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Drury Square zoning project gets boost

AUBURN – Just before the New Year began, an Auburn planning project got a boost as the state approved more grant funding to continue the effort to rezone Drury Square as a “village” district.

The effort, which has been in process for well over a year, is being largely coordinated by the Central Mass Regional Planning Commission. According to CMRPC’s Chris Ryan, this year’s funding of about \$13,000 should be enough to develop existing concepts into a full-fledged zoning bylaw and “work with the town to explain it to the public” so that it can go to Town Meeting either this fall or in spring 2019.

“We knew that, with limited funding, we could only take small bites at it. That put us in a position to have to phase the work,” Ryan said of why it’s been slow going.

The concept isn’t really new to Auburn. A version was narrowly defeated at Town Meeting a few years ago, and

a key part of that defeat was a failure to explain it well. Nor is it new to the state. Ryan noted Massachusetts devised model regulations in the mid-2000s, and CMRPC is now trying to improve upon them with work in Auburn and elsewhere.

Such proposals, like most zoning, tend to be technically complex and fairly jargon-filled, and zoning has to leap a high hurdle to get approval.

“A two-thirds majority is significant, and if there’s any skepticism, it can be very difficult to get it passed,” he noted.

In this case, the plan calls for creating a district in which current property owners would be allowed to continue what they’re doing, but with a goal of pushing things toward denser multiple uses. As it is now, that part of town is very car-centered, with large swaths of the available land used for parking lots that are typically laid out between the road and the buildings. One key goal of village zoning is to change that

Where being benched is a good thing

AUBURN — In elementary school, Steve Marshall knew what it felt like to be left out. So he’s trying to do something to help today’s younger kids make friends more easily.

The Auburn High senior is building a series of “Buddy Benches” for the playgrounds at Swanson Road, Pakachoag and Bryn Mawr schools as his Eagle Scout project.

“If students see someone sitting there, they know they want companionship,” Marshall

said. “Those kids can then take them into their friend group. It helps kids build friendships.”

He said the benches weren’t his first choice of an Eagle project. Originally, he wanted to do something on recycling, but when that fell through, his troop leader suggested this instead.

Dr. Elizabeth Lopez, principal at Swanson, said she doesn’t yet know where it will go, but

Frost surpasses 6,000 consecutive roll call votes in 21st year

BOSTON — State Representative Paul K. Frost (R-Auburn) has maintained a perfect voting record through the first half of the 2017-18 legislative session, participating in all 305 roll call votes cast in the House of Representatives in 2017. Frost, currently serving in his 11th term, has not missed a single vote since taking office in 1997. The Auburn Republican, appointed as an Assistant Minority Leader Whip in 2015, has extended his total consecutive roll call votes to 6,171; one of the longest streaks of active House members and second only to House Minority Leader Brad Jones. Frost cast votes on a number

of prominent legislative actions signed into law over the past year, including the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act, which requires employers to provide reasonable workplace accommodations for expectant and nursing mothers. He backed the efforts to reimburse cities and towns for the costs associated with implementing the state’s early voting law during the November 2016 election cycle, and supported the proposal to double the one-time survivor benefits paid to the families of police, firefighters and other first responders killed in the line of duty.

Baker is running...but no official statement made

Governor Charlie Baker has made it clear he’s running for a second term this year though there’s no scheduled date for an official candidacy announcement.

Baker revealed on Twitter just before

Christmas he will keep Lieutenant Governor Karyn Polito as his running mate.

“We’ve accomplished a lot together but there’s more work to do,” the governor tweeted.

Jim Conroy, one of Baker’s senior aides, said, “the governor and lieutenant governor remain focused on the bipartisan work they were elected to do,” but declined to set a specific date for the ticket to enter the race.

Though Democrats hold a statewide registration edge and hold both US Senate seats as well as all House of Representative seats, the Republican governor has remained popular across all demographics since his

narrow (48%-46%) 2014 victory over Attorney General Martha Coakely. Baker has often distanced himself from President Donald Trump on a number of issues including health care, where he opposed the failed effort to ‘repeal’ the Affordable Care Act and the Administration’s efforts on immigration policy. The governor has gotten high marks as well from Democratic legislators on Beacon Hill.

Baker’s strength is dramatized by the lack of big-name Democrats such as Attorney General Maura Healey to show any interest in challenging him. The same goes for the state’s entire congressional delegation. Former Newton Mayor Setti Warren has entered the

race and even made one trip to this region last fall, as have Jay Gonzalez, a member of former Governor Deval Patrick’s cabinet and entrepreneur Bob Massie. Salem Mayor Kim Driscoll and former MBTA general manager Richard Davey have indicated they’re considering the race.

The primary election is set for Sept. 4, the day after Labor Day. Traditionally held later in the month, Secretary of State Bill Galvin said the date was moved as to not coincide with the Jewish High Holidays. He’s also asking the legislature to approve five days of early primary voting as is the case in the general election.

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Online RMV may be best

Not crazy about driving to do business with the Registry of Motor Vehicles? If that's the case, you'll like this — the agency is moving to expand online access for some transactions.

For example, customers will now be able to renew licenses or ID cards online for two consecutive renewal periods. Additionally, customers will be able to use the same license picture for 14 years rather than nine, which means some 30,000 more renewals can be transacted online every month.

"The Registry is pleased to offer these helpful enhancements to service options available to our customers,"

said RMV's Erin Deveney, adding, we encourage customers to conveniently renew their driver's license or Mass ID card online if they are eligible to do so, saving a trip to a service center."

Deveney speculated the changes will make in-person visits to service centers less of a hassle and assure the centers will run more efficiently.

Under the new rules, licenses and ID cards will need to be renewed in-person at an RMV center or AAA offices (for members) every third renewal period, or once every 15 years.

The new rules stipulate that eligibility for online renewal must meet the criteria of having a license or ID card less than 14 years old and taken after

following the customer's 21st birthday. "This is positive for everyone," said Deveney.

Starting March 28, the RMV will also be changing the way driver's licenses and ID cards can be acquired and renewed. That's the day the Registry will start issuing licenses and ID cards which will meet federal standards to be REAL ID compliant.

Massachusetts residents won't need those REAL ID cards until October 2020 and even then only to board planes or enter a US government building under pending new federal rules.

by encouraging redevelopment much closer to the sidewalk, putting more things on a single parcel (greater density), promoting shared parking lots, and making it easier and more pleasant to walk around the area, among other things. Also, instead of having buildings that are all-commercial or all-residential, one goal is to encourage "mixed use" parcels — typically, apartments above commercial spaces, as were very common in most of our downtowns before suburbia came into being.

The last time this issue

came before the Planning Board in early December, Chairman Ron Brooks noted the changes won't be forced on people, even if Town Meeting approve them.

"In no way will anyone who exists there now ever be thrown out if we get a different zoning change," he said. "They'll be existing non-conforming [uses] and can remain there forever if they want to."

Ryan said the principle is to have the new rules be "significantly different enough that the profit in and of itself will drive the development" and encourage owners to change what now exists. Parking is a key part

of that: he added many current lots "are built for the lowest common denominator, Christmas eve or Black Friday, but you often don't see it full even then."


Back in December, CMRPC's Jeff Bagg told the Planning Board one existing parcel is a fairly good template for how the entire area could operate if the new rules end up being widely used: the Pizza Chef property. With that building, parking is behind the business, which is built right to the sidewalk and even has a few outdoor tables for good weather use. His preliminary designs have also depicted improvements to the area's

large publicly-owned areas (the high school, library, fire station and pond) to interconnect them with walking trails and other amenities, such as boats on the pond.

Ryan said CMRPC has until June 2019 to finish any work connected with this grant.

"We're really excited about working with Auburn. This is an area with a great deal of promise, and [rezoning] could be a spark for further great things happening in that part of town," he said.

likes the idea. Speaking on behalf of all three principals, she noted Marshall raised it with the superintendent, then emailed the three principals, but hasn't yet met with them to work out the details.

"We're always looking for ways to support all our students physically, socially and emotionally," she said, noting she sees these benches as another place "for kids to congregate and make friends."


The bench can open discussions and sensitize a school community to issues such as shyness, loneliness, peer rejection[and] bullying according to medical sources such as Psychology Today.

That's pretty much exactly what Marshall hopes to achieve.

"Bullying affects a lot of people, and this will help stop them," he said. To him, the benches, and the more inclusive attitude behind them, are "something our community definitely needs."

Marshall noted he didn't have a lot of friends when younger. In eighth grade, one of them invited him to participate in an assembly on bullying, and he accepted. That experience stuck with him, ultimately planting the seed for this project.

Like most Eagle proj-

ects, he expects this to be "very long," and he's adding a feature some Buddy Benches don't have — he's erecting a library box next to each one, to give bench-users something to read, if they so desire. That concept also has long roots, being inspired in part by the "Little Free Libraries" that have popped up in various places in recent years, often people's front yards. They work this way: People put up small containers housing books they're willing to give away, others take them and later return with a replacement book, often getting into friend-

ly conversations in the process.

Lopez likes that, too, saying they'll be "sustained by the students in the building" while being "open to the whole community."

Marshall said he has already rounded up people to help, is contacting Home Depot for supplies, has a commitment from a couple small businesses for others, and has done the paperwork for it to be approved by the troop council. Once it is, he intends to start building in early March, and has until July 2, his 18th birthday, to finish their installation.

Do Social Security benefits get taxed?

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How do I get my offer accepted?

I know I have written about this subject before and that is because the market every month continues to get more positive in Real Estate. The days of offer keeps decreasing and the price increasing in most areas. If you want to get your offer accepted in this competitive environment then you have to get creative. You need to ensure that your offer stands out from all of the other offers. Here are some

ways to have your offer win over the others
Higher Earnest Money – This will show you are more serious. Instead of giving a \$500 or \$1000 deposit with the offer you can give a \$5000 or \$10000 deposit. Then instead of putting 3-5% down when the Purchase and Sale agreement is signed you could put 10% down.

Egg regs could keep them out of baskets

In 2016 Massachusetts voters approved banning the sale of eggs from farm animals who were restricted to cages and consumer groups hailed the result. That proposal, which was supported by an overwhelming 77-percent of voters, requires that only cage-free eggs be sold in the state by 2022, irrespective of where they were produced.
 13 states though (none in New England) didn't think much of that and filed suit with the Supreme Court,

arguing such a ban is unconstitutional. Indiana is the chief plaintiff but Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas, Utah, West Virginia and Wisconsin are co-plaintiffs.
 Massachusetts Attorney General Maura Healey's office acknowledged it has received notice but declined to comment.
 The suit claims Massachusetts is trying to establish its own regulatory standards on farmers in other states, thus violating the Constitution's commerce

clause and insists farmers "will have to increase their production costs by decreasing flock of herd size, investing in new infrastructure and undertaking contentious zoning approval processes. If they do not", the suit adds, "they must forgo completely any sales in Massachusetts or to national distributors that may resell products in Massachusetts".
 Paul Shapiro is vice-president for policy of the Humane Society of the United States and said those 13 states are "grasping at straws."
 "Massachusetts has an interest in

protecting its consumers from inhumane and substandard production of eggs."
 He added the state is "applying an even standard by requiring the same condition for housing animals at its own farms."
 State law defines an overly restrictive cage "as one which would prevent an egg-laying hen, breeding pig, or calf raised for veal from standing up, turning around or fully extending its limbs." Many animal protection groups backed the measure.

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


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

Any student who will be graduating in the class of 2018 and lives in Auburn is eligible. Recipients will receive up to \$1,500 toward tuition and other educational expenses at an accredited college, university, vocational or technical school.

The SYF community scholarship program is one facet of the Simon Supports Education initiative, launched earlier this spring at all Simon properties. As part of this initiative, visitors at Simon centers can now purchase SYF Simon VISA gift cards, redeemable wherever

The Blackstone River in Blackstone was giving up some large pike during the fall season of 2017. With the snow free shoreline along the Blackstone River, some anglers are taking their rod & reel to fish for pike and trout. The state of Rhode Island also stocks trout annually in the Blackstone from the Woonsocket line south. The Blackstone River was also stocked in Massachusetts at Tri-River approximately 10 years ago by this writer's fly fishing class that was held annually at the at the Uxbridge High School. More than \$500 worth of rainbow trout and brown trout were stocked which was raised by the group. Hopefully, another group of anglers,

or the Mass Fish & Wildlife will start to stock trout in the Blackstone River soon. The water has cleared up substantially over the years with the help of numerous organizations, including the Blackstone River Watershed Association!

268 black bear were harvested in Massachusetts in 2017, which was a bit shy of the 2016 count of 287 in 2016. 119 bear were harvested in Berkshire County, 65 Franklin, 36 Hampden, 38 Hampshire, & 9 in Worcester County.

The preliminary 2017 deer harvest figures are as follows: 109 deer were harvested during the youth hunt, four during the paraplegic hunt, 5,095 during archery, 4,766 during the shotgun, 3,519 during the primitive arms hunt.

It should be noted that the archery season had a substantially larger number of deer harvested than the shotgun

season. With all of the high tech bows on the market today accuracy is much better, resulting in more deer being shot and retrieved. Hopefully the state will finalize the crossbow and Sunday hunting bills this year. All surrounding states have them. Sportsmen deserve no less. They are waiting!!



Safely manage insects on indoor plants

Aphids, a common pest of indoor and outdoor plants, suck plant juices, causing leaves to yellow, brown, wilt or become distorted.

Winter can be hard on gardeners and our indoor plants. Low light, shorter days and dry air stress our houseplants while helping insects thrive. Don't despair if insects have moved in and your plants are struggling with yellow or speckled leaves. Instead, invest a bit of time and effort managing these pests and keeping your plants looking their best.

Start by making sure your plants receive the proper amount of light and water. A healthy plant is better able to resist and recover from insect infestations. Check the plant tag, internet or plant book for the recommended growing conditions.

Make needed adjustments in your plant's care. Then take a closer look at the upper and lower leaf surfaces and stems of the plants for clues to the cause of the problem. Here are some of the more common indoor plant pests and organic options, safe for children and pets, for managing them.

Fungus gnats are those small fruit

fly-like insects that flit around your house. They feed on plant roots and organic matter in the soil. They usually don't harm the plants, but certainly are annoying.

Just sprinkle an organic insecticide like Summit Mosquito Bits, that contain the active ingredient Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis on the soil surface. This naturally occurring bacterium only kills the larvae of fungus gnats, black flies and mosquitoes.

Aphids are common pests of indoor and outdoor plants. These small teardrop shaped insects suck plant juices, causing the leaves to yellow, brown, wilt or become distorted. They secrete

a clear sticky substance known as honeydew.

Mites cause similar damage, but are too small to see without a hand lens. If you suspect mites, shake a leaf over a white piece of paper and watch for specks, the mites, moving across the paper. Don't wait until you see webbing to control these pests. At that point, there are thousands of mites making it difficult to control.

Both these types of pests can be managed in the same way. Start by placing plants in the sink or tub and knock the insects off the plant with a strong blast of water. Follow with several applications of insecticidal soap to kill the adults. Repeat as needed. Or suffocate all stages of the insects with a lightweight horticulture oil like Summit Year-Round Spray Oil (SummitResponsibleSolutions.com).

Bumps on the stems and leaves of plants that can be easily scraped off with a thumbnail are scales. Their shells protect the adults and eggs from predators, weather and most insecticides. A similar pest, mealybug, has white waxy strands on its body for protection. Mealybugs can be found on stems, leaves and area where leaves and stems meet.

Both types of insects suck the plant juices, causing leaves to yellow and plants to decline. And just like aphids and mites, they secrete honeydew. Both are difficult to control and require per-

sistence on your part.

For mealybugs, remove the hard scale covering with your thumbnail or old toothbrush. Use a cotton swap dipped in alcohol to dissolve its waxy covering and kill the insect. Then spray with insecticidal soap to kill the immature insects. This takes time and persistence to control these pests.

Or apply a lightweight horticulture oil, like that used for mites and aphids, to suffocate both the adult and immature stages of these pests. Continue to watch for outbreaks and treat as needed.

No matter what products you choose, natural or synthetic, make sure they are labeled for the plant and pest you are treating. And always read and follow label directions carefully.

Investing time in managing pests as soon as they appear means healthy and more attractive plants to brighten your indoor décor now and for years to come.

The last one to leave...turn off the lights

And if there were already people there, when they arrived, they either made friends and inter-married or fought with them. Eventually, once Europe had fought their way back and forth over their own land several times, conquered the African and Asian nations back and forth a bit (or been largely ignored by the Asian nations who were just happy to not be invaded thank you very much, we'll just do a little trading with you, now go away); hardy sailors found out wow, there's another big chunk of land, or a couple of them, over...there.

And so the Americas became a target. Too bad there were already people there. They didn't count. Still don't.

Business Matters going into budget season

As we transition from the fall into the winter months, the Auburn School District turns its attention to budget season, making plans for the approach of the next school year. In Auburn, we start the budget a bit earlier than many other area districts as we must recommend a number to the Town Manager by early January for review and support from the Board of Selectman and the Finance Committee. The process begins with guidance from the School Committee on what they recommend for budget priorities and then the District Leadership Team works to ensure that these priorities are met at each of our school buildings.

For the Fiscal Year 2019 budget, the priorities established are as follows: student safety, student achievement, class size, technology, textbooks, professional development, strategic plan implementation and educator evaluation. The District Leadership Team works in conjunction with the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent to make sure the budget being built encompasses and speaks to these specific areas. The approach is collaborative, with each administrator bringing forward their own specific needs while being cognizant of the most pressing needs of the District, to realize continued success and growth. The Auburn School Committee and Leadership Team are thankful for the support they receive from the Town, including Town Departments and Boards, but also the support of the community at Town Meeting and at other times throughout the year.

The budget is built to support Auburn's students, but it is done in a fiscally prudent way, striving to offset costs in the budget to ease the burden to the taxpayers of Auburn. Therefore the final budget usually reflects a minimal percentage increase from year to year with the major driving forces being the cost of personnel with regard to contractual obligations and the unforeseen needs associated with mandated special education costs.

As the budget is developed, the total budget reflects a much higher amount than what is actually voted at Town Meeting. The rationale for this is that as the School Committee and Leadership Team scrutinize the proposed budget lines, discussions are had and decisions are made as to how funding can be used to offset the bottom line budget request. These offsets are the utilization of funds under the school department's control which can be used for various needs in the budget. The funds used are: revolving accounts, grants, Town allocated Medicaid funds, governmental funds such as Circuit Breaker and funds from the School Choice account. Funds from those aforementioned

accounts must be utilized for the specific purpose outlined upon establishment. For example, building rental account funds are used to offset utility lines; busing fees are used to offset costs for regular transportation; Preschool tuition funds

are used to offset salaries and supplies needed for the Preschool programs; and Satellite and Galaxy tuitions offset salaries and supplies needed for those specific programs. Grants offset various budget lines relating to how the grant is written and can encompass the following areas: salaries, contractual services, tuitions, transportation, supplies and materials. Use of these grant offsets must coincide with the specific purpose of the grant awards and are monitored closely by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. Medicaid funds allocated annually at Town Meeting are utilized for special education costs incurred by the District, often assisting with the cost of transportation, contracted services for students and special needs equipment/supplies required by specific students within the district. Circuit Breaker funds are received by the District for use in special education such as: out of district tuitions, special education staffing and services. However, circuit breaker funds may not offset the costs of transportation. Lastly, school choice funds received by the District are used to provide for offsets to areas where school choice students are being educated. In Auburn we have school choice offerings at Auburn High and Auburn Middle School. Often school choice funds cover salaries of teaching staff, assist with costs associated with athletic staff, as well as technology and professional development needs affecting both AHS and AMS students and staff.

The above offsets are key in keeping increases throughout the budget at minimal levels. The total budget, to include offsets, is approved by School Committee and then submitted to the Town for recommendations from the Town Boards. Every effort is made at the District level to meet the needs of a growing student body within the Town of Auburn, while working to lessen the financial impact to the Town's taxpayers. At the end of the day, "WE ARE AUBURN" and very proud of our academic achievements, athletic successes and our community involvement!

Time for your pre-retiree checklist?

Like everyone, you want to enjoy a comfortable lifestyle when you retire. But a successful retirement doesn't just happen – it requires a lot of planning. And that's why it's a good idea to draw up a "pre-retiree checklist."

—Two years before retirement: This close to retirement, you'll want to pay particularly close attention to health-care expenses, so you may want to investigate Medicare supplemental policies. You'll also want to ensure that you have an adequate emergency fund to cope with unexpected costs, such as major home repairs. In addition, you'll want to think about whether you should take Social Security right away or if you can afford to wait until your monthly checks will be bigger.

—One year before retirement: Now it's time for some key decisions: How much can you withdraw each year from your 401(k), IRA and other retirement accounts without running the risk of outliving your money? Have you lined up your health care coverage? And, finally, are you really set on retiring in a year or could you delay retirement to improve your financial picture?

This checklist isn't exhaustive – but it can give you a good idea of the various issues you'll need to consider on the long road to retirement. And the sooner you start planning for that journey, the better.

We want citizens who know how to maintain healthy skepticism and wariness about elected officials, and who have the knowledge and confidence to hold them accountable.

But there are also steps we need our lawmakers to take.

Partisan gerrymandering has become a scandal; competitive congressional districts drawn to represent the population fairly are vital to our future. Similarly, we have to expand voter participation and fight efforts to repress votes; lower participation empowers the extremes in politics, and it's hurting our country. And we need to make it easier for third parties to

during the cold and flu season. As a bonus, the natural, herbal gargle tastes great.

* Medical studies reveal green and black teas take center stage when it comes to boosting the immune system. Test-tube studies also suggest that the flavonoids in tea may have more antioxidant activity than certain better-known antioxidants like vitamins C and E.

*According to researchers at the University of Geneva in Switzerland, green tea is packed with caffeine and catechin polyphenols, substances proven to speed up the body's calorie-burning ability. A study they performed showed drinking three cups of the Ancient Japanese cure per day can rev up your metabolism as much as an average man walking 17 minutes!

*Research reveals green and black tea contain fluoride and polyphenols that prevent plaque from sticking to your teeth. Studies show tea decreases the activity of the oral enzyme amylase, which is responsible for breaking

break into the system; people are losing confidence in the two parties and we need to open up the system to new participants.

Greater transparency from those in power or those seeking to influence those in power truly matters. Disclosure of campaign donations, disclosure of foreign money's track through our political system, disclosure of special-interest spending, identifying the people who make contributions to secretive political committees, details about financial conflicts of interest — all of this should be a habit in any self-respecting representative democracy. Extensive disclosure needs to be required by law, and backed up with the resources to enforce the law.

On Capitol Hill, members need to fund and then rely on independent sources of information they can trust, rather than special interests who too often lay down their own interpretation of the facts as a legislative foundation. And they need to return to the traditional processes of gathering expert testimony through congressional hearings.

And perhaps more than anything, Congress needs to revitalize the institution itself — by energizing the traditional committee structure and practices, giving up its ridiculous habit of enacting budgets through omnibus bills, and no longer allowing major legislation to be put together by a few leadership staff behind closed doors — and restore its power vis-à-vis the president.

This is where you come in. The changes I'm advocating

will not come about without citizen action. Our lawmakers have become fixated on their re-election and too comfortable with the status quo they and their predecessors have built in recent decades. We have to hold politicians to the highest ethical standards, and have them come up with serious proposals to fix the system. Without that, the loss of faith in our process and our institutions that all of us lament will be almost impossible to reverse.

Early 18-0 run helps Warriors fend off Auburn

STURBRIDGE — A strong start provided by a balanced offensive attack boosted the Tantasqua Regional boys' varsity basketball team to victory over Auburn High, 71-55, in a matchup played Friday, Jan. 19 at the district's middle school.

"We want to come out with as much energy as we can so we can

get teams back on their heels, and if we can do that with our big guys and speed on offense we can score a lot of points," expressed Warriors' head coach Tom O'Neil. "We did that early and defensively we were great."

Early on it looked like Auburn was going to give Tantasqua all they could handle after scoring the first three points of the game after a layup

by Matty Backlin and a bucket from the charity stripe by Craigon Confer, but after a 3-pointer by Tantasqua's Chase Freeland to tie it at 3-3, the Warriors gained all of the momentum.

Tantasqua employed a full-court press defense to create havoc and, in turn, score many easy points en route to an 18-0 run to surge ahead, 18-3.

"We have been emphasizing pressure a lot this year, defensively. It starts energy-wise, if we can come out and double-team and press, get some steals and get our offense going it puts teams on their heels," expressed O'Neil. "Our 2-3 zone if we do it right we trap like crazy and don't give up a lot of 3-point shots and it worked early on."

The Rockets knew coming into the game that the Warriors were going to come out aggressive on the defensive end and it forced them out of their comfort zone, but it didn't take all of the fight out of an Auburn team who is down to an eight-player roster.

"We didn't make the decisions that we talked about making consistently and I think that was the key to them in terms of jumping out on us," expressed Auburn head coach Andrew Niedzwiecki. "It is a learning experience for our group and I think we can build off this and move forward in hopes for more wins."

Justin Skaparas ended the first quarter on a high note for the Rockets via a 3-pointer and showed that they were not going to give up. Auburn nearly played even with Tantasqua the rest of the way.

"We are down to eight guys, but these eight are battling hard. In turns of the slow start, I think we gain confidence as we play. We aren't really a young team, but we are especially with the numbers we have right now so I think that plays a role. We almost wait for our offense to kick in before we really defend rather than having it the other way around, so I think

that was key," stated Niedzwiecki. "Tantasqua jumped out on us, but I am proud of the guys. We kept battling and made it a game; hopefully we can build off this and move forward."

Skaparas kept the hot shooting hand and got the Rockets on the board first in the second quarter, and for the rest of the period both teams matched one another. Jackson Hall, who added 10 points for the Warriors, hit back-to-back 3's to extend the lead, but moments later Tyler Judice hit consecutive 3-pointers of his own for Auburn. Judice had a team-high 13 points for the Rockets.

Auburn had their best quarter of the game, outscoring Tantasqua 21-19 to go into halftime with their heads high only down 37-27. Three-point shooting was a big reason for the Rockets' success.

"There is a lot of practices where we shoot 70 3's each, so it is a focal point of what we are trying to do, but we are priming to get the ones where we get the ball in and then out," said Niedzwiecki. "We did a much better job of that tonight in terms offensively, but the slow start kind of did us in."

The Warriors now found themselves in a battle during the second half of play.

"We kind of stepped back and thought we were going to win the game because we played so well in the first eight to 10 minutes of the game, we back off and Auburn didn't give up and started to make shots," explained O'Neil. "I told my team, when a team gets confidence they aren't going to want to give up and they aren't going to back down from you. That is what happened, Auburn kept bouncing back and hitting shots. They took our 15-18 point lead down to 10 and then they stayed right there the entire game."

The second half was similar to the second quarter. Each team went punch for punch, but Tantasqua was able to keep the lead. Evan Couture scored a

team-high 19-points and Hayden Peterson added 15. Both were huge down the stretch.

our best shooter is Drew Peretti, but he wasn't feeling it tonight so other kids got involved, Couture went to the rim like he does and scored a lot of points, Hayden was big inside, Jackson Hall hit a bunch of 3's, which is good to see from him, and other guys were hitting their shots. We take the shot when we are open."

AUBURN — Earlier in the season the Auburn/Shepherd Hill/Tantasqua/Millbury boys' varsity co-op ice hockey team suffered a close 3-2 setback to Westborough High. But, when the two met again in a Quinn Conference rematch at the Horgan Arena on Wednesday, Jan. 17, the Rockets made quick work of the Rangers, scoring four first period goals en route to a 5-1 victory.

"It's about time," Auburn head coach Glen Bombard chuckled afterward. "The last three games the first period's been a big downfall for us. They just came out and took care of their business quick."

The win lifted the Rockets' record to 6-4-1, while Westborough slid to 5-4-2.

Auburn's first goal came just 1:42 into the contest. Adam Lanier collected the puck just inside the Rangers' blue

The Rockets — and Lanier — weren't done there, though. At 10:46 of the period Lanier scored his second goal of the game. Mackin crossed the blue line with possession of the puck and made a nice pass over to Lanier, who then went backhand to score past sprawling Schiffman.

"I saw the defenseman go over and I thought it'd be perfect," Lanier said of the developing play. "[Mackin] put it right on my stick flat — a nice saucer [pass] — and I saw the goalie go down and try to spread across the whole bottom of the net, so I just took it to my backhand because it's easier to roof it that way."

"Adam Lanier had a huge night for us with those two big goals," added Bombard. "They were good, quality goals."

"Those are backbreakers," Bombard said of his team's fourth goal. "That was the nail in the coffin. You could see the sails come out of them a little after that."

Auburn has now won two straight after losing three in a row.

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

- 1/2 cup chicken stock
- 3/4 cup heavy cream
- 1/2 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 tablespoon hot sauce
- 1/2 tablespoon Creole mustard
- 1 1/4 cup Cheese Wiz
- 8 ounces sharp cheddar cheese, shredded

1. Preheat the oven to 350 F. Grease a 2-quart baking dish.
2. Boil the macaroni in a 2-quart saucepan filled with water, until it is al dente, or still has some snap when you bite it. Strain the pasta and rinse thoroughly with cold water. Set aside.
3. Combine the remaining ingredients, except for the shredded cheese, in a medium saucepan over medium heat. The mixture should be barely simmering. Whisk periodically. Cook for 7 to 10 minutes.
4. In a large mixing bowl, combine the cheese sauce with the pasta and about one-third of the shredded cheese. Transfer to the baking dish, covering with the remaining shredded cheese, and bake covered for 10 minutes.
5. Uncover and bake for 15 minutes more, or until the top is golden brown.




