





Skimming devices found at banks

CUSTOMERS ALERTED, INVESTIGATION LAUNCHED

WEBSTER — Webster Five customers got an unpleasant surprise following the Aug. 13 and 14 weekend, after skimming devices were found to have compromised the debit accounts of ATM users at the bank's Webster and Dudley locations.

The situation was first brought to the public's

eye over social media, where multiple customers on Facebook posted warnings to their fellow Webster Five users that their accounts had been emptied and that information may have been stolen. Webster Five later confirmed the situation on their own Facebook page saying they were aware of the fraudulent activity and noted that they had

traced some of the activity back to Boston and New York City. The bank later released an official statement confirming these details and revealing that skimming devices were in fact used to steal card information from customers at the Dudley and Webster locations.


"We decided to bring it back to Central Massachusetts because that's where Shawna was from," said Shae. "It was the community

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

Elderbus adds 'Mobility Vehicle One' to lineup

The MV-1 was added to Elderbus' 21-vehicle fleet to help with their goal of providing cost effective transportation for 21 towns in central Massachusetts.

Local nonprofit South Central Massachusetts Elderbus added a new vehicle to its 21-vehicle fleet, the Mobility Vehicle One (MV-1).

The Worcester Regional Transit Authority awarded the vehicle in early June. The MV-1 can carry up to four clients at a time, including capacity for a wheelchair.

The big draw – and what made Executive Director Tim O'Day request the new vehicle – is the MV-1's increased efficiency. The vehicle gets 50 percent better gas mileage. The vehicle will primarily be used for longer trips to smaller towns, said O'Day, who noted that sometimes there are only two or three people taking round-trips in and out of Holland or Brimfield, which can be up to 35 miles one way.

"We are a private nonprofit, a 501c3, so every dollar counts," he noted. "We – like other organizations like us around the country – are always looking for ways to operate more efficiently."

On top of living up to its 50 percent better gas mileage claims, the MV-1 has had

very positive feedback. In the past two months they've received 75 surveys back, giving their initial reaction to the new vehicle. According to O'Day, 95 percent of the surveys came back positive.

He noted: "They loved it." Specific comments included "very comfortable and beautiful," "I love the new vehicle," "most enjoyable ride, I look forward to future trips," and "please get more of these vehicles."

For a little over 40 years, South Central Massachusetts Elderbus has been providing transportation for seniors and disabled residents of the 21 towns in Central Massachusetts for as little as \$1.25, with no restrictions on where residents are picked up or dropped off.

This past year alone, South Central Massachusetts Elderbus has provided over 46,000 trips. The bus users can request rides to the mall, grocery stores and even Dunkin' Donuts.

Said O'Day: "It allows people to maintain social contacts as well. Take them to the local senior center or council on aging. We take them on special trips to local shopping malls. We take people on a weekly basis to grocery

stores. Some of these towns don't even have a grocery store."

Many of the towns in Central Massachusetts don't have public transportation. While the bus provides trips to the mall and grocery store, one third of the trips are medical related – medical appointments, dialysis treatments, cancer treatments – as well as bringing people to their place of employment.

Said O'Day: "It's a very, very necessary service."

Many people that use the Elderbus services do not have their own personal car, either for medical reasons or even because of the cost of gas prices, which continue to increase. It's more economical to use this service, said O'Day, than use their own cars, especially when going from Brimfield to hospitals in Worcester.

According to O'Day, Elderbus will continue to evaluate the MV-1 over the next twelve months to better understand its impact on the overall operation. Based on the initial results pertaining to increased fuel efficiency and extremely positive customer feedback, the organization may seek

to acquire additional MV-1's in the future.

In honor of my son starting his first day of kindergarten next week, and the many tears of sadness that will be shed (by my wife, not me! OK...maybe a little bit me...) because our little boy is growing up, I couldn't help but reflect on my earliest memories of kindergarten.

It's especially interesting for me, because as I have noted in past columns, he is going to the same school as I went to for my entire K-8 experience. He'll walk the same halls, play on the same playground, and learn in the same classrooms as his father did before him all those years ago. There is something extremely cool about that, but also a little sobering, as it's been nearly 20 years now since I graduated from there.

May it also be time for them to also exam the Highway Division level funded budget of about \$1 million over the last nine years? Plus, has their ever been a review of the Highway Division's projected future needs as the town accepts more, and future roads from new private developments in town? Plus, state and

federal unfunded mandates, on present, future, Public Works infrastructures in cities in towns, also figured into their future needs?

Plus how much does its annual budget of \$1 million actually go to Public Works maintenance and future preventative maintenance, and future roadwork may also help in a potential inquiry?

Let's hope we may not learn from a potential significant storm, or a protracted rain event, and a homeowner may incur flood damage, that insurance companies may send out their adjusters and may say you may not be covered because town drainage culverts, and drainage maintenance pipes, have not been maintained for many years — which may have been a contributing factor to potential property owners water damage, and other possible property damage, near one's property from a such an event.

Here are a few suggestions: Don't jump off. This is pretty standard advice

The fieldwork of the dog had the people in attendance excited over the dog's ability to find and point the pheasant. The Douglas Fish & Game Club and the Wallum Lake Rod & Gun Club were well known for their field day activities that held bird dog trials at their annual events.

The Whitinsville Fish & Game Club had coon dog races at their field days that

brought dog handlers from as far away as Vermont and New Hampshire to compete in the annual event. People in attendance were allowed to bid on their favorite dog and the highest bid would allow the bidder the chance to win money on one race. The bids were auctioned off on each dog (often seven) for first dog to cross a line that was set up at half way across the pond, and then for the first dog to locate and spike the tree showing his owner were the raccoon was high up in the tree. At the start of the race the seven dogs were loaded into a gate similar to greyhound races and a live raccoon was placed on a small raft, which was slowly transported across the pond by a cable that was attached to the raft.

With the excited dogs barking at the raccoon the dogs were released from their starting gate and the race was on. As the dogs splashed into the water and were swimming after the raccoon, the raft was kept 20 or 30 feet in front of them as the dogs barked frantically in hot pursuit. The raft was quickly hoisted to a large pole with the raccoon sitting safely atop the pole 20 feet from the ground. These races drew a few hundred people to the races annually. Because of anti-hunting groups that protested the manner in which the raccoon was used, the club used a raccoon scented dummy that

worked just as well. Raccoon drags were also done to lay a trail through acres of woods for dogs to hunt for during the trials. Raccoon hunting was one of the top hunting sports in the Valley in the 60's up to the 80's and then as the area became built up, open land needed to hunt started to disappear and rabies started to infect the raccoon.

Back in those early days of hunting raccoon in the Valley, sportsmen donated the meat to the Whitinsville Fish & Game Club for their annual ham and coon suppers that were a complete sell out. Can you imagine trying to sell tickets to a ham and raccoon supper today? Those were the days! Murray Andrews and Dave Greeno were only a couple of coon hunters in the Valley back then.

The Singletary Rod & Gun Club also had great field days back 50 years ago ... and they still do. Although the attendance of the public is a bit smaller, which is the same for most rod and gun clubs today, their agenda has also changed. Sky divers and water skiing acrobats were once a big part of the Singletary Rod & Gun Club agenda for their annual field days, and a new car was raffled off each year. Trap shooting had hundreds of shooters in completion for top gun of the event. Things have changed a lot at most Rod & Gun Clubs but a

great day in the outdoors for the family is still enjoyed. The Singletary Rod & Gun Field Day is Aug. 28, this year and is open to the public. Great food, raffles and games will be available throughout the day with a live band providing music.

Many long time collectors have confided in me that they are consigning items because heirs may not appreciate their collections and their items may end up being thrown away. John Terrey will not have to worry about this. He has chosen to make the auction of his radio collection a celebration that he will share with friends he has met in the radio collecting community.

The Boston Globe profiled Mr. Terrey and the auction of his collection. John collected stamps when he was young. He developed an interest in technology though when his father brought home some crank telephones from his job at a South Texas oil company at a time phones were being upgraded. He and his friends would wire the telephones through the tress to their houses. John

would also wire the telephone microphones to the volume control of a radio and place the microphone where he could pick up conversations.

His interest in technology continued and he became a ham radio operator at the age of 14. He went on to earn a degree in electrical engineering at MIT. He took a position with defense contractor Raytheon after he graduated.

For 55 years he searched antique shops, shows, meets, flea markets as well as trading with other collectors. Another collector told John that he no longer wanted to run the "Antique Radio Classified" magazine. John took over and published it for 24 years. At its peak, it had over 10,000 subscribers. A new publisher now runs it as an online publication.

One of the roles of an auctioneer is to create buzz around our auction events. John's planning has made that part of my work much easier. He collected high quality pieces that are very desirable to collectors. He is an expert in the field and his knowledge is invaluable in properly identifying and describing the collection. His contacts from mailing copies of his magazine along with his

ability to connect with other collectors at shows and swap meet are all making sure that the collecting community is notified of the auction.

John wants this to be a celebration as he shares his collection with other collectors. The auction will be held under a tent at his home. He is inviting other collectors to preview his collection on a Saturday night while he offers a barbecue reception and spends time with fellow collectors. There is a radio meet in Pennsylvania the weekend of the auction and many collectors are expected to drive to Massachusetts from the show. We'll be offering online bidding to those who aren't able to attend. The live auction will be on Sunday, September 18th. John will be able to see the radios that he enjoyed end up in the hands of collectors who will appreciate them as much as he did. He will never have to worry that unappreciative heirs will throw his collection in a dumpster.

Harvesting tips for the vegetable garden

It's harvest time and backyard gardeners everywhere are anticipating the well-earned fruits of their labor. From plucking peppers to cutting cauliflower, harvesting plants at the correct time can ensure optimum flavor and nutrients.

Read on for the ways to up the odds of culling "the cream of the crop" from common vegetable and fruit plants.

Bush and Pole Beans: To ensure crisp, mature beans they should be picked when they are full size, but still slender. Once seeds are swollen in the pods they become tough. Frequent picking prevents tough, stringy beans. If possible, harvest daily or every other day. As a bonus, picking so often prompts the production of more beans!

Broccoli: Broccoli should be picked when the head is full size and buds are tightly shut. Cut the plant only about half way down the stalk. This encourages side shoots to produce. Harvesting broccoli when buds are tight prevents it from becoming tough and woody. Don't worry, the buds will open and bloom after picking.

FYI: Frequent watering prevents broccoli from developing a bitter taste.

Carrots: Carrots should be picked when the top of the vegetable below the stem are about three quarters of an inch around (if not visible, move soil to take a look). Harvest after they've turned a nice orange (or yellow depending upon variety) color. Pull a sample carrot up to test.

FYI: As a general rule, smaller, thinner carrots are sweeter.

Corn: Gauge corn for ripeness by inspecting the silk. The tops of the silk should be brown, but not dried out. Ears should have a nice rounded base. To check, peel back the husk and check for plump, even kernels.

FYI: For optimum flavor eat corn the same day it has been picked.

Cucumbers: Standard cucumbers should be full size, have a nice, dark green color and a smooth and glossy skin. Avoid keeping ripe cucumbers too long on the vine; as they grow bigger they can become seedy and bitter.

FYI: Cukes should be picked daily or every other day to prevent over mature vegetables.

Eggplant: Harvesting young, mature eggplant is the trick to a tasty pick. Eggplants should be full size, with a smooth and shiny skin. Fruit should be firm and heavy for its size. Pick eggplants when they have grown to size and are smooth and shiny. A ripe eggplant will spring back when skin is pressed lightly.

FYI: Clip mature eggplant off the vine; pulling can damage the delicate plants.

Lettuce: Lettuce should be picked early in the morning when leaves are crisp, before the sun beats down on the leaves. Head lettuce is ready for picking when it is about the size of a football, yields slightly to press, and leaves are strong and have a nice color.

To harvest leaf lettuce all season long, cut lettuce off, leaving about two inches intact. Pick only what you can use in a day or two as you can always come back for more!

For spring mix lettuce, cut

off leaves about an inch from stock. Be sure to leave the plant intact so you can pick more later. And harvest from the outside leaves to the inside, to ensure the freshest leaves.

FYI: Outermost leaves may be a little bitter; if so pick from the second row into the middle.

Onions: Bulb (or storage) onions are ready to be picked when the tops are turning brown and falling over. This occurs when the onion has stopped growing.

FYI: After picking, allow onion to dry, then cut off tops and trim roots.

Peas: Pick shelling peas in the morning when pods have rounded and peas are filling the pod. Pick daily or every other day to encourage more pea pods and ensure crisp texture.

Snap peas should be harvested when the pods are show rounded peas but are still flat. Pick before the peas are too big as they will be tough. You'll notice that the pods will not taste sugary enough if the pods are picked too early and flat.

FYI: Pods picked too early will not be sweet.

Pumpkins: Pumpkins should be harvested when they are a deep orange color with a hard rind, which will resist a thumbnail press. When picking, cut to leave a two to three inch stem on the fruit. After harvesting allow pumpkin to cure for about ten days in the sun or in a warm area (80 to 85 degrees).

FYI: Curing the picked pumpkin helps to harden the skin and heal cuts and blemishes.

Peppers: For maximum sweetness, sweet peppers

should show full color (orange, yellow, red or green, depending upon variety). Peppers should be fully formed, mature in size and firm. Chile peppers should be picked when mature and shiny green.

FYI: Some varieties of chile peppers they develop tiny stress stripes on the skin when are ready to be picked.

Squash and Zucchini: Experts differ on when the best time to pick summer squash. Some suggest it is ready to pick when it reaches four inches or less, while other sources advise picking at up to six inches. Pick summer squashes when skin has an even color, are firm but skin is tender enough to be easily pierced by a fingernail.

FYI: Summer squash can grow an inch a day during peak season so be sure to harvest frequently!

Spinach: With proper harvesting, spinach can produce a month or so. Pick or cut larger leaves of spinach when it's about six inches tall. Pick when plants have six or more plants.

FYI: Leave at least four leaves on plant to encourage more plant growth.

Tomatoes: Tomatoes are at peak flavor when they are a rich color and plump. The fruit should have an even, vibrant color, and yield slightly a bit to the touch. Skin should have a nice (not dull) finish. Ripe tomatoes will smell like a fresh tomato!

FYI: While tomatoes will get softer once picked, they will not get sweeter once off the vine.

Winter Squash: Pick winter squash when the rind is a deep, uniform color and are hard enough that they cannot easily be pierced with a fingernail. When cutting, leave a couple of inches on the stem. Allow to cure for ten days in the sun or warm room.

FYI: Winter squashes keep longer if they are fully ripe before picking.

How do I adopt a child from foster care?

To begin, call the Massachusetts Adoption Resource Exchange (MARE), for referrals to agencies in your area. A social worker will meet with you, then refer you for the Massachusetts Approach to Partnerships in Parenting (MAPP) training. After completing the MAPP course, you'll have meetings with a social worker who will conduct your "homestudy" to explore adoption possibilities with you and begin to match you with a waiting child. It's important to balance patience with persistence to make a match that will build a lifelong family.





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Making the most with what you've got

Sometimes my nightly dinner planning is like being on an episode of "Chopped." I haven't had time to go grocery shopping, in my insane day I forgot to pull anything out to defrost, and the kids are screaming they are going to die if they don't eat right this second!

Searching through my cabinets and fridge I honestly reflect on the show "Chopped," and truly feel for those contestants. The only difference is, they have to use certain ingredients and make the best out of them, I on the other hand have to get creative and if the ingredients don't work well together, I am the only one to blame and get the chore of picking up a cheap oily pizza. Well let's say "no" to cheap pizza! (besides, a comfort food, like pizza, should at least taste good and not make you feel sick after)

So picture this, my day got away from me completely, I

looked at the clock once and it was 6 a.m., next it was 12 hours later, my kids are hungry and cranky, and my husband was on his way home from work. I opened the fridge expecting to have something defrosted and there is nothing! In between the "Mommy, what can I eat? I'm hungry!" and "Just wait for dinner, I promise you won't starve to death." I glanced at my pantry of canned food and cringe. I'll find something! So I quick defrosted my one lone chicken breast, found a packet of dried cheesy garlic pasta, and pulled a can of the dreaded mustard greens I had been avoiding for months. I sautéed up the chicken with some balsamic vinegar, making a reduction and having it cut into bite size pieces I ended up with more than I thought. I cooked up the pasta, but doctored it with garlic and parmesan, seasoned it to make it tasty and not repulsive, and

drained the mustard greens of all liquid and put in a pot with some olive oil, salt and pepper, and a few dashes of crushed red pepper. And I put the stove to work. When all was cooked I added in some dried bacon bits to the mustard greens and voila, dinner was served. And I actually had my picky husband coming back for seconds!

So I asked a few people to tell us when they had a time they were in a "Chopped" situation; here is what they said:

"My hubby made a meatloaf when we were out of bread. He mixed in leftover refried beans, applesauce, and green beans and used the crumbs from the bottom of bags of chips, crackers and the broken off feet from animal crackers. I will admit, that the sweet chunks of animal feet were a bit strange, but the rest worked beautifully." - Carrie B.

"Only strange thing I've done

is taking ALL of our leftover dinners from the fridge and fried them up in a frying pan with butter of course. Looked like crap but it was always delicious. ... Usually included rice, beans, pork chops, corn, hot dogs and green beans ... Top with ketchup and dinner! My mom did this all the time. She hated wasting food that was never eaten in the fridge. My brother hated leftovers, but he ate that!" - Michelle B.

"My father in-law had come over and I hadn't planned anything out to cook, especially for company. So I thawed a package of hamburger meat, fried it with about half a package of sausage. I added in garlic cloves (2-3), an onion, a frozen chopped green pepper. When meat was done I drained and rinsed it all and then put it back in the skillet. Meanwhile I boiled pasta. When it was done I drained and rinsed it and then added mari-

nara sauce. When it was heated through I added my meat mixture and then put it in a baking dish, topped with parmesan (shredded not that powder stuff) and mozzarella and baked it just long enough to melt the cheeses. This is now one of our favorites, and I've given out the recipe to others who loved it as well." - Gwyn K.



Webster Five customers put on alert after possible scam

VP of Retail Administration for Webster Five, spoke with Stonebridge Press about the situation and said that the bank is working closely with customers and local law enforcement to resolve the situation.

"The way this crime typically works is the crooks will install the skimmers after we close the bank for the weekend. They'll put them on during a Saturday afternoon and then they'll come back and remove them before we reopen on Monday. So they're on for a very short duration. I would say it was probably a 24-hour thing," Radovanic said. "We're working closely with the police in Dudley and Webster in sharing our surveillance film. It's an active investigation. Our security team is certainly working with the

authorities on this."

Webster Police posted on Facebook that they were indeed aware of the situation and that an active investigation was underway to find those involved in the crime.

"It was discovered that some people have placed 'skimmers' on ATMs of at least two banks that we are aware of here," police said. "Several people have found to have hundreds, and in some cases, thousands, of dollars withdrawn from their accounts. We are currently working with the banks as well as the victims, but (customers) are encouraged to check their accounts not just today but regularly for fraudulent activity. Also when using an ATM, don't be afraid to visually and physically inspect the spot where you put your card."

Police provided a video with the post to show how to detect skimmers at ATMs

and what to look out for to avoid having card information compromised.

As of Monday, Aug. 15, Webster Five was in the process of reimbursing customers and working with the banks of Webster Five customers who used the ATMs to have those accounts properly handled as well.

"Our customers as well as other bank customers are protected. All customers will be fully refunded by their bank. We will work with our customers and other banks will work with theirs. Conversely the same thing happens if there is a compromise at another institution and our customers use their ATMs. We are responsible for our customers and it took a few days to understand where the compromise occurred," Radovanic said. "We're asking all customers to monitor their accounts. That's normal practice, but be extra vigilant and if they see any unau-

thorized transactions on their accounts to notify their banks immediately."

As of this report no suspect had been named in the crimes. Radovanic said that Webster Five is examining added security measures but, for obvious reasons, would not go into details on exactly what changes may be made.

"The crooks keep evolving their methods and their techniques and we have to continue to evolve and change our techniques as well for fraud detection," Radovanic said. "We are enhancing and updating and changing our fraud detection at our locations. There's a variety of methods that these crooks are using to get customer information and it's our job to stay on top of that."

art hanging on the wall. I talked with them about showing films there and the owner was completely into it."

Shawna, the couple's twin daughter, died in a car accident in 1999 at the age of 16. It was a huge trauma for the small town of Uxbridge. The town came together at the time and organized a walk for her. To continue the tradition, Shae founded a film festival, with the proceeds going towards scholarships to Uxbridge High School seniors in Shawna's name.

The film festival coming to Southbridge will be the fifth annual event. Starting with only around 25 films, the film festival has since grown to over 100 films, including filmmakers from all over the world. Horror, comedy, romance and everything in between will be at the film festival, which – while a great night out – will contain adult content and may not be suitable for children (common for independent films).

"We believe this is going to be a huge success," said Chinappi. "Southbridge is very unique area when it comes to the arts. They have the Art Center, which the owner of Starlite is on the board for. He's very invested in sustaining a really vibrant art community. It's an environment that really supports something like this. That's why we are really looking forward to this. It will be a first for Southbridge and the area

to have a three-day international film festival. We are pretty happy and excited about this. It all just evolved and worked out."

The growing popularity and support for the film festival comes as no surprise when you take into consideration that Shae is a well-known filmmaker. In 2005 Shae started a one-man show that dealt with various aspects of his life, including clergy sexual abuse, called "Catholic (Surviving Abuse & Other Dead End Roads)." The one-man show turned him to acting and then filmmaking and screenwriting. He recently completed his first feature, "Trinity," an official selection at the Hudson Valley International Film Festival.

But the Shawna Shea Film Festival will be more than just entertainment.

Said Chinappi: "We have a very unique program called the Women in Film Fellowship. It's by application, for first-time women filmmakers. We just want to support them. We want to give people a chance who normally wouldn't have one. It's what Shawna would do."

Last year's winner was Erica Chick, a photographer from Uxbridge who had always wanted to make a film. They loved her idea and gave her \$500, as well as mentorship from Shae and his colleagues in the film community. Her film will be showing at the film festival.

The couple is currently taking applications for next year's Women in Film Fellowship. Applications are open until Sept. 2.

Said Chinappi: "All of this would defi-

nately mean so much to Shawna."

The Shawna Shea Film Festival will be on Nov. 10, 11 and 12. For more information visit shawnasheaff.com.



Practice school bus safety every day

Millions of students rely on public transportation to get them to and from school each and every day. The National Safety Council says 25 million students in the United States begin and end their school days on school buses. The NCS adds that riding a bus to school is 13 times safer than riding in a family vehicle and 10 times safer than walking.

Although buses are designed for safety, student riders can do a lot to make their bus trips even safer.

- Stand only in the designated school bus stop. Always stand on the sidewalk, lawn or curb where the school bus stop is located. Stay away from the street because traffic in the morning and the afternoon can be very busy and hectic.

- Arrive at the stop early. Rushing to the bus stop may cause you to make errors in judgment, including running in traffic to catch the bus. Leave early so you have ample time to catch the bus and obey all traffic laws.

- Only board and exit the bus when it is safe. Wait for the bus to come to a complete stop before boarding or exiting. The driver will engage the stop sign

and put on the flashing red lights. Move around the bus only when it is stopped.

- Keep the aisles clear. Stay out of the aisle when the bus is in motion and store backpacks on your lap or under your seat so they are not tripping hazards.

- Use seat restraints. Use seat restraints when available on the school bus. While not every school bus has seatbelts, many now do.

- Stay in your seat. Remain in your seat while the bus is in motion. Keep your hands inside of the windows. Do not get up to engage with other riders.

- Keep a good distance between you and the bus. Exit the bus and cross in front where the driver can see you. If you cannot see the driver, he or she cannot see you. Check for safety signals from the driver to proceed when traffic has stopped. Always walk, never run, around a bus.

- Do not goof off. When on the bus, always behave so that you can hear any safety instructions and be aware of your surroundings. Behaving also means one less distraction for drivers.

Making The Grade: Getting High School Seniors Ready For College

Nearly 17 million high school seniors graduate each year, the U.S. Department of Education estimates, and many plan to attend college. But are they all really college-ready?

Data suggests the answer is a resounding "no." According to the 2015 "Condition of College & Career Readiness" report from American College Testing (ACT), 31 percent of the ACT-tested graduating class is not meeting any of the four subject benchmarks: reading, English, science and mathematics.

These low-readiness test scores coincide with college dropout figures that top 29 million, making the number of Americans who have dropped out of college greater than the number of American adults who have not obtained their high school degrees.

"While test scores provide a benchmark for high school seniors, college readiness is an important issue for everyone headed to college, whether they are a new high school graduate or an adult learner returning to the classroom," said Jennifer Fletcher, Ph.D., program dean for general education at University of Phoenix. "Being prepared for the challenge can help ensure students aren't forced to take remedial course work and are able to stay motivated and on top of their workloads, ultimately resulting in a successful collegiate experience."

The pressure to earn a college degree is higher than ever. The White House has set an ambitious goal of producing a higher share of college

graduates than any other nation by 2020. The plan is to return the United States to the top-ranked nation after dropping into twelfth place.

"More and more, employers are seeking college graduates for jobs that previously required a high school diploma or other subbaccalaureate training," Dr. Fletcher said. "For the nearly two-thirds of U.S. adults who do not have a bachelor's degree or higher, this can create barriers to career

growth, unless they are able to pursue higher education."

She offers the following advice to high school seniors and adult learners heading off to college:

- Use summer months to take courses in English and mathematics to refresh high school level skills. Courses can be taken at community colleges or via online professional development resources such as University of Phoenix's continuing education

programs, Udemy, StraighterLine and Lynda.com.

- Don't overburden your first semester course load. There are always opportunities to add courses deeper into your college career or over summer and winter intersessions.

- Team up with your college adviser your first semester. College advisers are available to discuss your goals and a graduation timeline and can offer guidance on

the best ways to manage coursework.

- Attend skills center sessions for assistance in coursework and free proofreading.

- Organize study groups with peers to work together on complex materials and to gain different perspectives to approaching assignments.

are all things students can access that affect student success. When you couple this with healthy organizational and study habits, students can improve their chances of having a positive academic journey.

Help kids get ready for fall sports season

active throughout the summer, make sure they don't overdo it, as you should emphasize the importance of rest.

- Gradually get back in the swing of things. While rest gives kids' bodies a chance to heal and develop, it's important that young athletes stay in shape over the summer. As the fall sports season draws near, help kids gradually get back in the swing of things. Tryouts

tend to be physically demanding, so kids who have not lifted a finger all summer may be at risk of injury or missing the cut. Let kids ease back into regular exercise to make sure they are not starting from scratch come their first tryout.

- Speak with coaches. Coaches can be great assets to parents who want to make sure their youngsters enjoy the summer without sacrificing
