# 'Civil Service' designation lifted from police chief's position

BY JASON BLEAU VILLAGER CORRESPONDENT

CHARLTON - The town of Charlton's annual fall town meeting concluded with a rather contentious pair of articles on Tuesday, Oct. 8 as voters were asked whether or not to remove both the Police Chief and Lieutenant positions from civil service.

The idea was first brought up in July by Selectman David Singer, who felt that removing

the two positions from civil service designation would benefit the town by allowing for a more competitive and detailed hiring process. Singer started the debate by restating his opinions and explaining that this is a route many communities have chosen in recent years throughout the common-

"A lot of this came from the fact that we went through a chief hiring process and we paid a lot of money for an assessment center. They compile complete evaluations of all the candidates and, low and behold, we're not allowed to see them. So, you cannot review any of the evaluations of the candidates that they wrote for the town. All they do is give us a score. By removing this, among many benefits and coming in line with the rest of the state we'd actually be able to read the evaluations from

the assessment center," Singer

This started smoothly as the penultimate article of the meeting sought to remove the chief position from civil service and passed with little debate. A counted vote was taken after an inconclusive voice vote resulting in a 61 to 30 decision in support of the article. However, it was the last article of the night that sought to remove the lieutenant position

from civil service that drew the ire of several police representatives from the crowd.

Charlton Police Officer Timothy Smith was the most vocal opponent of the article seeking to put the decision on hold rather than voting on the matter at the meeting.

"I think there has to be a lot more conversation about this. This is a lot different than the chief position where it will

# Voters put a hold on social media bylaw

CHARLTON - Charlton's fall annual town meeting put a new social media bylaw before voters for consideration that would regulate postings on websites like Facebook by town employees, officers, and elected and appointed officials of the town.

The bylaw received mixed responses from the very start with confusion over who would enforce the bylaw, who would be grandfathered in under the proposal and how this would affect social media pages and forums currently operated by employed, elected or appointed officials of the town. Jordan Evans, who serves as a constable in Charlton, was one of the more

seeing as she operates an online community news and information resource for her town on her own time.

"I run a Facebook page that I use to interact with citizens of the town of Charlton to post election results and other things as they come up in the town. When I created that page, it was never meant to be a town identity, however social media designated me as an official public figure on Facebook so I don't have control over that. Facebook designated me as an official public entity because they didn't want my identity to be compromised. Would my personal account retroactively become a town identity?" Evans asked.

Evans' comments were

vocal citizens at the meeting just some of many throughout the discussion that highlighted some unknowns that remained with the social media bylaw. Curtis Meskus represented the Technology Committee at meeting, who played a role in forming the bylaw, and responded to some

of the concerns. "The town officially needs to maintain its identity and control over what the town does and what the town puts forward. It would be our intention in this bylaw that if you were to have a personal site and did not represent yourself as speaking for the town, but just providing the information, then that would be acceptable," Meskus said. "An example would be that in a





affect a lot more people on the department. I think we need to further discuss it to see if this is something we want to do as a whole body of the police department," Smith said.

Selectman Singer was quick to offer some sharp comments saying that Smith and other officers had ample opportunities to discuss the matter in a public forum. He also responded to criticisms that the police union were not invited to public meetings and while Singer said the union was more than welcome to attend the public forums the lieutenant position is not a bargaining or union position, so a special invite was not required.

"I think everyone here needs to be aware that people who are speaking tonight had every

opportunity to discuss this. This was brought up many months ago at a public meeting of the Board of Selectmen in July. This was brought up again in August at a meeting where the Chief of Police came and was asked to give pros and cons publicly. So, there were two opportunities where members of the police department had to come and participate in the process and give comments and feedback," Singer said.

He also noted that the story had been covered in local newspapers, and meeting notices were posted on the bulletin board o the police department.

'Quite frankly, it's a little disingenuous to have people come to the board and say they want to have time to discuss it and go over it when they've actually had since July and it's been discussed publicly multiple times," he added.

The debate evolved into a back and forth discussion between Singer and Smith where each had their say on the matter. Smith feared that removing the lieutenant position from civil service would cause qualified candidates to seek promotions outside of Charlton and fears of possibility of nepotism were also brought to the table. Singer stated that by making the change it would allow Charlton to have a larger pool of candidates and be more educated about their qualifications for the job.

In the end, the article was put to a vote and, in order to ensure accuracy, a counted vote was taken rather than attempting a voice vote first. In a 26 to 58 decision, the article was overwhelmingly defeated leaving the lieutenant position as a civil service post.

neighboring town an official left employment of that town and used the towns seal on a personal site. It was very difficult for that town to regain control of that because there was no bylaw in place

Other citizens voiced complaints against the bylaw calling it overreaching and invading free speech. Selectman Deborah Noble first brought the idea of a new bylaw to the town several years ago as the result of an incident in another town where an employee was fired for their social media conduct. With numerous controversies, both in the commonwealth and nationwide, stemming from how public officials present themselves on social media having a bylaw felt like a logical step for

"One of the things we've talked about for years now is bringing Charlton into the 21st Century, but without the foundation, without guidelines in place, we can't move forward appropriately so this is the beginning of that. It has taken two years, it has gone through the Technology Committee, it has gone through multiple departments and it has gone through the attorneys. I think it's important to realize we're not trying to inhibit freedom of speech or freedom of expression. Really what we're trying to do is to encourage responsible speech. There's nothing wrong with that," Noble

In the end, voters felt there was too much gray area and work still to be worked out with the bylaw. A motion to postpone action on the bylaw was approved in a counted vote of 71 to 26, putting the bylaw on hold until next May. Selectman Noble said she hopes to see citizens make their voices and concerns heard before then so that the town can bring a newly revised version to the table that everyone can get behind.

"A lot of departments put a lot of hard work into crafting the social media bylaw. So, the one thing I'd ask everybody to do is, if you've gotten up tonight and you've spoken up against it, if you think it's too onerous and too restrictive, I would expect that you would be contacting one if not every member of this board and sending your thoughts and suggestions to us so that when we come back in May, we can actually say that we were contacted and we've incorporated everyone's concerns," said Noble. "If those concerns were brought forth when this was posted in September, perhaps we wouldn't be sitting here right now having this discussion."

Many of my fellow bird hunters think that Massachusetts should close down hunting for grouse in areas of the Blackstone Valley, Zones 8 and 9 to help restore their populations due to lost habitat.

# Skip the screens

One of the most frustrating phenomena of recent years is to witness a baby, or toddler, or even a school aged child being occupied with a screen of some sort while sitting at a restaurant. It seems as though this is now such a common sight that it has become the norm, and is socially acceptable.

We are not doing these children any favors. We are teaching them that this family time is for the adults, a throwback to children should be seen and not heard. If your child is misbehaving or fussy, flashing a screen in front of their face may be a quick fix but no valuable lessons are being learned. Back in the day, when a child was fussy, a parent would simply remove them from the

A restaurant setting is the perfect time to teach children how to behave in a social atmosphere. We know that distraction is key. There are other options to distract a child then with a screen. Crayons, peek a boo, Cheerios, etc., etc. On that rare occasion, when a parent is feeling overly stressed, tired and lacks patience to deal with a crabby toddler, we get it, and we understand.

The issue we have is the staggering amount of time babies and children are exposed to screens, and how that exposure is playing a detrimental role in delayed development and language skills. Children are exposed to the television set in the morning, iPads during the day, phones during appointments then again after dinner. All of this time

Preschoolers should not have more than one hour of screen time per day, according to experts. Some local doctors suggest that time, be cut down to zero. Studies have revealed that excessive screen time during the formative years has stalled development, including social development, lack of eye contact or interest in the world around them. One study concluded that a higher level of screen time at ages two and three, significantly affected developmental screening tests. The bright lights have also been shown to compromise devel-

During those early years, the brain is at a critical time in development. Young children should be exploring their world as well as developing motor skills. This can only happen when they are on the move, looking around them and observing what's going on. If they are glued to a screen, none of those things are happening. Technology is no replacement for the one on one time that comes with interaction with a per-

Face to face time allows for children to interact verbally and non-verbally as well. The instant gratification of a screen inhibits the child's ability to slow down. Old school toys, such as puzzles, books and blocks are best.

Again, everything in moderation. We think screens have a time and a place and do offer some fun and educational components, however we think the bad outweighs the good, when used in

These funds are more niche because of the thematic focus and typically have narrowly defined investment guidelines, which can reduce diversification and may not fit neatly into a traditional asset allocation frame-



# Best (Budget Friendly) Halloween Hints



TAKE THE HINT KAREN TRAINOR

Want to welcome little ghosts and goblins to your door with more than a tasty treat on Halloween? Getting into the spooky spirit can be as easy as greeting trick or treaters to a dose of creative creepiness. Best of all, with a little imagination, setting the stage for frightful fun doesn't have to break the budget!

Through the years this column has passed along ideas to ensure a spook-tacular holiday, and some favorites deserve an encore. From front door fright to morbid makeup, the following tips culled from past columns offer affordable options to turn up the terror this Halloween!

Front Door Fright

These ideas add a haunted house element to your home.

Flight Factor: Here's how to create the image of a few ghosts bobbing around your front porch or foyer. Just drape a thin sheet square or cheesecloth over a white helium balloon. Use a marker to make two eerie eyes. If you want, tie the sheet off under the ghosts head, or just let it swing free as it bobs in the porch wind. For even more drama, attach the long balloon string to a house eave or roof. The sight of helium ghosts hovering in the dark is sure to spook trick or treaters!

UFO Alert: Trick Halloween visitors by attaching glow sticks to black helium balloons and tying onto a roof or tree. The wind creates just enough movement to make kids won-

Note: Disposable glow sticks are inexpensive, and often have a loop or hole at the top that you can use to tie to the base of the balloon.

Ghastly Ghosts: Manufacture a spooky spirit with some cheesecloth and either equal parts Elmer's glue and water or liquid starch. Simply soak the cheesecloth in the stiffener until fully saturated. For a tabletop ghost, place a balloon atop a paper towel roll. Drape the cheesecloth over the balloon until completely dry. Add eyes with a magic marker or felt. If you're more ambitious, use the same procedure to form a giant lawn sculpture!

To add some "super spook" to your ghost, tuck a string of battery operated white mini lights under the sculpture.

Crime Scene: If you have a sidewalk, cement walkway or paved driveway, you can easily create a creepy crime scene. Simply use flourescent sidewalk chalk to draw a life size outline of a "victim." Up the fright factor by stringing a length of yellow "caution" tape along nearby trees or bushes.

Light the Way: Forget old fashioned (and potentially dangerous) candles to light your carved pumpkins! Battery operated flameless candles and disposable glow sticks are ideal alternatives to softly and safely illuminate Jack-O-Lanterns. The lights can also be placed inside (decorated) paper bag illuminaries to safely line a walkway or path to the front

Wet Webs: Simulate scary spider webs by hanging long strands of string from your porch. Be sure to make them long enough to touch the heads of little ones. To add an extra dose of gore, spray the strings with water.

Morbid Makeup

For many creative costumers, a face properly made up for the occasion is a must. But before you run out to buy expensive makeup kits, try your hand at some kitchen creativity to concoct colorful creams and dramatic skin embellishments. Here's a collection of classic recipes that rival professional makeup techniques.

Face off: Makeup can make or break a costume. Whether you're a clown or a ghost, the following basic "recipe" is sure help you put your best Halloween face forward!

To create an easy face makeup that can be tinted with food coloring, mix together one teaspoon cornstarch; one half teaspoon water, one half teaspoon cold cream and two drops of food coloring. To make a big batch of makeup in different colors, mix ingredients in the cups of a muffin tin and you'll have a palette of colors at your fingertips. Just add a different color food coloring to each cup. Mix well and apply.

No cold cream on hand? Make the makeup from scratch. Here's how: Blend three tablespoons cornstarch, one tablespoon flour, three quarters of a cup of Karo light corn syrup; one quarter cup water and one quarter teaspoon liquid or paste food coloring.

Kid's Choice: This child safe recipe uses vegetable shortening in place of cold cream for a base. In a small bowl, combine ten teaspoons cornstarch and two teaspoons flour. Stir in five teaspoons of vegetable shortening and one eighth teaspoon food coloring. Stir in one quarter teaspoon glycerin, mixing together well.

Bloody Good: Any vampire worth his blood knows a ready supply of the yucky red stuff is a necessity on Halloween! To mix up some realistic blood, blend 1 3/4 cups of corn syrup with one quarter cup of water. Add two teaspoons of red food coloring and five to ten drops of blue food coloring until color resembles real blood. Add one quarter cup of sifted corn starch and mix well.

Scary Skin Ailments: Making scars, scabs, moles and other gory facial features require a little more imagination. Gelatin, in various colors and stages of set makes for a realistic Halloween array of yucky facial imperfections.

Ingredients: one ounce gelatin (plain or flavored depending on desired effect); two tablespoons boiling water; mix ins as needed: couscous, hairs, paprika, colored sugar; four tablespoons corn syrup

Directions: In a small bowl or cup combine gelatin and water. Mix and let set three minutes. To create general skin growths: Before the gelatin sets completely make moles, blisters, and some other skin growths by dripping the liquid gelatin

onto a ceramic plate and letting it set completely. When set use a sharp object to carefully peel the forms off of the plate. Stick them onto the face by using a drop of corn syrup as adhesive Or, drip unset gelatin for form a dripping effect, or the foundation for other gory skin conditions. Stirring in mixins adds texture to the effects. Sprinkling colored sugar into the unset gelatin will make grainy textured effects, while sprinkling paprika on top of the globs once they've begun to set will make some scab wounds look scabbed over.

# Shepherd Hill makes statement by beating Colonials, 29-22

SHREWSBURY — After one quarter at David J. Adams Memorial Field at Central One Federal Credit Union Stadium, the Shepherd Hill Regional varsity football team had only run three offensive plays, one of which was fumbled and recovered by Shrewsbury High's Rocco Ragaini. And the Colonials had 17 offensive snaps, which led two a pair of rushing touchdowns by quarterback Clint Mills.

result The end Shrewsbury leading, 13-0, and the Rams needed to regroup and quickly.

"When you play a good team on the road, you know that they're going to come out hot and be ready to play. They're

a fantastic team — verv wellcoached — so you knew they'd come ready to play and we knew that it was going to be a challenge," said Shepherd Hill head coach Ryan Dugan. "Down 13-0 we had two choices, and that was stick to our game plan, make a few adjustments and get better, or we could have thrown in the towel. But that's not our football team."

The Rams rallied, outscored the Colonials the rest of the (29-9) and eventually pulled out a dramatic 29-22 victory, improving to 5-2 in the

"This was a game that really springboards us into the second half of our season. I can't believe how proud I am of our players," said Dugan.

Shepherd Hill's comeback

began when they opened the second quarter with the ball. They embarked on a 12-play drive, which went 90 yards. Tyler Brassard ended the drive with a 3-yard touchdown run, and Brock Dubey booted the first of his three successful kicks to cut the deficit to 13-7.

Shrewsbury extended its lead to 19-7 with 5:30 to play until halftime on a 1-yard run by Tucker Montague, but The Hill came right back. On their next drive, the Rams made it a 19-14 game — the score at halftime — when Gabe Dos Santos scored from 3 yards out.

Shepherd Hill started with the ball in the second half and, as a result, they took their first lead. Dos Santos bounced a run out to his right and found the end zone from 16 yards out. Dubey's PAT made it 21-19 in the Rams' favor.

But the Colonials' AJ Hamm ended up kicking a 24-yard field goal with 4:10 remaining in the third quarter to put his team back ahead, 22-21.

The Rams wouldn't give in, though, and regained the lead in the final minute of the frame. Anthony Sacco broke a 47-yard run during the drive and capped the possession with a 1-yard plunge up the middle. Dos Santos then carried in the two-point conversion to push The Hill's lead to 29-22.

Shrewsbury then had a pair of fourth-quarter possessions, gaining a total of 102 yards. But, more importantly, they led to zero points.

With seven minutes to play and facing a third down at the Rams' 11-yard line, Mills rolled to his right and threw a pass into the end zone. But Dos Santos was there to make the interception.

Then, after the Colonials forced Shepherd Hill to punt, they found themselves deep in Rams' territory again. With less than a minute to go, Shrewsbury had a second-and-seven at the 13. Mills (7 of 12, 93 yards; 16 carries, 79 yards) dropped back again and threw a pass for Hamm. But Dos Santos came away with another interception, this one

wrapping up the victory. "We had a real good defensive plan. We knew that they were going to make their plays... and when we have a chance to

make a play, we have to make a big play," said Dugan. "We held them to a field goal, which was huge, and then the two red zone interceptions. We've been waiting for guys to make plays and Gabe, rightfully so, made two huge plays to seal the game.'

"Our line did a great job putting pressure on that," Dos Santos said of the game-ending INT. "I was kind of baiting him a little bit because I knew that [Hamm] was his first read. I just stayed back and I knew he didn't see me."

Dos Santos, who finished with 133 rushing yards on 16 carries, plus the two touchdowns, two interceptions and the two-point conversion, was battling injuries throughout the game.

"I knew that I couldn't give up on my boys," he said. "Even with one of our best running backs [Nathaniel Cooper] being out, some guys stepped up. We say at Shepherd Hill, 'the train stops for no one,' next man up."

Dos Santos, Sacco (7 carries, 110 yards), Brassard (11 carries, 55 yards) and Mike Raymond (7 carries, 10 yards) carried the torch and totaled 311 rushing yards for the Rams, who didn't attempt a pass.

# Rams can't contain Shrewsbury in pair of losses

SHREWSBURY — David J. Adams Memorial Field at Central One Federal Credit Union Stadium hosted a boys' and girls' varsity soccer doubleheader on Monday, Oct. 28, when Shrewsbury High hosted Shepherd Hill Regional.

And unfortunately for the Rams, neither game went their way as the Colonials picked up a pair of victories.

Shrewsbury 2, Shepherd Hill 0 — In the first matchup, the boys' teams took the field in what turned out to be a mostly defensive affair. The midfielders controlled the play as the game remained scoreless at the half.

But, in a five-minute span, the

Colonials scored a pair of second-half goals to account for the 2-0 final.

"That's a very dynamic team coming through the middle," Shepherd Hill head coach Tim Cormier said of Shrewsbury. "It was one of the things we warned them against at halftime."

The Colonials picked up goals off the feet of Connor Bell and Cole Lippert in the 49th and 54th minutes, respectively.

The Rams only put three shots on frame—which were all saved by keeper Leith Khan—as they had trouble maintaining any type of offensive attack.

"That's one of our major problems, is sustaining something in the offensive third," said Cormier.

Shepherd Hill keeper Jake Fortin made six saves in the losing effort.

Shrewsbury improved to 7-6-4 to officially qualify for the Central Mass. Division 1 Tournament, while the Rams' loss would have dropped them to 7-8-2 — just a victory away from also qualifying for the CMass D1 Tourney with a game to play — but the MIAA took away seven of The Hill's points to officially drop them to 4-12-1.

Shepherd Hill's Nick Diamond picked up his third yellow card earlier in the season and, unbeknownst to Cormier, he was supposed to sit out one game. Then, when Diamond got his fourth yellow card, he was supposed to miss the next two games. All of the games that he played since Oct. 1 have now been reflected as Rams' losses.

"It's an unintentional oversight on my part," said Cormier, a second-year coach.

Nonetheless, Cormier is proud of the way his team has performed this season, flirting with the .500 mark after an 0-17-1 campaign in 2018.

"We've made significant strides," he

# Set realistic expectations when housebreaking puppies

Individuals and families who decide to bring new puppies into their homes understand that their lives are bound to change until the new pup acclimates to the household. Many are willing to accept the work involved because of the love and affection their adorable puppy offers.

Arguably one of the most challenging — and often frustrating — components about puppyhood is training the dog to use the outdoors for bathroom needs. It's easy to underestimate the time involved in housebreaking a puppy. The Humane Society of America says puppies typically can control their bladders for one hour for every month of age. That means if the dog is three months old, he can hold it for about three hours.

How often a puppy will need to defecate depends on the food

> being fed and when meals are offered. T h e American Kennel Club says that most puppies will need to poop shortly after meal, a anywhere from 15 minutes to a few hours.

> > Puppies

longer overnight, but probably won't be able to go the entire night without a potty break. Many pups can last around six hours from the last time they've gone out. An early-morning bathroom break will be needed, or consider penning the dog with puppy pads to catch the mess until the dog gains greater control over its bladder.

typically can hold urine a little

The following are some other tips for housebreaking

· Take pups outside immediately in the morning, after naps and after vigorous play.

· Pick up food bowls and water several hours before bedtime. This can prevent accidents by ensuring dogs' stomachs and bladders are not full

overnight.

 Some pups may be hesitant to go outside when the weather is cold, rainy or snowy, so people who live in cold climates may want to wait until the weather warms up to adopt their puppies.

• Err on the side of caution at the start and take the pup outside once every 30 to 60 minutes to establish a system of reward and praise for going outside.

• Contain the pup when you can't provide it with your undivided attention. It only takes a moment for a puppy to wander off and have an accident.

Housebreaking requires extreme patience, routine and practice. Eventually the puppy will gain greater control of its bowels and stop soiling inside the house.

# PETS

# How to choose the right dog collar



New pet parents quickly learn just how many supplies they need to raise happy, healthy animals. Collars and leashes are two essential items dog owners will need. No matter how well-trained a pooch may be, collars and leashes are oftentimes necessary, especially when taking dogs to public places.

In addition to helping keep pets close, collars are a great place to hang identification tags, increasing the likelihood that dogs will be safely returned if they dash off.

There are various types of collars, each offering unique attributes. Choosing a collar involves investigating the key functions collars can serve, and assessing the pros and cons of each.

### FLAT COLLAR

A flat collar is the standard collar used by many

dog owners. Flat collars are typically made from nylon, fabric or leather, and many come with plastic or metal quick-release tabs. Some may have buckles similar to a belt.

Flat collars are useful for many dogs. However, some pet parents find dogs are more apt to pull when wearing flat collars, choking themselves in the process. A properly fit collar shouldn't slide off and should be gentle on the dog's neck.

### MARTINGALE COLLAR

Also known as limited slip collars or greyhound collars, according to the consumer information site The Spruce: Pets, martingale collars are designed primarily for dogs with narrow necks and heads. The martingale will tighten (only to the size of the dog's neck when properly adjusted)

when the dog pulls, so he can't be a collar Houdini. Some people worry that the collar will squeeze too tightly, but proper sizing can prevent that.

### **HEAD COLLAR**

A head collar is reminiscent of a horse's halter, as it slips over the dog's snout and attaches behind the ears. The purpose of head collars is to redirect a dog's attention so pulling is minimal. Some dog's do not like the feeling of a collar on their faces and may resist.

### PRONG COLLARS

Sometimes called pinch collars, prong collars are controversial. Prong collars are made of various links that can be expanded or shortened by "pinching" the links and removing or adding links. When the dog puts tension on the leash, the prongs will add pressure to the neck to help correct pulling, offers the Canine Journal, a pet care resource. Many trainers advise that prong collars should be used only as a training tool and not for extended periods of time as the primary collar. Also, the Humane Society emphasizes that prong collars must be properly fitted with the size of the prong links appropriate for the size of the dog, and it must sit high on the dog's neck. A chain collar works similarly as a pinch collar, in that it also tightens when tension is applied.

### **HARNESS**

Some pet owners like a harness, which puts the pressure on the dog's chest and back instead of its neck. Harnesses come with back clips or front clip attachments to offer control where owners

# This common virus can affect young pups



Juvenile dogs, much like their similarly aged human companions, have immature immune systems that develop over time as they gain more exposure to their environment. Many dogs are immunized against certain harmful bacteria, parasites and viruses that can cause serious illnesses. But exposure to certain viruses may catch new pet parents off guard when their furry friends begin to exhibit symptoms.

Canine oral papilloma virus is a contagious DNA virus that can be spread anywhere dogs interact. It is common at dog parks, daycare facilities, overnight boarding houses, or even among multiple dogs in a household. Transmission is spread through direct contact with an infected dog or through indirect contact from shared toys or communal water bowls, advises the pet health resource Vetstreet.

Oral papillomas, also known as oral warts, are typically small, benign tumors of the mouth caused by the papilloma virus. They can produce white or gray cauliflower-like eruptions on the lips, gums, mouth, and other mucous membranes, advises the Pet Health Network. These papillomas typically affect young dogs under the age of two, as they are more susceptible to the virus due to an underdeveloped immune system. Immunocompromised dogs also may be affected.

A report in The Canadian Veterinary

Journal says the growths can form after a roughly four-week incubation period. The oral lesions are usually mild in most cases and will not produce any discomfort or complications. In most instances, the papillomas will resolve themselves within a one- to two-month

Treatment is not necessary for oral papillomas unless the case is severe and is affecting the animal's ability to eat or drink or if the warts cause a respiratory obstruction. Treatment also may be necessary if the lesions become infected. Because the virus often has a short lifespan with no long-term health consequences, many people do not seek confirmatory testing of the papillomas. Vets can typically perform visual examinations to determine if papillomas are the culprit. It is a good idea to have a vet diagnose papillomas to rule out cancerous lesions.

Once a dog has had the papilloma virus, he or she likely will not get it again, as immunity is established after exposure. The virus is species-specific, so pet parents should not worry about catching it from slobbery kisses. However, owners should keep infected dogs away from other canines for a period of time to prevent spreading the


Papillomas tend to look worse than they typically are, and will usually resolve themselves in due time.

# Pros and cons to pet doors

Pets quickly take up residence in their owners' homes and hearts. Many pet parents treat their pets as full-fledged members of the family, with the same privileges and attention they devote to other family members.

A 2016 Harris Poll found 95 percent of Americans consider their pets to be part of the family, and there is not much they won't do for their companion animals. One area where pet owners may focus their attention is giving their pets more freedom to explore the outdoors. This can be achieved with the installation of a pet door. With busy schedules taking many pet parents away from home, pets may spend many hours home alone. An outdoor retreat could be just what the veterinarian ordered for pets who need more fresh air. Before pet owners install doors for their four-legged friends, it may behoove them to consider the advantages and disadvantages to doing so.

Pet doors can be very convenient for pet owners and pets. Unencumbered bathroom breaks is one

of the prime reasons to get a pet door. Not having to wake up early in the morning or rush home from work to let out a pup can give pet owners more freedom. Cat owners may choose to have their cats soil outdoors, removing the hassle and odor of indoor litter boxes.

A pet door provides a way for pets to regulate when they need to go and not be at the mercy of their human companions. This is handy when training a puppy who cannot hold his bladder for more than a few hours. Avoiding indoor accidents can be a great

reason to install a pet

Pets need exercise and stimulation to alleviate boredom and avoid destructive behaviors. Access to the outdoors promotes physical activity and mental stimulation. Cats may chase bugs or small animals. Dogs

may run around the yard and play with a ball or stick. Easy access to outdoor play can take some of the burden off of busy pet owners.

### Cons

As convenient as pet doors can be, they may disconnect pet owners

from their pets. People may feel they don't need to spend the time in the yard or walking the animal, and that can adversely affect the bonds between pet owner and pet.

Another potential disadvantage concerns alpha-driven pets. Giving pets control over their comings and goings may reinforce ego and potentially cause the animal to be less responsive to his owner's commands.

Safety is another concern. Although there are smart doors that can only open when triggered by a chip on the pet's collar, one never knows what pets may bring indoors. Cats may present dead rodents and dogs may dirty the house with muddy paws.

Weather is another concern. In colder climates, pet doors may be another source of drafts, contributing to inefficient heating and cooling situations.

Dogs or cats who are prone to roaming could get into trouble if left to their own devices out-

Pet owners should consider a host of factors before installing pet doors in their homes.



# How to transition pet food

The food a companion animal is eating today may not be the food he or she consumes in the near future.

Pet owners alter their pets' diets for a variety of reasons. These can include food allergies or intolerances that develop, new formulations that boast health benefits or the cost of food. Food transitions also occur when juvenile pets mature into adults and then require different foods to meet age-related dietary requirements.

Anytime pets owners introduce new foods to their pets, owners should follow a gradual introduction process to minimize the risk of potentially negative reactions, which can include loose stool or stomach upset, according to the pet retailer PetSmart. In addition to taking things slowly, pet owners can employ a few other strategies so pets seamlessly transition to their new diets.

• Choose a similar formulation. PetMD advises pet owners to find foods with similar formulations if existing foods need to be switched due to a recall or if a brand is no lon-



ger carried. That means if you were feeding chicken and rice, look for chicken and rice products when buying new foods. A similar nutritional analysis also can help make the transition go smoothly.

• Opt for a gradual switch. Mixing the old food with the

new food gradually can ease diarrhea or stomach upset. Hill's Pet Nutrition, the maker of Science Diet®, suggests a seven-day transition. On days one and two, make it 75 percent current food with 25 percent new food. On days three and four, serve a 50-50 mix. On days

five and six, the ratio should be 25 percent current food and 75 percent new food. Starting on day seven, serve only new food. Pets with sensitive stomachs may require a transition period that lasts between 10 days and two weeks.

• Consult with a veterinar-

ian. If you are unsure about food choices or want advice about making a switch, talk to your veterinarian. He or she can suggest foods, including some that may be breed- and need-specific.

• Watch for side effects. It can take as long as 12 weeks before you determine if a diet regimen is working. But most companion animals will resume normal digestive function within a few weeks of transitioning to new foods. Avoid new edible toys or food treats during the transition period to isolate potential food reactions to the new food. If vomiting or diarrhea is present and persists, it could be a result of sensitivity to the new food and a vet should be called.

• Use the same technique for wet or dry food switches. When switching from a wet to dry food or vice-versa, adhere to the same gradual transition process.

When transitioning to a new pet diet, adhere to the feeding guidelines on product labels, as portion sizes may need to change depending on differences in nutritional values.

# Shopping for a well-dressed dog



Size, fabric and comfort are important factors when choosing clothing for dogs.

Dog lovers go to great lengths to ensure their pets have everything to keep them healthy, safe and comfortable. Many dog owners extend their love even further to ensure their furry friends put fashionable paws forward.

The American Pet Products Association says that total pet industry expenditures reached more than \$60 billion in 2015, and the spending continues to grow. In fact, pet spending is remarkably resistant to economic downturns, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. While food, grooming, vet care, and more are included in the list of necessary items people buy for their dogs, clothing — a nonessential item — has grown in popularity.

The National Retail Federation

states around 27.7 million Americans dress their furry friends in costumes for Halloween and other holidays. But buying clothes for everyday occasions also has become the norm for many pet parents, as dog apparel does everything from making pooches look fashionable to protecting them from inclement weather. When shopping and dressing dogs, dog owners can consider these tips.

• Be certain of measurements. Measure a dog from neck to tail, as this is how many manufacturers size their apparel. Going by the measurement is more accurate than estimating whether a dog is small, medium or large on breed charts.

• Avoid overbuying for a puppy. Like

children, puppies grow quickly. Those who stocked up on outfits while the dog was very young may find dogs quickly outgrow their wardrobes. Stick to a few items at a time until the dog has stopped growing.

Select machine-washable pieces.
Dogs get dirty and their clothes likely will as well. Look for items that can be put into the washing machine and withstand frequent laundering.
Skip the zippers. Zippers can catch

on fur or skin, making dogs reluctant to wear clothes. Look for buttons, snaps or other closures instead of zippers.

• Choose comfortable fabrics. Breathable cotton can keep dogs comfortable, but it may not be the best insulator or moisture-wicking fabric. Select clothing based on desired use, and choose high-quality materials for comfort and durability.

• Avoid obstructions. Select well-fitting pieces that are neither too tight nor too lose. This way dogs can move around unencumbered and will not trip and fall.

• Keep disposition in mind. Some dogs tolerate clothing well, while others may bite and pull at garments. Do not force dogs to wear something if they're resistant.

Pet clothing can be stylish, make a statement or protect dogs from the elements. Keep comfort, budget and sizing in mind when shopping.

# Get to know your feline friend

Cats are stealth and lovable but somewhat unpredictable. cats will rub up against people to show affection. This trait also serves to mark territory. Cats have scent glands around their faces, paws and tail area.

While cats are thought by many to be aloof and less feeling than dogs, science says otherwise. According to the book "What Cats Are Made Of," by Hanoch Piven, a cat's brain is biologically more similar to a human brain than it is to a dog's. Both humans and cats have identical regions in their brains that are responsible for emotions.

For those worried about a pet getting lost and running away, cats may be preferential com-

panions. That's because cats have an ingrained ability to find their way home known as "psi-traveling." Experts think that cats use the angle of the sun or magnetized cells in their brains to act as internal global positioning systems.

Contrary to popular belief, cats can be trained. Although they're not likely to be as motivated by praise as dogs, cats can respond to food treats — particularly something soft and smelly. However, that may take some practice as, according to Petfinder, cats are less instinctively driven to work in partnership with humans. But those tasty treats may inspire them to stay and come and even use a toilet in lieu of a litter box.

People who welcome cats into their homes can expect a companion for a long time, as cats can live up to 20 years or more.




