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Selectmen approve land trust donation

DUDLEY - Add another 25 acres to the Dudley Conservation Land Trust courtesy of a donation made recently by residents Diana and Roger LeBlanc.

Selectmen were informed of the donation during their meeting on June 2 when the LeBlancs and Conservation Land Trust President Paul Wieloch appeared to seek conservation restrictions on the property now that it is being transferred to the town. Conservation restrictions are limitations put on the property in order to prevent it from being misused or altered beyond the expectations of the donating parties or the town. Such restrictions can include limits on logging, clearing of hiking trails or even bringing pets to the property.

The 25 acres donated by the LeBlancs is located directly adjacent to Wieloch Woods, a 70-acre parcel Paul Wieloch himself donated to the Dudley Conservation Land Trust in 2015. Wieloch said the Conservation Land Trust needed selectmen to approve the conservation restrictions after the state revue of the proposal.

"(Conservation restrictions) are kind of like a set of rules for the property for trails, no trails, hunting and no hunting, dogs and no dogs and all kinds of items like that," Wieloch said. "We own the land on the corner of Fabyan Road and West Main Street, what we call

the Bateman property. At some point we have access there and we have the option of putting a little parking area there.'

Roger LeBlanc delved a little more into the specifics of the conservation restrictions saying they want to preserve a piece of land that is home to significant wildlife in the town of Dudley while also allowing locals a chance to enjoy a scenic part of the town.

"We discussed hiking trails for families. We didn't want dogs and other animals to disturb wildlife. We just want it to be a place where families can go and enjoy it the way it's always been. We purchased it about 30 years ago and we've taken good care of it. There's a lot of wildlife on it and it's just a really nice place with some beautiful landscapes and a nice little brook that runs through it. It harbors a lot of wildlife for Dudley," LeBlanc said.

One question posed by selectmen is who would enforce these restrictions on the and. Wieloch said the Conservation Commission would be charged with that responsibility.

'They are going to hold the conservation restriction, so it would be that commission that would enforce it," Wieloch explained. "They're the ones who would make sure we're doing what we need to be doing with the property.'

Selectmen approved the conservation restrictions unanimously to effectively preserve the land for future generations to enjoy.

Ford added as new library trustee

DUDLEY - The Pearle L. Crawford Library Board of Trustees has added a new member with the departure of trustee Nota Cavic, who left the board earlier this year after five years of service.

Late last month the trustees interviewed and voted to appoint a new addition to the board, and on July 2 trustee Patricia Korch brought the name to selectmen for their vote of approval.

"At the June 26 meeting of the trustees it was voted by majority to appoint Stefani Ford as a library trustee to fill the seat vacated by Nora Cavic," Korch told selectmen.

According to the Pearle L. Crawford Memorial Library website Ford's seat will be up for election in 2020. Ford was touted as an "impressive young woman" and selectmen seemed to agree unanimously approving her appointment effective immediately.

Ford addressed selectmen during the meeting and expressed excitement in filling her new role and offering something to a community with which she has a lifelong history.

"I've lived in Dudley my whole life. I've always been interested in getting involved in the town. I've always used the library as a resource so it's something that's very close to what I'm interested in," Ford said. "I wanted to get involved there to help everybody realize that the library is a very important resource for our town that we should be using. I though my skills that I've attained so far would help the board"

Selectmen echoed Korch's sentiments calling Ford an "impressive" candidate. Several selectmen also acknowledged that Ford is a volunteering member of the younger community of Dudley and expressed hope that the trend of youthful perspectives to town boards and commissions will continue.

"It's good to see another generation stepping up and volunteering around the town," Selectman Kerry Cyganiewicz said.

His fellow Selectman John Marsi added to this saying, "We post these openings we have and she stepped up. I appreciate it. The library is an important part of our town and an asset. It's important to have people who care about it.'


LEFEBVRE TO BE HONORED FOR WORK WITH YOUTH

July Real Estate Market Update



According to Bankrate.com as of 06/10/2018 the rate on a 30 year fixed loan was 4.37% which is down slightly from last month. We are continuing to see a very hot Real Estate Market. We have seen a change in the market over the last month or two. Inventory has been creeping up which is probably stemming from the rising values and sellers realizing they can get a number they could not get before. I have had several calls in the last couple months from sellers deciding to sell just because they saw what we had sold another home similar to theirs for a price they couldn't believe. This tells me even though we still see multiple offers on homes in many areas and price ranges that our market is slowing and moving towards stabilization.

Today we have 1835 single family homes for sale in Worcester County compared to 6 months ago where we had 1315 single homes for sale. However, 12 months ago we had 1784 homes for sale so

inventory is slightly higher than where it was last year. The average days on market is currently 95 days which is a 3.3% increase in days on market from last month. This shows inventory is slightly rising and homes are staying on the market a little longer which again shows a shift in our market. If we look at homes sold over past 12 months compared to the same time for the previous year there is a small increase in sales of 0.2% and a 5.6% increase in average sales price while it is taking 16.3% less time to sell the homes this year than last year in Worcester County. You ink your unique stamp into the notebook with a written note about your journey. You then take the provided stamp and log it into your notebook. It is a great opportunity to get outdoors with a purpose. With this Letterboxing adventure, you will also learn things on the way. Our journey starts in Oxford. Venture into the briar off Main Street. Don't be blue, you can find it if you follow the color of the sun. Drive slowly over the three mounds and park on your left. 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

Lights are out... now what?



A power outage in Webster earlier in the week provided an opportunity to remind drivers about an important issue. This power loss occurred during a prime driving period, between 3 and 5 pm along Route 12 and 193 (Thompson Road). This caused the traffic lights at Routes 12 and 16 as well as the intersec-

tion of Lake Street and Thompson Road not to function. These are very busy locations. When traffic signals are not working, the actions of drivers at these intersections is very important. What is the proper procedure to observe in these instances?

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Transportation driver's manual outlines the proper procedures to follow at all traffic signals. This is a good resource to use if you have specific questions for many motor vehicle laws. It can be found on line at www.mass. gov/rmv/dmanual/chapter4.pdf. Lights that are not functioning properly could be alternately flashing red and yellow colors. In these instances, the red light is the same as a stop sign and the yellow signal will allow you to proceed through the intersection with caution. If the light is not working at all, such as during a power outage, the intersection is to be treated as though it is a stop in all directions. Drivers should be prepared to stop and proceed through when it is safe to do so.

This is a concern for many people. In various locations, such as along West Main Street in Dudley, some local drivers assume the main street traffic has the "right of way" and do not stop. It is always wise to treat these situations with extra caution. If all vehicles chose to proceed through without stopping, serious accidents could occur. It is even more important under these circumstances to watch for other vehicles and pedestrians that could be in these locations. By taking some simple precautions, you could prevent accidents and serious injuries.



Help protect vulnerable family members from scam artists



If you have older family members whose cognitive functions or decision-making abilities have declined, or who are lonely or recently widowed, you might need to help protect them against financial scams. What steps should you take?

First of all, try to gain a good sense of their overall financial activity. Look for red flags, such as a reluctance to discuss money matters, consistently unpaid bills, unexplained withdrawals, mysterious wire transfers or a sudden need to purchase large quantities of gift cards. And watch out for new "best friends" or caretakers who show an unusual interest in your loved one's finances.

Whether or not you've observed any of these activities, you can help your elderly family members by making these moves:

Have checks (such as Social Security payments) directly deposited. You can help your family members avoid a lot of potential trouble by having their checks deposited directly into their bank accounts.

Seek permission to become a joint account owner. By becoming a joint account owner on your elderly family members' checking and savings accounts, you can review statements for suspicious activity. Of course, your loved ones may be initially reluctant to add your name, but if you have a good relationship with them, you should be able to explain the benefits.

Shred bank statements, credit card offers and notices of lottery or sweepstakes winnings. One of the most useful gifts you can give to your elderly family members may be a shredder. Encourage them to use it to shred old bank statements, credit card offers and other financial documents.

Get on a "do not call" list. Telephone scammers are persistent and devious. By registering your family members' house and cell phones at www. donotcall.gov, you may be able to reduce their exposure to unwanted calls.

Obtain power of attorney. By creating a power of attorney, your loved ones can designate you or another trusted relative or friend to assist with their finances now – for day-to-day assistance and protection from scammers – and later, should they become incapacitated. Again, you will need to employ some sensitivity when discussing this issue.

Check references of caretakers. As mentioned above, some caretakers are, unfortunately, dishonest. Before you hire one, check out this person's references. And even when you do, be careful – scam artists have been known to use accomplices as references, so you will need to be thorough in your research and questions.

Get to know your family members' financial advisors. If possible, become acquainted with your older family members' financial advisors. Any reputable advisor will welcome a connection with their clients' loved ones. And if you are involved in any estate plans, this multi-generational relationship will prove beneficial for everyone.

Ask to meet any new "friends" they have met online. When someone is lonely, they become vulnerable to online friendships. Sometimes, these new friends make promises of meeting, but never show – and then they suddenly need money for one reason or another.

the wind and you can feel the delicate breeze.


Heil is not just a photographer, she is an adventurer.



expressed about Panient. "We didn't have anybody else hot at the time. He has a fresh arm; he has come in relief a couple times for us. He came in and closed the last couple games


for us and it has been good. He is a gamer he is one of the older kids. I have faith in





STURBRIDGE — Properly executed, the fundamentals of the game of baseball can lead to a team not only winning games, but also having a winning season. Not properly executed, however, the fundamentals of the game can lead to missed opportunities and can turn potential wins into devastating losses.

The Sturbridge Post 109 American Legion baseball team was painfully reminded about what happens when a team does not play a fundamentally sound game when it faced Grafton Hill Post 323 on Saturday, July 7 at Tantasqua Regional.

Post 109 made two errors and starting pitcher Spencer Cipro walked a pair of Hillers in the top of the first inning and all four base-runners ended up scoring to allow Post 323 to jump out to a fourrun lead en route to a 12-2 victory in a game that was shortened to five inning because of the 10-run Legion mercy rule.

"It would have been a different game if we scored a run or two to answer them, but we didn't come back with an answer and that hurt us," Rosseel continued. "If you answer back with a run or two, you're telling the other team you're still in it; that you're not just going to pack up and go home."

Sturbridge cut the Grafton Hill lead down to 4-2 with a pair of runs in the bottom of the second inning, but it was almost too little, too late.

"We did score two in the second, but it should have been three," Rosseel said, "and we needed to score those two in the first."


Post 109's Curtis Koebke led off the bottom of the second with a single to left field, the ball takattempted to go to third on the hit, but was cut down for the first out of the inning on an accurate relay throw from Grafton Hill shortstop Mike Breen to Holbrook, who slapped the tag on Kingman for the out.

Post 323 answered Sturbridge's pair of second-inning runs with three in the top of the third on a pair of singles and a triple, pushing its lead to 7-2.

Grafton Hill sewed up the victory with a five-run top of the fifth inning, the runs scoring on two doubles, three singles, two walks and a sacrifice fly.

Rosseel was disappointed by the loss, but he feels, because his team is young, that they will continue to improve, not only this season, but next season as well. "We're right there; we're very close to being a really good team," Rosseel said. "I'm frustrated with the way we are losing games, but I'm optimistic because the majority of our kids are coming back next year and when they do they'll have a season of American Legion baseball under their belts. The struggles they're going through this year are only going to help them — and us — going forward.

"I projected that next year is really going to be our year and I'm sticking with my projection, but it leaves a bad taste in your stomach when you give away all the games we've given away this year. We're 6-14, but we could easily be 11-9," Rosseel concluded.

the soil and air warm, at the same time you plant sweet peppers and tomatoes. Cherries

Manage muscle pain and inflammation with sour cherries. They are loaded with disease fighting chemicals and antioxidants. Plus, they help fight inflammation and relieve pain. Purchase plenty of cherries to juice, dry and preserve so you can enjoy their health benefits all year long. And consider planting a sour cherry tree in your backyard. Montmorency is the most popular sour cherry tree, needing only 700 hours of air temperatures between 34 and 45 degrees to initiate flowering for fruit development. New hardier dwarf introductions from the University of Saskatchewan can be grown in colder regions including zone 2. Although it takes several years for cherry plants to start producing fruit, you'll enjoy watching your tree grow into maturity and bear its first crop. Just make sure to cover the plants with netting so the birds don't eat your harvest.

Ginger

Grow ginger in a pot outdoors or sunny window along side your other indoor plants. Ginger helps reduce inflammation and combat migraines. muscle pain, arthritis and post workout or post-gardening soreness. All this and it helps fight nausea so common during a summer filled with barbeques and celebrations. Although it's a tropical plant, you can find plants or rhizomes (the part you eat) online. Or join other enthusiastic gardeners who have had success rooting the rhizomes they have purchased at the grocery store to start new plants.

Sage

You can remove as much as one third of the plant at one time for preserving.

Entertaining ways to prevent summer learning loss

Summer vacation presents an opportunity for students to enjoy an extended break from the classroom. While this respite from routine may be a welcome change to youngsters, teachers frequently lament that valuable educational lessons seem to be forgotten each summer. Educators then face tougher hurdles when students return to school in the fall.

Such a phenomenon is dubbed "summer learning loss," but it can occur during any extended break from school. Scholars have realized for some time that students' rate of academic development declines during summer vacation. Oxford Learning, a tutoring and education training group, offers these eye-opening statistics.

• Over the summer, students tend to lose 2.6 months of math skills and two months of reading skills.

 Summer learning loss can be seen in students as young as six.

• It can take up to two months from the first day of school to get students' brain development back on course.

Summer learning loss, sometimes called "brain drain," can be prevented. Proponents of year-round schooling at The National Association for Year-Round Education recommend a more balanced school year, where summer vacation lasts only 30 days and other school breaks are lengthened. In this scenario, the school year would still last about 180 days, but without the lengthy breaks.

Parents may prefer the status quo, and those who do can take several steps to prevent summer learning loss from affecting their children.

· Encourage more reading.

Schools recommend summer reading lists, but students should also learn to read for pleasure. Research from the National Literary Trust indicates reading for pleasure can improve reading attainment and writing, as well as one's general knowledge. Children can bring books to the beach that they can read between frolicking sessions in the waves.

Enjoy family game nights. Games can be customized to highlight certain skills that require reinforcement. For example, math-centered games that require counting or addition can strengthen generalized math skills. Problemsolving board games may help children become better critical thinkers.

· Make vacations educational. Add travel to historical sites or other places of interest to help history come alive. When visiting new towns and cities, read the placards that explain important moments in history that took place in each town or city, making sure to include some thought-provoking areas of interest on your itinerary.

• Look for science moments. Trips to the seaside, parks and much more present myriad opportunities to learn about science. Children can stage their own experiments with items they find in nature, such as learning about tides,

wind and water flow by sailing homemade boats.
