On April 7th at Everybody's Fitness Center in Auburn a group of people all joined together to raise money to help end cancer. The EFC held their annual Pedal to End Cancer event and reached beyond their goal. The turnout was amazing with over 25 people riding the bikes during a stretch of three hours.

The EFC was able to raise \$7,900 dollars that day and it jumped to over \$8,200 during the event and is still rising.

As promised, the trainers Greg Jackson, Jay Kusy, Katy Lussier and Melissa Fantasia-Lagares all had to split 790 (1 burpee for every \$10 donated) burpees in those three hours.

"I was hyped doing the burpees!" says Katy. "The energy in the room was inspiring," says Jhonny Eca-Ackerman. "I hope next year we can raise more money and have more

participants. It is such a good cause."

Jhonny and the rest of the team at the EFC want to earn over \$10,000 next year. The room where the event is held is home to 18 stationary bikes and is usually utilized for popular spin classes. Friends and families took turn riding. But Tracy Bourque completed the three whole hours herself. The room was decorated with various hearts all over. The hearts read the names of those who people have lost to cancer. Or those who are going through treatment right now. It gave an extra push for everyone to pedal faster and pedal harder for those loved ones lost or loved ones surviving. The participants rode for their families, friends and complete strangers. They raised a great deal of money for a great cause and even caught the attention of the American Cancer Society. The American

Two important races on Auburn ballot

AUBURN – Election Day approaches.

On May 15, Auburn voters will be deciding two key races. Three people are running for two seats on the Board of Selectmen – incumbents Doreen Goodrich and Ken Holstrom, and current School Committee member Wayne Page. At the same time, four are running for the School Committee's two available seats – incumbent George Scobie and newcomers Meghan McCrillis, Erika Sullivan and Mary DeCourcy. With Page leaving, at least one of the women is guaranteed a seat.

"Last year there was a very low voter turnout with only 9 percent coming out," Town Clerk Deb Gremo noted by email. "I am hoping many come out to vote this year for

the Annual Town Election."

For the sake of coverage, more detailed responses from each candidate will be sought for a later edition of this paper; some could not be reached before deadline for this overview.

By chance, that meant entirely School Committee responses, and that race features Scobie, in his sixth year, running against a long-time teacher, a local Realtor, and a nursing professor.

"I am seeking a third term on the Auburn School Committee because I truly enjoy my work," Scobie said by email. "I have had the best colleagues an elected official could ask for. I have learned so much about town government over the past six years, and formed great relationships with other town officials and employees."

To him, the town has historically "fully supported" the

district, something he expects to continue, and he noted he has no specific issues "with anything that is happening in our school district."

"We have the best committee members, leadership team, teachers, and staff that any community could ask for," he added. "Why would I not want to continue advocating for our children, with that type of support?"

Sullivan, the realtor, has a similar outlook from a different perspective. She has some local government experience as a member of the town's Energy Committee, and said she brings "analytical thinking to resolve conflict," contract resolution, budgeting and other skills to the table.

"As a parent with four children in the School District (one at AHS, three at Pakachoag), a

DUDLEY — Valentine's Day 2018 began like every other day Paul Brower has spent on the recruiting trail in the last several years, as the Nichols College men's and women's tennis coach and its dean of admissions. By early afternoon, however, it was a day unlike any other in his life, and one he prays never repeats itself.

After visiting four Florida high schools: Fort Lauderdale High School, Coral Springs Charter School, Coral Springs High School and North Broward Preparatory School, Brower and St. Clair Ryan, the Nichols running backs coach, arrived at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in

Metacomet Land Trust recognizes two with Community Spirit awards

At its annual meeting in Douglas on April 8, the Metacomet Land Trust awarded its Community Spirit awards to Douglas State Forest and Wallum Lake State Park Supervisor Cary Vanden Acker of Northbridge and to Douglas resident Dr. Brandi Van Roo, biology professor at Framingham State University.

"Why are we members of the land trust?" President Lisa Moczymski asked an audience of over 50 people. "Why do we work with individuals, municipalities and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to preserve and protect our fields, forests and open spaces? Because we love where we live! And we want to keep component of our quality of life strong and vibrant for all."

"In keeping with that," she explained, "we started an annual tradition called the Community Spirit award to recognize one or two special people who go the extra mile to help us - directly or indirectly - achieve our goal."

Moczymski went on to recognize Vanden Acker of Northbridge as a person who works tirelessly, day in and day out, for the largest property owned by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in our geographic service area. He is the supervisor of the Douglas State Forest and Wallum Lake State Park which encompasses nearly 6,000 acres and includes the beautiful bi-state body of water known as Wallum Lake. The park welcomes thousands of visitors each year and hosts numerous events for mountain bikers, trail riders and others.

Over the years, Vanden Acker of Northbridge has worked diligently within budget constraints but with a terrific seasonal and permanent staff to maintain the park and to make the visitor's experience in the outdoors an excellent one.

"To enjoy the outdoors is to love nature," she said, "and for all his hard work and boundless dedication, we

present this Community Spirit award to Cary Vanden Acker."

The land trust's second award went to Douglas resident Brandi VanRoo who quietly and diligently works in education but who also collects data that can help us understand whether changing patterns are predictors of a changing environment over time. As a professor of biology at Framingham State University, Dr. Brandi Van Roo investigates breeding behaviors and breeding hormones in songbirds. She is an ornithological expert on the area of Blackstone River Valley and works with students and volunteers to band migratory birds moving through our area.

In addition, Dr. Van Roo shares her expertise at both the local and state levels by volunteering her time as a member of the Douglas Conservation Commission and in 2005 she was appointed by the Governor to the Fisheries & Wildlife Board which over-

sees the Massachusetts Division of Fish and Wildlife where she continues to serve today.

"For your ongoing efforts to educate our young people, for your dedication to your field of science and for your generosity in giving and sharing your knowledge with our local and state boards, please accept this Community Spirit award from the Metacomet Land Trust," Moczymski proclaimed.

The Metacomet Land Trust is a non-profit conservation organization dedicated to the protection of open space and natural resources in the communities of South Central Massachusetts and that includes the towns of Bellingham, Blackstone, Douglas, Franklin, Hopedale, Mendon, Millbury, Millville, Norfolk, Northbridge, Sutton, Upton, Uxbridge, Webster and Wrentham. On Saturday, April 14th, you may have noticed individuals or groups of volunteers walking along the banks of the nearby streams and rivers with garbage bags in their hands. This dedicated group of volunteers were participating in the annual Earth Day Cleanup of local waterways organized by the Blackstone River Watershed Association.

For the last three years this cleanup has been sponsored by Savers Bank and Control Point Mechanical, Inc. demonstrating their unwavering dedication to the environment and a cleaner, healthier Blackstone Valley! This year

we also received the support of Tom Berkowitz Trucking, Inc. who provided trash removal services in the towns of Northbridge and Uxbridge.

Over 130 volunteers cleared 30 sites in 11 nearby towns: Auburn, Blackstone, Douglas, Grafton, Mendon, Millbury, Millville, Northbridge, Sutton, Upton, and Uxbridge. An incredible amount of trash was pulled from wetlands, streams, rivers, ponds, and shorelines amounting to 146 trash bags, that's almost four tons of trash. Some of the items retrieved from the banks of rivers and streams included car parts, a bicycle, two mattresses, three box springs,

13 tires and a truck load of construction debris, including a toilet.

Dumping can ruin the beauty of our natural landscape, and can also be a harmful pollutant that negatively impacts our rivers. Some of those impacts can be seen in declining water quality, reduced water flow, decreased accessibility for wildlife to access water bodies, and harmful ingestion of items mistaken for food.

Our champion volunteers included many individuals, families, student groups, organizations, and groups like the Girl Scouts, church groups,

concerned citizens, National Honor Societies, trail ambassadors, businesses, garden clubs and Events Gone Wild who worked tirelessly to clean up these areas.

As a small token of appreciation, all volunteers were given a reusable water bottle with the BRWA logo printed on the side.

The BRWA would also like to express their sincere appreciation to Blackstone Valley Technical High School for allowing us to use the school grounds as a meeting point and a place to distribute supplies. An additional thank you to the town DPWs who provided invaluable support for our cleanup by hauling the trash away and to cable access and local media who helped spread the word for the event.

Moore awarded for work with challenged individuals

BOSTON — Senator Michael O. Moore (D-Millbury) was awarded the Distinguished Legislator of the Year Award for his efforts on behalf of persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The award was presented to Senator Moore by the organization Advocates for Autism of

Massachusetts (AFAM).

"It is an honor to accept this award, and to represent persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families," said Senator Moore. "I won't take a back seat when it comes to advocating for the rights of the disability community and will contin-

ue to support legislative initiatives that help to improve the lives of thousands of residents across our Commonwealth."

In particular, Senator Moore received this recognition for his support of legislation including a bill known as "Nicky's Law" that would direct the Department of Developmental

Services to establish a registry that identifies individuals who have been found to have committed abuse against persons with disabilities.

Senator Moore was presented with the award during the annual "Autism Spectrum Awareness and Acceptance Day"

held at the State House. The program included hundreds of attendees who heard from speakers, legislators, self-advocates and autism-related stakeholders.

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With low inventory should I build a new home?

Ever since the most recent housing crash the building of new homes has been minimal. It has grown over the past few years however. According to the National Association of Home Builders it was 925,000 in 2013 and up to over 1.2 Million in 2017 for the entire U.S. This is an almost 30 percent increase over those 5 years but yet has not kept up with demand. The median homes prices also rose from \$288, 500 in 2014 to \$321,100 in 2017 and is continuing to rise in 2018 with the continued rise in building costs. Inventory for

new and existing homes is still extremely low which is causing a growth in new construction. The best thing about building a home is that you get to choose the finishes, the style of home, where it sits on the lot. You truly get to make this home your own by adding all the features you want. The downside to buying a new home is that you will need to wait for it to be completed. Most new builds you will see taking 6-9 months in this area to complete so you have a narrow window to start construction so you can be in

the home before school starts or you start a new job. You also do not have much control over the timing so this can be a challenge if you have a home to sell as well. It is usually best

to either build the new home and then sell your home if you can cover both mortgages or sell your home and then move into temporary housing until your home is complete. The other thing to consider is that the cost of building is significantly higher than the cost to purchase an existing home so you probably want to increase your budget when looking at new homes. Lastly, if you have very specific taste or want lots of upgrades you may need to come out of pocket during the build to pay for the

many upgrades and the cost of the home may also go much higher and possibly the bank will not appraise it and you may need to change the plans or the features of the home so you can afford it.

I suggest when you are thinking about moving to sit down with a local Realtor so they can consult with you on what direction makes the most sense based on your needs in a home to either buy new or to purchase an existing home.

The Hanover Theatre Conservatory for the Performing Arts ballet per-



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Colorful caladiums brighten shade gardens all season

Tuck them into the garden, pop some in a container or dress up a window box. Then water as needed, add a bit of fertilizer and wait for the color explosion.

The showy heart-shaped leaves of caladiums come in combinations of pink, red, white and green. These heat-loving plants provide beautiful color all season long. Best of all, no deadheading is needed.

Caladiums can be used to create a stunning garden almost anywhere around your home. These tropical beauties grow well in full to partial shade, and some varieties grow equally well in full sun. Choose varieties that will provide the color, size and look you want to achieve, and that match the light conditions in your yard.

Compact caladiums, such as lime and dark pink Miss Muffet, grow about 12" tall and are perfect for lining a pathway, edging a flowerbed or dressing up a container. Florida Sweetheart's bright, rose-pink leaves have ruffled green edges, and Gingerland has creamy white leaves that are decorated with splashes of green and red. All of these miniature varieties combine nicely with larger caladiums and elephant ears.

Step up the color impact with caladium Red Flash. This full-size caladium grows about 20" tall and has brilliant red centers, decorated with pink dots that pop against the large, deep green leaves. Use these anywhere you want a big splash of color in a garden bed or container.

Combine caladiums with shade-loving annuals like begonias, coleus, and mildew-resistant impatiens or other summer bulbs like cannas and elephant ears. Visit Longfield Gardens (longfield-gardens.com) for

a bit of inspiration and container design ideas. You'll find simple combinations that provide big impact on a deck, patio or entryway.

When planting caladiums directly into the garden, wait until at least two weeks after all danger of frost has passed. Nights should be warm, and the soil temperature should be at least 65° F. Prepare the soil before planting. Add compost or other organic matter to improve drainage in clay soil and the moisture-holding ability in fast draining soils. Plant tubers about six inches apart and two inches below the soil surface. Water thoroughly and often enough to keep the soil moist, but not soggy.

Those gardening in cooler climates may want to start the tubers indoors for an earlier show outdoors. Plant indoors four to six weeks before moving them into the garden. Set the tubers near the surface of a shallow container filled with a well-drained potting mix. Grow them in a warm sunny spot indoors, keeping the soil barely moist. Move outdoors once the danger of frost has passed and the soil has warmed.

As the summer temperature rises, watch your caladiums shine while many other flowers fade in the summer heat and humidity. Continue to water as needed and fertilize throughout the summer to encourage new growth.

Those gardening in zones nine through eleven can leave their caladiums in place year-round. Others can either treat these colorful beauties as annuals or dig up the tubers and overwinter them indoors. Dig tubers in early fall when soil temperatures drop to 55°. Spread them out in a warm, dry location for at least a week.

Label each variety, remove the foliage and place tubers in a mesh bag or pack loosely in dry peat moss. Store in a cool, dark location at around 60 degrees.

Make this the year you add caladiums for beautiful splashes of color throughout your landscape all season long.

graduate of Auburn schools, an Auburn homeowner and taxpayer, and an Auburn independent business owner, I have quite the vested interest in the schools and the community," she wrote. But she does have a specific objective: security. She said she'd like to "hire a professional school security company to review and consult on current security protocols" and "initiate new anonymous reporting methods for both students and parents to report suspicious or threatening behaviors without the concern for repercussions."

McCrillis, an associate nursing professor at Quinsigamond Community College, shares Sullivan's concern for

safety and finances, but also hopes to promote communication, more teacher/parent involvement and expand social-emotional learning. The latter, McCrillis said, "has been proven to improve self-esteem, reduce bullying, and enhance problem solving skills."

"The passion I hold for this town and the educational system is deeper than just me," she wrote by email. "My grandfather began his education here in town 84 years ago, when he started first grade. He never left and later enrolled three boys in the town's educational system. One of these boys (my father Jim Creelman) went on to serve on the school committee in the 1980's. I have always wanted to follow in his footsteps and feel that now is the best time for me to do so."

Decourcy comes from a different

branch of the educational system, primarily special ed. She's executive director at the Cambridge-based organization A Better Day for Children, Youth and Families, but also has principal and superintendent certification according to her LinkedIn page. She noted she "look[s] forward to learning what issues are a priority to all of our neighbors."

"I am passionate about learning, teaching, coaching and most importantly about fostering strong relationships with adults to ensure that ALL of our children will thrive," she wrote. "I have devoted my life to teaching, coaching, leading and advocating for rigor in every classroom, seamless inclusionary practices and the integration of technology without losing the focus of the important relationship that exists between each educator and each stu-

dent."

All of the other annual seats are unopposed, and Gremo said there are still a few openings for Town Meeting Representatives, namely one each in Precincts 3 and 4 and an unexpired term in Precinct 5. Since the deadline to file election papers passed weeks ago, anyone interested in those seats needs to have voters from the same precinct write their names in. Historically, it only takes a handful of write-ins to get elected, and if there's a tie, the sitting precinct representatives meet to vote someone in.

Wednesday was the last day for voter registration. Voting on May 15 will be in the Auburn High School gym from 8 a.m. to 8p.m.

BBQ basics: skill with the grill

Grilling is one of the simple pleasures of the season. Whether outdoor suppers consist of an impromptu barbecue or elaborate grilling feast, it's all about technique. From proper preparation to skill with the grill, this week's column reviews some BBQ basics.

patties, you'll get a juicier burger if you rub each side of the meat with cold water before grilling.

Sugar Stall: Barbecue sauce containing sugar should be applied for only the last 20 to 30 minutes of cooking because putting it on sooner may cause the

meat to burn. For grilled chicken, baste with sauce the last ten minutes.

Basting Basics: Basting on the grill can be a tricky challenge. Try this timing trick: For hot dogs and sausages, baste with BBQ sauce for the last five to six minutes of cooking time; barbecued meats cooked by indirect method should be basted with sauce the last hour of cooking.

Spray to Stay: Want your spices to stay put on meat while grilling? Try spritzing a little nonstick spray on the meat after seasoning to keep it in place better.

Cut Cleanup: Here's a tip to cut grill cleaning time. After cooking, place a piece of tinfoil over the grate and turn the gas up to high for about a minute, and then turn it off. The foil attracts the heat, burning the bits to an ash. When cool, crumple up the aluminum foil and use it to scrape off the residue.

The Waiting Game: As a rule of thumb, when you grill with charcoal, it takes about 30 minutes for coals to reach a medium temperature and become ash covered. For gas grills, allow about 15 minutes for the grill rack to preheat properly.

Turn the Heat Up: To increase the heat on a charcoal grill, try these tips. Simply push the coals together; add more coals as needed; lower the grilling surface, or fan the fire and tap the ashes from the coals.

Call for Coal: Did you know as a general rule, it takes about 30 coals to grill one pound of meat? But keep in mind the number of coals required can vary depending upon weather conditions. Cold temperatures and high humidity call for the addition of more coals.

Cool It: To quickly decrease the temperature on a charcoal grill, just raise the cooking grid or carefully sprinkle the coals with a little water to cool it down fast.

Tasty Turns: When marinating meat or other foods for grilling, you should move or turn the meat in its container every half hour or so to ensure an even distribution of the sauce.

Dry Off: Did you know meat that has been marinated should be blotted dry before searing in order to form a second skin?

Don't Flip Out: Did you know if you flip your steak more than once, you're probably cooking it wrong? Grilling experts say you can properly sear meat by using higher heat, and turning it just once. A nice crust will form and seal in the flavor, and keep foods from sticking.

Cut Curls: If you slash the edge of the fat around a steak or chop it will prevent it from curling as it cooks. Just make cuts in the edge every couple of inches.

Take steps to control your investment taxes

Tax Season is finally over. Of course, how much you pay in taxes depends on a variety of factors, many of which you can't control. But you might give some thought to how you can manage your investment-related taxes.

Here are some suggestions to consider:

Contribute to your employer's retirement plan. If your employer offers a 401(k) or similar plan, such as a 403(b) or 457(b), contribute as much as you can afford. The more pre-tax dollars you put in to your retirement plan, the lower your taxable income. Your employer also may offer a Roth 401(k) option, under which you invest after-tax dollars, so your annual income won't be lowered and your withdrawals will be tax-free.

Contribute to an IRA. Even if you have a 401(k) or similar plan, you may still be eligible to contribute to an IRA. With a traditional IRA, your contributions may be fully or partially deductible, depending on your income level; with a Roth IRA, contributions are not deductible, but your earnings can grow tax-free, provided you've had your account at least five years and you don't start taking withdrawals until you're 59½.

Follow a "buy-and-hold" strategy. You can't control the price movements of your investments, but if you do achieve gains, you can decide when to take them – and this timing can make a substantial difference in your tax situation. If you sell investments that you've owned for one year or less and their value has increased, you may need to pay capital gains taxes at your personal income tax rate, which, in 2018, could be as high as 37 percent. But if you hold investments for more than one year before selling them, you'd be assessed the long-term capital gains rate, which is 0, 15 or 20 percent, or a combination of those rates.

Consider municipal bonds. If you're in one of the higher tax brackets, you may benefit from investing in municipal bonds. The interest on these bonds is typically free of federal taxes, and possibly even state and local taxes. Interest from some types of municipal bonds may be subject to the alternative minimum tax (AMT). However, because of the new tax laws, the AMT exemption amounts were increased significantly.

You might be wondering what these new laws mean to investors. In terms of your regular investment activities, the effect might not be that significant. The tax brackets for qualified dividends and capital gains – such as those realized when you sell stocks – will remain about the same. This means that most investors will continue to pay 15% to 20% on long-term capital gains and dividends. Consequently, the new tax laws shouldn't really affect you much in terms of your decisions on buying and selling stocks or investing in companies that may pay dividends. Of course, it's still a good idea to consult with your tax advisor on how the totality of the new laws will affect you.

Ultimately, your investment decisions shouldn't be driven only by tax implications – nonetheless, it doesn't hurt to take steps to become a tax-smart investor.

Turkey on the move as season opens

Wild Turkey!! Love them or hate them they are here to stay. Turkey have become a real nuisance to farmers and the general public in some areas. Birds raiding farmers' grain piles, and turkey chasing residents as they walk on their daily exercises, have many residents of the valley area looking for ways to get rid of them. Even Barry Burbank, a meteorologist on channel 4 was complaining last week about wild turkey chasing him as he was taking his daily jaunt.

Although some of the wild turkey seem a bit wacko at times, hunting them is an exciting and rewarding experience, not to forget the excellent eating that they provide for the family. It is not easy to call a wild turkey close enough for a shot, but that is why it is so rewarding to a hunter.

Turkey hunting opens April 30, in Massachusetts, and hunters should be able to harvest some of the nuisance birds. With all of the sightings, it should be a record year. The birds are already gobbling and strutting their stuff, and with the forecast for warmer weather this week, the birds should be getting well into their breeding season, and should be receptive to their calls.

Hunters are practicing wild turkey calling daily, trying out some of the latest calls. Mouth calls are very hard for some hunters to master, while others have very few problems. Box calls are the easiest to use and are the number one call being used by turkey hunters today. One local turkey hunter has mastered calling in wild turkeys with only his vocal chords. I swear he must have swallowed a mouth call and it became lodged in his throat. He is really good.

Many wild turkey hunters shoot only long beards, which are often three years of age or more. They often tip the scales at 20 + pounds and can weigh as

much as 30 pounds, although 25 pounds is considered a trophy. Beard and spur length often make bragging rights among trophy hunters. Jakes are one year old birds that are easier to call into range for a shot, but an old tom bird can have you coming back on numerous days before giving the hunter a shot. The gobble of a turkey coming in at full strut can only be fully appreciated by a hunter.

After a few years of hunting wild turkey while sitting up against a large oak tree or against an old stone wall, I realized I was becoming a meal for the blood sucking ticks that managed to attach themselves to my body every year. After numerous tick bites and contracting Lyme disease twice, I decided to try a ground blind. Finally, I was off of the ground away from ticks, sitting in a comfortable chair, sipping coffee and having a bit to eat, as I patiently waited for a wild turkey to approach my set of decoys. Not only was I free of tick, but I found that calling in a wild turkey into range was a lot easier, as their keen eye sight was no match for my ground blind. I had turkeys walking within 10 feet of my blind. Using a spray called permitrin on my clothing, I was tick free on my last two years of hunting turkey.

Arriving at your hunting site early is essential if you want to enjoy the hunt. Setting up my turkey decoys in the dark needs to be done prior to first light. My three decoys consist of one hen and two jakes that have a couple of fan tails from previous birds I harvested. The tails are dried on a board that has the feathers in a fan position. I nailed a piece of wood to the fan, and then used a piece of dowel stock to hold the tail in an upright position. Sticking the tail in back of the Jake bird's, are a real draw to a lonely tom bird. Sitting in my ground blind

one hour before legal shooting time had me watching the woods come alive with all forms of wildlife. Turkey gobbling on the roost at first light can often make you aware of where the birds are, and what direction they could come from. If they are close enough, you will actually hear them fluttering to the ground as they leave their roost. That is a good time to make a couple of real soft hen calls, and if you are good at it, a quick response from a tom turkey will be heard. It is best to make no more calls, and to wait for the bird to respond numerous times as he looks for the imitated hen from your call.

Hearing the put, put from a hen turkey will often shock the tom into gobbling also.

Patience to wait for a full strutting bird and gobbling as he comes in range for a shot is extremely exciting. As you squeeze the trigger, the gun discharges sending a loud roar thru the valley. Looking out of the window of your blind, you should see your bird lying motionless on the ground.

As you exit the blind a fast dash to the unresponsive bird is necessary, as some shot turkeys often play dead until you approach them. You may need to restrain the bird for a short period of time by placing your foot on him. Picking up the bird, you realize the huge bird's size and the long beard and nasty looking spurs that are signs of a trophy bird.

Shoot straight and be safe!!

Trout fishing is in full swing at local brooks, lakes and ponds. Most areas have had at least two stockings of trout placed in them from Massachusetts Fish & Wildlife to date. More on trout fishing next week!

Ticks are already showing up on local outdoorsmen and women, and their pets. Be sure to take preventive mea-

sures every day. Checking your pets and family members daily is essential. If ticks are allowed to stay embedded in your dog's skin or on yours for more than 24 hours, you may need to see your family doctor or veterinarian. Be sure to keep all of your pets medications up to date. It is going to be a long summer!

Dandelions are out which is a sure sign that tautog season is getting underway. This hard fighting fish can provide some excellent eating.



First inning works wonders as Minutemen roll over Keefe Tech

CHARLTON — The first inning for Bay Path Regional's varsity baseball team against Keefe Tech on Monday, April 23 was about as good as any coach could hope for. Starting pitcher Nate Shoemaker tossed a 1-2-3 top of the first that included a pair of strikeouts. Then, in the home half of the frame, the Minutemen's bats went to work to the tune of 12 runs on 12 hits.

Bay Path took its 12-0 lead and cruised to a 19-2 win after five mercy-rule shortened innings. The Minutemen improved to 4-1 in the process.

"That was big for him," Bay Path head coach Mark Sansoucy said of Shoemaker's first inning. "He pitched a couple of innings last week, but that was his first start."

Sansoucy then said

that Shoemaker's teammates helping him with such a big run output was important.

"For them to pile on the runs like that he could relax, he didn't have to worry about any pressure," said Sansoucy. "They were putting the ball in play, that's what we want them to do. We don't want them striking out, and they did a good job of that today."

The Minutemen saw their first 14 players reach base successfully, which included John O'Loughlin, Shoemaker, Alec Desimone, Nick Jose and Cam Stitisit all getting on board twice in the frame.

In all, Desimone was 4 for 4, scoring each time he reached base. Jose was 3 for 3 with a walk, Stitisit 3 for 3, O'Loughlin 2 for 2 with a walk and Shoemaker 2 for 5.

Sansoucy saw his

team's offense come alive in their prior game, which took place in the consolation round of the annual Cape Cod Tournament over April Vacation. The Minutemen defeated Cape Cod Tech in the game, 17-1.

"We started to hit the ball, which was a good sign because we didn't hit the ball good against Upper Cape," said Sansoucy.

Bay Path lost to Upper Cape Cod Tech in the first game of the tournament, 4-0.

"They started to hit that game and it carried into this game," added Sansoucy. "Hopefully we can continue to hit."

The Broncos grabbed a couple of runs in the top of the second inning to cut the deficit down to 12-2, but the Minutemen tacked on two runs in the home half of the frame to regain a 12-run lead,

14-2. O'Loughlin scored on a throwing error and Jose ripped an RBI single to plate Desimone, who tripled.

Hot-hitting Bay Path scored four more times in the bottom of the third to extend the lead to 18-2. Shoemaker reached on an error, which scored two, Desimone connected on an RBI double and Tyler Bennett had an RBI single.

The Minutemen scored a final run in the bottom of the fourth when Bryson Bullock touched home plate following a Broncos' error.

Shoemaker finished his outing with four innings pitched, allowing two runs — one earned — on three hits to go with three walks and five strikeouts.

Sansoucy noted that Shoemaker has earned a spot in the team's rotation, which also includes a stable of Jake Leone,

Tim Kunz, Dom Esposito and Noah LaTour, who pitched the fifth inning against Keefe Tech. LaTour struck out the side and allowed a single.


Sansoucy knows that all of the aforementioned arms will need to pitch well as the Minutemen are prepared to face some of the league's toughest adversaries in the coming weeks.

"We're coming into the tough part of our schedule," he said. "We've got the AMSA's, the BVT's,

the Worcester's and the Assabet's coming up."

But Sansoucy is thrilled with the 4-1 start and hopes that the team won't rely on an end-of-season winning streak to reach the playoffs, which happened last spring. The Minutemen needed to win six of their final seven games to get to 10-10.

"I don't want to be in that situation again," Sansoucy said.

Parkland to discuss the possibility of attending Nichols with four senior members of the Eagles' football team.

Stoneman Douglas was familiar territory for Brower; he had made recruiting visits there many times and considered head coach Willis May and assistant coach Aaron Feis friends.

"We had been talking to the kids for about 10 minutes when we heard a fire alarm go off, but it only went off for about 10 seconds, which is very unusual," said the 40-year-old Brower. "Usually when you hear a fire alarm it usually goes off for about 10 minutes. It was one of those moments where you look around at each other and go, 'OK'."

Moments later Brower, Ryan, May and the four student-athletes who were meeting in the coach's office inside the boys' locker room found out the school was not holding a fire drill or testing the system.

"The fire alarm was shut off so quickly we thought nothing of it, but about 45 seconds later the words 'Code Red' came over the loudspeaker — twice," Brower recalled.

"Coach May went to the outer locker room doors and locked those and told everybody to get into his office."

"Shortly thereafter, we heard a popping noise and somebody said over the radio, 'hey, is that a firecracker?' And a voice came back and said, 'that ain't no firecracker,'" Brower said.

"A minute or two later we heard 'pop, pop, pop.' One of the guys then opened one of the side doors to the outer office and when he did that you could hear the shots clear as day. They were a lot less muffled. At that point, we knew someone was shooting inside the school."

Brower, who grew up in the Brookfields and now lives in Auburn, and Ryan, a first-year coach at Nichols, had found themselves inside one of the deadliest school shootings in the nation's history; 17 students, teachers and administrators were killed that day.

Feis, who worked security at the school and served as the football team's offensive line coach, was one of the casualties.

Brower sized up the situation quickly and when he realized that he, Ryan, May and the four athletes were in the safest place they could be in the school, his attention turned to the student-athletes in the room.

"To see these four football players

learning about one of their coaches being a victim of this was very hard for me," Brower said. "And, naturally for Coach May, who was very close with Coach Feis — Coach Feis had played for Coach May — it was really hard for him, too. All of those guys, Coach May and the four kids did an amazing job keeping their head on straight through all of it. It was definitely something you could see wasn't easy for them to find out about."

At that point, Brower — who with wife Amy is the parent of a 5-year-old daughter named Kaylee — and Ryan, went into a parental mode.

"We were really just trying to keep everyone's mind occupied by talking about football, by talking about college; anything not to focus on what was going on what's outside the room," Brower said.

"It was an incredibly stressful situation. That's not our community. We don't live there; we don't know the people in that community. I had only met these four young men that day, but they're hearing about friends and classmates; people they grew up with and they have known since they were little kids. I can't even fathom what was going through their heads."

One of those four young men was Tyler Goodman, the starting quarterback on the football team. The actions of Brower and Ryan have left a lasting impression on Goodman.

"Coach Brower and Coach Ryan kept us, the recruits, completely calm. They were trying to discuss any other topic they could than what was going on outside the locker room. That's what impressed me the most," Goodman said in a phone interview.

"When it came down to making my decision that was a big part of my deciding to go to Nichols. They treated me like a son. Every parent wants their children to go to a school where they know their kid would be treated like a son; treated the same way they were treated at home. You know, reminding us to stay on top of our school work, things like that — parental things."

Goodman made an overnight visit to Nichols Feb. 24-25. At the end of the first night of his visit he verbally committed to attend Nichols and play on the football team. Goodman said Coach Ryan was particularly comforting when Goodman found out Feis — whom he was very close to — had been killed in the shooting.

"When I found out Coach Feis passed,

I lost it. A friend of mine actually called me and told me, 'Coach is gone.' I was in the coach's office and I broke down," Goodman said.

"Coach Ryan told me, 'it's going to be all right. You've just got to toughen up right now. You can call me whenever you need to and we can talk about this, but right now you have to be tough and strong for your team.' When I found out Coach Feis passed away, that took a chunk out of my heart."

Goodman said when he got onto the Nichols campus he received a sign from Coach Feis and the others who perished in the school that this was the place he was destined to continue his education.

"I visited Western New England College the day before and it was 75 degrees and hot and I was like, 'this is Florida weather,'" Goodman said. "When I woke up the next day it was kind of chilly out and we drove to Nichols and it started snowing as soon as I got there. And it wasn't that icy snow, it was soft and fluffy snow."

"I looked up [toward heaven] and said, 'if someone is sending me a sign, I see it. I see the sign. OK guys, I get it. I got you. I'm listening.'" Goodman explained. "When I got to the administration office I saw Coach Brower and I went to shake his hand and he said, 'no, I want a hug.' I loved the campus. I'm not a big school type of kid. I'm a small school guy. When I found out the whole school was on one street I said to myself, 'you know what, this school is the perfect size for me.' Everything is all together. I committed right then."



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


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
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
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
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

How to approach sibling rivalries

Many parents dream that their children will grow up to be lifelong friends. That happens quite often, but typically not without a few bumps along the way.

Siblings disagree from time to time, and sibling rivalry is a part of growing up and charting one's course in the family unit. However, parents can take steps to avoid sibling rivalries developing between their children.

Children routinely test their boundaries and their places within their families, vying for attention from parents or other caregivers, especially when they become a brother or sister for the first time. A first-born child who went from being the sole focus of his parents' attention may struggle to adjust when another child is welcomed into the family.

Sibling rivalry also occurs because young children may not be able to fully process their emotions as soundly as adults. Kids may not recognize that a sibling is not a threat; as a result, they may act out reactively instead of thinking and choosing a more productive way of behaving. According to Dr. Gail Gross, a researcher and educator with a Ph.D. in Psychology, competitive or aggressive behavior could set the course for a lifetime of negative patterns, influencing a child's relationships with their siblings or other significant friends or even future romantic interests when they come of age.

Parents can take proactive approach-

es to prevent sibling rivalries from developing between their children.

- Encourage friendship before birth. Older children should become acquainted with the new baby before he or she arrives and be included in the process of welcoming him or her. Parents also can relive the older child's babyhood, offers childcare expert Dr. Sears. Show older brothers or sisters what they looked like as infants and how life changed for the better. Assign older children key roles in the family, such as a mother or father's assistant. This way he or she is taking an active part in helping the family run smoothly.

- Consider spacing children three to four years apart. By spacing siblings apart by three or four years, parents may find that one child is ready for more independence while the new baby will require more constant care. This also may alleviate some stress in the household because the older child can be an important helper.

- Make sure kids have their own unique belongings. Each child can have their own personal toys and possessions that they hold dear. They can choose to share these with one another in play areas, but they should not be forced to compete over particular items.

- Don't compare children in front of them. Children may interpret comparison as criticism. Children will not reach milestones at the same time, and parents should not compare their kids'



progress, or lack thereof, in front of the youngsters.

- Let kids work disagreements out. Children will have arguments, and parents should try not to take sides. Let kids work disagreements out on their

own when possible.

Sibling rivalries can develop, but parents can take steps to ensure such rivalries do not affect their kids' long-term relationships with one another.

Productive ways to spend the summer after graduation

Graduation is a momentous day in the lives of college students. After years of schooling that dates all the way back to preschool or kindergarten, newly minted college graduates are finally ready to begin their professional lives.

That can be a scary prospect for some students, especially those who graduate without jobs lined up. The summer after graduating from college can be a time like no other in the lives of new graduates. It can be easy to grow dejected as weeks or months go by without receiving a job offer. But spending the summer after graduation as productively as possible can help graduates overcome any dejection they might feel and increase their chances of landing a job.

- Contact career services offices at your alma mater. Career services offices can help recent graduates as they look for their first jobs out of college. Such offices may have access to job and internship opportunities that grads do not. In addition, they may coach grads on interviewing techniques and on ways to stand out in crowded job markets.

- Seek internships. If part- or full-time employment is proving elusive, don't be afraid to seek and ultimately accept internships, which can provide a way for grads to get their foot in the doors in certain industries. Summer internships may already be filled, so scour job boards for fall or winter internships.

- Start networking. Students who interned can get in touch with their past supervisors or mentors and

find out if the company is hiring. Such people may be more inclined to bring someone with direct experience onboard — even if that experience was brief and unpaid. In addition, grads can connect with adjunct professors who work in their desired fields.

- When job hunting, don't get pigeon-holed by your major. Just because a student graduates with a particular degree does not mean he or she needs to look for work in that field. In fact, many companies may prefer entry-level applicants with degrees that are not specific to their industries so their new hires are blank slates who can be easily trained.

- Attend job fairs. While other graduates may be taking the summer off, enterprising grads looking for work should attend as many job fairs as possible. Graduates likely won't leave job fairs with employment offers in hand, but job fairs are a great way for grads to meet hiring managers and submit their résumés to potential employers.

- Customize a résumé for every job. Be sure the curriculum vitae is not static. Write and refine résumés for each job you apply for, mildly tweaking the wording or accomplishments to address the key phrases used in the job listing.

It can be tempting for recent college grads to spend the summers after graduation relaxing, but those who spend that time productively may land jobs more quickly than those who do not.
