Library forum to focus on end-of-life options

WEBSTER – Next Monday, one of the longer-running debates over social policy will be coming to Gladys E Kelly Library.

For decades, there’s been a slow push toward passage of Death with Dignity laws across the country, since Oregon passed the first one 22 years ago. At the same time, there’s been strong opposition, often from the Catholic Church and disability advocacy groups.

Such laws allow terminally ill people under very specific circumstances to be prescribed lethal doses of medication, which they must be able to administer themselves. A bill legalizing

such a possibility – H. 1926, The End of Life Options Act – has been before the Massachusetts Legislature annually for the last 10 years.

Ever since the bill had a public hearing in Boston June 25, John Berkowitz has been stumping around the state aiming to educate the public about it and field questions from both supporters and opponents. One of those events is Monday, Aug. 26 at 6:30 p.m., where he’ll speak alongside Dr. Lewis Cohen, a UMass psychiatry professor.

“It’s a controversial issue,” Berkowitz admits. “Is this ‘assisted suicide’ or is it ‘compassionate aid in dying?’”

Those two phrases are pretty much how the two sides frame it. But the

issue itself is fairly simple: Does a person have the right to end their own life when facing terminal, painful illness? Under what conditions? How would the process be protected from misuse and coercion?

Under H 1926, the process is fairly lengthy. The patient must ask for it from their doctor, then request it in writing at least 15 days later and get approval “by a licensed mental health professional.” It’s only open to those diagnosed with a terminal illness giving them six months or less to live “whether or not treatment is provided,” and specifically states people with guardians and those whose only issue is “age or disability” do not qualify to

participate. The written request must have two witnesses, at least one of which must not be a relative, heir, or employee of a long-term care facility in which the person lives, and neither can be the doctor. It can be rescinded “at any time ... without regard to the qualified patient’s mental state,” and the doctor writing the prescription must offer such a recission at the time of prescribing. Patients must also have been informed about the likely effects and alternative treatments, including palliative care; doctors must recommend notifying next of kin and having a witness present when they take it, and

Compensation debate pushes Dudley to explore consolidation

DUDLEY – The town of Dudley is continuing to examine ways of consolidating town positions with the goal of embracing efficiency while cutting costs.

Currently, the town is dealing with a vacancy in the Building Department Clerk position, but rather than fill the position as it currently stands Town Administrator Jonathan Ruda and selectmen are looking at possibly combining several clerk positions together. Ruda brought the matter to the atten-

tion of selectmen during a meeting on Aug. 12 sparking a near half-hour debate about how the town should move forward with seeking efficiency and embracing a more consistent approach to hiring and salaries.

“We had been discussing and I think I’d really like to move forward with combining departments based on the workload and the like duties and functions of the position,” Ruda told selectmen. “I’ve been looking around at other cities and towns that may have a similar model. There are plenty of towns that use a similar model to what

I’m proposing.”

The proposal would see the several clerk positions combined with one salary covering multiple departments for full time hours. Ruda proposed a salary range of \$17.81 for the combined position which brought the issue of inconsistent salaries and raises into the conversation.

“What I think is a good model for the town hall in Dudley is to get clerical support personnel hired at the same rate for same like positions and pay them accordingly”

Handbell choir forming in town

WEBSTER — Ever heard of “campanology?”

No, it has nothing to do with camping or campaigning. But it’s centuries old and coming to Webster.

Campanology is “the art of bell ringing,” and Stephanie Plante is starting a handbell choir to introduce people to a musical form she fell in love with 17 years ago.

A handbell choir is “like the piano’s 88 keys. Each key is a handbell,” she said.. “Five octaves of handbells cover a paino, but we’re starting with two or three octaves. If we get more and more people, we can build up to five.”

Plante is the new music director of the UCC Federated Church, and brought the idea from her last posting, a church in Rutland. As with a lot of people, she first discovered handbells by getting a letter promoting a concert. Going there, she’d never heard of it, but “I loved it.”

The art form as we know it seems to have started in the cloisters of medieval churches with the large bells churches used to ring for all kinds of events, especially Masses and funerals, according to www.handbellringers.com. People paid to ring them got more for ringing the big ones, “not because the big one was harder to ring but because it kept the spirits further away and gave the departing soul a better start.” The ringers often learned their trade using hand-held bells that had originally been made for cattle and wagons.

“No doubt, these bells were then used for simple tunes particularly at Christmas and the art of tune ringing began,” the site states. “It was not long before the bell founders started making handbells specifically for method and tune ringing; with clappers and handles tailor-made for the purpose.”

The Lancaster Handbell Ensemble website notes the complex patterns of 16th century “change ringing” took lots of practice, but learning it on the big bells “was disturbing to the surrounding villagers, so small bells were developed so the ringers could practice indoors.” The idea of handbells long predated the churches, though; the site also notes the earliest bells with handles date to China around 1600 BCE and can be found around the world in many forms. Showman P.T Barnum brought English handbells to America in the 1830s, and a handbell guild formed in New England in 1937 to promote the art form nationwide.

Plante said participants don’t need experience; she’ll provide the music and equipment and teach

Police Department working hard to keep Webster safe

WEBSTER — Webster’s new Police Chief, Michael Shaw, has been in his new position for seven months, and is working hard with his department to keep the residents of Webster safe.

In his bi-annual report to the Selectmen, Chief Shaw says making Webster safer is his number one long-term goal. The first step in realizing this goal was to fully staff the department. Over the past 24 months, the Police Department has been operating at about a 20 percent shortfall in staff due to retirements, attrition and unfortunately the untimely passing of two beloved Police Officers—Detective Cindy Johnson and Officer Michael Lee. In the past two months, two new officers transferred into the department from the Framingham Police Department. Officers Hurton and Mroczek are great assets to our community and we hope they serve the people of Webster proudly for a very long time.

The Department also has a new officer in training, Francesca Cedeno, ready to start when she finishes the Police Academy later this summer. Back in January, with the promotion of Michael Shaw to Chief of Police, we also saw the promotion of Bobby Wheeler to Deputy Chief, and Gordon Wentworth to Lieutenant. With these recent new hires we see Officer Desantis with a promotion to Sergeant along with Officer Joe Reed to Detective. We welcome all the newcomers and those in new seats at the Police Department—we know you will continue to serve us well.

The last six months have been busy ones for Chief Shaw and the Department. With the increased staff, we are seeing notable increases in citations and arrests in Webster. Notably, there were 618 citations issued in the first six months of 2018. During that same length of time in 2019, a total of 1,516 citations were issued. Not only do these citations make our community safer to drive, but many of these citations lead to further action by the police department. For instance, with some steadfast investigative work, the Department was able to seize a Kilo of cocaine and remove it from the streets—which all started from a minor traffic violation. There have been several notable arrests recently including two narcotic arrests, an arrest in a stabbing incident and most notably the arrest of the man who abducted a 12 year old girl from the May Street Park.

Chief Shaw described the hard work that goes into these cases as “Some of the finest police work I have seen in my career. I have said it for years, the officers of this department are the finest in the area, and I am fortunate to be their leader. I can never say thank you enough to all of the men and women of the PD for the hard work they do.”

The Police Department does more

than just fight crime; they also save lives. On the Fourth of July, Sgt. Patrick Perry, with the assistance of others, heard a call for a distressed swimmer in the lake and promptly acquired a boat and was able to locate the distressed swimmer. Sgt. Perry jumped in the water and saved the man moments before he would have drowned. Also, our officers routinely save lives as they administer Narcan to overdose victims. The Department does an excellent job following up on these overdoses and helps those with an addiction get the assistance they need to overcome.

Recently, Webster Police Officer Aaron Suss and police dog Bandit were recognized for their efforts in solving a shooting in the neighboring town of Oxford. You also may have seen the department’s recent deployment of its new monitoring trailer camera. The trailer will be assist in areas of high traffic or crime and is just another tool available to the department to keep us safe.

The Webster Police Department is also very active in the community. They truly believe in being an active part of community events. One of the biggest town events, National Night Out was held this past Tuesday. Hundreds flocked to Memorial Beach for games, food and some community bonding. Other police hosted events include Hoops for Hope at Park Ave.

Benali Properties fined for violating wetlands regulations

BOSTON – The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) has assessed a \$9,750 penalty against Benali Properties, LLC of Dudley, owner of land at 320 Elm St. in Southbridge, for violating wetlands regulations during parking lot construction at the site.

In response to a request for assistance from the Southbridge Conservation Commission, MassDEP staff inspected the property and observed that work had occurred on Benali’s property without obtaining required wetlands permits. Benali altered approximately 1,000 square feet of Riverfront Area by con-

ducting grading and filling activities and installing a stormwater outfall. Benali also failed to comply with two previous enforcement orders issued by the Southbridge Conservation Commission.

MassDEP has ordered Benali to submit a restoration plan from a wetlands specialist, complete a restoration of the altered Riverfront Area and monitor the restoration work for up to a year. The company must also pay the assessed penalty.

“Obtaining proper permits before conducting work in wetlands resource areas is necessary to ensure pro-

tection of water resources,” said Mary Jude Pigsley, director of MassDEP’s Central Regional Office in Worcester. “Companies and individuals ignoring local enforcement actions will be subject to not only orders from the state, but also significant penalties.”

MassDEP is responsible for ensuring clean air and water, safe management and recycling of solid and hazardous wastes, timely cleanup of hazardous waste sites and spills and the preservation of wetlands and coastal resources.

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other safeguards. It also states the death certificate “shall list the underlying terminal disease as the cause of death.” Berkowitz said he’s heard some opposition from the disability community. Advocates sometimes tell him they fear “they might be railroaded or coerced into taking the pill.” That can’t happen under the law, he said, because doctors trying to push it on non-terminally ill people would get “long jail terms.” “I’m sympathetic to that argument because I have friends who are disabled,” he

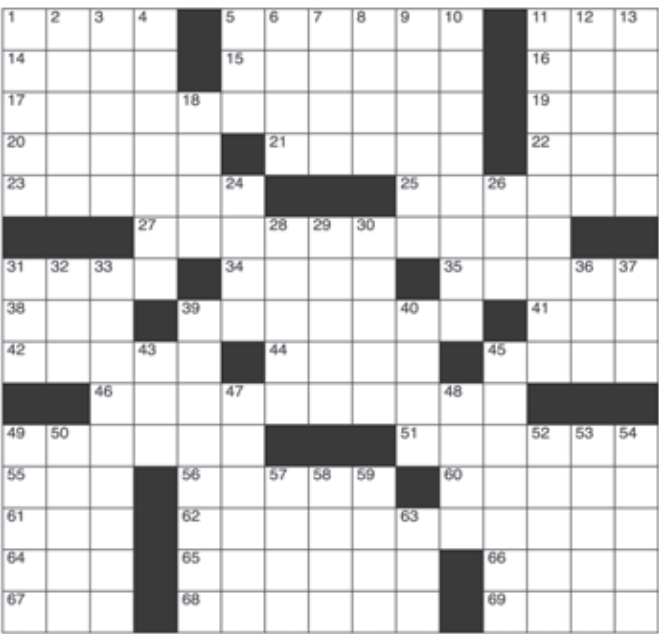
said.. “I wouldn’t be an advocate for this if I didn’t feel their concerns were unfounded.” Some of that community’s objections are laid out at www.second-thoughts.org, where a group called Second Thoughts Massachusetts notes it has been opposing such bills for years. It also opposed the 2012 ballot question on the issue, which voters narrowly rejected. Among the group’s key arguments are concern over misdiagnosis and the idea that palliative care can negate the pain. “12-15 percent of people diagnosed with 6 months or left to live will outlive their diagnosis, by months, years, or even decades. So if you receive

your prescribed overdose from a doctor and their colleague who totally misdiagnosed you, no one could ever know that your life was taken from you,” the site states. A little later, it adds, “Good palliative care makes dying people comfortable – uncontrolled pain is completely unacceptable. The bill’s advocates say it is all about pain, but the leading suicide motives are about distress over disability. A recent study published in the New England Journal of Medicine reported that the main motive for requesting assisted suicide boiled down to ‘existential distress.’” The site links to another page citing allegations of “abuses and complications” of Oregon and Washington’s laws, although Berkowitz said he believes “we have not

had one case of its abuse” in Oregon in 22 years. This year, Oregon expanded it because “they found that at end of life, people were so sick and it was so hard to access it,” he added. The Catholic opposition tends to be rooted in the idea of suicide as “gravely sinful” and equivalent to murder, as an Oct 17, 2015, article by Tim Staples at www.catholic.com states. “Suicide contradicts the natural inclination of the human being to preserve and perpetuate his life,” Staples wrote. “It is gravely contrary to the just love of self. It likewise offends love of neighbor because it unjustly breaks the ties of solidarity with family, nation, and other human societies to which we continue to have obligations. Suicide is contrary to love for the living

God.” He roots his argument in the idea that “We are stewards, not owners, of the life God has entrusted to us. It is not ours to dispose of.” Berkowitz recalled the June public hearing featured “seven hours of testimony, much of it very emotional.” Around 500 people attended, roughly 200 of them opponents. He said the bill’s key sponsor, Rep Louis Kafka, keeps filing it because “he lost a friend to pancreatic cancer, and the best efforts couldn’t alleviate his pain.” The friend asked Kafka, a doctor, for help, but Kafka couldn’t do it by law “and he saw his friend die in difficult circumstances,” Berkowitz said.

“what bell to ring and when.” In time, her goal is to develop a choir that can perform at the church during Sunday services once a month. Most of the music she has is religious, but there are occasionally secular pieces, particularly patriotic ones, mixed in. The choir is open to anyone, church-goers or not. The choir meets Thursdays from 6-7 p.m. at the church starting this week (Aug. 22), and Plante said she won’t require practice between the rehearsals. As of Monday, she had 11 people expressing interest, but hopes to get more. “All it takes is an interest in playing the bells,” she said. “... We just relax and forget about what our day’s been like.”

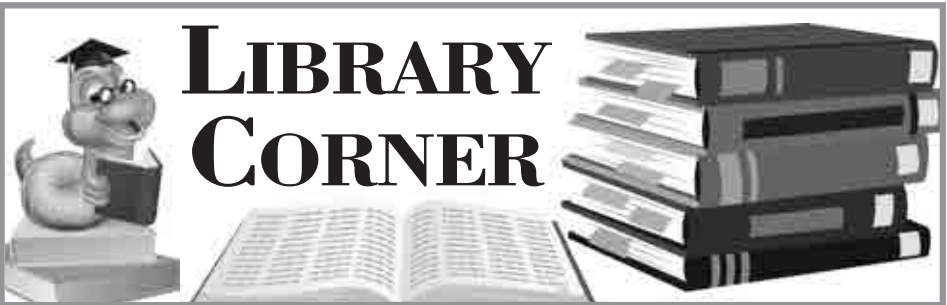

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Taking the “Measure” of Shakespeare

WEBSTER — For the second year, the famous bard came to the Riverwalk last week, as Brown Box Theater returned with Shakespeare’s “Measure for Measure.” Around 100 people brought lawn chairs, lunch and drinks to partake of a tale of coercion and chicanery that touched on themes all too common today: abuse of power, sexual manipulation, hypocritical moralizing and deceit.

Vienna’s duke (Chris Kandra) takes a trip to avoid having to enforce ultra-restrictive moral rules that

call for the execution of Claudio (Drew Cleveland) for getting his fiancée Julietta (Ivy Ryan) pregnant before their wedding. The duke leaves his deputy Angelo (Spencer Tew) in charge to play enforcer, but when he passes sentence, Claudio’s sister Isabella (Sarah Boess), a postulant nun, appeals for clemency ... to the point of agreeing to give Angelo her virginity.

In the middle of everything, Isabella and Claudio get advice from a shadowy friar (also Kandra), who is playing his own game against Angelo, bringing in Angelo’s rejected fiancée Marianna (Aislinn Brophy)

for a little bait and switch with Isabella, while also leading Isabella into thinking Claudio does get executed.

Most of the characters are pretty slimy and untrustworthy, yet the cast played them all well, to the point of making sure the audience went home thinking about what was not being said. It’s a lesson that unfortunately hasn’t changed much since Shakespeare wrote this 500 years ago: When a culture demonizes healthy, normal sexuality, it comes out in manipulative and unhealthy ways.

said Ruda. "In the absence of a wage and compensation study or a classification survey, which we desperately need, I have to come up with a way to fill that position and come up with a wage scale for that position. It makes it very difficult. We're looking at combining the position of Building Clerk, Zoning Clerk and Board of Health Clerk. We have a range of a \$5-per-hour difference."

Currently the Zoning Clerk makes \$17.77 an hour while the Health Clerk makes on \$13.26. The Building Clerk was making \$18.46 an hour while the highest paid comparable job in Dudley earns over \$20 an hour. The proposed \$17.81 salary was considered a compromise of the three wages, but

for Selectmen Paul Joseph the conversation only put a brighter spotlight on a prevailing issue in Dudley, an inconsistent approach to hiring, salaries and setting wage increases.

"That's exactly why we're having a compensation study done because of how we've done it piecemeal in the past. I would keep that person, whoever gets in, at their current hourly rate and when the study gets done, we should come up with a system that's fair and equitable," Joseph said. "If you put someone into that position who is currently on the payroll, I would not change their hourly rate. I know their hours are going to change from 20 to 35, approximately, but I would not change their hourly rate at this time."

Both selectmen and the town administrator struggled with

determining what the next move should be, hire someone to take over the position and await the upcoming wage study or wait for the study results and hire according to those finding. Regardless, Board of Selectman Chair Steve Sullivan felt the town administrator's plan for consolidating clerk positions is the right way to go either now or later.

"I think the administrator is on the right path with this combined enforcement clerk. It makes sense to have what you can under one roof, in conjunction with the other group that's going to be coming in and hopefully assisting us in making some rhyme or reason of the salary and wage compensation," Sullivan said. "(We have) two Paths. We continue down the road and I think the enforcement clerk is an excel-

lent concept in conjunction with other data we can generate and accumulate."

Selectman Kerry Cyganiewicz, a former Finance Committee member, said he feels the town needs to focus on establishing a fixed rate and the compensation study will help with that endeavor.

"Why I think we should post this job at a certain amount per hour is let's say if the person whose \$20, \$19, or \$18 an hour decides for whatever reason they'd rather do this job than what they do now. They apply for this job and they come in at their pay, now their job is open, and we need to fill that job, so we need to fill (the new vacancy) at what it was before. If we don't put a dollar amount with this, we leave ourselves open for whatever cost may

be. If we put it at \$17, we have a fixed cost," Cyganiewicz said.

Selectman Jason Johnson presented a more middle-of-the-road perspective trying to ensure the public that regardless of where these debates lead the goal of the Board of Selectmen is to do right by the community.

"Our intention is to do what's right for the town and create positions to best take advantage of the work that needs to be done in a way that makes sense," Johnson said.


The selectmen agreed to continue to collect data with the hopes of solidifying a path forward that provides efficiencies but also establishes a precedent that will allow for more consistent hiring and wage and compensation practices in Dudley.

A fresh start and a chance to make memories

It's that time of year again, when the buses start rolling, store shelves once again team with school supplies, and back to school photos will infiltrate your social media feeds. We love this time of year, when a more structured schedule takes hold and the crisp, cooler air of fall settles in.

We always consider late August into September to be a new year. Yes, we know the actual new year begins on January 1, the start of a new school year always brings a clean slate, and who doesn't love that?

This time of year brings with it memories for all of us, even if we are not headed back into the classroom. We recall in the height of the '80's when Trapper Keepers were all the new rave. During that time, anyone who walked into a drug store would be greeted with a wall of the colorful organizers, with notebooks and pencil cases to match. Having a brand new Trapper Keeper with pencils neatly tucked away the night before school started was step one. Next, the perfect outfit would have to be picked out, after all, the first day outfit set the standard for the rest of the year. During these first few days of school, the excitement was always at an all time high. It's the famous week three, when things start to settle, and the groove of the school routine has become the norm, once again.

As with most things, we enjoy tracking history. The drastic changes that have occurred over the years are quite interesting, so we thought we would share our findings.

During the 1800's, a typical rural area would have one room schoolhouses, with one teacher for grades first through eighth. The younger students would sit in the front of the classroom, with the 'big kids' seated in the back. Memorizing lessons was the priority back then, where students had to recite what they had learned. Paper bags and lunch boxes were not used for lunch, instead children would pack a lunch and carry it to school in a tin bucket.

During the early 1900's, only half of the children between the ages of five and 19 attended school. This was during the Industrial Revolution where children were needed at home to help work the farms or were put to work in factories. One study reports that in the present, 264 million children are still not educated.

We've heard it all before, but it's true — most students would walk or ride their bikes to school in all kinds of weather up to five miles away. Today most students take the bus or are dropped at school by their parents. In some areas, there have been initiatives taken to promote the 'old school' way of transporting kids via bike or walking.

In days gone by, if a student misbehaved they were placed in a corner and had to wear a dunce cap. Discipline has changed quite a bit; however, we remember a slew of kids standing along the brick wall during recess when we were in elementary school. Some students may have had to suffer the public shame of that lineup for not returning a permission slip, or for talking in class, but don't worry — we won't mention any names.

Home Economics classes have been replaced with a more modern swing than when they first emerged in the 1950's and lasted through the '70's. Back then, students, mostly female, were taught how to cook and sew. In the late 1980's, those classes saw more male students as it became a requirement for all. We remember sewing 'Nerd' (as in the candy) stuffed animals and Oreo cookies in our class. When it was time to cook, we have fond memories of baking a holiday cake and forgetting to add baking powder...or was it flour? Either way, the final product certainly wasn't going to land us on "Cake Boss."

Industrial Arts classes are few and far between, but are still offered in some places with a more technological twist. Back in the day, students would take large pieces of wood, run it through a planer, sand it, stain it and create all

The country-western singer Toby Keith asked his friend Clint Eastwood, as he was about to turn 88: "What keeps you going?" Eastwood replied: "I get up every day and don't let the old man in."

I love that. To me, this means remembering to pause each day to appreciate something beautiful, to pause in wonder and awe, to allow some time for the mind to wander and to rest, to allow yourself, despite the stresses of whatever day, to be filled with gratitude and even to find some time for play.

My wife Sarah and I were fortunate to spend the first two weeks of July in the desert, visiting our daughter Emily, who works as a yoga instructor, and son-in-law John, nearing retirement from the military, following more than 20 years of service in the Navy, currently working as an emergency room nurse at the naval hospital on the largest marine base in the United States.

While surrounded by cactus and jackrabbits, and as we felt the earth move during an earthquake, I considered how different the landscape is for those living in 29 Palms, Calif. and those where I live in Dudley, Massachusetts. Yet then I peered up at the moon and stars and realized we were seeing that the same.

Emily and John's neighbors, serving their country as marines, are from American Samoa, a U.S. territory covering seven South Pacific islands and atolls. They were holding a family reunion during the time of our visit. On our final evening there, dozens of people gathered in their backyard for a time of family worship which included song. Their singing, rising under the same heavens which covered their neighbors back home in American Samoa, songs rising under the canopy of a desert sunset, brought heartfelt tears to my eyes.

Last month and over the past couple of years, humanity has been celebrating first steps on the moon and our first glimpse of seeing the earth from space. Our journeys into space have helped us realize the truth of ourselves, floating around on this tiny blue-green ball in the middle of a vast universe, only one of countless universes. With all the stunning diversity this tiny world gives to us, how precious is the home we share.

Psalms 148 in the King James Version of the Bible is beautiful poetry which can, I hope, be appreciated by anyone, of any religious tradition, even by those of no tradition at all, simply appreciating these words as being written by those looking around themselves in wonder for all the life which surrounds them. It reads: "Praise ye the Lord. Praise ye the Lord from the heavens: praise him in the heights. Praise ye him, all his angels: praise ye him, all his hosts. Praise ye him, sun

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and moon: praise him, all ye stars of light. Praise him, ye heavens of heavens, and ye waters that be above the heavens. Let them praise the name of the Lord: for he commanded, and they were created. He hath also established them for ever and ever: he hath made a decree which shall not pass. Praise the Lord from the earth, ye dragons, and all deeps: Fire, and hail; snow, and vapours; stormy wind fulfilling his word: Mountains, and all hills; fruitful trees, and all cedars: Beasts, and all cattle; creeping things, and flying fowl: Kings of the earth, and all people; princes, and all judges of the earth: Both young men, and maidens; old men, and children: Let them praise the name of the Lord: for his name alone is excellent; his glory is above the earth and heaven. He also exalteth the horn of his people, the praise of all his saints; even of the children of Israel, a people near unto him. Praise ye the Lord."

It takes a bit of childlike wonder to perceive the world like this, so yeah, don't let the old man or woman in. Take advantage of this summer heat by stepping outdoors when you can, wearing as little clothing as possible. If you're in a totally private setting... perhaps stepping out in your "birthday suit" or "skinny dipping" in some pond, if this is what you need to fully awaken childlike wonder within you. Do something you're accustomed to chiding someone else for doing, yet secretly wish you were doing...not something immoral... just something liberating and fun. Instead of telling someone: "Why don't you act your age?" try telling yourself: "Perhaps I'm not too old."

Yes, your body will change over time, so we need to put in some effort to keep it as young as we can. Your mind and your spirit can remain as young and flexible as ever though, simply by choosing them to be so.

May you, in your way, express your gratitude for Earth, our island home; for sky filled with planets, moons and stars, for oceans, streams, mountains and wind, for trees and grass and desert sand. Even as our physical bodies age, remember the mystery we are part of, the agelessness of our spirits, yesterday, today and throughout eternity. Be filled with appreciation for all we have, the wonders of creation, of science, of artistic expression and imagination, of the healing power of forgiveness, kindness and love. May our hearts be filled with wonder, so we may sense the promise in this blue-green planet and feel convinced that our role is to care for it; as we feel convinced that our role is to care for one another.

It is hard to believe that the new school year is nearly upon us. Even though this may be disappointing to some of the students, it is always a good opportunity to emphasize the benefits of good driving behaviors. This is especially important for new drivers. This is a good opportunity to remind everyone of the restrictions on

junior operators.

A junior operator in Massachusetts is anyone licensed who is under age 18. The major restriction on these individuals is they are not allowed to drive between the hours of 12:30 and 5 a.m. For those people who obtain their license while under age 18, a restriction is in place which limits the presence of passengers in their vehicle. Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 90 Section 8 states in part, "No person holding a junior operator's license shall operate a motor vehicle during the first six months of licensure while a person under 18 years of age, other than the operator or an immediate family member of the operator, is present in such vehicle unless also accompanied by an operator, duly licensed by his state of residence, who is 21 years of age or over, who has had at least one year of driving experience and who is occupying a seat beside the driver..." Immediate family members are considered as mother, father, brother, or sister. The main intent of this law is to limit distractions to inexperienced drivers and prevent accidents.

Unfortunately, there have been too many tragic crashes and injuries involving young, inexperienced drivers. We hope to prevent these incidents from occurring in the future and educating young drivers is a move in a positive direction. Our officers will be out in areas focusing on traffic violators in order to prevent accidents and encourage voluntary compliance with the traffic laws.

The Dudley Police Department wants to remind everyone that when school is back in session, there is an increased presence of children on the roadways. As operators, pay attention to these individuals. Always watch your speed and drive defensively. We wish all the students, faculty, and staff a happy, healthy, and safe upcoming school year.

Be alert for opportunities when preparing for college costs

Now that summer is winding down, it will soon be "back-to-school" time. When children are young, your logistics for the new academic year may involve little more than a trip to buy school supplies. The ride to the North Rip had us catching our limit of stripers in a matter of one and a half hours. The largest striped was in the high 20's and low 30's. After we had our limit, we were headed for the seabass fishing grounds.

A couple of charter boats were in the area as we arrived to start bottom fish ,

hoping to catch a few seabass and a few fluke. The bite was extremely slow but we did manage to catch a few fluke and seabass that were undersized. It was not long before we spotted a nice seabass floating by the boat. I immediately asked the mate about the floating fish that was still alive.

«Yep. That fish was thrown overboard by the dragger, as they could not keep the fish because of a closed season for commercial fishing.” I thought that they could keep their Bi Catch. What a waste of fish. It is not the first time I observed this wanton waste of our fish resources at sea. Stripers have also been observed floating by our boat a few years ago, and we actually watched some legal size stripers being tossed overboard by commercial draggers. Marine Fisheries need to take a better look at their outrageous fishing tactics, and regulations.

Last week, a couple of local residents visited the Cape and were planning to buy a few pounds of striped to take home. Entering a local fish market, they were amazed at the fish prices. “Yikes!” \$26 a pound for striped! I am sure glad I go fishing. Often eating fish five days a week, I would defiantly go broke by the middle of the month with those prices.

Preserving Harvest's Bounty the Old Fashioned Way

The pleasures of the New England harvest season are truly bountiful. Ripe, red tomatoes heavy on the vine, stately rows of corn stalks, and pots of leafy herbs promise home grown goodness for the family table. Whether plucked from your own backyard or purchased fresh from local gardens or farmers markets, preserving the “just picked” flavor of the New England harvest is a seasonal quest.


While freezing has long been a favorite form of “keeping” crops and traditional canning is enjoying a comeback, the old fashioned method of drying garden vegetables often gets overlooked by home gardeners. A modern dehydrator isn't necessary, as all it takes is an oven, some trays and a bit of time to maintain all the flavor, integrity and wholesomeness of the season's harvest.

Dry to Preserve Garden's Bounty

Drying is one of the oldest forms of food preservation, and a reliable technique that can be easily employed to stretch the goodness of home grown vegetables. Dehydrating removes moisture and therefore halts the growth of bacteria and molds, extending the life of precious garden crops.

Proper preparation of vegetables to dry is very important. Pick produce at peak of ripeness and rinse in cool water to remove dirt and debris. Dry thoroughly and cut into uniform thicknesses to ensure even drying time. Some vegetables, such as tomatoes, corn, carrots

and potatoes should be blanched before drying to kill potential bacteria and enzymes that can decrease flavor and color during storage. Common foods that do not require pre blanching include mushrooms, peppers, onions, garlic and herbs. Blanch vegetables by boiling or steaming. Immediately drop into cold water briefly to stop cooking and drain and dry vegetables while still warm. (The warmth will aid the drying process.)

Place vegetables in a food dehydrator, or if drying in oven, arrange in a single layer on a wire cake cooling rack set on top of a sheet tray to allow air circulation. The optimum temperature for successful drying is 140 degrees. This low temperature ensures moisture has completely evaporated, therefore lowering the risk of mold from any trapped moisture. If your oven doesn't have as low a setting, try the “warm” setting checking the temperature with a thermometer to avoid cooking the vegetables. Check temperature periodically to ensure oven maintains an even 140 degrees.

It cantakeseveralhoursforgardenproduce to be properly dried. Sufficiently dehydrated vegetables and herbs will be crisp and brittle. Vegetables cut in thicker slices such as tomatoes should be dry but not hard (a bit pliable). Dried goods must be cooled completely before storing. Air tight containers such as zipper lock bags, glass mason jars and plastic freezer tubs are all good candidates for storage of dehydrated vegetables. Dried produce should be stored in a cool, dark place and can last from a few months up to a year, depending upon the vegetable. Refrigeration can extend the life of some dried vegetables, just be sure they are stored in an air tight container and always use within one year of packing. To ensure the product remains dehydrated, it is very important to check the contents periodically and discard any food that has become rehydrated, smells “off”, or is moldy or tainted in any way.

technique resembles “French braiding” of hair. For larger bulbs bring greens in from the outer edges (forming an x with the other greens) for an attractive French braiding rope. Continue braiding until all bulbs are used.

To finish off your garlic rope, wind a length of twine or raffia around the greens close to the top bulb. Tie off and tie ends together to form a loop to hang the rope. Hang in a well ventilated, warm area to dry for two to three weeks. When dry, simply snip off desired bulbs. For long term storage, hang braid in a cool storage area or root cellar.

Onions and shallots can be braided in the same manner.

*Pepper Wreath: Pick Perfect Peppers

Note: Before stringing hot peppers be sure to wear gloves to ensure safety while handling. Experts advise using waxed dental floss to string and dry hot peppers like jalapenos, as the strength of their oils can dissolve normal thread.

Wreath: To make a pepper wreath with slim peppers, you'll need to wash and dry a generous amount of fresh peppers. With a sharp knife, make two slits at the top of each pepper, under the cap. Using 12 gauge wires form a sturdy round circle (for larger wreaths double the wire or use a heavier gauge. To form circle, stretch wire over a bucket or clay flower pot. Make a loop at one end. Thread peppers onto the wire through the slits, pushing them together at different angles until the wreath is full and looks attractive. Make a hook at the end of the wire and hook onto the loop. Hang up to dry for about two weeks.

Swag: To string a swag of peppers, wash and dry thoroughly. Thread a heavy duty needle with fishing line or unflavored wax dental floss. Tie a knot at the end of the line and thread through the stem of the pepper, pushing peppers close together and off to each side as you form the swag. For decorative effect, alternate red and green peppers. Continue stringing until swag is desired size. Tie off and loop top and hang to dry.

From Décor to Diet: Garlic Braids and Pepper Wreaths

Garlic braids dangling from kitchen rafters and colorful hot pepper wreaths hung near the chopping block offer not only homegrown décor, but a handy “pick as you use” year round supply of garden produce. Storing garden garlic and dried peppers in a creative way is not only satisfying for the home gardener, but the finished products serve as ideal “garden gifts” throughout the seasons.

*Garlic Braid: Give Bountiful Bulbs a “Twist.”


Garlic is easy to grow, and even a novice gardener can produce enough garlic bulbs to store for use all year round via a well constructed garlic braid.

To do: Gather up about a dozen of fresh garlic bulbs with greens attached. Begin braiding greens of three garlic bulbs, and then begin adding more bulbs as you continue up the braid. Add a new bulb on the right and work it into the braid, then a new one in the middle and do the same, then add a bulb on the left, layering the bulbs in an attractive braid as you move up the length. At this point the braid

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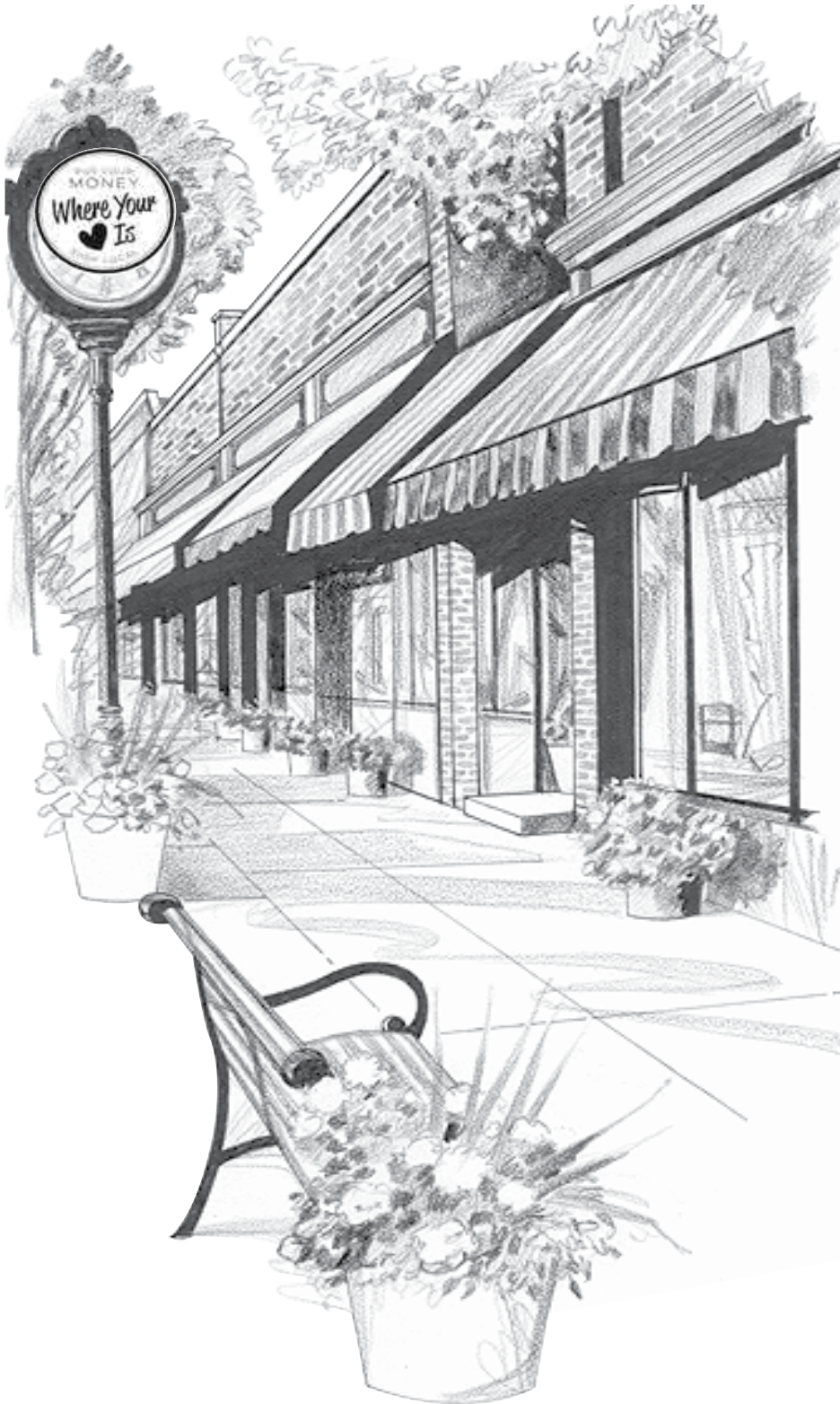

Maynard family goes the distance at Pan-Mass Challenge

THOMPSON, Conn. — Tourtellotte High School was well represented earlier this month in the 38th annual Pan-Mass Challenge (PMC), which to date has raised more than \$700 million for cancer research at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute.

Kim (Maynard) Aucoin, THS Class of 1991, and her brother Corey Maynard, THS Class of 1992, both completed the longest leg of the ride; the 192-mile stretch from Sturbridge to Provincetown that takes two days to complete.

Aucoin and Maynard both said that they know many people who have been through the ordeal of having cancer, including their mother, Dorothy, who is a cancer survivor.

This summer’s ride was Aucoin’s third straight year participating in the PMC; Maynard joined his sister on the ride two years ago.

“It’s such a great event; I definitely plan to ride again next year,” said the 46-year-old Aucoin, who lives in Dudley and works in Webster at MAPFRE Insurance. “It’s the people cheering you on along the way that makes this so special to me. There are so many hills in the beginning and, because of the heat, you don’t think you’re going to make it. But then the people start cheering you on, telling you that you can do it — and

they’ve got signs in their front yard encouraging you, too. It’s all awesome, and you somehow push through.”

Aucoin, who was part of MAPFRE’s 17-member PMC team, raised \$5,585 this year, while MAPFRE raised nearly \$420,000. A portion of the money MAPFRE raised came through its policy holders. Any policy holder who donated \$25 was offered a five percent discount on their auto insurance. The \$25 donation goes directly into the pool of MAPFRE PMC donations.

Her work with the PMC is not Aucoin’s first foray into cycling to raise money for a worthy cause.

“I’ve been involved with cycling, on and off, for about 20 years,” Aucoin said. “In 1998 and 2000 I participated in AIDSRides. I rode both years from Boston to New York. It’s about a 300-mile ride; it took three days, and I completed it both years on a mountain bike.”

Maynard, who also had mountain biked back in the day, got back into cycling to improve his health.

“I started riding again back in 2012 for fitness; I wanted to lose weight,” said Maynard, who participated in the PMC as a solo rider this year and raised \$8,866. “I work in Boston for Gillette and I was in Berlin [Germany] on business and I went out cycling with a co-worker. We were on road bikes — like Kim, I had always ridden a mountain

bike — and I thought ‘this is great.’ So I came back from that trip and bought a road bike.”

It was no simple feat, however, getting his sister to convert.

“It took me two years to convince Kim to buy a road bike,” said Maynard, a Northbridge resident who will turn 45 next month. “We would ride together, me on the road bike, she on the mountain bike, which weighed three times as much as a road bike. At one point I was like, ‘hey, you’re slowing me down. Get a real bike.’”

Maynard said he didn’t participate in the PMC with Aucoin back in 2017 for one simple reason.

“I wasn’t ready for it. I was 40 pounds heavier and really didn’t want to do a 200-mile ride carrying all that excess weight,” said Maynard, who shed the pounds by increasing his riding mileage and training a lot in the gym. “Back then we both lived in Dudley so we would meet up and go on rides together. The more we did that the more I got into cycling.”

Both Maynard and Aucoin train for the PMC from April to July, riding outdoors three days a week and indoors on a spin bike another three to four times a week. Aucoin prefers her training to involve road work.

“I love it; I’d ride outside every day if I could,” Aucoin said. “If it’s nice out I’m outside riding. I try to ride every

day if I can.”

There is a third Maynard family member involved in the PMC. Older sister Pam Maynard doesn’t ride, but she does help out.

“I’m there for support. I pick them up at the end of the race when they’re finished,” said Pam Maynard with a laugh.

Maynard, however, does more than that.

“This year I volunteered to

work with the PMC. MAPFRE set it up that any employees who wanted to volunteer, they would provide transportation to the PMC headquarters in Needham,” Pam Maynard said. “We were there for about six hours putting together ‘rider packages,’ which basically consisted of a list with bike jersey size, identification bands for the riders, luggage and bike tags.”

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


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Jacqueline Virginia Hall Hansen, 93
