Charlton selectmen welcome draft hazard mitigation plan

CHARLTON – The town of Charlton is edging closer to finalizing a hazard mitigation plan as one of several towns in Southern Worcester County looking to increase preparedness in the case of a significant natural disaster.

Peter Peloquin, Assistant Planner for the Central Mass Regional Planning Commission, presented a draft of the plan to selectmen at a meeting in late June where he explained that the purpose of the plan is not to respond to the effects of a storm after it happens, but rather to be prepared for a weather event before it does any damage. However, adopting such a plan could also greatly enhance the resources the town has I the aftermath.

"This is more encompassing all natural hazards so we're thinking tornados, earthquakes, hurricanes, wild-fires, droughts, snow storms, etc.," Peloquin told selectmen. "Charlton is doing this plan because in the General Disaster and Mitigation act of 2000 it requires all towns and cities to develop and adopt a Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan that's approved by FEMA and adopt-

ed by the town selectmen. By adopting the plan, it enables the town to pursue grant funding through FEMA."

Peloquin said his department examined buildings in Charlton, the personnel on hand to handle situations, and zoning and planning rules and regulations as well as storm management. Speaking to the benefits of having the plan in place Peloquin estimated that a well thought out and functioning Hazard Mitigation Plan would save a community \$4 in response cost for every dollar spent on creating a preemptive plan of action.

"We're trying to break the cycle of disaster and rebuild," Peloquin said. "We are looking at all areas of all kinds of weather situations we could think of - It's not a plan for how we're going to respond when these things happen. We're thinking about trying to prepare prior to when these storms do occur."

The CMRPC acted as a technical assistant on the plan while local hazard mitigation teams consisting of Charlton personnel conducted several meetings to identify local hazards. The public meeting held before the Board of Selectmen in June was the third step I the process, a public meeting providing an

update on the plan's development as well as presenting a draft. The plan was produced after CMRPC helped identify and map critical facilities and local hazard areas with the goal of prioritizing mitigation strategies. Public feedback was also gathered through a survey in the summer of 2018 where 62 responses indicated that there are concerns over the town's preparedness for natural disas-

While Charlton does have existing mitigation measures in place, such as dam safety regulations, salting and sanding roadways, permits for outdoor burning, zoning regulations, catch basin cleaning, street sweeping, tree trimming, and drainage, the plan enhances and builds on the policies and procedures already in place effectively modernizing and adding to the current response plan. Some of the highlights of the draft included pursuing funding for a comprehensive study to identify, prioritize, and replace culverts town-wide, making an inventory of shelter and emergency resources, improving and maintaining hazard warning systems, continuing incorporating disaster

North Oxford sewer rates rise

OXFORD – After continuing their public hearing so residents of the affected area could be directly notified, selectmen unanimously approved a proposed sewer rate hike for North Oxford last month.

The plan calls for boosting last year's rate of \$10.98 per 1,000 gallons to \$12.35 for the sewer service area between the

high school and the northern town line. Residents in South Oxford, where a separate system exists, will see no change

in their rate of \$16.86.

DPW Director Sean Divoll said the hike is needed to address issues surrounding "inflow-infiltration," which has increased the quantity flowing through the system. That, in turn, means higher costs for transport

through Auburn to the Upper Blackstone Treatment Plant, which also charges for treating

The idea of delaying the hearing came from Selectman John Saad, who argued that nobody had shown up at its previous session in early June and few people read the legal ads. He requested the town send notices directly to the roughly 400 customers. It did so, but just

one person attended the continuation to express concerns.

Richard Neiland objected to the fact the town charges for all water used, noting some towns give breaks for uses that do not end up in the sewer system, such as pools and irrigation. He said his last quarterly bill showed 22,000 gallons at a cost of \$241.56; the new rate would hike it to \$271.70.

"What are they changing

drastically to go that high?" he asked.

That's when Divoll noted the town does have a "deduct meter" program, by which residents measure their exterior use. Oxford provides the meters for free, but homeowners need a licensed plumber to install them. He also explained the "I-I" issues.

Sturbridge Trails Committee receives MassTrails grants

STURBRIDGE—The Sturbridge Trails Committee has been awarded two Mass Trail grants from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation as of Wednesday, June 26, after applying for funds to further its trail construction last February.

The grants are part of the MassTrails program, an initiative by Gov. Charlie Baker to provide funding and resources to expand shared-use pathways and recreational trails throughout the state. Announced in November of 2018 and managed by the MassDOT Trails Team established in 2017, it will provide approximately \$5 million in matching grants this year along with technical assistance and resources in order to build and maintain Massachusetts trails.

"The driving focus of the grant program is to help communities start building missing sections of trails," said Tom Chamberland, a member of the Sturbridge Trails Committee. "It's about opening up a bigger network of recreational trail

opportunities."
The first grant, which is in the amount of \$44,390, will allow

the town to begin the initial phase of parking lot and trail construction on the Riverlands, located at 52 Stallion Hill Rd., across from the main parking lot for Old Sturbridge Village. The town is planning for the first grant to cover the expenses of a 22 car parking lot and the first couple thousand feet of the Grand Trunk Trail.

"The total length of the Grand Trunk Trail through Sturbridge is a little over six miles," said Chamberland. "We have two and a half miles completed and the Riverlands sec-

tion is another mile and a half."
The second grant, which is in the amount of \$12,500, will allow for a feasibility study to be done for the central Sturbridge section of the Grand Trunk Trail, which is proposed to be a major trail from Westfield Lake in Southbridge paralleling the Quinebaug River all the way out to Route 20 at the

Leicester officials look within for new police leadership

LEICESTER - The police department will see familiar faces in new places this fall, as the internal appointment process for the chief and lieutenant positions continues.

Following the retirement of former police chief James Hurley in December, selectmen opted to promote the next chief from within the department. At the Board's June 17 meeting, selectmen voted 4-1 to use the MMA Consulting Group to conduct an internal assessment of department personnel this sum-

Selectman Harry Brooks was the lone dissenting vote at the June 17 meeting.

"I voted against using the consulting firm because I believe it's a waste of money," Brooks said. "The Board already voted to appoint internally, and I believe they will just tell us what we have already learned.

Over the next few months, the goal for the consulting group is to help identify the best internal candidates to fill the chief and lieutenant positions, officials said. To ensure fairness, the MMA assessment will include the entire police department ros-

The MMA Consulting Group, based in Plymouth, specializes in municipal affairs. Town officials have stressed the importance of the evaluation and selection process this summer, especially following the departure of a well-liked chief in Hurley who helped advance the department in several ways.

After Hurley's retirement,

officials determined that internal candidates would be the best options due to familiarity with the department. Maintaining strong communications with other town departments and continuing community outreach efforts will be priorities for the next leadership team, officials

"All current staff members are eligible to compete for these positions," said Town Administrator David Genereux, who has helped facilitate the process. "The goal is to have a permanent chief and lieutenant in place by the early

Kenneth Antanavica served as the department's interim police chief since Hurley's retirement. Paul Doray, meanwhile, has served as the LPD's interim lieutenant.

mitigation actions into appropriate local and regional plans, and updating the

hazard mitigation plan every five years. While the draft plan was received warmly by selectmen, there's still work to be done. The draft plan must now be received by the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency as well as the Federal Emergency Management Agency before it comes back to the Board of Selectmen for a resolution voting to adopt the final draft. If FEMA approves the final plan, Charlton will officially have a solid plan in place for any future natural hazards that may target the community.







Police, fire chiefs welcomed to Safety Building Committee

CHARLTON - On May 20, the town of Charlton approved the construction of a new public safety complex to be erected on Masonic Home Road. Now the project moves to the next steps as a new committee was established to see the construction through to the end.

The Charlton Board of Selectmen voted to establish an 11-member public safety construction building committee on June 18 with the committee to be made up mostly of the same members as the previous building committee, with two exceptions. After some deliberation and minor debate, the selectmen voted to make Fire Chief Ed Knopf and Police Chief Graham Maxfield full time members of the committee and finalized a pair of August dates to be set aside for a referendum allowing voters the final say on the project after town meeting approved \$28.5 million for the construc-

The original building committee that helped produce the proposed project as it stands right now was comprised of two members each of the police and fire departments as well

as a selectman and two members of the public along with one alternate from the fire and police departments respectively. Selectmen played with the idea of keeping the established membership intact, but it was selectman David Singer who recommended the chiefs be permanently added to the mix rather than serving as alternates as they did before.

"I greatly appreciate all the work that the Public Safety Building Committee has done. I know, as do (the other selectmen) the work that goes into being on the committee. It's a lot of work, a lot of time, and a lot of dedication. That being said town meeting did approve the monies, but we're not locked in to the plan or technologies. We have room to flex with that as long as we stay within the budget town meeting voted. That being said, I would personally like to see the makeup change for the next phase. I would like to see a fiveor six-member committee. To me I think it's critical that both chiefs are key members of this

committee," Singer said. However, Selectman John McGrath argued that the chiefs seemed to feel comfortable with the status quo and that adding them wasn't entirely necessary unless they wanted to serve on the committee.

"I think that the chiefs have basically picked the people that they feel represent them on the committee very well and I know that the chiefs have not been shy at showing up at the meetings," McGrath said. "I would ask them if they're comfortable with the way the committee is set up now."

Both chiefs were present for the discussion and revealed their faith in the members that served on the building committee, although both noted they are employees that answer to the Board of Selectmen and would serve if called upon. However Chief Knopf wanted clarification of exactly what it is the new committee would be working on. Selectman Singer said tweaking the design would be one of the committee's most pressing responsibilities specifically pointing out that the current proposal has two gymnasiums, one for police and another for fire personnel, which seemed to Singer to be a waste of space and resources when one gym would do. Chief Knopf said that even with himself and Chief Maxfield on the committee they may not have the knowledge needed to make

appropriate calls on the build-

ing layout.
"I think we're at a stage now where we're making decisions on how the building is going to look and how it's going to operate," Chief Knopf said. "There needs to be subject matter experts involved that we need to be taking their recommendations from and I don't know if this committee has any of that. I don't believe there are.'

Town Administrator Robin Craver intervened to clear up some details about the project and the personnel involved. She noted that there are several individuals involved outside of the building committee that will help resolve any design issues or major changes needed to the plan and they will be working closely with the building committee to finalize the proposal.

"We have an owners project manager that oversees the whole thing. We also have an architect that will be designing the building. This committee has done hours on its own of going out to other buildings and taking a look at them. We never expected to find that kind of technical expertise on a building committee. That's more the guiding body. But we would get experts in the areas that we need," Craver said. "I

really don't want anybody at home thinking that this committee would be doing any design or technology or any of those components because that would be done by professionals who do these buildings all the

After continued discussion the decision was made to compromise, keeping the bulk of the existing membership of the building committee intact increasing the membership to eleven adding the two chiefs as permanent members. Now three police officers, three firefighters, one selectman, two citizens, and two alternates from each of the departments will make up the committee which will officially be retitled to reflect the committee's new charge of overseeing construction plans for the building.

In addition to finalizing the building committee, selectmen also agreed on two dates, a primary and backup, to use Heritage School for a referendum to allow voters to cast their ballots in support or opposition of whatever finalized plan is put forward. The primary date is Aug. 13, but if the school if the school id unavailable on that day the vote will be held

Sturbridge and Brimfield town line. Eventually, it is envisioned to be a 66 Palmer to Franklin.

'We have both ends done, but the middle is kind of loose," said Chamberland. "This feasibility study is to figure out how to connect the trail and work on the last section. The challenge is the Grand Trunk Rail Line has been all but obliterated in that section because of I-84 and it cuts through the middle of Old Sturbridge Village. We need to figure out a new way to route the trail. It will give us potential options and cost and from there the town can decide what to do.'

The state required time frame to complete the projects that are funded by the MassTrails grants is two years and it is estimated that the projects will start sometime in the fall, as the town is currently waiting on the state to provide contract documents.

"I anticipate both projects will start sometime in September," said Chamberland. "The town is required to provide a 20 percent match to the grants, so our match is a combination of funds from the Community Preservation Fund, approved at last June's annual town meeting, and our due time and

'The vision of the Grand Trunk Trail was to be the main backbone trail for the residents to use and it is envisigned to be an east to west trail that will go from one end of town to the other," said Chamberland. "When it's complete, you'll be able to go fishing at East Brimfield and end at Westfield. The trail passes through the Riverlands, goes very close to Leadmine Mountain Parcel, and gives an opportunity to get to open space parcels without getting in your car and driving to a parking lot. It is a key part of the interconnect ability of open space parcels and it will make a longer journey and experience.'

"We have a plan in place to address that inflow-infiltration," he said. "... We think the sewers along Route 20 are to blame for this.'

He said the department has already put a camera through those sewer lines to locate leak points, and will do dyeand/or smoke-testing to see where others might be. He said he's met with state Department of Transportation officials on including sewer main upgrades as part of the state's Route 20 project; the design work is done, all Oxford needs is a source of funds for the roughly \$3 million the work needs.

Town Manager Jen Callahan said she's working with affected businesses to calculate the economic impact of their sewer plan as part of their appeal for state aid.

"If we had a funding source, we could

open bids tomorrow," Divoll said. The two largest areas served by that part of the sewer system are Plymouth

Village and the Thayer Pond condo complex, with several other homes and businesses on Route 20, 56 and some side

Divoll said he'd like to see the town create a sewer stabilization fund "to protect the ratepayers" by providing a source of funds for projects other than rate hikes. At present, if projects aren't paid by rate hikes, by law they default to the general taxpayers, many of whom aren't served by sewers.

other business, announced Oxford will be getting a state Historical Commission grant for preservation of the Library, as well as a Stanton Foundation grant of \$198,875 to build the new dog park. She also recently appointed Tom Purcell to be the town's new health agent by contract (rather than an employee), and signed Oxford on to the national opioid lawsuit. Selectmen also approved a host agreement with True Roots Marketing, which plans to open an adult-use cannabis facility.

started using marijuana in high school because I was nervous about

At 17, I still had not successfully had a physical relationship with a girl, and the social and hormonal pressures were intense.

The '70's was a decade of a lot of moral "freedom", which basically amounted to "intimacy" being talked about in magazines, on TV and shown in movies with unprecedented frequency and verisimilitude.

Nowadays, it's commonplace to see graphic love scenes on TV, but back then it was new and electrifying to see people "making whoopie" in films without a fast cut to a scene of waves breaking on a shore, or logs burning in a fireplace, a euphemistic device brilliantly parodied in the comedy "Top Secret."

All this to say that sex was always top of mind for me back then. And my anxieties about it, about my performance, about the possible consequences, were also top of mind, and worrisome.

To ease the discomfort, I sought out someone who I knew was a marijuana user, with whom I also desired to have a fling. This girl was more than happy to get me "high".

back then. I don't know where she got her stash, but her older brother is a likely possibility. I recall months later trying on his leather jacket and finding inside the pockets two enormous plastic bags of pot.)

The effects of smoking were immediate. I was no longer nervous about anything. I was friendly, clever and amusing, untroubled by the possibility of rejection. I felt like the charming fellow I could never comfortably be in "normal life," but felt myself capable of

A few hours later, of course, I was back to my old confused, introverted self... but also ravenously hungry.

Pot became a staple in my life for many years, and it all started by "solving" my problem of anxiety over getting intimate. After a while, nervousness about sex was no longer my problem. Quite the opposite: irresponsibility about sex became my problem.

Today's medicos undoubtedly recommend drugs to teens for similar anxieties. Today's marijuana, as well as today's psych meds, are far more powerful and addictive than anything I would have been exposed to in 1977, so I am concerned about the 17 year olds of 2019 who might be as nervous about life as

Here's the thing-drugs are a quick fix. They aren't based on or supportive of rationality. They don't cure anything. They are simply substances that affect the body in various ways, some of which can be pleasant, but always with a price.

Any pain diminished by drugs inevitably returns. Drugs rob your body of nutrients and, in many cases, can interrupt normal body function enough to make you ill or even do you in.

Pot smokers, back in my youth, were typified by the comedy of Cheech and Chong, (the Key and Peele of my day) who became famous with slapstick movies about stoners getting into ridiculous situations fueled by "Thai stick", "Panama Red" and other species of weed. (I recall them as hilarious, however, I don't think I'd feel the same about

Garden Herbs: Proper Picking & Preserving

Herbs not only bring essence and beauty to the landscape, they also provide an element of enchantment to a gar-Whether den. you grow herbs for their unique flavors, medicinal value, or just for the pure pleasure of it the humble herb adds

spice to any garden plot! Read on for some harvesting and preserving tips, plus few recipes to spotlight your fresh snipped herbs.

Harvesting Herbs

While snipping herbs daily for kitchen use is a common practice, the act of fully harvesting herbs regularly is also important to ensure new growth. For best flavor, cut or snip herbs in the morning, after the dew has evaporated from the leaves but before the midday sun heats the plant.

Most annual plants can be harvested twice during the planting season. Cut plants back to about five inches above the ground and feed after cutting. Annual herbs can be harvested until frost.

Perennial herbs may be harvested once during the first year and up to three times each season after the initial growth year. Harvest up to 75 percent of the top growth in late spring and another quarter in late summer. Stop harvesting about one month before the frost date. Late pruning could encourage tender growth that cannot harden-off before winter.

Flowering herbs should be harvested when the buds are apparent or when flowers are just opening. This is when their oil concentration is at its peak.

Preserving Herbs While herbs for cooking should be used fresh for optimal quality and flavor, a zealous growing season can necessitate preserving the herbal plants. There are several methods to "keep" herbs for later use. Freezing: This is the easiest method to preserve herbs that are to be used (Marijuana was, of course, illegal in cooking. Herbs should be cut fresh and rinsed briefly in cold water. Chop herbs and spread out on a cookie sheet to freeze. Once frozen, transfer to a zip lock freezer bag. Another popular way to freeze herbs for uses in soups and other dishes that require liquid is to place pinches of herbs in water filled ice cube trays. Freeze and pack them into a zip lock freezer bag. Don't refreeze herbs after thawing. Drving:Drvingisthetraditionalmethod of herb preservation. There are also several methods to dry herbs for later use. Air Drying: If the herbs are clean, do not wet them. Otherwise, rinse, shake off the excess water, and spread the herbs out to dry on paper towels or dishcloths until all surface moisture has evaporated. Remove any dead or damaged foliage. Then, tie the stems into small bundles with twine or string and hang them upside down in a warm, dry, airy place out of the sun. Be sure to make small, loose bundles and allow for good air circulation around each bunch. Dry indoors as sun and dew moisture can discolor and ruin the quality of many herbs. Hang and dry in the kitchen or even a garage or shed. Note: Some herbs, such as basil and mints may mold if not dried quickly. An alternative to hanging herbs to dry in bunches is to spread the herbs out on window screens. Suspend the screens over sawhorses or the backs of chairs. Turn the leaves often to ensure even drying. To air dry herbs with seeds, tie the herbs in small bundles and suspend inside a paper bag with holes punched in the sides. Suspend the bag in a dark area with good air circulation. Collect the seeds when they are dry, and store in rigid light-proof containers. Oven Drying: Traditional kitchen

TAKE THE HINT KAREN TRAINOR stoves can also be used to dry herbs. Spread the herbs on cookie sheets and dry at the lowest temperature. Home food dehydrators also do an excellent job of drying herbs. Follow the directions provided with the dehydrator. Herbs are sufficiently

dry when they are brittle and crumble easily. When the leaves are dry, separate them from their stems and package the leaves in rigid containers with tight fitting lids. Glass or hard plastic are best, although zip-lock plastic freezer bags can be used. To preserve full flavor, avoid crushing the leaves until you are ready to use them. Store dried herbs in a cool, dry place away from sunlight, moisture, and heat. Many herbs ca keep for a year if stored properly.

Herbal Recipes Below are some simple, yet delicious recipes that showcase the flavor of freshly picked garden herbs.

Melted Cheese Spread with Yarrow This is a great salsa alternative when served with Tortillas or corn chips)

Ingredients: one pound soft cheese; one tablespoon minced yarrow leaves; one half cup tomato soup two tablespoons whole Yarrow flowers; black pepper, onionpowderandgarlicpowdertotaste. Directions: Melt the cheese and add the tomato soup, stirring until well mixed. Add Yarrow leaves and spices to taste. Blend in one tablespoon of the Yarrow flowers. Use remaining flowers as a bowl garnish.

Quick Chive **Biscuits** Bisquick makes it quick and easy to

bake up a batch of biscuits laced with fresh chives.

Ingredients: two cups Bisquick; 2/3 cup sour cream; 1/3 cup water; one tablespoon chopped chives. Directions: Stir together all ingredients to a soft dough. Beat 30 strokes until stiff but still sticky. Knead dough ten times. Roll out one half inch thick and cut with

This spicy salsa is a tasty accompaniment to seafood.

Ingredients: one half cup minced onion; one half cup tomato (chopped small); one teaspoon minced Jalapeno chile; one teaspoon salt. Directions: Soak onion in cold water for a half hour, rinse and drain. Mix together all other ingredients and chill covered until serving time.

them if I watched one today; you never see any of their titles on "Best Comedy" film lists.)

Pot smoking was seen as unserious and innocent, nothing to get too worked up about. Overzealous educational films of prior decades which preached marijuana was a one-way ticket to insanity were rightly seen as exaggerated and inaccurate, playing on parental fears with laughably unrealistic situa-

A casual attitude about pot was partly the reaction to the obvious falseness of these "authoritative" films.

Marijuana didn't destroy me. It didn't turn me into a maniac, or ruin my life. But it didn't assist me in navigating the many challenges of life. In fact, it got in the way of me controlling my life.

Although I had innumerable stupid misadventures, the worst thing that happened to me as a result of marijuana was that eventually I did not care what I took into my body to feel better.

THAT opened the door to some very serious drugs which absolutely could have destroyed me and very nearly did.

That may be the most dangerous facet of smoking pot, one that is ignored today in the current wave of legalized weed; if smoking or eating pot to solve one's problems is acceptable, why stop

I don't have the hard statistics to hand, but I reckon most people that, like me, eventually turned to harder drugs to satisfy their pain or their boredom began it all by smoking pot.

Smoking pot was, for me, a surrender to something, a giving up on a problem, not a victory. It was an expression of throwing my hands up and saying, "I can't figure it out-I'll just be numb.'


There are safe, non-drug methods to deal with nervousness, pain, boredom, or any of the unpleasantnesses of life.

Cherry Valley Legion rallies, then deals Shrewsbury its first loss

WORCESTER — Chris Kustigian's two-out, three-run double highlighted a five-run seventh inning for Cherry Valley Post 443, which rallied from a two-run, sixth-inning deficit to defeat previously unbeaten Shrewsbury Post 397, 7-4, in an American Legion baseball game at Holy Cross's Hanover Insurance Park on

Tuesday, July 2.

Cherry Valley improved to 9-4 with the win. Shrewsbury, which lost a second game that same night (8-6 to Milford Post 59), went into its three-day Fourth of July hiatus with a record of 8-2.

Post 443 trailed, 4-2, when it came up to bat in the top of the seventh inning. The frame didn't start well for the visitors as Edgar Lopez grounded

out to third base for out No. 1. Evan Brindisi then got the rally started by working his way on base via a walk. He went to second base when Mike Bordeaux (two hits, RBI) singled to left field. Ryan Berry then struck out (for out No. 2) and unknowingly set the stage for Cherry Valley's comeback for the ages.

Post 443 manager Jim Stephens then sent pinch-hitter Matt Kustigian (Chris's younger brother) to the plate and he pulled Cherry Valley to within a run, 4-3, when he lined a solid single to center field, scoring Brindisi and moving Bordeaux to second.

Dan Mero then tied the game, 4-4, Bordeaux scampering home on Mero's single to center field. Matt Kustigian, who moved to second on Mero's hit, advanced to third when Tyrus Garvin reached on a Shrewsbury error, a play that also moved Mero to second.

That set the stage for Chris Kustigian (single, double, three RBI), who launched the ball into the alley between left and center field, the ball one-hopping the fence and scoring Matt Kustigian, Garvin and Mero to put Cherry Valley ahead, 7-4.

"I've got a lot of young kids on this team and the biggest thing I'm trying to teach them is being focused on every at-bat," Stephens said. "You have to work on your pitch. You have to hit your pitch. You have to look for your pitch.

But, before all of that, you have to know what your pitch is.

"Chris, at times, likes the high pitch. We've worked really hard on him laying off of those pitches," Stephens continued. "Chris did a good job of being disciplined in that at-bat because [Shrewsbury pitcher Mike Bean] started him off with some high pitches. But Chris has consistently worked hard to improve his approach at the plate. He's to the point now where he's chasing pitches he can hit."

Bean took a no-hitter and a 1-0 lead to the mound with him to start the fifth inning, but Post 443 wiped out both in the span of three batters. Lopez led off with a booming double to the corner in left field, went to third base on a sacrifice bunt by Brindisi and then scored to tie the game, 1-1, on an RBI single to left field by Bordeaux.

Cherry Valley took a 2-1 lead in the top of the sixth inning, Garvin reaching on an error with two outs and then scoring from first base when Chris Kustigian's single to center field got under the glove of Shrewsbury's Tyler Hopping and rolled all the way to the

Shrewsbury, however, scored three runs in the bottom of the sixth to take that fateful 4-2 lead to the top of the seventh.

Post 443 once again got a solid pitching performance out of right-hander Aidan Gilman. Gilman pitched into the seventh inning, allowing

Shrewsbury four runs on eight hits. He struck out five and walked four.

"Aidan gave me way more than I expected tonight," Stephens said. "He's been dealing with some soreness and hadn't pitched in eight or nine days. I sent him home [on June 28] and told him to get some rest

"He texted me at one point and all the text said was, 'I want Shrewsbury on Tuesday,'" Stephens explained. "I didn't respond to his text so over the weekend he sent me about 10 more texts asking if he was pitching tonight. I never tell kids until the day of the game that they're pitching, but I knew he was pitching this game over the weekend just from all the texts he sent me. I knew he was ready."

Growing blueberries in honor of National Blueberry Month

It's time to celebrate. July is National blueberry month so enjoy some of these nutritious berries and consider growing a few plants in your landscape.

Don't let a lack of space or poor soil stop you from

growing blueberries. Simply plant a few blueberries in containers and enjoy their spring blooms, fall color and tasty and nutritional fruit for snacking, baking and including in healthful meals.

Blueberries prefer moist well-drained acidic soil. Most of us don't have this type of soil. We can, however, create the ideal conditions with a quality potting mix. Or make your own with a combination of sphagnum moss, pine bark and rice hulls or perlite for drainage. Incorporate a slow release fertilizer at planting to provide needed nutrients for six to eight weeks.

Grow one blueberry in a five-gallon pot with drainage holes. You only need one plant to have fruit but growing two blueberry plants more than doubles the harvest. Plus, you'll have more flowers and colorful fall foliage to brighten your patio, deck or balcony.

Select a blueberry suited to your

growing region or one of the compact blueberry cultivars like Top Hat, Jelly Bean, Blueberry Glaze, and Peach Sorbet. Perpetua is not only compact but produces both a summer and fall crop.

Place your container in a sunny location. Check soil moisture in your container gardens daily. Water thoroughly and often enough to keep the soil slightly moist but not soggy wet.

Dress up the container and keep the roots cool and moist with mulch. Cover the soil surface with shredded leaves, evergreen needles, or shredded bark.

Birds are the biggest pest of blueberries. Simply cover the plants with netting as the fruit begins to develop to protect your harvest from hungry birds. This is a much easier task when dealing with a couple of potted plants versus a large in-ground planting.

You will need to provide a bit of winter protection if your winters are cold. Place your potted blueberries in a sheltered location and cover the container with woodchips to insulate the roots. Or sink the container in a vacant spot in the garden. You can also store your plants in an unheated garage for winter. Just be sure to water the plants anytime the soil is thawed and dry.
