

Frost, Dotson preparing for rematch

7TH WORCESTER DISTRICT UP FOR GRABS IN NOVEMBER

The upcoming elections in Massachusetts will be relatively quiet on the local level, with many seats being uncontested as November approaches.

One seat that will see some Election Day drama, however, is the 7th Worcester District House seat, with a race that will be a rematch between two candidates that bring very different philosophies to the table — incumbent Republican Paul Frost and Democratic challenger Terry Burke Dotson.

The 7th Worcester District consists of Auburn; Precinct 4 in Charlton; Millbury; and Precincts 2 and 3 in Oxford.

After 20 years as a state representative for the 7th Worcester District, Frost is looking to continue his hold on the seat in November. Dotson will once again compete against Frost for the seat after losing in her first bid for election in 2014.

Stonebridge Press caught up with both candidates to talk about their rematch, and one thing remained clear throughout the interviews —

Church dinner fundraiser benefits summer camp kids

CHARLTON — Roast pork, mashed potatoes, mixed vegetables and a homemade dessert — it's the Men's Fellowship Pork Roast Dinner.

On Monday, Oct. 10, at 5:30 p.m., at the Charlton City United Methodist Church (74 Stafford St.), for just \$10, the Men's Fellowship is inviting family and friends to come enjoy a delicious, home-cooked meal.

The Men's Fellowship hosts these dinners to raise money for the group. Their goal is to send five to seven teenage youths to local summer camps each year, in hopes of keeping the kids inspired and pick up where the adult church members left off.

Each dinner usually raises around \$400 to \$500, which is almost the amount it takes to send one youth to camp. According to Men's

Fellowship member and one of the cooks, Norman Ellis, the cost of summer camp keeps rising. In hopes of keeping up with the costs and reaching their goal, the Men's Fellowship holds a total of six dinners a year, three in the spring and three in the fall.

"The youth come back from camp and tell us what a wonderful experience it was," said Ellis. "Some of them even stand up in church and do a short presentation on what they've learned and done. The parents also appreciate it. Some of them ordinarily wouldn't be able to attend camps if it wasn't for us, because of the cost."

Ellis joined the Men's Fellowship for not only the fellowship, but because he believed in their cause and believed in what they do for not only the youth, but for the com-

'Something for everyone' at upcoming book sale

STURBRIDGE — Looking for some good books to read? The Joshua Hyde Library's Fall Bag of Books Sale is com-

ing on Saturday, Oct. 15. From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the library is holding one of their most popular book sales, where shoppers can fill a bag with gently used books for just \$3. Taking place at the same time as the Harvest Fest, the Bag of Books Sale is always a huge hit.

Throughout the year the Joshua Hyde Library collects gently used books. Some of the books are taken out of circulation at libraries, but most of them are donated from library patrons and town residents. The collection is huge, taking over the library's entire basement and out onto the lawn near the Town Common.

"We have everything that could be found in the library," said Friends of the Joshua Hyde Library volunteer Jane Zavistoski. "There's something for everyone."

The books are separated by genre, including nonfiction – biographies, history, health, sports and cook books – and fiction. There's also a large amount of young adult and children's books. There's even CDs.

The Joshua Hyde Library provides the bags. Last year their fall sale went very well, said Zavistoski. The sale made the Friends around \$700, "which is a lot of books when you think that it's only \$3 for a whole bag of books." They even ran out of children's books by the end of the day.

The money goes back to the Friends, who pay for the extra programs at the library that the town budget does not cover. This includes the Summer

Reading Program, museum passes and adult and children's programs throughout the year, like concerts, speakers and other fun events.

"It's absolutely important for the library to have more than books," said Zavistoski. "It's all for the community. It's a real treasure for the people in this town."

The book sale doesn't only benefit the library however. According to Zavistoski, it's a great opportunity for residents to get some great deals on books. Many new hardcover books can be \$20 or more. At the Bag of Books Sale, patrons can purchase a bag of hardcover books (a bag can fit three or more) for just \$3.

"It's a really good deal if you're into reading," said Zavistoski. "You can really stock up for the winter. As a grandmother, I also appreciate the children's books. I always encourage my grandchildren to read."

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WSU golf simulator named in honor of Sturbridge resident

‘EVERYONE JUST KNOWS WHAT A GREAT GUY HE WAS’

WORCESTER — Friends, family and members of Worcester State University gathered earlier in September to dedicate a golf simulator in the university's brand new Wellness Center to the late Richard R. Korzec, a Sturbridge resident and "cherished member of the WSU Facilities Department who served as head coach of the golf team for 14 years," said Renae Claffey, assistant to the President for Campus Communications.

Korzec's wife, Ann Veneziano-Korzec, who also works at Worcester State, said the dedication was "overwhelming in a positive way." When her husband passed away four and a half years ago, Ann had written an e-mail to the entire campus, thanking them for every kind word, deed, donation and any type of support.

Said Veneziano-Korzec: "At the end, I asked them to stop me when they saw me on campus to tell me Rich stories. I really wanted to keep his spirit alive on campus and in my heart."

It became quickly apparent that staff at WSU had also wanted to keep Richard's spirit alive on campus. A press release from Claffey states: "Korzec was so beloved by his family, friends, and co-workers that a group called 'Friends of Richard Everywhere,'

or Team FORE, successfully raised more than \$55,000 to name a golf simulator in his honor."

The funds were raised with "no trouble," she stated, adding: "Everyone just knows what a great guy he was."

According to Veneziano-Korzec, when the multi-million dollar Wellness Center project had just begun construction, the school had reached out to faculty and asked what their wish for the Wellness Center was. Richard had said: "If I could shoot for the stars, I'd have a golf simulator for the golf team," not knowing it would ever come to be. He never thought it'd be named after him, said Veneziano-Korzec.

Having coached the university's golf team and taught golf courses in the health sciences department, Korzec was an avid golfer himself. He was an athletic person in his younger years, said Veneziano-Korzec, but sports took a back seat when they started raising a family.

"He had a unique sense of humor that touched lives of everyone he met," continued Veneziano-Korzec. "He was known for his sense of humor and his

ability to make people smile."

After being diagnosed with cancer, Korzec passed away at 54 in April 2012. A family always involved with charitable donations, Korzec's wife and three children established the Richard Korzec Memorial Fund, which makes donations on an ongoing basis to numerous charities in Korzec's honor. The golf simulator is just another way for Korzec to continue helping others.

Said Veneziano-Korzec: "On behalf of our family, we acknowledge this dedication with humility and a full heart."

What did you like about it?

Hughes: "I didn't really know until about high school. It was the sound. The versatility of the sound. You can play in a duo, an orchestra and a lot of different settings."

And what drew you to the guitar?

Joseph Van Doran: "I started really little, when I was 8. I wanted to be a rock star

Van Doran: "We have played in Boston, but it wasn't a full concert. This was our first time performing in Massachusetts. It was great."

Hughes: "This library is beautiful. The people were really nice. It's just a beautiful space."

Van Doran: "It was fun!"

Hughes: "We didn't see much driving in. But it looks like a cute little town."

When was your first concert outside of school?

Van Doran: "The first was in junior year, two years ago. It grew into a want to perform outside of school pretty quickly."

What do you like about performing?

Van Doran: "I love getting to share emotions you can't really say, that have to be put into music."

How do you pick the songs you perform?

Van Doran: "We just pick music we like, really. There were a few that we were doing for class at the beginning. But for the past four years we have picked our own pieces."

Hughes: "We pick a lot of contemporary songs and living composers, people who are keeping music alive."

Is performing together something you do for fun or is this what you hope to do for a living?

Van Doran: "This is what we want to do."

Hughes: "We want this to be our life."

When you're not playing music or in school, what else do you like to do?

Van Doran: "That's most of the time! But I like working out. It's a nice way to relax."


Hughes: "I don't know..."



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Southbridge woman arrested for setting fire to Sturbridge Walmart

STURBRIDGE — The Walmart on Charlton Road was still closed as of press time due to smoke and fire damage after Southbridge resident Maiya Cruz allegedly set three separate fires in the building on Sept. 27.

Auburn Police arrested Cruz as a result of an arrest warrant obtained by the Sturbridge Police in Sept. 28 at 9:15 p.m., and was later arraigned at the Dudley District Court. According to Lt. Earl Dessert of the Sturbridge Fire Department, the fire was determined to be deliberately set.

Cruz was charged with three counts of burning of building contents, three counts of destruction of property over \$250, as well as disorderly conduct and disturbing the peace.

On Tuesday, Sept. 27 at approximately 5:25 p.m., Sturbridge police and fire personnel arrived at the Walmart after the jewelry section was reported to be on fire. It was determined that three separate fires had been set throughout the store, some damaging displayed food items. Aside from smoke damage throughout the

building, there was also contamination throughout the store from the release of chemical fire extinguishers. "All three fires had been extinguished by Walmart staff and several customers, who used the fire extinguishers that were located throughout

the store," reported Dessert. "Members of the Southbridge, Brimfield, Spencer and Charlton Fire Departments also responded to the scene to assist with ventilating the building and ensuring the building was safe for re-entry."

After viewing surveillance videos, investigators easily identified Cruz as the main suspect. According to Dessert, she was seen fleeing the area in her car.

"The investigators called her on her cell phone and asked her to come to the station for questioning and Cruz hung up the phone on them," said Police Chief Thomas Ford.

At the time, Cruz had managed to evade being captured and police had urged the public to come forward with any information on her whereabouts.

It was reported that Cruz had been an employee at the Charlton Road Walmart. It has not yet been released or determined why she would deliberately set fire to the building.

"You know what you want to see when you start typing," said Carron, "but sometimes when you present it to others they can help you make it more clear and precise. It's great for grammar and other things you would miss on your own. It helps you write for your audience."

Voter registration deadline for Primary is Aug. 19

Secretary of the Commonwealth William F. Galvin reminds Massachusetts residents that the deadline to register to vote or to change party enrollment for the Sept. 8 state primary is Friday, Aug. 19.

Persons who are U.S. citizens, residents of Massachusetts, and who will be at least 18 years old on or before the State Primary are eligible to register to vote. On the last day to register for the primary, registration will close at 5 p.m. Friday throughout the state. In addition, mailed registration forms must be postmarked by Aug. 19, to be eligible to vote in the State Primary on Sept. 8.

Eligible voters can register online by visiting the office website at www.register tovotema.com.

Those who register to vote by the deadline are not only eligible to vote in the primary — which is on Thursday, Sept. 8 this year — but are registered for the Nov. 8 general election.

Voter registration forms are available online at <http://www.sec.state.ma.us/ele/eleifv/howreg.htm>. They can be filled out on-line then printed out and signed, or printed out first, then filled out by hand and signed. Signed forms must be brought to the

local town clerk or city election department.

Voters registered in a political party (Democratic, Republican, Green-Rainbow, or United Independent) may only vote in that party's primary. Voters registered as "unenrolled" (commonly referred to as independent) may vote in any party primary and will remain unenrolled.

"If you wish to change your enrollment status," Secretary Galvin said, "you can also do it by going online at www.RegisterToVoteMA.com."

Offices to be voted on in the primary are party nominations for Representative in Congress, Governors Councilor, Senator and Representative in the General Court, Sheriff, County Commissioner in Barnstable, Bristol, Dukes, Norfolk and Plymouth Counties, and to complete terms for Register of Deeds in Dukes and Suffolk Counties, and District Attorney in Bristol County.

For information on voter registration, check the Secretary's website at www.sec.state.ma.us/ele. If you are uncertain of your registration status, Secretary Galvin urges you to check with your city or town clerks or registrars of voters before the deadline.



The best bang for your buck when doing minor renovations

Please contact your real estate agent and consult with them before making renovations if you are planning on selling or just to understand how your decisions will affect the resale value of your home. Most of the time I will find that some of the improvements were not necessary and other necessary items were overlooked. The most cost effective simple improvements are:

1. If you have wallpaper, strip the wallpaper and paint. I have found warm water with fabric softener to work well to remove wallpaper. You can also use a steamer or there are products at your local hardware store that can be purchased. I'm sure there are plenty of other methods.
2. Paint all rooms in the entire house with neutral colors, including ceilings because many times we don't realize just how much a fresh coat of white paint on the ceiling will make the room pop.
3. If you have carpets over the hardwoods pull the carpets to expose the hardwoods and refinish the floors. If hardwoods are damaged, you may find installing new carpet that is a neutral color to be more cost effective than the repairs or just have carpets professionally cleaned.
4. Have your home professionally cleaned and setup a cleaning service while the home is on the market even if your home is vacant.
5. For under \$100 you can install some very high wattage light bulbs to brighten up your home. Some sources show return on investment on this being over 700 percent and maybe even consider adding some light fixtures in rooms without them. If it is easy to access

as much as 200 percent return on these investments.

7. Kitchen improvements such as appliances, countertops and cabinets. Sometimes even just painting cabinets will give the kitchen a much cleaner look and make it so buyers don't think they need to replace them right away. Also replacing the hardware on the cabinets can bring them back to life.

Many times sellers will ask if we can include a credit for these items, instead of making the repairs. The challenge with this is most buyers cannot visualize the finished product and usually expect the cost to be much higher than the actual cost especially since they will be factoring in the cost of a professional doing the work when many of the renovations can be done by the homeowner. Even if you don't get extra value for the renovations, it may be the difference between selling your home and not selling your home. Vote for smart investment moves

The presidential election is little more than a month away. Like all elections, this one has generated considerable

interest, and, as a citizen, you may well be following it closely. But as an investor, how much should you be concerned about the outcome?

Probably not as much as you might think. Historically, the financial markets have done well – and done poorly – under both Democratic and Republican administrations. Also, many factors affecting investment performance have little or nothing to do with the occupant of the White House. Consequently, no one can claim, with any certainty, that one candidate is going to be "better for the markets" than another one.

Still, this isn't to say that any given presidential administration will have no effect at all on investors. For example, a president could propose changes to the laws governing investments, and if Congress passes those laws, investors could be affected.

But in looking at the broader picture, there's not much evidence that a particular president is going to affect the overall return of your investment portfolio. As mentioned above, many factors – corporate earnings, interest rates, foreign affairs, even natural disasters – can and will influence the financial markets. But in evaluating a president's potential effect on your investments, you also need to consider something else: Our political system does not readily accommodate radical restructuring of any kind. So it's difficult for any president to implement huge policy shifts – and that's actually good for the financial markets, which, by their nature, dislike uncertainty, chaos and big changes.

The bottom line? From your viewpoint as an investor, don't worry too much about what happens in November. Instead, follow these investment strategies:

Stay invested. If you stop investing when the market is down in an effort to cut your losses, you may miss the opportunity to participate in the next rally – and the early stages of a rally are typically when the biggest gains occur.

Diversify. By spreading your dollars among an array of investments, such as stocks, bonds and other investments, you can help reduce the possibility of your portfolio taking a big hit if a market downturn primarily affected just one type of financial asset. Keep in mind though, that diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.

Stay within your risk tolerance. Investing always involves risk, but you'll probably be more successful (and less stressed out) if you don't stray beyond your individual risk tolerance. At the same time, if you invest too conservatively, you might not achieve the growth potential you need to reach your goals. So you will need to strike an appropriate balance.

Forget about chasing "hot" stocks. Many so-called "experts" encourage people to invest in today's "hot" stocks. But by the time you hear about them, these stocks – if they were ever "hot" to begin with – have probably already cooled off. More importantly, they might not have been suitable for your needs, anyway. In any case, there's really no "short cut" to investment success.

Elections – and even presidents – come and go. But when you "vote" for solid investment moves, you can help yourself make progress toward your financial goals.

Waste not, want not: Tips to save money

The old depression era adage “use it up, wear it out, make it do or do without” rings true today, as the stalled economy has almost everyone tightening their financial belts.

The most simple (and painless) way to boost the family budget is cutting down on household waste. While statistics show the average household has a long way to go when it comes to conserving the basic necessities, a renewed awareness and a little effort can have a huge “payback” — proving the conservation of food, water and fuel is good for the pocketbook as well as the planet!

Food Facts: According to a study done by the USDA, Americans waste almost 27 percent of all the food produced in the U.S. each year. In fact, the average household throws away more than 1.25 pounds of food each day, a 50 percent increase since 1974. That means the average family of four is currently losing approximately \$590 worth of food each year! Ready to do something about it? Read on for some suggestions:

Live by the list: Research reveals grocery shopping without a list can account for spending 20 percent more than planned. The study also shows impulse buying occurs

on almost than 60 percent of all supermarket trips! Whether you jot down your pantry needs on paper or use a shopping list app, this first step can nip food waste in the bud!

Soup it up: Most of us are guilty of throwing out the ends of chopped vegetables, or carrot tops, celery leaves, and stems from herbs and such, but the truth is these throwaways are full of flavor. Make it a habit to toss veggie odds and ends into ziplock bags and store the freezer. Do the same for vegetables that are starting to wilt. When you have enough for stock, simply boil up and strain as a base for homemade soups and stews.

Daily bread: Think before you fling out that stale bagel, bread heel, or bag of post-cook-out hot dog rolls. Allow breads to dry out, and then periodically whirl them in the blender to create flavorful bread crumbs. Add Italian or other seasonings to vary the tastes. You'll never have to buy breadcrumbs again.

Freeze food costs: If you are a single person household or can't consume a loaf of bread before it goes stale, why not freeze the loaf upon purchase and defrost slices on a daily basis? Ditto for bakery items such as rolls and donuts (raised freeze better than cake donuts). Keep baked goods in the freezer and take out as much as you need each morning.

Loose is less: Buying fruits, vegetables, hot dogs and deli meats loose, rather than by

the bag or pound, eliminates waste. As a bonus, you often end up with fresher foods.

Chow challenge: Want to test your culinary creativity while cutting down on food waste and costs? Plan a “grocery free shopping week” every other month. Skip the weekly shopping trip and vow to make meals using only pantry, fridge and freezer foods on hand. This not only encourages creativity in the kitchen but it can be a fun family challenge.

Water Works: Saving our natural resources is an important effort that all ages can participate in. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promotes water efficiency year round, and offers these “water waster” solutions:

Locate a leak: Leaky faucets that drip at the rate of one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons of water each year, but it's not always easy to gauge whether or not you have a leak. Here's an easy test: If you're unsure if you have a leak, read your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, you probably have a leak.

Toilet trouble: According to the American Water Works Association, toilets account for 45 percent of all indoor water use in an average household. It is estimated that 20 percent of all toilets leak - and that translates into 200 gallons of water wasted every day! To tell if your toilet has a leak, place

a drop of food coloring in the tank and wait a half hour. If the color shows in the bowl without flushing, you have a leak.

Tub tip: Did you know full bath tub requires about 70 gallons of water, while taking a five-minute shower uses 10 to 25 gallons? If you must take a bath, be sure to stopper the drain immediately and adjust the temperature as you fill the tub to prevent waste.

Tap the savings: The average bathroom faucet flows at a rate of two gallons per minute. But the simple act of turning off the tap while brushing your teeth in the morning and at bedtime can save up to 8 gallons of water per day, which equals 240 gallons a month!

Offset pump prices: With gasoline prices unpredictable, most of us have practiced the basics of fuel conservation, from eliminating the junk in our trunk and properly inflating tires to avoiding high speeds and jack rabbit starts. Just in case you haven't heard, here are a few more suggestions to cut your fuel costs down to size:

History of auctions

While auction bidders are entering bids on their smart phone they may not be aware that they are taking part in an event whose history dates back as far as Ancient Greece in 500 BC.

A sourcebook on the Fordham University website states that Marcus Aurelius didn't have any money to pay his soldiers during his rule from 161 to 180 AD. He sold his imperial furniture and decorations in the Forum of Trajan. The National Auctioneers Association reports that Rome was the first “nation” to license auctioneers. The “Magister Auctionarium” drove a stake into the ground to start the auction.

When the Pilgrims arrived in America they used auctions to sell “crops, imports, livestock, tools, slaves and entire farms.” Candles were used at auctions in the 1700's. If you were the high bidder on an item when the candle burnt out and the flame died you won the bidding. By the mid-1700's auctions were often held at taverns. Elaborate and detailed catalogs were created to auction works of art. George Washington was an avid auction buyer.

During the Civil War colonels were the only people allowed to auction war plunder. Auctioneers today now hold the honorary title of Colonel. The first

auctioneer school in the United States was opened in 1906. Many auctioneers were needed to liquidate assets during the Great Depression. Over the years, auctions continued to be a preferred method to liquidate business assets, to sell personal property from estates and to sell valuable objects of all kinds.

The Internet has changed the way most businesses operate and auctions are no exception. eBay was founded in 1995 and offers a way to auction items online. There are many other platforms now available for both online sellers and buyers.

When we recently ran an auction with an important collection of radios we took advantage of modern technology but also used some tried and true methods. A scribe entered winning bidder figures into a PC that was networked into other computers used by clerks. The clerks used the computers to check people in and cash them out at the end of the sale. Some bidders had called us prior to the auction and left absentee bids. Our staff also handled telephone bids from bidders who couldn't attend in person. We had a speakerphone so bidders across the country could hear my bid calling while they bid on the radios with their personal computers or smart phones. Despite all of the modern

technology, the auction had an old fashioned feel for those who attended. The client had a catered barbeque and the auction took place under a tent on his lawn. Modern technology is great but I'm sure those who were able to attend and bid live under the tent found that it was well worth the drive to attend in person and be a part of the event.

The preview for a Worcester online moving sale of a doctor's home takes place on Oct. 8. Our September radio auction generated over \$200,000 in sales

Rams' volleyball rallies to take exhilarating five-set win with Wachusett

DUDLEY — Competing in the Midland Wachusett League A Division, perhaps the top league in all of Central Mass., there are no easy matches for the Shepherd Hill Regional varsity volleyball team. With that being said, head coach Tom Caffelle hopes for his team to compete night in and night out, and that was no different when the Rams hosted Wachusett

Regional on Tuesday, Sept. 27.

"We're in a very tough league with a lot of good teams so we knew this was going to be a dogfight, but we've been playing better and we figured if we gave it our best shot we'd compete. That's our goal is always to compete," he said.

And a high compete level can oftentimes produce victories, which was exactly the case as Shepherd Hill outlasted the Mountaineers, 3-2. Set scores

were 25-23, 17-25, 17-25, 25-18, 16-14.

Senior Kyra Foss — who played an integral part in the Rams' victory — was quick to mention that this win was a little more special than the others.

"This was the best win I've ever had at Shepherd Hill," she said. "I don't even know how to feel. Every year we always get killed by them in three sets."

The first set started strong for the Rams when Federica Mozzarelli provided six straight service points — she finished with 12 in total — as they jumped out to a 7-2 lead.

Shepherd Hill maintained its lead until Wachusett rallied to pull ahead, 23-22. But the Rams scored the set's final three points to win a close one, 25-23.

"I was proud of them because we fell behind in that set and then we came back," said Caffelle, who last served as the team's coach in 2013 before returning this fall.

The Mountaineers gained leads of 5-0 and 6-0 in the second and third sets, respectively, and never trailed as they gained control of the match, 2-1.

And Wachusett took a 13-10 lead in set No. 4 before they were unable to get the ball back over the net. Now trailing, 13-11, Foss stepped to the line to serve for the Rams. Eight straight service points later — she finished with a team-high 16 — and The Hill took a 19-13 lead before finishing off the 25-18 set victory courtesy of an ace from Ingrid Lindstrom.

"Every time I hit it I just say, 'This is going over,' and hopefully it does," Foss explained about her serving prowess, adding that she keeps her mindset simple to not overcomplicate the matter.

Now down to the deciding fifth set, which plays to 15 points (win by two), Wachusett surged ahead, 11-7. But the Rams were able to rally again and saw the set tied at 14-14. They took a 15-14 lead when Lindstrom's long hit was un-returnable, and they won the match a point later when a long rally finished with the Mountaineers hitting the ball into the net.

"I was really proud of the way in the fourth and even the fifth set how we fell behind early and we hung in there," said Caffelle. "We always talk about the next point being the important point. There's no three-point play in volleyball — you have to earn them one at a time."

"Today was the fruit of our labor in the sense that we were able to come back and win a set and come back and win a match," he added.

With the Rams' record now

at 5-4, they hope for more improvement and production.

"I think they realize that we have to work hard every day to improve. By improving every day, it allows us to compete," Caffelle explained, adding that the services of volunteer assistant Tony Wong-Li has been a big help. "The goal is to compete, and that's why I told them after the game that this is a great win, but we have to try to

be even better tomorrow."

Should Shepherd Hill get better tomorrow and every day moving forward, a spot in the district tournament — 10 or more wins in the 20-match regular season is the qualifier — can be achieved.

"I'm looking forward to hopefully making it to districts because we haven't done that in a long time," Foss concluded.

Challenged by head coach, Bay Path's defense helps top David Prouty

SPENCER — After the Bay Path Regional varsity football team lost a 44-13 decision to Blackstone Valley Tech on Sept. 24, head coach Matt Fall challenged his defense. The message didn't seem to be delivered when David Prouty Regional's Darrell Beer scored a 22-yard rushing touchdown in the first minute when the Minutemen and Panthers squared off on Friday evening, Sept. 30, at a rain-soaked Eugene R. Hurley Athletic Field. But in the end Bay Path's 'D' proved to be up to the task, holding Prouty scoreless the rest of the way en route to a 34-6 victory.

"The first thing you want to think is, 'Here we go again,' but the mistake that was made on that play was an easy fix. They figured it out," Fall said. "As far as that challenge...I'm going to add on to that challenge a little bit this week, but I'm happy with how they responded after a tough loss last week."

Fall is keeping the exact message between he and the defense private.

"Our defensive line stepped up a lot this week," said Bay Path's Matt Pecore, a member of the linebacker unit. "Our linebackers, we finally got together. We did some good work this week."

Pecore also played full-back and was a vital force on the offensive end. He carried the ball 11 times for 117 yards and 3 touchdowns while also setting up blocks for tailback Pat Dyer (16 carries, 136 yards, TD, two-point conversion).

It didn't hurt that Pecore cherishes playing in what most would call poor playing conditions.

"This is my favorite weather, ever since Dudley/Charlton," he said of learning to play the game in AYP.

Pecore was quick to mention the standout performances of the linemen and Dyer as well.

"Thanks to my linemen I had great yards and great carries this week, and so did my tailback Pat Dyer," he said. "He follows behind me and I'll get him yards no matter what."

Fall also praised the play of the linemen, Pecore and Dyer.

"I have to give props to the offensive line tonight," he began. "After last week they really worked hard this week. Our offensive line coach, Tony Salvaggio, got them rocking this week, and obviously that hard work pays off."

In regard to Pecore, Fall said, "Pecore is a downhill runner and he's a bruiser back. He's going to get you those tough yards."

And Fall noted that Dyer is "a football kid. He has a very good football mind. He really just enjoys the game — all conditions, all weather. He's just one of those kids that you like to coach because he loves the game genuinely."

Dyer tied the score at 6-6 midway through the second quarter on a 48-yard run. On the play he lowered his shoulder and broke a pair of would-be Prouty tacklers before finding the end zone. The Minutemen took the lead at 7-6 thanks to Ben Paquette's extra point kick and were quick to add more points.

Just a minute later — following a successful onside kick — Pecore scored from 22 yards out on a run up the gut that also saw him break a couple of tackles.

The score remained 13-6 at halftime, but Bay Path found the end zone nearing the end of the third quarter to up the advantage to 21-6. Pecore scored on a 9-yard jaunt up the middle, diving into the end zone to elude

a defender. Dyer added the two-point conversion rush.

Then, with 7:56 to play, Pecore broke a shoestring tackle to score from 23 yards out, and Paquette kicked the extra point to make it 28-6.

The Minutemen — who improved to 2-2 — scored their final points with 4:19 to go when John Oloughlin made the most of his only carry, a 54-yard score, which included spinning 360

degrees to break a tackle. David Prouty, meanwhile, lost their first game of the season after starting 3-0.

"We have to get better," said head coach Nate Orzech, noting that their victories were shootouts. "We can't keep giving up 35, 40 points a game or we're not going to win any games."

Orzech also mentioned the stellar play of Bay Path, stating, "They did an awesome job. They

came out and they played better than us and they deserve everything that they got."

It didn't help the Panthers' cause that starting quarterback Kyle Driscoll injured an ankle during the second quarter. As a result, both Joe Thebeau and Evan Fritze split the quarterbacking duties before giving way to Jason Anderson in the fourth period.

"That's completely on

us. We didn't have our kids prepared. They have not had enough reps," Orzech said of Thebeau and Fritze taking over under center. "Those kids did a nice job with the amount of reps that they had."

Beer was Prouty's most productive offensive player, finishing with 143 rushing yards and the TD on 20 carries, while Anthony Barrett made multiple tackles on the defensive side of the ball.

Dotson set to challenge Frost again for 7th Worcester District

in mind. Frost said he cherishes his job as a state representative, and considering how much his district has been through over the past two years, he wants to continue to build on the foundation he has laid in his two-decade-long career in Boston.

"The past two years my district has seen a lot happen. We saw the tragic circumstances of the issues on Route 20 in North Oxford and Charlton. I led the charge with my colleagues in the Legislature in those towns to work with the state Highway Department and the Governor and Lieutenant Governor to come to some interim solutions to improve that dangerous curve section," Frost said. "Auburn has also seen the loss of Officer Ronald Tarentino, which is something I took very personally. It's something that happened on the very street and road I live on. It was obviously heartbreaking for the Auburn community and Police Department for that to happen. We did what we could in the Legislature to help the family and the department and the various charitable efforts, but more importantly, we've worked with the governor to come up with different variations of legislation to help better protect our police officers from those who want to harm them."

Saying he has worked hard to bring

a bipartisan approach to his job, Frost touted his efforts to put the district first and feels his opponent has a skewed perspective on just what the job entails.

"Her top three local issues on her literature (two years ago) as a state representative were to impeach President Obama, reinstate a federal banking issue, which you can't do as a state representative, and the third was to appeal Obamacare across the nation," Frost said. "She means well. She's very passionate in her issues that she fights for, but 99 percent of the things she talks about have to do with the federal government. I think that's where her focus, unfortunately, is not really there in what the job is as a state representative. She might change her focus this time around but you can't run away from what you campaigned on two years ago. We're not federal Congress, we're state representatives."

Now seeking the state representative seat for the second time, Dotson, an Army veteran and public educator who works with high schoolers with learning disabilities, is not a typical modern Democrat. Expressing values and a perspective contrary to many of today's Democratic Party leaders and supporters, Dotson said she brings a more "old school" perspective to a job she believes Frost has held for far too long.

"The reason I lost last time was I was in the hospital two months before the election, and that doesn't help anybody. But, I'm in good shape now. Why will

I win? Paul has done nothing. If he reports he got money for a town, he hasn't fought for that. It comes as a grant and it's figured out by population with each town getting a portion of the state money, so he's really not doing anything," Dotson said. "He's a jolly person. He never says anything that offends anyone, and he does what he is told to do, and that's why he has been in for 20 years — not because he is remarkable or anything else."

Dotson expressed an approach and policy much different from Frost, focusing more on national issues that could create local impact, and one state law, in particular, she feels needs to be addressed immediately.

"Both the Republican and Democratic presidential candidates will reinstate Glass-Steagall. Why is that important to us? The towns get their money from the states, and the states get their money from the federal government, which is presently \$18 trillion in debt with nothing to show for it. The point I want to make is that Glass-Steagall will take care of most of that deficit, and also change the way we get our money. It will put it into the Hamiltonian system instead of the Federal Reserve and that system will have Congress to vote to print money. My role as a state representative would be to get that money through the Glass-Steagall system and bring it here for our towns and it can be done," Dotson said before moving to another issue close to her heart,

the state's transgender law. "Paul Frost voted for a badly written transgender law. I opposed that and I've been one of the people out there gathering 33,000 signatures we need to bring it up for all the citizens in Massachusetts to vote on. Once it's repealed, then I would say girls for girls rooms and boys for boys rooms and a one-at-a-time bathroom with a lock on it that can be used by a family or someone who is transgender. Transgender people are not a threat. However, allowing men into the lady's bathroom and locker rooms and all that is just opening it up for abuse by predators and perverts and all they have to say is they 'feel like a woman' today. It's the stupidest law that has ever been written and doesn't protect transgenders or anyone else."

While Frost and Dotson may not see eye to eye, both are clearly passionate candidates with one hoping to continue his work for the 7th Worcester District for another two years after a 20-year stint holding the seat, and the other hoping for a change of the guard to bring something new, different and, hopefully, just as effective, if not more so, to the table. Voters will have the final say on Nov. 8, an election day that so far is panning out to be one of the most historic voting days in United States history.
