Conservation in action

STURBRIDGE - People from all over the nation come to Sturbridge.

That's not news; they've been drawn to Old Sturbridge Village for decades. Last weekend, though, a crew of young people from as far away as Alaska came to town to work. For free.

They were members of the Student Conservation Corps, an Americorpsaffiliated organization that travels the nation doing environmental projects. In this case, the 23 members were working on expanding the Leadmine Mountain trail network south of OSV, specifically by building the new Ledges Trail and extending Sand Hill Trail.

According to Alaska resident Steven Taylor, SCA members received five months of environmental education before being sent out on five months of trail or other work. He has already graduated college, but some of his peers are taking a "gap year" during college or between high school and

group," said Zack Friedman of Baltimore. 'Everybody's living in one big cabin. We cook together and do chores together."

His trail-building partner, Ella Stack of

Nashville, agreed, noting they've done various things during their year, from farm work to trail construction.

"Sturbridge has a great network of trails, and it seems the community is really involved in making and designing them here in a way they're usually not in other places," she said.

They were working within sight (albeit through trees) of Hamant Brook. In December, the town and American Rivers collaborated to remove three roughly 100-year-old mill dams along the brook, emptying two of the three ponds. The southernmost one remains in a natural depression,

but isn't as deep or as large as it was. Sturbridge Tree Warden Thomas Chamberland said the work included planting dozens of saplings, each protected from browsers by small fences. He noted it will take some time for the brook to find its own channel through the now-dry and grassy

According to the American Rivers page n the project, the goal was to restore "hab-"We've definitely become a tight-knit itat for native brook trout, wood turtles and mussels." It dubbed the Hamant dams "deadbeat dams," in the sense that "they no longer serve a purpose. They're choking our

STURBRIDGE - For several years Wally Connor worked hard to build support for his former local charitable organization. Fueled by a passion to increase the number of children assisted by his community fundraising efforts, Connor worked equally hard over the last two years to start a brand new organization.

Previously known as Socks for Siberia, the organization has been restructured and is now called Supporting Orphans Nationally and Globally (SONG). But even though the name has changed, the organization continues to see the same strong support from residents and business owners. At one of SONG's first major community fundraising

events of the year, residents came out in large numbers for a June 9 music festival at Hyland Orchards.

The event included food, vendors, raffles, kids' activities, farm animals, and live music. The Otters band, which has supported Connor and his organization countless times in the past, was once again front and center at the event. Other bands included The Gypsy Cowboys and Frankenphil.

Sturbridge under mandatory water ban

To meet the town's Water Management time, the following water use restrictors permit # 9P2-2-09-287 01 (Quinebaug tions shall be in effect and enforced to River Basin) issued by MassDEP, the Sturbridge Water Department has been required by MassDEP to enter into a voluntary water ban when the Quinebaug River flow rate at the USGS Quinebaug River gauge station near Southbridge #01123600 falls below 87 cubic feet per second (cfs) for three consecutive days between May 1 and June 30 and below 37 cfs between July 1 and September 30.

The rules apply from May 1 through September 30. When the flow rate falls below the trigger condition during that comply with the town's. Once implemented, the restrictions shall remain in effect until stream flow at the gauge meets or exceeds the trigger for seven consecutive days.

Non-essential outside water use is not allowed, except that sprinklers may be used for lawn watering outside of the hours of 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. one day a week.

Non-essential water use is defined as water use that is not required: (a) for health or safety reasons, (b) by regula-

Opacum Land Trust is once again partnering with Rapscallion Brewery and Hyland Orchard of Sturbridge, and Southbridge Bicycle for our second annual Bike Ride for Land Conservation, scheduled Sunday, July 8 in Sturbridge.

The Ride brings cyclists through the heart of Opacum's service area including Sturbridge, Brimfield, Brookfield, Monson and surrounding towns in south-central Massachusetts. Bike enthusiasts will be challenged by our hilly 100 mile ride while others can choose a route in keeping with their ability, including 50 and 25 mile loops, and a family-friendly 7.5 mile ride that makes the day a win for everyone! All proceeds from this ride will go to support the land conservation work of Opacum Land Trust – helping to protect the beautiful character of our communities.

Registration for all routes is online at BikeReg.com, with the proceeds from

the \$50 registration fee going to support Opacum Land Trust. Rest stops with food and water are available, and a SAG vehicle will be on hand for emergency assistance. surrounding the pavilion, soaking up the sun. The venue also offers a full 18-hole Disc Golf Course.

Rapscallion will again brew a special "Opacum Ale" for the occasion – celebrating the land trust's namesake, Ambystoma Opacum, the blue marbled salamander, a rare and threatened species that inhabits this region. A portion of the sales of the beer will be donated to the organization.

Opacum's Executive Director Ed Hood is pleased to announce that Southbridge Credit Union is the lead sponsor for TourOpacum, demonstrating their commitment to the character of the communities that Opacum Land Trust serves. The Sturbridge Tourist Association has also made a substantial commitment supporting TourOpacum, including funding to support digital marketing efforts that will bring riders to the Sturbridge area.

"After a successful first year with 91 riders, we hope to more than double participation in 2018 with the help of the expanded marketing impact that our relationships with Southbridge Credit Union and the Sturbridge Tourism Association will provide," says Hood.

Hood is also excited to have Rapscallion Brewery's enthusiastic and generous support for this event. With its central location in Opacum's service area, the very important feature of local craft beer, and its commitment to helping grow TourOpacum, Rapscallion is an ideal partner for the event. Hood is particularly grateful for the guidance and technical support of Jon Steppic, owner and manager of Southbridge Bicycles, and himself an avid bike rider. Southbridge Bicycles will provide a "SAG Wagon" - a vehicle equipped to assist riders who have mechanical failures during the ride.

Based in Sturbridge, Opacum Land Trust is a not-for-profit 501(c)3 organization lead by a volunteer board of directors. Opacum cares for 1,992 acres of conservation land in its 13-town ser-

vice area, stretching from Monson to Charlton and Southbridge North Brookfield. Proceeds from the first TourOpacum in 2017 were used to help purchase a 76-acre forested parcel on Monson Road in Brimfield known as Dingley Dell, which Opacum will open to the public as The Clayton and Margaret Thomas Nature Preserve. This property contains a waterfall, a natural spring, a spectacular 25ft

high boulder, and

is adjacent to the Hemlock Gorge section of Brimfield State Forest.

In 2017 Opacum Land Trust also conserved 57 acres of "Stillmeadow Farm" in Monson, belonging to Nancy Clark, her daughter Laura Rogers and her son-in-law Eric Rogers, and 125 acres of land in Charlton belonging to Richard Kisten. Opacum's other public properties include Opacum Woods in Sturbridge, The Claire Birtz Sanctuary and the Thompson Family preserve in Southbridge, and the Flynt Quarry Lands in Monson. These four beautiful properties have trails for public hiking.

Gobi secures reimbursement for regional school transportation

BOSTON - Senator Anne Gobi (D-Spencer) has announced a unanimous vote by the Massachusetts Senate to increase regional school transportation reimbursement funding during Tuesday's budget debate. The amendment, filed by Senator Gobi, raises the reimbursement rate to 80 percent of full funding, at a total of \$68,878,679 - a \$7,357,679 increase over FY18 funding.

"This 80% reimbursement is a positive step towards the 100% promised by the state when schools were encouraged to regionalize," said Senator Gobi. "There are 107,000 students in 170 regional schools across the state and this funding helps to assure they receive other critical services.

Ellen Holmes, chair of the Massachusetts Association of School Committees, had this to say, "Anne's advocacy for regional school district issues has been greatly appreciated. The unanimous support in the Senate today for her Regional School Transportation reimbursement amendment moves us closer to the legislative promise to the voters in these regions. We look forward to the members of the Senate Conference Committee working with the House to secure this essential funding.

"Regional school transportation costs represent a significant portion of the Wachusett Regional School District's annual budget," said Margaret Natowicz, Rutland town administrator. "The state's year-on-year regional transportation reimbursement underfunding has resulted in increased assessments to member communities. If funded, Senator Gobi's amendment to increase regional transportation reimbursements from 68% to 80% would provide much needed relief to the town of Rutland and other municipalities challenged with sustaining an array of public services. We express our sincere appreciation to the Senator for her tireless work to assure that the

state allots its committed share of aid to municipalities and school districts.

State Auditor Suzanne Bump released a study on October 18, 2017 making recommendations to modernize laws and regulations within the regional school district structure. The report made sure to point at that state laws passed in 1949 entitle regional school districts to full reimbursement for school transportation expenses, but this is subject to annual appropriation. In fiscal 2016, the reimbursement rate from the state was just 73 percent, the auditor reported, creating a collective shortfall of \$14.4 million in this category for regional districts.

Regional school districts often have higher student transportation costs since they cover larger geographic regions. There are currently 58 regional school districts in Massachusetts with 171 member schools. The transporta-tion money that is not reimbursed by the state comes directly out of their school budgets. Senator Gobi has advocated each year for an increase in funding with a goal of 100% reimbursement.

The House of Representatives approved \$63,521,000 and the two amounts will be negotiated by the conference committee.

tion, (c) for production of food and fiber, (d) for the maintenance of livestock, or (e) to meet core

functions of a business. Examples of non-essential use are irrigation of lawns, washing of exterior buildings surfaces. parking lots, driveways or sidewalks unless it is to apply paint, preservatives, stucco, pavement or cement. Acceptable outside examples are irrigation to establish a new lawn during the months of May and September, irrigation for production of food and fiber or the maintenance of livestock, irrigation by plant nurseries as necessary to maintain stock. The irrigation of public parks and recreational fields shall follow the same restrictions.


Note: lawn sprinklers are very popular, and

many people have installed underground automatic systems. While this can be positive, it can also create serious problems if not installed properly. Any landscaping company will tell you that the best time to water your lawn is in the early morning or during the evening. Watering your lawn during the day wastes water due to the evaporation that occurs. Some experts say that as much as 50 percent of the water will evaporate before it soaks into the ground on a hot sunny day.

Signs will be placed on Rt. 20, Rt. 131 and major entrances into town, and notices placed on the town's web site and local cable access Channel 11 to notify residents when the ban is in effect.

Fishing both fresh and saltwater just fine say anglers

Fishing fresh and saltwater can be an exciting past time for young and old. It also can make great memories for the fishing

This past week this writer went striper fishing with Steve Mercure of Uxbridge at the Providence River. We arrived at the Bold Point boat ramp at 4:30 a.m.! By the time we had launched my boat it was just breaking light. As I navigated my 16 ft. boat through the channel and out into open water, I noticed a couple of boats about a quarter mile out and decided to check them out. Now I know I wrote a column about "Googans" a couple of weeks ago, where some fishermen follow and fish too close to commercial fishing vessels, but I was just trying to observe what they were fishing for. My prediction was right! They were trying to snag a few porgies for bass fishing.

We set up a few hundred feet from them and found our own school of porgies. It was not a large school of bait fish but we managed to snag a few for our morning fishing trip.

I decided to head out to a favorite spot of mine that often had us catching stripers on past fishing trips. We started our first drift by 6:00 a.m. and had a couple of hits on the first drift. They evidently were school stripers and were not large enough to handle a full size bait.

After a short run, they dropped the bait and it was time to go back up to where we had started our first drift. As we let our lines out we noticed a couple of osprey circling our baits. Suddenly one of the large birds plunged from the sky and picked up Steve's bait fish.

What the heck!!

I started to laugh as Steve battled the huge bird with his fishing rod. Suddenly the osprey dropped the bait fish and it crashed back to the surface of the ocean. Because the bait fish were swimming close to the surface it was easy for the osprey to spot the fish swimming just under the surface of the water.

Suddenly the second osprey plummeted from the sky and grabbed my baitfish, and I went through the same ordeal that Steve had just encountered. Giving the rod a good tug, the osprey also dropped my bait. Now we noticed that there were five osprey circling our boat waiting for another opportunity to steal one of our baitfish.

We decided to leave the area to avoid another encounter with the birds. We were also concerned that they could become entangled in our fishing line or ingest one of our hooks. I sure wish I had my camera running to capture at least one of the moments, but it happened so fast I did not have time.

We soon found ourselves fishing back where we had snagged a few porgies earlier in the day, and encountered a few more short runs from more than likely school stripers. I decided to check out another favorite spot of mine and found some larger fish by using my fish finder. We quickly let out our baits and had a fish on almost immediately. After the second run, this writer had a good hook up with one striper. After a 10 minute battle, the large striper was brought alongside the boat, where my fishing partner could scoop up the somewhat impressive striper and place it in the boat. He measured out at less than 40 inches, but slightly more than 30 inches?!!!!! At least it was a legal fish and was all that we needed to bring home for some of my acquaintances at the Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club

My brother Ken and his son Mark sent along a picture as shown in this week's column of anice lake trout they had caught a couple of weeks ago at Gate 8, in the Quabbin Reservoir. A \$23 fee to rent a boat and 9.9 hp. motor for the day also included a full tank of gas and admission. They caught seven lake trout throughout the day. They were all released back into the Reservoir. Although no salmon were caught by the two anglers, many fishermen still catch them on some of their trips. They are planning another trip to the Quabbin as early as next week.

To date, the Sturbridge Rotary Club has raised \$15,000 from the Dinner Dances for this worthy cause.







Tips to gear up for a great garden



TAKE THE HINT

Hot on the heels of Memorial Day weekend, gardeners everywhere are heralding in a long-awaited annual rite of late spring: official planting time! Backyard gardeners who patiently waited for the threat of frost to pass, are now eagerly scurrying to get their precious seeds, seedlings and fertilizer into the ground in anticipation of a bountiful harvest crop. And while many successful planters boast their own "secret" techniques to cultivating impressive rows of ripe, red tomatoes and patches of multi-blooming flowers, there are some easy tricks even "green thumb impaired" gardeners can use to give their plants a growing edge.

The following are some planting concoctions culled from readers of this column, gardening periodicals and past columns. All the methods are simple to do, and who knows, they just might improve the fruits of your labor!

Light Scent: Did you know most fragrant flowers are lightly colored or white? If you want to add a scent to your garden, be generous with white or pastel blooms.

Dash of Salt: Adding Epsom salt to plants has been reported to enhance the color of blossoms and leaves, promote new flowers and fruit, improve the root system and improve the strength of stems. For roses: sprinkle one teaspoon of Epsom salts per foot of plant height and spread evenly around the base for better blossoms and deeper greening. Add 1/2 cup sprinkled around the base and then scratched in, for strong production of new flowering canes and healthy new basal cane growth.

Pepper Position: Pepper plants thrive on heat, so it can be beneficial to place large rocks next to your green pepper plants to attract the sunlight.

Rein in Mint: Mint is easy to grow and useful in everything from herbal tea to holiday jelly. To stop vigorous mint from spreading and taking over the garden, keep it corralled by planting it in a large plastic bucket with the bottom

Rain Gauge: When planting your garden, sink a small jar or can in the middle of a row. This way, you can gauge exactly how much water your garden is getting from both irrigation and rain-

Boost Blooms: Plants that grow best in alkaline soil such as geraniums and hydrangea will thank you with better blooms if you water them with a mild mixture of baking soda and water occasionally.

Proper pH: The first thing to check if your azalea leaves are looking yellow is the soil pH. Azaleas need a soil on the acid side. Alkalinity locks up iron needed for green color.

Save \$: For cost effective mulch, use three sheets of newspaper under bark mulch. You'll save money on bark and the newspaper decomposes, enriching the soil.

Rooting Trick: It can be difficult to successfully take cuttings from shrubs to root and plant. Here is an option that ups your chances the cutting will take: Take a small potato, make a small hole, and place your shrub cutting inside. Immediately plant, potato and all, either in the ground or in a pot.

Pucker Power: To safely keep ants and insects off your plants, simply sprinkle concentrated lemon juice in the garden.

Need more green thumb tips? Try these problem solving "recipes!"

Miracle Grower Garden Tonic: Are your plants suffering from lackluster leaves? Are your blooms bowing out? Try this tonic to miraculously rejuvenate your plants this growing season.

Ingredients: Five gallon bucket; water; three pkgs. unflavored gelatin; two cups Epsom salts; one teaspoon borax (boron); one fourth cup dishwashing liquid (made with vegetable oils, not animal fats). Instructions: Put gelatin and Epsom salts in bucket as you fill it with water, so they will dissolve properly. Add borax and stir. Put soap in last (to keep down suds). Mix well. Use about two cups of formula per plant or group of plants. May be poured directly over foliage and allowed to soak in ground. In two to three days, plants and foliage should perk up nicely.

All Purpose Lawn Fertilizer: Lush lawns don't have to be a luxury with

this homemade brew. Ingredients: One can of beer; one can of cola (not diet); one box or cup of apple juice; one cup lemon scented dishwashing liquid; one cup ammonia; one cup liquid lawn fertilizer. Instructions: Mix together all ingredients. If you buy liquid lawn fertilizer with a hose sprayer attachment, you can use the attachment with any one liter bottle to make a 50 gallon sprayer. Spray your lawn and garden with the above mixture every three weeks, early in the day. *For houseplants, mix four shot glasses of the above mixture to one gallon of water and add one quarter tsp. unflavored gelatin.

Easy Pesticide: This mild insecticide uses only two ingredients, but gives bugs a powerful one-two punch!

Ingredients: One gallon water; 1/3 cup Murphy Oil Soap

Instructions: Mix oil soap with water and apply to stems and leaves of plants.





Tantasqua battles, but sees season end at hands of Colonials

WORCESTER — The Shrewsbury High boys' varsity lacrosse team came into its Central/ West Division 2 first round District game on a mission, having lost the previous two meetings with Tantasqua Regional. The Colonials were able to avenge those losses with a six-goal third period, which led directly to their 11-7 win over the Warriors on Tuesday, June 5, at Assumption College's Multi-Sport Stadium.

'That's a really good team over there, Tantasqua head coach Gregg Anderson said, looking at the Shrewsbury bench after the game. "They were gunning for us because we beat them the last two times we played them in a couple of really backand-forth games."

Tantasqua not only defeated Shrewsbury. 4-3, on May 4, but the Warriors also defeated the Colonials last year, 10-9, and in the process knocked them out of Central/West Division 2

Tournament. With the win seventh-seeded Shrewsbury (12-7) advanced to the quarterfinal round of the tournament, where it played No. 2 St. John's High and lost a nail-biter, 5-4. Tantasqua, the No. 10 seed, finished its season

Early on it looked like the June 5 result might have a similar outcome as the previous two, with Tantasqua jumping out to a 2-0 first quarter lead on a pair of goals by Tom Muir. Muir put the Warriors ahead, 1-0, on a

shot from right in front of the goal with 6:42 left in the period, and then pushed the lead to 2-0, scoring off a right-side rush and short right-toleft shot.


Shrewsbury proceeded to score the next four goals of the first half to take a 4-2 lead into the break. Tantasqua pulled to within a goal, 4-3, with 10:16 left in the third quarter on a goal by Riley O'Brien. The Colonials, however, then scored the final six goals of the quarter to take a 10-3 lead into the fourth and final

"They just took the game over at that point," Anderson said. "Even up 2-0 we knew we were in for a dogfight. They are a very skilled team. It was the kind of game that if a couple of things went one way or the other, I think we would have been closer. Their goalie made a couple of great saves at really key moments that kept them in the game.

"I think one of the key things for them was their generally winning the faceoff battles," Anderson said. "In the third quarter they had the ball in our zone most

of the time." Tantasqua opened the scoring in the fourth quarter, Chris Ballou cutting the Shrewsbury lead down to 10-4 with 8:45 left in the game. Shrewsbury answered Ballou's goal with one of its own 13 seconds later, to push the lead back to seven, 11-4.

The Warriors closed out the scoring with three straight tallies, two by Cody Robert, whose goals were sandwiched around a goal by Austin Varney.

Despite the Anderson was verv pleased by the play of his defense.

"You look at the score and we gave up 11 goals, but the possession advantage was lopsided," Anderson said. "I can't say enough about our defense. I can't say enough about how hard those guys played. Our entire defense — our LSMs [long-stick middies], the goalie, Mike Lucas — those guys just

battled their butts off." Lucas finished with five saves, while Shrewsbury goalie Michael Fornal recorded six stops.

Anderson said he was also happy with his team's never-say-die atti-

"Our guys didn't give up. Our guys kept battling to the end. Our guys, they just worked their tails off," Anderson said. "We would have liked to win the game, we would

have liked to go on and play the Johnnies [St. John's], but the fact is, and I know I speak for all the coaches, we're really proud to be associated with these guys."

With a smile on his face, Anderson took a moment to reflect on the season that was.

"We had a successful year. The cliché is that almost every successful season ends with a disappointing loss," Anderson said. "Early on we lost one of our best attackmen [Drew Darger]. We were able to recover from that and play some really good games. We had a great win over [Shrewsbury] early in the season and we had a great win over Northampton as well. I'm just so proud of these guys. They stepped up and they worked their butts off.





Safety tips for grilling season

• Only grill outside. Propane and charcoal barbecue grills should only be used outdoors. Grills should be placed well away from the home. Keep grills away from deck railings, eaves, overhangs, and tree branches.

Keep the grill clean. Thoroughly clean the grill prior to first use, and keep it tidy all year long. Grease or fat buildup can ignite and cause a fire.

• Always attend the grill. Grill distraction-free and keep an eye on the food being cooked. Simply stepping away for a few moments can lead to a fire or

• Start fires safely. Charcoal grills and gas grills may be lit using electronic starters that do not require fire. If using starter fluid, only do so on charcoal, and do not add more fluid or other flammable liquids after the fire has ignited.

· Check for gas leaks. Whether the gas grill is hooked up to a propane tank or the natural gas supply of a home, ensure that the hoses or tanks are not leaking. Apply a light soap-and-water solution to hoses to see if they bubble from leaking gas.

 Keep baking soda nearby. Baking soda can control grease fires, but it's also helpful to have a fire extinguisher or a bucket of sand on hand for other

Watch children and pets. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from grilling areas.

· Wait for the grill and coals to cool. Practice safety around the grill until all coals are cool and the grill is no longer hot to the touch. Only then should the grill be moved or relocated.

How to handle raw meats when grillng out

Cooking over an open flame on a grill in the backyard requires cooks keep watchful eyes on their grills. Charcoal

grill devotees must stay nearby as flames grow before settling down as the coals turn gray. Cooks using charcoal



or pets don't accidentally run into the grill, potentially knocking it over and creating a fire and/or injury hazard. But even gas grill users must be mindful of safety, checking hoses for leaks before igniting fires and then staving within arm's length of the grill to make sure everything is working smoothly.

Fire safety is essential when grilling outdoors, but cooks also must prioritize safe handling of raw meats. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has established a host of guidelines to promote safe grilling and the safe consumption of grilled foods and offers the following recommendations to cooks planning to grill raw meats.

· Separate foods when purchasing them. The grocery store might be far away from home, but safe grilling begins at the checkout counter. The FDA recommends consumers separate raw meat, poultry, seafood, and eggs from other foods in their shopping carts and grocery bags to prevent cross-contamination. Keep these items separate when storing them in the refrigerator as well.

Use separate cutting boards. Another way to prevent cross-contamination is to use separate cutting boards.

grills should also make sure children Designate one cutting board for produce and another for raw meat, poultry and seafood. If grilling more than one type of raw food at once, thoroughly clean the cutting board with soap and hot water between uses.

· Keep separate plates for precooked foods and cooked foods. The FDA notes that cooked foods should never be placed on plates that previously held raw meat, poultry, seafood, or eggs unless the plate has been washed in hot, soapy water. Bacteria from the juices of raw meat can linger on an uncooked plate, compromising the safety of cooked foods placed on unwashed, previously used plates.

Discard marinades once you start cooking. Marinades used on raw foods should be discarded once the foods are removed from the marinade and placed on the grill. Repurposing marinades to use as sauces can increase the risk for bacterial infections. However, the FDA notes that marinades used on raw foods can be repurposed so long as they are boiled before resuing them.

When grilling raw meat, poultry, seafood or other foods, cooks must be careful to prevent cross-contamination that can lead to bacterial infections.

GRILLING

Practice food safety

Warmer temperatures lead to an increase in outdoor dining. Grillmasters anxiously wait to show off their skills while guests gravitate around the barbecue in the backyard.

No matter the temperature outside or the size of the crowd around your dinner table, food safety is a concern whenever foods will be transported inside and outdoors or enjoyed in the fresh air.

A survey conducted by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics found that, while most people realize the months of May through September are prime times for the threat of food poisoning, consumers still are not practicing correct outdoor food safety procedures. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says there are around 76 million cases of foodborne illnesses each year in the United States alone. Those involve hundreds of thousands of hospitalizations and thousands of deaths. The CDC warns that people need to be even more diligent during warmer months to prevent food-related illnesses.

FOOD SAFETY STARTS AT THE STORE

Food can spoil even before making its way into your kitchen. When food shopping, put the cold and frozen items on your list in your cart last. This will help keep them fresher

protect other foods against raw meat or poultry juices that can leak. Bag these items together at checkout so that you'll know to immediately put all of the perishable items away when vou get home.

Some people invest in insulated, reusable tote bags that can keep cold food cold on the ride home. Even if you use such bags, always head directly home after food shopping; do not stop along the way and leave food in a warm car where it can quickly spoil.

SAFETY AROUND THE GRILL

Preparing foods involves avoiding cross-contamination between uncooked and cooked foods. That means switching utensils so that bacteria will not transfer from uncooked or partially cooked food to fully cooked food.

Use a cooler to keep refrigerated foods cold until it's time to put them on the grill if you're cooking away from home, such as at a public picnic site. Otherwise, wait until the grill is hot and ready before bringing out foods that need to be

Rely on a cooking thermometer to test the internal temperature of foods to ensure they reach temperatures that will kill bacteria or other patho-

gens. Hamburgers should reach 160 F and chicken breasts 165 F. When reheating fully cooked meats like hot dogs, grill to 165 F. or until steaming hot.

Discard any unused marinades so that they do not contaminate cooked foods.

OUTDOOR BUFFET TIPS

Food also needs to be protected once it is served. Use ice or coolers to keep cold salads and condiments at at least 40 F. Foods should not remain outside in hot weather of 90 F or above for more than one hour. The maximum time food should be kept sitting out is two hours, says the USDA.


Keep hands and utensils clean at all times. This way vou do not transfer any germs onto safe foods. If a fresh water source is unavailable, keep hand wipes or disinfecting gels at the ready to clean up before

CLEAN UP WELL

Promptly clean all serving platters, utensils and cutting boards if they have been in contact with raw food juices. The FDA even recommends that you sanitize your cutting board with chlorine bleach, and replace it if the surface gets worn and difficult to clean.

Outdoor cooking and dining are quite popular. Following safety precautions can go a long way toward preventing foodborne illnesses.

Master magical marinades



With their mix of acidic ingredients and spices, marinades add flavor and may even pack some nutritional punch.

Grilled foods boast inviting flavors that put many diners on the lookout for second helpings. Quite often the magic behind grilled meals lies in the marinade used to give foods that flavorful kick.

Marinades can be used to enhance the flavor of meats, vegetables and poultry. While marinades add flavor, they also may be responsible for some other benefits in grilled foods.

MARINADES ADD FLA-**VOR**

Defined as a savory acidic to enrich its flavor, marinades help break down fiber and tenderize certain foods. The base of many marinades include vinegar, lemon juice or wine, and marinades can be enhanced with spices, oil and herbs.

It's important not to let foods sit in marinades for too long, as any alcohol, acid or salt in the mixture can chemically "cook" the food in a process known as "denaturing." Adhere to timing recommendations when using store-bought marinades, and keep such guidelines in mind when using homemade marinades as well. Many may tell you to let foods sit no longer than four hours. Marinades with citrus juices may require even less time for flavor to penetrate.

The timing of marinade use also will depend on the foods being marinated. Delicate items, such as seafood, may change with regard to texture or color in a matter of minutes.


It's important to always marinate foods in the refrigerator. Food left sitting out on a counter — even when it's in a marinade — invites the growth of bacteria. If a recipe calls for marinating at room temperature, continue to marinate in the refrigerator, but extend the length of time you marinate. This helps to prevent foodborne illnesses.

When marinating, use plastic or glass containers so the marinade does not cause a chemical reaction, which may occur if you marinate foods in metal containers. Discard all marinades for raw meats and poultry when the time comes to cook the foods, as leftover marinades may contain bacteria that makes them unsafe to reuse on other foods.

THE NUTRITIONAL **BENEFITS** OF MARINATING

In addition to flavor, marinades may improve the nutritional value of grilled foods. In 2008, researchers at Kansas State University discovered that marinating meat in antioxidant-rich spice blends can reduce the risk of forming heterocyclic amines, or HCAs, by more than 80 percent. HCAs are harmful, cancer-causing compounds that form when food chars over an open flame at high temperatures. Marinades must be rich in spices to have any HCAbusting properties.

Marinades are a secret weapon in the creation of tasty, tender and healthy foods. They come in quite handy when grilling, and add an extra dose of flavor when cooking over high heat.


