Legislators secure \$2M for Northbridge fire department renovation

BOSTON—Senators Michael O. Moore (D-Millbury) and Ryan C. Fattman (R-Webster) filed an amendment that was unanimously adopted by the Senate during a capital bond bill debate that authorizes \$2 million in state funding for renovations to the Rockdale Village Fire Station in the town of Northbridge.

The current station was constructed more than 75 years ago and lacks the ability to adequately serve the needs of the community. The facility is located in a flood plain, possesses deficient structural conditions that do not meet guidelines set forth by the Americans with Disabilities Act, and possesses outdated utilities.

"This important funding will

enhance conditions for our first responders who serve as members of the Northbridge Fire Department," said Senator Moore. "Ultimately, the renovation will assist the Department with providing reliable, timely emergency response to residents of the community.

"I am appreciative of the State Senate moving this important amendment forward," said Senator Fattman. "Ensuring our first responders have the appropriate facilities and resources to ensure public safety is always a top priority."

"On behalf of the Board of Selectmen and the citizens of Northbridge, I want to extend our sincerest appreciation to senators Moore and Fattman for filing the amendment and achieving a giant first step in assisting the town with the replacement of the Rockdale Fire Station." said Northbridge Town Manager Adam Gaudette. "The Rockdale part of town is geographically segregated from the remainder or town that is serviced by the Main Street Fire Station Headquarters. Thus, having an up-to-date facility in Rockdale is an essential part of our town-wide public safety services. With this financial support, it is our hope that in the near future, we will have a modern facility that is a tremendous public safety benefit to our community.

McKenna 'humbled by the people's trust'

WEBSTER Republican Joe McKenna hopes voters will stay the course and send him back to the state House of Representatives in November for a third term.

"I continue to be humbled the people placed their trust in me and never take that trust lightly," he said, noting a challenger "has to show you can do better and that the incumbent deserves to be fired.'

As of this writing, none have taken out papers, but they've only been avallable about 10 days.

If re-election happens, he aims to push for a few bills that have so far been stalled in the Legislature. Chief among them is one specifically aimed at Webster, but which could affect other communities statewide. That's H. 3779, a plan to let residents who get public water but have to install water filtration systems take a

tax rebate for doing so. McKenna said the concept was born from the fact many Webster households have had to do that, to the tune of thousands of dollars, while the town works to build a treat-

ment plant. "This is a consum-er protection piece," he notes, while also praising the town for "doing a very good job with a bad situation." It's likelihood of passage this year is "unfortunately very slim," but he'll refile it next session, he said.

More likely to pass is what he calls the Foster Parents' Bill of Rights (H.104), which he hopes will improve "the level of respect" and information foster parents get from the state.

"They're often treated like a bank where children are deposited and withdrawn," without get-

ting adequate information on the child's health, behavioral and other needs, McKenna said. The state Department of Children and Families has provided "very strong feedback" on this bill. Although the version currently being considered is "significantly watered down from what I filed," McKenna still sees it as a "victory" because it shows there's real interest to taking action.

In a more general sense, McKenna said his goals include implementing the recommendations to reform the distribution of Chapter 70 school funding drafted a couple years ago, and "do more to invest in the schools." Those recommendations point particularly at fixing two key erroneous assumptions on which Chapter 70 has been based since the 1990s - special education funding and health care costs – both of which have risen far faster than expected then.

McKenna isn't favor of fixing the latter by implementing a single-payer system, but would rather leave it

Sen. Moore secures state bond funding for local priorities

BOSTON — Senator Michael Moore (D-Millbury) announced the Senate voted to authorize up to \$3.65 billion in bonds for repairs and improvements of capital facilities across the Commonwealth.

Spending authorizations in the bill include bonds for state university and community college campus improvements, public safety and security facilities, clean programs, and priorities for central Massachusetts.

"This bill will allow the Commonwealth to maintain and improve capital facilities across the state ultimately benefitting local residents," said Senator Moore. "The legislation authorizes investments in sectors that are critical for the continued success of our communities."

The bill authorizes the issuance of bonds for the improvement of capital facilities and for general government operations, including:

· \$6.1 million for public safety improvements in the towns of Auburn, Millbury, Upton

and Shrewsbury; \$4.3 million for engineering, design and construction of commuter parking enhancements between Shrewsbury Street and Grafton Street in the city of Worcester;

· \$1 million for repairs and improvements to the Route 146 pedestrian bridge at the Blackstone Heritage Corridor visitor center in the city of Worcester;

\$4 million to support increased capacity and expan-





They say beauty is in the eve of the beholder and when looking at a home there are typically several views on the value of the home. One price is the value a seller is willing to sell their home for. They may

have what is called emotional equity in the home which causes them to believe the home is worth than a ready, willing and able buyer would pay for the home. They may love the 30 year old carpeting and the newly wallpapered rooms. I am not saying that there are

not buyers that would prefer these features but the majority of buyers are looking for hardwoods or tile floors and painted walls. If the buyers love the home except for those things then they will see the value as lower because they are considering the cost of making the changes to the home to make it work for them. They usually will assume a much higher number than the actual cost of the updates to take on risk of other repairs being needed to be made.

If inventory is low then you may have buyer overlook these features just to get the home so they don't lose it to another buyer. The Real Estate Agent that represents the seller will be pushing to get the value the sellers wants for the home and may even feel the home is closer to the value the seller believes the home to be while the agent representing the buyer will believe it is lower than the sellers agent. This is due to the agents clients many times will influence their opinion of value and they will buy into some of that emotional equity. The best buyer for the home that will pay the most money is the buyer that is similar to the sellers and values the same features and that is why highlighting the features that the seller fell in love with is the best route to go to find the best buyer for the home.

Another value appraised value which is an objective view of the appraisers professional opinion of the home. However, this is based on their opinion so I have seen an appraiser look at the home and give their opinion of value and another appraiser come in a week later with a value that is 10% off of the other appraised value. The challenge is many times the appraiser is only using data of sold homes which shows the past but if you are in an appreciating market then the market value will end up being higher than the appraised value of the home is.

I think most consumers look at the assessed value by the town which is used for tax purposes and is not usually representative of the true market value of the home. You also have websites such as Zillow or Trulia or Redfin which just pull data from the local area for similar homes and come up with a value. If the data is incorrect the value will be incorrect, if your condition is inferior or superior to the similar homes it will be incorrect or if you have homes close to you that are in neighborhood with different values than your neighborhood it will make the value incorrect.





New skills workshops enhance the volunteer experience

A series of workshops designed to enhance the volunteer experience with Blackstone Heritage Corridor, Inc. (BHC), and the Blackstone River Valley National Historical Park (BRVNHP) is bolstering the Volunteers-In-Parks (VIP) program which the two entities co-manage. The VIP Skills Workshop Series launched last fall, and already nearly a dozen workshops have provided unique education and skills training for nearly 200 volunteers, with some of the workshops being made available to the general public.

"Our volunteer program continues to grow and is attracting a wide-range of different interests," explains Megan DiPrete, Executive Director at BHC. "By offering these Skills Workshops, we're able to give volunteers education and training which will enhance their skill sets and their ability to share their knowledge and passion with others when they lead program activities throughout the year."

workshop launched in October with an Enviroscape™ training, which is a table-top model designed to educate people of all ages about how pollutants affect a watershed. The Enviroscape™ can be used in school settings, libraries, community events, and more. VIPs who attended the workshop are now eligible to sign out the EnviroscapeTM model and take it to events to

continue to foster stewardship for the environment. America Recycles Day on November 15 was celebrated with a public-offered Skills Workshop at Casella Waste Systems in Auburn. People from all over the National Heritage Corridor were provided a behind-thescenes experience and now have additional tools to teach others to be better recyclers.

In December, VIPs received a behind-the-scenes tour at the Ladd Observatory in Providence, RI, to learn how to read the night sky and learn the history of the telescopes housed at the centuriesobservatory managed Brown University. Also in December, BHC offered a free sewing workshop, giving instruction on how to make a repurposed tote bag made from plastic seed and feed bags. The latter skills workshop was open to the public and was held at the new Blackstone Valley Education Hub at the Linwood Mill in Whitinsville.

In January, BRVNHP Ranger Joshua Boles offered an opento-the-public oral history skills workshop at the Little Red Shop Museum in Hopedale, so participants could learn new skills on how to best interview people to capture important history.

CPR and First Aid training was offered to volunteers of BHC's Bikeway and Trail Ambassadors, as well as the Blackstone Valley Paddle Club

in February, followed by opento-the-public training on Maple Sugaring at Blackstone River & Canal Heritage State Park in Uxbridge. These volunteers will put their skills training to immediate use by providing assistance to MA DCR staff at the upcoming Maple Sugar Days event at the Park March 3 and 4.

In March, a Visitor Services Skills Workshop is being provided by BRVNHP Ranger Joshua Boles, and later in the month VIPs will have an opportunity to learn about Cemetery Conservation Skills. This training opportunity is being offered by VIPs Betty and Carlo Mencucci at the Burrillville Historical and Preservation Society. The Mencuccis are professional gravestone conservators and members of the Association of Gravestone Studies and the Burrillville Historical Society. The workshop will be open-to-the-public and will provide training on the proper method of conserving gravestones. Participants will learn about various stone types as well as different techniques and materials used in the conservation process. The training precedes Cemetery Awareness/Preservation Day in Rhode Island on April 14th and the Mencuccis and other historical groups will be hosting volunteer cemetery restoration events at which these skills and knowledge can

be put to use.

BHC partnered with All Out Adventures in October, 2017, to present an assisted bicycle ride for VIP Margaret Carrollof Millville, MA, and this skills workshop will prepare the Bikeway Ambassadors for future events in the National Heritage Corridor.

Summer career investigation program hosts 51 students

Northbridge High School hosted its seventh annual Summer Career Investigation Program over the course of three weeks. Students had the option to choose from broadcast, art, engineering, community service, photography, forensics, and law.

SCIP coordinator, Susan Palmer-Howes said, "I am very pleased that we were happy to run this again this year. It almost didn't run due to the grant no longer being available. School Committee found the funds. It's extremely beneficial for the students. The turnout is incredible and the kids really enjoy it. I hope we can continue to run it."

Fifty-one soon-to-be eighth and ninth grade students signed up for one or more courses. The courses were free.

Phil Anderson ran three courses – engineering, photography and broadcast with photography. The first week students Anderson and Elizabeth Wermuth taught students how to run scientific tests on bicycles. They were able to hypothesize about speed and handling based on picking different bicycle parts from knobby tires or slick tires and the height of the seat. Students then tested their hypotheses with the bikes they built. They also analyzed packaging and how to fit the bike parts into the box to reduce material cost and lower the price of the bikes overall.

Jenny Chauvin, grade 9, said, "my favorite part was running tests on the bikes and collecting the data."

The second week Anderson taught students how to use photoshoot and green-screen techniques in photography. They also worked on studio shooting and lighting, painting with light and high speed photography.

Krista-Lyn Hall, grade 8, stated, "I loved learning how to work cameras, learning how to draw with light and working with fast motion."

Deb Herbert ran two courses – broadcast and broadcast with photography. The second week she taught students how to use cameras. The students created two videos. One was about the

Sarah Wildfuer, grade 8 said, "I didn't know I liked broadcasting until this program."

Sara Bedigian, said, "It was nice having unlimited ideas to do and having your videos come to life." Herbert and Anderson taught the photography with broadcast course where they combined photography with still skills. The students had to create original storyboards then they picked one to shoot and edit.

Herbert said, "I am always shocked at how creative students can be. Their ideas amaze me. It's great to see their ideas come to fruition and how dedicated they are to making it great especially in such a short time. They love hands on skills and enjoy active learning."

Emma Laydon, grade 8, said she liked, "seeing how it all comes together

into a clip. I really enjoyed learning about angles and getting the right angle for the shot."

Jennifer Mulkerrin taught one week of art. She introduced four different mediums to the students – observational with poses, soft pastel with nectarines, watercolor with trees to work on layering and blending. The students then had to create an original tunnel-book where they picked their own background, midground and foreground. They created either scenes or stories or designs. Mulkerrin said, she loved seeing, "creative processes without using a rubric. They got to do what they wanted and I could help them and they had freedom."

Sophia Swartz, grade 9, said that she loved "experimenting with styles I don't usually do."

Emma LaChapelle, grade 9, loved "learning new techniques. The oil pastels were my favorite."

Ansha Khan, grade 8, said she loved, "using watercolors to make unique art. I love that there is nothing wrong in art. You just have to make it better."

Shaylanni Green, grade 9, echoed, "I loved working with different materials but my favorite part were the conte crayons."

Robin Laurens taught two weeks of forensics & law with Alan Finkel. The students in this course were there both weeks. First, Finkel instructed them on basic law. He taught them what their rights were as citizens and the legal system process as well as they roles of all people involved in the criminal justice system from police officers to DAs etc. He also went over how forensics is applied to law. In addition, students were exposed to what it would be like to be arrested and go through the entire process. And finally, he also made sure to make it applicable to how the law applies to teens' lives. Laurens constructed a mock murder crime scene where she gave the students three suspects. Students had to process the crime scene from collecting evidence and analyzing the scene to analyzing evidence from the three suspects. She focused on different techniques from fingerprinting to ink chromatography to blood typing & analysis as well as DNA electrophoresis. The students then had to Laurens stated, "the best part for me was getting to expose students to the type of science and lab work that we do at the high school. I love meeting future students in a small setting and getting them excited to come here."

Donna Ross, grade 9, "my favorite part was testing our own blood to see what type I was. It was exciting to be able to find the actual suspect of the crime and be correct. Fingerprinting was fun because you can see exactly how they do it for real crime scenes."

Patrick Nolan, grade 9, favorite part was the law part made it seem like it'd be a good career and it was fun investigating."

Samantha Souvanna, grade 9, "the blood typing was interesting because we got to see how the blood clumped and how it didn't. We are still working on figuring out who did it but we have a lot of evidence against him."

Celia Walker, grade 8, said, "my favorite part was doing all of the analysis because I hadn't done anything like that before. I really enjoyed learning about the ridiculous lawsuits Mr. Finkel taught us about."

The final course was co-run for two weeks by Sherri Travers and Stephanie Bentley and was called community service. The students' time was split between working in the community garden at the high school and the new NHS Food Pantry. The students were able to weed the entire garden and staked & caged tomato plants. They also planted lettuce. They also treated plants for pests as well as put up fencing and tin pans to keep deer away. The garden focuses on trying to eradicate hunger in the community by teaching students about sustainable gardening. All food gets donated to the in town food pantry. Last summer they were able to supply the food pantry with 4,000 pounds of fresh vegetables. Students harvested cucumbers, summer squash and peppers.

Allison Ronan, grade 9, said, "it was fun helping the community knowing it will help someone eventually."

Donna Ross, grade 9, "it was more fun than I thought it would be but the hardest part was finding the irrigation tube." Patrick Gahan, grade 9, "I learned that I enjoy gardening."

learned that I enjoy gardening."


Travers said, "the students were incredibly awesome. Avoiding the irrigation was difficult. They totally embraced everything I asked them to do. We worked around torrential downpours and got a tremendous amount of work done in three days. They worked really well today. They were collaborating in groups of 2-3 and there was no task that they were afraid of tackling."

In the food pantry, students organized food into categories. Roughly \$5,000 worth of food was donated to the pantry. Then each category needed to have expiration dates placed on each item. After, the items needed to be shelved. Finally, the room needed to be set up and decorated with labels.

Melanie Warner, grade 9, said "the hardest part of the food pantry was how heavy the boxes were."

Patrick Gahan, grade 9, "it made me realize I was doing good for the community. My favorite part was planting lettuce seeds."



Editorial

All you need is...

It's two days after Valentine's Day, and the week of Presidents' Day. We honor both George Washington and Abraham Lincoln in a single holiday; keeping it to a Monday holiday for the sake of workers and school children, but at least we do still remember two of the presidents who made huge marks on American history.

Washington was the first duly elected president, he didn't really want it, but felt he was honor bound to take the office because someone needed to guide the fledgling country into being. He had helped create the atmosphere for the Revolution, he had helped draft the new laws taking shape to create the country, the baby constitution was still barely taking steps and a lot of people were already trying to dismantle it, saying the whole idea just wasn't going

He had a lot of support, he had been a war hero in several wars, not just the revolution but the earlier scrimmages with the French too. And he was well liked by politicians, military people, and even the not so well known but able to vote bourgeois. He helped keep the country going those first few years, and the grand experiment was held together to take a few more steps under a new regime, changing hands without revolution or rancor just as it was meant to.

Lincoln stepped into a minefield not of his making. Nor was he comfortable with much of his own presidency. There are multiple biographies of the man, who describe him as "conflicted" and "ambiguous" about the questions that ultimately took the country into its civil war. He wasn't necessarily anti-slavery; nor was he pro-slavery. He was hoping for some sort of compromise. But when that didn't look promising, he chose. And he backed it up. Then he made every effort to reunite the country in some manner

He didn't want the war; but he supported his troops and his men. He quietly wrote about the losses, to both sides in the conflict, and reminded others that they were fighting "ourselves."

His work, though unfinished, kept a presidency alive through a difficult time, and moved it thorough what could have been the end of the entire country as we now know it. We could have been two countries, perhaps even more, had the fight among ourselves gone much differently or the pieces reunited been done so in a different manner.


Then of course, we have Martin Luther King Day and the entire month paying homage to a people who for many years were less important in our history. Not because they didn't do valuable work, but because their work wasn't valued. That has changed, or is changing rather, because it isn't finished. And while we might choose to honor Black History Month, what about Asian History Month? Or Scandinavian History Month? Or Indian History Month? Or Icelandic History Month? Or Australian History Month? Or Uruguayan History Month?

See, we have a habit of over reaching. We bend over too far in attempting to right wrongs sometimes. Yes, people were ignored when they shouldn't have been; text books and histories and television shows were way too narrow in showing diversity for way too long, and still are. But we can't fix that with a single fix. We can't say, 'here, we'll celebrate everybody's everything for one week this week and another next week and there, everybody's recognized.'

Let's celebrate real accomplishments by real people no matter who they are. When someone does something...good! Hurray! We don't care if you are purple!

Let's not rewrite all the books, some of them very good books; or put movies out of circulation, very good movies; because someone somewhere isn't well represented. That isn't real life.

It isn't always going to be entirely fair; or righteous. But we can celebrate the goodness. And admire the ones who we missed when we weren't aware.

Most people are aware that there are advertising collectors who specialize in large national companies like Coca Cola. There are many advertising items from factories, stores, farms and other local businesses that also have collector value.

I discussed Worcester breweries in a February 2017 column and will just touch upon beer advertising here. Bowler WAYNE TUISKULA Company. Fanning became Bros., Brockert and Worcester

Brewing Company were some of the larger breweries in Worcester. Oldbreweries. com lists some lesser known Worcester breweries including Gindele & Reuther Brewing Co., N. Brewery Hines John McNamara

Brewery, S. B. Thomas Hotel & Brewerv and Geo. Warren Webster Brewery.

Advertising memorabilia from local breweries is popular with both local memorabilia collectors and those who collect all types of breweriana. Even though Bowler Brothers celluloid (old form of plastic) and metal matchsafes aren't uncommon, they can sell for over \$100 in nice condition. Tadcaster Beer trays by Worcester Brewing Company often sell for \$100 or more. We recently sold a Worcester Brewing company keg that brought over \$125 at auction.

White and Bagley began producing Oilzum motor oil in 1888 in Worcester. The Oilzum logo picturing a driver with goggles is very popular with automobile memorabilia collectors. "Oilzum Motor Oils Lubricants" is written across the driver's cap. A later version of that logo features the driver inserted in a wedge design. Prior to the driver with goggles, Oilzum used "Bucky" "the bucked tooth kid" as an advertising character. You can sometimes find Cleanzum hand cleaner tins by Oilzum for under \$25. Older oil cans, in fine condition, typical-

lars. There are many reproduction signs, but if you have an original, it should also sell for three figures. An Oilzum curb sign (shaped like a lollipop on a base) can bring thousands of dollars.

The Worcester Hoop Skirt Company was founded by David Hale Fanning in Worcester in 1861, according to the Metropolitan Museum of Art website. The company shifted production in 1872 and became the Worcester Corset president in 1888 when the com-

pany went public. The company was renamed to the Royal Worcester Corset Company in 1901. Paper ads promoting "Queen Bess' and "Bon Ton" corsets are fairly common and typically sell in the \$20 range.

An original Royal Worcester corset in excellent condition can sell in the low hundreds. As I write this column, there is a Royal Worcester corset advertising poster for sale priced at \$900 online.

Table Talk Bakery still sells pies in Worcester, but Town Talk Bread is no longer in business. The Worcester Historical Museum website states that Town Talk was in business from 1912 to 1973. Town Talk employed 125 people in Worcester and 50 in Dedham after World War II. A search of past auction records shows some signs selling for \$75. The highest sold for \$550, which is quite a bit of dough.

\$400 thousand for accessibility improvements at the Upton Town Beach and athletic complex;

\$825 thousand for renovations and accessibility improvements in the town

of Leicester: \$1.6 million for upgrades to the wastewater pumping station in the

town of Grafton; \$680 million for general state facility improvements;

\$675 million for trial court facility improvements;

\$500 million for public safety and security facilities;

\$475 million for state university and community college campus improve-

\$475 million for the University of Massachusetts system campus improve-

\$193.4 million for a municipal facility improvement grant program;

· \$150 million for the Accelerated Energy and Resiliency program, which develops and implements energy and water savings projects statewide;

\$85 million for the Clean Energy Investment Program to improve the energy efficiency of state-owned facil-

The bill also increases previous spending authorizations for University of Massachusetts, state universities and community colleges campus facilities.



We spent many nights at the Douglas State Forest running our dogs at Bear Swamp, and at what was called the "old pine tree " on the old Thompson Road in Douglas.

Listening to the hounds baying as they trailed the hare was indeed the most enjoyable and exciting time of our lives, which has left me and my buddies with many great memo-

The Beagle Club purchased a large tract of land for unpaid taxes back in the '60s and it is still being maintained by a group of local sportsmen,

however the beagles are now absent from the clubs running of snowshoe hare, due in part to the elimination of snowshoe hare being imported to Massachusetts. Antihunting groups voiced strong opposition to the importation of hare into Massachusetts and succeeded in stopping the annual stocking of hare called "Operation Snowshoe"! Because of new predators like fisher cat, bobcat, and coyotes it is unlikely many hare would have survived today in local

With all of the complaints

of coyotes killing residents' pets, and attacking a couple of young children recently (which is extremely rare) a group of sportsmen decided to hold a contest for the largest coyote harvested in the area, hoping to eliminate the threat. It did not take long for a couple of anti-hunting groups to oppose the event. SAD!!!!

Improving Auburn girls' co-op bockey team salvages tie with Framingham

AUBURN — Junior forward Amalia Monson scored twice, including a goal with 26 seconds left in regulation, to secure a 2-2 tie for the Auburn High girls' varsity co-op hockey team which also includes student-athletes from Shepherd Hill Regional, Tantasqua Regional, Oxford High, Douglas High, Grafton High, Holy Name High and Notre Dame Academy — against Framingham High on Monday, Feb. 5 at the Horgan Arena.

Time was counting down and the Rockets were a goal behind despite their immense effort in the third period to stay in the game. With less than a minute left, the Rockets continued their aggressive play, looking for the

'We knew we needed to win, I just pressed on them to come out and work hard. We had two lackluster first two periods where we let them outshoot us and beat us, so I told them that we had to come out strong in the third period and they did," said Auburn head coach Peter LaPrad. "They came out strong and saw an opportunity, popped a couple in, which is good.'

There was under 30 seconds left in regulation and, after passing the puck into Framingham's defensive zone, Auburn senior forward Carrianne Fortier slapped a shot that was padded out by Framingham goalie Hailey Vandelstyn, but junior captain Julia Siemen rocketed another shot off the rebound that was blocked once again by Vandelstyn. From there, Monson cleaned up the rebound and put the puck into the back of the net to tie it with 26.7 seconds left in the game.

Both of Monson's goals came in the third period.

Throughout the whole duration of the contest, Auburn's defense was its strength despite the two goals allowed. Due to their good defense and superb goaltending by senior captain Colleen

Fellows, the Rockets were able to be in the position they were in late in the

"That is a focus of ours," explained LaPrad. "I run this team from the back end out, strong defense, good goaltending and then up to the forwards, so it is critical for us, we work on it a lot. It is our focus. Our focus is to be defensive mined, have them quarterback the play and they do a good job of it and they did again tonight.

Throughout the course of the season Auburn has had its struggles, but has grown immensely and it is starting to show with their recent play.

"We are maturing, it is funny we have a lot of seniors on the team, but we also have a lot of young players and the young players are active. They are out there getting game time and I think they're starting to mature a little bit," LaPrad stated. "When they start out, the young players are not used to the pace of play because they're so young and they have that four-year span in high school, so I think they're getting a little used to it and starting to get over the butterflies, starting to mature a little bit."

With the season winding down for the 3-8-3 Rockets, they have goals they want to hit before the end of the year.

"We have six games left; I would love to see us win all six of them. One or two of them are against tough opponents and in those games I just hope that they go out there and do as good as they can,' LaPrad expressed with a lot of hope. "We would like to get at least three or four more wins on the season, that would be our goal."

Kaeller impressive as Spartans beat Auburn, clinch tournament berths

AUBURN — Back on Jan. 27, the Auburn High boys' varsity basketball team got the better of Uxbridge High, 55-51. But the Spartans exacted some revenge in the rematch played Thursday, Feb. 8, as they led from start to finish en route to a 50-26 victory.

"They [Auburn] played well and they deserved to win that game, but for us to come back tonight and a little revenge...I couldn't be prouder of the kids," said first-year Uxbridge head coach Ryan Hippert, a 2007 UHS graduate. "They played with great defensive intensity. Our goal is to make it tough for them to get into their offense.'

But that wasn't the only positive to come out that day for the Spartans. Hours before they learned that they had clinched a berth in the upcoming Clark Tournament. Then, following the win against the Rockets, Uxbridge improved to 10-6 to punch their ticket into the Central Mass. Division 3 sectional tournament. Their record inside the Southern Worcester County League (SWCL) also improved to 8-1, which is officially good enough to clinch the SWCL B Division title.

"We want to be playing our best basketball at the end of the year," said Hippert, who believes that the Spartans are doing just that.

"We're all excited, but we're ready to keep it rolling," added senior Scott Kaeller, who had a monster game versus Auburn. "We're not done yet, not even close.'

Kaeller nearly outscored the Rockets, finishing with 25 points to Auburn's 26. Kaeller also pulled down 5 rebounds, which tied for a team-high total with junior Andrew Goyette.

'He's been having a great year for us," Hippert said of Kaeller. "He's a tough football kid."

Kaeller was involved in what may have been a backbreaking play for the Rockets late in the first half. Auburn senior Craigon Confer (a team-high eight points) made a pair of free throws with 3.6 seconds to play until halftime to trim Uxbridge's lead down to 26-15. But the heady Spartans made the most of their available time as junior Tyler Tedford made the inbounds pass to junior Harrison Mansfield, who found a streaking Kaeller down the court. Kaeller then finished a layup as the buzzer sounded to send Uxbridge into the locker room ahead, 28-15.

'I think that was just on their own being athletes," Hippert said of the play, which was not drawn up. "That was a big play at the time and it gave us a little momentum going into the locker room.'

"Harrison and I just made eye contact, I was sprinting right next to him," added Kaeller. "I got a little ahead of him and [he made a] bounce pass and kept going."

Kaeller then scored the first two baskets of the third quarter as the Spartans surged ahead, 32-15, and they led by 20 points, 41-21, heading into the final

Uxbridge then won fourth quarter scoring, 9-5, to account for the 50-26 final.

Kaeller was especially proud of his team's defensive performance.

"It's been our focus all year. Sometimes it's been up, sometimes it's been down, but the past couple of games the intensity has been there from start to finish," he mentioned.

The Spartans will finish up regular season play before entering the Clark Tournament as the No. 8 seed in the Small Schools bracket. They are scheduled to play top-ranked Maynard High on Sunday, Feb. 18 at 7:45 p.m.

Meanwhile, the loss dropped Auburn's record down to 8-10. Andrew Niedzwiecki, head coach of the Rockets, commented on the loss, noting, "obviously missing Tyler hurts us offensively. He's our leading scorer and it's more than just the points. It's a senior leader – when you lose that it hurts. It messes up our rotation."

Niedzwiecki was speaking of Tyler Judice, who went down with an injury in the previous game and is now out for the season. With Judice gone, the Rockets are down to just seven players who began the season on the varsity roster.

"We didn't seem like ourselves," said Niedzwiecki.

Auburn's day was salvaged, though, as they found out they will also be taking part in the Clark Tournament as the final seed to be included. They are the No. 8 seed in the Large Schools bracket and will play No. 1 Quabbin Regional on Monday, Feb. 19 at 7:45 p.m.

"We're excited about the Clark... we've had a successful year, but our goal is to get to the districts," said Niedzwiecki.

To do so, the Rockets must win their last two games for seeding, versus Oxford High and then versus Quabbin at the Clark. Auburn also has a game with Tewksbury High sandwiched in between the Oxford and Quabbin contests, but it is an endowment game and does not count toward the team's win-

Spartans' Hicks shines with 26 points, but Uxbridge drops decision to Pioneers

SOUTHBRIDGE — On a night when Southbridge High senior Julitza Delgado registered the 1,000th point of her career with 5:05 to play in the opening quarter versus Uxbridge High on Tuesday, Feb. 6, it appeared as if Spartans' junior Olivia Hicks had the chance to steal the show with her performance on the parquet.

Hicks had scored 17 of her team's 19 points at the halftime break — Uxbridge trailed, 23-19 — and opened second half scoring with a 3-pointer to cut the deficit down to one point, 23-22. In all Hicks scored 26 points, including 21 straight for her team at one point, but the depleted Spartans' bench wore out late as the Pioneers won the game, 67-34.

"You can see how short my bench is," said Uxbridge head coach Tracy Larkin, whose team dressed just nine players. "I have 11 and two are out ill. And I have three that have never played

In regard to Hicks, Larkin said, "Olivia is a great ball player — she's a great athlete — but she runs out of gas. She's tired.'

After Hicks' 3-pointer dropped early in the third quarter, the Pioneers (5-13) ended the game on a 44-12 run. Delgado led the way with 24 points and 11 rebounds, while three of her teammate

 Ashanti Morales, Mya Torres and Kailey Ortiz — also scored in double figures. Morales tallied 16 points, Torres totaled 13 points and 14 rebounds, and Ortiz registered 12 points.

For Uxbridge, Ashley Dube (5 points), Maggie Streichert (2 points, 11 rebounds) and Sarah Johnston (1 point) also scored, but Hicks — who also pulled down 7 rebounds — was responsible for 76 percent of the Spartans' points (she knocked down three 3-pointers, five two-point baskets and seven free throws), which Larkin admitted was too much considering that it's a team game.

Larkin was proud of the way her team competed throughout the contest, though, which they have done all season long as their record slipped to 4-13.

"I can't say it's been a tough season [despite the record]. At the start of the season my goals were to help these kids learn how to play ball and to not quit in any game. They have not quit in any game," she said.

in the private sector and "incentivize employees to use employ-er-provided plans if they're competitive with MassHealth." As it is now, he argues, the system requires employers to pay a \$750 fee for each employee who's offered health insurance, but opts to go to MassHealth instead. In recent years, he added, private plans have lost about 450,000 people, while MassHealth has grown by about 500,000.

Health costs are also hitting people directly, particularly people who are "aging in their homes and



shifting the type of care seniors are receiving," he noted. A recent bill the Legislature passed to expand Alzheimer's research might help

McKenna said he also supported the governor's proposal to require 72-hour emergency hospitalization of opioid overdoses; To him, that "may get them to the point someone is sober long enough to see they need to take further action," although he acknowledges they'd need far more time to actually get off the drugs. A big part of the problem, McKenna said, is that big pharma has promoted opioids for "pain management" over the last 10-15 years when "addictive substances shouldn't be the first course of action." He notes "a significant burden should lie with the manufacturers" to end the problem.

another area that's hitting towns hard – infrastructure – McKenna said he believes Massachusetts "can go greater and should go greater" when it comes to funding Chapter 90, the state disbursement of money for road maintenance. He notes Gov. Charlie Baker added money his predecessor Deval Patrick had embargoed, upping annual funding to \$200-\$300 million. But McKenna also agrees that's not enough to address the actual repair backlog the towns have, although he's not sure how to fix the problem.

The \$40 billion state budget, he said, has "gone away from core services and funds special interests.' He won't specify which special interests he'd cut, because he said he sees them as often deserving support, but the "core services need more money.

Looking forward, the state's going to have to balance those issues with big picture concerns like climate change. To McKenna, the ongoing efforts embodied in the Green Communities Act and the governor's Community Compact to help fund towns' pursuit of energy efficiency and related preparations have been good ways to "achieve efficiencies within local budgets.' But he's concerned about some of the bills that aim for zero carbon emissions.

"Setting goals is laudable, but I'm hesitant to sacrifice efficiencies today for a perfect solution," McKenna said. As an example, he pointed to an increase in energy from oil and coal sparked in part by lack of natural gas to meet the demand; to him, gas is "the most cost effective at this point" and can be a "transition" fuel. When rates rise, it tends to "hurt the low-income, elderly and those on fixed incomes."

Regarding a couple of ballot issues, McKenna said he opposes the "Millionaire's Tax" which is on this year's ballot, arguing it could drive high-income folks to nearby states with lower taxes. He also opposed the way the marijuana legalization question was phrased in 2016, but not the concept of legalization itself. He said he likes the changes the Legislature approved last summer, although he predicted "hurdles to get [to a viable pot industry] and some growing pains along the way." He did, however, predict Massachusetts will see a commercial pot industry, but it's "a number of years away" and requires clarity at the national level.

McKenna has a background in economics and finance from Bentley University, which he said 'informs a lot of policy making.'

He's engaged to be married in October.

of marketing...you can become

bankrupt or rich easily."

Fuchs stressed a variety of things during his presentation such as doing their own research, diversification in their portfolio, and only buying stocks based on things they know. He also stressed that the words "this time is different" are incredibly dangerous when dealing with the markets.

Since part of the 1929 crash had to do with banking, Fuchs also spent time going over how banks work and what they do with students' money as well as what it means to be FDIC

insured. He then went into how to invest, where to go, who to talk to as well as different types of stocks to invest in such as retail, energy, medical, ETFs etc.

Fuchs said, "Investing is a long game. The 'NHS Stock Market Game' is an excellent way for students to grasp an understanding of how investing works and can be illustrative of how one or two bad investment choices can throwoff one's overall results. It creates interest and excitement, both great things. Using a 5-8 week time frame works well for a game, but is really not a suitable horizon for measuring real-life returns. Generally, funds that an individual needs for some specific purpose use in the next 6 months to three years should not be invested in the stock markets."

He added afterwards, "I was very impressed with the interest level of the NHS students on topics related to investing. I really did not know what to expect from groups of 16-17 year-olds. The students seemed engaged and were paying close attention to every sub-topic. Some had done research on related topics, perhaps for some other classes or projects, and seemed to have a fairly sophisticated knowledge of areas such as stock market bubbles and differentiating between what constitutes saving vs. investing. They had

a good understanding of the mechanics of banking and the hows and whys of The Great Depression. I presumed that much of their corporate knowledge would be in the areas of retail (Coke, Pepsi, Walmart, Kohl's, Verizon, etc.) since that is where people are bombarded by advertising. But I was impressed when they asked questions about more varied areas such as Bitcoin, technology into the future, biotechnology, etc. Before the bell rang, the students had obviously put some thinking into investing and its intricacies.

The competition started January 9 and ran until February 15. In the competition, each student is given

\$1,000,000 (fake) to invest in the real stock market. Currently, one student is up \$107,000, and 82% of juniors are in the black. Fuchs and several teachers have joined the competition to provide more incentive for students to want to win. Fuchs is in 34th place.

Fuchs was a CFO for three different hedge funds, however he started as an accountant for Ernst & Young after graduating from UMass Amherst in 1977. Also in his career, he also served as senior vice-president of the financial division of Fleet Bank (which later became Bank America). Fuchs is retired now and has turned to ranching in upstate New York.
