





# MCAS results leave Dudley-Charlton seeking improvement

The results are in after students throughout Dudley and Charlton participated in the state-wide MCAS testing earlier this year, leaving school officials mixed on the scores reported from the state.

School officials presented two reports before the School Committee Oct. 10, one focusing on the results of the district overall and another focusing on the results from special education students. The focus of the test for local students this year was English and language arts as well as mathematics.


District interim Director of Curriculum Barbara Marderosian presented overall numbers showing mixed results.

Dudley Elementary School made the most progress towards the target set by the state at 76% and also received the district's second highest accountability percentile at 65. Heritage School scored a 63% progress toward target and a 67 percent accountability percentile. Dudley Middle School was given a 39%

progress toward target and a 41 accountability percentile, while Shepherd Hill Regional High School ended with a 26% progress and a 33 accountability percentile. Charlton Middle School had the lowest percentage towards the state target at 8% and the second lowest accountability percentile at 39.

So, what does all this mean? For Marderosian it means the schools have room for improvement, but the data may not paint the whole picture on paper.

"The state is really looking at raising the ground floor. The philosophy I suppose is a rising tide raises all ships. In many cases the data can be a bit misleading. For example, if you look at Charlton Middle School and Shepherd Hill you'll see that they have lower progress toward targets, but they are also not Title 1 schools. They have less room for growth in another way of looking at it, where Dudley Elementary has more economically disadvantaged students that have some more

## OHS has change in administration

There has been a change in leadership at Oxford High School, though the reasoning behind the change is still cloudy.

On Oct. 5, the Oxford Superintendent of Schools Dr. Elizabeth Zielinski, Ed.D. issued a statement to the Oxford public schools website. The statement is as follows:

Dear Oxford High School Families:  
I want to inform you that Dr. Kimberlee Henry, Principal of Oxford High School, is currently out on paid leave. You have received reports that this was done as a disciplinary action, which is not true.

I have named Mr. David Nugent as Acting Principal while Dr. Henry is out on leave. Rest assured, your children will continue to receive their educational services from the professional educators of Oxford High School. The District cannot provide you with any further information since it is a personnel matter.

Henry became OHS principal in July of 2017. It was reported that in 2014 Henry resigned from being an assistant principal at Hall High School in West Hartford, CT. Henry was forced to resign due to state officials stating Henry did not complete the proper amount of enough teaching hours to earn her administrator certification. This information is from the Hartford Courant dated Nov. 6, 2014.

Nugent, acting principal, came to OHS in October 2006. Nugent was previously a special education teacher at Shrewsbury High School.

Dr. Zielinski has not responded to numerous e-mails for comment.

## Recreating tools of long ago

Under the ubiquitous surface of post-Colonial and industrial society in America is a deep but often harder-to-see and scattered layer of Native American culture dating back tens of thousands of years.

"They've been here about 20,000 years," Pierre St John of Spencer told the Oxford Daughters of the American Revolution chapter Saturday. Maybe, if some linguists argue based on how words have changed in South America, "it's even closer to 30,000."

In that time, although the technology continued to be mostly stone, with copper and gold in some places for ornaments, agriculture, the relationship with nature, cultural organization and other aspects of society came to be quite sophisticated before European conquerors started arriving 500 years ago. St John noted there might even have been a European influence (but not conquest) millennia ago. One archaeologist whose "theory is very much under scrutiny" thinks he found a spear point in West Virginia similar to those in Europe, suggesting a group

## Fire department project seeking more funding

ISSUES WITH  
BIDDING AND SOILS  
RAISE COSTS

DUDLEY – The fire department renovation project has hit a bit of a snag with the need for more money to come before the town in the coming weeks.

The extensive expansion initiative will expand the existing structure from nearly 6,000 square-feet to an 18,500 square-foot facility. Ground was broken in July after voters approved funding for the \$6.5 million facelift to the 58-year-old facility. Now voters could be asked to approve another \$225,000 after several unforeseen issues caused a significant hit to the project's contingency fund.

Town Administrator Greg Balukonis explained the situation to selectmen at the beginning of October, noting that after the project reached five-percent completion the contingency had been depleted by 65-percent.

"The project is under way. I think things are going well and I think the members of the building committee will tell you things are going well. What has happened in the early stages of the project is we encountered some difficulties. They are items that eat into the town contingency," Balukonis said. "We hope that town meeting sees fit to give us the additional monies that we need to complete the project."

To date the contingency fund has been depleted \$207,562. Balukonis broke down the expenditures showing a combination of soil issues and the withdrawal of an electrical sub-bid as major factors.

The sub-bid situation alone cost the project \$127,087 after the winning bidder and the second lowest bidder both backed out of the project for different reasons, leaving the town forced to uti-

## Town clerk seeks dual raises for assistant

DUDLEY – The town clerk is doubling down on her call for a raise for the assistant town clerk, a move she and Town Administrator Greg Balukonis argue would help the town remain competitive when compared to other towns in the region.

Town Clerk Ora Finn is one of several department heads to propose increases in either wage or hours in 2018, and earned support from the Personnel Board for her proposal before taking the matter to selectmen. She even coor-

minated a study with the town administrator, examining the salaries of other area positions comparable to the assistant town clerk position in Dudley.

Finn appeared before selectmen Oct. 1, asking for a two-step raise to be considered at two separate upcoming town meetings, with the first expected to be on the agenda for the upcoming annual fall town meeting at the end of October.

"Currently the assistant is making \$18 an hour. I've asked that her salary be increased to \$19 an hour starting with the fall meeting, and then on

the spring town meeting it would be increased to \$20 an hour and that would begin with the fiscal year on July 1," Finn said.

Balukonis confirmed this pay raise would bring Dudley closer to the competitive pay of other towns, but it would still have Dudley below the average salary for the position.

"Mrs. Finn did a pretty extensive pay study and it shows that the (current) range is not in keeping with what other communities are doing," Balukonis

# Bertonazzi Foundation seeking best election turnout by town

The race to determine the Senator Louis Bertonazzi Foundation 2017-18 Outstanding Citizenship Award is entering its final stage with the upcoming Nov. 6th election. The competition among the 19 area towns to identify the "Best Voting Community 2017-18" has completed the local election of 2017, the local election of 2018 and the recent September State Primary, and the winner will be announced following the inclusion of the upcoming November election results.

The percentages of registered voters who actually come out to vote in each of the four elections in all 19 towns that had been represented by Senator

Bertonazzi during his legislative service will be tabulated. The town with the highest percentage of registered voters who cast ballots will be declared winner of the Outstanding Citizenship Award as "Best Voting Community 2017-18".

A check for \$1,000 will be presented to that town's clerk and Board of Registrars, along with a plaque to the Board of Selectmen. In addition, a large banner will be unfurled and awarded to the townspeople whose civic spirit in turning out to vote earned the award.

As shown in the accompanying chart, the town of Douglas, with a cumulative percentage total of 20.01%, is currently

The towns of Uxbridge, Millville, Mendon, Milford, Oxford, Grafton, Upton and Southbridge comprise the first tier of leading challengers.

Sutton, Auburn, Blackstone, Westborough, Bellingham and Hopedale make up the middle tier.

To this point, the trailing towns are Webster, Charlton, Northbridge and Dudley.

Just as the rankings have shifted with each of the first three elections, the upcoming November election will have a profound effect on the final standings. Anyone can win.

Not only those who have voted faithfully over the years, but also young new voters who have recently demonstrated a strong interest in government issues, will have another reason to vote.

Hopefully, this competition will provide an additional incentive for all voters in the 19 towns to exercise their voting privilege, a privilege won and protected by the sacrifice of so many over the years.

## Exploring robotics at Dudley Elementary

Computers and robotics are now engrained in today's society and while past generations may have been introduced to this technology later in their education today youngsters are learning about programming and related subject at an earlier age.

Schmitt said the new club was provided in an effort to introduce students to a growing profession while allowing them to have fun and explore technology without the stress of being grades on their work.

"I started the Robotics Club because I wanted to

The entire Robotic Club was in attendance to show off their work to the School Committee. Among the projects presented were the STEM Education Ozobots, a programmable Bee Bot, a personalized iPad video game, littleBits, a Lego robot, wheeled robots and others.

## Treasurer's race has viable candidates

The candidates for state treasurer are the Democratic incumbent Deb Goldberg and Republican state Rep. Keiko Orrall of Bristol.

Goldberg, elected in 2014, says economic empowerment, economic security, and economic stability were the driving forces behind her candidacy in the first place and have been her priority over the last four years.

She said, "Government has an important role to play in improving people's lives. Whether in saving taxpayer dollars through smart debt management to ensuring high school students to learn how to avoid debt."

Goldberg said she's kept her campaign promises.

Foremost among these was the creation of a college savings plan called

SeedMA for kindergarten students at no cost to taxpayers.

"Research shows a kid with a savings plan is seven times more likely to attend college," she said. Goldberg said she supports vocational and technical training to keep workers in Massachusetts.

Goldberg said she has leveraged the treasurer's office and the pension fund to fight for greater diversity on corporate boards and executive positions. She said she knows from her own private sector experience that "companies that invest in people and reflect the vibrancy of our communities are far more successful, resulting in a better economy for everyone."

For her part, Orrall, the first Asian-American elected to the state House of Representatives (2011) said she led the drive to stop Massachusetts' participation in PARRC, a national testing consortium.

Orrall adds she was instrumental "in helping to pass legislation to give small businesses certainty in tax filing deadlines by matching federal and state requirements."

She said she "worked with a bipartisan group to stop an unnecessary regulation in the medical field that would have cost city and town taxpayers millions of dollars."

Orrall said she has also worked with senior citizen advocates and legislators to "help block a measure which would have shut down a quarter of the nursing homes in the state through overregulation and disregard for the needs of the elder population."

"I am running for state treasurer because I believe voters want someone who relates to them and will bring a common sense, fiscally conservative approach to running the state's finances," is Orrall's statement.

Kaiden and his family are proud to be continuing the tradition of the number, and are




excited to see where it goes in the future.

# Re-enactors take over Black Tavern

DUDLEY – Had you driven by the Black Tavern on Saturday, it might have looked like the past invaded the present. Despite the rainy weather, about 15 people donned Civil War uniforms, set up a couple tents and several flags, and erected displays of various period equipment (including a real cannon) to honor their ancestors who fought in that war.

For many of the participants, Saturday's event was just one of what has become a decades-long commitment to history.

Phil DiMaria's interest dates back to the 1960s, while Loren Andrews has been doing it since 1988. To both of them, the fact they have family members

among the soldiers both kept it going and helped spur their concern with trying to be as historically accurate as possible. In both cases, they were visiting Civil War battlefields when they first saw re-enactor in action.

"Some people [who see us] come in and are in awe," Andrews said. "But there will be a lot of people who lay back and ask questions. You realize they have a lot more knowledge of the Civil War than they let on, and you want to be accurate."

After participating a while, "you can pick out quality units from those who are there just to shoot guns and make noise," he added. DiMaria dubbed the latter "a march and chowder society" whose members "just wear costumes."

"If we're not teaching people about the Civil War and history, we're just playing cowboys and Indians. I'm too old for that," Andrews said.

Learning the history isn't just about teaching others, though. It's also about trying to find out the truth of how our ancestors lived, and that's not always easy.

"We've lost that whole way of life," because that era's people did not record the commonplace things of life, just the unusual things, as people always have, DiMaria said. "I'm sure, if they could look down and see us, they'd say 'You've got it all wrong.' We're not trying to glorify war, but to remember the sacrifices these men and women went through."

One of those sacrifices was Lt. Col. George Hull Ward of Worcester, who was seriously wounded during the Battle of Balls Bluff, had a leg amputated and spent a

year in traction, then returned to battle against doctor's orders to get killed at Gettysburg. His descendants kept his memory alive, and today Robert Ward of Cape Cod portrays him in the 15th Mass.

Ward said he was age 9 when he first visited Gettysburg, where a monument to Col. Ward exists. The fact his father taught him the family history and his mother's ancestors were in the Revolution prompted him to get a master's in history and become a professional genealogist.

"It's amazing what there is to find," he said. "If you're looking, they left a lot of paper behind. Nearly everybody whose ancestors were here at the time has a Civil War veteran" – often several, sometimes on both sides.

Webster's Paul Grady agreed, noting people take local libraries for granted, but they're an incredible source of such personal information. In one case, he found an ancestor's photo just hanging in the West Boylston Library, but nobody there knew who he was.

Fellow re-enactor Ray Pedro was researching the three men who wrote a certain key Civil War manual, and found one of the only two photos of one of them known to exist in similar circumstances. He noted

some people today think that only digital media matters, but many key documents of the past have never been digitized and will only be found by visiting such libraries. Often, researchers come across them by accident, he noted.

The internet, however, has also been a boon to such research. Neil Flanigan said he was able to trace some information about his Civil War ances-

tor through the Sons of Union Veterans and Ancestry.com, finding the man had fought in the 18th Conn Infantry. His father, Greg Flanigan, added they also "learned a lot of family history from my dad," tracing one leg to County Clare in Ireland, which they visited while Neil was studying abroad in Ireland.

David DuPont, Class of 1967, was an exceptional basketball player at Bartlett High School, attaining membership in the elite 1,000 point scorers club over his three-year varsity career.

David excelled on both sides of the ball, typically being assigned to defend the opponent's "big man" while also drawing the focus of the opposing defense due to his great jump shooting range. David's fierce passion for the sport revolutionized the way it was played in Webster and his attitude was infectious to the rest of the team. David utilized methods of training year-round that were not common to the sport of basketball for his era.

David became the first sophomore to start on the varsity team in over 10 years, starting alongside four senior players. He scored 181 points during this season. Following his sophomore year, Coach Martin Starosta said "Dave can shoot, drive, defend, and rebound. He should be the very best player in the county in his last two years."

David emerged as a massive scoring threat during his junior year. While leading his team to a 17-8 record, David scored 458 points, averaging 18.3 points per game.

As a captain in his senior year, David continued his outstanding play, leading the team to a 16-8 record and scoring 442 points, averaging 18.4 points per game. This team also appeared in the District Tournament achieving one win. He also led the team to the

Tri-Area Tournament championship game, with David being selected as a tournament all-star.

Over his three varsity seasons, David amassed 1,081 career points. This total puts David in a club with the most elite basketball scorers of all time at Bartlett High School. David accomplished this feat before recognizing 1,000 point scorers became prevalent in high school basketball.

David was selected as team MVP as a junior and senior and was also awarded the 1967 Exchange Club Good Sportsmanship Award.

After graduation from Bartlett, David earned a Bachelor degree from Tufts University.

David had multiple strong finishes in the legendary Boston Marathon, was a volunteer EMT, and was a long-time Big Brother-Big Sister volunteer.

David passed away in 2003. He predeceased his wife Judith who passed away in 2008 and leaves his son David DuPont Jr.

William Millette, Class of 1969, was a three-sport athlete at Bartlett High School. Bill played baseball, basketball, and football beginning in his sophomore year.

Bill was an impact player on the football team earning varsity letters in all three years playing halfback, linebacker and defensive lineman. His reputation was that of a hard-nosed runner on offense and a quick, hard-hitting tackler on defense. As a senior, he was chosen to be a captain and would lead the

team in scoring. For his efforts, Bill received the Alumni Award as the outstanding running back, and the Veteran of Foreign Wars Award at the conclusion of the season.

Bill also excelled in baseball while at Bartlett. He was an outstanding pitcher and third baseman for the Indians. In his first start as a pitcher in his sophomore year, he struck out 15 batters while surrendering just three hits in a win over Tourtellotte High School. During that season, he led the team in plate appearances, runs batted in, and batting average (.347), leading Bartlett to a 15-3 record. As a junior Bill was the number one starting pitcher. In a game against rival Southbridge he pitched 12 innings to beat them 2-1.

Webster Times columnist John Bialy wrote that "Billy was a naturalist in athletics and considered one of the best pitchers in Central Mass." Over his 3-year career, Bill batted .322 and was a three time Border Conference All Star (including the first ever such team his sophomore year). His teams won a combined 39 games, qualified for district play three times, and were conference champions twice and co-champions once. Bill also accomplished an unbelievable .405 batting average while playing American Legion baseball during his high school days, a rare feat in Legion play.

Under the tutelage of Don Cushing, Bill participated in basketball during both his junior and senior years during which Bartlett won the Tri Valley Tournament defeating heavily favored Southbridge, and also qualified for the District Tournament.

Following graduation, Bill attended the University of Tampa.

Currently Bill is self-employed and lives in with his wife Christine in Pomfret, CT. They have one son, Derek.

Brad Smith, Class of 1981, was a 1,000 point scorer for the Bartlett basketball program.

Brad came to Bartlett for his sophomore year, transferring from conference rival Tantasqua Regional High School. During his initial season at Bartlett, Brad's focus was to work hard on defense while working to establish a role as a member of his new team. Over the next three years, Brad would emerge as one of the best guards in Bartlett history.

Entering his junior year, Hall of Fame Coach Bob Paranto referred to Brad and teammate Greg Fiddes as "the best backcourt in central Mass." Brad scored 34 points in a game against Auburn, establishing himself as a scoring threat for the Indians. Brad was selected a Border Conference All-Star and a Telegram & Gazette Honor Team member for his junior season.

During his senior year, Brad was a team captain and continued to excel as a prolific scorer, averaging 26 points per game. Coach Paranto stated Brad was excellent under pressure. Brad joined the elite 1,000 point scorer club during a 29 point performance against Southbridge.

Brad scored a season high 45 points against Groton-Dunstable. For his efforts, Brad was selected as the team MVP, a Border Conference All-Star, and a Telegram & Gazette Super Team member. Brad was also selected to participate in the prestigious statewide Best of 48 All-Star Game.

During his three years, Brad was a member of three Clark Tournament champion teams, a two-time district champion, and a state champion as a member of the Hall of Fame 1978-79 basketball team. Brad ended his career with 1,294 career points, at the time, the most in school history.

After high school, Brad attended Eastern Connecticut State University.

The local press referred to him as the "Freshman Sensation."

In preparing for his sophomore year, Mike attended a summer football camp sponsored by Coach Jim Healy. He got the attention of not only coaches, but also the pros who assisted at the camp (Tim Foxx, Andy Johnson and Mike Haynes) by running the 40-yard dash in 4.6 seconds.

As his career continued, he was a dominant player both offensively and defensively. In his sophomore year, Mike scored the winning touchdown in the Thanksgiving Day Game, which finally broke the 10-year losing streak.

Mike's senior year was action packed with intense performances and numerous awards. He was now starting as a defensive end and was credited with 28 quarterback sacks during the season. In the game against Southbridge, Mike had 14 unassisted tackles, a blocked punt and two quarterback sacks. Mike was awarded the Vincent J. Sabataneli Award as the MVP of the game. Mike was also recognized by being selected to the Border Conference All Star Team and the Worcester Telegram and Gazette Honor Team.

Mike's second passion was baseball. He earned three letters as a starter in center field and was captain his senior year. Mike's best asset was undoubtedly his speed

on the base paths, which made him a base stealing threat as well as a threat to take an extra base on any hit. Rich was a 5'11" 185-pound tailback with a punishing running style who possessed speed, power and balance, which he used to attack would-be tacklers. On the defensive side of the ball, Rich used his quickness, toughness and power to overwhelm opposing linemen. With a boxing background, Rich used his strong hands on both sides of the ball. On offense, he would ward off tacklers with powerful straight arms, and on defense, he would use a powerful punching motion to shed blockers.

In his senior year, he averaged over 100 rushing yards per game ending up with nearly 1,200 total yards and scored multiple touchdowns in half of those games.

In two games against Shepherd Hill, who was considered the top opponent besides Southbridge, Rich accumulated some impressive statistics. He scored a touchdown and rushed for 174 yards in the first game. In the second game, he gained 145 yards, scored both touchdowns, kicked both PATs and was awarded the game's MVP in the 14-7 win. Against Tantasqua he rushed for 180 yards and scored three touchdowns. In a game versus Auburn, he scored a touchdown, amassed an incredible 212 yards rushing, and kicked the deciding PAT, resulting in the hard fought 14-13 victory. Coach Rene Langevin stated "Despite Auburn keying on him all day, he couldn't be stopped." On Thanksgiving Day, Rich carried the ball 30 times gaining 134 yards and playing spectacularly on defense.

As the team's kicker, Rich went 21 for 24 on PAT attempts and 2 for 4 on field goals. However, he is best known for his long kickoffs, which routinely created poor field position for Bartlett opponents.

Rich was a United States National Achievement Academy Award winner in football. The criteria for selection are a student's academic performance, interest and aptitude, leadership qualities, responsibility, enthusiasm, motivation to learn, citizenship and dependability.

Rich is self-employed and lives in Dudley with his wife Deborah and three children Regina, Sonja and Stefan.

Robert Daigle is an excellent example of what Bartlett pride is all about; determination, dedication, and commitment.

Bob was a three-sport athlete during his high school days, playing football, basketball, and golf. However, he is most revered for the years following his return to Bartlett in 1979 serving as a highly influential teacher, coach, and advisor until becoming an administrator in 1990. He positively impacted over a decade of athletes and students at Bartlett High School.

While serving as a coach on the staffs of Jim Healy and Hall of Fame Coach Rene Langevin, Bob's effectiveness as an offensive coordinator was exceptional, resulting in many big wins. Even more impressive though, was the special relationship he developed with many of the athletes. When speaking to former players from Bob's era as a coach, most will tell you that Bob Daigle is at the top of the list of coaches who made a significant difference in their lives. He was often described as an inspirational leader who knew just how to get every ounce of effort out of each of his players. Bob also promoted independent thinking and problem solving by his athletes, rather than simply having a "do as I say" mentality. He always wanted them to understand why they were doing something, rather than just doing it. To Bob, the intangible qualities were far more important than the tangibles of statistics and winning games.

These influences extended beyond the field and into the school day where as a teacher and later an administrator, Bob always maintained a student-first attitude. He had an under-

standing of and appreciation for the uniqueness of each of his students. Bob also served as a class advisor and his commitment and genuine interest in the entire class's success was readily apparent. This allowed Bob to develop the same special relationships with all students in the school.

Unfortunately, Bob's time at Bartlett was cut devastatingly short in 1991 when he suffered a heart attack at the young age of 37 while working out in the school weight room. Bob's untimely passing left a huge void in the school and community, among his athletes, students, and beyond. His legendary and iconic status among all paths that he crossed at Bartlett led to the following statement being made after his passing: "The spirit and values promoted by Bob throughout his entire life had a profound impact on many. We, your former students and players, continue to honor your example and memory." This quote speaks to the legacy that Bob Daigle left on the countless lives he touched in his time at Bartlett.

Bob left behind his wife Diane and their three children Heath, Kristen, and Lauren.

**1968 GOLF TEAM**

The 1968 Bartlett High School golf team is part of an elite group of teams that have represented Bartlett in tournament play and have also been a state finalist.

Seven golfers and one coach faced a challenge that was unique, one that will live on forever and never be duplicated. The team was coached by Ed Kunkel, comprised of Ed Wieloch, John Napierata, Ted Siegmund, Joe Plaza, Dean Mason, Ed Czernicki and led by Bruce Ziemski (team captain and most valuable player). They finished their season undefeated with a record of 12 wins and one tie. In their first eight matches of the season, Bartlett outscored their opponents 68 points to 5 points. They defeated powerhouse Westborough and Southbridge during the regular season, and won four matches in a one-week span. At one point, they were ranked fifth in the state.

At the end of the season, to be qualify for the state tournament field of ten teams, Bartlett had to win a qualifying match against perennial powerhouse Duxbury High School. Keeping the amazing feats coming, they won the match by a score of 336 to 338, a total team victory in that each player's score counted towards their victory.

The state tournament was played at Putterham Meadows Golf Club in Brookline, home course to several of the participating teams in the tournament. Scoring for the tournament was based on the total of the individual scores of the top five play-

ers from each team.

The Bartlett Team surprised everyone but themselves by placing second in the field. Only Newton High School scored better, 328 to 336. What makes this team's achievement so great is, unlike other sports competing in a state tournament, school enrollment was irrelevant for golf. There were no divisions separating the larger and smaller schools, meaning large and small schools competed against each other. This tournament field included the teams of Needham, Marlborough, Springfield Cathedral, Saint John's Prep of Danvers, and other Division I schools. No other team in Bartlett's history has been faced with such a unique challenge.

The 1968 Golf Team from Bartlett High School had an unbelievable season and played with class and a tremendous amount of determination. In doing so, they brought pride to their school and the town of Webster.

**1986 SOFTBALL TEAM**

In the spring of 1986 the Bartlett softball program reached an all-time high and completed an historic season by capturing the school's first District Tournament title in the sport. The team, which finished with an overall record of 16-5, was coached by Larry Norton and Assistant Coach George Hetherman and lead by senior captains Colleen Canty and Lisa Plasse.

The team's success was fueled by a combination of strong coaching, talent, determination, and a unique level of camaraderie and friendship. Most of the team's members had been playing together since the age of 8 years old in the town's Lassie League. They played with great pride and unselfishness. Each individual did whatever was asked of them with the highest level of effort and trust in one another.

After reaching the District Tournament in the previous two seasons but bowing out in first round losses, the girls were determined to return to the playoffs and overcome their opening round struggles. With a focus on fundamentals, strong fielding, and intelligent base-running coupled with the strong pitching of Bartlett Hall of Fame members Danielle Norton and Lynne Silk this special group of girls would finish the regular season with 13 wins and only four losses. This effort was good enough to seed them third in the tournament.

The opening round game pitted the team against sixth seeded Monty Tech. A strong overall offensive performance and solid pitching propelled Bartlett to a decisive 10-3 victory. This set the stage for a matchup with second seeded Oxford High School for the semi-finals. The Indians offense would stay hot and their defense would work out of two bases loaded situations early in the game to avenge a regular season loss with a 10-3 upset victory to move on to the District Finals.

In the Finals, Bartlett would face defending champions and top seeded Quabbin Regional High School. Early offense and heady defense would be the keys to victory again for the team. A 3-run first inning spotted Bartlett with a lead, but when Quabbin loaded the bases with no outs in the bottom of the seventh inning and the score 4-1, it would take a heads up tag and throw double play by second basemen, Hall of Fame Member, Tara Canty and a caught line drive by shortstop Monique Choiniere to preserve the 4-2 victory crowning Bartlett as District Champions for the first time in the programs history.

The team ended their season with an impressive 16-5 record, having made it to the State Semi-Finals for the first time in the program's history.

Kevin was not just an all-around athlete but was a true leader on all of his teams. He is a true definition of a student athlete, excelling both on the field and in the classroom, where he was a high-honor student.

In football, Kevin was a three-year member of the varsity team. On the field, Kevin consistently went above and beyond, always putting in 110% effort. As an undersized lineman, he refused to allow his size to dictate his skill. His leadership efforts over his career led to him being selected as a team captain during his senior year. Kevin was also awarded the Harry J. McMahon Defensive Player of the Game award on Thanksgiving Day, a stellar accomplishment for a smaller than average defender. As pessimistic as that may sound, it's also oddly comforting; there is indeed nothing new under the sun.

## How can you become a 'sustainable' investor?

You can further dilute this risk by owning a wide array of sustainable funds that use different approaches or processes to invest in sustainable companies. However, while diversification can reduce the effects of volatility on your portfolio, it can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.

Track record - As you have no doubt heard, past performance can't guarantee future results, so you may not want to over-concentrate on a fund's historical returns. Still, it might be worthwhile to compare how one fund has performed over time in comparison with similar funds or an index. Many sustainable-investing funds are newer or weren't always invested sustainably, so be sure the track record you are considering is

relevant.

Here's something else to keep in mind: The universe of mutual funds is vast, and some funds may not market themselves as "sustainable," but still include sustainable considerations in their investment selections. These funds could provide you with more options.

Finally, consider including charitable contributions in your investment strategy. In some cases, you may decide that's a better way to meet your financial and non-financial investing goals than limiting your investment choices.

By following a sustainable investing approach or incorporating charitable donations in your financial strategy, you can express your beliefs in a tangible way - while still working to achieve your long-term goals.

“might have followed the Atlantic ice floes down to West Virginia.”

Generally, archaeologists believe the evidence shows the bulk of ancient indigenous people arrived in several waves by way of Siberia and Alaska, either using what’s called the beachcombing route along the Pacific coast or a route between the continent’s two major ice caps approximately along the eastern edge of the Rockies. The former would have been open all the time; the latter, only after about 13,000 years ago.

Either way, St John said the earliest known sign of tools here are Clovis-style spear points, first identified in New Mexico. They’re “found throughout the US,” but are “fairly rare,” he noted. In this region, they’ve been uncovered in New York, Ipswich, and along the Connecticut River, among other places.

Initially, the people hunted with spears thrown or thrust by hand. Eventually, someone invented the atlatl (spear thrower),

a wooden or bone tool about a foot long with a small prong on one end that was used to hurl a spear farther and faster. Nobody knows who did that or where, but it’s found worldwide.

“You can get a tremendous amount of leverage with this thing,” he said. “You can picture four or five of these guys launching these things into woolly mammoths.”

Some scientists theorize the influx of human hunters into America sparked a massive extinction crisis, sending many of the larger species into death around 10,000 years ago. St John and others argue the cause was more likely to have been the climate changes that came while and after the glaciers receded. There’s also one theory claiming extinction came as a result of a comet detaching over the ice cap around 13,000 years ago.

Regardless of which is correct, when things stabilized, the continent no longer had horses, camels, woolly mammoths, several big cat and canine species, giant beavers and other major species, some of which survived in Eurasia. North American people ended up with no animals large

enough to be domesticated for labor or transport, and a relatively small number they could domesticate for food, but found several plants they adapted to a wide range of conditions across the continent. Some of those have become common globally, including maize (corn), squash and beans, and a few are being rediscovered, particularly by people interested in local food sources, including wild rice, acorns and other nuts, and sunflowers.

Throughout this time-span, the native toolkit continued to develop in complexity. Sometime around 500 CE, St John said, the peoples of our area started using the bow and arrow, and Natives took advantage of a wide range of rock types and bone to make arrowheads. Although the easiest to knap was flint, and the sharpest was obsidian, neither were common in central New England. But both were traded into the region in noticeable quantities; St John said the nearest flint quarry was in upstate New York.

He showed a box full of tool chips and a couple trays of arrow- and spear-heads from various places, most of them

he found himself. Of the chips, he said, “These are all from one site. That site I dug was half of this room [in area],” yet it included flint from New York, quartz and other stones. The Natives used stone for weapons, drills, mortar and pestles (for grain and nut grinding), scrapers, some bowls, axes and other things. There were also pottery fragments and one copper ornament, probably from the Lake Superior area, although one audience member said there was also a small copper source in Connecticut.

“This is almost a dying hobby because the land where some of the most popular sites are are now under development,” he said. “[Finding artifacts] was kinda like a competitive sport, especially after a rain, because the rains washed the stones clean.”

He noted his primary tool was his walkingstick, with which he turned over potential objects as he walked, with favorite sites being along lake or river shores. “More often than not, it was a ‘no,’” he admitted. But if he walked long enough he found “my piece of gold for the day.”

“Any place I could pos-

sibly look near a stream or sand bank were prime spots,” he said afterward. “I always asked permission.”

In one case, he said, he thinks the site was “some sort of factory for making clothes,” because it had many scrapers (used for processing hides).

“Sometimes [a find] is disappointing, but it’s still a piece of history,” St John said. “You know it was imported from some place, and you’d love to know its history.”

In other places, the finds are history-making. St John said he’s been trying to get state archaeologist Eric Johnson to look at his collection, but Johnson has recently been leading the excavation of an Adena site near Quaboag Pond. The Adena were an early mound builder people based in the Ohio Valley whose culture collapsed around 200 BCE. Before the Brookfield site was found a few years ago, nobody suspected Adena influence had ever reached this far northeast.

“[New England] is a hard place to do archaeological work because the glaciers went through and everything’s topsy-turvy,” he said, noting

most archaeologists prefer to work out west. But, he added, “I’m sure there are nice sites to be discovered.”

In part, that’s because “while we seem to have trouble taking a walk in the woods...it was second nature to them,” he noted. “They just wanted to see what was past the next hill.”

St John said he has no formal archaeology or anthropology training, but picked it up on his own after finding his first arrowhead while fishing with an uncle at Lake Quaboag in the 1950s. Afterward, he spent a lot of time reading about indigenous people in National Geographic and various other sources, making native-style crafts in the Boy Scouts, and walking the woods seeking native objects, but later found he has no native ancestry.

“I thought for sure I’d have a little in me because my great-grandparents came from Canada,” St John remarked.

said.

With several departments coming forward in 2018 looking for potential raises for employees, selectmen echoed the caution they have embraced through much of the year. While they agree with the need for the raise, they don’t want to set a precedent that any department will receive a raise if they ask for it. Balukonis responded to these concerns, noting the assistant town clerk isn’t just another position, but one with enough responsibilities to justify the raise in addition to being below local salary

average.

“I think the concern that we have is that the position as the assistant town clerk has certain legal and statutory authority and we want to make sure that for continuity sake we have someone in that office that, regardless of who is town clerk, would be able to run the operation. In order to do so we need to be competitive with our salary. If another department can demonstrate that they’ve got a job that’s similar in nature we’re happy to entertain that,” Balukonis said.

Finn explained even if the two raises were approved, the assistant would only match the average entry-level wage for the position, meaning Dudley would be

more competitive but would still be on the lower level of the spectrum. Finn added the position acts as the town clerk in her absence, and reminded selectmen she is going to retire from the position after her current term; meaning Dudley needs to be able to keep a capable individual on board who can assist the new clerk in that office when the time comes.

“I am retiring next year, and you will have a new town clerk,” Finn told selectmen. “I’d like this board to consider that all offices come through the town clerk’s office, much like the selectmen’s office. I am the only department that deals with people on that level that does not have a full-time clerk and I

think really going into the future when you have a new town clerk, they’re not going to know anything. They’re going to be leaning toward the assistant town clerk to learn their office and I’d really hope (the selectmen) consider making the assistant town clerk position full time (in the future).”

The town administrator further added the raise would be in keeping with the goals of the town to have plans in place for succession in town departments. Selectmen chose to get behind the recommendation and seek approval for the raise both later this month and in the spring.

room to grow. That’s not making excuses, but I just want to point out that the data can be a bit misleading if you don’t look at all the context,” Marderosian said.

She added from her experience the state recommends that they don’t compare percentiles and it can be difficult to discuss trends for the current format of the MCAS tests because there’s a brand new baseline to consider with the changes made to the exams and the data collection. She said the district is “essentially in the middle” but improvement is the ultimate goal.

“How are we going to move the district from partially meeting toward meeting expectations? We are going to need to identify the lowest performing subgroups in the district. Also, we’ll need to look at the areas of needed growth. We want to get some targeted goals and objectives,” Marderosian stated.

Concluding her report Marderosian noted all schools that participated in the MCAS tests were deemed “not requiring assistance or intervention.”

Charlton Elementary School and Mason Road School were not included because those facilities did not participate in the testing in 2018.

The second presentation focused on special education test results with director of special education for the district Lorinda Allen being much more forward with her data. In her opinion the district has a lot of work to do to meet the state standards specifically in one

subject.

“With math, we had a pattern of being significantly less than the state average,” Allen said. “Clearly math is one of those areas we need to work on without a doubt.”

Her data showed that nearly every grade tested throughout three facilities of focus, Dudley Middle School, Heritage School, and Dudley Elementary School, failed to meet the state average for high achievement in math. Only special education students in third grade in Dudley Elementary School and grade five in Dudley Middle School managed to meet the mark in math, while every grade tested excelled in English and language arts and those tested in science also met the high achievement standard.

However, Allen also revealed students with disabilities in the district failed to meet the state averages for achievement in the majority of tested areas. This means, as she puts it, it’s time for change.

“Most of our schools did not even meet the state average and that to me as a special education director was very troubling,” Allen said. “We need to definitely change some things up as we move forward. This is not going to be a short-term quick fix. It’s going to take some time. It’s going to take some systematic planning.”

Among the plans she put forward to start the conversation for the future is the review of all K-12 special education programs to ensure efficiency, as well as examining intervention strategies and staffing.

want to keep those so really the alternative is to look and see what could be available.”

Selectman Paul Joseph inquired about why these projects weren’t included in the original budget and Balukonis said this was partially because they were looking for specific systems they felt would require a separate bidding process to obtain. Selectmen approached Fire Chief Dean Kochanowski about the situation and asked if the extra \$255,000 would suffice if the voters decided to support the request.

“There’s going to be change orders throughout the project. That’s just how any project goes, and it costs money, but I think it will be enough because we’re through the worst of it. The dirty soil has been removed. The foundation is in. It’s smooth sailing from here so I do think it will be enough,” Kochanowski said.

Selectmen did not make a decision on the matter as the town administrator asked to have time to work on the warrant first. It was clarified that the additional funding would be included I the original scope of the project and the debt exclusion approved by voters in the town.

lize the third bidder with a much higher price.

Contaminated and poor soils were also discovered with the contaminated sediments only located after work began on the building because they were contained within the base of the structure. This means the contaminants were impossible to detect through pre-project surveys. This required a site professional to be called in and mitigation to take place.

Moreover, the project has several aspects not included into the original budget by design. Among those extra additions to the project Balukonis is a vehicle exhaust system which was planned to be bought at a later date for around \$80,000. A second item is an emergency alert communication system that will cost \$50,000.

“I would venture to compromise that we don’t want to take out those things because they’re vitally important to the safety of the project and the ability of that station to have outside internal communication,” Balukonis said. “We

OXFORD — Oxford High celebrated the 50th anniversary of its football program in style at Homecoming on Saturday, Oct. 13, rolling over David Prouty Regional, 46-6.

Starting quarterback and defensive back Joel Erickson led the way for the undefeated Pirates. On offense the senior carried the ball five times for 62 yards, including a 17-yard touchdown and completed all three passes he threw for 136 yards and a pair of scores. Defensively he made six tackles, recovered a fumble and intercepted a pass.

"Every week Joel gets better and better," Oxford head coach Jeff Clarkson said. "On and off the field he's a leader and he does his job. We love him. He ran the ball well tonight; he took off a couple of times and made plays with his feet. We want him to do that, we told him we needed him to play aggressive. I told him, 'We need you to go when you have the opportunity.'"

The 6-0 Pirates scored on the opening possession of the game, driving 53 yards on six plays. Erickson took care of the final 17 yards, scrambling out of the pocket, weaving through traffic and then diving into the end zone head-first for the score. Niko Murray then rushed for the two-point conversion and, with 8:22 left in the first quarter, Oxford led, 8-0.

"I like being a threat," Erickson said of his success running the football against the Panthers. "A lot of teams key on Niko and we have some kids that can come in and make plays and I feel like I'm one of those kids. I want to be able to help this team out as much as I can. It's a good feeling."

The Pirates increased their lead to 14-0 by the end of the first quarter, 20-0 on the first play of the second quarter and 33-6 by halftime.

As impressive as the offense was in the game, the defense came to play, too, forcing David Prouty into six turnovers — three interceptions and three fumbles.

"Our defense did their job," Clarkson said. "They did everything we asked them to do. We knew they were going to come out throwing the ball and our defense covered them up. They made plays for us."

Other standouts on offense for Oxford were Murray, brothers Sam and Ben Wing, and Tyler Jacques. Murray gained 62 yards rushing on five carries, had scoring runs of five and 30 yards and caught a swing pass from Erickson and went 73 yards for another touchdown. Sophomore Sam Wing gained 42 yards on six carries while Ben Wing, just an eighth-grader, rushed three times for

69 yards, including a 62-yard scoring scamper. Jacques, a sophomore, hauled in a seven-yard scoring strike from Erickson.

Leading the way defensively for the Pirates were: senior Ryan Walsh (seven tackles, fumble recovery, interception); Ben Wing (seven tackles, fumble recovery); Erickson (six tackles, fumble recovery, interception); junior Will Vega (three tackles, interception — returned 27 yards for a TD); and freshman Antoine LaCourt Ramos (five tackles).

At halftime Oxford honored the golden anniversary of its football program by announcing more than 40 former members of Pirates' teams of the past and having them walk out to midfield. Clarkson, Class of 1993, was included in that group.

"It was wonderful," Clarkson said. "Just to go out there and see Mr. [Roger] Bacon and Coach [John] Doldoorian, and the guys that started this program, and all the former captains, that was great. That was the highlight of the day."

"When I went out there and shook their hands and told them I loved them I had tears in my eyes," added Clarkson, as tears returned to his eyes. "Ron Prunier, one of the program's first captains was here, and so many other guys as well. I was very pleased, very happy, with how the day turned out; it was something that was good for the school."

Erickson said the team was energized by seeing all the former players.

"The fans, everyone being here, the alumni coming back, it was just a great feeling," Erickson said. "I want to be able to come back here and do the same thing. So many people came back and knowing that they all support us, it's a great feeling and it makes me want to put on a show for them."

And he did. David Prouty's lone touchdown was scored by senior quarterback Braedon Wood on a five-yard run late in the second quarter. The score capped a seven-play, 63-yard drive.

"We had six turnovers, you can't do that. We did not play well. We did not execute offensively, defensively or on special teams," said Panthers' head coach Pat Rossi, whose team fell to 3-3. "We had our chances. We felt we could play with them. We made some plays early, we'd fight right back and we turn it over. We have a big play and then a turnover. We get a kickoff, we make a turnover. It was a culmination of errors. It was a combination of horrendous play on our end and excellent execution on their end."

# The Pumpkin Harvest is in!

Fields of plump pumpkins ripening on the vine, flickering Jack O'Lanterns lighting the way for a parade of little ghosts and goblins, and a simmering pot of thick pumpkin soup — such are the simple pleasures of a New England autumn.

The humble pumpkin is rich in both nutrition and heritage. In the 17th century fairy tale, Cinderella's coach magically appeared from a large, stout pumpkin; Native Americans and early settlers revered pumpkin seeds as a medicinal sedative; and in modern times, carved triangle faces transform sugar pumpkins into annual ghoulish spooks. It should come as no surprise the harvest vegetable continues to serve as a highly anticipated autumn treat. Read on for some seasonal ways to pump up your pumpkin pleasure!

**Mum's the Word:** Chrysanthemum and pumpkins are two autumn delights that are even better when merged. Create a unique "urn" for your hearty mums by gutting a tall pumpkin and placing a pot of blooming mums right into the pumpkin. The contrasting colors and texture make the perfect display when perched on a front stoop or porch step.

**Seedy Treat:** Many Halloween traditions include gathering the seeds from a carved Jack O'Lantern to toast in a warm oven. To properly toast pumpkin seeds, remove all pulp and clean strings from the seeds. Place seeds in a bowl and stir in melted butter or olive oil and salt to coat the seeds. Spread seeds on a cookie sheet and bake in

a 275° oven for about an hour or until the seeds are golden brown and crisp. Avoid overcooking as seeds can become hard and tough.

**Sprout Surprise:** Pumpkin seeds can even be sprouted to use on sandwiches and in salads. Pumpkin seeds are a healthy snack as they are over 30 percent protein and are high in and oil-soluble vitamins A, D, and E. To sprout pumpkin seeds, place the seeds in a glass jar (Mason jars are ideal) and cover with water just to cover. Secure a piece of cheesecloth over the top with a rubber band. Soak seeds overnight. The next day, drain the water out and place the jar in dark area that is room temperature. Rinse the seeds in the jar at least four times a day. After a few days, you should see the seeds sprouting. Rinse them again and place the jar in the sun for a day or so until tiny leaves form. They are now ready to use as a tasty garnish or salad addition.

**Frozen Pumpkins:** Freezing cooked, pureed pumpkin is a favored way to preserve the taste and texture of pumpkin. Sugar or pie pumpkins are ideal candidates for freezing as the pulp is thicker and firmer. To easily prepare a pumpkin for pureeing, simply place the whole fruit in the microwave for about a minute or so to soften the skin. This will make the pumpkin much easier to peel. Cut the pumpkin in large slices, peel the skin and remove the strings and seeds. Then cut the

slices into smaller pieces. Boil the pumpkin pieces until tender, then mash or process the pumpkin pulp until it forms a smooth, thick puree.

**Pulverized Pumpkin:** Pumpkin can also be dried, which was a favored method of the colonists. Drying pumpkin must be done carefully in order to kill all the germs that would make it spoil. Split the pumpkin in half and remove the seeds. Remove the skin and cut the fruit into thin slices. Steam for about six minutes. Spread on a tray and dry in the sun or in a solar dryer until dry and brittle. This will take about two days. If flies are a problem, cover with netting. Pumpkin needs to be dried in hot sun so that it dries quickly before it spoils. Dried pumpkin can also be made into a flour, which can be used just as you would all purpose flour in cooking and baking. To do, simply pulverize the dry pumpkin in a food processor.

**Fresh Pumpkin Bisque**  
Here's an easy recipe for a rich pumpkin soup. For a vegetarian version, just switch vegetable broth for the chicken broth.

**Ingredients:** 1 medium onion, chopped; 2 stalks celery, chopped; 3 cloves garlic, chopped; 4 cups chicken (or vegetable) broth; 2 tomatoes, chopped; 2 bay leaves; ½ teaspoons nutmeg; 2 cups pumpkin purée (one medium sugar pumpkin, about four pounds, yield about 1 ½ cup purée); salt and pepper to taste; 1 cup heavy cream.

Instructions: Sauté onions, celery, and garlic in butter. Add broth, tomatoes, bay leaves and nutmeg. Cook until vegetables are very soft. Strain and reserve liquid. Purée vegetables with some liquid and strain through a sieve. Combine liquid, puréed vegetables, and pumpkin; heat. Add cream and season with salt and pepper.

## How to make smart choices at the buffet table



Healthy eaters can do their best to avoid the "buffet binge" at their next special occasion.

Buffet dining can be found everywhere from wedding receptions to all-inclusive resorts to cafeteria-style restaurants. Unlimited access to a wide array of foods means there's likely something for everyone to enjoy at the buffet

table. But having so many foods at one's fingertips also may compel some people to overeat. Some people are tempted to get their money's worth, while others have difficulty controlling portions with so many deli-

cious offerings beckoning. Limitless food supplies often tempt people to dine on much more than they normally would at sit-down meals. Dubbed "buffet binging," individuals may walk away from buffet lines feeling bloated.

However, there are some tricks to enjoy buffets without ending up with the post-buffet bloot. Do a sweep of the area first. Examine the buffet offerings before picking up a plate. If something looks irresistible, leave room for it by going spar-

- ingly on other foods.
- **Snack before arriving.** Fill up on high-fiber foods before visiting the buffet line so you'll be less likely to overdo it. If that's not possible, have a salad or broth-based soup as an appetizer. Both options are filling but not too high in calories.
- **Use a small plate.** Pick a small plate so you can't fill it up with more food than you need to feel satisfied. If you're still hungry after finishing your plate, you can always go back for a second helping.
- **Pick some protein.** If the idea is to make the meal worth it from a financial standpoint, stick to protein-rich offerings like meat, poultry and seafood. These tend to be the most expensive items on the spread.
- **Choose unusual foods.** When indulging in an item or two, select foods you don't regularly have access to. And don't hesitate to give signature dishes a try.
- **Load up on veggies.** Fill your plate with plenty of vegetables, which are filling and healthy. Just be wary of how veggies are prepared, skipping those that are coated in cream sauces or look laden with butter.
- **Indulge wisely in desserts.** Pick up very small pieces of dessert if you want to sample various offerings. Fill the rest of the plate with fresh fruit, which is refreshing and low in calories.
- **Slow down.** Eat slowly and register when you are full. This will help you eat with your stomach and not your eyes. After visiting the buffet line, sit beyond the sightline of the buffet so you're not tempted to revisit it.

## Explore new flavors over an open flame



Just about anything can be cooked over an open flame. No matter the type of grilling they're using, cooks who prepare meals over an open flame can't help but notice the distinctive flavor that's unique to grilled foods. Trying something new this grilling season can open cooks' eyes to a host of flavors they might not instantly associate with grilling. The following recipe for "Ginger Soy Chicken Breasts" from Eric Treuille and Birgit Erath's "Grilling" (DK Publishing) is one such meal that can open cooks' eyes to the many wonderful foods that can be cooked over an open flame.

### GINGER SOY CHICKEN BREASTS SERVES 4

2 tablespoons grated fresh ginger  
 3 garlic cloves, crushed  
 2 tablespoons dark brown sugar  
 2 teaspoons sesame seeds  
 2 teaspoons toasted sesame oil  
 1 tablespoon medium dry sherry  
 1/2 cup soy sauce  
 4 boneless chicken breast halves, slashed (see below)  
 Salt  
 Black pepper  
 1 recipe Cilantro Coconut Sauce (see below), optional

Combine ginger, garlic, sugar, sesame seeds, sesame oil, sherry, and soy sauce. Add chicken and toss to coat evenly. Cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes, turning once. Grill according to instructions below. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Serve hot with

### CILANTRO COCONUT SAUCE (optional).

To slash chicken breasts: With a sharp knife, cut 3 parallel slashes through skin, about 14-inch deep.

Outdoor grill: Grill skin-side down on medium-hot coals until crisp, about 7 minutes. Turn and continue grilling until chicken is opaque with no trace of pink, another 5 minutes.

Indoor grill: Preheat broiler. Broil skin-side up until skin is crisp, about 7 minutes. Turn and continue cooking until chicken is opaque with no trace of pink, another 5 minutes.

### CILANTRO COCONUT SAUCE MAKES 2 1/8 CUPS

- 1 handful cilantro leaves
- 1 handful fresh mint leaves
- 4 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 green chile, seeded and chopped
- 1 avocado, peeled, halved and pitted
- 1/2 teaspoon grand cumin
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 3 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1 1/2 cups coconut milk
- Salt
- Tabasco sauce

Place cilantro, mint, garlic, chile, avocado, cumin, sugar, lime juice, and coconut milk in a food processor or blender; pulse to a purée. Add salt and Tabasco sauce to taste. Cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes to allow flavors to blend. Serve chilled.

Cooks note: To avoid discoloration, store in a bowl with plastic wrap, pressing directly on the sauce to prevent contact with air.

Chinese food is one of the most popular ethnic cuisines enjoyed in both Canada and the United States.


What constitutes "ethnic" food differs from person to person. Someone of Italian descent may dine regularly on garlic-infused pasta dishes, while a person from another area of the world may find such foods exotic. In the cultural melting pot of North America, various cuisines representing countries that span the globe are within arm's length for many people. According to Technomic, a Chicago-based research firm, 77 percent of Americans enjoy ethnic foods while dining out once a month. Around 38 percent order ethnic food weekly. In addition, many more people prepare ethnic cuisine at home. A growing interest in ethnic foods is fueled by young people. Technomic notes that millennials

are more apt to want to try various cuisines and then incorporate them into their regular dining experiences. The National Restaurant Association found that 60 percent of people are likely to "tie their favorite ethnic food to their family history." Interest in ethnic foods tends to be highest in urban areas where restaurants and ingredients may be more readily available. When it comes to the top ethnic cuisines enjoyed throughout the states or provinces and territories, Chinese, Mexican and Italian rally for the top spots on diners' plates. While the NRA has Italian cuisine as earning top-billing, Technomic's list says that Chinese food, at 76 percent, followed by Mexican food (74 percent)

and Italian (71 percent) comprise the biggest ethnic draws. Japanese or sushi comes in a distant fourth at 32 percent in the United States. The statistics portal Statista indicates that, as of January 2015, Chinese, American and Italian foods are quite popular in Canada. However, the percentage of people who cook these foods as opposed to eating them out at a restaurant varies. Chinese food is most widely enjoyed in a restaurant setting, while Italian food is frequently whipped up at home. As immigration tides change, ethnic cuisine may change with them. However, interest in experiencing ethnic dining is likely to remain consistent.

# Potential benefits of a vegan diet

A nutritious diet is an integral component of a healthy lifestyle. One of the great things about eating right is there are many ways to do so. A healthy diet that works for some people might not work for others with different tastes, and it doesn't have to.

Eating right can boost immune systems and help people be more productive, and some people even tailor their healthy diets to align with their personal beliefs. One such example is veganism. Adherents to veganism do not eat or use animal products, and many do so to advocate for the ethical treatment of animals.

Regardless of why people choose vegan diets, the potential health benefits of such decisions are myriad.

- **Shed excess weight:** Vegan diets may help people shed excess weight. A 2015 study published in the journal Nutrition found that vegan diets may result in greater weight loss than more modest recommendations. The vegan diets used in the study did not require participants to limit their caloric intake, though many might have simply by the nature of the vegan diet, which is packed with satisfying foods full of nutrients such as fiber that can help people feel full and maintain that feeling of fullness for long periods of time.
- **Improve kidney func-**



tion: Studies have indicated that people with diabetes who replace the meat in their diets with plant protein may reduce their risk for poor kidney function. One such study, published in the Asia Pacific Journal of Clinical Nutrition, concluded that, while more studies are necessary,

substituting soy protein for animal proteins usually decreases hyperfiltration in diabetic subjects and may reduce albumin excretion as well.

• **Protect against certain cancers:** The World Health Organization says that roughly one-third of all instances of cancer across the globe can be

prevented if people make the right lifestyle choices. That includes their choice in diets. Due to the nature of vegan diets, vegans tend to consume considerable amounts of fruits and vegetables. That's good news, as an analysis of data from the Health Survey for England found that eat-

ing seven or more portions of fresh fruits and vegetables every day can reduce a person's risk of dying from cancer by as much as 15 percent.

• **Reduce risk for heart disease:** Fruits, vegetables and fiber also have been linked to a lower risk of heart disease. A study from research-

ers in Japan found that intakes of plant-based foods, particularly fruits, were associated with reduced mortality from cardiovascular disease.

Vegan diets may necessitate an adjustment period when starting out. But over time, the benefits of such diets are numerous.
