## Cemetery debate costs total more than \$47,000

DUDLEY – It's been several months since the issues of the proposed Islamic cemetery on Corbin Road was finally resolved, but now officials have made public the cost the town accrued throughout over a year of litigation and very public debate.

The request from the Islamic Society of Greater Worcester in early 2016 is still very fresh as the town faced accusations of passive-aggressive racism against the society, which the society in turn received accusations from the town of slander and liable that stained the community's image, all capped by several very public back-and-forth debates between attorneys representing both parties.

The Islamic Society of Greater Worcester made its initial push for the cemetery in January of 2016, with the first public meeting drawing a capacity crowd to the town hall in February. The Zoning Board of Appeals turned down the project and in July a lawsuit was filed that led to the early parts of an investigation and, eventually, a settlement in December. Despite reapplying for a special permit, the Islamic Society

dropped their request in April, choosing instead to bring their cemetery to offered land in Worcester.

Dudley Town Administrator Greg Balukonis explained during a Board of Selectmen meeting Monday, July 24 that he compiled a cost total from the 16-month series of debates and lawsuits to present to selectmen at their request, and make available for the public at their leisure.

"The board had asked me to give a summary of what the cost was for legal defense, not only for the lawsuit, but for the related investigations and the special permit action related to the Islamic Cemetery of Greater Worcester," Balukonis said. "We spent \$47,298.70. These costs represent the cost of town council services. We also did have special council, which was covered through our insurance vendor. However, we did pay a deductible which is shown in the amount of \$5,000."

Selectmen offered little input and took no action on the document itself, other than to acknowledge receipt and release the numbers for public record. Among the costs was \$42,122 to the town's legal

## Harrington DPH hearing draws criticism

STURBRIDGE – At least a dozen nurses and several board members, but only a handful of citizens, turned out for last Friday's public hearing on Harrington Hospital's proposal to close its birthing unit on Sept. 30.

None of the speakers liked the idea, although board members said they supported it rather reluctantly for "fiduciary" reasons on the grounds that the number of births had been sliding for years.

But nurses and the two citizen

speakers were strongly opposed, with Southbridge resident Scott Metras making an impassioned plea to keep it open and critical of a lack of information.

"It's not a minimal impact for me, not a minimal impact for my wife," Metras said, pointing out that his wife, Gina (who also attended) is 25 weeks pregnant. He said they already had other doctors at Harrington and looked forward to having their first child there, but felt closing the birthing unit vio-

## Goguen settles in at Webster school helm

WEBSTER – To new Superintendent Ruthann Petrino-Goguen, the fact Webster is a highly diverse town was a big selling point.

"When you have a diverse population, there are lots of challenges and opportunities that present themselves," she said. "It was one of the things that drew me here."

She can see a fair amount of it near top-floor office in the old Filmer School on Main street: Polish bakeries, a Himalayan restaurant, Latino, black and white kids walking the street, a couple Thai restaurants, several different kinds of churches. Although in some respects it resembles a previous district she worked in (Fitchburg), she's not willing to make the comparison too closely, noting she still has a lot to learn about her new community, having been here just 13 days.

According to School Committee Chair David Hurton, his board picked her after a year-long process that started with about 30 applicants. About 10 of them survived to semifinals, and the committee interviewed three. Goguen is Webster's fourth superintendent in 10 years or so.

"I thought she had the strongest leadership skills ... and very strong communication skills," Hurton said. "I didn't necessarily want to hire somebody who'd be learning on the job."

Beyond learning the quirks of Webster, Goguen won't be. She's been in education more than 17 years, having worked her way up from a start as a parent volunteer with four young children. For the last seven, she's been a superintendent, most recently in the

## Oxford planners recommend pot moratorium

OXFORD – Last week, the Planning Board voted unanimously to recommend selectmen put both a moratorium and a ban on recreational marijuana on the fall town meeting warrant.

"I have no problem on this one," said Chairman Richard Escobas of the moratorium. "I think everybody needs more time to develop a bylaw for the town, since the state just recently finished some of the process themselves."

He was referring to the fact Gov. Charles Baker had just signed a legislative compromise bill (H. 3818) that made several changes to the law voters approved last November legalizing recreational pot. According to Duke London's summary at [www.marijuana.com](http://www.marijuana.com), the revised law keeps all of the provisions regarding personal use, possession, growing and gifting the ballot law had, including the prohibition on public consumption, but alters

several factors governing commercial sales. Most significantly, it hikes the taxes to 20 percent, merges oversight of recreational and medical pot into the Cannabis Control Commission (the latter was originally under the Department of Public Health); sets requirements for location, advertising, packaging and label information; states products "cannot resemble any non-marijuana food product currently sold;" and pushes back the start date to July 1, 2018.

One issue that might end up in court is the fact it splits the process towns can use to ban recreational sales outright. If a town's voters approved the law in November, they still have to send a ban to the ballot. But if it rejected the law then, a ban only needs to be approved by the selectmen or council.

In Oxford, the proposal to ban is already drawing a little uncertainty

## Speeding trends draw concerns from Dudley resident

DUDLEY – Dudley's selectmen and emergency officials are being urged to take immediate action on reducing the threat of speeding in the community after a local citizen brought the issue to their attention at a recent meeting.

Airport Road resident Richard Clark took the time to make himself heard during the Dudley Board of Selectmen meeting on Monday, June 24, voicing his concerns about continuous speeding on his own street, which he noted is a concern for residents all over Dudley as motorists fly through back roads and

main streets of the town. After seeing strategies presented for reducing speed in Worcester, Clark decided to bring his concerns to selectmen and ask that serious action be taken to crack down on speeding sooner rather than later.

"I would hope that the town would take this matter seriously. I would have for something tragic to happen. I think the law of averages are against us in that regard," Clark told selectmen who showed great interest in creating a plan of action to resolve the situation.

Selectmen called upon Dudley Police Chief Steven Wojnar to weigh in on the concerns at which time the chief

acknowledged there are many streets in Dudley where speeding and potential accidents are a threat. Wojnar said speeding itself has become a growing concern in Dudley over the years that his department has worked hard with what recourses it has to resolve.

Selectmen Paul Joseph inquired about whether or not the police department had access to grants and other resources to help fund or provide assistance when it comes to traffic stops and speeding violations. While the chief said the department does receive grants and does its best to have officers assigned to radar checks, there are lim-

its to what his department is able to do.

"We do get grants for traffic enforcement. A lot of those are focused on a certain times of the year. A lot of times we get them around Memorial Day, Labor Day, Christmas, and New Years. We have grants that focus on those times. We have some specific to texting and driving and some more for impaired operators," said the chief. "It's hard to say when we might have someone else who can go and do something (like radar checks) because that depends on a lot of things. We try to get people out

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
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# How Pierpont Pond came into being

When Massachusetts Bay Colony Governor Joseph Dudley died in 1720, he bequeathed his thousands of acres of land to his sons, Paul and William Dudley, who began selling the land to English settlers. Governor Joseph Dudley also bequeathed his great grandniece, Ann Hilton of Cambridge (b. 1698, Roxbury), 500 acres of land located in what would become Dudley, Oxford, and Charlton. In 1722, Ann Hilton married Ebenezer Pierpont, a wealthy merchant from Roxbury.

Ann and Ebenezer sold some of her 500 acres, but the family retained 125 acres of land, including a large meadow. (A meadow at that time indicated a tract of moist, low-lying usually level grassland, often used for growing superior quality hay.) This land became known in the Pierpont family as "the Dudley farm." Located in the northeast corner of Dudley, the area abutted the Charlton and

Oxford town lines. Ebenezer also held about 500 more contiguous acres just over the town line in Charlton. There is no evidence the Pierponts ever actually lived on the property. Ann died in 1745 and Ebenezer died in 1755.

In 1768, an attempt was made at a Dudley town meeting to approve a new town road running from the southwest corner of the Pierpont property to what is now Dudley-Oxford Road, but it failed.

The 125 acre "Dudley farm," as well as 49 contiguous acres in Charlton, were acquired by Ebenezer Pierpont (the son) in 1795, and at that time a map of Dudley showed no pond on the land. There was a seasonal brook running through the property.

Many of the old deeds mention as a landmark the "Pierpont stone wall (so called)" and there are still many old stone walls visible today through the water of Pierpont Pond from when the property was a "meadow."

In 1803, the 174 acres (125 acres in Dudley plus 49 acres in Charlton) were sold to Ebenezer Brown. Brown then sold the 174 acres to Thomas Larned of Dudley in 1809 with no

mention of a pond in the deed. By 1812, Pierpont Meadow Pond appears on a Dudley map for the first time. The pond probably originated with Thomas Larned. Larned enlarged what he called his "Pierpont Farm" to 218 acres and in 1810 sold the property to William C Brown, who sold to Ozias Cortiss in 1826.

Henry Hale Stevens had started Stevens Linen Works in 1846 and by the late 1850s was buying up every water privilege in sight. In 1853, he bought 80 acres with a small mill at the north end of Pierpont Meadow Pond where it empties to the north (Charlton) and in 1866 bought the abutting 218 acres from Ozias Cortiss in Dudley.

It was announced in 1868 that Stevens had re-opened the old mill he owned in Charlton, was putting in new machinery, and planning to do some of Stevens Linen Works' beetling there. Shortly thereafter, he approached Dudley about making a new road from that mill to Dudley-Oxford Road. The town agreed and allotted \$2,500 to build the road, which was opened to the public in 1869 and was officially known as Pierpont Avenue. Two miles long, it cut 1-1/2 miles off the trip from Dudley to Charlton.

Because of money problems, Stevens signed his mill, Stevens Linen Works, over to corporators in 1868 and then left the mill in 1877. Stevens Linen Works, Inc. was thus created in 1868, followed by Stevens Linen Associates in 1939, organized to divest the mill of unwanted assets (land, buildings, etc.). The area of Pierpont Meadow Pond was sold off in several parcels. One large parcel sold to Leverne F. Lundberg included

the land under the pond and the water rights. This parcel, with the land and water rights, then went in 1940 to Alvin L. and Esther D. Clark, who sold house lots on the pond for years. Alvin died in 1954 and Esther D. Clark died in the early 1970s.


In April 1960, after the catastrophic flood of 1955, the U.S. Government using a "land-taking" took possession of 93+ acres of land beneath Pierpont Pond, at the time still owned by Mrs. Esther D. Clark per the deed of 1940. This "taking" was part of the Buffum Dam Project. She was paid \$350. The 93+ acres were then placed under the management of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, who held a right-to-flood easement for Pierpont Meadow Pond. Although not used for 50+ years, if Buffumville Lake's water level rises to dangerous levels, this easement gives the Corps the right to flood Pierpont Meadow Pond to lower the water levels at Buffumville, the current capacity of which is 5.2 billion gallons of water. The Corps' office explained that some people who have built or rebuilt homes/camps on Pierpont Meadow Pond since 1960 are not aware that the easement may include the land they have built on, and that some foundations and footings have been built in the flood easement area. If your structures are close to the current shoreline, your property may be in the easement. The Corps' office in Oxford (48 Old Oxford Road) said if there are questions about this easement, the Corps may be called at 508-248-5697 to clarify the situation.

Henry H. Stevens' grand-sounding "Pierpont Avenue" is now known as "Pierpont Road."





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# Not all pleased Fahey is returning

SPENCER – After a year-plus roller coaster that included an investigation, suspension, rally, and much speculation, recently reinstated David Prouty High School Athletic Director Charles Fahey is eager to move past the turmoil and embark on a fresh start. But several residents aren't willing to dismiss last year's investigation so easily, claiming it is part of a growing problem for the district.

Fahey last served as AD in 2015. In April 2016, he found himself at the center of a lengthy investigation into mishandled vending machine funds and other accounts. Serving solely as a DPHS math teacher at the time, Fahey was suspended by then principal Patricia Jordan, who wrote a letter to Fahey demanding that he make a public apology and pay restitution.

The status of the investigation was a mystery to residents

for several months, with school officials announcing last week that it has been concluded.

"The matter has been resolved and the report is a personnel document, not a public record," said Acting Superintendent Jodi Bourassa.

The AD selection process involved a seven-member search committee, which included parents and faculty members, among others. Four candidates were interviewed, and David Prouty High School Principal Elizabeth York recommended the highest rated candidate for the position, officials said.

For Fahey, it is a relief to put the investigation in the rear-view mirror and focus on the future.

"Everything has been settled and is behind us. It is good to be back, and I am happy I can help the students of David Prouty," Fahey told the New Leader.

Fahey's reinstatement was so sudden that it caught residents and educators alike off guard.

"I was never told he was coming back. I got a phone call from the principal saying they had chosen a better candidate," said Tab Bassett, who has served as AD since 2015. "It's a frustrating situation – I thought I did a good job. I did what the district asked of me, and I will continue to do what it asks."

Bassett will remain in his position as a physical education teacher at DPHS.

Meanwhile, Fahey's return and former superintendent Tracy Crowe's unexpected departure were announced within a week of each other in a summer of major changes for the district. School officials still have not explained why Crowe left suddenly or addressed the potential financial implications of her departure for the district. If her contract was bought out, parents have asked how that would affect the district moving forward.

Multiple attempts to reach Crowe over the last three weeks have been unsuccessful.

Crowe was accused of not being transparent throughout her tenure, but now it is the SEBRSC which faces those same allegations from parents, residents, and staff members.

"They keep talking about transparency and how everything is open, but it is anything but transparent," said Spencer resident Bob Cirba, who served on the SEBRSC from 2010-11. "[SEBRSC Chairman Jason] Monette has always said his two biggest objectives were getting rid of Crowe and putting Fahey back in. I believe the reason she [Crowe] is gone is because she would not bring Fahey back."

Crowe's departure was one of many in what has become a carousel at the leadership levels of the district in recent years. Five superintendents have served the district in the last seven years, while David Prouty High School has seen four principals in as many years. The district has also experienced a mass exodus of students and staff, and even

the town of East Brookfield, itself, is questioning whether it wants to remain in the district, a process that could last over three years.

"It's a big problem, and it's getting worse," said a Spencer parent who wished to remain anonymous. "People are afraid to ask questions and face the harassment. They just move their kids elsewhere, away from this poisonous situation."

Asked what she meant by "harassment", the resident described several incidents in recent years, among them the circumstances reportedly surrounding former DPHS principal Eileen Belastock's departure. In the spring of 2016, reports surfaced of allegations that Belastock was threatened and assaulted in her office by unnamed school employees. No one was ever charged in the alleged incident.

Belastock left her position without explanation last fall, and she was ultimately replaced by Jordan.

## Getting 'a leg up, not a bailout'

A sign of the times in many communities is the fact they often have blight policies that require clean-up of potentially dangerous buildings.

While those are all too often owned by absentee landlords or distant banks, sometimes they're still home to long-time residents like Sutton's Robert Faulkner: seniors, veterans and others who would maintain them if they could afford to.

"I barely squeak by," the 77-year-old Army veteran said. "When my wife died, my income got even lower because of losing her Social Security."

That made it difficult to address roof work, painting and porch work his house needed, as did the fact "I can't get up on a ladder now. Too risky."

At some point a couple years ago, he saw a blurb in the paper about Habitat for Humanity's Critical Home Repair program and gave them a call. His wife was then still alive, but their fiscal situation still wasn't great, so they qualified.

"They did an excellent job," Faulkner said. "I have to make payments, but I can handle them."

"Our goal is to help people stay in their homes," said Habitat's regional CHRP director David Hamilton, who noted the application asks "a whole lot of questions" to determine income eligibility.

Specifically, the program is limited to people making 30-60 percent of the area's median income, live in the home and aren't using it for rental income, are current on mortgage and insurance, and meet certain other requirements. One of the latter is willingness to partner with Habitat, either by making pay-

ments on a zero-interest loan and/or putting "sweat equity" into their own project or some other Habitat work.

"We need a partnership for this to work. It's a leg up, not a bailout," Hamilton said, noting participants usually pay about 40 percent of the total cost over the course of three to six years. "... There's more money available for veterans than non-veterans."

Typically, projects stay on the outside, fixing things so the home meets health and safety codes. Roof and siding repairs, stairs, porch banisters, handicapped ramps and the like are common, but about half the time, Habitat will hire subcontractors to do interior work, particularly plumbing and electrical repairs, that state law doesn't allow their volunteers to do.

"We occasionally see projects that are bigger than we can handle," Hamilton added. Their goal is to keep it below \$15,000, and sometimes that means

doing work in pieces. Sometimes, though, it means "painfully" making the decision to reject the project. They do 10 per year.

Since 2011, Habitat's Metrowest-Greater Worcester branch has done 23 repair projects on top of their better-known 52 home building projects, six of the latter are in progress. He said they're also looking for neighborhood revitalization projects, such as one they're doing in Marlborough.

According to Cara Fausset and others, "the specific obstacles that older adults encounter in home maintenance are not well documented," so her team tried to do so in a study called "Challenges to aging in place" at [www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov](http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov). In their research, depending on the question, 15-20 percent of the participants identified home repairs as "difficult to perform or likely to become difficult," especially if living alone. In some cases, they note, "participants

mentioned not doing a task anymore; certainly, that is not an optimal solution in all cases an might even make a living environment dangerous."

For the most part, they preferred "person-related" solutions -- typically simply having help -- over technology or environmental changes, although there was some difference in responses between men and women and between singles and married couples, Fausset's team wrote.

"By understanding the nature of home maintenance problems older adults encounter ... interventions and redesign efforts can more effectively address the areas of greatest need," they observed.



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# Old setting, new school

There's so much that kids can learn from observing old-school farming in action.

STURBRIDGE – Could preparing for the future mean stepping into the past?

That's what founders of the new Old Sturbridge Academy hope, as they bring their first batch of K-3 students into a school combining computers with the living history of Old Sturbridge Village this fall.

"As a kid, I used to come to camps here, and knew it was an incredible educational opportunity," said co-director Lisa DeTora. "But it was just for the summer, and I had to go back to the four walls of a classroom."

After years of being in more traditional classrooms, both as student and teacher, DeTora got tapped to realize her dream of blending the

two together, of letting kids mix hands-on learning and "skillful play" "in one of my favorite places in the world."

She'll be running the show with Kristen Rhodes, who said they aim to "infuse elements of the Village into the classroom," having the various staff share their old-style skills and knowledge with the kids to learn all the things expected of modern education. The goal, she added, is to tie the formal curriculum to reality "at a developmentally-appropriate pace" by doing "meaningful work."

"That brings joy. They really want to do these projects," DeTora said. "It's student-driven, but also standards-based..."

"... and they're learning despite themselves," marketing director

Michael Arnum added. Among other things, the trio foresees kids using real crops they plant, animals they see being born, snowshoeing across OSV's common, and a host of other things as fodder for their own exploration of the world. First graders have already expressed interest in raising chickens, second graders in planting a garden, and third graders in doing something with the trails. A key part of that, they said, is ensuring the kids can translate it into the real world, communicate with others, and play a role as "leaders in their community."

Although classes don't start for a couple weeks, the kids have already been given summer reading (on animals, although dragons count). Meanwhile, the adult staff has been reading about community and the teachers start this week, DeTora said. She noted the academy will be part of the 150-school nationwide EL (formerly, Expeditionary Learning) Education network, which grew out of Outward Bound and has three key goals -- character education, mastery of skills and high-quality work. To her, that ties in well with the Wells family's intentions for OSV as a hands-on educational institution.

The concept for a charter school came when Executive Director James Donohue took over his role in 2006, but it took some time to pull it together.

"I thought it'd be a great location for some kind of school. It lends itself to an active learning environment," Donohue said, noting OSV had a private, tuition-based school in the 1950s that lasted just one year.

After he reorganized OSV's offerings by restoring its commitment to costumed live staff, Donohue began looking into the school itself. A key impetus came from next door, when he noticed Southbridge's schools "were in disarray" and felt there was a need for "a public educational alternative," he said. Five years ago, OSV received a grant to study the concept's feasibility, and this year, that seed is germinating.

The academy will take 160 kids from kindergarten through grade 3, with two classes in each having 20 students. Every year thereafter, it'll add at the kindergarten level until it has eight grades with 360 kids and the current third graders become their first graduates. Although they've received "a lot of requests," there's no plan for now to expand into high school, so those kids will be going elsewhere for secondary education.

The prospect has already sparked some concern in Southbridge, from which the new charter is getting dozens of students. That will mean Southbridge loses at least \$800,000, and possibly over \$1 million, in state aid every year; the state is reimbursing 75 percent of that this year, but only

25 percent next year and none thereafter.

Southbridge officials have been talking with state education officials and legislators about this fiscal issue, but have no resolution yet. That means a statement included in the March town budget presentation remains valid. Town Manager Ron San Angelo then wrote, "State comments -- We need to make sure the district is successful. We will work with you to ensure the Town can deal with this funding issue."

But he continued, "If not, the Town will have to consider reducing funding to our local school district. The Town simply will not have the funds to send this much money to the Charter School and at the same time provide necessary increases to our own schools."

When asked about

that, Donohue said, "The Village doesn't get to weigh in on how charter schools are funded." He said the school aims to "recruit students that are the most at risk and not succeeding in traditional public schools."

When specifically asked if OSV would work with Southbridge and the state to change the funding formula, he added his priority is to get the school itself "off the ground," and he thinks OSV can share "best practices" with other districts.

The academy is accepting students from a wide range of communities from I-395 in the east to Palmer in the west and Spencer in the north.

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# Moore-sponsored disability protection bill has public hearing

BOSTON – Senator Michael O. Moore (D-Millbury) recently testified in support of legislation that would strengthen protections for persons with disabilities. The Moore-sponsored bill would direct the Department of Developmental Services to establish a registry that identifies individuals who have been found to have committed abuse against persons with disabilities.

According to a recent U.S. Department of Justice report, persons with disabilities were victimized in violent crimes at the rate of 2.5 times that of the general population. The bill would require DDS to establish and maintain a registry of former employees who have been terminated or separated from employment as a result of abuse directed toward a person with a disability. The bill

resembles protections already enacted in at least 12 other states. Massachusetts currently possesses a similar registry for childcare employees.

Senator Moore filed the legislation in response to meeting with Cheryl Chan, a Shrewsbury resident whose developmentally disabled son, Nicky, was physically abused by a caretaker at a day program. While a report was filed by the Disabled Persons Protection Commission, there are no procedures currently in place that would ensure the caretaker is prevented from continuing a career within the field.

“I won’t take a back seat when it comes to advocating for greater protections for the disability community,” said Senator Moore. “Establishing a registry will help protect

persons with disabilities from falling victim to abusive treatment. There are clear benefits to screening prospective employees who intend to work within the licensed caretaker field and I am hopeful that the Committee will advance this legislation to help protect our most vulnerable residents like Nicky.”

“Nicky’s Law is The Arc’s highest priority legislation for the current legislative session,” said Maura Sullivan, director of government affairs for The Arc of Massachusetts which is advocating for passage of the bill. “We have worked closely with Senator Moore leading up to today’s hearing, and we are hopeful that the bill will be passed this session. There is no doubt that the disability community strongly supports the creation of a registry to track

individuals who have been found to abuse persons with disabilities, and ensure they are not hired again by different providers. This legislation will protect the safety and dignity of people with autism and other intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The legislation possesses more than 20 co-sponsors and is currently under review by the Joint Committee on Children, Families and Persons with Disabilities which is co-chaired by Senator Jennifer L. Flanagan (D-Leominster) and Representative Kay Kahn (D-Newton). ## Small details make a big difference with antiques

After having the pleasure of speaking before several local groups recently, I thought I’d share some of the tips I offered to those in attendance on evaluating items in their homes.

You can do some research on your own on many types of items. Always turn things over and check the bottom for identifying marks. You can research items in books and on the internet by the maker name and other markings that you find. Sterling silver hallmarks are one of many things that can provide information by searching the internet for the maker and pattern. You will need a professional to verify autographs but you can do some basic research. Check photos of other autograph examples to see whether or not it is worth further researching the signature. Signatures change over time so look at several examples. Look carefully though, sometimes what may resemble an autograph is actually printed and not signed. There are also “secretarial signatures” or “clubhouse signatures” where others signed letters, photos, or other objects for a busy public figure or famous sports celebrity. Many paintings also have artist signatures that you can research. There are books such as Davenport’s Art Price Guide that will provide you with auction results of listed artists. You can find plenty of good information on the internet as well. While you are on the internet,

you can also look for reference guides on anything that interests you. You can find guides on Depression glass, toys, coins and almost any other field of collectibles and antiques.

Research that I did revealed some details that should make a major difference in the price of antique ice skates we recently picked up from a Western Massachusetts estate. The ice skates were made in the first half of the 19th century. They are similar to other antique skates with metal blades that are curved into a spiral on the front. Wood is attached to the blades. These skates would

then be attached to the skater’s boots. An online search shows that some similar skates can sell for as low as \$12. A closer look at these skates reveals some features that will make them more desirable to collectors though. The blades are signed “Dudley Fox Hockanum, Conn.” Hockanum is a section of East Hartford. Some stamp collectors may know Fox because he was the Hockanum Postmaster who used a stamp cancellation shaped like a running fox according to the Connecticut Postal history website. He also commanded Hartford County’s First Regiment from 1833-1836. Fox was listed as a silversmith or “tinner” (metal worker) in the Hartford City Register during the 1840’s. Being an accomplished metal worker, he added a flourish to the ice skates he created.

The metal curls on the front of the skates have a snake head design. It is unusual to see this and will increase the collector appeal. How large a difference will it make in the price? We will find out after they sell in our August 31st auction.

Now may be a good time to take a closer look at some of the items displayed in your home or tucked away in your attic.

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# Blue days return to Derrick Farms

With July and August comes a favorite summer-time activity: blueberry picking. Derrick Farm on the Oakham/Spencer town line is more than ready to provide you the opportunity. Located about five miles off Route 31 North, down Browning Pond Road and at the end of Sanders Road, lies the sprawling six-acre blueberry farm.

Walter Derrick, owner and operator of the farm,

calls it his “dream come true.” His wife, now ten years deceased, grew up in the original 1756 farmhouse and on the surrounding forest land. As a couple, they bought back the twelve-year abandoned farm, clearing a field near the house. In it, they planted apple trees, pumpkins, other vegetables, and a few blueberry bushes. After having soil tested at UMass, they discovered it was a perfect match for blueberries.

Thirty-two years later the farms boasts 5,000

bushes and eight different plant varieties, with berries harvested from between early July-late August.

“It all depends on the weather,” states Derrick. “berry bushes like mild winters and wet springs. You need a nice mix of rain and sunshine.”

While picking, one can hear what sounds like wild monkeys, but Derrick assures that they are just speakers broadcasting the sounds of various predatory birds to help keep the berry-lov-



ing birds at bay. At one point and for a while, Derrick and other help would lay netting, by hand, over the bushes; however, when he heard about the bird-calls, he decided to give it a try, and has been very happy with the results.

In the works, Derrick is having cleared 5-6 acres with 3 1/4 of them reserved for attracting and keeping natural pollinators. Rocks have been pushed and stacked along the perimeter of the new fields because

this is where the bees, supplied out of Utah, will make their hives. On the cleared acreage will be planted a variety of wildflowers with seeds supplied by Vermont Wildflower Company meant to make the bees very at home on the farm.

“To think that as a kid in North Brookfield I used to sell quarts of tiny, wild blueberries that I picked to earn money to go to the movies. And now..., I look forward every morning to coming out here. This is really a

dream come true.”

Derrick Farm is open now through late August or until berries are gone. They are a cash only operation, with U-pick berries costing \$2.50/pound. Pre-picked berries are also available, as well as maple syrup produced from their own maple trees. Hours are Monday-Saturday 8 am-6pm and Sundays 8 am-12pm. They close on rainy days. ## Hints for fresh herbs

It's midsummer and most garden herbs are hearty and lush, just waiting to be plucked, pinched or snipped and brought to the table as a flavorful seasoning or garden fresh garnish. From adding a gourmet touch to BBQ rubs, sauces and marinades, to bringing a dash of class to lemonade, soups and salads, freshly picked herbs are a seasonal delight!

Read on for some helpful hints to better enjoy home-grown herbs!

\*\*\*  
For best flavor, cut or snip herbs in the morning, after the dew has evaporated from the leaves but before the midday sun heats the plant.

\*\*\*  
Most annual plants can be harvested twice during the planting season. Cut plants back to about five inches above the ground and feed after cutting. Annual herbs can be harvested until frost.

Perennial herbs may be harvested once during the first year and up to three times each season after the initial growth year. Here's how: Harvest up to 75 percent of the top growth in

late spring and another quarter in late summer. Stop harvesting about one month before the frost date. Late pruning could encourage tender growth that cannot harden-off before winter.

\*\*\*Flowering herbs should be harvested when the buds are apparent or when flowers are just opening. This is when their oil concentration is at its peak.

\*\*\*  
Storing Cut Herbs  
Place freshly cut herbs in a bag in the salad crisper of the refrigerator. Or for or maximum freshness, cut an inch off the stalks and place them in a glass of water in the refrigerator. Try to avoid submerging the leaves in the water.

Note: Don't refrigerate basil as the leaves my turn black if they get too cold. Store cut basil in a bag in a cool, dark place or in a cup of water out of direct sunlight.

\*\*\*  
Bouquet Garni from the Herb Garden

The herb bundle or bouquet garni (French for “garnished bouquet”), may have a fancy name, but it is simply a bunch of herbs bound together with string and dropped in soup stock or other cooking liquid to “season it up.” Some cooks use a cheesecloth sachet or tea strainer to “steep” the fresh herbs. A fresh bouquet garni is never far if you have an herb garden. A classic fresh bouquet garni includes three sprigs of parsley, one sprig of thyme and

a small bay leaf.

If you are using dried herbs, crush them and place in the middle of a cheesecloth square and tie with string. As with all bundles, be sure to leave a long enough length of string to hang out of the pot for easy retrieval. Herb bundles tied in cheesecloth can even be made ahead of time and frozen. Here are some suggestions for bringing out the best in dishes with a bouquet garni:

Poultry: celery stalk; one sprig each of parsley, marjoram, tarragon, and thyme.

Chicken soup: three sprigs each of parsley, thyme, tarragon; one bay leaf.

Beef Stew: one sprig each of rosemary; thyme; parsley; one bay leaf.

Provençal: one sprig oregano, savory, thyme, marjoram, and rosemary.

Pork: one sprig thyme; six sprigs parsley, one bay leaf.

Seafood: two sprigs tarragon; one sprig dill; lemon zest.

Fresh Herbal Vinaigrette  
Whip up this garden fresh dressing that's simple and scrumptious!

Ingredients: 1/2 cup olive oil; 1/2 cup white wine vinegar; 1/2 cup chopped fresh basil; 3 tablespoons chopped fresh oregano; 2 garlic cloves, minced; 1/2 teaspoon seasoning salt; 1/2 teaspoon dried crushed red pepper; 1/2 teaspoon sugar

Directions: Combine all ingredients in a jar; cover tightly, and shake vigorously.

Mint Butter

Super quick and delicious, it's great on grilled fish or try it on corn on the cob!

Ingredients: one stick butter, softened; 2 tbsp. chopped mint leaves; 1 tbsp. lemon juice

Directions: Cream ingredients together in a bowl. Cover and chill in refrigerator a few hours before serving.

If you have an herb garden, these remedies are always on hand:

Lemon balm: Lemon balm is a relaxing herb that reduces restlessness, anxiety and irritability. It is also used to treat anxiety that causes digestive problems. Simply steep leaves, strain and drink as a tea.

Note: Do not use if you have thyroid problems.

Oregano: Oregano is a great skin remedy to aid in the healing of cuts, scrapes, rashes and even eczema. Simply steep Oregano leaves, strain and allow to cool. Soak a cloth in the “tea” and apply to skin a few times per day until skin is healed.

Basil: Relief of a sore throat is as close as your garden. Pour boiling water over dried basil leaves, steep and strain. When cool, gargle with the liquid three times a day.

Passionflower: Passionflower is an effective depressant of the central nervous system which translates into a relaxing anti-anxiety effect. It not only helps general anxiety, but is especially touted as a remedy for nightmares and nocturnal anxiety.

Note: Those taking an MAO inhibitor should not take passionflower.

Skullcap: An herb with fewer side effects, Skullcap helps calm the “worrier” who has racing thoughts and constant fret. This herb is useful for all types of anxiety but has also been hailed as an aid for stress caused by hormonal imbalances in women.

# Shooting incident reveals long history of criminal activity

SPENCER – The man killed last week in an officer-involved shooting had a lengthy history of run-ins with the law, including a previous police chase and several domestic incidents.

Walter Lynde, age 49, of East Brookfield, was shot to death by a Spencer Police Department officer during a domestic incident on July 23. According to Worcester County District Attorney Joseph Early's office, Lynde was shot as he approached a house at 160 Northwest Road. A replica handgun was located near him, which he allegedly pointed at the officer.

Lynde was transported to the University of Massachusetts Medical Center in Worcester, where he was pronounced dead.

Just after 8 p.m., Spencer Police initially received a call reporting a domestic dispute at 160 Northwest Road. When Officer Brandon Fullam arrived on scene, he spoke with a woman at the

home who said the suspect had left. The woman was advised to seek a restraining order at East Brookfield District Court the next morning.

A short time later, Officer Fullam encountered Lynde in his vehicle heading back toward 160 Northwest Road. Fullam attempted to stop the vehicle, but it sped off. A chase ensued, with Lynde reaching speeds of 80 miles per hour before he ultimately returned to 160 Northwest Road.

In the driveway of the home, Lynde was ordered to stop and drop the gun, officials said. After Lynde reportedly pointed the ostensible firearm at Fullam, the officer fired one shot and Lynde collapsed.

The replica gun is a black pellet pistol, police said.

Officer Fullam is a six-year law enforcement veteran, spending the last year with the Spencer Police Department. He has been placed on administrative leave, Early's office indicated.

Police said the victim of the domestic incident will not be identified. State Police detectives assigned to the Worcester County District Attorney's office continue to investigate the circumstances leading up to the shooting.

Meanwhile, documents obtained by the New Leader reveal Lynde's extensive history of charges dating back to 2001, when he was involved in a police chase and subsequent standoff at a North Brookfield residence. The chase began after Lynde was suspected of robbing and damaging a Sturbridge liquor store.

In 2014, Lynde was arrested in South Carolina following another domestic incident that led to a confrontation with police. He was charged with resisting arrest with a deadly weapon, criminal domestic violence, and third-degree arson. A year earlier, South Carolina police responded to his then girlfriend's workplace after she reported him making threats.

## Webster man arrested during Worcester drug bust

WORCESTER - A major drug enforcement operation in Worcester yielded four arrests on Friday, July 28 including one Webster resident after officers of the Worcester Police Department Vice Squad acted on a search warrant for an apartment in the city.

According to official reports from the Worcester Police Department the WPD Vice Squad acted on the warrant at 830A West Boylston St., Apt. 8, as around 12:30 p.m. on July 28 after an undercover officer set up surveillance that covered

the entire apartment building.

Police located 29-year-old Joseph Ekberg of Brooks Street in Worcester at 1:15 p.m. standing outside of the building before he entered a Chevrolet Cruz and left the premises. Officers pursued the vehicle and performed a traffic stop on Anson Street where officers located \$2,691 in cash and a half gram of heroin along with four suboxon strips inside the car.

Upon returning to the West Boylston Street apartment officers executed the search warrant, entering the apartment facility where police suspected Ekberg was conducting a drug trade. Using a key located on

Ekberg's key ring they entered apartment 14 at which time police located and identified a second individual, 38-year-old apartment resident Richard Bain, who police had seen talking with Ekberg earlier in the day.

Police, anticipating a search warrant for the apartment, entered to secure the residence.

At that time two other individuals were located, 26-year-old Oakham native Cody Handrahan and 28-year-old Webster resident Joseph Randell, with numerous hypodermic needles, a digital scale, and plastic baggies containing heroin residue in plain sight.

A search of Randell by police produced 11 knotted bags of heroin, a suboxon strip, and two clonazepam pills.

A second search was conducted in the same building, this time at apartment eight, where another digital scale and more plastic baggies were discovered. During the search one officer was stuck by an uncapped needle and received medical treatment as a local hospital before being released.

Officers received an official search warrant for apartment 14 at around 4:15 p.m. that afternoon and a more in-depth investigation revealed 30 to 40 knotted bags of heroin, another

digital scale, several cell phones, packaging material, two pieces of crack cocaine, and 15 different unidentified pills.

As a result of the search all four men were arrested with Ekberg, Bain, and Randell all being charged with possession of class A substance with intent to sell and possession of a class B substance. Webster's Randell also received a charge for possession of a class C substance. Handrahan was charged with knowingly being present where heroin is kept. All four men were to be arraigned in Worcester County District Court on Monday, July 31.

on the Planning Board. Escolas noted his reading of the wording "would ban the medical one we already approved," and the board voted to recommend the bylaw "provided it doesn't negatively impact medical [use]."

"If it were just recreational, I don't have a problem," agreed Dale Mahota. "But it says 'all other types of related business.'"

In general, state law (Chapter 369 of the Acts of 2012 and 105 CMR 725) doesn't allow towns to ban medical cultivation or dispensing sites, just regulate and zone them. The section specifying municipal requirements is very short. It states only two things: that facilities "shall comply with all local rules, regulations, ordinances and bylaws;" and that "The Department does not mandate any involvement by municipalities or local boards of health in the regulation of RMDs ... or any other aspects of marijuana for medical use. However, nothing in 105 CMR 725 shall be construed so as to prohibit lawful local oversight and regulation, including fee requirements, that does not conflict or interfere with the [law's] operation."

According to Planning Board minutes, Oxford's proposal first came up in June, when member Norman LeBlanc shared a recent news story with the board. At that time, Mark Lee noted, "nothing prevents the town from enacting broader restrictions." Clerk Mary Herriage observed the state's deadline

for legislative action was April 2018, so any bylaw would have to be adopted in October to qualify. Last week, she added that the law also requires ballot approval, which means next year's spring election, meaning "if it goes to town meeting and town meeting voters don't agree with it," it can't meet the state deadline. (There's also always an option of holding a separate special town meeting and a special election, but nobody on the board suggested such an avenue.)

The board will hold public hearings on both proposals in September.

Additionally, they voted to seek town meeting approval of a plan to rezone part of the east side of Route 56 in North Oxford between the road and the river from residential to General Business. That will also go to a September public hearing.

Escolas noted the goal is to "get residential use out of there," and it was partly inspired by the plan a few years back to build a large 40B condo complex in that vicinity. He estimated four homes will be affected, but predicted those people would get more money for their property with business zoning if they ever choose to sell.

Lastly, the board set an August 28 public hearing for the new Master Plan, indicating they'll be accepting comments from citizens and other boards on it on or before that date. The plan is on the town website.

## Tricky turn signs: what is the score?

Road improvements and the upgrading of traffic signals can equal new experiences for drivers. A person was traveling in another community and came upon an intersection which had a flashing yellow left turn arrow. They wondered what exactly should

drivers to do at this type of signal? Turn arrow signals are generally found at intersections where there is heavy traffic flow. These lights allow vehicles to make uninterrupted turns which alleviate back-ups and provide clear guidance to drivers. In fact, we hope we can add these turn arrow lights to our busy intersection of West Main Street and Schofield Avenue at some point in the near future. The rules for these signals are generally contained in the state highway regulations and/or in local traffic by laws or ordinances. Most intersections have only red or green turn arrows. These exist at most traffic signals along Webster's Main Street. An example of a flashing yellow arrow is at the intersection of Thompson Road and Lake Parkway in Webster. While traveling north on Thompson Road, drivers will see this arrow flashing on occasion.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts Drivers Manual, provided by the Department of Transportation, specifically addresses these yellow flashing turn arrows. It states in part, "A flashing yellow arrow allows you to turn left when oncoming traffic has a green light but the traffic is clear. You must carefully determine that there is an adequate gap in the oncoming traffic and ensure that there are no pedestrians in your path before making your turn."

Therefore, this signal serves as a caution to drivers. It allows for the left turn as long as the driver properly yields to others with the right of way.

It is very important to note the presence of signs, posted at some intersections, which make certain movements illegal. Similar to the "No Turn on Red" signs for right turns, some intersections may allow turns on green arrows only. The Lake Parkway and Thompson Road intersection has one of these signs informing drivers of what is permitted when the arrow is flashing yellow. Take the time to look for any possible signage in order to make your turn safely. This is especially true if you are in an unfamiliar location. Drivers should exercise caution at all intersections. Take the time to cautiously enter these locations in order to avoid accidents and possible injuries.

# Back in the world

Paul Shanley is back in public, living in a small apartment out in Ware. The announcement the defrocked priest is out, mostly because of his age, has had a lot of people disturbed.

Is it possible, even at his more advanced age (he is now in his 80s) he might reoffend?

There are a lot of safeguards in place, attempts to keep children safe from such people; announcements of where they live, and awareness by the police of who they are and where they are likely to be; where they work, where they "hang out."

It's been a calmer, quieter few years in the Catholic Church; we can only hope it is because people have become more vigilant and they are also more likely to blow a whistle rather than accept someone they find is inappropriate. They won't just pass a sketchy person along to be someone else's problem either, the Church has become more responsible.

But, and it's a big "But", we can't let our guard down. Not with church groups, not with scout troops, not with sports teams, not in any place where we hope our children are safe and with other responsible adults learning something valuable...good lessons not bad ones.

The possibilities are always there, unfortunately; it's up to all the rest of us to stay alert.

Along that same vein, there was a shooting close to home last week. As the facts unfold, we discover the man had a long, violent history; and his choice to wave what looked like a real pistol at Spencer Police (who know him and his history), was probably not a good life choice.

Now that he is no longer a threat to anyone, we have been told about his long history, his arrests for domestic violence, his repeat offenses.

The new guidelines for the police departments to provide information on domestic calls has changed in the past few months. The addresses are not provided, but more importantly, the name of the person arrested for the domestic violence is also no longer available for publication.

The reasoning, we were told, is to protect the lives of the victims in the incidents.

No, it isn't.

It's blatantly to protect the perpetrators. The person, after all, is arrested. Arrests for all other crimes are public record.

And if this person has harmed someone, and might harm someone else, then the name should be public.

Period.

There's no protection of victims here. There's a good old boy decision to protect the guy who did the hitting.

One has to wonder if the fellow with the long history of domestic problems and who just lost his life for his idiocy just might have been less of a threat with all his neighbors aware of him.

# Honoring Sacred Silence

Recently, from June 30 through July 4, I served as a voting delegate to the biennial General Synod of The United Church of Christ, held this time in Baltimore, Maryland. For those unfamiliar with our process, approximately 700 people gather to search their minds and hearts, following great amounts of study and prayer, to vote on issues affecting our Christian denomination of approximately 900,000 people, possibly holding wider implications for our nation and world. Most often a person can only serve in this way, voting as a representative of a particular geographical area, twice in their lifetime. My son Tim and I have now served together in this way twice (with my wife and Tim's mom Sarah with us as a guest), first in Cleveland, Ohio (where the United Church of Christ has its headquarters) in 2015, then in Baltimore just a few weeks ago.

Serving in this way has been one of the greatest privileges along my life's journey. During the time of voting, each of us holds an electronic clicker. We push the number 1 for yes, 2 for no and 3 to abstain. Our denomination, as is true for our country and world, is very diverse. We don't all think the same. Every once in a while, however, we find an issue almost all of us can agree on.

During one significant vote in Baltimore, we found near unanimity. 97% voted in favor. 2% voted against. 1% abstained. A common human reaction then occurred. The 97% began to applaud and cheer.

God bless our moderator who quickly came to the microphone, admonishing the majority, of which I was a part. As best I can remember her words, she said: "Please, refrain from applauding. Thank you for your vote and yes, the resolution has passed. Yet, there are 3% who did not vote as the majority did. We honor their thoughtfulness and their deep caring which led to their decision. All voices matter. We hold one another in love and learn from one another."

Then there were moments of sacred silence, hearing the truth in her words.

Over the course of 5 days of engaging in various difficult, intellectually and emotionally engaging conversations, this was the moment when I paused to think: "If only this moment could be held up as an example for our local town meetings, national and international conversations." I may disagree with how my neighbor voted, yet I can still love and engage my neighbor in conversations concerning issues affecting the well-being of all people and all life on earth. We can honor each other's voice and learn from one another.

A wise person once said, referring to their understanding of God: "Your word

is a lamp to my feet, and a light to my path." (Psalm 119:105 - NRSV)

# Fishing is great just off the coast

Fishing aboard the Yankee Fleet in Gloucester is providing anglers with some great haddock fishing. The full closure of cod in the Gulf of Maine is an indication that the cod stocks are still in serious trouble, and even with the strict regulations imposed on commercial and recreational anglers a number of years ago, they have not shown any sign of improvement. Haddock stocks however have shown a significant increase in their numbers, and recreational anglers can now harvest 15 haddock daily. This week's two pictures show a couple of young anglers with nice size haddock that they caught aboard the Yankee Fleet last week.

The harsh decrease in cod and haddock limits has already done a lot of damage to fishing charter boats in the Gulf of Maine. One of my favorite fishing charter boats was the Clipper Fleet out of Salisbury. Captain Tom & Joe Grady ran a first class operation for many years, taking over the business from their dad long ago. The Grady family lived in Millville for many years and had local anglers fishing from there two boats, "The Challenger" and the "Sundance," until they closed their fishing charter business a couple of years ago, due to the closure on cod and a decrease in haddock daily bag limits.

Once again, I have watched a local television program that is recommending the eating of sand shark. One particular restaurant was promoting the


fish for great table fare, and acknowledged serving the fish for fish & chips at their restaurant. I am certainly not ready to start eating sand shark. I have learned that the sand shark excretes their waste thru their flesh. I find it hard to believe that the fish is safe for human consumption.

The safe operation of ocean farming is becoming a lucrative business for many companies in Massachusetts and bordering states. Oysters are a big business, but require lot of work and monitoring to insure they are safe to eat. The high demand for oysters is increasing every year. Fish farms are also on the rise. Farm raised salmon and other species of fish like catfish & tilapia are big business.

For our family, we are fortunate to have a good supply of

fresh wild fish from the ocean for the dinner table. My fishing activities each year supply some great eating of summer fluke, sea bass, striper & tautog, for my family. Unfortunately catching legal size fish for the dinner table lately during my fishing trips, is becoming harder to retain a few fish to eat.

Last week my fishing partner and I fished one of our favorite spots in Rhode Island, and was met by three large trawlers just returning to Port in Galilee RI. They had obviously been fishing all night. As we entered the breach way, we could see three more commercial draggers scraping the ocean floor. They were only a half mile or so from the mainland. I commented to my fishing buddy that fishing may not be too good today, but we were hoping that they had left a few fluke and seabass for

us. Catching our limit of nice seabass was easy but the fluke fishing only had us catching two under size fish.

Charter boats are also having a hard time finding fluke for their customers. We will need to find a new fishing spot for fluke!

Anglers with larger boats are doing very well on fluke and seabass around Block Island and at the Windmills. Fortunately, draggers are not able to navigate that area.

Freshwater fishing for trout has started to slow, but deep trollers are still finding some nice rainbow trout at Wallum Lake and Webster Lake during the early morning hours. Comet Pond's another good place to catch some impressive trout. Cape ponds like Peters and Hamblin also have a good population of trout at this time

of year, as most anglers are fishing saltwater. ## Webster-Charlton Senior League All-Stars reach East Regional semifinals

WORCESTER — The Webster-Charlton Senior Little League team didn't lose its East Regional Softball Tournament semifinal against Team New York on Thursday, July 27 at Vernon Hill Park as much as it just ran out of innings.

Trailing by four runs after five innings, Webster-Charlton ratcheted up the game's tension meter considerably when it exploded for three runs in the top of the sixth inning, but New York pitcher Fran Cipollina retired the final four batters to seal the 4-3 victory.

"This game could have gone either way, really," Webster-Charlton manager Ed Johns said. "It was a great game. We have nothing to be ashamed of. I think the fact that we hung with them surprised them."

The big blow for Webster-Charlton was delivered by shortstop Emilee Leber, who smashed a bases loaded two-

out, two-strike pitch deep to right field, scoring teammates Madison Johns, Hailey Delphia and Olivia Sokowaski.

"I don't know what the pitch was," said Leber, who had both of Webster-Charlton's hits in the game, having also singled in the second inning. "I just know I had two strikes on me, so it was really nerve-wracking at that point because any close pitch could get called a strike and the at-bat would be over. The pitch was outside and when I made contact it was just hoping it would go past someone so I could get on base."

Leber said that she knew the magnitude of the hit the second it left her bat.

"I actually ended up tearing up on second because I saw the scoreboard with our three runs on it and I was like, 'Wow, I did that,'" Leber said. "It felt really good."

Johns was thrilled for his player. "How about that?" The manager said of Leber's bases-clearing hit. "That is something she is going to remember for a long, long, long time. It brought us right back."

The fact that Webster-Charlton was even within striking distance of tying or taking the lead in the sixth inning is a credit to Madison Johns, who pitched out of one jam after another. New York left 11 runners stranded on base in the game, including the bases loaded in the first inning and two on in each of the third, fourth and fifth frames.

Johns finished the game allowing four runs on nine hits. She struck out six and walked five.

"She's a very good pitcher," New York manager Joe Corretjer said of Johns. "She's the best pitcher we faced in the tournament. She made some big pitches in big situations. She did a great job of pitching."


Madison Johns was taken aback when she heard about the kind words from Corretjer.

"Wow. That's a nice compliment from him," she said. "There are a lot of good pitchers in this tournament. As far as getting out of all those jams, it's tough to bear down and get out of a tough situation that many times, but as long as I put my mind to it I had the confidence I would."

Webster-Charlton advanced to the semifinal round of the East Regional by defeating Team Maryland, 9-3, in a quarterfinal round game on July 26, also at Vernon Hill Park.

Cleanup hitter Hailey Delphia swung a big bat against Maryland, going 2 for 3 with a two-run, first-inning double and a three-run, second-inning home run. The home run sailed over the left-field fence and staked Webster-Charlton to a 7-0 lead.

"I went up there just trying to swing at strikes," Delphia said. "The first one was a perfect pitch to hit. The second

was a little high, maybe out of the strike zone even, but I was able to get a good uppercut swing on it and hit it out."

Despite her prowess at the plate, the biggest play Delphia made may have come in the top of the seventh inning. Maryland already had a run in, to cut the deficit down to 9-3, and had two runners on and no outs. Maryland cleanup hitter Grace Harkey drilled the ball to the right side, but Delphia fielded the hard line drive cleanly for the first out of the inning. The next two Maryland batters went quietly to end the threat and the game.

"That was a huge out," Delphia said. "It was their last at-bat; they were desperate. They had a run in and two on. They were starting to think they just might be able to come back. The first out is so important at that point. I feel like it really took the wind out of their sails."

Webster-Charlton finished the tournament with a record of 3-3. Team New York finished 7-0, defeating Team New Jersey by a 4-2 final to win the East Regional.

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

lates the hospital's claim of providing "total local care."

Furthermore, Metras decried the lack of information and public outreach surrounding the process.

"To continue to go to appointments and not get straight answers is unacceptable. Unacceptable," he said, having previously noted, "Apparently, there was a letter that went out to 'Friends of Harrington.' I guess I'm not a 'friend of Harrington.'"

Nurse Lindsey Boulay, with nine years on the obstetrics ward, essentially agreed with him, saying "nobody outside the Board of Directors was consulted" and "our ideas have been ignored or flat-out rejected."

Afterward, she noted the nurses first heard of the proposal May 23, and if it happens, all 19 OB/Gyn nurses "will be out of jobs."

Speaking on behalf of the nurses, Boulay she tried to make a case that keeping the service had more ramifications than just the number of births. Among other things, she noted the emergency room often sees very rapid births due to opioids and other issues, and worried what effect not having someone with obstetric specialization

available would have on such people. It takes two years to develop skill in the field, and if Harrington's doctors are on call at UMass Medical Center, they might not be available here in emergencies, she said.

She summarized the plan as "a disservice to all involved, and the constant transport will strain an already strained EMS system. To the board, it's all about the numbers. To us, it's about the families."

In making his case for the closure, CEO Edward Moore agreed that the numbers were a key aspect. He said Harrington has seen a large decline in deliveries since 2007 (from 412 to 217), while the average for Bay State community hospitals is nearly 1,100 a year. That makes Harrington the third lowest statewide, with only Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket being lower, and he said some people surveyed said they went elsewhere because Harrington lacks a Neonatal ICU. (He and others noted very few deliveries need such a unit, however.)

"We don't have critical mass to continue the service going forward," Moore said, after listed several things the hospital has done to try to boost the numbers. One of those things was allowing deliveries at its Charlton location.

Overall, Moore added, "part of the decision-making process" was the fact

the unit is losing \$1.8 million a year. If it closes, most of the doctors have already agreed to stay at Harrington, serve in Spencer, and will be on rotation at UMass. They will continue to handle pre- and post-natal care and gynecological surgery at Harrington, he said.

"That is the hardest part of this. I know personally that we provide a great service," Moore said when he began his presentation.

Board member Laurence Morrison agreed, saying he voted for it "reluctantly," and only after a "methodical" look at the issue that found "a marketplace response which was thin." He said the "accumulated, hard, unblinking data ... proved compelling, like it or not."

Tony Detarando added that few votes in his time on the board "have been as emotional and impactful" as this, and it "was not a conclusion taken lightly." He noted the hospital tried to stave it off a few years ago, when the fiscal picture was similarly bad, by hiring two more OB/gyns and opening a unit in Charlton, but it didn't work.

To Dr. Susan Waters, the hospital's expansion is part of the problem. A former Harrington nurse now at Head Start, she urged Harrington to "discontinue areas that are empty -- offices and real estate," and put the funds into the birthing unit and other programs.

"They bought up all these little prop-

erties, and now they're empty," Waters said afterward. "They should be investing in the babies. They're expanding so big and fast, but not investing in what they have."

"Most of our properties are occupied and utilized," Moore responded, noting, selling property "is not a great long-term solution to maintain long-term needs."

"We're not the first hospital not to have a maternity program" -- Mary Lane in Ware, Wing in Palmer, and Marlborough Hospital all disbanded theirs, he added. "There are models and solutions out there that we haven't publicized because we're still working out the details."

The hearing, conducted by the state Department of Public Health, aimed to get testimony on whether keeping the maternity ward open "is necessary for preserving access to health service in the area," DPH representative Sherman Long said. DPH will make a decision within 15 days of Friday (that is, by either Aug. 12 or 18, depending on whether the requirement is calendar or working days) and is accepting further comments by email to stephen.davis@state.ma.us.

Mascenic school system in New Hampshire.

Unlike many in her post, she has seen the field from an unusual side: she spent a few years running a charter school, Hillview. She said they're "very similar" in most respects because charters are state-funded and "still accountable for all the same rules," including standardized testing. But charters have a notable limitation: their state money is restricted to per-pupil dollars only; they don't get transportation, building or other kinds of aid.

"Public schools offer more opportunity to offer different

programs more quickly and easily because the funding exists," she said.

Webster's variety of programs are one of the things Goguen likes about it, although she admits she doesn't know them "intimately" yet. One that did jump out at her though was the fact all students are eligible for free meals and many partake of the summer meals program; she said she feels Webster is doing well at providing kids the help they need.

She didn't exactly get much of a chance to wade in slowly. Even before Goguen was formally in office, she was working with the outgoing interim to fill two key posts: principals at Park Ave Elementary and the Middle School, Ginger

Coleman and Michael Zajac, respectively. She introduced both to the public at Tuesday's School Committee meeting.

"I'm excited about having two new leaders in the district," Goguen said, adding that she intends to "set some clear goals and look at why we're at Level 3."

A key aspect of that process will be getting the teachers involved in a lot of work on curriculum, which she described as the whole system's "main purpose -- kids learning at their own pace."

"I try, even as a superintendent, to spend a lot of time with kids," she said. In her last district, she helped start the local Special Olympics, and generally tries to put a fair amount of

energy into special education to ensure the programs meet their needs. By the time her first three-year stint is done, she hopes to have "made a positive impact" and closed the learning gap between groups within the district, something she notes is "everywhere."

Hurton said he liked her commitment to teacher development, and noted she'll have a challenge in continuing to improve education in the face of funding that meets the needs but still isn't really enough.

To him, fixing that will require the state to commit significant money -- "probably billions of dollars" -- to implementing the recommendations of the legislature's Foundation Budget Review Committee,

and that will require a lot of public pressure.

"There was more movement this year than in the past, so they're beginning to talk about it," Hurton said, adding Goguen's well positioned to deal with the issue. "One thing that impressed me is that she came from a very, very difficult budget scenario in New Hampshire." Her ability to "look at each [budget] line," get lots of grants, and work with "our great business manager will help improve things."

"I'm really excited about the future of the school district moving forward with her," he added.

there to do traffic whenever we have people available, but it depends on call volume and other issues we are dealing with."

Richard Clark noted that his concerns are not just for himself, but for others on his street as well as he has noticed Airport Road specifically has become a hotspot for speeding and pedestrians walking the road, where there is little to no sidewalk, risk their lives when walking on their own street. Clark said that many have blamed the students of the nearby schools for the speeding, but noted that school is not in session and the problem persists.

Selectmen asked both Clark and Chief Wojnar for any suggestions they had in resolving the perceived speeding epidemic in Dudley. Clark said he believes it's a matter of showing motorists that no speeding will be tolerated and establishing a reputation that speaks for

itself.

"I think one possibility could be increased signage or moving the signs that we have because I think they've just become background noise at this point. People are so used to ignoring them they don't even see them any longer," Clark suggested. "Another thought would be a no tolerance policy. No more warnings, you get a ticket. I think we need to create a mindset. There are some communities not that far away (like Douglas) where if you speed you know you're going to be stopped. We need that sort of mindset here in Dudley."

Wojnar followed this up acknowledging that a shortage in personnel, which he said is not a problem unique to Dudley's police department, does play a factor in the ability for police to effectively eliminate the threat of speeding in town. However, Wojnar stated that there are many areas of concern throughout the community, even more significant and consistently problematic than Airport Road, and another part

of the issue is making sure the town utilizing the money and manpower in the most effective way possible. He also restated the busy schedule and unpredictable work environment his officers have to endure while also trying to deter speeders and aggressive drivers.

"We try to do (radar checks) several times a week if we can, but again the problem becomes what happens. It's not a job where you can show up in the morning and say 'alright from seven until eight you're going to do this'. Things change at the drop of a hat. We try to focus it and I'm working with my sergeants to get regular people out there to do things. Several times a week we're out in different places doing different things," said the chief. "There are several problem areas we have to address and look at. The issue becomes if we're going to spend money or whatever we're going to do then how do we direct those resources? I know we've had a few discussions with Central Massachusetts Regional Planning and those things have come up to have us

identify areas that we can target. There are certain things in the mix that we have to address."

The chief said he is not taking Clark's concerns lightly and promised to consult his officers about how to more effectively deter speeders in the foreseeable future, however he said the solution may be more difficult to come to with manpower and funding limited.

"Certainly the staffing level is a huge issue because as issues come up during the day you have to deal with them and an average case comes along and gets tied up for four hours with something. They could be put doing something else, but they're tied up with the task at hand," said the chief.

While a final solution was not determined during the July 24 meeting, everyone involved seems content that the problem will be addressed again in the near future with a possible long-term resolution to help make Dudley a safer community for everyone on or around the roadways.
