## Selectmen green light pot dispensary

AUBURN — By a 3-2 vote, selectmen approved a letter of support for another proposed medicinal marijuana facility in town on Sept. 25.

This one, to be run by Fidelity Wellness Center Inc., is being planned for 435 Washington St., which now holds a dilapidated house at the corner of Millbury Street and Route 20. According to Fidelity's lawyer Philip Boncore, they intend to "take down that eyesore" and build a roughly 2200 square foot dispensary solely for retail sales. It will get its supplies trucked in from Fidelity's cultivation and production facility, which is

being planned for an old mill building in Holyoke, he said.

Based on data showing 1-2 percent of the population gets medicinal pot licenses, Fidelity board member Eugene McCain predicted there's a market of about 400 people in Auburn alone. He expects to draw from a wider area, though, saying "1,000 or more patients we'll build up to," although traffic will be variable on any given day.

"It's not like a McDonald's where there's a tremendous amount of traffic," he said. "Only licensed patients are even allowed in the building."

Selectman Ken Holstrom said he feels

the location is "a very, very difficult spot." Ultimately, he voted no, as did Dan Carpenter.

McCain said his goal is to go through the permitting process this winter, break ground in spring, and open in fall 2018. Once open, the firm aims to provide 10-15 jobs, and "we'd like to bring in people from the town and train them."

He likes the site because "it's easy to see" and get to, but if the town finds it to be unworkable, he said he's willing to work with local officials to find another.

In a memo included with Fidelity's information packet, Town Manager Julie Jacobson wrote the firm "is committed to paying real

estate property taxes... despite being a non-profit entity," and "has indicated it would provide 3% of gross sales to the Town under the Host Agreement, which is the maximum allowed under state law."

One issue, however, is that it will definitely need two zoning variances because it's within the aquifer zone and because it's less than 250 feet from a residential zone, she wrote.

A large part of the firm's packet addressed how it intends to maintain security, which John Tanner of American Alarm Co. summarized at the meeting. McCain noted the firm already provides security and transport for several other firms in

the medical pot field.

"The state has very strict requirements on security," McCain noted, adding their transport plan is to use "a secure but less conspicuous vehicle" than a bank's armored truck. Boncore said there have so far been no security problems at any of the operating facilities.

In the building, the system includes a wide range of sensors, key cards, motion detectors and cameras that both store video for "at least 90 calendar days" and will be accessible to police, the documents state. The main entrance, it adds, is a "mantrap" in which security only grants access "after visually assessing the individu-

al to ensure they are a patient, active employee or authorized contractor, vendor or visitor with legitimate business."

So far, selectmen have approved a similar letter for only one other facility, a cultivation site on Bancroft St., but Jacobson told the board in passing that it fell through without elaborating. That firm is also seeking another site.

Support letters do not give approval to do anything other than continue the regular zoning/planning process and get a "provisional certificate of registration" from the state, McCain said.

## Auburn plan addresses housing needs

AUBURN — Selectmen and the Planning Board both unanimously approved a new housing plan aimed at addressing the growing imbalance between high-end housing and the need for less costly places to live.

"There's a lot of demand for houses in the sub-\$300,000 range and sub-2000 square feet," project consultant Ron Barron of CMRPC said. But not many of those are being built; those that exist typically date to before 1980 and some are beginning to need maintenance. Additionally, there are too few rental units in town; combined, those factors "could be potential drivers of the slow growth of population and the age gap," he added.

Despite Auburn's relative wealth, about 36 percent of residents are "cost-burdened, meaning they're spending more than 30 percent of their income on housing," he said. Some households earn just 80 percent of the region's median income or less (a figure that's about \$68,000 a year, or almost the same as Auburn's own median).

Furthermore, the town is well below the state goal of having 10 percent of its housing deemed "affordable;" today, it has 3.6 percent, he told the Planning Board Sept. 12. (A Planning Board member noted Auburn would need to build about 600 units to meet the 10 percent threshold.)

Town Manager Julie Jacobson told the Planning Board the state knows such a goal "may not be achievable; the reality is, you may never get to 10 percent," but it gives credit for having a plan "that at least shows you're making

## Auburn inaugurates hiking trail

AUBURN — Last week, a door opened from the busy motion of athletics at the Pappas complex to another world, one that's just downhill and over a bridge.

The town formally inaugurated its first official hiking trail, Pakachoag Trail, on Friday. Within a couple minutes of walking, the greenery swallows the sound, some ancient trees catch the eye, and crabapples, oaks, walnuts, grapes and silverberries whisper to be picked. Before long you pass the rustling cornfield and find yourself in a savannah where bird songs compete with sounds of house construction work for attention, if you can take your eyes off the turkeys.

But, as Town Manager Julie Jacobson noted during the ribbon-cutting ceremony, the trek to get there "is not for the light-hearted, or people with a bum knee like me." Parts are steep and rutted, paralleling and crossing a rocky streambed that probably flows in spring, and an area features stepping-stones across what's pretty marshy at the same time.

"It's my project," said Planner Matt Benoit. "It's taken three years and it's finally done."

He noted the town bought the downhill half — the savannah section — of the property through which the new trail rambles about three years ago. When he first explored

## Moore and Frost announce sustainability grant awarded to Auburn

BOSTON — Senator Michael O. Moore (D-Millbury) and Representative Paul K. Frost (R-Auburn) announced the town of Auburn has been awarded a grant through the Recycling Dividends Program coordinated by the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection.

Funds through the program are available to municipalities in the Commonwealth that implement specific programs and policies proven to maximize reuse, recycling and waste reduction. Auburn is slated to receive a grant in the amount of \$8,800.

"This grant funding is critical to supporting new opportunities for sustainability in the town of Auburn," said Senator Moore. "As a former Environmental Police Officer, I recognize the importance of actively promoting environmental protection. I commend the town on their efforts to secure this grant and I am confident that the funding will assist with their ongoing efforts to reduce solid waste."

"I am pleased the Baker Administration awarded the town of Auburn with a grant through the Recycling Dividends Program," commented Representative Frost. "I commend the town of Auburn for securing the grant to protect the environment and create a sustainable community. This funding will assist the town with current waste reduction and recycling programs that are vital to the town's recycling and environmental protection goals."

Before 1990, Massachusetts residents recycled about 10 percent of their discarded materials. In 1990, Massachusetts adopted its first Solid Waste Master Plan, a blueprint for managing solid waste that is generated, reused, recycled, recovered and disposed in the Commonwealth. Since then, government and citizen efforts have led to a 47 percent recycling rate overall, which is among the best in the nation. However, waste generation continues to increase while the growth in recycling has leveled off.

## Bay Path shares state review results

CHARLTON — On Monday, Bay Path School Committee heard the school generally did well in its recently-completed state Coordinated Program Review, but did find several areas that needed work, particularly in the area of English language education.

It excelled in financial accountability, where the five-day review of Perkins Act grant data found "no findings."

"A lot of voke schools don't do a good job on this," Superintendent John LaFleche said, adding that teachers have been able to maintain contact with 94 percent of recent graduates.

According to LaFleche, one of the more notable discrepancies is that the school lacks an ELL teacher. The school only has nine ELL students.

"We may have a teacher who's qualified," but doesn't yet have certification, he told them. Last year, Bay Path advertised for a 40-percent ELL teacher, "but didn't get many applications."

LaFleche said the state review found Bay Path isn't "adequately identifying"

kids who might need it or those who no longer need it, and needs to do better at tracking the latter to ensure they make "adequate progress." Part of the issue stemmed from "having difficulty getting records from a member town," but he noted communication has improved with the interim receiver there.

Language issues were also an element of the eight standards the state saw in the civil rights category, namely, the need to have more documents translated into Spanish, he noted. For the most part, this category's issues manifested as a lack of formal documentation that the school doesn't discriminate in various ways, but it also included the lack

# Gobi pushes for consumer protections in wake of Equifax hack

BOSTON — Legislation heard by the Joint Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure would ramp up consumer data protections and measures dealing with credit reports. Senator Anne M. Gobi (D-Spencer), a co-sponsor of the bill, joined her colleagues in supporting the legislation.

Originally filed in response to data breaches at multiple retailers, the bill has been updated in response to the Equifax hack announced on Sept. 7. The bill would allow Massachusetts residents to freeze their credit reports for free and their credit reports and scores could not be used or accessed without their consent. These protections are critical in a data breach as massive as the Equifax breach, which affect-

ed 143 million people. The information assessed primarily includes names, Social Security numbers, birth dates, addresses and, in some instances, driver's license numbers.

The company is offering free identity theft protection and credit file monitoring, however the fees are only waived through Nov. 21.

In her support letter to the committee Senator Gobi said she "feels strongly that we must protect consumers from cybersecurity attacks, especially when financial institutions cannot. The only beneficiary in a cybersecurity attack is a criminal. Demanding a fee for protection is an unnecessary barrier to something that saves both consumer and businesses time and money."

The Attorney General has announced

her intent to sue the company over its failure to protect the sensitive and personal information of up to 3 million Massachusetts residents. 



# Bump calls for enhanced data sharing to improve sex offender oversight

BOSTON — An audit released today by state Auditor Suzanne M. Bump found that as of February 2017, the Massachusetts Sex Offender Registry Board (SORB) did not have a current address for 1,769 convicted sex offenders, of which 936 had never been classified. The failure to classify these 936 offenders means that members of the public had no way of determining if an individual who posed a significant risk of reoffending lived in their communities, nor did the public have access to critical information about these offenders, such as their names, photographs, registration status, and offenses, which the law requires be included in the registry.

Section 178F of Chapter 6 of the Massachusetts General Laws requires SORB to obtain violators' addresses from executive-branch agencies such as the Department of Revenue and the Department of Transitional Assistance "when there is reason to believe a sex offender required to register has not so registered." Bump's audit found that despite having agreements with the DOR and DTA to share data for the purpose of confirming sex offender addresses, SORB was not conducting these verifications. An analysis by Bump's office using just one of the executive branch databases available to SORB found 39 sex offenders who were in violation of registration requirements that collected public benefits in Massachusetts from DTA. In the audit, SORB indicates its intentions to utilize its existing data-sharing agreements with DOR and DTA, and explore opportunities to build similar agreements with other state

government agencies.

"When government commits to the taxpayers that it will provide a certain level of safety — and transparency — it has an obligation to do everything within its authority to meet that obligation. As technology and data collection continue to change and improve, our state agencies have an opportunity to utilize that change to break down the silos that have historically existed in government," said Bump. "In this case, the sex offender registry is only as good as the information it contains, so without taking the steps to expand and use data-sharing agreements with other state agencies, it is not fulfilling its mission."

After a person is convicted and sentenced for a sex crime, SORB is tasked with providing a classification of 1 (low-risk of re-offense and danger to the public), 2, or 3 (high risk of re-offense and danger to the public) to determine how their information is released to the public and their level of oversight.

Of the 936 offenders who had not received a classification level during the audit period:

237 are convicted of indecent assault and battery on a person aged 14 or older;

177 are convicted of indecent assault and battery on a child under 14 years of age;

143 are convicted of rape; and

129 are convicted of rape of a child with force.

Finally, the audit found that SORB did not ensure that all sex offenders were assigned a final classification before they were released from incarceration.

Other audits by the office have similarly found agencies not accessing or sharing information that would protect the public. A 2014 audit of the Board of Registration in Medicine (BORIM) found that BORIM received only two reports of criminal activity for licensed physicians from state courts during an eleven-year period. However, the Criminal Offender Record Information (CORI) system showed 82 other physicians with either a criminal conviction or continuation without finding that were not reported to the state during the same period. As a result of that audit, BORIM established a new data-sharing process in which it receives information about physician criminal activity from the Executive Office of the Trial Court.

"Unfortunately, SORB is not alone in its failure to establish good data-sharing arrangements that will improve its effectiveness. It can be hard to break down walls," said Bump.

The Sex Offender Registry Board was established by Chapter 29 of the Acts of 1996 to comply with the 1994 Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act, which requires states to create a registry of sex offenders and crimes against children. SORB works with local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies to ensure the proper registration of sex offenders in Massachusetts. It is the only entity tasked with classification of each registered sex offender. SORB states its mission is "to promote public safety through educating and informing the public in order to prevent further

victimization. This is accomplished through registering and classifying convicted sex offenders by risk of re-offense and degree of danger and disseminating the identifying information of those offenders who live, work and/or attend institutions of higher learning in the communities of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts."

At the time of the audit, its registry contained records of 21,808 convicted sex offenders. Of those, 13,127 lived in Massachusetts; 5,260 had moved out of state while another 3,421 were either incarcerated or had been deported.

The Board consists of seven full-time members appointed by the Governor.

The Office of the State Auditor conducts performance audits of state government's programs, departments, agencies, authorities, contracts, and vendors. With its reports, the OSA issues recommendations to improve accountability, efficiency, and transparency. The OSA has identified approximately \$1.3 billion in unallowable, questionable, or potentially fraudulent spending and saving opportunities for the Commonwealth since 2011. Last year, auditees report implementation of 91 percent of the OSA's audit recommendations. The office received the Einhorn-Gary Award for its success furthering government accountability.

# Legislators respond to recent findings of state auditor's office

BOSTON — In response to a report issued last week by State Auditor Suzanne Bump, Representative Harold P. Naughton (D-Clinton) and Senator Michael O. Moore (D-Millbury) are considering a legislative review of policies and procedures utilized by the Sex Offender Registry Board (SORB). Among its findings, the report highlights SORB's inability to adequately maintain the addresses of nearly 1,800 convicted sex offenders, and its failure to classify over 900 sex offenders in the Commonwealth. Naughton and Moore serve as the Chairs of the Joint Committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security which possess oversight authority over the SORB.

"As Chairman of the Joint Committee, shaping legislation and practices that best promote public safety and protect residents of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts is my priority," said Representative Naughton. "The committee is exploring the possibility of holding an oversight hearing which would enable us to dive into the findings and recommendations of the audit, and would ideally allow the Legislature the opportunity to work closely with

the Executive Office, the Executive Office of Public Safety and the Office of the Auditor, alongside SORB in finding a strong solution. When it comes to dealing with SORB and the unaccounted and unclassified offenders, no rock can be left unturned; it is our duty as elected officials to solve this threat to public safety."

The SORB is an office within the Executive Office of Public Safety. The SORB collects the addresses and contact information for convicted sex offenders living in Massachusetts and distributes this information to local law enforcement agencies, and maintains a publicly-available online registry of level 3 and level 2 sex offenders classified after July 12, 2013. The board is responsible for implementing the classification of convicted sex offenders who are released back into the community.

"The Auditor's findings detail troubling deficiencies with current practices employed by the SORB," said Senator Moore. "The SORB is a critical piece of our public safety infrastructure, and there must be strict adherence to established policies to effectively protect residents of our Commonwealth. It is clear

from the report that the SORB failed to meet appropriately high standards during the investigatory period. I look forward to working with my colleagues on the Joint Committee to address these deficiencies and to restore public trust and confidence in the system."

The Auditor's report found that of the nearly 1,800 sex offenders unaccounted for by the SORB, 936 had never been classified upon release from incarceration. Offenders are grouped into three classifications; level 1, level 2, and level 3, which indicate a low, moderate or high risk of reoffending. The SORB, the office of the State Auditor, and the Administration all cited the recent complication of the classification process as one reason for the backlog. A 2015 Supreme Judicial Court ruling, in John Doe 380316 v. Sex Offender Registry Board, established

a higher legal standard for the classification process, resulting in increased strain on the system.

The audit also found that SORB was not properly verifying the addresses of these violators, and recommends the board take steps towards the use of secure data sharing agreements between comparable agencies in other states. of a written procedure to implement an existing policy regarding use of restraints and a need for better notification to parents and/or students regarding suspensions or dropping out.

One "civil rights" area also popped up in the career education category — the need to more fully document that kids have exposure "to a career non-traditional to their gender" and maybe expand that potential.

According to Vocational Director Donald Montville, the school offers four tracks that are considered non-traditional for males, 17 for females, and two for both. All freshmen participate in an "exploratory" program where they try out various shops prior to focusing on one.

LaFleche, however, noted fitting all of this year's 190 freshman boys into the four "non-traditional" tracks would cause them to "end up in some shops with more boys in exploratory than we have [students] in the shop." The school is looking at options for how to address this.

It has already corrected 18 of the 22 "serious hazards" found in the state's safety review, and the rest are in progress. Those ranged from using rafters to store materials to torn safety gloves.

The largest area the state reviewed was Special Education, with "60 sepa-


rate legal standards." Of them, only three were found to have concerns, mostly paperwork-related, Pupil Personnel Director Nancy Alpine said.

Specifically, the state found that some of the school's 140 special ed students' files had written determinations that "were not signed by all members of the team." Some evaluation reports didn't include a section indicating which potential services were rejected and why, and some of the shop parent advisory councils need post-secondary members, she said.

"They're procedural issues," LaFleche said.

"They're not saying we're not providing services."

He noted this kind of review happens every six years, with a follow-up visit every third year.



With the fall saltwater fishing season finally starting to show some good results after the recent hurricanes, anglers are starting to head out on the water again. Boat fishing came almost to a standstill for a couple of weeks because of the high surf and choppy seas. The water was still a bit cloudy as of this past Monday, but every day this week, started to show some improvement.

Tautog fishing in Narragansett RI is starting to improve daily with some nice white chin fish being hooked. Only a three fish limit is allowed daily per angler. The limit goes to six fish per angler on Oct. 15, but anglers fishing on private boats can only retain 10 fish per day for two or more anglers. It sounds a bit ridiculous but those are the rules. Only party boats for hire can have anglers catching six fish daily at a minimum of 15 inches.

The Uxbridge Rod & Gun Club will hold their first pheasant hunt for members this Saturday Oct. 7. The club holds a preserve permit allowing the private hunts to start early and end late. Although the trees still hold foliage, man and dog will be tested on the first pheasant

ant hunt of the year. The club stocks pheasant, chucker and quail, which test the dog's skills in the field. Hunters that have done their training during the off season with their dogs, will enjoy some great days in the field. The regular pheasant hunting season opens on Oct. 14 this year in the Central district. Jerome Jessume of Douglas had his dogs winning a few trials out of state this past week. More on his winning dogs next week.

This past week, a Massachusetts man was killed by a swarm of yellow jackets while working in his back yard. Although he was not allergic to bee stings, he was stung so many times that he succumbed to the attack. At

this time of year bees and wasps are extremely active and are also very aggressive. Yellow jacket wasps often make their nest in the ground at this time of year, and can cause a major problem for the unsuspecting residents of the household.

Spider bites are also a major problem at this time of year. They can also cause major infections if they are not treated.

The fall season is a good time to fish for hornpout in the valley area. The West Hill Dam area is one hot spot for catching migrating hornpout, and can reward the angler with some great eating. Every fall hornpout migrate into muddy areas in the West River. They are not very big, 10 or 12 inch-

es are the average size, and they can be caught during day time hours. Normally hornpout anglers fish for them at night using a lantern, which helps to lure the fish in, as they are attracted to the light. Fishing with worms on the bottom works well, but some of the new power baits also work better.

Catfish are also a species of hornpout but grow much larger. A gentlemen in North Carolina caught a 112 pound catfish on 10 pound test line a while ago but it did not break the state record of 117 pounds! This week's photo shows the huge 112 pound catfish taken in North Carolina.

Anglers fishing aboard a couple of head boats out of Montague, New York were boarded by a couple of Environmental Police recently after they returned to port and found numerous violations. Under size fish and limits

that exceeded the daily quotas were found. The fish and coolers were seized, and other charges are being addressed by Environmental Police.

The fall stocking of trout should be well underway by the time you read this column. Most lakes and ponds that normally receive trout will be stocked, but no local rivers and streams are expected to receive any fish this year. For complete list of up to date trout stockings, go to the massfish-hunt web site.

The annual youth deer hunt was held again this year. The date was Sept. 30. The one day hunt allowed 12-14 year old youngsters to participate in the hunt, but must abide by the regular shotgun rules. For more information go to the massfishhunt website.

# Successfully transition houseplants indoors for winter

Help your houseplants make a smooth transition from their outdoor summer home back inside for winter. The lower light and humidity indoors along with any insects that hitched a ride indoors make it difficult to keep these plants looking their best.

Give them a shower before they move indoors. A gentle blast of water washes dust and dirt off the leaves and dislodges aphids and mites that might be feeding on the plants.

Gradually prepare the plants for the lower light conditions indoor. Start by placing plants in the sunniest south- or west-facing window available or grow them under artificial lights. Leave them here for several weeks if the final destination receives less light.

Next move them to an east-facing or well-lit north facing window. Again, leave them here for several weeks. Gradually decrease the amount of light the plants receive until they reach their final location. This gradual acclimation helps the plants develop more shade tolerant leaves. Foregoing this process results in yellow leaves and massive leaf drop. This is stressful on the plant and its caretaker.

Skip this step, reduce the stress on

your plants and keep them looking their best throughout the winter by growing them under artificial lights. Using a combination of natural and artificial light helps plants better tolerate the less-than-ideal indoor growing environment.

Isolate these plants from your indoor houseplant collection until you are sure no insects tagged along. Check under the leaves and along the stems for aphids, mites, scale and white flies. Use an eco-friendly product like Summit Year-Round Spray Oil (SummitResponsibleSolutions.com) to prevent these pests from moving onto the rest of your indoor garden. Increase the humidity by grouping plants together. As one plant loses moisture from its leaves, or transpires, it increases the humidity around its neighboring plants.

Further increase the humidity and decrease your workload by placing the plants on a gravel tray. Place pebbles in the bottom of the saucer or other shallow container. Set the pot on top of the pebbles. Allow excess water to collect in the pebbles below the pot. As this water evaporates, it increases the humidity around the plants.

You'll also eliminate the amount of time spent and mess made when pouring off the excess water that collects in the saucer. Plus, you'll avoid root rot and other diseases caused by plants sitting in a water-filled saucer.

Give your plants a bit of TLC as you tuck them into their winter lodgings. Your efforts will be rewarded with healthier, pest-free and better-looking plants to enjoy all winter long.

## Consider multiple factors when creating retirement plans

When you create your financial and investment strategies for retirement, what will you need to know? In other words, what factors should you consider, and how will these factors affect your investment-related decisions, before and during your retirement? Consider the following:

Retirement lifestyle – Some people want to spend their retirement years traveling from Athens to Zanzibar, while others simply want to stay close to home and family, pursuing quiet, inexpensive hobbies. Clearly, the lifestyle you choose will affect how much you need to accumulate before you retire and how much you will need to withdraw from your various investment accounts once you do.

Second career – Some people retire from one career only to begin another. If you think you'd like to have a "second act" in your working life, you might need some additional training, or you might just put your existing expertise to work as a consultant. If you do launch a new career, it could clearly affect your financial picture. For one thing, if you add a new source of earned income, you might be able to withdraw less from your retirement accounts each year. (Keep in mind, though, that once you reach 70 ½, you will have to take at least some withdrawals from your traditional IRA and your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan.) On the other hand, if you keep earning income, you can continue putting money into a traditional IRA (until you're 70 ½) or a Roth IRA (indefinitely) and possibly contribute to a retirement plan for the self-employed, such as a SEP-IRA or an "owner-only" 401(k).

Philanthropy – During your working years, you may have consistently donated money to charitable organizations. And once you retire, you may want to do even more. For one thing, of course, you can volunteer more of your time. But you also might want to set up some more permanent method of financial support. Consequently, you might want to work with your legal advisor and financial professional to incorporate elements of your investment portfolio into your estate plans to provide more support for charitable groups.

As you can see, your retirement goals can affect your investment strategy – and vice versa. So, think carefully about what you want to accomplish, plan ahead and get the help you need. It takes time and effort to achieve a successful retirement, but it's worth it.

## Plant in the fall for spring bulbs

Following a long New England winter, few signs of spring are more welcome than the first sprouts of green popping up in a barren garden. The promise of a season of beautiful blooms, the tiny shoots are the gardeners reward of a past autumn spent preparing and planting.

Experts agree fall offers ideal conditions to plant perennials. In fact, this season is the preferred time to plant spring blooming bulbs. The following is a beginners' guide to preparing, planning and planting bulbs now for a flourish of flowers come spring.

If you are selecting bulbs in bulk, such as loose bulbs offered at discount garden centers, it's important to follow a few rules of thumb. Typically, big bulbs produce the largest blooms and may yield more flowers, therefore, it may be worth the cost to pay a bit more for good sized, healthy bulbs. However, if you are on a budget and have the time to wait, smaller bulbs will eventually increase in size and bloom each year.

When choosing a bulb, look for those that are firm and plump. Hold them in your palm and select bulbs that feel heavy for their size. Avoid bulbs with bruises, spots or signs of mold.

And steer clear of soft, mushy and lightweight bulbs. Sprouting bulbs may indicate a bulb that has been in storage for a long time.

A little thought and preparation go a long way in reaping the benefits of a successful spring and summer flower garden. The planning you take time for in the fall will be apparent when the flower garden plantings burst with color and texture next year.

Know your flowers before you plan to plant. While most bulbs require an area where there is full sun, other varieties such as the iris and crocus enjoy some shade after blooming. For best results select a location in full sun or sun with morning shade only. Well drained soil is a requisite for flower bulbs. If you have poor soil, raised flower beds may be an effective alternative.

For best results, design your garden with pen and paper first, mapping out the size of the beds and the flowers to scale. Keep in mind color, texture and fragrance are all important factors when deciding on a particular flower garden plan. Plotting a garden plan is an exciting chore, and there are some basic rules that ensure a pleasant mix of color for a showy display. Notice how a clump of daffodils and tulips are much more charming than a tidy row of the springtime flowers. The eye is drawn toward the burst of color when these flowers are situated in generous groups of plantings.

# Plant easy care daffodils now for added spring beauty

Daffodils have a cheery presence in the spring garden and are a sure-fire way to chase away the winter blues. These fall-planted bulbs are also reliable perennials that require no maintenance and are not bothered by deer or other pests. The National Garden Bureau has declared 2017 the Year of the Daffodil, and with the fall planting season right around the corner, now is the time to choose your favorites.

Yellow trumpet daffodils are classics, but there are many other flower styles and colors to choose from. Double-flowering types like white and yellow Lingerie and long lasting lemon-yellow Sherbourne feature multiple rows of petals and some varieties look more like peonies than daffodils.

Multi-flowering varieties like Beautiful Eyes, display several flowers

on each stem. This variety's white and orange blossoms have a gardenia-like fragrance. Miniature daffodil Baby Boomer has five to ten flowers per stem. After blooming, the grassy foliage quickly fades

away, allowing nearby perennials to take center stage.

Split corona daffodils have an unexpected beauty and are lovely cut flowers. The cups on these daffodils are divided into segments that are pressed back against the petals. Narcissus Cassata has a ruffled yellow split cup and white petals. Lemon Beauty's shorter split cup is adorned with a yellow star.

These are just a few of the many choices that are available for gardens, containers and spring bouquets. Most daffodils are hardy in growing zones 3 to 8. In warmer zones, look for heat tolerant varieties such as Thalia and Silver Smiles.

Mix daffodils into shady gardens filled with hostas, ferns and other shade-loving perennials. As the daffodil blooms fade, the perennials will grow, mask the foli-

age and provide beauty throughout the remainder of the season.

Plant daffodils on a hillside, woodland border, beside a pond or under trees and shrubs. Over time, the bulbs will grow and multiply with minimal care from you. Choose cultivars with different flower styles and bloom times, and plant in drifts to create an attractive display.

Can't decide? Consider one of the many pre-mixed packages such as Longfield Garden's Fragrant, Double, Miniature or Multi-flowering daffodil collections ([www.longfield-gardens.com](http://www.longfield-gardens.com)). Or, create your own long-lasting display by combining early, mid and late blooming varieties.

Get your daffodils off to a great start with proper planting. Order the bulbs early for best selection, and plant them in mid to late fall, any time before the ground freezes. Dig a hole and position the bulbs 6" deep with the pointy side up. Cover with soil, apply a low nitrogen slow release fertilizer and water thoroughly. Once in the ground, the bulbs can remain in place for years

to come.

Reserve a few daffodil bulbs for your containers and window boxes. Pot them up in the fall and make sure they get at least 15 weeks of chilling at 40-45°F. In mild climates, the containers can be left outdoors. In zones 6 and colder, they should be stored in an unheated garage where they will be

cold, but won't freeze.

Start now and enjoy a brighter beginning to next year's garden season. The daffodils you plant this fall will delight you year after year as their carefree blooms announce winter's end and spring's return.

Be sure to take an accurate bulb count of such large splashes of plantings. Your layout plan should also include using flower bulbs as accents in perennial beds, or to fill in rock gardens or as an interesting border to greenery. Be sure to plan for extra bulbs to fill in areas or to add as landscape accents.

For an interesting mix, merge short plants with tall specimens to give variety and depth as well as differing textures. And don't underestimate the power of fragrance. Nothing is more delightful than a pathway of floral scents welcoming visitors to your door.

You should also decide if you want to plan out every aspect of planting a semi formal garden, or if you choose instead to toss convention and bulbs to the wind, planting bulbs the natural way, thus creating a natural sprinkling of blooms.

Scaling plants to the bed is another important factor when plotting your plan. A simple rule to follow is to keep in mind the tallest plant in an island flower bed should have a mature height that is equal to about half the width of the bed. Place these plants in the center, so they can be viewed from all sides. Also remember to take into account plants that grow and expand quickly.

Color is another major consideration when planting your bulbs. If you want your garden to be a showcase all season, select a variety of bulbs that flower during early, middle and late spring and summer for a continuous burst of color.

Just as in the home, in the garden bed cool colors seem to recede and warm colors appear to come forward. To make a small garden area appear larger and more spacious, plant flowers in cool, light colors. As a general rule white goes a long way in a garden bed, but if you use a lot of white flowers in an area, consider adding a dramatic splash of bright red or bright pink or purple for visual contrast.

And, remember, if you are growing flowers to cut and bring the blooms indoors, choose colors that will go with the decor of your home, as well as harmonize with one another in the garden.

Gardens are often planned around color first. The ambiance of your outdoor living space is determined by color and your choices decide whether your garden flowers contrast or complement each other which can result in either a subtle hue of color or a spectacular show of brilliant blooms. The former, which relies on soft pastels to make a statement in the flower garden, is often achieved through monochromatic planning. Choosing flowers of all the same color family may offer a soothing garden setting. Interest is accomplished by

providing varying textures and flower heights in monochromatic pastel gardens.

For a more showy garden, eye catching bright reds, yellows, purples and whites take center stage in a flower bed. Such contrasting colors can be often be achieved with little effort simply by matching up opposite colors on the standard color wheel.

Planting time varies depending on location, but here in the northeast it ranges from September until as long as the soil can be worked, usually around the end of October.

Prepare your bed by making sure soil is properly fertilized. Be sure to dig out the soil to the proper depth. Loosen the soil and if you choose, add a bulb booster to the soil. Bulbs should be planted with pointed side up. Place them firmly, yet gently, into the ground. Cover the bulbs loosely with soil, water lightly and add a layer of mulch. Typically, bulbs should be planted three times as deep as the bulb is wide. In sandy soils, you can plant a little deeper, and in heavy soils you can dig a slightly shallower hole. Bulbs should be spaced approximately a width twice the diameter of the bulb.

Note: Tulips should be planted one inch deeper than indicated if the soil is not too heavy and their location is permanent as deep rooting can prolong the effective life of the tulip bulb.

Forcing bulbs: Forcing bulbs indoors allows the impatient gardener to enjoy springtime blooms during the winter season. Certain bulbs, such as the narcissus and hyacinth lend themselves to forced budding. To do: Drop a bulb into a glass jar and fill with water and small pebbles until the water level reaches the base of the bulb. Position the jar in a sunny window. Water must remain at the same level, so add moisture as needed. To prevent mold, change the water periodically.

it, "I saw an opportunity where there's a 12-foot-wide connection [to the Pappas property] and thought 'That's not going to be a roadway,'" Benoit said.

"I'm really proud of this," he added. "Without the Blackstone Heritage Corridor, this wouldn't have happened. They're wonderful."

The Corridor's involvement began in 2015 when Auburn joined it as the last community in the region who wasn't a member of either BHC or the Last Green Valley. Theoretically, they could've joined both. Jacobson said the trail exists because of a \$15,000 grant from the BHC; among other things, that helped fund two bridges, signs that were hand-painted by the DPW, and a flora/fauna guide.

"We can't get anything done without collaboration," she said. "...But when we all work together, we can."

State Rep. Paul Frost agreed, noting this wouldn't have been possible were it not for the work of Drs. Arthur and Martha Pappas, who spearheaded creation of the recreation area years ago. Martha Pappas said the idea for the complex grew out of the fact the new high school was built on the town's Little League fields.

"It's a wonderful asset, and it's nice to see additions are still being made to it," she said. "It's nice to see all the healthy recreation that's available."

Selectman Doreen Goodrich thanked Pappas for her vision. "Early on, when we were in the planning process, people

were worried this would be just a place for more [playing] fields," she recalled. "We're making this a real community asset; it's not just about the sports fields....The more we add, the more people will be included."

BHC representative Bonnie Combs said her agency saw this as fitting their goal of pro-

tecting historical, environmental and recreational resources. It held a "Go!" program (the BHC's annual event month, akin to LGV's Walktober) here in August, and started a Trail Ambassadors Program last year with the goal "to promote all these hidden trails."

## Auburn wins again, but Warriors show positive strides in defeat

STURBRIDGE — A defensive showdown between the Auburn High and Tantasqua Regional varsity football teams ended in the Rockets' favor by a score of 12-0 on Friday, Sept. 29 at the Reservation.

The tone was set early on in the game — and that tone was defense, defense, and some more defense. The game started with a three-and-out by each team, and it wasn't until late in the first quarter that some offense began to take shape.

Moving the ball methodically down the field and gaining chunks of short yardage, it opened up the Warrior defense just enough for Auburn tailback Manny Rosario to bounce outside on a zone-read play for a 17-yard sprint into the end zone for an early 6-0 lead.

"I think we needed to take what we could get, we didn't get into our rhythm tonight and that is a credit to [Tantasqua]," expressed Auburn head coach Jeff Cormier. "I thought Coach [Nate] Orzech did a great job calling the game defensively for Tantasqua, and it made for a rock fight the whole way."

Despite not getting their offense rolling, it was obvious what the Rockets were trying to do to move the chains. They ran a lot of zone-reads and relied heavily their

one-two punch of senior signal-caller Coleson Hammond and Rosario, a junior.

"We tried to get something going, we wanted see if Hammond could get loose a little bit, but we also like our tailback," explained Cormier. "I do wish we threw the ball up a little more tonight, but we thought that we didn't have the field position to do so; Hammond made a couple good passes completing throws on third down."

Late in the fourth quarter and in need of some insurance points, the Rockets were driving methodically down the field once again. Hammond then connected with sophomore tight end Joshua Adams for a 21-yard gain that opened the drive up and gave Auburn some momentum. Hammond eventually capped the drive with a 4-yard touchdown run that gave the Rockets a 12-0 lead with 4:47 to go.

That was it for Auburn's offense, while the Rockets' defense made important play after important play. They finished with three interceptions.

"Our kids made some real tough plays down in the end zone, and when they had their backs against the wall in the red zone they came up with an interception and a couple fourth down stops to give ourselves a chance and give our offense a shot," Cormier said. "Our defense was

significant tonight."

Despite the loss, the Warriors — now 0-4 — showed toughness defensively, going head-to-head with Auburn's offense that usually puts points on the board frequently. Tantasqua's offense also had flashes of brilliance, driving the length of the field a few times before stalling out.

"We moved the ball very well; we got the ball down into the red zone a couple times. We could have kicked the field goal, but based on the distance we were unsure, but overall we were driving and then we would get a penalty and stall ourselves," explained head coach Jon Hargis. "Those are the little things that we need to correct and again it starts with me, but we will get better."

Against a very good Auburn (3-1) defense that loves to stack the box, the Warriors were looking for a way to get the Rockets out of their comfort zone. They were running many different formations in the game and spreading the ball through the air. Senior Sebastion O'Leary

recorded three catches for 72 yards and sparked two drives with a 36-yard grab and a 25-yard sideline catch, both occurring on third down.

"We have a lot of formations, and based on how Auburn plays defense if you don't try and spread them out a little bit, they will just keep eight guys in the box," expressed Hargis. "That makes it hard to run when you

only have five-six guys blocking, so based on what they did defensively we had to spread them out and take them out of their element."

Coming into the season with a whole new coaching staff, and a new defensive system, Hargis is pleased with how his team has progressed over the first four games of the season. Despite the loss he believes the Warriors

showed massive strides in the right direction against the Rockets.

"We had some good things, a lot of good showings just a few mental mistakes that are easily correctable and it all starts with me," said Hargis. "We have improved over the last four weeks and it showed against Auburn."

## Rockets improve to 6-4; Pioneers look forward to second half of season

SOUTHBRIDGE — When the Auburn High boys' varsity soccer team headed home 5-2 winners versus Southbridge High on Monday, Oct. 2, both sides were encouraged. The Rockets grabbed the win to improve to 6-4, while the Pioneers played well and felt like they could compete better in the second half of the season.

"The goal today was really to get kids that don't play a lot playing time," explained Auburn head coach Chris Bailey. "We brought six JV freshmen up because they don't have a JV."

The Rockets continually rotated varsity and JV players in and out of the game and had four goalies — John Froio, Coleman Picard, Collin Winkelmann and Joseph Leblanc — each play for 20 minutes. In all, Bailey believed that the

game not only helped out his team, but the Pioneers as well.

"That's the idea," he said, "and I think it helps out their program as well, I honestly do. One of the best players on the field was their kid [Jose Fuentes-Rodriguez]. He's quick and skilled — he can play."

Fuentes-Rodriguez scored his team's first goal and was a menace to Auburn's defensive unit throughout the game.

"Jose Fuentes is fast as lightning," said Southbridge head coach Jason Keller. "The better he gets the more dangerous he's going to be."

The Rockets scored the first four goals, though, all in the first half. Nick Gonyea struck in the second minute, and Jadon Latino (Parker Plona assist) grabbed a goal in the 10th minute. Gonyea then scored in the 38th and 39th minutes to complete his hat trick, with

Latino assisting on both.

Fuentes-Rodriguez then got his goal in the 47th minute, with Jose Colon-Rivera assisting. Auburn added an insurance goal in the 59th to make it 5-1 when Jackson Sypek crossed a pass that was headed in by Brett Sullivan before the Pioneers finished the scoring in the 72nd minute with a goal by Colon-Rivera courtesy of a free kick.

Keller was pleased with his team's effort, calling it "our best skilled performance" of the season.

"I think last year we played them and it was 11-0," he added. "In the second half we beat them 2-1, which to me is a great victory, so I couldn't be any happier."

Keeper Luis Quinones made 20 saves for the Pioneers to keep his team close — something he has done all season long.

"Luis played excellent. He's always one of the most solid players in the field," said Keller.

Southbridge, which went 0-17-1 in 2015 and 1-16-1 last season, is now 1-9, but Keller believes the second half of the season will bode well for the Pioneers.

"Last year we won one game toward the end [of the season] and we cut the scores in half of the defeats," he said. "I think we're going to have the same this year except we'll have three or four wins scattered in there."

On the flip side, Bailey hopes his team will qualify for the Central Mass. Division 3 postseason tournament, but the Rockets must play a bit better going forward.

"We've got to get prepared for the second half of the season," he said. "We're on pace [to reach districts], but we've got to get better. If we're where we are right now going into districts, it's going to be one and done."

## Rockets push the play in second half to get past Cougars

AUBURN — In soccer lingo, there is what is known as carrying the play and there is what is known as pushing the play. The Auburn High girls' varsity soccer team spent the first half of its game against Quaboag Regional doing the former and the second half performing the latter. And in the end, the latter — pushing the play — worked much better.

Thanks to a pair of second-half goals, the Rockets defeated the Cougars, 2-0, at Memorial Field on Sept. 27.

The win was 6-2 Auburn's fifth straight. Quaboag, whose roster includes two of the top goal-scorers in Central Mass., dropped to 4-3 with the loss.

"At halftime we talked about keeping possession of the ball, not panicking, not forcing the passes through the middle of the field," Rockets' head coach Emily Para said. "In the first half we weren't waiting until we sent the outside backs are up. We weren't holding on to the possession and then attacking when the moment was right. In the second half we were looking up, we were find-

ing some nice passes and we were hungry.

"It was 0-0 at half," Para continued. "It hasn't been 0-0 at the half in a long time. I think at halftime they realized they could lose the game. They realized we needed to step it up, and we did."

Less than a minute into the second half Auburn grabbed a 1-0 lead, sophomore Julia Lussier scoring off an assist from senior Aly Frotten.

"Aly made a run down the right side and she saw me in the middle of the field in front of the goal, so she passed it to

me," Lussier said. "I took a touch and then I shot it upper left corner."

Lussier said the Rockets knew coming out for the second half they had to score early.

"In the second half I thought we came out as a team with a real sense of urgency," Lussier said. "We had so many chances in the first half to score, and have it be 0-0 at the half, we weren't happy about that. Scoring early in the second half gave us a lot of momentum."

Auburn doubled its lead to 2-0 in the 21st minute of the second half, sophomore Liv Matthews scoring on a header off an assist from junior Ally Anusauskas.

"That was an awesome goal," Para said. "It all started with the free kick by Alex [junior Alexa Katsoulis]. She had a thought to play the ball back to Ally. That was an excellent thought; she saw the congestion in the middle of the field so she played it away from the pressure. Ally then had a nice chip ball in and Liv made a run and headed it far post. You couldn't ask for a prettier goal."

Sophomore Danielle Schmelting posted the shutout in net for the Rockets, making three saves. The number of saves seemed a little surprising when you consider Quaboag has the top goal-scorer in Central Mass. — Kiarra Dorman (20 goals) — as well as Paige Baldwin, who is tied for eighth in the area with nine goals.

"We didn't do anything special defensively," Para said. "We tried to watch for balls being sent over the back side and we tried to step quick to their players with the ball when we were on defense."

Quaboag head coach Chris Bailey took a positive approach coming out of the Cougars' loss to Auburn.

"It's been a while since we've really even been competitive with Auburn and a couple of the other teams we lost to in the last week [Leicester and Uxbridge]," Bailey said. "We're a really young team [10 girls on the roster in grades 8-10]. It's the same every year; we've got 300 kids in our school and we're playing against these big schools like Auburn.

"We can accept that we're not going to win the possession game. But, especially in the first half, we're really trying to maintain our organization

in the back and midfield and counter attack when we can," continued Bailey, who was upbeat about his team's chances going forward. "I think we're on an upward tract. I think we are improving relative to the other teams in the SWCL."

After a hard fought SWCL showdown, Cormier was happy with the outcome to keep them undefeated in the league as she looks forward to her team's bright future. Cormier calls every game a chance to learn and improve.

"What we say to the kids after every game is what did you learn," she explained. "As long as you can take something from every game and you're making progress you're going to get better and that is what we expect our kids to do. We expect them to work together and hustle and play hard and that's what they did and I am happy with the way they played."

## Bay Path beats Pioneers to start season 5-0-2

CHARLTON — Last season, the Bay Path Regional girls' varsity soccer team reached the Central Mass. Division 3 district tournament for the first time in seven years. That taste for postseason play has now translated over to this season, as the Minutemen are off to an undefeated start of 5-0-2 after defeating Pathfinder Regional, 4-1, at George L. Fowler Memorial Field on Tuesday, Sept. 26.

"They want it, they want to be back in," said head coach Tammy Legere following Bay Path's victory over the Pioneers. "They're playing more as a team, they're passing better and they're working harder."

A season ago the Minutemen went 9-6-2 and earned the No. 13 seed in the tournament. There, they met No. 4 Millbury High, the reigning state champions. And the Woolies took it to Bay Path in their first round matchup, 9-0, en route to eventually claiming their second straight state title.

"I think it felt good," Legere said of qualifying for districts before adding that having to play Millbury made the team "a little overwhelmed."

But the Minutemen haven't been overwhelmed yet in 2017, and in their game with Pathfinder it took just four minutes to strike first. Nekelle Waskiewicz rang her shot off the crossbar, but the rebound found the foot of Jayden Pantalone, whose shot got past Pioneers keeper Mackayla Weldon (13

saves).

Then, in the 21st minute, Bay Path made it 2-0 when Ariana Gelardi collected the ball at the center of the box and placed a perfect shot that clanged off the inside portion of the left post and into the net.

The Minutemen held their 2-0 lead into the halftime break after out-shooting Pathfinder, 13-2.

"The problem last year was we had a hard time playing a first half," Legere said. "They [now] want it from the beginning."

Legere added that this year's team is so different from last season's and that they hope to make an even bigger jump in their success.

"We have seven incoming freshmen that we picked up this year," she said. "We have a lot of returning players and only four seniors leaving, so we're rebuilding this year. We lost six [seniors] last year. It's a huge change. It's a whole different team from last year."

In the second half, a goal in the 51st minute upped the Minutemen's lead to 3-0. A corner kick led to the ball finding the foot of Gelardi, who passed it back to Lillian Berry. Her shot popped up and over Weldon's reach.

Bay Path's lone hiccup occurred in the 72nd minute as Pathfinder cut its deficit down to 3-1. Meghan Mitchell's deep shot went up and over keeper Lauryn Dawson (4 saves), but the Minutemen responded just four minutes later.

Pantalone scored again, this time tak-

ing the initial shot and depositing the rebound into the back of the net.

The game was then called with three and a half minutes to go due to a slight injury to Weldon as well as both teams playing through the intense 85-degree heat and humidity. The Minutemen continually subbed players in and out,

though, remaining fresh and playing a solid game of soccer.

"I keep the numbers high — we have 22 girls on the roster — so keeping that many usually helps out," Legere concluded.





# Mid-century modern furniture's Connecticut connection

The New York Times first noted that a new design trend was taking place in a 1998 article. Now after almost 20 years, in 2016 a new article in the New York Times is titled "Why Won't Midcentury Design Die?" The article provides answers to this question from several different designers and dealers. Despite this New York based newspaper's focus on the debate, mid-century furniture's popularity with collectors, designers and dealers extends well beyond New York.

The artistic design of the furniture and size of many of the pieces made mid-century modern furniture well suited for apartments in New York and other big cities. Many of the designers also worked in big cities. We have a connection to one of the great designers of this era right in our back yard though.

Jens Risom's obituary in the New York Times states that he was born in Copenhagen, Denmark in 1916. Risom studied at the Royal Danish Academy of Fine Arts along with Han Wegner, who "went on to become perhaps the most renowned chair designer of the 20th century." Risom emigrated to New York and began a partnership with Hans Knoll who had emigrated from Germany. In 1942, they produced "the armless, affordable chair that became Mr. Risom's

signature in 1942." The chair was "was one of the first mass-produced modernist furniture pieces introduced in the United States and not Europe."

Jens Risom's success grew in the early 1950s according to an article from "Connecticut Explored" on the connecticut-history.org website. An advertising campaign by fashion photographer Richard Avedon and Saks Fifth Avenue generated considerable interest in his furnishings. "The Answer is Risom!" campaign created a need for more production space and additional workers.

The Connecticut Development Commission approached Risom about moving his operations to Connecticut. With cheap manufacturing space and a good available work source, Jens Risom Design, Inc. setup operations in North Grosvenordale. The business achieved considerable success before Risom eventually sold it in 1970.

We sold the contents of the estate of a former manager at the Jens Risom plant in North



Grosvenordale in 2013. Despite condition issues with many of the pieces, there was considerable interest. An office cabinet with water spotting brought \$500. An upholstered chair brought \$425. Even four wastebaskets that showed some wear brought \$375, which provided some nice disposable income for the consignor.

More recently, our August auction featured several pieces of mid-century modern furniture. A pair of Gilbert Rohde occasional tables for Herman Miller sold for nearly \$1,100, a Knoll Furniture bench brought

\$1,150 and a mid-century modern chaise by Widdicomb furniture reached \$3,500.

an effort."

Barron predicted the town's slow growth would continue, adding maybe 10 percent by 2040. For the most part, the growth is likely to be in the "retirement-age cohort," while "the working-age cohort...is predicted to decline."

"Population growth slowed significantly in recent decades" and is generally aging, a situation that creates "an affordability gap between older houses which are smaller and newer homes which are more expensive and larger." Barron said that gap "limits the number of young professionals that can come in and start families."

Fellow consultant Karen Sonnenberg proposed various strategies to fund projects to bridge this gap. One was

adoption of the Community Preservation Act, which would enable the town to put a surcharge (0.5 to 3 percent) on property taxes specifically to fund affordable housing, historical preservation, land protection and other issues. She noted Auburn's median house value is about \$233,000, and if the town exempts the first \$100,000 of value as many CPA towns do, the maximum surcharge would add just \$6 per month to median-value taxes. She also recommended creating an Affordable Housing Trust Fund, which would allow the town to create a new board with the power to acquire property and do other things to expand the affordable housing stock.

Changing zoning rules is also "really important," Sonnenberg said. Participants in the housing committee's public forum urged creating

a new zone for multi-family housing and mixed uses; the latter does exist, but isn't much used and "hasn't created any new housing," she said.

The town could take advantage of three sections of MGL Chapter 40 — namely, section R, S, and B, she said. The first of those gives authority to create a "smart growth overlay, where mixed use makes sense;" several appropriate places exist in town, including Drury Square, and the state offers subsidies. Under Section S, the state will help fund additional impacts on schools if development draws families with kids, and the town is currently using Section B to work with a developer to convert two schools into senior housing, she noted.

Those projects also give Auburn a two-year grace period in which it does not have to accept "comprehensive per-

mit applications that override all your zoning," colloquially called "unfriendly 40Bs," Sonnenberg noted. Jacobson added that all of those school units (110) count to the town's affordable stock because some are defined as affordable.

Sonnenberg said, however, "there are different definitions of what qualifies as 'affordable housing,'" although the most common one is 40B. Most of them are subsidized in some way, either by state funds or density bonuses to the developers. One form is via "inclusionary zoning," in which developers are required to include affordable units in all projects or pay the town a sum of money.

Regarding zoning, Sonnenberg said Auburn should look at modifying its Open Space Residential bylaw because it lacks incentives and therefore "hasn't been used

effectively." Similarly, modifying the accessory apartment bylaw would have "many benefits," especially for seniors and lower-income people.

She went on to recommend making more public property available for housing, encouraging "small-scale infill" that would put housing on now-vacant lots "in a way that's harmonious with existing neighborhoods," tapping the CBDG Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program to help owners fix their older homes, and continue using the state's abandoned housing initiative, by which the town can assign "receivers" to vacant properties to fix and manage them.

Praising the work of the Housing Committee, Jacobson said, "It's a collaborative effort to get done something that really needs to take place in our town."


