*A hero has
a name...
now he has
a street*

Steve Palermo will always be with the town of Oxford. Adjacent to Main Street, leading to the Oxford Community Center, and near the home of the Palermo family rests a sign for Palermo Drive.

Steve was a former major league baseball player, and the MLB logo rests prominently on his sign. In 1991 Steve selflessly ran to the rescue of two robbery victims, he was shot in the back, and told he would never walk again. Steve was injured, missing death by a millimeter, but that didn't stop him. He regained his ability to walk, defying all odds and showed his strength of character inside and out. Steve never gave up, he never settled for mediocre, he was a hero to all who knew him.

"He would do it all again," says Steve's sister Anne Marie Palermo.

"He was thinking of his sisters, his mother, and his wife when the robbery happened. He would have wanted someone to help his own family, so that is why he helped those girls in danger at the robbery in Dallas, Texas," says Anne Marie.

New policies for students opting out of MCAS

The Dudley Charlton Regional School District has solidified a plan of action in the case of a student's unwillingness to take the MCAS tests in response to parent complaints brought forth in April.

During a meeting on April 10 the Regional School Committee heard complaints from Charlton Middle School parents Lisa Tinsley and Julie Richard who claimed their students were improperly treated after they refused to take the MCAS testing.

In recent years, movements to do away with the testing have grown leading a growing population of parents in the commonwealth to request their students opt out of the state testing program. In late May Superintendent Gregg Desto revealed a policy before the School Committee that is to be followed from now on when students or their parents decide to opt out.

Desto said he had been in contact with Mrs. Tinsley in the wake of the April 10 meeting and a four-step action plan was put into motion and discussed with other school leaders to allow students to opportunity to opt out of MCAS tests without being a distraction to the

students around them. Desto said the first steps involve parents making the school aware of their decision for their children in a timely manner.

"We would ask that all parents inform the school at least a week in advance in writing of their intention to have their children not participate so the school could start making plans for supervision and so forth. Once the school receives that advanced notice of any parent's request not to have the student participate we as a school will not speak to the student about it or question the student about it because we don't want to put them on the spot. They're kids," Desto said.

Then there's the matter of what to do with students who are not taking the testing when the bulk of the staff is dedicated to the MCAS. Desto said the other two steps in the policy were an answer to those concerns.

"This is at the recommendation of the DESE but also because we just simply don't have enough supervision because literally every hand is on deck for MCAS, so any student who has parental permission not to participate will have to remain in the testing area, in the classroom with the classmates, but will be allowed

to read a book of his or her choosing no more than fifteen minutes into the testing window," Desto said.

"Once a first time request is received by the principal we're asking the principal or his or her designee to contact that parent to discuss the issue with them and make sure that they understand all the peripheral things that go along with that decision."

Desto said the principals were "happy for the guidance" and feels the new policy will be a step forward in addressing the situation with respect to the testing students and those who choose not to take the exam. However, several members of the School Committee showed concern that the approach is unbalanced and opens the door for the opting out students to be distractions for others taking the MCAS tests. Several ideas were presented on how to more efficiently handle such matters including allowing students not taking the tests to come into school by 10 a.m. or even having those students watch a movie in another room. However, Desto said he, and others, feel that the plan in place will be effective.

"The DESE stance on this is to keep all kids in the room. Their stance I think emanates from a

Selectmen table discussion with Forefront

DUDLEY - Selectmen began a discussion with solar company Forefront Power during a meeting on June 4 at which the town's highest elected board was asked to approve a Memorandum of Agreement for the project.

Described by Forefront Power representative Edward Switzer as a "side letter agreement", the document would

solidify a relationship between the town and the company and allow Forefront Power to prepare for the installation of solar arrays in 2019. Forefront Power is looking to utilize property at 99 Ramshorn Road. During Dudley's annual spring town meeting on May 21 voters voted to pass over a request by Forefront Power to extend the Solar Overlay District for more information in the fall.

Part of the project would

involve an obligation by Forefront Power to cover the cost of update work to nearby Partridge Hill Road. Switzer said that work is included in the agreement.

"One of the obligations is to the extent of the town of Dudley conditions approval of the solar facility on finishing or repairing Partridge Hill Road the tenant, which is us, agrees to complete or hire a contractor

Dudley solidified plan for highway superintendent search

DUDLEY - With the retirement of Highway Superintendent Dan Gion mere months away the Board of Selectmen has put a plan into action to find a successor in order to make a seamless transition this fall.

Selectmen discussed the impending vacancy on June 4 looking at a timetable for a new hire with the goal to have an individual in place and ready to go at least a month prior to Gion's final day on Oct. 11. The discussed lasted nearly a half hour with the board deciding to advertise the position immediately with a July 8 deadline. The goal is to have a new hire finalized by Sept. 10 with interviews to take place in August.

The most widely discussed issue was the matter of the salary, and ensuring that contract negotiations don't interrupt the Oct. 11 transition date or the candidate's ability to leave their current job with due notice. Selectman Steve Sullivan said having a range would be the best approach to cut down the negotiation time and give applicants a firm idea of what is expected of their salary from the get go.

"If we have a range we know the job will fall within that

range. The people who are being interviewed would have to know the range," Sullivan said. "I'm just going to make up a number but if the range was \$60,000 to \$65,000 for example and their coming in for an interview you can't come to us at contract time and say I want \$72,000."

Town Administrator Greg Balukonis added that the position is budgeted is budgeted in the "mid-eighties" in terms of annual salary, but with candidates with different backgrounds and workplace experience expected to make up the pool of candidates, selectmen wanted to present a salary range that wouldn't exclude anyone from applying for the post. Gion revealed during the meeting that his salary upon retirement will be \$82,000. Selectmen agreed to meet in the middle, adding to the advertisement a range of \$75,000 to \$88,000 for the yearly salary and removing the stipend for extra plowing payments from the contract to be negotiated later.

Selectmen also chose to clarify several other requirements in the advertisement by seeking applicants who live within 15 miles of Dudley and requiring an associates

Dispensary dispenses donations to local agencies

WEBSTER - In the run-up to a special town meeting that might enable the firm to grow cannabis for recreational as well as medical uses, Curaleaf donated \$1,000 each to three local organizations last week - United Way, the Veterans' Council and Food Share.

"We're just now gaining momentum in the community and want to become a larger part of the community," said Curaleaf CEO Patrik Jonsson.

Veterans' Council Commander Victor Jankowski said his group mostly needs funds for flags, wreaths and flowers at the cemetery, paying the Pulaski Brass Band for the parade, but it would like to be able to clean the war monument next to town hall.

United Way's Janet Scheffler said the funds will go into the agency's pool of about \$200,000 a year, which it uses to fund various programs helping more than 7,000 area residents. Her remarks prompted Jonsson to say, "This is amazing: the fact you're working with 17 charities."

One of them is the third recipient, Food Share. President James Alkire noted they serve about 100 families a month and are open every Tuesday and Thursday. In response, Jonsson suggested he might have food donation boxes at Curaleaf facilities.

"Our purpose and goal is to have a hunger-free Dudley and Webster," Alkire said.



Gobi secures reimbursement for regional school transportation

BOSTON – Senator Anne M. Gobi (D-Spencer) has announced a unanimous vote by the Massachusetts Senate to increase regional school transportation reimbursement funding during Tuesday’s budget debate. The amendment, filed by Senator Gobi, raises the reimbursement rate to 80 percent of full funding, at a total of \$68,878,679 - a \$7,357,679 increase over FY18 funding.

“This 80% reimbursement is a positive step towards

the 100% promised by the state when schools were encouraged to regionalize,” said Senator Gobi. “There are 107,000 students in 170 regional schools across the state and this funding helps to assure they receive other critical services.”

Ellen Holmes, chair of the Massachusetts Association of School Committees, had this to say, “Anne’s advocacy for regional school district issues has been greatly appreciated. The unanimous sup-

port in the Senate today for her Regional School Transportation reimbursement amendment moves us closer to the legislative promise to the voters in these regions. We look forward to the members of the Senate Conference Committee working with the House to secure this essential funding.”

“Regional school transportation costs represent a

“There’s no excuse for any senior or child to go hungry in our community.”

His firm recently opened an indoor cannabis growing facility in Webster and a dispensary in Oxford. Both are presently for medical pot only, and he noted the firm has a small staff at each. If the June 25 vote passes, Jonsson said the company won’t make any visible changes to its Webster facility. The only difference, he added, will be where some of its product is sold.

Oxford town meeting approved recreational sales on May 2, and Jonsson repeatedly emphasized it’s for adult use here and there. That’s required by state

law, which prohibits sales to minors and public consumption of cannabis products, although it also allows households to grow some for their own use (up to six plants per person and 12 per household).

Under the law as it now stands, medical pot must be grown indoors, but recreational pot can be grown outside or in a greenhouse as well. Jonsson noted the state is much stricter with medical pot than recreational. The former must be “vertical” and non-profit, that is, growing and distribution must be done by the same company. The latter can be for-profit and the state is making available licenses for several cannabis-related businesses that are not directly related to sales or production, including transport and other things.

“They want to make sure there’s enough for supply and demand,” he said, but later noted, “Until [the system] is up and running, nobody’s going to really know” what the demand is.

“It was really surprising how quickly medical [use] got embraced by everybody. I expected that to take five years,” he added.

According to a January Pew Research poll, 61 percent of Americans support cannabis legalization, an increase of four points from Pew’s poll in 2016. Currently, Massachusetts, seven other states and the District of Columbia allow recreational pot, while Massachusetts plus 28 states, DC, Guam and Puerto Rico allow medical use.

Jonsson predicted “tremendous growth in the industry” over the next

2-3 years, but the prices are likely to remain relatively high for a while due to limited supply. Afterward, though, he said he expects prices to stabilize as the market gets “much more competitive,” with most towns having “one or two” dispensaries of some type.

Jonsson’s company began as Mass Organic Therapy Inc a few years ago, becoming Curaleaf in 2017, according to the state’s corporations database. It was originally a non-profit, but became a for-profit on March 29, 2018. Jonsson is its president, secretary and treasurer, while Jonsson and Joseph Lusardi are the only directors. Curaleaf’s home office is in Hanover.

degree and preferring a bachelor’s degree or comparable work experience. Applicants also need to have experience in a supervisory position.

One other issue put on the table was the idea of utilizing a screening committee, which had been done in the past utilizing members of the Personnel Board. However, Selectman John Marsi felt selectmen should make up such a board.

“I would rather not outsource this to another committee,” Marsi said. “This is such an important leadership role we should be fully involved.”

There was some question as to whether or not having selectmen involved would prevent the initial interviews from being private. Balukonis said in that case making the Board of Selectmen also act as the screening committee could hurt the town’s ability to find the best candidate.

“I have always operated under the impression that if the board was the screening committee then that can create some issues with public versus private. You will benefit by having your first round of interviews in executive session. That’s what most candidates expect. That’s what most candidates

want. Remember they’re coming in and interviewing the town also and they don’t want to jeopardize their employment situation if it’s not a good fit for them,” Balukonis told selectmen.

For now, the town awaits applicants and it will be up to Balukonis to narrow down the field at first. Selectmen would like Balukonis to examine the applications after the July deadline to select the candidates that truly meet the requirements and needs of the town before the candidates are interviewed further in two months.

“I saw his vibrant personality while he was in the hospital,” says Kristine DelloStritto, Steve’s niece.

“He would make sure every person who came to visit him felt comfortable. He was kind to every nurse, every doctor, and every visitor. He fought at the end. I felt truly blessed to be with him and to know him,” says DelloStritto.

Standing a distance, looking up at this prominent Palermo Drive sign was Roger Bacon, Steve Palermo’s former coach.

“This is very fitting,” says Bacon. “Steve was a great man.”

While friends and family came to commemorate this day and the unveiling of the Palermo street sign. Representatives from the state came in support as well.

Senator Ryan Fattman addressed the crowd, Palermo family and friends, at the Board of Selectman meeting.

“The Massachusetts State Senate and the Massachusetts House of Representatives extends its congratulations to the Palermo family in recognition of contributions that Steve Palermo and the Palermo family have made over the years and to the dedication of the Palermo family,” stated Fattman. State Representative Joe McKenna took the podium.

“Thank you to the town of Oxford for stepping up and doing this for a hero. For someone who ultimately put his life, his health, and his career in jeopardy to help other people. Oxford does


John G. Saad, Board of Selectman member, read out the proclamation that today, June 5, 2018 is Steve Palermo day.

Steve became a national hero in 1991 when he attempted to break up a robbery. The incident ended his on-field career. He was told by doctors that he would not walk again. Steve defied those odds and threw out the ceremonial first pitch of the 1991 World Series using a cane and a leg brace. Steve was a model of courage and strength.”

Palermo went on to be a motivational speaker.


In the early years, the town of Dudley purchased the plants that the DWC ladies, under the coordination of

place of if the students are in the room maybe they will just go ahead and take the test, but that's not our point here. Our point is really that every single person in the building is utilized because we have a lot of kids testing in small groups and some testing one on one. So, we just simply don't have the ability to do it. Certainly, if it grew which we're hopeful that it will not, and it really hasn't taken here as it has in some communities, we'd have to reassess that. For right now my feeling in talking to the principals is that they prefer to have the least amount of disruption possible and that the kid leaving the room is more disruptive than them staying in."

Desto emphasized that the matter is a complicated one as the district needs to ensure that there are no interruptions to the testing, but if student and their parents don't want to embrace the MCAS tests they're not required to, and the schools shouldn't interfere with that. At the same time though the district doesn't want to embrace a more "entertaining" option to the tests and inspire kids to avoid the tests simply because others get to have fun.

"We want to provide as little disruption as possible and not make it something enormously pleasant," Desto concluded. "We respect people's right to do this. We have to respect that."



to complete such work provided that all costs to complete such work shall be borne by the landlord. It is acceptable for the landlord to net such costs from the basic rent the tenant owes to the landlord under the lease," Switzer read from the agreement. "This letter basically states that we will do that, and the selectmen agree that we will do that. (Town Administrator) Greg Balukonis had asked that I put in some provisions that prior to the issuance of any construction permits that this work will be done and that in lieu of the work being done prior to the issuance of construction permits we can put up a bond amount."

Switzer quoted the cost of materials and labor to total around \$72,000 implying that Forefront Power would cover the cost of both but not perform the work itself.

Selectman Steve Sullivan, who made the motion to delay a vote on the Solar Overlay District expansion in May, said he appreciated the additional information selectmen received on June 4.

"I'm heartened by this document. I think it's a very good framework," Sullivan said.

However, the selectman added that Forefront Power and the town may need to resolve a specific issue a second time before proceeding.

"It's an expired subdivision I believe with no covenant. Any conditions that were originally put on the developer have expired. My understanding is the planning board will have to have a public hearing to get a covenant. At that point, they can put in conditions or waivers because if we're telling the applicant to make it to town standards all of a sudden you take a lot of things coming into play like street lights, drainage, things that may not be apropos might have been previously waived, so I believe they're going to have to go through the planning board to get that subdivision added again," explained Sullivan.

Switzer said he would be happy to go before the Planning Board again, having discussed the project with them in March. Selectmen moved to table the discussion for the time being choosing not to make an immediate decision on the MOA.

school districts in Massachusetts with 171 member schools. The transportation money that is not reimbursed by the state comes directly out of their school budgets. Senator Gobi has advocated each year for an increase in funding with a goal of 100% reimbursement.

The House of Representatives approved \$63,521,000 and the two amounts will be negotiated by the conference committee.

significant portion of the Wachusett Regional School District's annual budget," said Margaret Natowicz, Rutland town administrator. "The state's year-on-year regional transportation reimbursement underfunding has resulted in increased assessments to member communities. If funded, Senator Gobi's amendment to increase regional transportation reimbursements from 68% to 80% would provide much needed relief to the town of Rutland and other municipalities challenged with sustaining an array of public services. We express our sincere appreciation to the Senator for her tireless work to assure that the state allots its committed share of aid to municipalities and school districts.

State Auditor Suzanne Bump released a study on October 18, 2017 making recommendations to modernize laws and regulations within the regional school district structure. The report made sure to point at that state laws passed in 1949 entitle regional school districts to full reimbursement for school transportation expenses, but this is subject to annual appropriation. In fiscal 2016, the reimbursement rate from the state was just 73 percent, the auditor reported, creating a collective shortfall of \$14.4 million in this category for regional districts.

Regional school districts often have higher student transportation costs since they cover larger geographic regions. There are currently 58 regional

Have caution, but not over reaction, to neighborhood bears

Last weekend on a few occasions, our department received reports of bear sightings in the western parts of town. These are rather infrequent but can cause concern for some people. We provided some information for residents on Facebook during the week and I wanted to follow up here as

well in the event someone encounters one of these animals.

Bears are not a threat to people or pets under most circumstances. They move around frequently, especially at this time of year, in search of food. With ever increasing development, the opportunity to meet one or more of these animals increases. A great deal of information on bears is available on the Mass.gov website. The Department of Energy and Environmental Affairs provides the following: "If a bear is sighted in town, leave the animal alone. In most situations, if left alone, the bear will return to the forest on its own. Keep dogs under control. Stay away from the bear and advise others to do the same. Often a bear will climb a tree to avoid people. A gathering of people not only stresses the animal, but it adds the risk of having a bear chased out into traffic or into a group of bystanders."

They also inform people that the mere presence of a bear in a populated area is not a public safety threat. These animals are most often in search of food. The best defense against this situation is to limit potential sources. If bears find a good source of food, they will spend more time there or even return later. The state suggests removing bird feeders if you experience any bears around your home or if you are in an area frequented by bears. Even empty feeders can provide some residual scents which can attract these animals. The state also suggests leaving garbage in closed containers and only putting it out for pickup on the scheduled days. Other potential food sources can include meat or vegetable scraps, extra grease in or around grills, and pet foods left outside. Any of these scents can attract them if they are in the area.

A few simple precautions can be all you need to limit interaction with bears. Again, in most instances they are not dangerous to people or pets. They are, however, wild animals. As such they have the potential to become defensive, especially if they are stressed or protecting cubs. If left alone, they will leave on their own and may not return if they cannot find a meal. You can "enjoy" the view but please limit the interactions.

We are not the only ones....

In the wake of the G-7 conference, at which our president has confirmed decisions to continue to levy tariffs and penalties on historic trade partners; it is interesting to realize the world could easily go on without us.

We are not integral to the world's markets any longer.

Name one, just one product produced in the United States that is not available elsewhere.

Anyone? Anyone?

You are right.

There isn't one.

And often, because we are somewhat isolated from some of the most populous possible customers, our costs for shipping and handling mean we may not be the most economically feasible choice. We have oceans between us and many of the places that might rather have US goods. Air shipments or ocean shipments are expensive.

It limits just who our closest possible trade partners might be, north or south; and we pretty much ticked off our neighbors to the north this week.

We already messed up our relations to the south by threatening to bar them all with a gigantic wall...whether it is ever built or not it is a subtle threat indeed.

Everyone else in the world...an ocean. And costs.

The costs we incur in this country for employees, insurances, utilities, raw materials, spaces, machinery, display costs, shipping, and even advertising means we are not competitive with many other, smaller, leaner, entrepreneurial global enterprises. We just can't compete. And when we start demanding others pay our prices or else, we're cutting our own throats.

We can't even demand it on the precedent of quality. Not any longer.

Others do it better.

They just do.

So we are in trouble in the US of A. And we are not helping ourselves much with our bully attitudes. It might have worked in the earlier industrial ages, but no longer. Because we just aren't the best, or the even the least expensive, or the only ones with the widget others need, or a lock on any market anywhere.

It's going to hurt when the rest of the world realizes the power they have, and begin to exercise it. The power of the wallet has always been the most telling; and it will crush us in the long run.

Father's Day - lessons about money can be priceless gifts

Father's Day is almost upon us. If you're a dad, you certainly may enjoy getting cards and gifts, of course. But, over time, you will gain even greater satisfaction by what you can give your children - such as some valuable financial lessons.





On weekends we would go digging for arrowheads together and hike into the woods. He taught me to always watch my path, know where I was going, and intend every step I took. He would use my youth and drive to his advantage in the community. WORCESTER — When it was over, the disappointment of having been defeated in the first playoff game in the history of the program quickly gave way for the Shepherd Hill Regional girls' varsity lacrosse team to the acknowledgement of all the Rams accomplished this season.

Shrewsbury High defeated Shepherd Hill, 19-5, in a Central/West Division 1 Tournament first round District game, played Tuesday, June 5 at Assumption College's Multi-Sport Stadium. The Colonials, the No. 4 seed, improved to 15-6 with the win.

The 13th seeded Rams, playing in only their second varsity season, finished 11-10.

"I wouldn't say it's

disappointing, I would say it's unfortunate," Shepherd Hill head coach Sarah Morin said about the season-ending loss. "But we'll get them next year. We pretty much have the whole team coming back, so we're excited about that. The future of Shepherd Hill girls' lacrosse looks very good."

The Rams lose just two seniors off of this year's team, starting goalie Carrienne Fortier and Emily Girouard, who plays attack.

"The difference from last season to this season — from winning only four games to making Districts — is such an improvement. Hopefully next year we can keep it up," said sophomore captain Skylar Pietz, who scored one goal and assisted on two others in

the Rams' game against Shrewsbury. "We have practically our whole team coming back and we'll add a few freshmen next year, so I'm excited to see what the future holds. Hopefully we'll make another jump next year like we did this year and be even better."

Shrewsbury, with seven seniors and four juniors on its roster, showed how valuable experience in the post-season can be, as they jumped out to a 6-0 lead before the game was five minutes old. Morin called a timeout at that point to settle her team down and the Rams responded, scoring the game's next two goals — the first by freshman Claudia Bonaventura, the second by Pietz — to cut the deficit down to four, 6-2, with 17:19 left in the first half.

Shepherd Hill had a chance for another goal about 30 seconds later, but a shot from about 10 yards away zipped wide of the goal.

"I knew if we could keep plugging away at their lead and getting goals back a little bit at a time we could get back in the game," Morin said. "But, unfortunately, they were shutting us down when we tried to move in close to the goal and that caused us to force some shots instead of looking

to pass. At the end of the game, when we started making those passes and our transitions got better, we scored a few goals."

After the Rams cut the Shrewsbury lead down to 6-2, the Colonials responded by scoring the final 10 goals of the first half to take a 16-2 lead into halftime. Shrewsbury made it 18-2 four minutes into the second half on goals by Phoebe Johnson and Michaela O'Connor.

Shepherd Hill scored three of the final four goals of the game, Bonaventura netting two

and sophomore Katie Lavoie scoring the other.

Pietz stressed how proud she was of the improvement and progress her team made this year, but acknowledged that the level at which Shrewsbury played the game is where the Rams want to get to.

"This game was definitely a learning experience. Seeing what they did on each goal — how they set their scoring chances up — I want us to put some of those things into our plays and the way that we play,"

Pietz said. "Hopefully we'll get back to this spot [Districts] again next year."

Morin had nothing but smiles and hugs for her players after the game.

"I'm so proud of them for making it this far because we are definitely underdogs, being only a second-year team," Morin said. "I'm also proud of my team because they never gave up. At halftime they decided to pick their heads up; they didn't want to end the season that way."

Early run support enough for Fagan as Shepherd Hill softball beats Holy Name

WORCESTER — A quick burst of runs in the early innings helped the No. 5 Shepherd Hill Regional varsity softball team roll past No. 4 Holy Name High, 5-1, in a Central Mass. Division 1 Tournament quarterfinal round matchup, held Saturday, June 9 at Vernon Hill Park.

"We talked about it all week getting ready for the game that it was going to be important for us to play from ahead," explained Rams' head coach Donny Loos. "The girls were excited and they were ready to play the game into our advantage."

Shepherd Hill was in for a tough matchup against Holy Name (14-7) knowing they had a solid pitcher in Ava Vincequere in the circle. The Rams had to stray away from their normal game plan in order to have success.

"We got some aggressive base-running, that is a tough team in that dug-out," praised Loos. "Holy Name plays a quality brand of softball, tons of great players and a great pitcher in the circle. We knew we would have to do some things outside our usual game plan to

get a run across and we always want to play from ahead, so it is good to get a couple of runs coming out of the gate.

"We needed to make sure we kept the pitcher in the zone and not help her with pitches outside of the zone. She spins the ball terrifically, so we needed to make sure we got hitters' pitches to hit and stayed disciplined in the strike zone. I thought we did that today," added Loos. "We needed to also be aggressive on the bases, not fall into ruts, try to be unpredictable and keep pressure on their defense. We don't bunt a lot ordinarily, but we put one down with a runner on third and thought we could make something happen. Just getting the ball into play and playing heads-up offensive softball really helped us out today."

The Rams succeeded. In the top of the first inning Shepherd Hill had a runner on third and the Rams took advantage when Sam Zannotti scored on a swing bunt by starting pitcher and No. 3 batter Cayley Fagan.

A couple of batters later, Keely Scaria ripped an RBI single to make it 2-0 Rams going into the bottom of the first.

The Hill didn't slow down and they

stayed on track with their game plan, jumping out to a big early lead by scoring three more runs in the next three innings.

Zannotti and Scotia paced Shepherd Hill offensively, as Zannotti went 2 for 3 with two singles, an RBI and a run scored. Scotia went 2 for 3 with a double, a single and an RBI.

After giving up a run in the first inning, Fagan was dominant in the circle. She struck out nine and allowed just the one run. Fagan did a great job changing speeds and mixing in her variety of pitches.

"She is a talented kid," Loos praised. "I have been coaching her since she was 12 years old and she has always been a very talented pitcher. What she has been able to do this season is improve tactically to work with Sofia [Sciarappa] calling the pitches and she mixed her pitches terrifically today. I told the kids afterward, the battery did such a good job that whenever they thought they were going to get a fastball, they got a changeup and the times where they thought they were going to get a change they got a fastball. She did such a great job of mixing her stuff and

keeping them off balance."

Although Fagan was excellent, her defense was also outstanding. Shepherd Hill turned a couple double plays throughout the duration of the game to get her out of jams and her outfield took perfect angles to turn potential doubles into singles.

"Today they were really focused and took 'the ball is coming to me' mentality on every pitch," explained Loos. "We preach that to the kids that defensively that you have to focus just like you know I am going to hit you a groundball before the game warming up. Our outfield is really athletic and does a great job taking angles at balls and making sure we don't give up extra bases. Typically we have a lot of faith in our offense and we didn't hit the way we would've liked to today, we always say if we can stay away from crooked numbers and we can keep those innings to one-run innings we have a good shot of staying in games."

Shepherd Hill, now 12-9, advanced to the District semifinals, where they played No. 1 Wachusett Regional (21-0) after press time.

The Chieftains answered with two unanswered goals to take a 3-2 lead going into the second quarter. Nashoba never surrendered the lead again in the contest. To do so they won most of the face-offs and got all the right bounces, winning most of the 50-50 balls.

In the end, the Chieftains (12-7) performed the detailed tasks better than the Rams.

"They worked harder and they did all of the little things right," expressed Kelley. "We had some glaring errors and areas to work on and they were better at them than we were today."

"Fundamentals, groundballs, sticks skills and face-offs; all of it," added Kelley.

It was a season of highs and lows for the Rams, who finished 9-10, but they played best when it counted most, earning


"Obviously you want to win, but you forget about it, move on and get ready for Districts," he said.

With loss to Murdock, strong season ends in disappointment for Bay Path softball

CHARLTON — The Bay Path Regional varsity softball team finished its first round Central Mass. Division 3 Tournament game against Winchendon's Murdock High with seven singles, but none were delivered when the Minutemen needed it most and the end result was a disappointing 6-2 loss to the Blue Devils.

With the win Murdock, the No. 11 seed, improved to 13-7. Bay Path, the No. 6 seed, finished its season with a 14-5 record.

"We couldn't come up with that big hit we needed. We had baserunners and we couldn't execute," Bay Path head coach Rick Carrero said. "We didn't play our best game, but I felt we played good enough to win if we could have gotten a few of those hits. Sometimes they don't fall your way."

Murdock jumped out to a 1-0 lead in the top of the first inning, with lead-off hitter Maria Polcari tripling to right field and then coming home on an RBI single by Molly Murphy. The Minutemen looked as if they would answer with a run or two in the bottom

of the inning — they had runners on first and second with one out — but the threat fizzled on a pair of infield outs.

In the bottom of the third Bay Path's Kyleigh Sutherland singled to center with two outs, stole second and advanced to third on a Murdock error. Meagan Harding was up next and she hit a shot to center, too, but hers was right at Murdock's Lindsey Smith, who easily caught the ball to end the inning.

In the bottom of the fourth the Minutemen had runners on first and second with two outs, but Murdock pitcher Emily Smith got out of the jam by striking out opposing pitcher Sarah Gosselin to end that inning.

In the top of the fifth inning Murdock increased its lead to 3-0 thanks to an RBI single off the bat of Murphy and an RBI double down the left-field line by Jocelyn Garner. In the bottom of the frame Bay Path got a runner to second base with one out, but she was doubled off first when Garner, playing shortstop, made her second diving stab of a low line drive and then threw to first to complete the double play.

The Blue Devils doubled their lead to 6-0 in the top of the seventh inning, on RBI singles by Ashley Sevigny and

Polcari — who was 3 for 4 with a double, triple and RBI — and another RBI double by Garner on a ball that hit off the left field fence on the fly.

Bay Path finally got on the scoreboard in the bottom of the seventh inning, scoring two runs.

Evelyn Sheehan got things started with an infield single and moved to second on a throwing error. She advanced to third on a single by Gosselin and then both runners scored on a two-run single to left field off the bat of Lizzy McLam, who finished with two hits.

"Defensively they played very well. Their shortstop made a couple of great, diving catches that they turned into double plays, and their pitcher pitched well," Carrero said. "We made a few errors in the beginning and we had a few hits in the outfield that were shots, but they were positioned perfectly defensively. They played a great defensive game. That's a good team; they were very aggressive."

The silver lining in the disappointing loss for Bay Path is that, with no seniors on this year's roster, the entire team will return next year.

"We have a good team," Carrero said. "Our goal was to get to Worcester State

[site of the tournament's semifinal and final round games]. Last year we went past the first round, this year our goal was to build on that and get through two rounds. Our expectations for next year are that we're going to win our league and get into Districts again, we've just got to find a way to win games like this."

To help do that Carrero said he plans to schedule some tougher out-of-league opponents.

"Our schedule is very bipolar. We play the Colonial [Athletic League] Large Division and the Colonial Small Division. The Colonial Large Division is good and competitive. We went 4-3 against Colonial Large teams and we beat Assabet, Worcester Voke twice and we beat AMSA," Carrero said. "Our Colonial Small Division games do not prepare us in a lot of ways because they're so lopsided. A lot of times we don't get anything out of them."

"Next year we're going to have four non-league games to pick up," Carrero continued. "I'm hoping to look to the SWCL and the Mid-Wach and play some of those teams, schedule some higher division teams."

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
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

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
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GRILLING

Safety tips for grilling season



People have been cooking meals over open flames since the discovery of fire. Even today, when there are so many ways to cook a meal, many still insist there's nothing better than the taste of food cooked on the grill.

The Hearth, Patio & Barbecue Association, which tracks industry trends, points out that one-third of con-

sumers plan to use their grill or smoker more often this year. Even though grilling is widely associated with summer, a growing number of people are embracing year-round grilling. HPBA's CEO Jack Goldman has said, "Barbecuing is no longer just a pastime, but an integral part of the North American lifestyle."

Seven in 10 adults in the United States

and eight out of 10 in Canada own a grill or smoker. With so many people firing up their grills, it's important to recognize the importance of grilling safety. Each year an average of 8,900 home fires are caused by grilling, and close to half of all injuries involving grills are due to thermal burns, advises the National Fire Protection Association.

Here's how to stay safe.

- Only grill outside. Propane and charcoal barbecue grills should only be used outdoors. Grills should be placed well away from the home. Keep grills away from deck railings, eaves, overhangs, and tree branches.

- Keep the grill clean. Thoroughly clean the grill prior to first use, and keep it tidy all year long. Grease or fat buildup can ignite and cause a fire.

- Always attend the grill. Grill distraction-free and keep an eye on the food being cooked. Simply stepping away for a few moments can lead to a fire or accident.

- Start fires safely. Charcoal grills and gas grills may be lit using electronic starters that do not require fire. If using starter fluid, only do so on charcoal, and do not add more fluid or other flammable liquids after the fire has ignited.

- Check for gas leaks. Whether the gas grill is hooked up to a propane tank or the natural gas supply of a home, ensure that the hoses or tanks are not leaking. Apply a light soap-and-water solution to hoses to see if they bubble from leaking gas.

- Keep baking soda nearby. Baking soda can control grease fires, but it's also helpful to have a fire extinguisher or a bucket of sand on hand for other types of fires.

- Watch children and pets. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from grilling areas.

- Wait for the grill and coals to cool. Practice safety around the grill until all coals are cool and the grill is no longer hot to the touch. Only then should the grill be moved or relocated.

Grilling is a passion that is enjoyed throughout much of the year. Safely cook outdoors by heeding safety guidelines.

TACOS WITH GRILLED STEAK AND VEGGIES

Prep time: 5 minutes
Cook time: 14 minutes
Serves 6

Ingredients:

5. To assemble the tacos, place a couple slices of grilled steak on the bottom. Add vegetables and top with a slice of avocado. Drizzle the top with chipotle mayonnaise.



How to handle raw meats when grilling out

Cooking over an open flame on a grill in the backyard requires cooks keep watchful eyes on their grills. Charcoal

grill devotees must stay nearby as flames grow before settling down as the coals turn gray. Cooks using charcoal

grills should also make sure children or pets don't accidentally run into the grill, potentially knocking it over and creating a fire and/or injury hazard. But even gas grill users must be mindful of safety, checking hoses for leaks before igniting fires and then staying within arm's length of the grill to make sure everything is working smoothly.

Fire safety is essential when grilling outdoors, but cooks also must prioritize safe handling of raw meats. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has established a host of guidelines to promote safe grilling and the safe consumption of grilled foods and offers the following recommendations to cooks planning to grill raw meats.

- Separate foods when purchasing them. The grocery store might be far away from home, but safe grilling begins at the checkout counter. The FDA recommends consumers separate raw meat, poultry, seafood, and eggs from other foods in their shopping carts and grocery bags to prevent cross-contamination. Keep these items separate when storing them in the refrigerator as well.

- Use separate cutting boards. Another way to prevent cross-contamination is to use separate cutting boards.

Designate one cutting board for produce and another for raw meat, poultry and seafood. If grilling more than one type of raw food at once, thoroughly clean the cutting board with soap and hot water between uses.

- Keep separate plates for precooked foods and cooked foods. The FDA notes that cooked foods should never be placed on plates that previously held raw meat, poultry, seafood, or eggs unless the plate has been washed in hot, soapy water. Bacteria from the juices of raw meat can linger on an uncooked plate, compromising the safety of cooked foods placed on unwashed, previously used plates.

- Discard marinades once you start cooking. Marinades used on raw foods should be discarded once the foods are removed from the marinade and placed on the grill. Repurposing marinades to use as sauces can increase the risk for bacterial infections. However, the FDA notes that marinades used on raw foods can be repurposed so long as they are boiled before reusing them.

When grilling raw meat, poultry, seafood or other foods, cooks must be careful to prevent cross-contamination that can lead to bacterial infections.



GRILLING

Practice food safety

Warmer temperatures lead to an increase in outdoor dining. Grillmasters anxiously wait to show off their skills while guests gravitate around the barbecue in the backyard.

No matter the temperature outside or the size of the crowd around your dinner table, food safety is a concern whenever foods will be transported inside and outdoors or enjoyed in the fresh air.

A survey conducted by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics found that, while most people realize the months of May through September are prime times for the threat of food poisoning, consumers still are not practicing correct outdoor food safety procedures. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says there are around 76 million cases of foodborne illnesses each year in the United States alone. Those involve hundreds of thousands of hospitalizations and thousands of deaths. The CDC warns that people need to be even more diligent during warmer months to prevent food-related illnesses.

FOOD SAFETY STARTS AT THE STORE

Food can spoil even before making its way into your kitchen. When food shopping, put the cold and frozen items on your list in your cart last. This will help keep them fresher longer.

Always use plastic bags to

protect other foods against raw meat or poultry juices that can leak. Bag these items together at checkout so that you'll know to immediately put all of the perishable items away when you get home.

Some people invest in insulated, reusable tote bags that can keep cold food cold on the ride home. Even if you use such bags, always head directly home after food shopping; do not stop along the way and

leave food in a warm car where it can quickly spoil.

SAFETY AROUND THE GRILL

Preparing foods involves avoiding cross-contamination between uncooked and cooked foods. That means switching utensils so that bacteria will not transfer from uncooked or partially cooked food to fully cooked food.

Use a cooler to keep refrigerated foods cold until it's time to put them on the grill if you're cooking away from home, such as at a public picnic site. Otherwise, wait until the grill is hot and ready before bringing out foods that need to be cooked.

Rely on a cooking thermometer to test the internal temperature of foods to ensure they reach temperatures that will kill bacteria or other patho-

gens. Hamburgers should reach 160 F and chicken breasts 165 F. When reheating fully cooked meats like hot dogs, grill to 165 F, or until steaming hot.

Discard any unused marinades so that they do not contaminate cooked foods.

OUTDOOR BUFFET TIPS

Food also needs to be protected once it is served. Use ice or coolers to keep cold salads and condiments at at least 40 F. Foods should not remain outside in hot weather of 90 F or above for more than one hour. The maximum time food should be kept sitting out is two hours, says the USDA.

Keep hands and utensils clean at all times. This way you do not transfer any germs onto safe foods. If a fresh water source is unavailable, keep hand wipes or disinfecting gels at the ready to clean up before eating.

CLEAN UP WELL

Promptly clean all serving platters, utensils and cutting boards if they have been in contact with raw food juices. The FDA even recommends that you sanitize your cutting board with chlorine bleach, and replace it if the surface gets worn and difficult to clean.

Outdoor cooking and dining are quite popular. Following safety precautions can go a long way toward preventing foodborne illnesses.

Master magical marinades



With their mix of acidic ingredients and spices, marinades add flavor and may even pack some nutritional punch.

Grilled foods boast inviting flavors that put many diners on the lookout for second helpings. Quite often the magic behind grilled meals lies in the marinade used to give foods that flavorful kick.

Marinades can be used to enhance the flavor of meats, vegetables and poultry. While marinades add flavor, they also may be responsible for some other benefits in grilled foods.

MARINADES ADD FLAVOR

Defined as a savory acidic sauce in which food is soaked to enrich its flavor, marinades help break down fiber and tenderize certain foods. The base of many marinades include vinegar, lemon juice or wine, and marinades can be enhanced with spices, oil and herbs.

It's important not to let foods sit in marinades for too long, as any alcohol, acid or salt in the mixture can chemically "cook" the food in a process known as "denaturing." Adhere to timing recommendations when using store-bought marinades, and keep such guidelines in mind when using homemade marinades as well. Many may tell you to let foods sit no longer than four hours. Marinades with citrus juices may require even less time for flavor to penetrate.

The timing of marinade use also will depend on the foods being marinated. Delicate items, such as seafood, may change with regard to texture or color in a matter of minutes.

It's important to always marinate foods in the refrig-


erator. Food left sitting out on a counter — even when it's in a marinade — invites the growth of bacteria. If a recipe calls for marinating at room temperature, continue to marinate in the refrigerator, but extend the length of time you marinate. This helps to prevent foodborne illnesses.

When marinating, use plastic or glass containers so the marinade does not cause a chemical reaction, which may occur if you marinate foods in metal containers. Discard all marinades for raw meats and poultry when the time comes to cook the foods, as leftover marinades may contain bacteria that makes them unsafe to reuse on other foods.

THE NUTRITIONAL BENEFITS OF MARINATING

In addition to flavor, marinades may improve the nutritional value of grilled foods. In 2008, researchers at Kansas State University discovered that marinating meat in antioxidant-rich spice blends can reduce the risk of forming heterocyclic amines, or HCAs, by more than 80 percent. HCAs are harmful, cancer-causing compounds that form when food chars over an open flame at high temperatures. Marinades must be rich in spices to have any HCA-busting properties.

Marinades are a secret weapon in the creation of tasty, tender and healthy foods. They come in quite handy when grilling, and add an extra dose of flavor when cooking over high heat.
