled a one-out single to left field two batters before Nosek came to the plate.

The Panthers extended their lead to 2-0 when, with one out in the third, senior Sam DuBois singled to left field and went to second on a wild pitch, was safe at third on a fielder's choice grounder off the bat of Dubey and then scored on an RBI single to left by sophomore Trevor Grenier.

Bartlett took the lead for good in the bottom of the inning, sending 10 men to the plate and scoring four times. Junior Mike Toner got things started with a hot smash of a single that ricocheted off Dubey, the Panthers' shortstop, and rolled into short left field. Sophomore Ryan Truscott then walked, moving Toner to second base, and then Toner and Truscott both scored to tie the game, 2-2, on a Panthers' throwing error.

Sophomore Jordan Molina, who advanced to second base on the error, put Bartlett ahead, 3-2, when he scored on an RBI single to center field by junior Logan Paranto. Paranto then stole second and advanced to third on a wild pitch.

During junior Sean Stockhaus's at-bat Paranto attempted to steal home, but was cut down at the plate when David Prouty's catcher, sophomore Zach Paine, took the pitch from Nosek, jumped out in front of the plate and tagged Paranto out. Bartlett had another runner thrown out at third base in the inning.

"We stayed aggressive and we made some mistakes on the bases being aggressive, but on a day when it's cold and rainy we wanted to force the issue," Indians' head coach Jon Way said. "We wanted to make them make plays and they did; they held us in check for a little bit, but we were able to open it up by taking advantage of a couple of errors on their part."

The Indians increased its lead to 4-2 later in the bottom of the third inning when Stockhaus, who reached base on a bunt single, scored on an RBI single to left field by senior Eric Vazquez.

Bartlett extended its lead to 8-2 in the bottom of the fifth inning, taking advantage of three straight walks and scoring runs on an error, a sacrifice fly by Toner, and RBI single to center and left, respectively, by senior Joe Grundel (two singles) and sophomore Jordan Molina.

The Indians closed out the scoring in the bottom of the sixth inning when Vazquez worked a one-out walk and then scored on an RBI double by sophomore Chase Czernicki to push the Bartlett lead to 9-2.

Truscott started on the bump for Bartlett and went three innings, allowing both David Prouty runs on four hits. He struck out three and didn't walk a batter. Junior Casper Sykes, who started the game behind the plate for the Indians, finished the game, allowing just one hit — a double off the bat of Dubey — while striking out three and walking two.

Way said he was pleased with the way his team hung around until they started to string some hits together.

"Their record isn't too stellar, but they're a pretty good ball team. They're young and they fight and they've been in close games," Way said. "We knew it was going to be cold out and that hits and runs were going to be hard to get, and then we come out and we're down by two runs early. At that point we knew we had to compete. We were swinging the bats well early; we were just hitting the ball right at their fielders. We knew if we kept doing that, over time they would start falling in for hits."

David Prouty head coach Sean Bastien said he was pleased with the

way his team battled for the entire game, despite the challenging weather conditions.

"A couple of timely hits by them and a few untimely errors by us and the next thing you know the game starts getting a little out of hand," Bastien said. "But we kept fighting. Our bats have been getting better; we hit the ball better today — we made contact better today — than we have the last couple of games. For us it's all about just trying to improve day in and day out. We're just trying to get better."

CHARLTON — In a game that started out as a pitchers' duel but turned into a slugfest — for one team, anyway — the Oxford High varsity softball squad defeated Bay Path Regional, 11-1, behind another all-around solid performance by junior Crystal Nelson and a productive day at the plate from her classmate, Sam Meech.

The Pirates improved to 7-5 with the win, while the Minutemen dropped to 8-5. The game was played at Allen Field in Charlton, which is located directly behind the library in the center of town.

After staking her team to a 2-0 lead in the top of the first inning with a two-run homer — her seventh round-tripper of the season — Nelson (home run, double, single, three RBI) struggled through the bottom of the first in the pitching circle. Sophomore Kyleigh Sutherland led off Bay Path's half of the first by walking. She then stole second and came home to make it 2-1 when the next batter, freshman Izzy Tanacea, poked an RBI single into right field.

Up next for the Minutemen was senior Kathryn Ryan, who hit a sharp grounder to Oxford shortstop Skyla Hodsdon, who forced Tanacea out at second base and then threw to first to complete the double play. Nelson finished off the inning with a strikeout of freshman Paige Osche, her first of four punch-outs in the game.

"Crystal's been pitching great this year and she had a great warm-up so it was a little surprising that she was a little bit off early but, like always, she settled down and came back even stronger," Meech said. "The double play was big for her and for us. Usually when we get that one big play we're in it for the rest of the game."

Nelson finished the complete game win allowing just four singles and two walks.

The Pirates made it 3-1 in the top of the third inning. With two out Nelson double to left field and then scored when Meech (two singles, two RBI) belted an RBI single to left field. Oxford added another run in the top of the fifth. Eighth-grader C.C. Gendron reached on a bunt single with one out, stole second base and scored to give the Pirates a 4-1 lead on an RBI single by Nelson.

Oxford increased its lead to 6-1 in the top of the sixth, senior Hannah Buxton opening the frame with a double to right field. Freshman Audrey Hayes was up next and she was awarded first after being hit by a Sarah Gosselin pitch. Both runners ended up scoring on a Bay Path error.

The Pirates closed out the scoring in the top of the seventh inning, scoring five runs on four hits, two walks, an error and a wild pitch. Big hits in the inning were an RBI single by Meech, a two-run double by junior Bella Auclair and a two-RBI single by sophomore Bella Buxton.

Meech said an early-season adjustment in her mechanics at the plate has allowed her to string some quality at-bats together.

"Hitting-wise the season was a little rocky at the beginning but it's getting better; I've kind of picked it up at the plate. I've been working on my swing all season," Meech said. "I've been focused on getting my hands back in the box and driving through the zone. I, personally, hit the outside pitch better so I look for that. I'm a little picky on the inside ones. My hits today came on low and outside pitches."

Oxford recorded two stolen bases and two walks in the game and also benefitted from three Bay Path errors and two wild pitches. All of that traffic on the bases allowed Oxford head coach Jamie Hetherman to go to his bread-and-butter, small-ball approach.

"I love playing small-ball;

the key is to put the ball in play," Hetherman said. "Once you do that they have to field it, transfer it and then throw it to first. That's hard to do sometimes. And then when you add the pressure of our first two girls [Gendron and Hodsdon] running hard right out of the box, it sometimes causes the other team to make mistakes and when they do that we've got a runner or runners on with the big part of our lineup coming up."


After the game Bay Path


The rain began to fall, again, and Bay Path ultimately lost another close decision, again. This time the Minutemen were eked out by the Aztecs,

The Minutemen mustered seven hits and ended up stranding eight runners on base, all over the course of the final four innings. All this was happening as Bay Path's Nate Shoemaker was pitching to the best of his ability. Shoemaker tossed all six innings and gave up three runs —

none earned — on five hits to go along with three strikeouts and one walk.

Assabet struck for a run first in the bottom of the third inning when Justin Giusti led off with a single and advanced to second base on a coinciding throwing error. A pair of groundouts to second base moved Giusti over to third and then home, as Andrew Smith was credited with the RBI groundout.

Bay Path tied the game in the top of the fifth, though, when Dom Esposito stepped to the plate with the bases loaded and one out. Dylan Brien, Andrew Leache and Andrew Fritze had all singled for Esposito, who grounded one to second base. Fritze was out on the force play, but Esposito beat the throw and Brien came around to score.

The Minutemen nearly took the lead in the top of the sixth when Shoemaker (3-for-4) got to third base, but he remained stranded on the bag. The Aztecs then took advantage in the home half, scoring twice.

Tyler Dossas opened the inning by reaching on a two-base error. Tyler Boucher (2-for-3) then plated him with an RBI triple and Boucher later scored when Isaac Wagner reached base on an error.

Bay Path, again, had its chances in the top of the seventh when Wagner — Assabet's starter — got wild. Brien walked, Fritze hit a one-out fielder's choice, and Esposito and Erik Johnson (2-for-3) both walked to load the bases and end Wagner's day.

Dossas stepped in to toe the rubber and Shoemaker greeted him with a chopper that maybe went 30 feet. But Fritze scored from third and Shoemaker was safe at first to make it 3-2. But Dossas got Cam Stitis to fly out to right field to end the game.

The Aztecs are now an impressive 12-2, while Bay Path slipped to 6-8.

"We have our work cut out," Sansoucy said of potentially qualifying for the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament, where a record of 10-10 or better will be required. "We've got to get four more wins to keep playing."



# Tinner talks his trade and Revolution

OXFORD – What do tin and the Revolution have to do with each other?

Not much on the surface, but local historian and tinner Larry Leonard wove them together in his role as “Brother Jonathan,” speaking last weekend at a Daughters of the American Revolution gathering.

Leonard, a former teacher, has been a practicing tinner – as opposed to “tinsmith” – for about 25 years.

“The difference is about 200 years,” he noted. “Tinsmith” is a 20th-century term, but the techniques, clothing and other aspects of his character come from the 18th or early 19th centuries. The trade itself goes back many more centuries, and Leonard’s story actually starts around 1600, with a famous children’s tale – Jack and Jill. That story, he said, has roots in tinning. When English King Charles I needed money to fight the 30-Years War but was “having problems with Parliament,” he did one of the few things he could. He introduced a new way of measuring things.

At the time, a “gill” was the common liquid measure equaling a quarter cup, split into two “jacks.” He shrank the latter to get more money, in effect hiking the tax on beer and wine on the grounds “they’re not going to stop drinking.”

The cups were typically made of tin, in large part because it’s lightweight and easier to work than are copper, bronze or steel. (Tin is safer than copper, too; acidic foods in tin are safe, but in copper, they react to create highly toxic verdegris, he said later. Copper cookware is traditionally lined in tin for that reason.)

“I do tin because I’m lazy,” Leonard quipped. “It’s easier than doing copper or brass ... and I can do it in the basement right next to the beer locker.”

Tinning came to America in the 1740s, when Shem Browne “set up shop in Boston

... doing a little bit of everything.” Around the same time, the “Patterson boys” came to Connecticut, where they made from tin “all sorts of neat things you’d normally make of pottery, pewter and silver.” They’d been forced out of Pontypool, Wales, by the guilds of those other tradesmen, and settled here near toolmaker Jedediah North, Leonard has some of North’s tools from the 1820s.

“Many tinner were farmers. You have to do something in wintertime other than make babies,” he said.

The catch, though, was what to do with the winter products come spring. Most farmers couldn’t afford the time to travel to sell them, so they hired someone to do that, giving birth to the Yankee peddler, Leonard said. That itinerant tradition eventually gave birth to a few famous major brands, including Montgomery Ward and Sears.

In the early 1800s, machines – which he dubbed “idiot tools” – began to eat away at the tinning trade, by doing “all the work I do by hand.” At first, tinner used them to keep their apprentices busy, but eventually, the tinner themselves found themselves using the machines on other metals, including aluminum, and doing different things with them to stay afloat.

“Apprentices are worthless, believe me,” he said. “If it weren’t for the fact their fathers paid me to teach them things they don’t want to learn, I wouldn’t have them.”

One of the issues in those days was the fact many containers were sealed using solder – a 60/40 mix of tin and lead. Acidic foods leached out the lead. Leonard said one suspected example was the Shackelford expedition; those Arctic explorers vanished, and evidence later found suggested they’d gone insane due to lead poisoning. To address that, tinner found a way to seal cans by machine without solder, by folding the edges over each

other.

“Once it all became mechanical, you could throw anything you want at it,” he said. “The best thing we can is beer.”

Revolutionary origins: 1620  
Regarding the Revolution, Leonard noted it didn’t really start in 1775, but had roots going back to 1620’s landing in Plymouth. There, the colonists were “well outside the place [they’re] supposed to be, and [their] agreement with the proprietor is null and void,” he noted.

They were supposed to be in Virginia. Instead, they drafted the Mayflower Compact to define how they wanted to run things, with 47 signers (all free, adult males). Everyone agreed to “abide by the rules of the majority,” and created what we now know as Town Meeting. But they weren’t exactly inclusive. They had two groups – the Pilgrims, who “called themselves Saints because they [thought they] had the one true vision of god,” and a mixed group of craftsmen here for economic reasons.

In 1629, their original proprietors gave up their charter, and King James incorporated the Massachusetts Bay and Plymouth colonies under the stipulation the colonies had to pay him “one-fifth of an ore of gold and silver... which were promptly avoided,” Leonard said. “Smuggling was another thing we did very, very well.”

The Crown tried to crack down on New England repeatedly, without much success. In 1654, it tried to prohibit local coinage, but colonists simply kept minting them with the date of 1654. That same decade, Parliament passed a series of Navigation Acts, which required crews to be 90 percent English to ship anything to the colonies and set a long list of other restrictions aimed at quelling smuggling and Dutch trading. Later, in the 1680s, James II tried to consolidate colonial government in the hands of Gov Andros of New York, but the numerous New England colonies refused, arguing it violated their charters, which they hid from royal troops.

That didn’t last long. After James was overthrown, Massachusetts got a new charter with a royal governor and various other officials the colonists themselves paid, local government by Town Meeting, and a House of Representatives elected by Town Meeting who chose the Governor’s Council.

“The governor could not run roughshod over the colony and expect to get paid,” Leonard said.

Wars spark repression  
In practice, that meant a lot of local autonomy for the next several decades. However,

England found herself in several costly wars – Queen Anne’s War/The War of the Spanish Succession (1704-14), King George’s War/the War of Jenkin’s Ear (1740s), and the Seven Years War/French and Indian War (1760s). They left the Crown “very much in debt,” so it hiked taxes on almost everything going to the colonies. Two of the most notable were those on molasses and the infamous Stamp Act, which was applied to almost every document needed to do anything. They had to be paid in cash, but that was in short supply, so colonists created various work-arounds, including a land bank that acted as a form of collateral for IOUs.

“We had absolutely no problem cheating the Crown out of anything,” Leonard said. One way was by trading in kind. That “suits my purpose, but doesn’t suit somebody who’s trying to get ahead.”

Colonists fought the Stamp Act by arguing it was “taxation without representation,” something that was in practice impossible since it took a year to make any round trip to London. The Crown conceded, but replaced it with the Townsend Act taxing various things, including tea (at 6 pence a pound). The British East India Co tried to undercut that by selling its massive stockpiles of tea at half that, which was cheaper than smuggled tea, but the colonists still refused to pay. That famously prompted the 1773 Boston Tea Party, where 340 (maybe 342) chests of BEIC tea were thrown overboard into low-tide mud and “stomped into the ground.”

Although “we want our tea because we’re trying to emulate them because we think we were as good as them,” the tea itself “was vile. It would take paint off a wall,” he said.

The British Army shut

Boston’s port and the Crown passed the “Act for Better Governance of Mass Bay Colony.” That made the governor, his council, judges and other key posts directly appointed and paid by the Crown, allowed only one Town Meeting a year to elect House members, and required all other local warrant items to get the governor’s approval.

The colonists couldn’t tolerate that. When the next round of circuit court meetings were held, locals repeatedly shut them down, refusing to acknowledge them unless they convened under the Charter of 1692 (which they couldn’t). In Worcester, 4422 county residents gathered to blockade Chief Justice Peter Oliver, demanded the judges’ resignation, and made them recant “every five, 10 or 15 feet and beg forgiveness.” Nobody was hurt, Leonard noted, “yet government stopped that day in Worcester. It was the last time anyone tried to meet under the Mandamus Councilor Act.”

Later, Gov Gage sent agents to Worcester to scout out its supplies of weapons, food and other military needs, but decided it was too far away (a four-day hike) to attack... so he chose Lexington and Concord.

“Worcester was the hotbed. Concord and Lexington were little, out of the way places nobody ever heard of,” Leonard said. “... [Gage] knew he was going to ignite a shooting war,” but he’d been ordered to capture John Hancock and Sam Adams.

“We could rely on ourselves and we usually did very well,” he added. “...Benign neglect by England ... came back to bite them.”

## Take a closer look at myths surrounding 529 plans

If you want to help pay for your children’s college education, you might want to consider contributing to a 529 plan. With this plan, your

earnings grow federally tax-free, as long as the withdrawals are used for qualified higher education expenses such as tuition and room and board. Yet, you may have heard some things about 529 plans that are keeping you from investing in one. However, these concerns may be more myth than reality – so let’s take a look at a few of them.

“I need a lot of money to contribute to the plan.” This myth has essentially no truth to it. Typically, only a modest amount is required to open your 529 plan, and you can generally transfer small sums to it from your checking or savings account.

“If my child doesn’t go to college, I lose out on the money I’ve put in.” This myth runs counter to one of the 529 plan’s greatest benefits: flexibility. If you’ve named one child (or grandchild) as a beneficiary of a 529 plan, and that child or grandchild decides against pursuing higher education, you can simply change the beneficiary to another eligible family member. Furthermore, if none of your intended beneficiaries will need the 529 plan, you can name yourself the beneficiary and use the money



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to take classes or receive some other type of qualified education opportunity. In a worst-case scenario, in which the money is never used for education, you will be taxed on the earnings portion of the withdrawals – but had you never contributed to a 529 plan, the funds would have been taxed, anyway. (However, you might be subject to a 10 percent penalty tax, in addition to regular income taxes, again on the earnings portion of the withdrawals.)

“I have to invest in my own state’s plan.” Not true. You’re free to invest in the 529 plan of any state, no matter where you live. But it could be advantageous for you to invest in your own state’s plan, as you might receive some tax breaks for state residents. (The tax issues for 529 plans can be complex, so you’ll want to consult with your tax advisor about your situation.) Investing in your own state’s plan also might provide access to financial aid and scholarship funds, along with possible protection from creditors.

“A 529 plan will destroy my child’s chances for financial aid.” While a 529 plan could affect your child’s financial aid prospects, it might not doom them. And the benefits of building significant assets in a 529 plan could outweigh the potential loss of some needs-based financial aid.

Before investing in a 529 plan, you’ll want to explore it thoroughly, as you

would any investment. You can find details about a 529 plan’s investment options, share classes, fees, expenses, risks and other information in the plan’s program description or offering statement, which you should read carefully before making any purchasing decisions.

But, in any case, don’t let “myths” scare you off from what could be one of

your best college-savings vehicles.
