Incumbents reelected to BOS

DUDLEY – Despite having no opposed candidates on the ballot Dudley's annual town election on June 11 still contained a bit of drama mostly from write-in candidates.

A total of 301 voters turned out for the election, only four percent of the 7,215 registered voters in town, with every candidate actually presented on the ballot going unopposed. However, it was those whose names weren't actually on the document that provided a bit of dramatic flair for an otherwise quiet day at the polls.

Kathleen Carmignani earned a spot on the Dudley-Charlton Regional School Committee after receiving 138 votes as a write-in candidate over the course of the day. The open position originally had no candidates listed on the ballot.

While Harrison Records ran unopposed for a seat on the Library Board of Trustees, a second seat was filled by write in candidate Joyce Nierodzinski who only received 38 votes. It was enough to defeat another write-in candidate, incumbent trustee Benjamin Craver who failed to procure enough signatures to run on the ballot for reelection and lost by only two votes when the final tally came in.

Another seat that saw no candidates on the actual ballot, but several write-in candidates come forward was a seat on the Planning Board. Write-in candidate Dan Edmiston earned a spot on the board with only

Significant changes in Webster if town meeting approves articles

WEBSTER – On Monday, June 25, town meeting voters will decide several warrant articles that might pave the way for significant changes in town.

One asks to amend the moratorium on commercial marijuana facilities to exclude cultivators and product manufacturers, thus opening the door for the existing Curaleaf medical growing facility to grow for the recreational market. Several others are related to changes that would put some teeth into bylaws for handling vacant and derelict houses. Beyond those, the warrant slides into fairly routine territory, closing out old borrowing, shifting funds to buy a fire engine, changing the Charter to combine the treasurer and collector into one job, and changing the zoning of part of a cemetery.

Town Administrator Doug Willardson said he expects the fire truck to be the most controversial. Article 13 aims to spend about \$600,000 to replace Engine #5, roughly

equally split between budgeted funds, Free Cash and transfers from old project accounts.

"When you have seven vehicles and they last 25 years [each], you have to replace one every 3.5 years," he said.

At present, Engine 5 has several safety, space and other issues, so much of its workload has been put on Engines 1 and 3. Willardson said if this item fails, the extra burden on those two trucks will probably mean Webster will have to replace them at the same time in a few years.

Regarding the pot moratorium changes (Article 2), he said, "Curaleaf approached the town after town meeting approved the moratorium last fall and asked 'Would you mind changing that?' They've done a good job being respectful."

Although the change affects only that firm now, it would affect any similar entity that comes down the pike, if any do, he noted. The moratorium itself expires in December.

Sleeping Bag Ministry warms the needy

WEBSTER – For most of us, staying warm at night is easy. We just add a blanket or turn up the heat.

That doesn't work so well if you're homeless, and that's where Edna Patri and her Sleeping Bag Ministry comes in.

For 24 years, she and a team of others have gathered every Monday and the Federated Church on Church Street to create sleeping bags from blankets, sheets and various kinds of insulating materials. When done, they're rolled into a bundle with a hat, mittens, scarf, pillow and health kits and distributed as needed. Sometimes,

people donate actual sleeping bags and related gear.

"My sleeping bags have gone all over the world," Patri, an Auburn resident, said. Besides helping people in numerous Massachusetts and Connecticut communities stay warm, they've been shipped to such places as South Dakota, New York, Dominican Republic and Albania.

On Monday, shortly before The Times showed up to get photos of their process, a representative from Worcester's Mustard Seed "picked up 25 bags."

"For me, the most rewarding one was when people would go to New York and the nuns would take sleeping bags to people sleeping in the parks," Patri recalled. "One man hugged the bag and said 'God visited me today'."

"My heart breaks for them, especially when you hear some of them are families with kids growing up this way," said volunteer Sandy Snider of Dudley. "If you're lightening your load at home, there's a place for this stuff to be used." (The group relies on donations of materials, which can be dropped off at the church any weekday morning.)

Snider came upon the minis-

Collaboration promotes communication as school works with agency

CHARLTON – If the US were Bay Path and Iran were the Mercy Center, or vice versa, the world would probably be better off.

That's because the two entities – a voke school and a social service agency – have been exchanging people for nearly 15 years with the goal of trying to better understand each other. Recently, they celebrated the end of a semester by having Mercy Center folks come to Bay Path for lunch and activities in the cosmetology, carpentry and graphic design shops.

"I was nervous because I'd never been in that type of environment," said Brooke Bowes of Dudley. "I learned to love it there by talking to them and really getting to know people – not just by what you see, but who they are as a real person."

Like the other Bay Path students involved, Bowes is a health technology sophomore. According to one of the department's four teachers, Christine Piehl, the students

spend part of the year in several places that help them learn "communication skills across the growth and development cycle," from infancy to seniority. In this case, it gives them experience with various kinds of disabilities and for the last two years has specifically given them an opportunity to practice sign language, although none of the deaf clients were able to come to Bay Path this time.

"They enjoy watching our students," Piehl said. "They seemed a little apprehensive at first, but came into themselves."

Indeed, some were quite vocal about it. One, Rafael, proudly wore the basketball pin and Hawaiian shirt he'd just received from the graphics art department.

"I like making new friends and love the art stuff," he said, noting his favorite part of the visit was "my friend right here."

He was referring to Carla Rodriguez of Southbridge, who likes the program

Dudley moving quickly with roof project

DUDLEY – Town officials have moved fast after receiving approval for a roof replacement and a new cooling system during the annual spring town meeting in May.

Town Administrator Greg Balukonis said to selectmen on June 4 that the town has already progressed with a contract for a replacement cooling

system, which he explained should be replaced within a six-week time frame. The replacement is a simple one that will involve the removal of the current, outdated system in favor of a new one, while salvaging parts for any potential repair needs years down the road.

"There's a large unit that sits behind the police station on the ground. It's a cooling tower. Typically, they have an

estimated life of between ten and twenty years. This one is about 12 and a half or 13 years old," Balukonis told selectmen. "There could have been some things that would have been done when the building was originally opened that might have extended the life a little bit further, but that unit, although it's on the short end of its useful

Closing cost credit For Massachusetts veterans using program

BOSTON — MassHousing announced a \$2,500 closing cost credit for Massachusetts military veterans who purchase a home through the agency. The new \$2,500 closing cost credit is available to Massachusetts veterans, National Guard and Reserve members, active service members, and Gold Star families who purchase a home with MassHousing's Operation

Welcome Home mortgage program, a home loan program designed specifically for veterans.

"Closing costs can run into the thousands of dollars, and by helping our veterans reduce those costs, we will make homeownership more affordable for them," said MassHousing Executive Director Chrystal Kornegay. "When combined

with MassHousing's existing financing options, which offer military members and Gold Star families down payment assistance and up to 100-percent financing, this new closing cost credit will give the men and women who serve our country substantially more buying power."

MassHousing is offering veterans the new \$2,500 closing cost credit in addition to the agency's Operation Welcome Home mortgage product, which finances up to 97 percent of the purchase price of a single-family home or condominium. Operation Welcome Home borrowers can also use a second down payment assistance loan for three percent of the purchase price — or up to \$12,000 — to receive 100 percent financing.

Veterans who purchase a two-, three-, or four-family home can receive up to 95 percent financing, and also use the 3-percent down payment assistance second loan, along with

the \$2,500 closing cost credit.


MassHousing will reimburse the lender for the \$2,500 closing cost credit.

Operation Welcome Home loans for which the borrower makes less than a 20-percent down payment will include MassHousing's MIPlus™ mortgage insurance. MIPlus™ includes unemployment protection at no additional cost to the borrower. The benefit will cover the borrower's principal and interest payments up to \$2,000 for up to six months in the event of a job loss. For a member of the Reserves or National Guard, activation or deployment overseas will make them eligible for the unemployment benefit as well.

MassHousing is not a direct originator of mortgages and instead makes home loans through 170 partner banks, mortgage lenders and credit unions across the Commonwealth. MassHousing then purchases the loans and services them from its Boston

office.

MassHousing (The Massachusetts Housing Finance Agency) is an independent, quasi-public agency created in 1966 and charged with providing financing for affordable housing in Massachusetts. The agency raises capital by selling bonds and lends the proceeds to low- and moderate-income homebuyers and homeowners, and to developers who build or preserve affordable and/or mixed-income rental housing. MassHousing does not use taxpayer dollars to sustain its operations, although it administers some publicly funded programs on behalf of the Commonwealth. 

Safety first on the Fourth

Local fire departments supervise professional fireworks displays all over Massachusetts. Unfortunately, children and adults continue to set off illegal fireworks that start fires and cause serious injuries to themselves and others.

A 45-year old Gloucester woman died in a December 22, 2003 house fire when someone threw fireworks and ignited a Christmas tree in the living room. Three other people were injured. On May 20, 1997, a 26-year old man from Watertown was killed while he was lighting fireworks in a hallway. A 27-year old Framingham man was killed on July 4, 1993, when backyard fireworks exploded in his face. On July 4, 1992, fireworks fatally injured a 30-year old man on a Fairhaven beach.

The possession and use of all fireworks by private citizens is illegal in Massachusetts.

This includes Class C fireworks which are sometimes falsely called "safe and sane fireworks." Class C fireworks include sparklers, party poppers, snappers, firecrackers, spinners, cherry bombs and more. Sparklers burn at 1800°F.

It is illegal to transport fireworks into Massachusetts, even if they were purchased legally elsewhere. Illegal fireworks can be confiscated on the spot. Do not purchase fireworks by mail. Government cannot prohibit the advertising and sale of fireworks by mail, but police do confiscate illegal shipments of fireworks.

Many consumers attempting to circumvent the law have lost both their money and their fireworks. Children imitate adults. If you use fireworks, children will copy you, not realizing how very dangerous fireworks are. Fifty-one percent, (51%), of fireworks-related burn injuries reported by hospitals to the Office of the State Fire Marshal

in the last 10 years (2007-16) were to children under age 18. Almost thirty-percent, (29%), were children under age 10. In the past decade (2008-17) there have been 784 major fire and explosion incidents involving illegal fireworks reported to the Massachusetts Fire Incident Reporting System (MFIRS). The incidents caused 10 civilian injuries, four fire service injuries, and an estimated dollar loss of \$1.9 million, which is high considering most fireworks fires are outdoor brush fires.

On July 4, 2017, the Hull Fire Department was called to a fire in a 5-unit apartment building. Drapes in a second floor window were ignited by fireworks. On July 5, 2017, the East Longmeadow Fire Department was dispatched to a fire in a single-family home. The fire was started by fireworks in the garage. On July 10, 2017, the Boston Fire Department responded to a fire in a two-fam-

ily home. Fireworks had ignited a sofa outside of the home. The fire spread to the outside of the neighboring three-family home. On July 15, 2017, the Nahant Fire Department was called to a fire in a single-family home. Upon arrival, firefighters found the homeowner trying to extinguish a fire that was started by his son using fireworks.

In the past decade (2008-17), 45 people were treated at Massachusetts emergency rooms for severe burns injuries from fireworks (burns covering 5% or more of the body) according to the Massachusetts Burn Injury Reporting System (M-BIRS). Fifty-six percent of the victims were children and youths under age 25. These victims are scarred for life.

On July 1, 2017, a Mattapan teenager was driving down Woodbole Avenue when a firework exploded in his hand. On July 4, 2017, a 32-year old Quincy man suffered extensive

damage to one of his hands, possibly losing some of his fingers when a firework exploded in his hand. On July 3, 2016, an 8-year old Lawrence boy was hit in the chest by a wayward firework from an illegal show at a neighbor's house. On July 4, 2016, a 4-year old Lawrence boy received burns to his forehead and chin from fireworks that hit him in the face. On July 9, 2016, a 10-year old Boston boy lost four fingers while playing with illegal fireworks inside an apartment. On July 15, 2016, a 15-year old Plymouth boy who was lighting commercial grade fireworks received burns to his eye and hands, as well as a puncture wound to his abdomen.

So enjoy the same but stay safe and always follow the law.

Throughout the weekend, the Museum will offer guided tours of the ship and behind-the-scenes curator-led tours of the Museum's collection storage facility, and a special former crew member dinner event with the United States Secretary of the Navy, Richard V. Spencer. For some former crew members, this will be the first time they have been aboard their beloved ship since the completion of their service.

Intrepid's 75th Commissioning Anniversary Celebration Weekend is open to the public, and will feature pro-

grams and events specifically tailored for former crew members and their families, as well as opportunities for members of the public to interact with our visiting former crew members. More than 280 former crew members are currently confirmed to attend with their family members.

Now a museum and national historic landmark, the aircraft carrier Intrepid (CVS-11) was one of the most successful and stalwart ships in US history. It was also one of the primary recovery vessels for NASA during the Mercury and Gemini missions, and retrieved astronauts Scott Carpenter, Gus Grissom and John Young after

their respective orbits and splashdowns in the Pacific.

1. Baron Wallworth's letter of promotion to rank of lieutenant in the "Luck" Regiment March 28, 1779.
2. Health Certification for Arthur Humphrey and Marven Moore from Dr. Daniel Fisk Jan. 2, 1777.
3. Ledger entries from 1790 (2 pages).
4. Announcing to Major Huntington of appointment as paymaster Dec. 25, 1776.
5. Town receipt from Worcester to Oxford dated Nov. 7, 1814 for payment of State Mutual Life Insurance.
6. Oration delivered at Oxford on the 46th Anniversary of American Independence. By Ira Barton (25 pages). Printed by Hilliard & Metcalf, of Cambridge 1822.
7. Framed article "Presentation of Colors to the Oxford Invincibles" Sept. 13, 1824 from the Massachusetts Spy, Dec. 23, 1824.
8. Company roll of Captain Thomas Meriam, company of Infantry, in the fifth regiment, first brigade, and seventh division as corrected May 4th, 1813- May 1814.

The restoration, preservation and digitizing of these documents was done by the Green Dragon Bindery in Shrewsbury. The documents will be made accessible on line, as well as displayed for a short period of time, in the near future at the Oxford Public Library.



We don't give peace a chance

Not in this country.

We are a violent nation.

We were born that way, and we continue to uphold our birthright.

In 2017, the US arms sales were almost \$42 billion to foreign governments. This according to our own Defense News records.

And, in case you didn't catch the gist of it, yes, all those arms are made with...steel...so trying to get the costs to those manufacturers at a place where they can make even more profit would just so make the businessmen mentality at play in our political fields SO happy.

There's always more than one method to the madness.

Always follow the money.

Who profits if the costs and tariffs are in play?

How the town is saving money

Last week, James Chauvin, the town treasurer and acting collector, presented the Webster Board of Selectmen with an update of the operations of these combined departments. As part of his presentation, Chauvin informed the Board that \$646,200 has been collected from auctioning off tax-foreclosed properties over the last two years. In addition, the town treasurer's office collected \$763,300 in back taxes through the tax title process. This totals \$1,409,500.

The town recently appeared before the Massachusetts Municipal Finance Oversight Board to request use of the state's bond rating rather than using the town's rating (the state's bond rating is higher). This request was approved, saving the town, at a minimum, \$80,000 in interest over the life of the bonds the town will be issuing shortly. Additionally, the town is refunding its existing callable debt, saving Webster \$229,000 in interest costs on school construction, water infrastructure and sewer bonds.

After reviewing these cost savings and additional revenue generated, we looked further at additional monies the town received or saved over the past 12 to 18 months. We are pleased to present you with some additional ways your town is extending your tax dollars.

ENERGY

Earlier this year, the town worked diligently to receive designation as a "Green Community" by the Commonwealth. With this designation came an initial grant award of over \$189,000 as well as the ability to apply for future grant opportunities. Communities that are actively engaged in energy improvements and implementing measures to create more environmentally friendly space could see grant awards that average over \$50,000 every year.

The town is using the initial grant funds awarded to convert our streetlights to LEDs lights. The streetlight conversion will save the town a projected \$167,781 in annual maintenance and energy costs. Initial estimates to convert the streetlights to LEDs was \$400,000. However, separate from the Green Communities grant award, the town received over \$100,000 in grant funding from the Commonwealth to pay for the project. The return on the investment of this project will be approximately 10 months. On top of this, the town was using net metering credits for solar developments to pay for the streetlight electricity bills. Now those credits, worth over \$20,000, can be transferred to another account for an additional savings.

The town has also entered into a new net metering agreement for a solar development in Granby. This agreement is projected to save the town \$17,000 annually.

The town is diligently working through the process to aggregate the residential electricity load for Town residents. The Town can then receive bulk load bids from electrical suppliers. Some communities have seen up to a 10% discount in their electricity bills compared to National Grid standard pricing. For the average home in Massachusetts, that equals approximately a \$90 annual savings.

The town has converted the lights at the sewer plant to LED lights which has yielded an approximate \$4,500 annual savings.

HEALTH INSURANCE

The town negotiated with our retirees to consolidate their health plan options to a single plan. This measure saved the town approximately \$17,000.

The public employee unions also voted to forego their insurance premium holiday, saving the town \$332,725.

CONSOLIDATION OF POSITIONS

The town has consolidated several positions, including the chief chemist in the sewer department, the benefits coordinator, and we have combined the town treasurer and collector positions. This will save the town approximately \$150,000 annually.

OTHER GRANTS/REVENUE RECEIVED

The town received a grant of \$7,500 from our insurance provider to review our capital assets and develop a maintenance plan for Town buildings.

We re-negotiated our lease for the transfer station. We will now receive a \$25,000 annual lease payment from Pratt Trucking to allow them to operate that facility.

Through the state's Community Compact Program, the town received \$25,000 to update our Open Space and Recreation Plan. Once completed, we will be eligible to apply for future State grants related to projects earmarked for parks and open space.

The Commonwealth also provided the town with \$17,000 for ADA improvements at the beach including water wheelchairs, an ADA playground swing and an ADA beach sand mat.

In 2017, the town received a \$100,000 earmark in the state budget for improvements to the Webster downtown area. In 2018, we received a \$50,000 earmark for the water main upgrade on Thompson Road. We thank our legislators, Senator Fattman and Representative McKenna, for their great work on our behalf.

Thanks to the generosity of the Fels Foundation, we have again received funding for additional police training and other Police Department needs.

The Marijuana Host Agreement with CuraLeaf was renegotiated from \$50,000 up to \$200,000 over the next three years.

The town received approximately \$16,000 in insurance credits for proactively managing town risks.

PUBLIC SAFETY EQUIPMENT DONATIONS

A notable amount of the public safety equipment in town came at no cost to Webster tax-payers. Some were generous donations from residents, others were purchased from fund-raisers, and some was donated from other public entities. The Fire Department recently purchased a foam trailer through a generous donation and then Fire Department staff upgraded the trailer. The trailer, with a market value of \$75,000, didn't cost the town anything. Another great example is the new police boat that the Police Department was able to solicit, via donation, from another government entity.

Beach is restricted: please follow the rules

The Dudley Town Beach does not officially open until July 1st. This location on Merino Pond is used by many people during the summer months. With school vacation in full swing and warm weather at hand, some people have been using this area. Based upon previous issues, the Board of Selectmen

voted to adopt some use restrictions. I wanted to provide residents and others with a reminder of this important information.

The Town Beach has been a hot topic of discussion for many years. There has been damage, trash, alcohol use, and other problems taking place over time. People from town, as well as many from outside the area, have come to Dudley to use the beach. Due to limited resources, lifeguards and maintenance personnel only spend limited time at this location. A great deal of cleanup and repair must take place.

Many non-residents have been using this location. This has caused problems for those who live in the area as well as the beach users.

In the summer of 2016, the Board of Selectmen voted beach parking (in the lot behind the Mason Road School) and access restricted to town residents and their guests only. Since local tax dollars and donations fund the beach operation, the hope is for residents to care about its condition. The goal is to encourage users to display responsible behavior.

In addition to the resident restriction, there are regular rules that apply to all beach goers. They include no alcohol, open fires, or pets. There are also restrictions on other activities. The beach is closed to the public at dusk and any swimming, outside of established lifeguard hours, requires people to use the facility at their own risk.

It is important for those from outside town to be aware of this change. We hope to maintain this location as a quality place for citizens of Dudley. We want all patrons to have a safe and enjoyable experience. The Dudley Police Department encourages anyone who experiences problems or concerns at the beach to contact our department or the Selectmen's office.

Behind Meech's pitching, one run is enough for Oxford

WORCESTER — One-run games are the norm for the Oxford High varsity baseball team when competing for a Central Mass. Tournament Championship. The Pirates, making their sixth Sectional Final in the past seven years, had played in four one-run games in their previous five appearances, winning three of them.

This year, with top ranked Oxford playing No. 2 Littleton High for the Central Mass. Division 4 title on Saturday, June 16 at Tivnan Field at Lake Park, it was again a one-run result. The Pirates scored a run in the bottom of the first inning and, behind the pitching of ace David Meech, Oxford prevailed, 1-0, to win its fourth champion-

ship in seven years.

“Those 1-0 games are beautiful, especially when you win,” head coach Justin Richards said with a wry smile.

Meech stranded two base runners in the top of the first inning before the Pirates scored the winning — and only — run.

Michael Bordeaux led things off with a four-pitch walk and, after Jason Panient struck out, Meech was intentionally walked. Meech was then picked off first base, but Noah Buckley came through with a clutch RBI single into right field on an outside curveball, plating Bordeaux.

“Every time Dave has been intentionally walked this year, Noah has come through and driven in a run,” Richards said of Buckley’s execution.

“I was just thinking

base hit, anything to try to move the runner,” added Buckley, who finished 2 for 3.

From there, Littleton pitcher Mitch Crory was nearly unhittable. Through his six innings of work, Crory allowed four hits while striking out seven, walking three (two intentionally) and hitting one. Richards was glad that his team was able to scrap a run across before Crory got hot.

“We knew he was going to be one of the best pitchers we faced all year, and he was,” said Richards.

But Meech was also posting zeroes on the scoreboard, although the Tigers had their opportunities. In addition to the two runners stranded in the first inning, Littleton left two more on in the second, one in the third and another in the fifth.

Meech then found another gear in the sixth and seventh innings. The Tigers were retired 1-2-3 in both frames, with Meech striking out four of the six batters he faced.

“We mixed in more pitches with him as the game wore on,” said Richards of Meech’s pitching strategy. “We try to stay fastball heavy early in the game to almost hide [the curveball and changeup] from teams.”

“I think I found the zone,” Meech added on his late-game performance. “I think early I was leaving the ball up too much.”


Through Meech’s complete game the lefty surrendered four hits and two walks while striking out 10.

“He mixed up his pitches, he threw them inside-outside, and he just did a good job at the end of the day,” Buckley said of Meech’s outing.

Meech and Buckley, two of the Pirates’ seven seniors, are ready to compete in the State Tournament as cornerstones of the squad, two years removed from play-



HOW THEY GOT THERE

Oxford gets past Leicester, makes trip back to District Final

WORCESTER — When the Oxford High versus Leicester High varsity baseball game — played Wednesday, June 13 at Clark University — concluded, both teams were able to walk off the field feeling good about where they stood. That's because the Pirates, the top seed in the Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament, won the game, 7-0, and advanced to the District Final for the sixth time in the past seven years, while the fourth ranked Wolverines got as far as they did behind a first-year head coach and performed much better than they did in the regular season against Oxford, which was a 12-0 loss where they got no-hit.

The Pirates put the game away with a three-run sixth to account for the 7-0 final.

"We limited them from big innings, unfortunately it happened in the bottom of the sixth with that big inning," said Rafferty.


Oxford plated three runs in the second inning and one more in the fourth.

"Having a lead in the playoffs, regardless of what it is, just helps out immensely," said Richards.

The run support was more than enough for starting pitcher Jason Panient, who fired a complete game two-hitter, striking out 10, walking one batter and hitting another.

"We were expecting three or four [innings], he's had some arm issues, and they hit him early but he got tougher and tougher," Richards said of Panient. "His changeup was real, real good and kept them off-balance."

The Pirates (22-2) will play No. 2 Littleton High (18-3) for the District Championship, while the Wolverines finished 13-7.

Oxford's David Meech was 2 for 4 with a pair of RBI in the game, while Ryan Parr added an RBI. Defensively, second baseman Noah Buckley and third baseman Dante Purretta both snared hard line drives for outs early on.

"I had my defense behind me, which

was really good. Second and third basemen really helped me out," said Panient.

Leicester's Hunter Guinto and Ryan Russo had the base hits off Panient.

Rafferty credited Adam Sullivan with getting the start for the Wolverines and Christian Russo's effort in relief.

"Adam Sullivan did a really good job starting in the first inning. Christian Russo came in and held it down, he threw his heart out," said Rafferty.

Russo, Guinto and Tom Steiger, Leicester's three seniors, left a strong lasting impression on Rafferty.

"The senior guys, they had three coaches in their past four years. As a senior, when you have a new coach it can be a really good thing or a really bad thing and I'm really lucky that it was a good thing," Rafferty concluded.

WORCESTER — After combining to score just two runs in two regular season games against Wachusett Regional and its ace pitcher, Courtney Lanpher, the Shepherd Hill Regional varsity softball team had a strong showing at the plate in a Central Mass. Division 1 Tournament Semifinal, played Tuesday, June 12 at Rockwood Field on the campus of Worcester State University.

The hard-hitting Rams, seeded fifth in the bracket, scored eight runs on 10 hits, but the top-ranked Mountaineers brought their offensive attack as well, scoring 16 times on 20 hits for a 16-8 victory.

Wachusett, which defeated Shepherd Hill by 17-2 and 7-0 counts earlier this spring, improved to 22-0 and advanced

to the District Final, while the Rams finished 12-10.

"She's an incredibly tough pitcher and I'm so proud of our offense to hang eight runs on her that were hard fought," said Shepherd Hill head coach Donny Loos of his team against Lanpher. "We tried to have a plan at the plate and they executed what we asked them to do. They were disciplined and we put balls in play — so I was proud of that."

The Mountaineers scored five times in the bottom of the second inning, but the Rams countered with a three-spot in the top of the third. There, Kiley Wong-Li (3 for 3, HBP, 5 RBI) plated two with a single into left field and Keely Scotia followed with a hot-shot grounder to first base, which resulted in an error and another run.

Wachusett scored once in the bottom of the third to take a 6-3 lead, but Shepherd Hill responded again with two more runs in the top of the fourth to make it 6-5. Wong-Li belted a double down the third base line to bring in a pair.

"We were right there for four innings, and then their offense just exploded," Loos said of the Mountaineers.

Wachusett scored eight runs in the bottom of the fourth inning and twice more in the sixth to surge ahead, 16-5. The Mountaineers' Ellie Moore (3 for 4, 5 RBI), Lanpher (4 for 5, 2 RBI) and Paige Arvidson (3 for 5, RBI) were the big bats off the pitching of Cayley Fagan.

Loos credited Fagan with making "huge strides in learning to execute a plan and mix her pitches up, change speeds and hit spots," but Wachusett's offense was just too much. The Rams' defense also committed four errors, as only six of the 16 runs allowed were earned.

Shepherd Hill didn't go down without a fight, though, as they scored three more times in the

Fagan, Scotia and Carly Snyder are all junior starters who will return next season, and sophomores Kelly Cournoyer, Parker Filo-Loos and Wong-Li are in the same boat. Freshman starter Sam

Zannotti, who hit .500 during the regular season, will also be a year older for the Rams.

"There's some things we can build on in terms of our experience, and we return an awful lot of starters next season. We're excited to get those kids back because they've been on three playoff runs," Loos said of the juniors and their back-to-back trips to the semifinal round in addition to a quarter-final round exit in 2016.

One player Shepherd Hill will miss due to her recent graduation is senior Sophia Sciarappa, not only for her .613 regular season average, but also for her leadership.

Bay Path then went down 1-2-3 in the top of the seventh to conclude its season.


Sansoucy was pleased with Shoemaker's complete game pitching performance, especially after giving up a number of runs early on and then settling down.

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

Garvin's one-bitter helps Cherry Valley topple Sturbridge



I am ready to hit the ground running for the people of the Worcester and Norfolk district in any way necessary. Senator Fattman and his office have done excellent and thorough work over the last four years, and I'm ready to help continue that through this position," said Fredericks.

Fredericks' responsibilities include assisting with constituent services and district operations within the 14 towns that comprise the Worcester Norfolk senate district.

because it "makes it easier for us to talk to different kinds of people."

"I miss them a lot. We used to go to Mercy Center, but we haven't been there in a while," she said. "It's nice to be able to have this one last goodbye."

Piehl said the students visited Mercy Center on alternating weeks earlier this year, before shifting to an adult day care setting. As she sees it, the typical student is "inexperienced and uncertain at the start, but their confidence levels improve and they embrace the setting."

At least one Bay Path graduate now works at Mercy, she added.

According to Jodi Contonio, Mercy Center has several related programs, including a day hab and a community-based day program (a sheltered workshop), for its roughly 140 clients. Some of its clients go to regular jobs, so the Bay Path students tend to interact with those who stay behind. She also noted a couple clients have relatives working at Bay Path.

"These guys just love them. They build a great relation-

ship," she said. "These guys work a lot one-on-one with our clients. I wish they could join our clients on job sites, but they can't."

For Charlton's Samantha LePage, who said she's worked with disabled children, Mercy Center's adult population was a logical next step, but she admitted she "wasn't sure I'd like it." But she particularly likes hearing their stories and pasts.

She and Bowes were having lunch with Freddy of Fitchburg, who spends most of his days in Mercy's workshop sealing envelopes, folding papers and doing similar things. He said he's been there "a long time" and particularly likes "meeting new people."

At Bay Path, he spent much of his visit in the carpentry shop, where he worked with two students to make a birdhouse, wielding the hammer himself.

Contonio said she tries to ensure everyone gets a chance to come here, and would love to have more time to see more Bay Path programs

"I really wish we could do it more than once a year," she added.

life, the fact that it needs to be replaced after 13 years is not the end of the world. It's just something that caught us a little bit by surprise. We've been tweaking it and making changes to it, but what's happened is the whole unit is rusted out. It can't be further repaired."

The second part of the project involves the replacement of the municipal building roof, and the town wasted no time looking into personnel that will help with the planning.

"I am in the process of hiring an architect for the plans for the roof," Balukonis said. "Unlike the cooling system, which is a turn key system that we can do under a state bid and that's what we did, the roof requires an independent design, so I'll have to hire an architect and hopefully

get the project completed within the next six months."

In May voters approved \$450,000 for the dual projects and while the cooling system replacement has received no real negative feedback from taxpayers, the roof replacement has turned some heads. During the town meeting last month there was some minor discussion about why the roof requires replacement so soon into its life. While this issue has been discussed numerous times at recent meetings Balukonis explained the details of the roof situation again to make sure there was no confusion over how the town got to this point.

"We have a PVC membrane roof. I went back and looked at the contract and that contract stated it was a ten-year warranty. That would have been up in 2013. During that period of time we had an expert go up and take a look at the roof for us and give

us a report. That report showed that the roof has been damaged and the quality of the workmanship that originally went into it is not high quality. It cannot be repaired in accordance with the experts and needs to be replaced," Balukonis explained.

Balukonis added the likely scenario is Dudley receiving a bid including a 30-year warranty and while the bids could come in below expectations it's not necessarily expected. He said he's not surprised that there has been frustration over the roof situation calling the 10-year warranty an "abomination". He also stated that his preference would be to see Dudley invest in a roof with a pitch and external draining. The current roof is flat and uses internal drains. The roof replacement would span around 12,500 square feet with the estimated cost as of this report sitting at around \$350,000.

try's work by accident. She said she'd gotten laid off and came to the church to help her brother serve food (the church is also home to a soup kitchen and the Food Share pantry), saw the women working on bags, and stayed.

"It's a rewarding experience. I look forward to coming here every week," she said.

A similar accident got the group's sewing machine operator involved. Jane Conti of Woodstock said she got to the church about an hour early for an appointment and "kinda wandered in here." Like the others,

she's been coming back ever since, and is personally also a member of the Interfaith Stitchers, which makes clothes for people who experienced disasters and other events.

Conti said she grew up in Worcester, so she has seen "the situation of the homeless pretty up-close and personal" and periodically brought them things to the street corners they stake out around the city.

"We want them to keep their dignity," so members always ask if they know someone who could use such a bundle. "So far, I've only gotten one 'no.'"

Volunteer Donna Plummer said she feels

society could help the homeless more effectively by using abandoned homes to create a shelter (something now lacking in town). "You don't have to have it open all day. Just give them a place to sleep."

Patri noted the "majority of homeless people are men, so we never put silk panties [in the kits]. A woman who's homeless will wear men's shorts."

Patri said there are 14 people involved in the project, of which 9-10 come regularly.

According to the National Alliance to End Homelessness website, as of Jan. 2017, there were 553,742 Americans without permanent homes. Most lived in a shelter

or transitional housing, but 34 percent "lived in a place not meant for human habitation, such as the street or an abandoned building." A third were families with kids and seven percent each were veterans and unaccompanied minors.

In general, the site reports, Massachusetts has been one of the leading states in terms of addressing homelessness by increasing the number of shelter beds and "rapid rehousing inventories," causing a decrease in the numbers of homeless individuals and families. However, 47 states (including Massachusetts) have seen increases in the numbers of people living "dou-

bled-up" with friends or family and increases in the "number of poor renter households experiencing a severe housing cost

burden."

16 votes, but it was the second seat that has caused quite a bit of drama. Write-ins Greg Benoit and Andrew Cronauer both receive only 12 votes for the second seat, putting them in a tie that, as of this report, had yet to be decided.

The remainder of the elected candidates were pretty cut and dried. Water-Sewer Commissioners Jay Spahl and Scott Zajkowski, Assessor Jo-Ann Szymczak and Board of Health member Jennifer Cournoyer all ran unopposed and won their respective seats. Richard Carmignani Jr. was reelected as Treasurer/Collector with the most votes of any candidate at 258.

Finally, the Board of Selectmen remains the same with both John Maris and Steven Sullivan running unopposed to maintain their seats for another three years. Both candidates said they hope to continue to move Dudley forward and thanks voters for turning out for the election.

"I always said I would continue doing this as long as I could make a difference. I'm still committed to making sure that we continue the things we're doing here in Dudley, doing more with less and adding value to the people's quality of life," Maris said. "We do have a good board. We respect each other, and we've gotten along. We feel comfortable sharing opinions and sometimes it does take time to get something done in the municipal world. It doesn't always work as quickly as you'd like, but once you get these it's very satisfying."

"I think Dudley is headed in a good direction. We have an extremely active economic development committee now. We're trying to reinvent the parks and recreation committee. We want to do what's best for the people and for the town and I think we are on the right path," Steven Sullivan added. "I think the continuity is big. Everybody on the board kind of serves a role. Everyone does their role well. I can honestly say with the way the board is constructed now I've never left a meeting upset or mad at a decision. I may be disappointed if my position doesn't win, but I think I respect everyone's opinion and when I walk out that door it's all about that respect. The bottom line is we all do what we can for the betterment of the town."

6) imposes a \$300 civil fine for public consumption of cannabis. Doing so is already illegal under the state law voters accepted in November 2016 and the Legislature amended last summer, although the state didn't set fines for violations.

Between those articles are three long ones dealing with "nuisance" properties. Among other things, they require landlords to register vacant properties with the Board of Health if they've been unoccupied for 45 days (with increasing fees the longer they're vacant) and allow the town to inspect such properties to make sure they're secure and eliminate "blight" in various forms. If the landlord doesn't act within 10 days of receiving a notice, the town can do the work and place a lien on the property.

Willardson said that lien will go to a revolving fund to pay toward future demolition or repair work, but he admitted it's often hard for towns to recoup the money they spend.

Those issues are big ones for Building Commissioner Ted Tetreault, who said the ideas for the new bylaws came from

Worcester and Springfield.

"The biggest problem here is making the companies that run [those properties] and the mortgage holders responsible for what they have," he said, noting the worst violators are generally out-of-state banks and other absentee landlords. He has seen such properties sit vacant for years, becoming squats for homeless people who build fires in them to stay warm and other safety issues.

He said his list has 62 properties on it now, and "every road you go down, you can see at least three." He cited one in particular - 11 Gore Road - as "a nightmare as long as I've been here, nine years."

A few years ago, Webster tried "shaming" bad landlords, but he said that backfired. The effort didn't take into account the fact that the big banks often "don't want to do the final foreclosure if it's occupied, so somebody will live there in shambles for six years."

"The town has the authority to do a lot of this anyway, but this makes it consistent across the board," Willardson said, noting Tetreault has already demolished more than 60 buildings. "For the most part, [landlords] who live here want to keep it

pretty nice."

Willardson said the treasurer-collector item has been lingering for some time. This spring, voters approved changing the two separate jobs into appointed posts (they were previously elected), and although the Charter Review Commission had considered combining them, "they thought it'd be more likely to pass if you kept them separate," he said. Since election day, though, the treasurer resigned, so the collector is now doing both jobs anyway, and he plans to retire next May, Willardson said.

Other articles seek to dedicate more than \$360,000 toward water system improvements, to close out a water project deficit, more than \$400,000 to fund expansion of the sewer system's SCADA computer monitoring system, and rezone 5.5 acres on Old Worcester Road (part of St. Joseph's Cemetery) from Single-Family to Business without Sewer so the church can sell it to an abutter.

Town meeting convenes at Bartlett High School Auditorium at 6 p.m. Monday.

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


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

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

Beckon twilight with a tasty summer cocktail

Perhaps nothing is more relaxing on a warm summer night than sipping a cocktail as the sun sets. Some cocktails, such as the following recipe for "Blueberry Crush" from Susan Elia MacNeal's "Infused: 100+ Recipes for Infused Liqueurs and Cocktails" (Chronicle Books), even evoke the twilight hours of summertime with their unique look.

BLUEBERRY CRUSH

Serves 1

- 4 or 5 ice cubes
- 2 blackberries
- 2 blueberries
- 2 raspberries
- 3 ounces Blueberry Vodka (see below)
- Dash of lime juice
- 1 cup cracked ice
- 1/2 cup sparkling water or club soda (optional)

Place the ice cubes in a chilled old-fashioned glass. Place the berries in a small bowl and crush with a fork. Add to a shaker with the vodka, lime juice and cracked ice. Shake for 10 to 15 seconds, then strain over the ice cubes. For a lighter version of the drink, add the sparkling water.

BLUEBERRY VODKA

- 1 750-ml. bottle of vodka
- 1 quart fresh blueberries
- 1/4 to 1 cup Sugar Syrup (optional; see below)

Decant the vodka into a clean 2-quart glass container with a tight-fitting lid. Soak the original bottle to remove the label. Let dry.

If using frozen berries, allow them to thaw. Place the fresh or thawed frozen berries in a bowl, crush with a fork and add to the vodka. Allow the vodka to infuse away from direct sunlight and intense heat for 3 months. Shake the container a few times each week.

When you're satisfied with the intensity of flavor, strain the liqueur through a metal sieve into a bowl. Discard the berries. Add the sugar syrup to taste, if desired.

Using a funnel, pour the liqueur into the original bottle (or another container). Label with the name of liqueur and the date. Age for 1 month away from light and heat.

SUGAR SYRUP

- 1 cup water
- 2 cups granulated sugar

Put the water in a small saucepan. Add the sugar. Bring the water to a boil while stirring. Reduce the heat and continue to stir until the sugar dissolves. Cool to room temperature. Select a clean container that will hold at least 1 1/2 cups. Using a funnel, pour the sugar syrup into the container, seal and store in the refrigerator for up to 6 months.

Tips to making delicious ice cream at home



Ice cream is a favorite dessert across the globe. The average American consumes more than 23 pounds of ice cream per year, says the International Dairy Foods Association.

Even though a trip to the local ice cream parlor can yield many different opportunities to indulge, making ice cream at home is easier than one may believe. Also, creating homemade ice cream can be a fun way to experiment with unique flavors and textures. It is easy to customize concoctions based on what everyone likes best. Making ice cream also is a fun way to bring the family together with the reward of a tasty prize for all of the effort. Here are some tips for making ice cream at home.

- Buy quality ingredients. Choose fresh, high-quality ingredients. Real vanilla beans or extract can produce bet-

ter flavor than imitations. Select in-season berries and other fruits and, if possible, use organic milk. All of these ingredients will blend together for fresh flavor.

- Freeze equipment early. Cold equipment is necessary to produce ice cream. Store the bowls of an ice cream maker in the freezer to keep them frozen and ready for when the mood strikes to make a batch of ice cream.

- Avoid ice crystallization. According to Food 52, a foodie equipment and recipe resource, ice crystals in the ice cream can ruin texture by making ice cream crunchy. Freezing ice cream quickly at very cold temperatures is essential. That means freezing the bowl and keeping the ingredient mix cold. Spinning the ice cream and transferring it quickly to the freezer helps keep ice crystals small.

- Keep mix-ins small.

Mix-ins, like cookie pieces or cake crumbs, can add a different dimension to ice cream. Chill the ingredients and make sure they are small (roughly the size of chocolate chips). Add them after the ice cream is entirely frozen.

- Watch alcohol usage. Alcohol can create a tipsy ice cream experience, but adding too much can interfere with ice cream's ability to freeze. Therefore, use alcohol sparingly.

- Store ice cream smartly. According to David Lebovitz, author of "The Perfect Scoop," store ice cream in a shallow container to keep it softer. Also, cover the surface of the ice cream with plastic wrap to prevent ice crystals from forming.

Homemade ice cream will last for roughly a week in the freezer. Making ice cream can be a challenging but rewarding endeavor.
