# Firefighter accused of assaulting dispatcher

STURBRIDGE — Auburn firefighter Adam P. LaFlash of Sturbridge, who is a full-time fire lieutenant for the Auburn Fire Department and has been working as a part-time call firefighter for the Sturbridge Fire Department for nearly three years, has been accused of sexually and physically assaulting a female dispatcher early in the morning on

Sunday, April 28 at the Sturbridge Public Safety Complex.

According to Timothy J. Connolly, Director of Communications for the office of Worcester County District Attorney Joseph D. Early, Jr., LaFlash, 36, was charged with and pleaded not guilty to three counts of indecent assault and battery on a person 14 or older and two counts of assault and battery at Dudley District Court on Monday, April 29. A

judge ordered that he be released on a \$200 bail with the condition of his release being that that he stay away from and have no contact with the victim. He is due back in court on Monday, June

The Town of Sturbridge has suspended LaFlash's part-time position, and the Town of Auburn has placed LaFlash on paid administrative leave from his full-time position until they do an investigation and see the

outcome of his next court of court proceedings as date. Auburn Fire Chief Stephen M. Coleman, Jr. released a statement on social media recognizing the incident.

"We are aware of the allegations against one of our members that occurred in the Town of Sturbridge while working secondary employment with the Sturbridge Fire Department," he said. "The employee has been placed on paid administrative leave pending the outcome

well as our own internal investigation on the matter. As this is a personnel matter, we will not comment further until this case makes its way through the court system and all investigations are complete."

According to a police report, the Sturbridge Police Department began investigating later in the day on Sunday, April 28 starting with an interview with the dispatcher. She accused LaFlash

of grabbing, kissing, and groping her without her consent multiple times after he returned from responding to an ambulance dispatch for a car accident. She also said he had been sending her inappropriate messages over text and through Facebook. The two had exchanged messages prior to this occurrence in 2018, but she blocked him after becoming uncomfortable with his messages and said she

## Juvenile suspects arrested for vehicle break-ins

CHARLTON - Charlton police made four arrests on Saturday, May 4 after a local resident observed a group of juveniles breaking into vehicles in the early morning hours.

According to a release from the Charlton Police Department, calls were received at around 3:16 a.m. from the area of Roberts Boulevard where a resident was letting his dog out and observed the youths breaking into vehicles in the neighborhood. The juveniles fled in a stolen vehicle which the resident described to police in a call to 911.

Charlton Officer Christopher Birtz was the first to spot the vehicle on Daniels Road and pursued the car onto Colburn Road. The vehicle did not stop after Officer Birtz activated his blue lights and sirens. The suspects then went onto A.F. Putnam Road eventually making their way down Oxford Road and Muggett Hill Road, turning onto Freeman Road Extension before crashing into the nearby woods at the intersection of Old Muggett Hill Road. One juvenile male was taken into custody at that time but the three remain-


Maddie's family is thrilled by the rapid response of the community. Whenever a family in town is in need, Leicester residents and organizations are always quick to offer assistance. The Deja New organization played a significant role in this latest fundraising effort.

"I am speechless. We were able to raise all the funds in less than two weeks," said Maddie's mother, Lisa Cole. "The Deja New team was with us every step of the way and donated the last \$2.500 we needed from the proceeds from their Taste

## Annual 5K supports melanoma research

FISKDALE—For the 14th year in a row, runners and supporters will be participating in the annual BB5K Run/Walk and Festival at Hyland Orchard on Saturday, May 25 at 9 a.m. to raise awareness for and educate people on melanoma, the most deadly type of skin cancer that can affect anyone but is most prevalent in people ages 25 to 29 and women ages 30 to 35.

The race was founded in 2005 in honor of Jennifer Tietgen, a local victim of melanoma who died in 2002 at the age of 27 after undergoing five years of unsuccessful medical procedures and chemotherapy. She was hardworking and determined, and despite her diagnosis and rigorous treatment, she graduated on time with a 3.9 GPA and a master's degree in Industrial/ Organizational Psychology from

New Haven University and always kept a positive attitude about her condition.

After Tietgen's death, her family started the Jennifer Linscott Tietgen Foundation to help educate others and all the proceeds from the BB5K, which stands for Tietgen's motto 'Be a Believer,' are used to support that foundation, the Melanoma Education Foundation, and Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center in Buffalo, N.Y.

"I hope that the 5K continues to be another way to educate family and community members about melanoma, because it's so preventable if caught early," said Tietgen's sister Peg Hall, a resident of Sturbridge. "This really isn't about getting a lot of runners or running a long distance, but about educating people in our own

community.' The main goal of the race is to open up a conversation about melanoma and help people learn more about the importance of getting checked for it, because although it can be very deadly, it is preventable and treatable if its caught before it has metastasized.

'We've had several people who, because they've come to the race, have gotten to a dermatologist and caught melanoma early," said Hall. A major part of what the Melanoma Education Foundation

## Harrington Hospital designated lung cancer screening center

SOUTHBRIDGE-Harrington Hospital has been designated a Lung Cancer Screening Center by the American College of Radiology (ACR), a high honor that has many clinical and technical requirements, as of Thursday,

The ACR Lung Cancer Screening Center designation is a voluntary program that recognizes medical facilities that have proven their commitment to providing safe and effective diagnostic services to individuals who are at the highest risk of having lung cancer. In order to receive this designation, a facility must have ACR computed tomography (CT) accreditation in the chest module, undergo an assessment of its lung cancer screening practices and technology, and have procedures in place for follow-up patient

care, such as counseling and programs to help patients quit smoking.

"This requires a lot of control quality and proves that we are taking each case seriously and working with a multidisciplinary team," said Blaine

Schnare, Marketing Director for Harrington HealthCare. "Being designated is a rigorous process that takes time and a lot of paperwork before even being considered.'

Harrington Hospital launched its Early Lung Cancer Screening Detection Program, which uses CT scans to help detect lung cancer at an earlier stage in high-risk patients, in 2015. Since then, the number of scans it has completed each year as increased continuously. In 2018, the hospital did 1,144 scans, a 24 percent increase over 2017 and a 57 percent increase over the first full year of the program in 2016. According to Jean Comeau, an interventional radiology nurse and the nurse navigator for Harrington's Lung Screening Program in Southbridge, there is an anticipated 10 percent increase by the end of 2019.

Patients who qualify for this program include those who are between age 55 and 77, current smokers or those who quit less than 15 years ago, and those who have a history of 30-pack years, which means smoking one pack per day for 30 years, two packs per day for 15 years, and so

on. Those who are

eligible start with a consultation from a referring physician and a discussion about what can be done to improve their health.

The screening itself is a 10-minute low-dose CT scan that is offered at both the Southbridge and Webster Harrington locations. The results of the scans are studied by Harrington's radiology team along with radiologists, oncologists, thoracic surgeons, and pulmonologists at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center and Harvard Medical School. After reviewing the findings, these experts plan the best treatment options for each patient.

Southbridge currently has one of the highest levels of lung cancer cases in the region and, according to a study in the New England Journal of Medicine, lung cancer screening with low-dose computed tomography scans along with follow-up care significantly reduces lung cancer deaths by detecting many tumors at early stages. Harrington Hospital is therefore in an ideal location for helping people catch lung cancer as soon as possible.

This is also the second year in a row that Harrington has been designated a Screening Center of Excellence by the Lung Cancer Alliance for following the best lung screening practices.

## VGG clarifies claims against Rydlak

CHARLTON – Following alleged accusations of illegal activity against Charlton Planning Board Chair Patricia Rydlak, legal representatives of Valley Green Grow, or VGG, have backtracked on a statement made to the state Land Court in March.

During a meeting of the Charlton Board of Selectmen on April 23, Rydlak readdressed the accusations against her which insinuated that she had illegally recorded a call between the Land Court Judge Robert Foster and attorneys after she revealed she had a copy of that call during a Board of Selectmen meeting on March 18. In April, Rydlak accused a town employee of conspiring with Valley Green Grow to discredit her after Valley Green Grow's legal representatives submitted a document to Land Court commenting on her possession of the recorded audio and Facebook posts where she claimed to be listening to the meeting. At a previous meeting, Rydlak and selectmen showed concern that someone had taken the information from the public meeting and passed it to VGG attorneys to be used against Rydlak and the town in court.

However, according to Rydlak, it appears VGG is making it clear they are not accusing her of a crime. She read an updated statement that was sent to Land Court prior to the April 23 meeting: "In their March 28 letter they talked about the alarming event and did their whole accusation. It clearly says I committed a crime. It referenced a crime. In the new letter — I'll quote — it says 'We have not made and do not now make any accusations or claims that Ms. Rydlak in fact violated any laws," Rydlak said

Rydlak has vehemently denied any wrongdoing and claimed that the accusations were impacting her professional and personal life. She also sought legal representation from the town to help her fight against the accusations if they came to court. However, On April 23, Select Board Chair John McGrath revealed that the town can't appoint an attorney at this time as no actual charges have been levied against Rydlak.

"Because there has been no action taken, so there has been no court case filed, nothing kicks in. If there is a court case filed, then things kick in. So, if somebody filed in court saying Ms. Rydlak said this and did this then my guess is our insurance agency would pick up on that but because nobody has made a formal complaint in court against (Rydlak) there is nothing that the town does legally," McGrath said.

What this means is that Rydlak could receive help from the town if she was the target of a specific case against her. However, if she chose to pursue defamation lawsuits or the like against Valley Green Grow or their attorneys, she would have to hire her own private legal representation in that matter.

One of the biggest talking points in the discussion remained who was responsible for passing on information from the Board of Selectmen meeting in March that led to the accusations against Rydlak. Selectman Karen Spiewak made a bold statement that whoever it was should step forward and even suggested a name, special town counsel Jonathan M. Silverstein of KP Law, as the individual in question. Silverstein was present on March 18 when Rydlak revealed she had a recording of the Land Court meeting in a public forum.

"I think we could save a lot of time and this town possibly a decent amount of money if we just got some answers to questions regarding how this happened," Spiewak said, naming Silverstein as the suspect. "Who instructed him, if it was him, to do that or did he take it upon himself to do it? If anyone else had encouraged him to do so that would be very important. It's important so that history doesn't repeat itself we learn how it happened and so that it doesn't happen again."

Spiewak demanded that attorney Silverstein provide input on what actually happened and any details concerning his involvement in the situation. The Webster Times reached out to attorney Silverstein for comment and he confirmed that he had been in touch with VGG counsel Michael Rosen after the March 18 Board of Selectmen meeting. Silverstein said he was informed by attorney Rosen about Facebook posts from Rydlak that suggested she was listening to the meeting before March 18 and that no one other that the counsels and judge had identified themselves on the call.

"(Attorney Rosen) asked me if I was aware that Ms. Rydlak had listened

to the conference. I advised him that I had not previously been aware of this fact but had just learned it the previous evening, when she stated in an open meeting that she had a recording of the conference. This is the extent of this discussion. It was very brief. I have never communicated with the Court regarding this matter," Silverstein said in his statement to The Webster Times. "I must note that, as an attorney, I have an ethical obligation to be truthful and honest in my dealings with other counsel. My role as counsel does not permit me (much less compel me) to lie to counsel for another party. I would have no reason to mislead other counsel or withhold information that was volunteered by Ms. Rydlak herself at a public meeting, and I would not do so. Moreover, even had I refused to answer Mr. Rosen's question, he could simply have obtained and reviewed the minutes of the meeting, which clearly demonstrate that Ms. Rydlak stated she had a recording of the Court confer-

Silverstein went on to say he did not encourage VGG's counsel to submit his statements to the Land Court regarding the recording. He added that he even declined to participate or join that correspondence to the judge. He concluded that the simple fact remains that someone, whether Rydlak or another party, listened in on and recorded a Land Court discussion without proper consent. "Someone improperly listened in on the Court conference without identifying themselves (despite a direct request by the Court that all persons on the call do so), and that person recorded the conference without the knowledge or consent of the participants," Attorney Silverstone said. "It is ironic indeed that the only person who apparently knows who did so is attempting to suggest it was somehow improper for me to act honestly and ethically in responding to a question posed to me by another party's

attorney."
Selectmen did consider bringing Silverstein in to discuss the matter in a public forum at a future meeting.



Leicester got off to a blazing start, with \$12,000 raised in the first week alone. The extensively trained dog will be particularly helpful in alerting while Maddie is asleep, family members said. Her seizures do not respond to conventional seizure medications, diet therapies or surgical treatments. Striking at all hours of the day, the seizures number anywhere from 50-75 per day, sometimes requiring rescue intervention.

'We hope to give her more indepen-

dence at night since most conventional seizure monitors don't detect many of Maddie's seizure types. This has required a parent to sleep next to her during the last few years," said Lisa


Maddie lives at home with her parents and two sisters, who join forces every day and night to protect her from seizures, foregoing vacations and losing sleep to constantly guard against the next event. Maddie has always been close with her twin sister, Kelsey, and her little sister Avery has also learned how to respond when Maddie is having a seizure.

Unable to verbally communicate, Maddie is learning to make choices using an iPad program. She also continues to work with her special education teacher and therapists to gain new skills and knowledge. Once her family acquires the seizure alert dog, her life at home will dramatically improve.

"Her dog will be trained to help with balance issues so she can better maneuver around her environment without getting hurt," Lisa Cole added. "It will also help her walk on her own without wandering off and getting into danger. It can also be trained to track her if in an emergency she does wander off unattended.'

Moreover, the dog will be trained to meet many of Maddie's sensory needs on a daily basis. Sometimes she seeks deep pressure input, and the dog will be trained to lay across her legs to help

'Most importantly, the service dog will be Maddie's companion to comfort her through all the seizures and medical procedures," Lisa Cole said.

# Is college debt a catastrophe in the making?

It's that time of year when high school seniors are committing to colleges and making a plan for what will happen after graduation day. College tuition has become so incredibly unaffordable for a large segment of the population that many students are opting out or seeking a career in various trades in which they may stand to make more money than a classmate with a four year degree, depending of course on which route they take.

Harvard University cost ten schillings per year in the early 1700's, which was equal to about a pair of shoes and two pairs of stockings. Interesting to note is that back then, most jobs did not require a degree, license or certification, and laborers learned via apprenticeship. If the price of Harvard over time had continued to rise at an 18th century rate of inflation, tuition today would cost \$1,703 per year. However, that is not the case, and the current tuition at Harvard is upwards of \$67,580 a

Many of the presidential hopefuls on the campaign trail have mentioned the student debt crisis, and have proposed various ways to help students climb out of that hole.

As a society, we stress the need for a solid, good education. Any job that pays a livable wage requires you to have a degree: however, many students are not making much more than their counterparts who chose to enter the work force right out of high school. This depends on where you live and what you

The significant increase in college tuition has angered many parents and students. One has to wonder how a financial aid office at any given school comes up with the numbers for a student's financial aid package. In one recent example that came to our attention through a close friend, a student with a single mother who makes roughly \$30,000 a year was only offered \$13,000 in financial aid toward a firstyear tuition of \$73,000. In view of such a clearly inadequate offer of assistance, one cannot help but wonder if there might not be a more than a hint of classism involved in this particular school's financial aid policies.

Students who do make it through their four years — although even that can vary based on the requirements associated with their degree of choice — will graduate with an exorbitant amount of debt, a bill they could potentially be paying well into old age.

In days gone by, state universities were free, with the exception of some small fees. In the 1960's social and legislative changes turned higher education into a business; hence, the beginning of the student loan debt crisis we see today.

Through some research, we discovered an interesting timeline that laid out the path higher education has taken since its inception during Medieval times in Europe. In days of old, few of these schools charged tuition and were supported by the government or a church, and areas of study were limited.

In 1796, Thomas Jefferson proposed an education system that was supported through taxes. He did this because he believed that for a government to truly work, its people needed to be educated. As a result, in 1818, the government began subsidizing elementary schools, and Jefferson used a \$15,000 grant to start The University of

In the early 1800's, many colleges did not charge tuition; however, only the wealthy could afford the living expenses incurred during study. In 1810, students lived as simply as possible, keeping room and board rates extremely low, compared to today's living conditions

In 1870, Harvard's tuition was

# Do-It-Yourself Painting Pointers

After a long, cold, New England weather, stuffy homes call for a makeover, and that includes revamping an interior room or two in anticipation of the sunny season. Since nothing transforms a space quicker or cheaper than paint, it's a nat-

ural choice for a mini makeover. Whether you're painting an entire room or a piece of furniture, the following ideas and techniques can help

ensure paint perfection!

Paint is one the easiest, cost effective ways to alter and enhance the spaces you live in. The golden rule to painting walls is that dark colors absorb light, making a room appear smaller, and whites and pastels reflect the light, creating a spacious feel. To expand a small room, paint the walls a color from the cool end of the color wheel. In fact, paint company Sherwin-Williams recommends choosing blue, green or violet hues to make walls appear to recede.

Paint can also be used to visually correct architectural flaws. To widen a long narrow room, use a slightly darker color on the shorter walls and a lighter color on the longer walls. To make a low ceiling appear higher, be sure the ceiling is a lighter color than the walls. A long hallway can be shortened by painting the wall at the end a dark color to bring it closer. And rectangular rooms can instantly appear more symmetric by painting the two short end walls a darker shade.

The proper paint finish can be used to camouflage imperfect walls. For example, Paints that have no sheen, also known as "flat" or "matte" finishes absorb the light. These porous finishes are ideal for hiding flaws in ceilings and walls and are especially appreciated when working with old, plaster surfaces. The downfall is they cannot withstand cleaning and scrubbing so they are not practical for kitchens, bathrooms, children's rooms or other high traffic areas.

Eggshell finish has a slight sheen, similar to that of an eggshell, so it is still somewhat effective at hiding flaws. Its velvety look makes it a popular choice and eggshell finish is a bit more reflective than flat paint so it doesn't show every scuff and can tolerate light cleaning.

Satin finish paint is more durable than matte or eggshell finishes. It has a light sheen, and resists moisture, which makes it a popular option for kitchens and bathrooms.

Semi gloss finishes reflect light and offer a bright, glossy finish which can really add to a room's appeal. Surfaces are easily cleaned, however the shiny finish shows surface imperfections, making it impractical for many applications. Newer trims and moldings are ideal candidates for semi gloss paint.

A glossy finish provides a high gloss shine, is very durable and easy to clean. The brilliant shine is typically used for small accent areas, as the finish is very reflective and too distracting for most area applications.

Not sure how much paint to buy? Most major paint companies and home center offer easy to use paint calculators on their websites for precise measuring. Or, to estimate the amount of paint you need in order

to cover the walls of a room, multiply the perimeter of the room by the ceiling height to get square feet. Subtract 20 square feet for each door and 15 square feet for each average-sized window in the room. The figure you end up with is a pretty close estimate of the actual wall area. Keep in mind, you can expect one gallon of paint to cover approximately 350 square feet.

Want to know the most efficient order of painting a room? Experts advise painting ceiling, walls, trim, cabinets, and doors.

Color Cues: Studies reveal the color of a room's walls can affect a person's mood and well being. According to the Paint Quality Institute, yellow is a mood brightener, promoting happiness, hope and optimism, and "creating positive psychological vibes."

Here are more paint color claims: \*Light green can refresh and invigo-

rate the mind. \*Medium green, such as sage green



# Warriors wear out Auburn pitching for big victory

AUBURN — The Tantasqua Regional varsity baseball team, taking advantage of control issues by a pair of Auburn High pitchers, jumped out to an early double-digit lead and then withstood a furious late-inning rally by the Rockets to hang on for a 12-9 win in a game played on Wednesday, May 1.

The Warriors (4-8 overall, 3-5 in the Southern Worcester County League) jumped out to a 9-0 lead in the top of the first inning, taking advantage of five walks, four hits, two hit batsmen and a sacrifice fly. Tantasqua increased its lead to 11-0 in the top of the second inning on three straight hits, the first of which was the first high school home run by Deven Kingman.

For Auburn (8-4 overall, 6-1 SWCL) Aidan Gowaski got the start on the mound and only lasted one-third of an inning, allowing eight runs on three walks, three hits and two hit batsmen. He was relieved by Kyle Sebastyanski, who pitched two-thirds of an inning, allowing three runs on four hits, two walks and a sacrifice fly.

With the score 11-0 and no outs in the top of the second, Rockets' head coach Eric Swedberg relieved Sebastyanski with left-hander Ethan Leonard, who got Auburn out of trouble by setting down the next three Warriors' batters in order. Leonard went on to finish the game, allowing just one run on six hits and a walk. Leonard struck out four in his six innings of work.

Ethan Leonard did a great job for us today," Swedberg said. "Had I known Tantasqua was going to be locked in on power righties I would have started Leonard, but you can't know that until

In the bottom of the fifth inning, still trailing 11-0, it was the Rockets' turn to take advantage of some control issues by the Tantasqua pitching staff. Auburn cut the Warriors' lead to 11-7, scoring in the frame on four hits, six walks and a sacrifice flv.

The Rockets in fact could have crept closer to the Warriors had it not been for a bases-loaded circus catch by Tantasqua's Dylan Willitts for the final out of the inning. Willitts, going to his right, overran the fly ball off the bat of Ryan Lempicki, slipped as he tried to change direction and, falling down made a frantic lunge at the ball, which somehow found his glove.

Tantasqua head coach John Leroux, a member of Auburn's 2009 state championship team, used three pitchers in the inning. Starter Ben Kelley began the inning, but he ran out of gas after six batters and six runs. He was replaced by Kyle Renaud, who faced six batters and allowed a run on four walks, a hit and a sacrifice fly. Kingman relieved Renaud with two outs in the inning and got out of further danger thanks to Willitts' potential game-saving grab.

Auburn inched closer to tying the game in the bottom of the sixth inning, cutting the Warriors' advantage to two, 11-9, on two walks, a single and a wild pitch. After allowing two walks and a hit to the first three Rockets' batters in the inning, Kingman settled down and retired three of the final four batters he faced in the sixth.

Tantasqua added an insurance run in the top of the seventh to extend its lead to 12-9. Roman Krochmalnyckyj smacked a one-out double to left-center field and then came home when the next batter, Dominic Brown, doubled to almost the same spot.

Kingman ended the game in the bottom of the seventh, working around walk and a single to keep the Rockets off the scoreboard in the inning.

"The kids played great today," said Leroux, whose team followed its win over Auburn with a win over Holy Name High on Friday, May 3. "We've been struggling mightily, basically all year and today it seemed like we finally broke through.'

Krochmalnyckyj and Roger Leland paced the Tantasqua offense, each recording two singles and a double. Kingman and Andrew Parker each had two hits.

"We hit the ball hard and everybody played the way we expected them to play from the beginning of the year. Everything came together today so that was awesome to see from a coaching perspective," Leroux said. "Finally







\$150 per year, while Brown University was just \$75. This equals out to about \$3,000 in today's terms. Again, only the wealthy could afford to attend.

A spike hit in 1920 when admissions doubled between then and 1930. The cost was about \$250 per year, with 20 percent of college aged Americans attending university.

The G.I. Bill was passed in 1944, but has since been modified.

In 1965, the Higher Education Act passed. This act helped provide financial assistance for those who needed it. In 1973, in today's dollars, an average year, at an average school cost just over \$9,000 and just over \$2,000 for an in state public school.

In 1972, only 49 percent of high school graduates went on to college. Back then, grants covered 80 percent of the

costs. Today, more and more students are heading off to school, leaving less grant money to go around. In 1975, the rates started to increase faster than inflation. Prior to the 1970's, tuition rates increased roughly two or three percent each year. In 2003, the cost went up 14 percent in just one year. In 1987, the rate for a public school saw a 44 percent change.

With student loan debt having become such a burden that it is forcing college graduates more and more to put off marriage and starting families (birth rate statistics among Millennials have seen enough of a drop off from previous generations to spark recent media coverage), we must ask ourselves whether this situation is sustainable in the long term. We grant that no-cost higher education may be beyond the realm of possibility at this point, but how much longer can the current system hold before reaching its breaking point?

"My kids either run it or volunteer, usually they are in charge of parking, and my mom and my sisters are up at the registration table," said Hall. "My dad always runs it and is the last one to cross the finish line every year."

The search led them in the direction of Bay Path High School. The officers located footwear lost by the suspects during the pursuit. # Potential culprits behind thinning grass

Thick grass is often a hallmark of a healthy lawn. If grass begins to thin, homeowners may feel as though all the time and effort they spent tending to their lawns was for naught.

Thinning grass can be caused by any number of things. And while it might take a little effort to address, thinning grass can be treated if homeowners correctly identify that cause of the prob-

#### LEAF SPOT

The Center for Agriculture, Food and the Environment at the University of Massachusetts Amherst notes that leaf spot diseases affect both cool- and warm-season turfgrasses. Various fungi can cause leaf spot. Symptoms and the timing of the appearance of leaf spot will vary depending on which fungi is causing the problem. For example, bipolaris sorokiniana, which affects grasses in warm, wet summer months, produces small spots that are dark purple to black. Dreschslera poae is another fungi that causes leaf spot, and it also produces dark purple to black spots. However, it tends to appear in the spring when the weather is cool and moist. Understanding the different fungi and when they typically strike can help homeowners identify what is causing their grass to thin. In such situations, professional landscapers can be invaluable resources as well.

#### **STRIPE SMUT**

The University of Maryland Extension notes that stripe smut primarily poses a threat to Kentucky bluegrass that is older than three years. Pale green streaks that run parallel to the veins in the leaves and leaf sheaths are symptomatic of stripe smut, which tends to be noticed in spring and fall, when weather is cool. As the disease progresses, stripes turn black or a sil-



very gray, causing the leaf blade to shred and curl. After the blades have shred, they turn brown and die. The grass thins because stripe smut makes it vulnerable to problems like drought.

#### ASCOCHYTA LEAF BLIGHT

Lawns suffering from ascochyta leaf blight will become straw-colored. According to the lawn care and pesticide experts at Ortho®, when a lawn is affected by ascochyta leaf blight, its healthy grass blades will be mixed in with diseased grass blades. Most prevalent in the spring, this disease can affect grass at any time during the growing season. That's because the ascochyta fungi invade leaf blades through wounds, such as those that can result from mowing. Ortho® notes that dull lawn mowers can contribute to the disease, which might disappear on its own and can even return after it's seemingly been cured.

Various issues can cause grass blades to thin. Working with a landscape professional is a great way to combat such issues before they compromise the look of a lawn.







# Surprise Mom with a special dessert in her honor

Try this tasty recipe for "Cold Mango Soufflés Topped with Toasted Coconut" from "The Complete Mexican, South American & Caribbean Cookbook" (Metro Books) by Jane Milton, Jenni Fleetwood and Marina Filippelli.

Cold Mango Soufflés Topped With Toasted Coconut (Makes 4)

- 4 small mangoes, peeled, pitted and chopped
- tablespoons water 1 tablespoon powdered gelatine
- egg yolks cup superfine sugar
- 1/2cup milk
- cups heavy cream Grated rind of one orange Toasted flaked or coarsely shredded coconut, to decorate

Place a few pieces of mango in the base of each of four 23-cup ramekins.

Wrap a creased collar of nonstick parchment paper around the outside of each dish, extending well above the rim. Secure with adhesive tape, then tie tightly with string.

Pour the water into a small heatproof bowl and sprinkle the gelatine over the surface. Leave for 5 minutes or until spongy. Place the bowl in a pan of hot water, stirring occasionally, until the gelatine has dissolved.

Meanwhile, whisk the egg yolks with the superfine sugar and milk in another heatproof bowl. Place the bowl over a pan of simmering water and continue to whisk until the mixture is thick and frothy. Remove from the heat and continue whisking until the mixture cools. Whisk in the liquid gelatine.

Puree the remaining mango pieces in a food processor or blender, then fold the puree into the egg yolk mixture with the orange rind. Set the mixture aside until starting to thicken.

Whip the heavy cream to soft peaks. Reserve 4 tablespoons and fold the rest into the mango mixture. Spoon into the ramekins until the mixture is 1 inch above the rim of each dish. Chill for 3 to 4 hours, or until set.

Carefully remove the paper collars from the soufflés. Spoon a little of the reserved cream on top of each soufflé and decorate with some toasted flaked or coarsely shredded coconut.
